# Reports

#### STANDING RESOLUTIONS

#### 1. CONFERENCE

- 1. The Conference shall convene on Wednesday following the first Monday of August.
- 2. The Conference and Church fiscal year shall close June 30, and the Conference Treasurer shall close his books July 15.
- 3. There shall be a standing Committee of Ways and Means, composed of four ministers and three laymen, of which the Conference president and the Conference Treasurer shall be members ex-officio.
- 4. The Conference shall elect a standing Nominating Committee of eight, of which in addition to the eight, the Conference President shall be a member ex-officio, no two of the elected members being from the same church, and not more than two of the elected members from the same district. This Committee shall nominate the Standing Committees and the Committees of the temporary organization, provided that nominations may be made from the floor.
- 5. The Board of Church Extension and Evangelism shall serve as the Committee on Church and Parsonage Location and Building.
- 6. Priority on dormitory rooms shall be given to ministers and delegates attending Conference.
- 7. No divorced person who has remarried shall be ordained.

- 8. Officials shall assume office in the next meeting after election.
- 9. There shall be a Publications Committee of three, of which the President and the Secretary shall be members ex-officio.
- 10. The Conference President, after having exercised his perogative in the reception of ministers coming from other denominations shall immediately refer them to the Committee on Itineracy and Elders' Orders, which sha'l make a thorough investigation as to the ministry and life of such applicants and shall report their findings to the President after which appointments may be made.
- 11. For the purpose of operating the Camp Meeting, there shall be a committee of seven Wesleyans, four of whom shall be elected by the Conference, the President of the Conference being ex-officio one of the four and chairman of the Committee, two others being elders, and one layman; and three of whom shall be elected by the Board of Directors of the Camp Ground Association, the President of which Association shall be a member ex-officio, and one an elder and the other a layman. Each elected member shall serve for three years, provided that the Conference shall elect one the first year for one year and another for two years, thereby assuring the election of one member annually.
- 12. The Standing Resolutions shall be printed in the September Messenger.
- 13. The Conference Treasurers of the Missionary Society, of the Wesleyan Youth, and the YMWB shall send a report of the itemized receipts from each church to the Conference Treasurer immediately after their books close.
- 14. The Conference Treasurer and the Statistical Committee shall check the pastor's report before he reads it on the floor.
- 15. The Conference President shall urge each church to carry adequate insurance on its property.
- 16. Since television in its present state is so radically demoralizing in its range, be it resolved the Kentucky Conference register its disapproval of any one within the conference endorsing or owning a television set. Furthermore, be it resolved that the Kentucky Conference will not license preachers or workers, ordain elders, or station ministers who own or have a television set in their possession.
- 17. It is hereby resolved and ordered by the Kentucky Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America, in session assembled this 5th day of August, 1966; That a majority of the Trustees of said conference are hereby fully empowered to buy, sell, convey, mortgage or lease property for, or on behalf of said conference provided, however, that between the sessions of the Kentucky Conference, a majority of the Conference Board of Church Extension and Evangelism, as the designated Board of Managers of the said Kentucky Conference, shall signify their agreement therewith by a special resolution and order authorizing each and every transaction.
- 18. The Book of Discipline of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America shall constitute the policy under which the Kentucky Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America shall operate as a corporation.

#### II. CHURCH

- 19. No charge shall call a pastor or supply from other conferences or denominations as long as there are available ministers in the conference qualified for the work.
- 20. The vote on the pastor should be taken the first week of June, unless special permission is granted by the President and his advisory Board. Ballot for the vote should be prepared by the clerk. The results of the vote shall be reported at once to the President.
- 21. Church elections shall be held so that elected officials fill their offices on July 1, provided that the treasurer shall fill his office July 15.

#### III. MINISTRY

- 22. Let all pastors transfer their membership to their new appointment. Budget assessments by the Ways and Means Committee shall include such membership.
- 23. Any preacher borrowing a book from the Conference Library may hold it for only one month. There will be a flat rate of twenty-five cents for the month and five cents for each day over the month.
- 24. Pastors shall read to their congregations the General Rules, Discipline, Article III, paragraphs 34-40; Special Directions, Discipline, Section IV, paragraphs 82-88, 100; The Standing Resolutions; the report of the Committee on Moral Reform; and shall urge them to familiarize themselves with the Wesleyan Methodist Discipline.
- 25. In this age when immodesty and worldliness are subtly creeping into the Holiness Movement, let every minister earnestly contend for and faithful y preach the Word of God without fear or favor. Let us refuse to compromise with the ungodly element which is robbing the church of her glory and preachers of the divine anointing.
- 26. All ministers not attending both conference and camp without a written excuse from the Conference President and his Advisory Board shall be placed under discipline and be required to appear before the Character Committee of the next annual conference for clearing. Further, no pastor shall be permitted to accept revival meetings or camp meetings if they conflict with conference or camp meetings.
- 27. Our own evangelists shall not conduct revivals or camp meetings in our Wes'eyan Methodist churches within the bounds of our conference at the time of our Youth Camp. Annual Conference, Camp Meeting, or Ministerial Institute.
- 28. In order to assist the Statistical Committee in its work, be it resolved that we comply with Section VI, Paragraph 228 of the Discipline. All reports shall be in no later than July 15 to the Conference Treasurer and then the Conference Treasurer shall notify the President of all such delinquent reports not in by July 20. We hereby instruct the Statistical Committee to indicate with an asterisk at the proper place in the minutes showing that such reports do not appear because they were too late. The Statistical Committee shall set a date for the beginning of its work before conference.

# Report No. 1

#### PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Members of the Conference and Friends:

Greetings to the 44th session of the Kentucky Conference.

We gather as co-workers with the infinite God. We honor the blessed Trinity — Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. We invoke the divine blessing of God for wisdom, light, inspiration, strength, and anointing. Without Him we can do nothing. With Him we can do all things necessary.

This is the day of the Spirit, the day of salvation and grace, but also the day of Satanic opposition, the day of organized opposition to the family, society, the nation, and the church and Christ, Mater alism, secularism, and a naturalistic philosophy are destroying the foundations of the home, society, the nation, and the church, Biblical authority is ignored. Decline is superseded by mora and spiritual bankruptcy, apostasy, apathy. Socialism breeds communism, Confusion and frustration beset the church and the world. Division separates the nations, the races, the social structure, political leaders, and the church. Independency and insubordination are unwittingly worshipped as human rights, the spawn of Satan, Crime mounts daily. Law enforcement agencies fail to curb it. Immorality and homosexuality fast become the goddess of lust on the throne. High government circles reek with this stench. Even some educators and physicians, seek relaxation of public castigation and legal approval of these lustful practices. The trinity of illegitimacy, abortion, and divorce multiply. Will the wrath of God soon blot out America as Sodom and Gomorrah were cast down to hell? Forgetting the corruption of the human heart, prominent leaders of church and state espouse ecumenicity - one word, one church, one economic system, one center of control. As in the days when the Roman Empire unknowlingly prepared the way for Christ's entrance into the world, so in this day, this Satanic system prepares the way of the antichrist, But the Christ of Calvary's crimson cross will soon overthrow the arch fiend and sit upon the judgment throne

Wes'eyan Methodists and Kentucky Conference may still have revival by united intercession, God's power released by a powerful revival is the answer to the evils of the day. Calloused knees, rivers of tears, searching and living in the Scriptures, anointed proclamation of the authorative Word, daily visitation from house to house, personal expendability for the lost and the cause of Christ, laying up treasures in heaven, and seeking first H s will can and will bring resu ts. Systematic daily living, personal piety, the family altar, and diligence in church conference business will bring fruitful services and united victory.

Many towns over the conference await the coming of a Wesleyan church, among them Lebanon, Kentucky, being one where the conference has a valuable lot. A greater pioneer thrust this year on our knees and a mighty effort to reduce conference pioneer obligations by generous faith promises and payments will open the way to advance into a new field as God provides a pioneer man.

The conference and churches will be voting on merger with the Pilgrim Holiness Church. Let us vote prayerfully seeking God's will. Then let us consistently abide by the vote taken throughout the denomination whether or not all of us are pleased.

Gains and losses over the conference will be apparent from the treasurer's report and that of the Statistical Committee. Debts have been consistently reduced on new buildings and on the campground. Repairs and improvements have been made on several churches and parsonages. The Sale Avenue Church in Louisville, has wisely purchased a house beside the church which is now used for church office and Sunday school rooms. The West Frankfort Church in Illino's, has also purchased a good small parsonage at a bargain price of only \$2000, improved the church property, and tore down the old parsonage where a parking lot will be made beside the church. Glasgow, Kentucky Church, has made two good Sunday school rooms in the church and purchased new pews. #### August 2, 1966

Motion carried to authorize Washington, Indiana Wesleyan Methodist Church to purchase the property West of, and adjoining the church property for the sum of \$1200.00, provided the property shall be deeded to the trustees of the Kentucky Conference and that the local church sign notes for the securing of the money for said purchase.

### Recommendations By The Church Extension Board

# I. Calendar System

- 1. A pioneer calendar shall be provided by the Church Extension Board for a Sunday in September chosen as Pioneer Sunday, at which time pledges shall be taken in each church to be paid in 10 monthly payments.
- 2. A pioneer secretary appointed by each local church shall announce or have announced on the Second Sunday of each month the pledge collection on the Third Sunday, and shall collect and tabulate opposite each pledge the monthly contributions, then have the church treasurer remit the total collected each month to the Conference Treasurer.
- 3. Pioneer works, and, or new, works may be granted permission by the Church Extension Board to use their money locally as may be needed.
- 4. Previous to Pioneer Sunday there shall be a rally of the pastors in each district presided over by the Conference President or another designated by the Church Extension Board, when goals for each church may be suggested.
- 5. Fields and Goals: (1) Money shall be saved for centers of population to be invested in property or to employ men of pioneer ability (2) We urge a goal of \$10,000 this year toward reducing indebtedness.

#### II. Sunday School

The first Sunday of the month Sunday School Offering in full shall be remitted by each Sunday School Treasurer for much needed pioneer work.

#### III. Revolving Fund

This fund shall be increased by gifts and at the discretion of the

Church Extension Board from regular pioneer funds not to exceed \$500 per year.

#### 1V. Mother Church

We urge the larger churches to co-operate with the Church Extension Board in starting a prayer meeting or a Sunday School in a new section as well as in tithing their church tithes and offerings for mothering a new work under the Church Extension Board.

#### V. United Effort

We suggest and urge co-operation of the Conference W.M.S. and the Youth Executive Council with the Church Extension Board to help our pioneer works as may be needed.

## VI. Deeds and Legal Documents

- 1. That the Conference President be custodian of deeds and conference records to be kept in a safe.
- 2. That the Conference President shall collect all deeds or records of deeds for filing, at the time of his visitation in Quarterly Conferences.
- 3. The Board will recommend no authorization or the signatures of the Conference Trustees on notes or mortages for churches until there is a joint deed made to the local and conference trustees.
- 4. All churches involved in any major indebtedness shall be under the supervision of the Church Extension Board.

#### WESLEYAN YOUTH PRESIDENT'S REPORT

To the members of the Kentucky Conference, greetings:

It has been a privilege to represent the Wesleyan Youth another year. This has been a year packed with many varied and interesting experiences This is generally the way it is, working with young people, as they can make life quite exciting.

The first big event of the conference year was the Reserve Officers Training Convention, held September 24 and 25 in Louisville. Three members of the Wesleyan Youth Council, Robert McIntyre, Clifton Wood and Walter Jeffries were guest speakers and workshop leaders. We felt that this was very helpful to the overall program of our conference.

Much planning and work went into the 2nd International Wesleyan Youth Convention. As host chairman, we endeavored to extend a cordial welcome to Wesleyan Youth from far and near. This convention made a great impact on the city of Louisville and went beyond expectation. The "Welcome Mat" is extended for the 3rd such Convention.

Wesleyan Youth Week has found its place in the schedule of many of our churches. We had some remarkable results this year. Yet, less than half of our churches observed Youth Week. This is sad and disappointing.

Again, I was received royally in each district as I toured the conference in the interest of Wesleyan Youth. The pledges and offering exceeded that of previous years. But I am worried. The lack of concern and cooperation on the part of some pastors and young people causes me to wonder about our interest in youth. In some districts, only a few young people were present with mostly older people taking part; the service lacking a real vital spirit of enthusiasm to interest our youth. Some pastors not attending during the year, caused our leaders to be discouraged over the lack of cooperation. May a revival of cooperation sweep our conference.

One of the highlights of the year was the annual youth camp. Although we did not break the attendance record, we did feel that it was a great spiritual uplift to our young people as many found help at the altar. In the missionary service, a number of our young people dedicated their life to full-time Christian service. To me, this was the climax of the camp.

In looking over our statistical report, we have 20 locals; 237 active members; 58 associate members; 125 subscriptions to the Wesleyan Youth; total receipts for the year was \$3080.20.

Statistics do not tell the whole story, I am grateful to God to still be a part of the Wesleyan Youth of the Kentucky Conference, But I am worried. I am worried about the spiritual condition of the average young person growing up in our churches. As I traveled the conference and worked with our young people at youth camp, I see so many of our young people who look like the world, talk like the world, sing like the world and behave like the spirit of the world. It seems to me that the spirit

of the world has so penetrated our churches that the spirit of the church is no longer able to influence the world. We have lost our distinctiveness as holiness people; our militancy and dedication for the cause of Christ Our ranks are being left vacant because our youth have not been challenged to the need of full-time Christian service.

As I close my 19th year as president of Wesleyan Youth, I do so with great concern. May God give us a renewed vision of scores of young people who are lost without the Saviour. If won to the Lord, they could fill our pulpits, relieve tired and worn missionaries; and replenish the vacancies in our churches. This is our only hope for our churches and the conference

#### INSURANCE COMMITTEE

# We Recommend:

- 1. That the Conference continue the Blue Cross-Blue Shield Hospitalization Plan for pastors at the rate of \$15.50 per month, and that each church pay at least one half of their premium.
- 2. That the Conference continue life insurance with the Presbyterian Minister's Fund for all active ministers and also when they become inactive, with the same coverage as heretofore (age 45 \$3,000, age 46-55, \$2,000, over 56, \$1,000) and that each participant pay a flat rate of \$14.00 per year, and that the Conference budget assessment of 50 cents per member provide the balance of the premium, provided that no one 65 years of age or over be admitted.
- 3. We recommend Campers Insurance on a voluntary basis for ministers and delegates for conference and camp.
- 4. We recommend that premiums on Blue Cross-Blue Shield be paid on or before the 20th of each month. The premium to be sent to the Conference Insurance Treasurer.
- 5. We recommend that the premium on the Presbyterian Minister's Fund Life Insurance be paid on or before November 1 of each year. The premiums to be paid to the Conference Insurance Treasurer.

This means that among the forty-one reporting Sunday Schools, the conference had a loss of eighty-eight scholars.

This over all loss is disturbing. Many would say that this is a sign of the falling away, but I trust that we are not allowing the devil to rock us to sleep in this perilous age. "Let us not be weary in well doing, for in due season we shall reap, if we faint not," Gal. 6:9

The Sunday School Board recommends that final Sunday School attendance be determined before the last ten minutes of the Sunday School class period, and that no one be counted coming after that time.

- 5. We recommend that those taking examinations in the course of study, shall take said examinations in the presence of an elder or a Local Preacher or a Conference Preacher and the examinations be sealed and sent by him to the proper member of the committee.

# Report No. 15

#### COMMITTEE ON WAYS AND MEANS

# Item I. Budget

- 1. We recommend that the Conference pay General Budget Assessments as foliows: General Wesleyan Youth \$2,00 per active member of W.Y.; World Missions \$2.00 per full member; Australia \$.25; Church Extension and Evangelism \$1.50; Superannuate Pension Plan \$7.00; Church Administrative Fund \$2.15; General Conference Expense and Entertainment \$.50; Hephzibah \$.50; Sunday School \$.25 per member based on the number in main school; Educational Budget \$4.00; Wesleyan Seminary \$.50.
- 2. We recommend our churches pay Conference Budget as follows. Conference Work Fund \$1.00; Conference Entertainment \$1.00; Camp Meeting Fund \$1.00; Conference Wesleyan Youth \$.50 per full member; Conference Parsonage Fund \$.50; Conference Sunday School \$.05 per member in main school; Conference President's Salary \$1.00 and an amount equal to 10% of the Pastor's cash salary; Minister's Group Insurance Fund \$.50 per member; Ministerial Institute \$.10 per full member; and that the Sunday School offering for the first Sunday of each month be sent to the Conference Treasurer for Pioneer Evangelism.

All budget money shall be sent in monthly in even dollars.

3. We recommend a study of the income of the Churches of the Conference with the idea of making a percentage assessment to the churches.

#### Item II. Pastor

- 1. Each Pastor shall encourage the storehouse plan of tithing.
- 2. All Pastors shall encourage membership in the Card Cail Plan.
- 3. The Pastoral year shall end with the last Sunday of Camp and the Church he is serving shall pay his salary until that time.
- 4. All Churches shall provide their Pastors suitable living quarters, all their utilities, fill their obligations by monthly donations and definitely

arrange with the Pastor the number of Revivals he is allowed to conduct. The Pastor shall receive two weeks vacation with pay exclusive of Conference and Camp Sunday.

5. Each Pastors moving bill shall be paid by the contracting Church.

#### Item III. Conference President

- 1. The Conference President shall be paid \$90.00 per week, one half his social security, Hospitalization Insurance, house rent, utilities, desk expense, and secretarial help, traveling at 8c per mile in connection with Conference work and he shall receive two weeks vacation with pay.
- 2. The Conference President shall meet with the Board of Stewards and encourage the church to provide adequate support for their Pastor.
- 3. Each church shall hold four quarterly meetings annually, one to be held by the Conference President at his convenience and three to be arranged by the Pastor.
- 4. The Conference President shall give as much time as possible to supervising the pioneer works and the smaller churches.
- 5. The Conference President's tithe is to be deducted for the Parsonage Fund

#### Item IV. Miscellaneous

- 1. The Conference Treasurer and the Conference Secretary shall receive an honorarium of \$100.00 each.
- 2. All superannuated Ministers and their wives of our Conference shall be entertained free during Camp.
- 3. We recommend that the Board of Church Extension be empowered between the sessions of the Conference to make available for present use any surplus in any funds.
- 4. We recommend that the Kentucky Conference Ministerial Student Aid Fund at Marion College be placed under the Conference Church Extension Board with recommendations from the donors.
  - 5. We recommend that the minutes be sold for \$1.00 per copy.
- 6. We recommend to the Annual Conference and the Wesleyan Camp Meeting Association the erecting of a Headquarters Building of four rooms on the Campground for office use.
- 7. We recommend for use by treasurers in the local churches a mimeographed envelope for reporting funds sent to the Conference Treasurer, prepared by the Conference Treasurer at Work Funds Expense. #### COMMITTEE ON MORAL REFORM

We your committee on moral reform, submit to this conference and the churches of this conference the following resolutions:

- 1. Since our homes are the tributaries which feed the stream of our national and religious life, we call upon our ministers to challenge our ent're church congregations to make our homes Christian.
- 2. Inasmuch as we are living in a world of unrest, of contention, and of strife, which is the result of the spirit of the anti-Christ, we ask our people to seek the peace of unity of faith once delivered to the saints, to seek understanding in the midst of misunderstanding, to cover our brothers fau ts with the grace of charity and by fellowship to those who may be weaker in the faith.
- 3. We call our people to return to a reverence, for the Lord's Day and stress the necessity of a faithfulness to all services conducted on that day. We urge our families to worship as a family unit and adopt the family pew and sit together. We intreat our people to abstrain from social and secular interest and indulgences that take away the sacredness of the Lord's day.
- 4. Believing in the integrity and devotion of our God appointed church leaders in a l levels of administration, we urge our people to support them by their prayers and cooperation in furthering the work of the Lord through the channels of the Wesleyan Methodist Church. We feel that the leaders should, in return, be sympathetic and have a common understanding toward the conference's beliefs and standard. Hebrews 13:17
- 5. We further urge that our people exercise their disapproval of obscene literature, immodest attire, encouraging women wearing three quarter length sleeves, their dress below the knee wearing their hair according to I Cor. 11:15, And that we exercise our disapproval of tobacco, intoxicating beverages, degrading radio and television programs, also the discouraging of television as a whole because of the general tendency to unwholesome influence.
- 6. Be it resolved that the pastors exhort our people to fulfill their responsibility as citizens in registering their vote in all areas including local, state, and national levels, and also encourage praying for our public officials. I Tim. 2:1-3
- 7. In the midst of the racial tension we discourage our people from participating in or encouraging any pleasure groups that produce unchristian attitudes. We exhort our people to treat all races (Negro-Indian-

Asiatic) with respect and dignity since God has made of one blood all people. Acts 17:26

- 8. We wish to reaffirm our historical beliefs and standards against the putting on of gold and costly apparel, which includes the engagement and wedding ring. I Tim. 2:9-10
- 9. We also disapprove immodest attire, this pertaining to the wearing of shorts, slacks, etc. And parents to exercise their Parental authority over their household to this end. Titus 2:1-8
- 10. We strongly oppose any fad which leads to effeminate behavior, which obliterates the line between the sexes, and which stimulates a tendency toward homosexuality in either sex.

To the forty-fourth Annual Session of the Woman's Missionary Society, this year of 1966: Greetings in the name of Jesus,

We thank the Lord for each of you and the efforts you have put forth. I am reminded of Mrs. Miller's article about "Good Fellowship" in the April Missionary Magazine. She said, "Much has been written about the importance and responsibilities of leadership but very little is heard about the qualities and obligations of "fellowship." And yet, without good followers the most brilliant of leaders would be helpless. Even those who are designated as leaders are at times in the ranks of followers and so the subject should be of general interest.

Good "fellowship" she says, is not blind accompanying, or thoughtless acquiescence. Nor is it habitual disagreement. Since 1954 when the W.M.S. offerings reached over \$5,000 we have steadily increased our giving until it was doubled in 1961. This year it reached an all time high of \$13,190.18. Support for Mrs. Allice Calhoun and Miss Ruth Marilyn Houser has been added to that for Marcia Earl and the Peltons making a total of \$7,200 pledged for missionary support. Reverend Ortlip's tour of the conference will be delayed a year, the situation in Haiti being such that the Ortlip's furlough is delayed. Reverend Lytle, Deputation Secretary, will help us have various missionaries as they are available.

We thank the Lord for hea'th, for protection and a wealth of Christian pleasure as we have fellowship in your homes and churches. May God bless you.

#### Report No. 2

#### WESLEYAN YOUTH PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Dear Youth of the Kentucky Conference:

It has been a pleasure to represent you again this year. This has been a year packed with many varied and interesting experiences. This is generally the way it is in working with young people, as there is never a dull moment.

The first big event of the conference year was the Reserve Officers Training Convention, held September 24 and 25 in Louisville. Three members of the Wesleyan Youth Council, Robert McIntyre, Clifton Wood and Walter Jeffries were guest speakers and workshop leaders. We felt that this was very helpful to the overall program of our conference.

Much planning and work went into the 2nd International Wesleyan Youth Convention. As host chairman, we endeavored to extend a cordial welcome to Wes'eyan Youth from Far and near. This convention made a great impact on the city of Louisville and went beyond all expectation. The "Welcome Mat," is extended for the 3rd such Convention.

Wesleyan Youth Week has found its place in the schedule of many of our churches. We had some remarkable results this year. Yet, less than half of our churches observed Youth Week. This is sad and disappointing.

Again, I was received royally in each district as I toured the conference 84.

in the interest of Wesleyan Youth. The pledges and offerings exceeded that of previous years, But I am worried. The lack of concern and cooperation on the part of some pastors and young people causes me to wonder about our interest in youth. In some districts, only a few young people were present with mostly elder people taking part; the service lacking a real vital spirit of enthusiasm to INTEREST our youth. Some pastors not attending during the year, caused our leaders to be discouraged over the lack of cooperation. May a revival of cooperation sweep our conference.

One of the highlights of the year was the annual youth camp. Although we did not break the attendance record, we did feel that it was a great spiritual uplift to our young people as many found help at the altar. In the missionary service, a number of our young people dedicated their life to full-time Christian service. To me, this was the climax of the camp.

In looking over our statistical report, we have 20 locals; 237 active members; 58 associate members; and 125 subscriptions to the **Wesleyan Youth**; total receipts for the year was \$3080.20.

Statistics do not tell the whole story. I am grateful to God to still be a part of the Wesleyan Youth of the Kenucky Conference. But I am worried. I am worried about the spiritual condition of the average young person growing up in our churches. As I traveled the conference and worked with our young people at youth camp, I see so many of our young people who look like the world, talk like the world, sing like the world and behave like the spirit of the world.

It seems to me that spirit of the world has so penetrated our churches that the spirit of the church is no longer able to influence the world. We have lessened our distinctiveness as holiness people; our militancy and dedication for the cause of Christ. Our ranks are being left vacant because our youth have not been challenged to the need of full time Christian service.

As I close my 19th year as president of Wesleyan Youth, I do so with great concern. May God give us a renewed vision of scores of young people who are lost without the Saviour. If won they could fill our pulpits, relieved torn and worn missionaries; and replenish the vacancies in our churches. This is our only hope for our churches and the conference.

#### II. District

- a. We recommend that the Districts be set up the same as the Conference Board of Extension and Evangelism.
- b. We recommend that each District have at least four rallies during the year and that we use our Young People in a variety of programs for the rallies rather than always securing an outside speaker.

#### III. Local

a. We recommend that the local treasurer's books shall close June 30.

#### IV. Finances

a. We recommend that the local raise the amount of two do'lars (\$2.00) per active member for the General W.Y. Program, and that those churches not having an organized local take an offering for the General Youth Program,
