SUNDAY SCHOOLS

The importance of the Sunday School cannot be overestimated. There is no agency more consistently effective in evangelism and Church extension than the Sunday School. The Sunday School opens the door and furnishes encouragement for large groups of laymen to do personal work, house to house visiting, and Bible study. There is a place for all from the cradle to the grave in this organization of the Church.

The marked blessing of the Lord upon the Conference in a deepening and widening vision of our opportunities to push out into the whitened harvest fields is being reflected in our Sunday Schools. Pastors and local Superintendents are more and more seeing the possibilities of larger schools with greater efficiency in organization and teaching personnel. During the year Teacher Training Classes were organized at Willis, Gage Park, and Cedar. The following new schools were organized: Snokomo schoolhouse near Williams Chapel by Rev. A. F. Messer assisted by Rev. Dale Campbell; Hopewell schoolhouse near Excelsior by Rev. J. C. Patterson; Belvoir school in Topeka by Rev. C. U. Hughes; and Freedom school, Freedom, Nebraska by Brother Stevenson.

A series of local Sunday School rallies were planned throughout the Conference which proved helpful in awakening interest in Sunday School work. Two pastors in each of the five districts of the Conference were asked to serve as visiting speakers for these rallies. Thirty three rallies were held representing a total of approximately 1800 miles travelled and a total audience of near to a thousand people in attendance, a large number of whom were active Sunday School workers. The Secretary desires to thank the pastors who coöperated so willingly in making these rallies possible.

While we are interested in every legitimate avenue for further training and development of our Sunday School workers, we would not encourage coöperation with the County Councils for Religious Education where these councils are under the guidance of leaders who are seeking to build character upon the "old man" instead of the "new man." We urge that our schools be spiritually awake, keeping forever as our objective the salvation of young and old within the school. Let us see the Sunday Schools doing their full part in promoting the interests of the gospel through every church in the Conference.

BOOKS AND PERIODICALS

The total of all that has been written on all subjects and is available for reading today is more than any one person could read in a lifetime. Therefore one is forced to select what he reads even if all were wholesome and desirable, and much is not. Few will find time even to read all that is of the highest and best in Christian literature, biogrophy, history, etc. We conclude that life is too short to spend time reading anything but the very best. We deplore the increasing amount of yellow journalism and would warn against it as poisonous. We do not include the Bible among books in the general sense of the word. The Bible is more than a book; it is The Book. We read it not only for information but for inspiration. It is more than a source of facts; it is the source of Faith. The reading of no other books or periodicals however spiritual they may

be can substitute for the reading of the Bible. We would urge that the Wesleyan Methodist and the Wesleyan Missionary be in every Wesleyan home as far as possible, that parents be especially careful and prayerful in selecting books for the home library, and periodicals which are to come into the home. Parents and Sunday School teachers may do much toward encouraging the reading of our graded Sunday School literature which is of the very best. A circulating library for the local church, containing books appropriately selected is always of great blessing to young and old. Many of those who have been denied adequate school privileges have applied themselves to home study and much reading and have thus compensated in large part for the lack of school privileges.

Where the end will be, God only knows unless we, as a Church, raise our voice against these gross sins of the day.

As was said of Esther of old, perhaps it is for such a time as this that we as a people have an existence. God is calling every Christian to arise and shine, stand fast in the faith, and abide by the Word of God. This task of the Church is a large one, therefore we feel that our members should be examples in word, in conversation, and in purity. We urge that our dress be modest without the use of jewelry or unnecessary ornamentation, and that all choir singers wear long sleeves and dresses of modest length.

We believe that all Wesleyan Methodists should be law abiding citizens and exhibit exemplary conduct before their children. In these times when the evils of tobacco, drunkenness, gambling, dancing, and other forms of immorality are sweeping our land unchecked, we should use the power of influence against all evil, and that it be not passive or silent, but aggressive and audible both in denouncing these evils and supporting our officers when they try to enforce the laws which exist.

STATE OF THE WORK

We, your Committee on State of the Work, submit the following report:

We give thanks and praises to God for His many blessings and for the victories of the past Conference year.

We are made to rejoice for the advancement made in the spiritual condition of the Conference, and for the spirit of unity and fellowship among the brethren; and for the gracious revivals held throughout the Conference.

Five churches have been dedicated the past year: Abilene, Mankato, Kansas City, Missouri; Clay Center, and Concordia. The Concordia Church was a rededication after an extensive building program was completed. The Ottawa Church has been extensively repaired. Much needed repairs have been made at Topeka, First Church; the Antioch Church has been newly painted; Inglewood has repainted the church and decorated the church and parsonage lawn with a border of Chinese Elms; and some interior redecoration is being done in Willis Church. Plans are being made for a new church building at Phillipsburg also at Gage Park, Topeka in the near future. The Kansas City, Kansas parsonage has been completed this past Conference year. A much needed electric water system has been installed upon the Camp Ground for which all are glad.

A pioneer church has been organized in Salina with a membership of 13. A mission church was organized in North Topeka with a membership of 20; a mission work has been started at Belvoir in East Topeka. The Hollis Church after being practically inactive for 14 years with only two members remaining has reorganized with a membership of 20 and some much needed repairs have been made there. The Williams Chapel Church has been repainted; the Union Valley Church is being revived with a pastor stationed there and the church society is being rapidly built up. A revival was held at Hopewell in the oil fields north of Hutchinson; seemingly this work promises a hopeful field. A new work has been opened at Hardy, Nebraska and God is blessing the band there.

Four new Sunday Schools have been organized the past Conference year.

We have examined the books, vouchers and reports of the Conference Treasurer, the Treasurer of the Camp Meeting and Camp Ground Committee, and of the Treasurer of the Missionary Board which we find correct.

MISSIONARY BOARD ORGANIZED

The newly elected Missionary Board held its first meeting at Miltonvale, August 19, 1935, and effected the following organization:

On motion E. H. Dunbar was elected Secretary-Treasurer for the coming year.

REPORT OF STATISTICAL COMMITTEE

Your Committee on Statistics presents the following information as gathered from the reports of the churches. There has been a marked increase in almost every department of the Church. The net gain in membership is 74 and the increase in contributions for all purposes is \$12,553.60 more than last year. The average contribution per member is \$38.24. 73% of our churches reported totals for all purposes higher than last year, 70% reported higher pastors' receipts. Three pastors' receipts were above \$1000.00, eight others were above \$750.00, and 14 reported less than \$500.00.

The increase in the property of the Church is \$18,300 while the increase in indebtedness is only \$2,843.15.

The Sunday Schools report a net gain of 371.

Churches filling every item of the Budget are: Belleville, Concordia, Eskridge, Heber, Kansas City, Kans.; Kansas City, Mo.; Topeka, Gage Park. Topeka, First Church raised more than the assignment but did not fill every item.

We come nearer reaching the goal in the Connectional items of the Budget than in the Conference items. The order in which we approach the goal is as follows: Connectional Sunday School Work, Connectional Home Missions, Education, Foreign Missions, General Conference Delegate Fund, Conference Fund, Kansas Conference Missions, Superannuated Ministers' Fund, Hephzibah Orphanage. The increase in Conference Fund is \$120.11 over last year.

There is a loss of 84 in subscriptions to the Wesleyan Methodist. The number reported is 282 or not quite 1 subscription to each five members in the Church.

PLAN OF WORK

We, the Committee on Plan of Work, hereby recommend the following:

Division I. Local Work

- 1. That this Plan of Work and the Efficiency Standard be read quarterly in each Local Society.
 - 2. That we observe the "Red Letter Days":
 - A. Harvest Home Day for Educational Work.
 - B. Easter-programs, gifts and offerings for Home Missions.
- C. The World Day of Prayer—that we coöperate in observing the World Day of Prayer.
- D. May Day—to be known as gift day, bandages and such gifts as can be sent with outgoing missionaries or used in our home field.
- E. Wesleyan Missionary day with programs to secure Wesleyan Missionary subscriptions.
- 3. That October 18 be observed as Harvest Home Day. We urge each Society to send cash or make donations to the Dormitory and report same to the Harvest Home Committee to receive credit on the Educational Budget.
- 4. That by recommendation of the General Conference Society all local dues be sent to our Conference Treasurer and be divided as follows: 25 cents to be forwarded to the Treasurer of the General Conference for general fund, 25 cents to be retained in the Conference Treasury, and the remaining 50 cents be used for missionary work and be applied on Local Church Budget. Please designate specifically where credit is desired.
- 5. That each Local Society elect a Solicitor for the Wesleyan Missionary, the same to be a permanent officer. Her duties shall be to secure renewals and fill up the quota for her society.
- 6. We recommend the use of a monthly envelope system for the collection of dues, the Treasurer to keep record of the amounts paid in.
- 7. That each Society contribute 10 cents per member to pay General Conference Delegates' expenses.
- 8. That each Society contribute at least \$6.00 for Home Missions Connectionally supported.

- 9. We urge each Society to contribute at least \$5.00 to the Hephzibah Orphanage. Such contribution to be applied on Budget.
- 10. That each Local President appoint a Committee of two whose duty shall be to visit the sick and to work in harmony with the Pastor in rendering assistance that will help in reaching souls and building up the Kingdom of God.
- 11. That the President of each Local Society be made responsible to arrange with the Pastor for one evening of the third week of each month to pray especially for the Mission work; the same to be preceded by a day of fasting. We also recommend that an offering be taken at each of these services:
- A. September, October, and November for Education. This Fall quarter has been given to the W. H. & F. M. S. to raise funds for our school.
 - B. December-Bethshan Home.
 - C. January-Hephzibah Orphanage.
 - D. February-Medical Missions.
 - E. March-Kansas Conference Missions.
- F. The remaining offerings to be divided half Home and half Foreign.

These items all count on Budget with the exception of Bethshan Home and Medical Missions.

- 12. We recommend the use of the programs printed in the Wesleyan Missionary.
- 13. That all bandages be sent to Rev. E. F. McCarty, 222 S. Clemens Ave., Lansing, Mich., receiving credit of 50 cents per pound but does not apply on Local Church Budget. Before sending donations of clothing for use in Home Mission work secure information from the workers concerning proper addresses for mailing packages. See Magazine Directory for addresses.
- 14. That all money be disbursed through our Local and Conference Treasurers. That all money or receipts applying on Budget be sent from the Local W. H. & F. M. S. Treasurer to the Conference Treasurer quarterly. This money should all be in the hands of the Conference Treasurer by August 1. That each Local Society use the Treasurer's Book prepared by the General Conference Society, the same to be audited by a committee of two before the report is adopted.

- 15. That the annual report be prapared by the President, Secretary and Treasurer of the Local Society, one copy to be sent to Committee on Statistics, Mrs. N. Mae Clark, Perry, Kansas, two weeks before Conference, the duplicate copy to be brought to Conference by Delegate. The names of the out-going President and Secretary should appear on the regular report and the names of the newly elected President and Secretary should appear on the back of the Report Blank.
- 16. That each Society grade themselves by the Efficiency Standard. A grade of 10 per cent will be given on each of any ten points chosen. Societies making a grade of 90 per cent will receive honorable mention and those making a grade of 100 per cent will be placed on the Honor Roll.
- 17. We urge the reading of the Report on Moral Reform at four public meetings during the year.
- 18. That each Society have a Committee of two to see to the gathering in of foodstuffs for the Conference dining hall. The minimum for each Society shall be: 10 quarts of fruit spread, 10 quarts of pickles, relish or catsup and 10 pounds of noodles. Fruit and vegetables may be substituted. This does not apply on Budget or Society apportionment.
- 19. That the Local Society cooperate with the Temperance Superintendent of the Sunday School in observance of Temperance Sunday.
- 20. That our Conference goal for the coming year be 600 members, 375 magazines and \$4,500.00 Budget.
- 21. That honorary membership dues be undivided and applied on Budget.

Division No. II. Conference Work

- 22. That the W. H. & F. M. S. Conference open Thursday at 10 a. m., of Camp Meeting week and that we accept the kindly offer of the Camp Meeting Committee giving us the first Sabbath afternoon of the Camp for our public meeting.
- 23. That our Conference President, Y. M. W. B. Superintendent and District Organizers arrange one Missionary Convention for the coming year.
- 24. That the President and District Organizers arrange the time and recommend the worker for the Convention, alsa that they prepare the schedule for the visitation of our worker and report through our Church publications.

25. That each District be supervised by the District Organizer under the direction of the Conference President. The Organizer shall be Prayer Secretary and Magazine Committee of her District and shall report the conditions of her District to the President quarterly. We suggest that each Organizer make definite plans for the observance of the World Day of Prayer.

26. The Districts are as follows:

District No. 1.—Topeka 1st, Gage Park, Ottawa, Fairview, Eskridge, Williams Chapel, Kansas City, Kans.; Kansas City, Mo.; Willis, Easton.

District No. 2.—Clay Center, Chapman Creek, Bethany Chapel, Wesley Chapel, Abilene, Antioch, Manning, Miltonvale.

District No. 3.—Concordia, Hall, Belleville, New Hope, Morgan Chapel, Heber, Hollis.

District No. 4.—Wichita Church, Wichita Mission, Excelsior, Grace Chapel.

District No. 5.—Mankato, Wesley Center, Formoso, Victor, Cedar, Phillipsburg, Iowa Union, Inglewood, Gaylord.

27. That the Gleaners each:

- A. Observe the monthly prayer hour.
- B. Be a subscriber to the Wesleyan Missionary.
- C. Furnish five pounds of bandages.
- D. Write at least once to each of the Mission Fields.
- E. Write to some other member of the Gleaners once quarterly
