Standing Rules

I. CONFERENCE OFFICERS—Resolved, that the officers be installed during Conference, at a public service announced in advance, office to take effect at the rise of Conference.

II. CONFERENCE PRESIDENT—Resolved: (1) That the Conference President be appointed, authorized and required to travel the Conference as President, having general supervision of the spiritual interests and benevolences thereof, holding at least one service at each church during the year under such date as he may announce in advance.

(2) That he shall raise funds to meet the demands of the Conference work, assisted by the pastors, and he shall receive contributions for Missions, Education, and Superannuated Ministers where there are no pastors.

(3) That he shall have general supervision of the church property, and shall inquire into the titles of the same, to see that no property is loosely held, and shall look after the rental of Conference property and see that the rent is turned into the treasury and he shall investigate the possibility and feasibility of the sale of property not in use.

(4) That he shall be authorized to grant letters to disband classes.

(5) That he shall be required to write non-resident members of the Conference asking them in case they cannot attend, to write the Conference a letter of greeting, stating the condition of their religious experience.

(6) That he shall devote as much time as possible and as occasion may afford in evangelistic and other meetings in the Conference.

(7) That he may engage help from time to time, as may be advisable and who he may consider properly qualified to assist in holding Evangelistic and Quarterly meetings, such help to be remunerated from the Church Extension Fund.

(8) That he shall be paid from the Conference President's Salary Budget the sum of seventy dollars (\$70.) per week for his services, the same to begin the first Sunday following the rise of the next Conference, and to continue through the second Sunday following the rise of the next Conference, the same to be paid monthly in advance; he shall also be paid official expenses, including secretarial help up to ten dollars (\$10) per week, and he shall be paid five dollars (\$5) per week for utilities, and his premium on the Conference approved minister's health insurance policy shall also be paid.

(9) That he shall act, or appoint to act, as Fraternal Delegate to all denominational or inter-denominational bodies, as he deems advisable.

III. CONFERENCE TRUSTEES—Resolved: (1) That the Board of Trustees shall consist of nine members, three to be elected, each for a term of three years, and each to reside within the bounds of the Conference.

(2) That the duly elected and qualified Trustees of the Annual Conference are hereby authorized and directed to sign for the purchase, sale, mortgaging and conveyance of real estate recommended by the Conference Missionary Board during the interim between the meetings of the Annual Conference, and all such action or actions shall be deemed to be legal and binding upon the Conference, and of as full force and effect as they would have been if such actions on the part of the Trustees had been specially authorized by the Annual Conference.

(3) That the President and Secretary of the Board of Trustees shall be authorized to sign on behalf of the Board of Trustees, such signatures to be valid and binding as if all members of the Board of Trustees had signed said papers.

IV. MISSIONARY BOARD—Resolved: (1) That the Conference Board of Trustees, and the President of the Conference Women's Missionary Society constitute the Missionary Board.

(2) That the Missionary Board is hereby authorized to pay out all monies from the Church Extension Fund.

V. COMMITTEE ON CHURCH AND PARSONAGE BUILDING, LOCATION, ALTERATION AND REMODELING—Resolved: That the Conference Board of Trustees shall constitute the Committee on Church and Parsonage Building, Location, Alteration and Remodeling.

VI. CAMP MEETING BOARD—Resolved: (1) That the Conference President, the Conference Wesleyan Youth President and the Charles City pastor be members ex-officio, except when the Charles City pastor is an elected member of the Board.

(2) That the Board be constituted of a total of ten members, elected by ballot for a term of three years each.

(3) That the Camp Ground Property shall be under the care of the Camp Meeting Board.

(4) That this Board shall have the power to engage workers beyond the present year.

(5) That this Board, together with the Conference Secretary, constitute the Orders Of The Day Committee.

(6) That all pledges and cash received during the sessions of Conference and Camp Meeting be placed in the Camp Meeting Fund unless otherwise designated.

(7) That the incidental expenses of the Annual Conference, while in session, be paid from the Camp Meeting Fund.

VII. COMMITTEE ON STATISTICS—Resolved: That a standing Committee on Statistics be elected, consisting of the Statistical Secretary and three other ministerial members. That three lay members be elected at the opening of Conference.

VIII. FINANCIAL SECRETARY—Resolved: That the Conference shall elect a Financial Secretary for the Conference year, whose duty it shall be to study finances and bring recommendations to the Committee on Finance at the next Annual Conference, of which committee he shall be first member. He shall also require the various treasurers of the conference to secure a competent auditor and submit a "Certificate of Audit" and the qualifications of the auditor to them. He shall give a "Report of the Auditors" to the Conference.

IX. BUDGET ITEMS—Resolved: That all Treasurers shall mark receipts "Budget" or "Not Budget."

X. LOCAL CHURCH FISCAL YEAR—Resolved: That each local church of our Conference close their books June 30.

XI. CONFERENCE FISCAL YEAR—Resolved: That the Conference Fiscal Year close July 15th: that all money shall be in the hands of the proper Treasurers on or before that date; that within seven days thereafter each pastor shall submit to the Conference Treasurer his budget check sheet, with receipts covering the same, and his statistical blank, completed in full, except for the budget raised; that the Conference Treasurer shall fill in budget raised items and hold reports for the Statistical Committee the first day of Conference.

XII. CONFERENCE DATE—Resolved: That Camp Meeting begin the first Sunday of August and continue through the second Sunday. That Conference begin the following Monday and conclude Wednesday.

XIII. SUNDAY SCHOOL—Resolved: That Sunday School shall be held each Sunday of Conference and Camp Meeting.

XIV. LEAVE—Resolved: That no member shall leave the Conference Session without the permission of the President.

XV. COMMITTEE REPORTS—Resolved: That all reports of Committees be made in writing, complete and ready for the printer, and handed to the Secretary at the earliest possible date after such report has been made.

XVI. PASTORAL REPORT—Resolved: (1) That each ministerial member of our Conference report to his Quarterly and Annual Conference the

number of sermons preached, prayer meetings attended, homes visited and pastoral calls made.

(2) That each Sunday School under pastoral oversight of Wesleyan Methodist pastors shall be included in a separate Statistical Report.

XVII. CONFERENCE PREACHER'S REPORT—Resolved: That all Conference Preachers not stationed by the Pastoral Relations Committee shall report to the Chairman of the Committee on Itineracy and Elder's Orders within the thirty day period ending the first day of the Annual Conference Session.

XVIII. CREDENTIALS—Resolved: That each Annual Conference Preacher present his Credentials at Conference for renewal and proper signature.

XIX. TEXT BOOKS—Resolved: That all persons shall be requested to bring the text books to Conference in which they are to be examined.

XX. PASTOR'S SUPPORT DURING CONFERENCE—Resolved: That it be our plan that all pastors remain on their charges for one Sunday after Conference and that the churches financial obligation to the pastor, whether he be leaving the field or not, be extended through that Sunday.

XXI. MOVING PASTORS—Resolved: That each charge make provision for the moving expense of the incoming pastor.

XXII. MINISTER'S VACATION—Resolved: That the Conference President and all pastors be given a two weeks vacation, with pay, with one Sunday's absence from their pulpits.

XXIII. MEMBERSHIP IN SUPERANNUATED PENSION PLAN—Resolved: That all all ministers be required to join the Superannuated Pension Plan before receiving Conference appointment, unless they furnish the Superannuated Ministers Committee sufficient evidence of inability to join or participation in Social Security. That this action become a Standing Rule effective as of 1954. Ministers receiving their first appointment shall have one year in which to join either or both.

XXIV. DEATH OR ILLNESS—Resolved: That the Conference Secretary be notified by telephone in case of death or critical illness in a minister's home, and that he shall send cards at once to each pastor.

XXV. MINUTES—Resolved: That the Conference Secretary bill each church for the number of Minutes ordered by that church, and that the Conference Secretary bill the Conference Fund for those Minutes not ordered by individual churches.

XXVI. PUBLISHING OF EVANGEL—Resolved: That the Evangel be published monthly; that the Editor be also Publisher, that he be nominated by a staff composed of President of the Conference, President of the W.M.S., President of the Conference Wesleyan Youth, and the Conference Sunday School Secretary, and after being elected by the Conference, the manner of financing the publishing of the Evangel be left to the Editor and his staff.

XXVII. NOMINATING COMMITTEE—Resolved: That a Nominating Committee be elected at each Annual Conference to serve in the succeeding Conference; to consist of: Conference President, ex-officio as chairman; three elders, elected by the Conference; and three church delegates of the Conference to serve in alphabetical order of the churches. Said Committee to nominate Conference Session Committees.

XXVIII. MID-YEAR CONVENTION COMMITTEE Resolved: That the Committee on Mid-year Convention consist of three members elected for three years; one member to be elected each year. The Host pastor to be member ex-officio.

JOURNAL OF DAILY PROCEEDINGS

Monday, August 10, 1959, 8:00 A.M.

REPORT NO. 6

Conference President's Report

Greetings to the 106th session of the Iowa Annual Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church. We again thank God for His favors and for the privilege of working with you in His vineyard. Your cooperation has made the year a joy.

There was a gracious spirit of revival in several churches. Our new church at Cedar Rapids was organized and the Lord has miraculously sent in people and finance. Roslyn Park church has had sifting but has come through with victory. In three churches men's prayer groups meet weekly.

DURING THE QUADRENNIUM a 20% gain was registered in total membership. Two-thirds of the churches showed an increase. New building construction totaling \$350,000.00 brought our total evaluation up to over a million dollars.

Des Moines church is in the beginning of a church building program. Charles City has been working on plans for re-location. Waite Park church is building a parsonage. Guthrie Center is remodeling and putting in

Sunday School rooms. Albaton has stuccoed their church. Albert Lea has put in a new heating system and remodeled the parsonage. The camp kitchen has been given a new look.

THE DOUBLE YOUR MONEY PLAN was inaugurated to encourage annuities, bequests, loans and contributions for Kingdom building purposes.

TO ENCOURAGE CHURCH EXTENSION THE COMING YEAR, proposed goals have been set up for each church and also a proposed budget of expenditures to be presented to the conference. This should make every individual and every church feel their privilege and responsibility. New areas await our coming, but we need financial backing to go ahead.

Our total pastor's receipts increased \$9,010.64 this year. Full membership showed a gain of 54 and total membership an increase of 132. Estimated converts were 207.

Janssen, one of the members of the Sunday School Board. In each rally some local minister and lay leaders were used in workshop sessions. Also featured in these rallies was a book display dealing with various phases of Sunday School work.

Missionary Board and Trustees Report

By motion, the following actions were taken:

June 5, 1958 —

1. \$100.00 was allowed to help in the expense of plastering the Guthrie Center Parsonage.
2. The Card Call and Calendar envelope money is to be turned in through the regular church treasurers.
3. The Dayton Valley Church request to be disbanded by September 1958 was granted.
4. Dr. Paul Kindschi was made chairman of the closing Church Extension service and the installation of the new officers.
5. Approval was given George Walquist to purchase two lots near a school in north St. Paul for a future site of a Wesleyan Church.

Aug. 13, 1958 —

1. The matter of rental or sale of the Dayton Valley property was left in the hands of the Conf. President.
2. The moving expenses of Rev. Orland Johnson to Guthrie Center and Rev. Vernon Swanson to Denison was allowed.

Aug. 14, 1959 —

1. Approval was given the Albaton church for the parsonage remodeling.
2. Approval was given to the E. R. Dodd Memorial Church for the construction of a recreational building with suggested changes.
3. The printing of a brochure for wills and annuities, presented by a Committee, was approved.
4. Authorization was given to the Conference President

to approve bills up to \$250.00. Church Extension calendars are to be printed.

5. The Conference President was declared President of the Board by virtue of his office. Rev. Paul R. Davis was made secretary, by motion.

Sept. 22, 1958 —

1. Roslyn Park and Cedar Rapids churches are to take extension offerings with the money to be used in their local churches.
2. Albert Lea and Rudd churches were given permission to have the Church Extension service at a later date because of revival conflict. Their service will be September 28.
3. Roslyn Park was given \$100.00 to help toward Sunday School Supplies and fuel bill.

Oct. 7, 1958 —

1. The Board met with the Des Moines Church and architect, Joseph Kimbel, for a two hour session.

Oct. 8, 1958 —

1. A vote by mail approving Albert Lea church borrowing \$2,000.00 for a new furnace was accepted.
2. A request from the Rockford, Iowa church to sell their parsonage was granted, with the money to be placed in the Rockford fund.
3. The Dayton Valley parsonage is to be sold to the high bidder over \$2,500.00. The church building to be given to the Charles City Camp.
4. Rev. H. F. Clark was appointed to make arrangements with an Albert Lea plasterer to stucco the steps of the Marengo Church. Rev. Robert Howlett and Rev. H. F. Clark were authorized to oversee the reroofing of the Marengo parsonage and hold a week of services for the church.
5. \$30.00 from Missionary funds were made available for assisting in the expense of city water being piped to the Maywood parsonage.
6. A letter of commendation is to be sent to Des Moines church for their preliminary plans of a church superstructure. The Board will assist in finding loans up to \$25,000.00 for the superstructure as soon as the plans are approved.
7. A special Christmas offering was authorized.
8. The Conference President was authorized to confer with Rev. H. F. Clark and other men in Sioux City that are interested in getting a church started there, with approval of suggested plans, provided it does not involve the Conference in an immediate outlay of money.

Feb. 11, 1959 —

1. Plans for Waite Park's new \$20,000.00 parsonage were approved.
2. The Roslyn Park pastor's salary is to be subsidized by \$43.50 per month. A partial Board's action authorizing \$474.32 as improvement taxes plus \$115.00 on the December payment and \$100.00 on the January payment were approved.

Feb. 12, 1959 —

1. A report was given of the sale of Dayton Valley parsonage.
2. The former action relative to the Dayton Valley Church building was rescinded. The building is to be sold and torn down and the money to be given for

Camp improvements.

3. The Cedar Rapids church trustee's request that the money from the sale of the Dayton Valley parsonage be applied toward their church indebtedness was approved with the understanding that the cost of selling and 500.00 for Conference Mission be first taken out and that the Cedar Rapids raise enough to finish paying the loan from the Home Missions Department.
4. All additions and remodeling of churches or parsonages are to first meet the approval of the Conference building committee.
5. Offering taken in the West Iowa District some years ago were, by motion, to be place in the Conference Mission treasury and voted out by the Board.
6. The Maywood church is in arrears of \$200.00 on their payments plus several other outstanding bills. The Board approved the paying of the \$200.00 building payment. The Cedar Falls church raised an offering of \$46.00 to help on other outstanding bills.
7. Blue prints of Des Moines superstructure were approved.

June 9, 1959 —

1. Plans of Waterloo First Church for a new entry and church remodeling was accepted with a recommendation that brick veneering on the original structure be considered.
2. The Dayton Valley Fund of \$500.00 was placed in the Pioneer Loan Fund.
3. The mail call vote authorizing the purchase of the La Porte City parsonage was approved.
4. The card call for Marengo remodeling was approved.
5. Guthrie Center to be granted a card call for remodeling.
6. The Superannuate budget for Dayton Valley is to be paid.
7. Approved the renting of the Rockford parsonage for \$25.00 per month.
8. Remodeling plans for Howardville church were approved.

June 14, 1959 —

1. The general building plans for a new church structure for Falls Avenue were approved, with a request for the church to present plans for financing.
2. The trustees were authorized to sign with the Des Moines trustees a mortgage loan of \$20,000.00 at 5% interest for their new church building.
3. The Charles City church's preliminary plans for a new building were presented. The Board voted to commend the church for their plans and urged them to complete the same.
4. Church extension Sunday plans were made.

In October of this year, we attended the National Sunday School Convention at Des Moines, Iowa. 4. SOUTHERN IOWA DISTRICT—Des Moines, Oskaloosa, Marengo, and Cedar Rapids. Leader: Mrs. Hazel Calhoun.

5. CHARLES CITY DISTRICT—Charles City Rockford, Rudd, Ben-zette, Howardville and Clarksville. Leader: Rev. James Slye.

6. WATERLOO DISTRICT—Cedar Falls, Emmanuel, La Porte City, Waterloo Falls Avenue, Waterloo First, Waterloo Maywood. Leader: LeRoy Danielson.

7. INDEPENDENCE DISTRICT—Fayette, Hoover, Independence, Manchester and West Union. Leader: Mrs. Roy Coleman.

We Further Recommend:

1. That each district have a minimum of one Sunday school convention.

2. That every Sunday School cooperate with the denominational thanksgiving project.

3. That attention be given to disciplinary provision, relative to election of officers and teachers. (See paragraph 334 page 187)

13. That the Child Evangelism Secretary be director of the Bible Crusader Camps.

14. That two Sundays be disallowed, if desired, in figuring the average attendance of the year.

REPORT NO. 24**Secretary of Evangelism Report**

It has been heartening to notice three distinct trends in the interests of evangelism within the Iowa Conference during the past year.

Pastors have continued to evidence a characteristic interest in evangelism through the scheduling of evangelistic services in the various churches. In most cases, scheduled meetings have been faithfully reported to the Secretary. Where this has been done with adequate time to do so, evangelistic efforts occurring in the several churches have been announced in **THE EVANGEL**. Undoubtedly this has stimulated interest, prayer support and spiritual victory. In regard to evangelism as a tool of the pastor, it will be well for us to recall that a church which ceases to emphasize evangelism soon ceases to be evangelistic. This occasions the unhappy circumstance of a church failing in the achievement of its divinely appointed mission—"adding unto the church daily such as were being saved."

A second important trend within our conference has been the employment of a full time conference evangelist. A new departure this year, this plan was well received with the Rev. Lowell Stoesz being widely used throughout the conference.

An additional trend, not concerned with our conference alone, but reflected in such assemblages as the Conference on Evangelism sponsored by our church last December in Florida and the National Holiness Association Convention in Cincinnati, was an awakened interest in the validity of evangelism in our day.

On the local conference level, attention to the phase of evangelism was focused through an address delivered by the Secretary of Evangelism. Whether the challenge to engage upon expectant evangelism—evangelism which proposes to believe that revival can be experienced in our churches in this day—was accepted or not will be reflected in only one way: The reports of future revival meetings in this Conference.

On the national level of interest and concern over evangelism, the Secretary was unable to attend the Mid-Winter Conference in Florida, but did participate in the NHA Convention, directing a seminar on evangelism. Striking is the fact that the great moving of the Spirit in this convention occurred through the emphasis on Evangelism which was the theme of the 1959 Convention. It is evident that God blesses when a vision of evangelism is caught.

As we review the scope of this aspect of our conference ministry, the natural inclination might be to argue for the primacy of this emphasis over all others. Such would be an invalid presupposition. However, it is not invalid to insist that each arm of the church's ministry be used to the fullest utilization of its unique contribution to the whole. Until we select personnel more carefully, prepare more fully, pray more powerfully, believe more positively and succeed more dramatically, we have not done all that can be done to use to the greatest extent this potentially powerful aspect of the program of our denomination and our local churches.

And, until we have utilized every legitimate technique of evangelism, exploring the possibilities of visitation evangelism, teaching evangelism, extra-church evangelism, we are not ready to rest on the laurels of meager albeit rewarding achievements.

To share a vision is an easy task, but to impart a vision is difficult. Prayerfully we admonish the members of the assembled conference to accept a vision of thorough, powerful and productive evangelism.
