Standing Rules

1. Visiting Ministers:

All visiting ministers of our denomination and those of other denominations who hold the Bible to be the very Word of God and the final authority in faith and practice are invited to honorary seats in this conference.

2. Date of Conference:

The annual sessions of the conference shall convene on the Chambers Campground at 7:30 p.m., the last Monday of June, except that quadrennially it shall convene the second Monday after the General Conference convenes. The forenoon meetings shall convene at 8:30 and adjourn at 10:45. The afternoon meetings shall convene at 1:30 and adjourn by vote. The seven rows of seats in the front of the tabernacle, and the platform, shall comprise the bar of the conference.

3. Examinations:

Examinations shall be in the hands of the Committee on Itinerary and Orders not later than two weeks before the opening of the conference session.

4. Loans:

Any and all conference loans shall be subject to the approval of the Conference Board of Trustees.

5. Procedure:

The daily order of business shall be: 1. Hymn, 2. Roll Call, 3. Devotions, 4. Reading of Minutes, 5. Appointment of Committees, 6. Report of Committees, 7. Miscellaneous Business, 8. Passage of Characters.

The roll call and the reading of the Minutes shall be heard only at the first session of each day.

6. Taking of Pastoral Vote:

(a) To obtain uniformity, it is recommended that the Pastoral Vote be taken on any day during the third full week in April, or during the following week if Easter falls during the third week. The Pastoral Vote shall be taken on prepared official ballots for this purpose.

(b) A pastor is eligible for a two year call if he has been a resident pastor continuously since the previous September 1.

7. Pay for Officials:

The Secretary and the Treasurer of the conference shall receive \$75.00 each annually.

8. Statistician:

The conference shall elect a statistician whose term of office shall expire at the close of the next session of the Annual Conference. He shall be the chairman of the Statistical Committee.

9. Closing of Records:

The Conference Treasurer shall close her books on June 3 and all receipts thereafter shall be included in the report for the following year. The Treasurer then shall fill in Item IX on the statistical report blanks, affix his signature and return one to the pastor who sent it. The other statistical report shall be forwarded to the Statistician by June 17.

10. Reporting of Statistics:

We authorize the use of the abbreviated report blanks.

11. Reports:

The report of the Woman's Missionary Society and the report of the Wesleyan Youth shall be printed in the conference minutes.

12. Ex-Officio Members:

- (a) The President of the conference and the President of Wesleyan Youth shall be ex-officio members of the Camp Meeting Committee.
- (b) The President of the conference shall be ex-officio chairman and the President of the Woman's Missionary Society shall be an ex-officio member of the Missionary Board.
- (c) The conference President shall be ex-officio chairman and the Secretary of the conference shall be ex-officio member of the Nominating Committee.
- (d) The conference President shall be ex-officio chairman and the Secretary of Evangelism shall be member ex-officio of the Committee of Evangelism.

13. Sale of Properties:

All money coming to the conference from the sale of church and parsonage property shall become a part of the Conference Missions Fund.

14. Committee on Location:

The Board of Trustees shall choose three of their own number to constitute a Committee on Building Location. They shall study all proposed building projects and report their findings to the Board of Trustees. The names of the committee shall be printed in the minutes.

15. Editing of Minutes:

The Secretary of the conference is authorized to edit the minutes.

16. Election of Camp Meeting Chairman:

At the time of the election of conference officers the conference shall elect by ballot from among the elders the chairman of the Camp Meeting Committee.

17. Election of Conference Officers:

All conference officers shall be elected by ballot or after nominations by the Nominating Committee or from the floor. (See list of officers.)

18. Conference Policy:

- (a) Each church shall grant its pastor at least two weeks vacation each year, with pay, and the church shall furnish the supply. The pastor's vacation must be taken sometime between the rise of the conference and the convening of the next conference unless a satisfactory arrangement is made otherwise with the church.
- (b) Each church shall grant its pastor the privilege of a two week revival meeting away from his pulpit each year, and the pastor shall pay his supply.
- (c) It is understood that the pastor shall have one day each week for rest and recreation. Accumulation of days shall not exceed three days.
- (d) Each church shall furnish an adequate heating system (preferably a central heating system); and a kitchen range for the parsonage as soon as possible.
- (e) Each church shall furnish shades or venetian blinds, draw-drapes, curtain rods and fixtures for the parsonage.
- (f) The church shall release the pastor for attendance at Conference and Camp including both Sundays and shall furnish the supply.
- (g) Each church shall encourage and plan for the pastor to attend all Conference gatherings (Ministerial Fellowships, District meetings, work bees, etc.). This is an important part of the Conference work.
- (h) The church shall encourage the pastor to attend the Annual Ministerial Refresher Course at Houghton each year and shall make this possible by providing for the expense for the same or as much of that expense as possible.
- (i) When a church anticipates changing pastors and invites a minister to candidate it shall provide the expense for such a trip.
- (j) When a church changes pastors it shall pay the moving expense of the incoming pastor.
- (k) A pastor who is leaving a church will continue through conference and camp Sundays from which church or charge he will receive his salary until the end of such time. The above will not pertain to a pastor leaving the conference unless he completes the major part of above mentioned time.

- (l) A pastor failing to make required conference reports shall state his reason to the Pastoral Relations Committee before he is given a conference appointment.
- (m) Each church shall formulate a policy for the remuneration of guest speakers.
- (n) The pastor is an ex officio member of all committees unless it contravenes Discipline, and it is understood that the pastor will extend to the Pulpit Supply Committee, the courtesy of meeting without his being present; furthermore, he will not meet with this committee in the selecting of a pastor unless requested.

19. Apportionment of Budget:

- (a) The Budget Apportionment Committee shall apportion budget to all members-in-full, regardless of age.
- (b) The Onondaga Reservation charge shall be assigned only the denominational budget.
- (c) A newly organized church shall be exempt from Conference budget the first year following its organization and only one-half the conference budget assigned the second conference year following its organization, after which it may be assigned all items of budget in full as usual.
- (d) The local church is urged to adopt a policy for paying General and Conference budgets quarterly.

20. Course of Study:

Persons recommended to study or to travel under the direction of the conference shall appear personally before the Committee on Itinerary and Orders before they are accepted and annually thereafter or communicate with the committee so long as they are continued. If they fail to do this for two successive years, they shall be returned to their quarterly conference.

21. Ministerial Institute:

The President of the conference shall be ex-officio chairman of the committee to plan the Ministerial Institute. The three district chairmen shall complete the committee. This committee shall arrange for the Institute following the next annual session of the conference.

22. Delegates' Credentials:

It shall be the duty of the pastor not later than one week before the next annual session of the conference to forward to the Secretary of the conference, who is a Committee on credentials, the credentials of the delegate(s) and the alternate delegate(s) from his charge.

23. Audits:

The books of the Treasurer of the conference and of other custodians of conference funds shall be audited by an accountant or recognized bookkeeper approved by the President and his Advisory Board. This shall be done prior to the convening of the annual session of the Conference, and a certified copy shall be furnished the President.

24. Conference Missions:

- (a) In the interim between conference sessions the Missionary Board is authorized to interpret what shall be considered conference missions. In the event of the purchase of property, the Missionary Board may make recommendations to the Board of Trustees.
- (b) The third Sunday of the second month of each quarter is recommended as the time for taking the Sunday school offering for conference missions.

25. Bible Study Quarter:

Each church is expected to conduct a systematic Bible study for at least one quarter during the conference year. The material to be selected by the pastor and local church from approved material.

26. Committee on Orders of the Day:

The President and his Advisory Board shall constitute a committee on Orders of the Day.

They shall plan the daily schedule of the conference and shall prepare a printed agenda. The following shall be the order of the evening services: Tuesday, a Sunday school rally; Wednesday, conference missions; Thursday, a public missionary service; Friday, the ordination service.

27. Church Membership Classes:

Each church is requested to present annually a series of studies in church membership to be known as "Preparation for Church Membership." All prospective new members are to be requested to attend these classes. Classes are to be open also to persons interested in learning more concerning membership.

28. Financial Appeals:

- (a) The conference shall promote the offering for the Houghton Academy on Academy Sunday which is the second Sunday in September. Twenty-five per cent of this offering is to be designated for scholarships for Wesleyan missionaries' children.
- (b) The Lenten season and Easter offering is hereby established as a time for a special offering for the local church.
- (c) Any financial appeals to be made in the local churches by non-Wesleyan persons or groups shall require the approval of the Conference President and his Advisory Board. This does not apply to representatives of the Gideons and of the American Bible Society.

29. Conference Board of Managers:

The Conference Board of Trustees are the Board of Managers of the Conference during the interim of conference. (See Discipline par. 245.)

30. Vouchers

The Vouchers of the auxiliary conference treasurers, e.g., Woman's Missionary Society and Wesleyan Youth, are to be sent directly to the Conference Treasurer at least once a quarter and that the second copy be returned to the local treasurer of that organization.

31. Ordination Service

Ordination service will be held in a Wesleyan church of the Ordinand's choice or at a service during the annual conference if desired by the Ordinand. The Conference President and other officials will be in charge. All elders are urged to be present and to participate.

DAILY PROCEEDINGS

FIRST DAY - MONDAY EVENING

The 123rd Annual Rochester Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America convened at the call of the Chair at 7:30 P.M., Monday, June 26th. The roll was not called. The service was opened with singing "All Hail the Power of Jesus Name" and "Great is Thy Faithfulness." Rev. Thomas Boghosian led in prayer. A girls trio sang, "A Wonderful Saviour is Jesus My Lord."

Dr. David A. Rees welcomed and introduced our denominational representative and his wife, The Rev. Dr. and Mrs. Harold K. Sheets. Mrs. Sheets gave her testimony. Brother Sheets brought greetings to the conference and then spoke on "Releasing God's Power" taking his text from I Corinthians 1:22. He stated that "God's spiritual atoms need to be released upon the church today." Following Brother Sheets message he invited everyone to come forward to seek the face of Jesus Christ that we might go in the direction he would have us follow.

SECOND DAY - TUESDAY MORNING

The Conference was called to order by the Vice President, the Rev. James E. Bence. The Rev. Bradley Wood led the conference in singing "To God be the Glory."

We recessed by common consent.

The Conference body reassembled.

Dr. Claude Ries was added to the Nomination list for General Conference Elders Delegate.

The Courtesy Committee introduced Craig Waldo who has been supplying Herrickville Wesleyan Church for the last few months.

Dr. Claude A. Ries was elected as the 5th Ministerial Delegate to General Conference.

The President nominated Dr. David A. Reese as Ministerial Member and Tarbell Lamos as Lay Member to the President's Advisory Board.

Mr. Richard Alderman was elected as the 5th Lay Delegate to General Conference on the 2nd ballot.

The Rev. Wesley B. Nussey was elected as the 1st Alternate Ministerial Delegate to General Conference on the 3rd ballot.

The Rev. Roger C. Rounds was elected on the 3rd ballot as the 2nd Ministerial Alternate Delegate to General Conference.

Mr. Everett Gilbert was elected on the 4th ballot as the 1st Alternate Lay Delegate to General Conference.

A motion was adopted to refer the matter to the Conference Trustees as to whether to keep the present Conference parsonage or to give an allowance to the Conference President and allow him to purchase his own home. The Trustees are to report the matter to the next annual Conference.

We adjourned by vote.

FIFTH DAY - FRIDAY MORNING

The Rev. James E. Bence called the conference to order. The Rev. Bradley Wood led in the singing of "Leaning on the Everlasting Arms." The roll was called. Devotions were conducted by Dr. Claude A. Ries.

The minutes were approved as corrected.

A rising vote of appreciation was extended to The Rev. Claude A. Ries.

The Courtesy Committee reported. They introduced Dr. T.E. Koshy, native of India. Dr. Koshy gave words of greeting and his testimony.

ORDERS OF THE DAY - Mrs. Gladys Newbury gave the Woman's Missionary Society President's report. A rising vote of thanks was given to Mrs. Newbury.

Mr. James Francis was elected as the 2nd Alternate Lay Delegate to General Conference.

The Rev. Bradley Wood, the newly elected Conference Wesleyan Youth President, read the Wesleyan Youth President's report which had been prepared by the Rev. Harry Barriger, who served as Wesleyan Youth President this past year, but was unable to be present.

A rising vote of thanks was given to The Rev. Harry Barriger for the fine job he performed as Conference Wesleyan Youth President.

The Finance Committee's Report was read and adopted. (See Report No. 15).

The Committee on Itinerary and Orders reported. The report was adopted. (See Report No. 16).

The Auditing Committee report was read and adopted with all the financial reports which were included in the report. (See Report No. 17).

The Statistical Report was given and adopted with appreciation shown by a rising vote of thanks. (See Report No. 18).

It was voted that the following ammendment be added to the first sentence of Standing Rule No. 31, "or at a service during the annual conference if desired by the Ordinand."

We adjourned by limitation of time.

FIFTH DAY - FRIDAY AFTERNOON

The Rev. Wesley B. Nussey called the conference to order and led in the singing of "Majestic Sweetness." The Rev. Leon Jelliff led in devotions, reading from Revelation I.

The minutes of the morning session were read and approved as corrected.

The Courtesy Committee reported introducing the Rev. James Ridgway from Australia who is now studying at Drew University and pastoring the Jersey City, New Jersey, Wesleyan Methodist Church.

The Committee on Examination of Character read their final report. It was adopted.

A motion was adopted that the names of the Elders and Conference Preachers for whom we have had no character blanks be recorded. They were: Harold Chapman, John Edling, Lloyd Mack, Claude Ries, Dale Cowan, George Merz, George Crook, Betrand Rudd, Mrs. Mary Lyon, and Rita Albright.

A motion was adopted that the Secretary send a letter of appreciation to Mrs. Claude A. Ries for her interest and prayers in behalf of this conference.

Several persons stood and bore testimony to the blessedness of this conference upon their lives. A number of persons have stated that they have sensed an unusual spirit of unity prevailing throughout this particular Conference session.

REPORT NO. 3

REPORT OF THE SUNDAY SCHOOL SECRETARY

During the past year your Sunday School Secretary mailed out over 300 cards and letters, spoke at five Sunday School worker's banquets. We represented you at all conference functions and committees with the exception of those during the time of our hospitalization during the month of May. We attended the National S.S. Convention at Boston with the cup winning delegate from Riverside church.

After three years of active use the filmstrip library became a rather inactive item in our arsenal of S.S. tools.

In spite of the new method of reporting average attendance (a disadvantage for this first year only), several schools made good gains. 10% ribbons of merit are awarded to the following: Grace Lee Memorial (Chambers) 20% gain, Camden 17% gain, and Pine Meadows with 17% gain.

The conference trophies are awarded as follows: Larger schools, Avon 10% gain, 59-99 schools, Penfield with a terrific 30% gain, and smaller schools, Herrickville with a great 46% gain. This makes two years in a row that Penfield has won a trophy.

In spite of the fact that I failed to wind the year's work up during May, due to my hospitalization, it has been a pleasure to serve as your Conference S.S. Secretary.

THE AWARD STANDARD

The S.S. Board recommends the following awards and standard for the coming year.

1. Each school in the conference achieving a 10% gain in average attendance for the year will receive a Ribbon of Merit.

2. Schools competing for the trophies shall be divided into four groups; up through 39, 40 through 79, 80 through 109, 110 and up. The grouping of the schools will be established according to the average attendance for the last conference year. A trophy will be awarded to the one in each group achieving the greatest percentage gain.

3. The S.S. Secretary will be encouraged to attend the National S.S. Convention and the Wesleyan Convention which is held jointly, whenever the financial situation will allow.

4. The average attendance shall be an average of total Sunday School attendance divided by the number of actual sessions held. To be counted present, scholars must be in attendance at least half of the S.S. session. Persons known to be in attendance at any Sunday service of any conference connected services such as Chambers Camp, youth retreat, or Houghton Youth Rally, may be considered present at their local Sunday School for that Sunday or Sundays.

5. An Extension Sunday School shall be defined as per the 1966 Conference Journal, page 30, section 5.

REPORT NO. 4

REPORT OF THE CONFERENCE PRESIDENT

To the members of the Rochester Conference assembled on Chambers Campground for its one hundred and twenty-third Annual Session:

Greetings in the Master's precious name. Again God has permitted us to gather for another Annual Session of Conference. In the midst of war - an ever expanding war and the almost constant threat of new wars we find, to put it mildly, times in which we are living to be not only confusing but frustrating and sometimes makes us down-right afraid but in the midst of all of this what a real comfort and assurance to know that God is still on His throne and mindful of us as a group and as individuals; how reassuring to know Christ as a personal Saviour and God as our Heavenly Father. Hope and poise rest in our confidence and trust in Him.

Again we are thankful for the blessing of God upon our Conference during the past year. While not every item of budget has been paid in full by three or so churches we are grateful indeed for the splendid manner in which our pastors and churches have accepted the challenge of the increased budget presented last year and have responded in such an excellent way.

There have been profitable revivals and week-end services in many of our churches and His Spirit has been manifested in many ways. While our personal activities have been limited this year both of necessity and by official action of the Board of Managers, it has been our privilege to have been in several of our churches. It was an honor to speak and officiate at the dedication of the fine new parsonage at Haskinsville, to attend and speak at the tenth Anniversary Service in Baldwinsville where the growth has been heartening, to speak and officiate at the dedication of

the much-needed and newly purchased and remodelled parsonage in Rome and to officiate at the dedication of the new church at Avon. At the same time to cross the street and observe the fine progress being made on their new parsonage. There is always a thrill in beginning something but also a great satisfaction in the completion of a task and such was the case when we were privileged to speak and officiate at the mortgage burning service in Waterloo this spring and then immediately drive down to the beautiful new corner lot which they have purchased and offer prayer for the future progress of this work.

One of the highlights of the year was the organization of the new church at Kirkville on May 28th with fifty-five new members including associate and junior members - here they have a beautiful new brick church which will be a great blessing in this community and area where our church is making such good progress.

We have visited and spoken in all our pioneer churches with one exception - this was Penfield where they are just completing a fine new educational unit to meet the need of the growing work there - these new fields of labor are progressing well and are very encouraging indeed. You have already heard of the new project at Big Flats where the Conference Board of Trustees has authorized the building of a new chapel-parsonage. Brother and Sister Woughter have had this field on their hearts for some time and it is expected they will serve there this coming year; let us be much in prayer for them especially for the physical recovery of Brother Woughter who, as you know, is recovering from an operation which was necessary to remove a tumor from the pituitary gland; while his recovery has progressed in a remarkable way he still needs prayer for a complete recovery.

We have received official transfers for Rev. Michael A. Terifay from the Kentucky Conference and Rev. Robert F. Finch from the M.A.S. Conference and upon adoption of this report will become officially members of our Conference; we have granted a transfer of Rev. Norman L. Handy to the Evangelical United Brethren Church, Susquehanna Conference, Penna.

We have conducted several business meetings and Rev. Bence has also assisted in this area which has been a real help. We have met several times with the Conference Board of Trustees; have met with the Advisory Board, the Policy Committee and with other boards and committees as necessity directed. We have preached several times but not up to the usual schedule, have had nearly forty personal and business conferences.

We have endeavored to work with the local church committees in securing supply pastors for those churches which were without pastors following Conference a year ago and where changes were being made for the coming year we have worked diligently to help them secure new pastors. There are still three churches without pastors but we have some good prospects and we trust these pulpits

may be filled by the close of the Conference. Your prayers are solicited in this area for the need of pastors is becoming very keen, not only in our Church, but in others as well.

The Conference Book Shop has had a very good year reaching by far the largest gross volume of business in its history - we are trusting in a few short years this business will be pouring money into the Conference for pioneer work as it was intended.

This year we have conducted a great deal of business by phone and had several conferences with officials and boards of the Conference and, of course, our travel mileage is much less than usual.

June 12 we mailed a letter stating that we would not be available for this office the coming year. The reasons were given in this letter but since some may not have seen or been acquainted with the letter may we express here again our reasons for this decision:

First - Because of my own health and also the health of Mabel.

Second - We have held this position twenty-three years (two periods - 7 years the first time and 16 years this last period) and we feel definitely there should be a change of leadership.

Third - After much prayer and careful consideration over a period of many months we feel this is the course God would have us to take.

May we review just a bit, without wearying you, two or three items. During these years through the co-operation of the pastors and the laymen it has been possible to open ten new fields of labor, to see twelve new churches erected and fifteen new parsonages (including those purchased) with many more new educational units provided for the ever-expanding Sunday School. The membership of the Conference has grown from 1241 full members to 1465 with the largest percent coming from the new churches organized; the average Sunday School attendance has increased from 1970 to 3271 and there has been growth in the W.M.S., Youth work, and in other areas - for all that has been accomplished we join together in praise to our Heavenly Father. We would like to take this opportunity to express to our fine group of pastors and laymen throughout the Conference sincere thanks and appreciation for their prayers, faith, work and co-operation during these years. Especially would we like to express our heart-felt thanks to our Vice-President, Rev. James Bence, who has always co-operated and helped in every way but especially this year when our own activities have been limited. To the Secretary, the Treasurer, Board of Trustees, Advisory Board, the chairmen of all committees and leaders of the auxiliary departments and to those who have served officially in any way thru these years we would say a warm thank you. To our Book Shop Manager, Mr. Clary, we are grateful for his managership which in no small way contributed directly to the growth of the business and his good public relations has

helped secure many new patrons for the business. To our General Superintendents, Church Leaders and the Board of Administration we express gratitude for their co-operation, counsel, encouragement and inspiration. To Rev. and Mrs. Paul Larson, our close neighbors, for their co-operation in taking telephone calls and caring for the mail while we were out on trips we express thanks. One who has constantly been very close to the problems and has helped to lift up at times and sort of level us off at other times when needed, is our good wife; for her understanding, untiring co-operation and hours in the office and strict confidence as well as joining in earnest prayer for the work of the Conference we want to publicly express sincere thanks and appreciation. Above all we want to thank our Heavenly Father for His patience, definite help and guidance through the years and answer to prayers, we want to say to Him be all the glory! We pledge our prayers and continued co-operation for the advancement of the Rochester Conference and His work in this part of the Vineyard.

REPORT NO. 13

SYRACUSE UNIVERSITY CHAPLAIN'S REPORT

Brethren:

Each year of service in this place of privilege bring a more secure sense of comprehension as to our task and further realization of the enormity of that task. One could easily feel inadequate on a campus that contained this past year 20,000 students, but this has been another year of gratifying experiences.

The building of a new church which almost completely absorbed our time drastically reduced our efforts on the campus. Nevertheless, we continued in our relationship on the Chaplain's Council being invited even more warmly to participate in activities which heretofore have not been the responsibility of part-time Chaplain's.

Our stand as an Evangelical on this campus bring further focus on the personage of Jesus Christ. We have discovered that throughout this campus there are several Christian groups and prayer cells both amongst student and faculty. God can yet bring a revival to a church related institution that has its share of problems related to sex, psychedelic drugs, and secularism.

It is increasingly our pleasure to entertain students in our home using this as a means to promote Jesus Christ. Through our Chaplaincy we have also had fellowship with Christian faculty members and have been able to bring to our own pulpit such men of stature as Dr. Frank Laubach and women as Dr. Jane Chan.

Our efforts in the area of International students are increasing. This year we have been able to consolidate a group from The Christian Community in Syracuse as a sponsoring committee and act as directors in this work. We still have our apartment, at 1020 Madison St., where we entertain students. This year we are endeavoring to support our Missionary to Internationals, T.E. Kosby who will soon be taking to himself a wife. His fiancée is Dr. Indira Perry, an eye surgeon, who will be enthusiastically sharing in our ministry.

There have been two heartwarming and perhaps peak experiences in this year. The first being the opportunity to share our witness with a student from Nepal, Chitrakar by name. Before leaving for Nepal, Chitra expressed a willingness to believe yet was fearful of repercussions for himself and his family in Nepal. Since his return we have received this word, quote: "I am now ready to preach Christ on the street corners of Nepal, if this is what God wants." This word from the director of secondary education for the country of Nepal.

Secondly, following our International Student Conference at Houghton College it was our prized joy to be able to pull off to the side of the road near Geneseo and lead James Dola, a student from Kenya to the Lord Jesus Christ. May God help us to see more and more the potential for foreign missions on our home fields.

It is with a great deal of anticipation for what is ahead that we conclude this year's activity seeking continually to be in the Lord's will.

REPORT OF THE FINANCE COMMITTEE

We recommend that the Woman's Missionary Society and the Wesleyan Youth be asked to pay for the printing of the number of pages in their portion of the Conference Minutes.

We recommend that where the pastor is a member of the Social Security Plan that the church give the pastor a bonus sufficient to cover his social security payment.

We recommend that for the conference year 1967-68 the expenditures for Conference Administrative work be as follows:

- A. The salary of the President shall be at the rate of \$40.00 per week while he continues to pastor the Penfield Church and at such time as he is able to give full time to the Conference work his salary shall be at the rate of \$90.00 per week.
- B. The Conference President shall be allowed Expense at the rate of eight cents per mile and miscellaneous expenses.
- C. The conference is to assume the expenses of the Conference Parsonage utilities.
- D. We recommend the Conference Treasurer to be authorized to give the Conference President a bonus sufficient to cover his social security assessment plus the \$20 minimum for Mutual Aid.

- E. That the Conference President receive \$300 for secretarial work.
- F. We recommend appropriations of:
- (1) \$100 to Mrs. A.J. Shea
 - (2) \$ 50 to Mrs. Exa Rathbun
 - (3) \$600 to Onondaga Reservation
 - (4) \$150 to Chaplain expenses at Syracuse
 - (5) \$100 to International Students Ministry in Syracuse

In order to finance the above program we recommend that the following be adopted:

1. The Conference Budget shall be \$12 per member of which 75¢ will go for the Chambers Camp expenses.
2. The Mutual Aid Budget shall be 60¢ per member.
3. When the Conference President shall hold revival meetings within the bounds of the Conference, \$50 per week shall apply on budget. Any balance above this amount shall be a love offering to the President.

The Budget Apportionment is assigned on a per capita basis and is divided at the rate of \$31.75 per full member of the church, and is divided as follows:

We recommend that a full time president be employed by the Conference, whose duties shall be in accordance with those set forth in the discipline, paragraphs 230, 235.

1. We recommend that the Conference missionary church shall be under the special care of the Conference President and his advisory board, until such time as they shall have assumed the entire responsibility for their indebtedness, and that other missionary churches be under this care by mutual agreement of church and conference president. The Conference President shall be a member ex-officio of the boards of these churches. He shall be sent a copy of the minutes of these churches as often as necessary, to counsel and encourage the pastor and people.

2. He shall be required to study and survey possible fields for new work and report annually to the Conference Policy Committee. This Board shall have the power to authorize further investigation and recommend a definite plan of action.

3. The Conference President shall superintend the more-established churches and shall endeavor to visit them once a year, presenting the needs of the Conference and Church missionary work.

4. He shall enforce the provisions of the discipline, and uphold the standards of the Church.

5. He shall seek to co-ordinate the evangelizing efforts of the various churches of the Conference by suggesting to pastors a suited arrangement of meetings, and by counseling with reference to evangelists.

6. His Conference evangelistic dates shall be established by the President and his Advisory Board.

7. The Conference President is to be permitted to take two evangelistic meetings per year outside the bounds of the Conference.

8. He shall be a member ex-officio of the Finance Committee.
We further recommend that all appropriations cleared by the
Pastoral Relations Committee be referred to the Finance Committee.

The President and Secretary of the Board of Trustees be
authorized to send out pertinent information to pastors and that
board minutes be read as has been the policy at annual conference.

We also recommend the following:

1. That the Conference President and Advisory Board, along
with Conference Trustees, be authorized to dispose of the property
at Groton if this seems advisable.

2. That the Conference President, Advisory Board and Con-
ference Trustees study the situation at Armenia Mountain
concerning what is to be done with the property.

1. Our first session of Conference shall convene at 9:30 Wednesday morning following the opening of Annual Conference. The forenoon session shall be 9:30 to 11:30 A.M. The afternoon session from 1:30 to 4:00 P.M.
2. The first five seats shall comprise the bar of the Conference.
3. The Conference Officials shall receive the following honorarium:

President -	\$25.00
Vice-President -	15.00
Secretary -	20.00
Treasurer	50.00
Y.M.W.B. Supt. -	25.00

They shall receive their board and room during Conference.
4. Members of the Executive Committee shall receive traveling expenses equal to that voted by the Conference for Conference Officials.
5. There shall be elected a Conference Statistician whose term of office shall not expire until the close of the Conference session following her election. She shall be the Chairman of the Statistical Committee and shall be authorized to choose members of the said committee. She shall be seated within the bar of the Conference and shall be given board and room during Conference. The local treasurers shall send both of their statistical reports to the Conference Treasurer by June 3rd. The local Y.M.W.B. Superintendents shall send their reports to the Conference Y.M.W.B. Superintendent by June 3rd.
6. Each local society of the Conference shall close its financial reports and records for the year, May 31st.
7. To receive credit, all cash and vouchers must be sent to the Conference Treasurer and Y.M.W.B. Superintendent by June 3rd. Any money sent after that date shall be applied on the next year.
8. It shall be the duty of the local president to forward to the Conference Secretary, who is a Committee on Credentials, not later than one week before the Annual Conference convenes the credentials of the delegate from her society.
9. The Matron of the Dormitories shall be elected by the Executive Committee. Her salary shall be \$40.00 per year. Her room and board is to be paid during Conference and Camp. She may choose her own assistant whom the Conference shall pay \$5.00.

REPORT OF CONFERENCE WMS PRESIDENT

To the Members of the Rochester Conference WMS gathered for their 62nd annual session, greetings!

I am sure that we all feel that we are living in momentous days! All eyes have been focused on Israel and the Holy Lands. We should feel more than ever, the necessity of being at our best for the Master. In Ecc. 9:10 we read "Whatsoever thy hand findeth to do, do it with thy might..." We must "fill the water-pots, let down the net, and bring the loaves and fishes." Only then can we expect Him to bring the "Fruit Unto Life Eternal." We may have but a short time to work...life at the longest is as a vapor. May we exclaim with Frances Havegal -- "Jesus, Master, whom I serve, though so feebly and so ill, strengthen hand, and heart, and nerve, all thy bidding to fulfill: open thou mine eyes to see...all the work Thou hast for me."

It has been a joy to receive expressions of appreciation for the excellent services of Rev. and Mrs. Ronald Heavalin as they did deputation in our churches last October. I believe you will enjoy and be challenged by the messages of Miss Dorothy Marville, returned missionary to Haiti, this October 1-29, 1967.

Spring Conventions were well attended, with a total of about a thousand in all services. The offerings were around \$500. After expenses were taken care of we were able to send \$115.60 for the work in Pulaski; \$115.58 to Sierra Leone; and \$215.64 for the new church at Port au Prince, Haiti. Mrs. Florence Bence and I attended all five conventions which were held at Spencerport, Lyncourt, Camden, Elmira, and Haskinsville. I was especially pleased with the attendance of the CYC groups at Camden and the family groups at Haskinsville. A new feature this year was the "Women's Only" meeting by Marybelle Chapman, while the men enjoyed the informal fellowship with Rev. Henry Ortlip. We wish to again express our thanks to the district chairmen, pastors and societies who had a part in making these conventions the success that they were. Invitations were extended by Penfield, Rome, Pulaski, and Wallace for 1968 conventions.

Since we have little opportunity to have direct contact with the field of Australia, I feel we are indeed fortunate to have Rev. James Ridgway with us for the public missionary service.

Giving has been excellent again this year. The grand total of \$29,727.70 which, if we deduct the monies handled by our treasurer for the Area Missionary convention last year, we still have a gain over last conference year. Total membership is 920, a gain of 47. We have given a total of \$3096.17 for Conference Missions; paid the field support of the Johnsons of Japan, the Starks of Jamaica and the Dekkers who will be returning to Africa; White Christmas offering amounted to \$510 for the Merz working on our Indian Reservation and \$366 for General Evangelism. Self-

Standing Rules

8. The President shall appoint one of the Vice-Presidents as Conference Youth Magazine Sales Manager.

9. There shall be a 2nd Vice-President elected on the Conference level, to come from the opposite age group from the 1st Vice-President, with the dividing line to be 20 years of age.

10. At the Annual Youth Conference each organized society shall report last year's and this year's full and associate membership, General Conference budget assigned and paid, and number of WY Magazine subscriptions.

11. Our Camp Director's board for camp shall be paid by the Conference treasury.

12. The Minutes and Efficiency Standard shall be mimeographed and distributed as soon as possible after the conference session.

13. The term of all the youth officers on the conference level shall run from the close of camp to the close of camp.

14. Pastors shall be seated within the bar of the conference.

15. The WY shall sponsor a Labor Day Retreat annually except when the Houghton area is sponsoring one.
