OPENING - The Tennessee Annual Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church convened for its Thirty-third Annual Session on the Campground at 9 A.M., Tuesday, July 17, 1962.

Conference was called to order by the President, D. P. Denton. Rev. Charles Haire conducted devotions. Roll was called with 10 Elders, 2 Superannuated Elders, 7 Conference Preachers, 2 Students in the Course of Study, and 23 Delegates responding. In closing he challenged the members of the Conference Body to keep their hearts open and in tune with heaven with Pentecostal blessings upon them to win lost souls during the new Conference year.

COMMITTEE ON RESOLUTIONS - Committee on Resolutions reported. Voted unanimously to delete resolution #16 and reword #10 to read thus: "The Conference Treasurer's books shall close on July 5 of each year and no credit shall be given on the Budget for that fiscal year for money received after this date. This shall not effect the closing of our fiscal year on June 30."

EDUCATIONAL INTERESTS - Dr. C. R. Rickman gave personal testimony and presented interest of Central College.

Recessed to Orders of the Day.

MEMORIAL SERVICE - The Memorial Service was conducted by Rev. J. A. Cassady. Rev. N. C. Hoggle, Rev. Douglas Heffner, and Rev. Aris Kight spoke of the life and labours of the departed members and friends of their respective churches.

Voted to re-convene at 1 P. M.

CHILD EVANGELISM DIRECTOR - Sunday School Board nominated and Conference elected Mrs. Jean Wheeler, Director of Child Evangelism.

COMMITTEE ON APPORTIONMENTS - Report of Committee on Apportionments was adopted with ammendment as follows: Conference President's Salary - \$6.00 per full member.

AUDITING COMMITTEE - The Auditing Committee reported that the books of the General Conference Treasurer, Conference Treasurer, Pension Plan Treasurer, Conference Extension Fund Treasurer and Conference Tidings Treasurer had been audited and found in order. Report Adopted.

COMMITTEE ON THANKS - Committee on Thanks read its report, which was adopted. (See Report No. 13)

CONFERENCE TIDINGS - Voted to continue Conference Tidings under direction of the Missionary Board.

PASTORS' MONTHLY REPORTS - Voted to continue monthly reporting system for pastors to Conference President.

UNFINISHED BUSINESS - It was voted that any unfinished business be left in the hands of the Conference President and his Advisory Board.

Voted to leave the printing of the Conference Minutes in the hands of the Missionary Board and that the Conference President and Conference Secretary be authorized to edit the Minutes.

ANNUAL CHURCH MEETING - Voted that annual church meeting for revision of church roll and election of officers be held on June 15, or as near that date as possible with new officers taking office on July 1.

DATE OF NEXT ANNUAL CONFERENCE - Date and place of next Annual Conference placed in the hands of President and his Advisory Board.

PASTORAL RELATIONS - Committee on Pastoral Relations gave its report, which was adopted. (See Report No. 14)

Upon motion, Conference adjourned sine die. Benediction.

RESOLUTION AND LAWS OF THE TENNESSEE CONFERENCE

We, the Committee on Resolutions, submit the following reports:
Be it resolved, that these articles shall become the standing rules and law of this Conference:

1. Before a local building committee proceeds with a building plan or program that they be required to have all plans approved by the President and his Advisory Board and the Missionary Board; and further, that no financial obligations be assumed without the consent of the Conference Trustees.

2. That the Board of Conference Trustees be, and they are hereby empowered, to sign all papers necessary for the sale or transfer of Conference, Church or Parsonage property, providing the said sale of transfer is authorized by the President and his Advisory Board and shall not violate the spirit of paragraphs 386, 387 of our Book of Discipline.

3. The Board of Conference Trustees are hereby authorized to execute papers to secure funds for the liquidation of Conference, Church or Parsonage indebtedness, providing that the churches set forth in writing the amount and the purposes for which the loan is to be used; and that no funds so secured shall be used for any other purpose than that set forth in the notice to the trustees of the Conference.

4. When a deed for Conference, Church or Parsonage property is received and before it is recorded it shall be referred to the President and his Advisory Board who are hereby designated as a Deed Examining Committee whose duty shall be to examine the deed and see that there are such disciplinary clauses included as may be necessary to make the property secure to our Church. Said Committee shall have power to engage such legal advice as may be needed to insure the proper steps regarding the reception or transfer of the property. See paragraphs 388, 389 of present Book of Discipline.

5. We shall proclaim with voice and pen and holy living the gospel of full salvation, recognizing our dependence upon, and need of the indwelling power and presence of the Holy Spirit.

6. We shall continue to interpret the teachings of the Scriptures and the Special Rules of the Discipline in accord with the standards held by the early Methodists and the Wesleyans of the past generations. To this end we reaffirm our stand against the reception of any member as a full member who wears jewelry, including the wedding band or other unnecessary ornaments and other worldly manifestations on the person and declare ourselves in favor of higher standards of dress. Our ministers are asked to refrain from performing wedding ceremonies using the ring, and to be positive in their declarations regarding this entering wedge of worldliness. We further declare our opposition to such things as commercialized ball games, Sabbath desecration, theatres, television, and such like, and shall support our ministers in their endeavors to counteract these menaces. We further urge our ministers to take an active stand in exposing the three "C's" of the world - Communism, Catholicism, and Compromise.

7. We urge all Conference Preachers and Elders to become members of the Women's Missionary Society, and that the pastors attend each meeting and encourage the women, this being one of the strong arms of the Church.

8. Each Church shall make a special effort in behalf, and loyally support the Church Extension Card Plan.

9. EACH PASTOR, OR CHARGE, SHALL HAVE IN THE HANDS OF THE STATISTICAL SECRETARY NOT LESS THAN FIVE DAYS BEFORE THE ANNUAL

CONFERENCE, ONE COPY OF HIS STATISTICAL REPORT IN FULL. This report shall be accompanied by a statement from the Conference Treasurer giving the amounts paid on budget under item VIII in the pastor's statistical report and the pastor's report must check with that of the Conference Treasurer.

10. The Conference Treasurer's books and the General Budget Treasurer's books shall close on July 5 of each year and no credit shall be given on the budget for that fiscal year for money received after that date. This shall not effect the closing of our fiscal year on June 30.

11. The President's, Secretary's, and Treasurer's correspondence expenses shall be paid from the Conference Fund by the Conference Treasurer.

12. Minutes of this Conference shall be published through arrangements made by the Missionary Board and delivered to the pastors in numbers equal to 50% of their Church membership.

13. Preachers and delegates shall remain throughout the entire Conference session unless providentially hindered or excused by the Conference.

14. All Elders received from other denominations shall be required to pass examination on our Book of Discipline, and must have passed a course of study which is equivalent to our course for ordination, and harmonize with our theological views. They shall give special attention to the requirements found in paragraph 171 of our Book of Discipline.

15. Copies of these resolutions, together with the apportionments and the addresses of the President, Secretary, and Treasurer, shall be in the hands of each pastor within two weeks of the close of the Annual Conference. The Conference Secretary be authorized to carry out this resolution.

16. The Conference Budget shall be raised and remitted monthly to the Conference Treasurer.

17. All monies which are reported through the Conference Treasurer shall be sent to him either as cash or receipts and he shall give Conference Treasurer's receipt for each item, and no money shall be listed paid out by the Treasurer except by check, on order of the President, and he shall be required to present cancelled checks and vouchers for each bill paid.

18. Those wishing to take examinations in the Course of Study for credit during any year, shall write for questions before May 31 of that year and shall have the answers in the hands of the proper instructor before June 30 for credit for that year. The Committee on Itineracy and Orders shall not be expected to send out questions or accept papers after these dates.

19. It shall be a standing rule that the Secretary shall be remunerated the sum of \$50.00 for each session of Conference.

20. We recommend that when the Conference President labors as an evangelist in any of our churches, he be paid as other evangelists are paid.

21. Each unorganized work which is being run under the direction of the Conference and served by a member of this body, shall be allowed to elect an honorary delegate who shall be permitted to sit with the Conference and speak on matters of business, but not allowed to vote.

22. The Conference President shall be required to hold Quarterly Business Meetings at all unorganized works that are under the Conference Missionary Board or with the Conference, and the pastors of

these works shall receive an offering quarterly to be sent to the Conference Treasurer and used toward the President's Salary. Treasurers of these unorganized works shall be members of some Wesleyan Methodist Church unless otherwise approved by the Conference Missionary Board.

23. In order to help maintain the spirit of brotherhood among our members and ministers, we ask that designations of titles, degrees and authority be omitted both in our public meetings and in the printed minutes, except in the first public introduction of each individual.

24. The Committee on Itineracy and Elders Orders will be responsible for the time, place, financing, and program of the Ministerial Convention each year.

25. The Conference President and his Advisory Board is a constituted committee on Special Orders.

26. In the judgment of the Tennessee Conference, viewing television programs is an impediment to the development of holy character. We deplore the television program's evil effect upon the moral and spiritual life of the nation. The principles of Wesleyan Methodism, being an epitome of the Christian religion, oblige Wesleyan Methodists to an unblameable life which constantly rebukes every form of evil and zealously advocates holiness of heart and life. Therefore, we most earnestly request our ministers and members, as those who must give account unto God in the Day of Judgment for anything which tends to influence toward evil, to refrain from the purchase of television sets and from viewing television programs for Jesus' sake. Inasmuch as ministers are examples and patterns to the flock of Christ, the Tennessee Conference expects each of its ministers to set a wholesome example and to be a godly pattern in this respect, so that those to whom he ministers will follow his example and avoid exposure to this which menaces vital godliness.

27. That outgoing pastor's responsibility continue through the Sunday following Annual Conference. Also, that a church allow its pastor at least two meetings away from the church and that he be given at least one week's vacation pay; that last provision to include the Conference President.

28. That no budget credit be given until payment is itemized, or otherwise specified.

29. That all officers and standing committees assume their duties at the close of the sitting of conference at which they are elected.

30. Before any of these resolutions and laws of the Tennessee Conference can be changed or repealed, it shall require a two-thirds standing vote of the Conference body.

31. The Missionary Board shall be the Board of Managers of the Tennessee Conference.

32. It shall be the polity of the Conference that our own Conference Officials preside over the Conference Sessions.

REPORT I

CONFERENCE PRESIDENT

We greet you at another annual Conference session conscious of the fact that this may be the last session of the Conference, or the last time that we shall ever be privileged to meet together. The closing of this dispensation, the rising tide of atheistic communism, and rapid increase of the anti-christ spirit in the world and in our nation, the gathering clouds of impending doom, and the agonizing apostasy that is upon us, is enough to make us know the coming of the Lord draweth nigh. Surely there is little time left, and no time to waste in the work of God.

While we would like to speak at length of the various aspects of the work, and its relation to existing conditions, we shall refrain and simply give those things that are of importance to the Conference and its work. We would like to mention the many steps of progress that have been taken this year, but most of these will appear in other reports. Suffice it to say that this has been one of the best years we have ever seen in the Conference. God has been moving among us and working in our behalf. Of course, there have been some problems, and there are many enemies, some of which I am sorry to say, are to be found among those who ought to be encouraging the Conference in its standards and activities. We could not mention all of the good things that have been done, nor all of the successful projects that have been undertaken, so will not even attempt a listing of them. Practically every Church in the Conference has done something in the way of material improvements, and most of them have made spiritual progress. To God be all the glory.

I would like to mention some areas in which I feel that we need help. First, the area of our standards. While the Lord is helping us here, and our people generally are seeking to be true Bible Christians in their standards, nevertheless there are some glaring needs among us. This is especially true among the Ministers' families. It is bad enough to find a lax attitude among the laymen, but when the Ministers' homes have bobbed hair, jewelry, sleeveless dresses, suggestive clothing of other kinds, and a lax attitude toward worldliness in general, it is a time to become alarmed, and to take stock of ourselves. We are fasting and praying regularly for the Pastors' families that they will be the Christians that they should be. The second area in which we need help, I think, is in our cooperation with one another in the work of the Conference. The Wesleyan Methodist Discipline places every Church and every Minister under the jurisdiction of the Conference in whose bounds they are located. Our Conference has never taken a bossy attitude, and never will as long as I am your leader, but we ought to take stock of our attitude toward our Conference and our work, and be sure that we do not lag in our cooperation to it. I repeat, the Wesleyan Methodist Discipline lists our first responsibility to our local Conference. Let us be ever reminded of this fact. Some have sought to encourage a centralized dictatorship outside of the Conference. Such an attitude will destroy the very foundation upon which Wesleyan Methodism is founded. The greatest enemy that true Wesleyan Methodism has is that group in the denomination which is working for more control and more centralization and more dictatorship outside of the local Conference. Such a thing is a violation of the basic principles of the Discipline, and as a loyal member of my Conference I am obligated to either resist it or withdraw from the Church. I cannot be an honest man or a truthful man and seek to destroy the very foundations upon which our Church is built. This is an area in

which we all need to do some serious thinking. The insidious move that is on, inspired by powerful forces outside of the local conferences, to transfer the seat of our loyalty from the local church and local Conference to elsewhere is not true Wesleyan Methodism, is a violation of the Wesleyan Methodist Discipline, and should be and will be resisted to the limit by all true Wesleyans and true Christians. Such a transfer of loyalty has always (and this is apparent from a study of Church history) wrecked the fellowship of the members, stifled the leadings of the Holy Ghost, destroyed the local church, and changed the denomination into a machine rather than a movement. May God in His mercy give us the sense to see, the will to work, and the strength to stand.

OFFICIAL ACTS:

While this has been a year of intense activity, it has been necessary to take but very few official steps in the work. There has been a spirit of harmony and loyalty to the task that has made very few transfers and changes necessary.

The last session of Conference left us with the following unfilled: Corinth was left in the hands of the Missionary Board due to the situation there, with the understanding the W.F. Johnson would remain as Pastor. However, on August 1st, Brother Johnson left the church and took work in another Conference. The church remained without a pastor until December 1st, when we appointed George Bross, a Conference Preacher, as Pastor with the consent of the Missionary Board, the Advisory Board, and the request of the Church. Crossville was left in our hands, and on August 1st, we appointed Earl Snider as pastor, he having transferred as an Elder from the Indiana Conference, the church requesting his appointment, and Advisory Board approving.

On March 1, 1962, Ealis Stephens notified us that he was resigning the Johnson City Church. This Church has remained without a Pastor, with various ones filling the pulpit.

On May 16, 1962, we granted a letter of transfer to Roy Bagwell Conference Preacher, who has taken work in the Kentucky Conference.

I would like to pay especial tribute to those who have labored so faithfully with us this year: Our Conference Vice-President, Conference Secretary and Treasurer, the President's Advisory Board, the Missionary Board, the Wesleyan Youth Officers, the Women's Missionary Society Officers, the Camp Meeting Board, Pension Board, the Pastors, and all the Laymen and Laywomen who have stood by so faithfully in the work. My personal thanks to each of you. If there has been a cross this year between any of us that has effected our fellowship or injured our relations in any way, I certainly do not know it, and have not felt it. There has been and is a marvelous spirit of harmony and fellowship among the Brethren which humbles us before Him. May God add His blessings and multiply them upon these Co-workers.

My personal activities include: We have travelled 41,125 miles, 32,925 of which has been in the Conference work. We have preached in two Camp Meetings, four Conventions, and fifteen revivals. We have preached 318 times, been in 292 other services, for a total of 610 services during the year. We have made 216 visits with prayer. We have supervised the editing and printing of the Conference Minutes, the Conference Tidings, and numerous other items of print for the Conference. We have issued 13 letters to the Pastors

during the year. We have conducted 57 Quarterly Conferences and other Business Meetings, have met with various Boards and Committees throughout the year, have worked an average of more than 20 hours per week on churches, parsonages and the Camp, and have tried to keep up with the correspondence relating to the work.

MISSIONARY BOARD

Missionary Board met July 20, 1961 at the close of Conference and elected: Carl Johnson, Secretary; Rev. Charles Haire, Sec-Treas. of the Pioneer Pardon; Rev. Charles Haire, Rev. Thomas Hampton, and Carl Johnson as the Executive Committee. Also, on this date paid the kitchen help.

Voted to continue the publishing of The Tennessee Tidings the same as last year.

Voted that Brother Denton print the Conference Minutes.

Voted to have two regular meetings, one in the fall and one in the Spring.

Voted that the Conference be authorized to underwrite the moving of the needy churches.

August 31, 1961 - business by mail: Voted to loan the Corinth Church \$540.00 out of the Elizabethton Fund.

Voted to borrow \$1,000 from a friend and loan it to the Corinth Church.

Voted to set the Fall meeting of the Missionary Board October 28.

Granted the Conference President permission to work on plans for a Training School, to be held the same time as Youth Camp.

September 3, 1961 - Discussed the problems of the Corinth Church. Voted to relocate the Corinth Church. Approved a loan of \$1,000 for the Corinth Church to be paid back when the church is sold at 6% interest.

REPORT V CONT'D.

October 28, 1961 -- Pension Board and Missionary Board had a joint meeting. Motion made and carried to pay the benefactor of the Pension Plan \$25.00 a month beginning October 1, 1961.

Missionary Board voted for the Conference Treasurer to send the General Budget Treasurer \$5.00 for banking fund. Voted to pay \$125 for the Minutes. Voted to pay \$60 from the Pioneer Pardner for the revival at Old Liberty. Leave the selection of a pastor for the Corinth Church to the President and his Advisory Board.

The Missionary Board goes on record as opposing the sending out of representatives from the Conference or any of its branches which do not abide by the Bible Standards as interpreted by the Tennessee Conference.

January 17, 1962 -- Approved for the Oak Ridge Church to borrow up to \$1,200 from a local firm. Voted to assist the pastor at the Johnson City Church temporarily.

March 6, 1962 -- Business by Mail. Approved the Stair Avenue Church refinancing its loan with the Wesleyan Investment Foundation with the following agreement: "The Board agrees to grant permission to the Stair Avenue Church to refinance its loan through The Wesleyan Investment Foundation securing a total of \$2,300 with the understanding that should future developments bring about a change in the relationship of the Conference that the Church Trustees work with the Conference in securing the discharge of the obligation represented in the loan."

Board agreed to allow the Oak Ridge Church the same privilege with the same agreement in securing their loan.

Board agreed to loan the Savannah Church \$300 from the Pioneer Pardner Fund for 60 days to help finish work on the church.

May 12, 1962 -- Approved putting the New Mission work near Rockwood under the Pioneer Pardner.

Ask Brother Haire to plan a promotional service for the Pioneer Pardner during Camp Meeting.

Asked the churches to give the same as last year for Conference Entertainment.

Voted to leave the setting up of Conference to the Executive Committee.

Voted to leave the Johnson City Church in the hands of the Conference President.

Refused to accept the work at Bristol under the direction of Brother Carl Cox as a Wesleyan Methodist Work and to write Brother Cox stating reasons. This does not shut the door in the future if conditions are met.

The Missionary Board recommends to the Missionary Society of the Tennessee Conference that in the election of delegates, Conference Officers, and District Officers that they maintain the Standards as adopted by the Tennessee Conference.

WESLEYAN MINISTERS' INSURANCE PLAN

Report of the Treasurer to the Tennessee Annual Conference, July 18, 1962.

Our group insurance plan has now been in operation for eighteen months, and the figures given below are for the twenty-three men who currently are members of the Plan. During that period of time, the following has been paid in and expended. All of the Disbursements are for the premiums to the Company.

Received from Ministers on premiums \$1,151.30

Paid to American Frontier Life Insurance Company. 1,206.05

Deficit. . . \$ 54.75

We have eleven members who are in arrears with their payments in the amount of \$111.97.

We have nine men who are paid in advance in the amount of \$62.80.

We have twenty-three members in the Plan, with the possibility of two cancellations next month, and the need to increase our coverage by a total of \$15,000 in order to keep the present low rate.

To cover the deficit left by some of the members being in arrears with their payments, we borrowed \$40 from two of the members, Charles Haire and Douglas Heffner, in order to keep the payments in balance. Record should be made of this obligation, and as soon as the members can pay their premiums, it should be repaid to these brethren.

We urge all the Ministers in the Conference,--- Elders, Conference Preachers, and Local Preachers, who are under fifty years of age to join the Plan. Older ones may join on a limited amount until the age of sixty.

We recommend that the Plan be left under the direction of the Conference Missionary Board.

COMMITTEE ON MERGER

At the session of the Tennessee Conference in 1961, a Committee was set up with the instructions to study the proposals for merger and keep the Conference advised as to moves along this line, as well as to recommend appropriate action in keeping with the position of the Conference as expressed in its action last year.

Therefore, the Committee wishes to offer three separate motions having to do with this matter.

1. We move that the action of this body last year regarding merger be reaffirmed (said action recorded on page 7 of our 1961 Minutes under Recommendation Against Merger) and that the same Committee be instructed to continue its work.

2. The Board of Administration has asked us to take a ballot vote on the following resolution, simply as an expression of our position. It is clearly understood that this is not a constitutional vote but just an opinion poll. The committee recommends that this vote be taken and that in view of our position, we should express our opposition to any such move. The Resolution reads thus: "Be it resolved that our Church continue to pursue the possibility of union, on mutually acceptable terms, with the Pilgrim Holiness Church and other sister holiness groups of like precious faith as doors may providentially open."

3. In view of the fact that the next General Conference meets before another session of the Tennessee Annual Conference, and since so much of the future of our Conference is involved in the matter of merger, and since we have gone on record as opposed to any such move, and since our Churches on the local level voted almost unanimously against our entrance into any such merger, therefore, we move that the Board of Managers of the Tennessee Conference be empowered to take whatever action is necessary to insure our position as a Conference in the event such a merger should develop.
