Standing Rules

1. Visiting Ministers:

All visiting ministers of our denomination and those of other denominations who hold the Bible to be the very Word of God and the final authority in faith and practice are invited to honorary seats in this conference.

2. Date of Conference:

The annual sessions of the conference shall convene on the Chambers Campground at 1:30 p.m., the last Tuesday of June, except that quadrennially it shall convene the second Tuesday after the General Conference convenes. The forenoon meetings shall convene at 8:30 and adjourn at 10:45. The afternoon meetings shall convene at 1:30 and adjourn by vote. The seven rows of seats in the front of the tabernacle, and the platform, shall comprise the bar of the conference.

3. Examinations:

Examinations shall be in the hands of the Committee on Itineracy and Orders not later than two weeks before the opening of the conference session.

4. Loans:

Any and all conference loans shall be subject to the approval of the Conference Board of Trustees.

5. Procedure:

The daily order of business shall be: 1. Hymn, 2. Roll Call, 3. Devotions, 4. Reading of Minutes, 5. Appointment of Committees, 6. Report of Committees, 7. Miscellaneous Business, 8. Passage of Characters. The roll call and the reading of the Minutes shall be heard only at the first session of each day.

6. Taking of Pastoral Vote:

To obtain uniformity, it is recommended that the Pastoral Vote be taken on any day during the third full week in April, or during the following week if Easter falls during the third week. The Pastoral Vote shall be taken on prepared official ballots for this purpose.

7. Pay for Officials:

The Secretary and the Treasurer of the conference shall receive \$75.00 each annually.

8. Statistician:

The conference shall elect a statistician whose term of office shall expire at the close of the next session of the Annual Conference. He shall be the chairman of the Statistical Committee.

9. Closing of Records:

The Conference Treasurer shall close his books on June 10 and all receipts thereafter shall be included in the report for the following year. The Treasurer then shall fill in Item IX on the statistical report blanks, affix his signature and return one to the pastor who sent it. The other statistical report shall be forwarded to the Statistician by June 17.

10. Reporting of Statistics:

We authorize the use of the abbreviated report blanks.

11. Reports:

The report of the Woman's Missionary Society and the report of the Wesleyan Youth shall be printed in the conference minutes.

12. Ex-Officio Members:

(a) The President of the conference and the President of Wesleyan Youth shall be ex-officio members of the Camp Meeting Committee.

(b) The President of the conference shall be ex-officio chairman and the President of the

Woman's Missionary Society shall be an ex-officio member of the Missionary Board.
(c) The conference President shall be ex-officio chairman and the Secretary of the conference shall be ex-officio member of the Nominating Committee.
(d) The conference President shall be ex-officio chairman and the Secretary of Evangelism shall be member ex-officio of the Committee of Evangelism.

13. Sale of Properties:

All money coming to the conference from the sale of church and parsonage property shall become a part of the Conference Missions Fund.

14. Committee on Location:

The Board of Trustees shall choose three of their own number to constitute a Committee on Building Location. They shall study all proposed building projects and report their findings to the Board of Trustees. The names of the committee shall be printed in the minutes.

15. Editing of Minutes:

The Secretary of the conference is authorized to edit the minutes.

16. Election of Camp Meeting Chairman:

At the time of the election of conference officers the conference shall elect by ballot from among the elders the chairman of the Camp Meeting Committee.

17. Election of Conference Officers:

All conference officers shall be elected by ballot or after nominations by the Nominating Committee or from the floor. (See list of officers.)

18. Conference Policy:

- (a) Each church shall grant its pastor at least two weeks vacation each year, with pay; and the church shall furnish the supply.
- (b) Each church shall grant its pastor the privilege of a two week revival meeting away from his pulpit each year, and the pastor shall pay his supply.
- (c) It is understood that the pastor shall have one day each week for rest and recreation. Accumulation of days shall not exceed three days.
- (d) Each church shall furnish an adequate heating system (preferably a central heating system); and a kitchen range for the parsonage as soon as possible.
- (e) Each church shall furnish shades or venetian blinds, draw-drapes, curtain rods and fixtures for the parsonage.
- (f) The church shall release the pastor for attendance at Conference and Camp including both Sundays and shall furnish the supply.
- (g) Each church shall encourage and plan for the pastor to attend all Conference gatherings (Ministerial Fellowships, District meetings, work bees, etc.). This is an important part of the Conference work.
- (h) The church shall encourage the pastor to attend the Annual Ministerial Refresher Course at Houghton each year and shall make this possible by providing for the expense for the same or as much of that expense as possible.
- (i) When a church anticipates changing pastors and invites a minister to candidate it shall provide the expense for such a trip.
- (j) When a church changes pastors it shall pay the moving expense of the incoming pastor.

19. Apportionment of Budget:

- (a) The Budget Apportionment Committee shall apportion budget to all members-in-full, regardless of age.
- (b) The Onondaga Reservation charge shall be assigned only the denominational budget.
- (c) A newly organized church shall be exempt from Conference budget the first year following its organization and only one-half the conference budget assigned the second conference year following its organization, after which it may be assigned all items of budget in full as usual.

20. **Course of Study:**
Persons recommended to study or to travel under the direction of the conference shall appear personally before the Committee on Itinerary and Orders before they are accepted and annually thereafter or communicate with the committee so long as they are continued. If they fail to do this for two successive years, they shall be returned to their quarterly conference.
21. **Ministerial Institute:**
The President of the conference shall be ex-officio chairman of the committee to plan the Ministerial Institute. The three district chairmen shall complete the committee. This committee shall arrange for the Institute following the next annual session of the conference.
22. **Delegates' Credentials:**
It shall be the duty of the pastor not later than one week before the next annual session of the conference to forward to the Secretary of the conference, who is a Committee on credentials, the credentials of the delegate(s) and the alternate delegate(s) from his charge.
23. **Audits:**
The books of the Treasurer of the conference and of other custodians of conference funds shall be audited by an accountant or recognized bookkeeper approved by the President and his Advisory Board. This shall be done prior to the convening of the annual session of the Conference, and a certified copy shall be furnished the President.
24. **Conference Missions:**
(a) In the interim between conference sessions the Missionary Board is authorized to interpret what shall be considered conference missions. In the event of the purchase of property, the Missionary Board may make recommendations to the Board of Trustees.
(b) The third Sunday of the second month of each quarter is recommended as the time for taking the Sunday school offering for conference missions.
25. **Bible Study Quarter:**
During the first quarter of each calendar year, which is designated as Bible Study Quarter, each church shall conduct a Bible study program. Plans for this work shall be offered each year by the President and the Bible Study Committee.
26. **Committee on Orders of the Day:**
The President and his Advisory Board shall constitute a committee on Orders of the Day. They shall plan the daily schedule of the conference and shall prepare a printed agenda. The following shall be the order of the evening services: Tuesday, a Sunday school rally; Wednesday, conference missions; Thursday, a public missionary service; Friday, the ordination service.
27. **Church Membership Classes:**
Each church is requested to present annually a series of studies in church membership to be known as "Preparation for Church Membership." All prospective new members are to be requested to attend these classes. Classes are to be open also to persons interested in learning more concerning membership.
28. **Financial Appeals:**
(a) The Conference shall promote the offering for Houghton Academy on Academy Sunday which is the second Sunday in September. This shall be in addition to raising the educational budget in full. (Note: Houghton Academy receives 20 per cent of the total educational budget.)
(b) The Lenten season and Easter offering is hereby established as a time for a special offering for the local church.

(c) Any financial appeals to be made in the local churches by non-Wesleyan persons or groups shall require the approval of the Conference President and his Advisory Board. This does not apply to representatives of the Gideons and of the American Bible Society.

Daily Proceedings

FIRST DAY - TUESDAY AFTERNOON

The Rochester Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America convened at the call of the Chair for its 119th annual session at 2 P.M. on Tuesday, July 9, 1963. Rev. Gerald Wright, Sr., led the congregation in singing "The Solid Rock." Rev. Stanley W. Wright offered prayer.

The roll was called showing 33 elders and conference preachers present. The report of the Committee on Credentials was adopted and amended to seat alternates. The amended report was then adopted. Twenty-eight lay delegates responded to the roll call. (See Lay Delegates on page 13.)

The Rev. David A. Rees, Conference President, brought a devotional message from Isaiah 6:5-7. He exhorted us "to go down before God" at the opening of the conference session in view of the great issues at stake in the U.S.A. This was followed by prayer at the altar.

The President urged us to do business in good parliamentary procedure, to be courteous, and in the Spirit of Christian fellowship.

The Agenda on Orders of the Day was adopted. (See Report No. 1).

The lay delegate roll was called again for the purpose of getting acquainted.

The Report of the Nominating Committee was adopted with the understanding that where alternates were seated they will be substituted on committees for delegates whose place they are taking. (See Report No. 2).

The Bible Committee was called upon but had no report.

The Committee on Character reported and the Character of David K. Ross was passed. Brother Ross gave his pastoral report. He is taking work in the Middle Atlantic States Conference for the next conference year.

The report of the Secretary of the Men's Fellowship was deferred by permission.

Fifteen minutes were granted to discussion on the Conference News. Rev. Harold Kingdon, retiring editor, was given a rising vote of thanks. The matter was referred to the Editorial Board to bring in recommendations.

Rev. Leon Jelliff, Pension Plan Treasurer, reported. His report was adopted. (See Report No. 3).

We adjourned by vote. Rev. William Woughter closed with prayer.

SECOND DAY - WEDNESDAY MORNING

The Conference President called the conference session to order. Rev. Gerald Wright, Sr., led in singing "Tis So Sweet To Trust in Jesus." The Courtesy Committee presented Rev. Aubrey Carnell, President of the Australian Conference and pastor of the college church. Brother Carnell conducted devotions, giving as his life's verse, "My God shall supply all your needs according to his riches in Christ Jesus" (Phil. 4:19). Brother Carnell told how this verse has sustained him in the Australian work.

The roll was called, the minutes of the previous session read and approved.

The Sunday School Secretary, Rev. Edwin Macumber, awarded ribbons to the honor churches. He also read his report. The report was accepted

by vote. The Standards were amended to delete "Sunday morning service" and to insert "attendance at a Sunday service at our Camp Meeting." The amendment was carried. The Standard was adopted as amended. The financial report was referred to the Auditing Committee. (See Report No. 4).

The Committee on Religious Services reported. They presented a partial report. (See Report No. 5).

The Committee on Courtesy presented Dr. & Mrs. Stephen W. Paine from Houghton College. They both gave a testimony.

Committee on Courtesy presented the Rev. & Mrs. Charles Sarber and the Rev. & Mrs. William Sarber. They all gave words of testimony.

The Committee on Courtesy introduced Dr. B. H. Phaup, General Superintendent; Rev. Philip Birchall, President of Houghton Academy; Dr. Claude Ries, Professor at Houghton College. Each brought greetings.

Rev. Harold Kingdon, Educational Secretary, introduced Rev. Philip Birchall, President of Houghton Academy.

Brother Birchall reported on the academy building program, the academic advancements, registration and recruitment. He concluded with an exhortation for Wesleyan Methodist support of the Academy.

Dr. Stephen W. Paine, President of Houghton College, spoke from Col. 2:1-3, "In whom are hid all the treasures of wisdom and knowledge." He based his remarks on the word "knowledge." "Christ is the repository of all knowledge," Dr. Paine explained. He reported that in the last four years registration has increased 200. In that time plant value increased one million, and debt by half a million. Four Ph.D's are being added this year to the college faculty. He concluded by saying that "in Christ" all our needs are supplied.

Upon request, Dr. Paine explained the change made at the recent General Conference in the status of the Local Board of Trustees to a Regional Board of Trustees when colleges desire it.

Rev. Paul Lawrence, Director of Child Evangelism, gave an oral report, and it was accepted by vote.

Consent was given to rent a computer for the work of the Budget apportionment.

We adjourned by vote.

SECOND DAY - WEDNESDAY AFTERNOON

Conference was called to order by the Conference President. The Rev. Gerald Wright, Sr., led the conference in the singing of "My Faith Looks Up To Thee." Devotions were conducted by the Rev. Harold Kingdon.

Rev. Roger Bohall, Director of Truth for Youth, was introduced and brought a message concerning the alcoholic problem young Americans and the progress Truth For Youth is making to overcome alcoholism.

Order of The Day - Children's Camp Treasurer - Rev. James Bence, Treasure Children's Camp, gave the financial report which was referred to the Auditing Committee. (See Report No. 6).

Committee on Examination of Character reported. The Committee on Character reports the following characters have been examined and passed: David Ross, Bernard Draper, Charles Sarber, Mary Crandall, Gerald Jack, Carroll Brentlinger, Robert Wilhelm, Roger Rounds, George Kilpatrick, James E. Bence, John W. Crandall, Thomas Boghosian, William W. Turverey, Gerald Wright, Jr., Merlin Loomis, Edward Van Wicklin, George Pattington, Stanley Lawrence, Gerald F. MacKinnon, Adelbert Edwards, Edwin Macumber, Harold Kingdon, Paul Lawrence, Gerald Wright, Sr.

Order of The Day - Conference President's Report.

The Vice President, Rev. James E. Bence, took the Chair. The Annual Report and Official Acts of The Conference President, Dr. David A. Rees, were read and adopted by motion. The Financial Report was referred to the Auditing Committee. (See Report No. 7).

Order of The Day - The Report of the Tithing Secretary was given and adopted by vote. A short period of time was spent on discussing the way of ascertaining the true number of tithers & family altars in our church. A motion was made that this matter be referred to the new tithing secretary following the election of officers and that one or two other persons be appointed to study this matter.

A motion was made and adopted to amend the previous motion by changing the name of the "Tithing Secretary" to the "Tithing & Family Altar Secretary." The main motion was approved as amended.

Order of the Day - The Secretary read the Conference Treasurer's report in the absence of Mr. Howard Dietrich, Conf. Treasurer. The report was referred to the Auditing Committee. (See Report No. 8).

Order of The Day - The official acts of the Board of Trustees were read by the Secretary of the Board of Trustees, Rev. James E. Bence. This report was adopted.

The Committee on Editorial Policy of the conference made this report stating that the Conference News policy will remain as it is.

Rev. Bernard Roof & Rev. Wesley B. Nussey gave their pastoral reports. A motion was made & adopted that we adjourn.

ORDER OF THE DAY - 7:00 P.M., WEDNESDAY - MEMORIAL SERVICE

The Rev. Harley S. Hill and the Rev. Stanley Lawrence were in charge of the service conducted in memory of the late Rev. Leonard Hayes who served a charge in the Rochester Conference before retirement and who passed away July 30, 1962; in memory of the late Rev. G. Clarke LaCelle who served charges of the Conference from 1937 until near the end of his life, August 24, 1962; and the late Rev. George H. Sprague who commenced his missionary life in 1912 and continued until retirement. He died March 21, 1963, in Florida where he had lived in retirement for several years.

THIRD DAY - THURSDAY MORNING

The Chair called the Conference to order. Dr. Claude Ries, Chairman of the Division of Christian Education at Houghton College, lead devotions from II Chron. 2. Dr. Ries said that the favorite pastime of the average American is gripping; the favorite occupation of the Christian is praising. He emphasized the need to praise God and the power of Thanksgiving.

The roll was called and the minutes of the last session read and approved.

Miss Madge Pratt was seated as the second delegate from the Lyncourt Court in the place of Otto Nemitz.

Dr. B. H. Phaup, General Supt. was invited to preside, by vote, during the election of Conference President and Vice President.

Wesley B. Nussey resigned as ministerial member on the Local Board of Trustees of Houghton College. This was accepted by vote. David A. Rees was nominated for the Local Board of Trustees of Houghton College. Further nominations were: James E. Bence and Royal S. Woodhead.

William Woughter, Stanley Wright, S. Bond Harlan, Gerald F. Wright, Sr., were nominated as conference trustees. It was voted that the first ballot be a nominating ballot.

Time was extended for the completion of the election of officers.

First Ministerial Trustee - William R. Woughter, term to expire 1966.

Gerald H. Jack, Bernard A. Draper, Gerald F. Wright, Sr., Leon J.

Jelliff were nominated for second conference ministerial trustee.

Second Ministerial trustee - - Gerald F. Wright, Sr., term to expire 1966.

Nominations for lay trustee were Harold Woodard, and Cecil Burlington.

Lay Trustee - Harold Woodard, term to expire 1966.

The Committee on Religious Services reported. The report was adopted by vote. (See Report No. 5).

The meeting was adjourned by vote.

THIRD DAY - THURSDAY AFTERNOON

Rev. I. L. Conley led in the singing of "Jesus Saves." Rev. Charles Sarber conducted devotions reading from Revelation 3.

The Secretary of Tellers reported on the election of the Standing Committees and Boards. (See Conference Committees and Boards.)

Rev. Eugene Ramsey, Director of Negro Evangelism was introduced.

The Committee on Characters reported and the following were passed by vote of the conference: Royal Woodhead, Richard Brown, Edward VanWicklin, Orville Lawrence, I. Leslie Conley, Barry Barrigar, Wesley Nussey, Bernard Newbury, Robert Crosby, Bernard Roof, John Edling, Zelia Johnson, Chester Osgood, George Crook, Leon Jelliff, Harold Little, George Merz, Harley Hill, Bond Harlan.

The first reading of the report of the Committee on Itineracy and Orders was heard.

Rev. I. Leslie Conley was elected camp president by ballot. Mrs. Marjorie Haeks was nominated and then elected to be a director of Truth for Youth. William Woughter was elected as Sunday School secretary for 1963-64.

Order of The Day - The Director of Negro Evangelism read the story of the "Good Samaritan" from Luke 10, basing his comments on the parable, pointing out the need of Wesleyan Methodism going to the negro race.

Order of The Day - Official Denominational Representative

Dr. B. H. Phaup, General Superintendent, was introduced and presented the denominational address giving thanks for God's assistance

in the quadrennium just completed. He then gave in formation on the commissions, zones, and other changes made at the recent general conference. Dr. Phaup requested that a conference solicitor for subscriptions be elected at this conference.

Rev. Richard Brown gave the Ministerial Mutual Aid Plan report. The report was adopted and the financial section referred to the Auditing Committee. (See Report No. 10).

Order of The Day - The Rev. Carroll Brentlinger, Secretary of the Conference Policy Committee, reported. The report was adopted and it

was stated in the adoption that this report be mimeographed and sent to each pastor. (See Report No. 19). He gave Conference Missionary Fund report which was adopted. (See Report No. 11).

The Nominating Committee reported nominating Mrs. Charlotte Lamos to be the conference treasurer. The report was adopted by motion.

It was voted that three laymen be added to the Policy Committee and that these laymen be from the Board of Trustees.

It was moved and seconded that the following statement be sent to the General Superintendents of the Wesleyan Methodist Church: "In view of the fact that the General Conference meeting at Fairmont, Indiana, June 26, 1963, made no forthright statement on race relations, that the Conference Secretary and the Rev. S.W. Wright write a letter to the General Superintendents protesting this omission." The motion was tabled until after the report of the special committee reported.

By vote, the President was empowered to appoint a committee on race relations.

On the second ballot, Rev. Royal S. Woodhead was elected to the Local Board of Trustees, term to expire in 1965.

We adjourned by motion.

FOURTH DAY - FRIDAY MORNING

The Chairman called the Conference to order. The Rev. Gerald Wright, Sr., led in singing, "Blessed Assurance." Rev. Carroll Brentlinger conducted devotions from Ephesians 1. Brother Brentlinger spoke on the necessity of praising God. The roll was called. The minutes were read, corrected, and approved.

The President appointed the following on the committee on race relations: Carroll Brentlinger, Stanley W. Wright, Thomas Boghosian, and Harold Hutton. The Camp Treasurer gave his report which was referred to the Auditing Committee. (See Report No. 12).

Rev. I. L. Conley, Camp President, gave an oral report which was accepted. Thanks was offered to Rev. and Mrs. Conley, Mrs. Fern Hunt, Rev. Gerald MacKinnon, Harry Harris, Glenn Lennox, Rev. Gerald Wright, and Rev. Orville Lawrence for work done on the campground this past conference year. The new motel unit was named, "The Conley Motel" by vote of the conference.

The W.M.S. President, Mrs. Gladys Newbury, gave her report. A rising vote of thanks was extended to Mrs. Newbury for her work. The Conference Youth President, Gerald Wright, Jr., reported. A rising vote of thanks was given to him.

It was voted that we recommend that the names of the officers and the budget be included in the Conference Minutes and that the rest be in mimeograph form.

The Committee on Itinerary and Orders read its final report which was adopted. (See Report No. 9).

The Committee on Examination of Characters recommended that all characters not passed in previous action be passed. This report was carried. Bond Harlan, Harold Kingdon, Gerald Jack gave their pastoral reports. Rev. Harold Kingdon was appointed to replace Rev. Carroll Brentlinger at his request on the race relations committee.

Time for adjournment was called.

FOURTH DAY - FRIDAY AFTERNOON

The session was called to order by the Vice-President, Rev. J.E.

Bence. Rev. Edwin Macumber led us in singing, "My Jesus I Love Thee." Devotions were conducted by Rev. Wesley B. Nussey.

The Courtesy Committee introduced Rev. and Mrs. David Konz, the new pastor and his wife of the Buena Vista church. Each gave a testimony.

The Secretary of the Conference read the financial report of the Christian Life Book Shop. It was adopted by vote. (See Report No. 13).

The Statistical Committee read the summary of figures. The report was adopted. It was moved that our educational budget be paid in full by the conference treasurer. This was amended to include paying the deficit in the Pension Plan budget. The amendment was lost. The main motion prevailed. (See Report No. 20).

The Financial Committee reported. The report was adopted as read. (See Report No. 14).

It was moved that the local church pay the first \$300 on the moving expenses of pastors, and that the local church and the conference pay the balance sharing equally. The motion was amended to state that beyond the \$300 the church pay one-third, the conference pay one-third, and the incoming pastor pay one-third. The amendment was amended to add that the ceiling in which the conference would participate be \$500. After much discussion it was referred to the Finance Committee for recommendations.

The Finance Committee made the following recommendation as a memorial to the next General Conference:

"Whereas it is evident that some annual conferences which meet prior to the convening of the General Conference, do not adjust their budgets until the second year of the quadrennium to reflect changes in assessments made by the General Conference; and whereas, annual conferences meeting soon after the rise of General Conference are forced to bear a greater share of denominational expense; therefore, be it resolved that all annual conferences be required to establish their budgets on the basis of assessments made by the General Conference for the forthcoming quadrennium." The recommendation was adopted by conference vote.

Order of The Day - Reports from General Conference

Rev. James Bence reported on Memorials. Rev. Carroll Brentlinger reported on religious services. Mr. Richard Beach reported on the daily proceedings. Mr. Gary Swimley reported on impressions and elections. Rev. David Rees reported on the changed status of the Pension Plan.

A vote of thanks was offered to Rev. S. W. Wright and Rev. Leon Jelliff for their many years of service on the conference Board of Trustees. The President expressed the thanks of the conference body to our denominational representative, Dr. Phaup for his presence and assistance during the sessions of conference.

The following pastors reported: William Turverey, Gerald MacKinnon, Edward VanWicklin. The Committee on Race Realizations reported. The report was adopted. (See Report No. 15). The recommendations were adopted.

We adjourned until 8:30 A.M. Saturday. Mrs. Hawks closed with prayer.

SATURDAY MORNING - FIFTH DAY

The conference was called to order by the Secretary who conducted a brief devotional period. The roll was called and the minutes read and approved. Rev. I.L. Conley gave his pastoral report.

The Sunday School Board nominated Paul Lawrence to be Secretary of Child Evangelism. It was voted that Orville Lawrence be added to the Sunday School Board with term to expire in 1965.

The Auditing Committee reported. It was approved as read. (See Report No. 16). A motion was made and approved that all the reports that passed through the hands of the Auditing Committee be approved. They were as follows: Sunday School Secretary, Conference Treasurer, Treasurer of Children's Camp, Ministerial Mutual Aid Plan, Conference Missions Fund, Camp Treasurer.

The Finance Committee made the following report:

"After considering the various aspects of the problem at hand and realizing that we would be setting a complicated precedent, the Finance Committee consisting of five laymen and two elders, is of the opinion that it would be better to refer the problem of financing moving of pastors to the local church for solution."

The motion was amended to insert after "to the local church," the following, "and the Conference President and his Advisory Board."

A standing vote was called for. The amendment was passed. The motion as amended prevailed.

There was a "Resolution on the Recognition of God in our Public Institutions" which came from General Conference presented to the Conference for consideration. The resolution was adopted by vote. (See Report No. 17).

It was suggested that this report be placed in the hands of the pastors and that they in turn get them to the local newspapers, radios, and members of their congregations.

Dr. Rees reported on the home for the aged. It was moved that "After giving due consideration to the purchasing of the Grove Home in Canandaigua, N.Y., as a home for the aged, we recommend to the Rochester Conference trustees that we look with favor on the above said project, providing the other conferences are likewise in favor of purchasing and operating this home."

This was amended to add, "We further recommend that we proceed to purchase this home at a cost not to exceed \$250,000." The amendment was approved by vote. The motion as amended prevailed.

It was voted that the Location Committee be the committee from the Rochester Conference to serve as the committee on the home for the aged.

The Secretary nominated Rev. William Turverey as his assistant. The nomination was confirmed by vote. The President nominated Rev. James Bence and Howard Dietrich as the members of the Presidents Advisory Board. The nominations were confirmed by vote.

The Committee on Pastoral Relations reported. The report was corrected and approved. (See Report No. 18).

The following gave pastoral reports: Edwin Macumber, Paul Lawrence, Orville Lawrence, James Frase, Wallace Taylor, the pastor's report from Morris Church was read by Paul Lawrence.

REPORT NO. 4

REPORT OF THE SUNDAY SCHOOL SECRETARY

The Conference Sunday School Secretary and a delegate from the Sandy Creek Sunday School attended the Philadelphia Area Sunday School Convention last November.

A Saturday Convocation of the Sunday School superintendents was held at Waterloo last September. Twelve Superintendents and six pastors attended. Eighteen schools showed an increase in average attendance this year over the previous year. The average size school is 82.

A sound filmstrip, "More Than Sunday School" was secured for the 1963 Conference Sunday School Rally. In addition, Mrs. I. Leslie Conley directed a skit entitled, "10 Seconds...66."

AWARDS

The three Conference trophies are awarded as follows: to Baldwinsville with an increase of 19%, to Bentley Creek with an increase of 6%, to Chambers with an increase of 62%.

The pastor or other delegate of these schools will each receive transportation in one car to the National Sunday School Convention or other nearby convention. In addition to transportation as specified, each representative of trophy-winning schools will receive from the Conference Sunday School Fund \$10.00 toward other convention expense.

The 10% Ribbon of Merit is awarded to the following: Baldwinsville (19%) Chambers (62%) Herrickville (60%) Kirkville (30%) Pine Meadows (10%) Taylor (12%) Morris (18%) Redfield (10%).

THE AWARD STANDARD

The Sunday School Board recommends the following awards and standards for the coming year:

1. Each school in the Rochester Conference achieving a 10% gain in average attendance for the year will receive a Ribbon of Merit.
2. Schools competing for the Conference trophies shall be divided into three groups: up through 59, 60 through 99, 100 and up. The grouping of schools will be established according to the average attendance for the last conference year. A trophy will be awarded to the school in each group achieving the greatest percentage gain.
3. The Pastor or a key-layman of each trophy winning Sunday School may travel without charge in one car at the expense of the Conference Sunday School fund to the National Sunday School Convention or a comparable one selected by the Sunday School Board. In addition, each winner who takes advantage of this will be given \$10.00 from the same fund for other convention expense.
4. Each School shall have the privilege of omitting from its record of average attendance any four Sundays of the year. To be counted present, scholars must be in attendance at least half of the Sunday School session. Persons known to be in attendance at any Sunday service of our annual camp meeting may be considered present at their local Sunday School for that Sunday or Sundays.

REPORT NO. 7**CONFERENCE PRESIDENT'S REPORT**

To the members of the Rochester Conference assembled on Chambers Campground for the 119th Annual Session:

Cordial Christian greetings. Once again we meet to evaluate our past and make plans for the future. In the midst of great difficulty and uncertainty which confronts us as a nation; the inflationary spiral, the unemployment problem in some areas and the almost continual crises which never seem to subside for long, we know that God has been with us in a very gracious manner throughout the year for which we praise Him! This has been a year of encouragement, advancement, and growth. Our new churches have made good progress as you will note in the reports to be presented this evening, reports which we are sure will be both encouraging and inspiring. The fine leadership in these new areas is much appreciated and let us continue to hold them up in prayer. We were made to rejoice as we participated in the dedication of the fine new church at Pulaski in February and again as we were privileged to officially organize this, our newest church, with 19 members in March--another example of the effectiveness of the mother-church idea; we would express appreciation to the pastor for his vision and fine leadership and to the mother church, Sandy Creek, for their cooperation and sacrifice--as always we are certain God will reward them richly. The splendid new Grace Lee Memorial Wesleyan Church was dedicated at Chambers last September. This spring an excellent new parsonage was dedicated at Spencerport and a fine modern education building was dedicated at Gates; earlier in the year, a fine adequate education addition and study were dedicated at Berrytown; a new organ was dedicated at Waterloo and at Baldwinsville--also a new organ has just been presented to the Horseheads church by Mr. George Lee. It was a source of real satisfaction to participate in the note-burning service at the Corning church which marked the completion of their indebtedness--their progress in this area is very commendable. At present, construction on the new church building at Buena Vista is making progress toward completion; also the new church at Bentley Creek is nearing completion and a new parsonage is being built at Chambers. A little over a year ago, the new chapel-parsonage was opened at Kirkville and we are happy that so soon they are grappling with the problem of room; it may be that something by way of a church basement will need to get under way before winter to provide adequate space--these type of problems are always welcome ones.

Our hearts were made heavy this spring by the two fires which struck the homes of two of our ministers--one in Canandaigua and the other at Herrickville. However, we do earnestly praise and thank God that no one was injured. The home of Brother Harold Little was completely destroyed while the second floor and a good portion of the first floor of the parsonage at Canandaigua was either destroyed by fire or by water and smoke. We understand that Brother Little was able to rent another home there in Kerrickville until arrangements can be completed to move to Rome, New York where he works at the present time. The church at Canandaigua was able to secure temporary housing for the pastor and family and then the Board of Trustees immediately began to plan a complete modernization program and with the approval of the church, work was started at once. Recently completed, the pastor and family moved into an almost new parsonage which is much better arranged and with better facilities for modern living.

It is always a regret when it becomes necessary to close a church as was the case at Wellsboro this year. This decision was made after long and serious consideration by both the Conference officials and the members of the local church. The property has recently been sold and the money, after paying off the mortgage and caring for other legitimate obligations, will be placed in the Conference Missions Fund--this was done by action of the Conference Board of Trustees.

Our hearts were saddened by the passing of Brother Clarke LaCelle and Brother Leonard Hayes soon following the rise of Conference and Brother George Sprague this spring and a memorial service is being planned in their honor. These truly were men of God and worked diligently for the Master and the advancement of His cause; let us remember the loved ones in prayer and may the passing of these veterans of the Cross serve to inspire us to more effectively work and witness for our Saviour.

During the year several of our number were afflicted by illness or accident but we thank God for answers to prayer in restoring them to usual health and strength again and that they can be back in the service of the Master.

While we have not been very much given to evaluate the past years in the sense of statistics nor to make comparisons yet it seemed appropriate at this time to bring a bit of information to our attention. We were very much interested in the report of the Church Editor, Dr. George Failing, which he presented to the March meeting of the Board of Administration and may we quote in part, writing under the heading of Statistics, "While our denomination has not been characterized by fast growth, at least three considerations must be kept in mind. (1) There are some vigorously growing areas in Wesleyan Methodism. Conferences registering spectacular gains during the quadrennium are California, Florida, and Illinois. Significant advances also were made by the Wisconsin, Iowa and Rochester Conferences. These six conferences averaged 24.5% growth and gave to the denomination 1002 members. (2) On the other hand, two conferences lost over 100 members each during the quadrennium, and three of the declining conferences averaged an 11% loss. A total of ten conferences showed a net loss (in full members) of 494, while four others remained virtually unchanged in size. (3) The remaining eight conferences made small gains. Without the six vigorously growing conferences, our entire denomination may well have showed a loss rather than a modest gain for the quadrennium. "In 1951 the records of the Rochester Conference show that we had 1241 (full members) and in 1962 we have 1448 members--a gain of 207, while the last four years show a gain of 122, in 1959

we had a total membership of 1690 and in 1962 we had 1860, a gain of 170 in 3 years. Our average attendance in Sunday School has increased from 1970 to 3021 a gain of 1051 (about one third); six new pioneer works have been launched with a total membership (full members) 176; 10 new church buildings have been erected, 11 new parsonages and 16 new educational units (including new basements created for class rooms." This good record has been possible because of the consecrated ministry and the spirit of team work which has prevailed at all levels of our work. Let us continue to keep ever before us the real goal of winning souls for Christ and the advancement of His work rather than anything personal or minor. May we again quote Dr. Failing from the same report to the Board, "Toward the close of his life--and he died at 47--Orange Scott lamented that he had for so many years engaged in a running battle with church authorities. He admitted, with regret, that he relinquished a spiritually fruitful pastoral and evangelistic ministry to become a full time reformer. His mature views ought to speak with wisdom to us. Extreme and relentless criticism, directed toward the church or the world, proves spiritually unrewarding and often rebounds with harm upon us. Though John Wesley hesitated to speak on reform issues, he never abandoned evangelism to become a reformer. Charles G. Finney retained his stature and usefulness in evangelism only because he insisted that matters of reform never become the focal point of Christian concern nor crowd out the more urgent duty of "feeding the flock of God" and of seeking to save that which was lost"! Again in another paragraph "As I understand it, Wesleyan Methodism has committed itself to an evangelistic and spirit-annointed mission, refusing to be lured into the social concerns of the liberal ecumenical movement on the one hand, or to be identified with the caustic critics of the liberal movement on the other hand. We are conservative evangelistic, and committed to Scriptural holiness; from these positions we dare not move."

This has been another year filled with activities for the Lord in the work of the Conference and associated interests. We have preached over one hundred times, spoke at several prayer services, in Sunday School; assisted in several communion services; participated in 11 district ministerial and other gatherings; mailed out 10 circular letters and carried on a heavy correspondence. We have conducted two revivals and three long-week-end services, spoke in Holy Week services at Bellville, Canada. We have participated in over fifty personal conferences, participated in seven dedication services; met with the Conference Board of Trustees several times, met with the Bldg. and Locations Committee 5 times. We have spoken in every church on Sunday and conducted nearly thirty quarterly conferences and special business meetings. We have counselled freely with the Advisory Board, worked closely with the District Chairmen and the Policy Committee. Have worked with the Pulpit Supply Committees where changes were being anticipated, worked with the pastors and local boards and the various committees of the Conference.

We would like to take this opportunity to express sincere thanks and appreciation to our Vice-President, Rev. James E. Bence for his help and fine cooperation; to the Advisory Board for their help and counsel; to the Conference Treasurer, Brother Dietrich, and to Brother Nussey, Conference Secretary for their untiring labors and cooperation. To the Conference Board of Trustees, and the Policy Committee, the District Chairmen and all other committees of the Conference and to the pastors and laymen we are indeed grateful for their cooperation and fine teamwork. We would like to express to our neighbors, Brother and Sister Conley, our thanks and appreciation for their cooperation and help especially when we have been away from home in Conference work in looking after the mail etc.; to Mrs. Rees for her help in the office though

limited somewhat this year because of her physical condition as a result of the accident, for her understanding and sharing in the problems and her earnest partnership in prayer. Above all we wish to express our sincere thanks to God for His help, guidance, and answers to prayer and leadership throughout the year.

Let us launch out into the new year with determination, will and above all a faith in Him who is able to do exceedingly abundantly as He sees our needs in a special effort to advance the cause of Christ, the Church and our Conference.

REPORT NO. 10

THE ROCHESTER CONFERENCE MINISTERIAL MUTUAL AID PLAN

WHEREAS, The ministers and their families who serve the Rochester Conference are subject to accidents, sickness and disease, with income frequently inadequate to meet the financial burdens associated with such circumstances, and,

WHEREAS, The ordinary coverage for such purposes is exceedingly high and the returns are only realized in case of actual sickness or emergency,

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED,

That the Rochester Conference set up its own plan to be hereinafter known as The Rochester Conference Ministerial Mutual

Plan, and that it be interpreted and administered by the Conference Board of Trustees who shall elect a treasurer. The treasurer's duties include a report quarterly to the Board and annually to the Conference, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED,

That the Plan shall be financed and administered according to the following regulations:

1. A budget of fifty (50) cents per capita member of the Conference.
2. Each minister joining the Plan shall contribute a minimum of \$20.00 annually (unless this fee is paid by the local church) plus 1/2 of one per cent of his total income, including secular income, each year. These payments are to be based on the total income for the previous Conference fiscal year. It is suggested that wherever possible the local church assume the responsibility of the \$20.00 annual minimum fee. The \$20.00 minimum fee and the assessment of the 1/2 of one percent must be paid in full at the close of the fiscal year, May 31. A period of thirty (30) days grace will be recognized. To be eligible for benefits, all assessments for the previous fiscal year must be paid in full in keeping with the provisions stated above.
3. When one becomes a member of the Plan he will be continued as a member, unless he notifies the Treasurer in writing otherwise by August 1, subject to conditions in number 2.
4. Each minister will be eligible for benefits during the year providing he joins the Plan by August 1. New ministers coming into the Conference, to be eligible for benefits, must become members of the Plan by August 1 following their acceptance into the Conference, or within thirty (30) days following their coming into the Conference. In the event of addition to the family, within thirty (30) days in order for benefits to apply beyond the regular maternity benefits.
5. There will be a deduction of \$40.00 per year for each family receiving benefits.
6. Each benefit case shall be paid on the basis of 75% of the actual total hospital and doctor's expense associated with the hospital experience within the past twelve (12) months after \$40.00 is deducted. It is understood that this applies to any bill in excess of the amount covered by insurance of any kind. However, in case of other coverage, the \$40.00 deductible may be absorbed by such coverage. It is understood that courtesy allowances may not be considered as part of the total bill.
7. \$50.00 shall be paid at the time of the birth of each child.
8. No family shall receive more than a total of \$600.00 benefits in any one fiscal year.
9. Any pastor who does not join the Plan shall be entitled to 50% normal benefits (37 1/2% benefit after \$40.00 is deducted), or a maximum of \$300.00, provided his church shall have raised the Benefit Budget in full. Otherwise, he shall

be paid on a per cent basis of Benefit Budget raised. Beginning in 1954, the benefits shall be based on the per cent of Benefit Budget raised the previous year where he was pastor.

10. Ministers who are not pastors, but are members of the Plan, and pay the \$20.00 minimum annual fee plus 1/2 of one percent of the total income, shall be entitled to the 50% usual benefits (37 1/2% total expense after \$40.00 is deducted), of a maximum of \$300.00, with the usual benefits in full. Evangelists shall receive benefits on a per cent effective basis. A minister who has been an active pastor, but, for some reason does not have a pastorate, may be eligible for full benefits for one year, providing he pays the usual assessments as stated above.
11. In the case of a wife being an elder in the Conference and whose husband is not a member of the Conference, she shall be required to pay the \$20.00 annual minimum fee plus 1/2 of one percent of the husband's total annual income; Superannuated ministers shall be required to pay the usual 1/2 of one per cent of their annual income or a minimum annual fee of \$20.00.
12. Ministers who are neither pastors or members of the Plan shall not be entitled to benefits.
13. When a minister is serving outside the Conference, with the approval of the Conference, he may pay the \$20.00 annual minimum fee plus 1/2 of one percent of the total income and be entitled to 50% of the usual benefits (37 1/2% total expenses after \$40.00 is deducted), or a maximum of \$300.00.
14. All applications for membership shall be approved by the Conference Board of Trustees or its Executive Committee.

REPORT OF THE DIRECTOR OF THE ROCHESTER CONFERENCE MISSIONARY FUND

The Rochester Conference Missionary Fund has finally lifted from the firing pad. It is not yet in orbit, but all indications are "go". After a slow start and some faltering due to misunderstanding as to method, the pledge cards began to multiply in the files.

It is our hope that the vision of new churches in our Rochester Conference grips all our people and that they will give that little extra for this missionary endeavor without lessening their regular giving.

Now is our time--our opportunity. Let us move "Forward With God Into The New Quadrennium," remembering Dr. Sheets words as he addressed the General Conference, "Church extension is the key to world-wide evangelism."

REPORT NO. 14

REPORT OF THE FINANCE COMMITTEE

We recommend that the Woman's Missionary Society and the Wesleyan Youth be asked to pay for the printing of the number of pages in their portion of the Conference Minutes.

We recommend that where the pastor is a member of the Social Security Plan that the church give the pastor a bonus sufficient to cover his social security payment.

We recommend that for the conference year 1963-1964 the expenditures for the Conference Administrative work be approximately \$5700 as follows:

- A. The salary of the President shall be at the rate of \$80 per week.
- B. The Conference President shall be allowed Expense at the rate of seven cents per mile and miscellaneous expenses.
- C. The Conference is to assume the expenses of the parsonage utilities of the president.
- D. We recommend the Conference Treasurer to be authorized to give the Conference President a bonus sufficient to cover his social security assessment plus the \$20 minimum for Mutual Aid.
- E. That the Conference President receive \$300.00 for secretarial work.
- F. We recommend appropriations of:
 - (1) \$100.00 to Mrs. A.J. Shea
 - (2) \$ 50.00 to Mrs. Exa Rathbun

In order to finance the above program we recommend that the following be adopted:

1. The Conference Budget shall be \$8.00 per member of which 25¢ will go for the Chambers Camp expenses.
2. The Mutual Aid Budget shall be 60 cents per member.
3. When the Conference President shall hold revival meetings within the

bounds of the Conference, \$50.00 per week shall apply on budget. Any balance above this amount shall be a love offering to the President.

The Budget Apportionment is assigned on a per capita basis and is divided at the rate of \$23.10 per full member of the church, and is divided as follows:

World Missions, \$2.00

Australia, \$.25

Brainerd, \$.25

Church Extension and Evangelism, \$1.50

Pension Plan, \$3.50

Church Administrative Fund, \$1.70

REPORT NO. 17

RESOLUTION ON THE RECOGNITION OF GOD IN OUR PUBLIC INSTITUTIONS

WHEREAS the historic attitude of the United States Government toward the worship of God has been one of friendliness, as may be substantiated by any number of evidences, and

WHEREAS the American citizenry today, of whatever creed, is overwhelmingly characterized by faith in God and a recognition of our national and personal dependence upon Him, and

WHEREAS the intent of our founding fathers in forbidding the establishment of religion in the First and Fourteenth Amendments of our Constitution was manifestly not to remove all vestiges of our theistic faith from government-sponsored premises and activities, and

WHEREAS in recent years there has been a determined effort by an atheistic minority, having every personal privilege of disbelief, to secure judicial decisions purportedly based upon the Constitution to shield themselves from reminder of their minority status by the banishment of all theistic traces from publicly sponsored activities and premises, notably from our public schools which, because of compulsory attendance requirements, affect the lives of the vast majority of our children, thus undermining the historic foundation of our moral and ethical value system, and

WHEREAS successive actions of the Supreme Court, occasioned by the persistent appeals of atheists and agnostics, seem to indicate a growing inclination to ban from public life all worship of God, in however broad terms, and all recognition of Him,

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that this Wesleyan Methodist Church of America, assembled in its 31st quadrennial General Conference in Fairmount, Indiana, respectfully petitions our legislative leaders to discover for us and for the great God-fearing majority of our people some adequate lawful redress from the above described disability. We presume that such may require a Constitutional Amendment recognizing the sovereignty of almighty God for our nation (while granting freedom of conviction and propagation to those who choose not to recognize Him), reaffirming the doctrine that units of the Government are to avoid acts and policies

involving the support or establishment of organized religion, but declaring the principle that it is not deemed a contravention of this doctrine that the name of God be honored in state and civic life and that men be encouraged to read the Bible in its various versions and to worship God in accordance with the dictates of their own conscience, not excluding the incidental occurrence of such activities even from premises built or financed in whole or in part by public moneys, that this nation may indeed be a nation under God.

BE IT RESOLVED FURTHER that we urge all our people to circulate petitions after this tenor, these as well as individual communications to be sent to the national legislators from our various areas of residence, endeavoring thus to show the concern of God-fearing peoples in America that the public recognition of God, the creator of all men, be not destroyed from among us.

We recommend that a full-time president be employed by the Conference, whose duties shall be in accordance with those set forth in the Discipline, paragraphs 147-150.

1. We recommend that the conference missionary churches shall be under the special care of the Conference President and his Advisory Board, until such time as they shall have assumed the entire responsibility for their indebtedness, and that other missionary churches be under this care by mutual agreement of Church and Conference President. The Conference President shall be a member ex-officio of the boards of these churches and shall be informed of the meetings of these boards with the agenda for the same. He shall be sent a copy of the minutes of these churches as often as necessary to counsel and encourage the pastor and people.
2. He shall be required to study and survey possible fields for new work and report annually to the Board of Church Extension and Evangelism. This board shall have the power to authorize further investigation and institute a definite plan of action.
3. The Conference President shall superintend the more-established churches and shall endeavor to visit them once a year, preferably at a Sunday service, and shall present the needs of the conference and church missionary work. Each pastor shall adjust to the convenience of the President of the Conference so that his visit may be made with the minimum of time and travel.
4. He shall enforce the provisions of the Discipline, and uphold the standards of the church.
5. He shall seek to co-ordinate the evangelizing efforts of the various churches of the conference by suggesting to pastors a suited arrangement of meetings, and by counseling with reference to evangelists.
6. His conference evangelistic dates shall be established by the President and his Advisory Board.

7. The Conference President is to be permitted to take two evangelistic meetings per year outside the bounds of the conference.
8. He shall be a member ex-officio of the Finance Committee.

We FURTHER RECOMMEND that all appropriations cleared by the Pastoral Relations Committee be referred to the Finance Committee.

We FURTHER RECOMMEND that the Conference Mission offering from the Rochester church be given to the Spencerport Church for the current conference year.

REPORT NO. 19

REPORT OF THE POLICY COMMITTEE

A meeting of the Policy Committee was called to order June 17, 1963, at 10:30 A.M., in the Lyncourt W.M. Church, by the chairman, Dr. D.A. Rees.

The following action was taken:

1. A motion was passed that outgoing pastors continue to receive salary from and assume responsibility for the church which he is leaving through conference and camp Sundays. In the case of an outgoing pastor who will be leaving the conference, the above will not pertain unless he is present and on the charge or at the annual conference and camp the major portion of the weeks involved.
2. A general opinion of the committee was expressed that there is a real need to assist the missionaries' children at Houghton Academy. To do so, it is suggested that the Academy Offering in September of each year be earnestly promoted and 25% of this offering be designated for scholarships for missionaries' children.
3. A memorial to the Policy Committee was adopted which recommends:
 1. That the director of the Rochester Conference Missions Fund also be sub-treasurer for this fund.
 2. That all monies contributed to the R.C.M.F. be channeled through the Fund's director (unless an exception is made) who will:
 - a. Report quarterly to the Conference Treasurer all funds received.
 - b. Report annually, unless otherwise requested, to each local church treasurer the amount of money received from that church (whether

offerings or individual pledges) for the R.C.M.F. and also to the S.S. treasurer that received from the S.S. offerings.

- c. Receive reports in lieu of cash from the treasurers of the various societies of the local churches when money is given through these societies and designated for Rochester Conference Missions work.
 - d. Send a receipt to each contributor at the end of the fiscal year for income tax purposes.
- 4. A motion was passed that a pastor who consistently fails to make the required conference reports shall make a satisfactory explanation to the Pastoral Relations Committee for these failures before his conference appointment is given.
 - 5. A motion was passed that we recommend to the conference that a committee be appointed by the president to revise and revamp all conference report forms.
 - 6. A motion was passed that each church formulate a policy for the remuneration of guest speakers.
 - 7. A motion was passed that the pastor's vacation must be taken sometime between the rise of Conference and the convening of the next Conference unless a satisfactory arrangement otherwise is worked out with the church.
 - 8. A motion was passed that the president be authorized to form a committee to study the problem of the Syracuse churches.

1. Our first session of Conference shall convene at 9:30 Wednesday morning, the last Wednesday of June, except that quadrennially it shall convene the second Wednesday after General Conference convenes. The forenoon session shall be 9:30 to 11:30 A.M. The afternoon session, 1:30 to 4:00 P.M.
2. The first five seats shall comprise the bar of the Conference.
3. The Conference officials shall receive the following salaries:
President - \$20.00
Vice-President - \$10.00
Secretary - \$15.00
Treasurer - \$40.00
Y.M.W.B. Superintendent - \$20.00

- They shall receive their board and room during Conference.
4. Members of the Executive Committee shall receive traveling expenses equal to that voted by the Conference for Conference Officials.
 5. There shall be elected a Conference Statistician whose term of office shall not expire until the close of the Conference session following her election. She shall be the chairman of the Statistical Committee and shall be authorized to choose the members of said committee. She shall be seated within the bar of the Conference and shall be given board and room during Conference. The local treasurers shall send both of their statistical reports to the Conference treasurer by June 5th. The local Y.M.W.B. Superintendents shall send their reports to the Conference Y.M.W.B. Superintendents by June 5th.
 6. Each local society of the Conference shall close its financial and records for the year, May 31st.

REPORT OF WMS CONFERENCE PRESIDENT - 1962-63

It is with grateful thanks to our Heavenly Father, and sincere appreciation to each of the local societies and the five District Chairmen, that I bring this report. Certainly we are "Workers together", and this report would not be possible if it were not for the fine cooperation of each of you. For all that has been done, we raise our hearts to God in thankful praise.

Because of the late canceling of the previously arranged schedule to have Miss Dorothy Marville, missionary to Haiti, travel our conference last fall, plans were changed and God arranged things so that the Chapmans were able to meet with the majority of our people, in combined services the last week of August and early September.

We have scheduled the Rev. Glenn Barnett for this fall, Oct. 6-Nov. 3. Pray that God's will shall be done in the arranging for these services.

Spring Conventions were held at Wallace, Canandaigua, Lyncourt, Pulaski, and Chambers. We greatly appreciated the ministry of Rev. Warren Woolsey, Missionary to Africa, and Rev. and Mrs. William Davis, Missionaries to Honduras. The theme, "The Night Cometh" was carried out in all five conventions. The new feature - Children's Services with Mrs. Davis, added greatly to the convention program. The display of posters added color and interest. The total attendance was 870 with a total offering of \$499.46. We wish to again express thanks to the District Chairmen, host pastors and the local ladies from each entertaining church. Plans are to have Rev. and Mrs. Crosby, Missionaries to South America, for next Spring. The dates are April 26 - May 3, 1964.

Dr. B.H. Phaup is our speaker for the Public Missionary Service for Conference. We are privileged to have several others present with us this year to greet us at some time during the conference sessions. Rev. Aubrey Carnell, President of the Australian Conference; Miss Florence Pickert, Missionary to Jamaica; Bai Bankura, President of the African Conference; Rev. and Mrs. Harold Chapman and Rev. Warren Woolsey. Last year's offering and pledges for the Public Service totaled \$9,039.

I have met with the Conference Planning Committee, Conference Policy Committee and W.M.S. Executive Board during the year. I have sent out six form letters to all pastors and local presidents and have contributed to each issue of the Conference News, besides writing numerous personal letters for the promotion of missions. The W.M.S. delegates, Mrs. Florence Bence, Suzanne Gillmer and I attended General Conference, attending every session and each of us served on committees while there. Our Memorial to General Conference, that "steps necessary to change the Constitution and Discipline so that men might be full members of the society" was not approved by the body, but a broader resolution was approved, which we favored, to elect a Commission to serve with a Commission from the General body to study and formulate specific recommendations for further integrating the activities and organization of the Woman's Missionary Society with that of the general church. These are to be presented at the next quadrennial session. Mrs. Stark, Mrs. Felton and Mrs. McMillen were elected.

We were privileged to visit Wesleyan World Headquarters while there. It thrilled our hearts to see the beautiful new buildings and the integration of the work as a whole. We felt as we visited there that it was a completed project which we as Wesleyan Methodists could justly be proud of. How interesting, that "by fire, God worked". We would not have de-

sired the fire - but it seems not that God was in it.

We have promoted all fields of the missionary program. We also received for the White Gift, General Project \$211.64 and \$668.72 for the Merz on the Onondaga Reservation. Self Denial with \$160.72 for the new church in Florida and \$1542.99 for Conference Missions, which is a gain of \$230. American Bible Society - \$145.95 and the Field support for the Crosbys of \$2400.

Our societies show a gain of \$1225.84 in all funds raised, BUT a loss of 46 members. This might be accounted for, in that we lost two societies. Wellsboro, with the closing of the church there and East Forks, Elkland charge - they joined with the Millview society.

Twenty-eight societies made the HONOR ROLL, having earned at least 80% on our Efficiency Standard. Four made 100%, namely, Avon, Rome, Wallace and West Jasper. Three made 95%. They are Boylston, Buena Vista and Shady Grove.

It has been a joy to serve the Master in this capacity. We rest assured that our "labours are not in vain in the Lord".
