JOURNAL OF DAILY PROCEEDINGS

The Kansas Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America assembled for the seventy-eighth annual session in the Conference Tabernacle at Miltonvale, Kansas, at 1:00 p. m., Monday, June 7, 1948, with the President, the Rev. W. A. Smith in the Chair.

E. C. Campbell led in the opening songs. For the devotions our President, the Rev. W. A. Smith, quoted two verses of Scripture, "Trust in the Lord with all thine heart; and lean not unto thine own understanding. In all thy ways acknowledge him, and he shall direct thy paths." He briefly stated the great importance of its injunctions, in all our lives, and especially in our conference deliberations. He then led in prayer while a precious sense of God's presence pervaded the place.

Secretary Pro Tem-In the absence of the Secretary, Rev. E. A.

Coates was elected Secretary pro tem.

STATISTICAL GLEANINGS

This 78th Annual gathering marks the completion of another year of history of the Kansas Conference. We pause to express our appreciation to Almighty God that we are permitted to report some increases in the record of our labors for the past Conference Year. We, your Committee on Statistics, have prepared a full report for your future reference, and hereby submit some items of interest.

There has been a gain of Sunday School members of 87, with an increase of 260 in Average Attendance, and 228 scholars converted. In the item of church periodicals, we note that Wesleyan subscriptions have increased 81, and that there are 53 more Wesleyan Missionarys coming to us as a Conference, this year. Conference Property evaluation has increased \$71,829.00. Our church treasuries show a gain of \$1112.81, in amount of money on hand. Although we have had a short Conference Year, there has been a gain in Total Receipts for All Purposes of \$1315.18.

BOUNDARIES

We, your Committee on Boundaries, respectfully submit the following recommendations:

That the Conference be divided into Seven districts as follows:

Lawrence District—Lawrence, Kansas City, Kansas; Ottawa, Leavenworth, Paola, Overland, Mo.; Kansas City, Missouri; Chanute, Ancell, Mo.; Wesleyan Chapel, St. Louis, Mo.

Topeka District—Topeka, First; Gage Park, North Topeka, Belmont, Williams Chapel, Eskridge, Willis, Quinton Heights.

Clay Center District—Clay Center, Manhattan, Abilene, Miltonvale, Salina, Wesley Chapel, Antioch, Idana, Mulberry Chapel.

Concordia District—Concordia, Hall, New Hope, Morgan Chapel, Heber, Hollis, Belleville.

Wichita District—Wichita, First; Wichita, West Side; Wichita Mission, Hopewell, Arkansas City, Hutchinson.

Mankato Districe—P. A. Miller Memorial, Wesley Center, Hardy, Victor, Red Cloud.

Phillipsburg District—Phillipsburg, Cedar, Gaylord, Iowa Union, Englewood, Naponee, Denver, Colorado.

We also submit the following:

We recommend that Bethany Chapel be granted their desire for a full time pastor, also that Wesley Chapel be granted the same privilege and that the matter of the parsonage property be referred to the Conference Trustees. We further recommend that the name of Inglewood charge be changed from I to E.

REPORT OF THE MORAL REFORM COMMITTEE

We, with Simon Peter, would say, "To them that have obtained like precious faith with us through the knowledge of God and our Saviour Jesus Christ: according as his divine power hath given unto us all things that pertain unto life and godliness, through the knowledge of him that hath called us to glory and virtue: whereby are given unto us exceeding great and precious promises; that by these ye might be partakers of the divine nature, shaving escaped the corruption that is in the world through lust. And beside this giving all diligence add to your faith"—

1. Virtue

Our world needs men and women of purpose. May we like Daniel "purpose in our hearts not to defile ourselves." Let us have "Christian pluck to win through Christ."

2. Knowledge

"The intelligent application of principles." "To be forewarned is to be forearmed." "Study to show thyself approved unto God, a workman that needeth not to be ashamed, rightly dividing the word of truth."

3. Temperance

"Christian temperance sets itself against the desire for what is not ours, as well as the undue and immoderate use of what is ours." "He that ruleth his own spirit is greater than he that taketh a city." Let us take warning from the life of Solomon, though he had great wisdom, yet he failed in self-control.

4. Patience

"A calm endurance of all things for God's sake." "Let patience have her perfect work, that ye may be perfect and entire, wanting nothing."

5. Godliness

As Christians our lives are "to be bound to God by a sense of personal obligation." "As He which hath called you is holy, so be ye holy in all manner of conversation." Sometimes we lose sight of the fact that God's reputation is wrapped up in the way we act and re-act in our daily living. "He that hath not the spirit of Christ is none of His."

6. Brotherly Kindness

Brotherly kindness is the daughter of godliness; a love to the faithful prompted by love to Christ. "Wherefore, if meat make my brother to offend, I will eat no flesh while the world standeth, lest I make my brother to offend."

Charity

"Charity is the roof of our spiritual house; it keeps all other graces in union and gives beauty to our character." Jesus said, "By this shall all men know that ye are my disciples, if ye have love one to another."

"If these things be in you and abound they make you that ye shall neither be barren nor unfruitful in the knowledge of our Lord Jesus Christ ... for if ye do these things ye shall never fall ... for so an entrance shall be ministered unto you abundantly into the everlasting kingdom of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ."

RESOLUTIONS

1. Evangelistic Help. Resolved, that the Campground and Camp Meeting Committee be authorized to engage evangelistic help for the Camp Meeting as far in advance as deemed advisable.

2. Election of Conference Officers. Resolved, that the election of Conference Officers be held the second day of Conference at 9:00 a. m.

3. Subscription Lists. Resolved, that all subscription lists and monies raised at Conference for all purposes be put through the hands of the Treasurers of the Conference, the W. M. S., or the Camp Meeting Committee, and that said Treasurers furnish the Conference President with a copy of the subscription lists which they hold that he may furnish each pastor a list of subscriptions from his charge.

4. Sanctity of God's House. Resolved, that such work as making quilts and disposing of the same be performed in the homes of the people and not in the houses erected for public worship.

5. Pastor's Moving Expense. Resolved, that the class hiring a minister shall within ten days after his arrival pay to him his moving expenses, this not to be applied on his salary.

6. Reporting All Officers to Pastors. Resolved, that all monies be reported to the pastors for entry on their statistical report in order to

give due credit to the charge and to the Conference.

7. Unleavened Bread. Resolved, that it shall be the sense of this Conference that all our churches use unleavened bread in the administration of the Lord's Supper. We suggest the following recipe: One-third cup flour, one teaspoon butter (heaping), moisten with milk enough to roll. Mark in one-inch squares and bake as pie dough. The above will serve 50 people.

8. Pastor Nominates Steward. Resolved, that it be the sense of this Conerence that the pastor be granted the privilege of nominating one mem-

ber of the Board of Stewards from each church on his charge.

9. President's Duties. Resolved, that the Conference President shall First, travel the Conference and hold one-half of the Quarterly Meetings. Second, urge the proper repair and insurance of church property. Third, call a meeting, upon request of the Board of Stewards or Pastor to help arrange a workable financial plan for the church.

10. Vacations. Resolved, that the Conference President be granted a vacation over two Sundays, that the greater part of three weeks might be taken if desired, and that he be given two weeks' extra pay in addition to

his regular salary at the time he chooses for his vacation.

Resolved, that we recommend that each charge grant their Pastor a one Sunday leave of absence from his work, that the greater part of two weeks might be used for vacation and that the church give him one week's

pay in addition to his regular salary at a time agreed upon by Pastor and church for vacation.

11. Nominating Committee. Resolved, that we elect a committee of five elders, including the President ex-officio, and three delegates-elect, from three churches designated by the Conference to: First, examine the credentials that are in the hands of the committee at the time of its first meeting. Second, Nominate all sessional committees and be prepared to report at the first session of the Conference. Third, nominate the personnel of all Conference Boards and report at an early session of the Conference. Fourth, nominate the Committee Chairman for next year. Fifth, nominate the District Chairman. Sixth, nominate a minister of the Conference to preach the Conference sermon next year.

12. Theological Institute. Resolved, that the traveling expenses of the instructors to and from the Institute be paid from the Conference Fund

and also such books as may be needed.

13. Superannuate Service. Resolved, that one public service in each Annual Camp Meeting or Conference Period be set aside in honor of the Superannuated Ministers and for the purpose of creating interest in the Superannuate Fund and that it be the duty of the Superannuate Board to arrange for such a service.

 Conference Loans. Resolved, that the Conference Treasurer shall issue no loans from any Conference monies except by sanction of the Con-

ference Trustees.

15. Additional Delegate. Resolved, that when more than one delegate from any one church presents credentials to this body, there shall appear in the credentials the name of the elder that entitles the church to the

additional delegate.

16. Fiscal Year. Resolved, that the closing date of the fiscal year be two weeks before the opening date of the Annual Conference Camp Period, and that all statictical reports must be in the hands of the Conference Treasurer at least one week before Conference. He shall forward the blanks to the Statistical Chairman who shall be able to report at an early session of Conference. (The Fiscal Year for 1948-1949 shall close May 23, 1949.)

17. Pastors Paid Through Conference. Resolved, that the church's financial obligation to the pastor, whether he be leaving the field or not, be extended throughout the Conference and Camp Meeting Period.

18. Orders of the Day. Resolved, that the Camp Meeting and Campground Committee be permanently the Committee on Orders of the Day, to prepare ahead of time the Conference Program for publication in the "Visitor."

19. Camp Meeting Committee. Resolved, that the President of the W. Y. P. S. be a member ex-officio of the Camp Meeting Committee.

20. Trustees Authorized. Resolved, that all action heretofore taken by the Trustees of the Annual Conference in the interim between the meetings of such Annual Conferences concerning the purchase or conveyance of real estate are hereby approved and confirmed and held to be as binding upon the Annual Conference as they would have been if such action had been specifically authorized by the Annual Conference.

Resolved, that the duly elected and qualified Trustees of the Annual Conference are hereby authorized and directed to take such necessary action as to them seem proper and expedient and to the best interest of the Annual Conference and the local churches concerning the purchase, sale, mortgaging and conveyance of real estate during the interim between the meeting of the Annual Conference and all such actions so taken by the

Trustees shall be deemed to be legal and binding upon the Annual Conference and as full force and effect as they would have been if such actions on the part of the Trustees had been specifically authorized by the Annual Conference.

- 21. Introduction of New Business. Resolved, that all introduction of new business of such a nature as to require an election must be presented not later than noon of the third day of Conference.
- 22. Installation of Officers. Resolved, that all Conference Officers continue in office until the close of the annual session of the Conference when there shall be an installation service held for the installation of the officers as are to appear in the Conference Minutes; this service to be arranged by the Pastoral Relations Committee.
- 23. Pastors—Released for Meetings. Resolved, that we earnestly request each of our churches to release their pastor for one meeting of three weeks' length to be held on a new field or on one of the weaker charges under the direction of the Missionary Board, and that the church pay his salary during his absence.
- 24. Money to Treasurer. Resolved, that the pastors be urged to send all remittances to the treasurer in whole dollars when possible. That the budget money be remitted quarterly from the local churches.
- 25. Conveying Property. Resolved, that all instruments conveying property for church or parsonage use carry the official name of the church, viz., "The Kansas Conference of The Wesleyan Methodist Church of America, Inc."

26. Conference and Camp Date. Resolved, that Camp Meeting begin annually on the first Sunday in June, and continue through the following Sunday.

That there be a session of Conferense the first Monday afternoon of Camp week, for the purpose of electing committees, so that said committees may meet from time to time during camp week.

That Conference shall adjourn following this first session, to meet the following Monday or on call of the Chair and continue until business is completed. The Orders of the Day Committee shall arrange for services, which may be held during camp week, at times not to conflict with evangelistic services.

27. Calling List. Whereas, most of the friends and members of our local churches are won through the personal contact of the pastors;

And whereas many of these friends and prospective members are lost in the changing from one pastor to another because the incoming pastor does not know of these people nor their interest in the church;

Be it resolved, that this Conference ask each pastor to prepare a calling list of all the homes connected with the church and Sunday school, listing the relationship they hold to the church, listing their names and addresses by city, street and number. The same to be kept for his own work while on the pastorate and to be given to his successor on the field.

28. Church Delegate Expense. Resolved, that each local church pay the Annual Conference Church Delegate room, board and transportation expenses, the same to be paid in advance.

29. Field Man and Quarterly Meeting Evangelist. Resolved, that we elect by ballot a General Field Man to labor under the Missionary Board, who not employed as a Field Man is to hold Quarterly Meeting services.

30. New Resolutions. Resolved that all new resolutions and changes in existing resolutions be printed in the Conference Visitor at least sixty days before the next Conference session.

All proposed resolutions and changes in existing resolutions not so printed shall require a two-thirds vote to pass.

31. Order of Business. Inasmuch as it is the desire of the Conference to complete its business as soon as possible it is recommended that

the following procedure of business be followed:

First, All delegates' credentials, whether regular or alternate, which are turned in after the first seating of delegates, be turned in directly to the Nominating Committee who shall examine such credentials, and report such to the Secretary who shall read the names added to the roll at the next session at which time they are automatically seated, if no objection

Second, All recommendations to study or travel be turned directly tothe Assistant Secretary who shall turn them to the Committee on Itineracy

and Orders.

Third, Ministers' reports shall be given immediately after Officers' reports are given, and continued whenever other business will permit. Fourth, The following order of business shall be followed in each ses-

sion:

Roll call a.

Minutes b.

Communications C.

- d. Special Committees Standing Committees Sessional Committees e. f.
- Unfinished business g. Ministers' Reports

Fifth, Business shall continue from 8:30 to 12 noon and from 1:30 to 4:30 each day with no adjournment for committee work, unless deemed very necessary. It is understood that important Committees may meet during sessions if necessary.

32. Conference Visitor. Resolved, that each Sunday school of the Conference pay \$1.00 to supplement the subscription income of the Visitor, the same to be sent to the editor.

REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT

"How firm a foundation, ye saints of the Lord Is laid for your faith in His excellent word?"

A knowledge of the Word of God and a love for its truths are our only means of security in this age of insecurity. False teachers glibly quote portions of the Bible and wrest it to suit their own pernicious doctrines. Sometimes we hear good people say, "He must be alright for he quotes so much Bible." Their own limited knowledge of the Word makes "it possible for the false teacher to mislead their unwary and unstable hearts. "Man shall not live by bread alone, but by every word that proceedeth out of the mouth of God." "By every word." We are commanded to search the scriptures for in them ye think ye have eternal life; to study to show ourselves approved unto God; to hide His sure word of truth in our hearts; to keep all His commandments.

His Word is life and light to man. It reveals Christ who beame the Living Word; makes plain the way of salvation; presribes rules of daily conduct for the followers of Christ, and offers 32,000 promises to the obedient; declaring over and over again, "If ye will, I will." It opens heaven to our wondering hearts and makes clear the awful tragedy of sin. I shall be judged by it, therefore, I must live by it.

Ezra prepared his heart to seek the law of the Lord and to do it. How essential that we do likewise! It is modern to receive whatever portions of the Word please the carnal, world loving heart. For whosoever shall keep the whole law, and yet offend in one point, he is guilty of all.—James 2:10. But whoso keepeth his word in him verily is the love of God perfected; hereby we know that we are in him. 1 John 2:5. Obedience to the Word of God will not only assure us of an entrance into His heavenly kingdom, it will make possible answers to prayer and write records of achieving faith. "On God's Word I stand secure."

The lives of Bible Christians are so beautiful and their testimonies so inspiring! His abundant grace will enable us to be Bible women in the truest sense.

"Behold I come quickly: blessed is he that keepeth the sayings of the prophecy of this book." Rev. 22:7.

A review of the work of the past conference year cheers us with some evidences of advancement: it also brings to light failures which we can only commit to the blood.

We thank God for the increase in Prayer Partner membership; for the organization of four new W. M. Societies; for the itineraries of Brother Swauger and Sister Banker; for the lengthening of our missionary vision, and for the warm hearted cooperation which has been realized. We may feel we have done our best this year, but as we look to our Lord surely we see greater possibilities which He is calling us to make realities for Him.

Official Acts

In accordance with the vote of the W. M. S. conference of 1947 a foreign missionary, Sister Hazel Banker, missionary to India on furlough, was secured to visit the conference by districts. With the aid of the

district organizers the convention tour was arranged and the itinerary made in the month of October. Also, in keeping with the wish of the Kansas W. M. S. Rev. Swauger, our Home Missionary Secretary came for a series of spring conventions. Since the time allotted to Kansas was so limited it seemed necessary to transport Rev. Swauger from district to district by car. Rev. Fletcher was secured to accompany Brother Swauger meeting him at Phillipsburg and conducting him as far as Topeka. Brother and Sister Lowell Gilger then provided transpotation fo him to Kansas City. As had been peviously arranged car expense, four cents per mile, was paid from offerings taken at conventions. \$3.00 per day were paid Brother Fletcher from the Expense fund for the days he spent in the field. After numerous attempts to secure a speaker for our public missionary service Rev. Pamp, pastor of the Sioux Indian Community Church, Rapids City, S. D. has been engaged for that service.

Have sent out one general letter this year, also gave notice by postal to the societies of the opening day of conference. Organized a small
