- 4. The Conference Sunday shall be the closing Sunday of Conference year, and the out-going pastor shall be paid his salary for that Sunday by the charge he is leaving.
- 5. At the beginning of the Conference session the president shall appoint a Nominating Committee of not less than three members, two Elders and one Layman to bring to the Conference a slate of Nominations for Committees, etc., for the Conference Temporary Organization. Delegates Credentials shall be mailed to the Secretary not later than ten days before the convening of Conference. The Secretary shall be Chairman of the Credentials Committee and shall compile the Roll of Delegates from the regularly filled Credentials received.
- 6. No person shall be received into membership in Allegheny Conference until he shall have properly filled out an application blank, which application together with recommendations of his references must pass the approval of the President and his Advisory Board. Exceptions to this rule may be made by the President and his Advisory Board when they deem best.
- 7. The pastor of any church in the Conference shall be free to hold at least one revival meeting during the year, wherever he sees fit, and it is recommended that his salary be paid to him while he is absent.
- 8. Each pastor shall send a monthly report on the blank provided, to the Conference President showing the progress and the state of the work under his care.
- 9. Each church may elect a Nominating Committee whose duty it shall be to nominate candidates for church officers for presentation to the church at the time of the annual election of officers. Such nominations shall not exclude other nominations at the time of the business meeting.
- 10. Churches having business with the Conference Board of Trustees requiring a visit of that body to their church, shall be responsible for the expense attached to such calls, unless released by the Board.

- 11. Inasmuch as trial sermons are hardly fair to the church or candidate and since the practice of having trial sermons is contrary to the usual manner of locating preachers, we recommend that no preacher shall accept any such invitations, if given. Exceptions to this rule may be granted by the Conference President upon request of any church.
- 12. Since considerable expense of transferring automobile title and license attends the moving of a pastor from one state to another, we recommend that where possible the calling church bear this expense.
- 13. We recommend that all districts emphasize Sunday School activity, and that Conventions be arranged for in conjunction with the visitation of the Conference Sunday School Secretary, who shall visit one Convention of each District during the year, at Convention expense.
- 14. We recommend that no one be elected to Elders Orders who does not have an abiding sense of divine call to give himself wholly to the function and ministry of an Elder in the WESLEYAN METHODIST CHURCH, and that no one shall be ordained to this office and work who is not applying himself wholly to this one thing in cares and studies, and clearly determining by God's grace to give himself wholly to this holy ministry, if possible, long before the appointed day of ordination, and manifesting such a determination of faithful Christian service to the church or congregation whom he was called to serve during his years of preparation, so that as much as lieth in him, he has and will apply himself wholly to the work of the ministry, except in all cases of absolute necessity of such diversions to a legitimate avocation for livelihood which neither jeopardizes the Lord's work nor blames the ministry.
- 15. We recommend that each church equip its parsonage with the necessary heating and cooking equipment, because of the variation of requirements in this equipment for the individual parsonage.
- 16. We recommend that in election of local church Advisory Committee each church permit the pastor to nominate the members of this committee.
- 17. The Conference Secretary, as Chairman, with the Conference President shall be a Standing Committee on Publications, whose duty it shall be to examine all matters pertaining to Conference printing and publications, and let all contracts for same.
- 18. All churches shall have a systematic means of keeping records, as required by Discipline, Paragraph No. 74, The "Ideal Church Record" published by the Bethel Publishing Company, Elkhart, Indiana, is a suggested form.
- 19. Local church treasurer's books shall close April 30, thus making the Conference fiscal year from May 1, to April 30. All funds received after this date shall be counted in the following year Funds will be credited on Sub-Treasurer's books if received by May 5.

To meet the requirements of Paragraph 164 of the Discipline regarding revision of the Roll of membership, April 30, may be considered the close of the Conference year for Statistical purpose.

20. Minister's Pocket Credentials shall be issued to Elders and annually to Conference Preachers who are eligible.

- 21. Since the use of the wedding ring is not in accord with the standards of our church, we therefore, as a Conference, disapprove of our ministers performing or taking part in the ring ceremony.
- 22. The pastoral vote shall be taken on each charge on the third Sunday in April. When it is the desire of the church to vote on a week night, it will be done sometime during the week previous to the designated Sunday. Permission to vote on another Sunday may be obtained from the President and the Advisory Board.
- 23. Each church shall allow their pastor a reasonable vacation with pay to be taken at his convenience. Two weeks is suggested.
- 24. In the judgment of the Allegheny Conference, viewing television programs of the type commonly offered in response to the public clamor for entertainment is an impediment to the development of holy character. We deplore the current television programs' evil effect upon the moral and spiritual life of the Nation. The principles of Wesleyan Methodism—being an epitome of the Christian religion—obligate Wesleyan Methodists to an unblameable life which constantly rebukes every form of evil and zealously advocates holiness of heart and life. Therefore, we most earnestly request our ministers and members, as those who must give account unto God in the Day of Judgment for anything which tends to influence toward evil, to refrain from the purchase of television sets and from viewing such programs for Jesus' sake.

Inasmuch as ministers are examples and patterns to the flock of Christ, the Allegheny Conference expects each of its ministers to set a wholesome example and to be a godly pattern in this respect, so that those to whom he ministers will follow his example and avoid exposure to this which menaces vital godliness.

REPORT NO. 1

THE CONFERENCE PRESIDENT

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ:

To the members of the Allegheny Annual Conference here assembled for its 116th Annual Session, we greet you in the Name of Him whose work engages our attention at this time!

Once again in the providence of God, it is our privilege to meet on this OLD HILL TOP unmolested and unhindered to report for the past and to plan for the future. This year as we give an account of our labors and our lives which we have lived to this Annual Conference Session, let us keep in mind that every one of us are one year closer to the giving of our final accounting to God.

In these critically significant days and in this day of abounding perplexities and problems, increasing confusion and irregularities, multiplying of "fuzzy thinking" along spiritual lines and increasing of "that hidden principle of rebellion against constituted authority," let us not forget the Scriptural admonition: "And let us not lose heart and grow weary and faint in acting nobly and living right, for in due time and at the appointed season we shall reap, if we do not losen and relax our courage and faint" (Galatians 6:9, Amplified New Testament); "And as for you, brethren, do not weary or lose heart in doing right (but continue in well-doing without weakening)" (II Thess. 3:13, Amplified New Testament).

Throughout the year we have continued in the work assigned to us at the last Annual Conference. - 2. That each pastor do all he can to interest his people in supporting and attending Stoneboro Campmeeting (It is the Conference camp);
- 3. That each pastor keep before his people the necessity of rebuilding the family altar;
- 4. That each pastor work to revive interest in the pioneer work of the conference;
- 5. That every church labor for an old-fashioned revival and Holy Ghost awakening;
- 6. And that each one labor for a mighty resurgence of prayer secret prayer, midnight prayer, increasing prayer, for prayer will release God upon the church and community problems until consciences will be awakened, vows paid, sin forsaken, talents uncovered, doubts banished, loved ones saved and homes re-established.

ITEM XII. SOME CONFERENCE GOALS FOR 1959-1960. Let our objectives for this coming Conference year be:

- 1. An enriched personal experience;
- 2. An intensified intercession;
- 3. An increasing interest in our youth;
- 4. An intensified effort to conserve our converts;
- 5. And a greater effort to maintain "the unity of the Spirit in the bond of peace."

CONCLUSION:

Some material progress has been made this year. A few new parsonages have been acquired, while improvements have been made on other properties. The President's parsonage has been improved by remodeling the kitchen and rewiring the whole house. The wiring was found to be very dangerous. Some indebtedness has been reduced while others have been incurred. The financial situation throughout the Conference has been rugged in some areas due to the fact that many have been out of work. As a result Budgets have been hard to raise in some instances. This has already affected the income of the conference. Our Pioneer Work has been hit the hardest and has caused the Mission Board to recommend to this body that a traveling Pioneer Secretary be dropped for this year until sufficient funds may be built up to launch a new program.

Brother and Sister George Adamson have been successful in getting a new work started at Eighty-four. Brother Edwin Alexander is trying to get a foothold at Columbiana, Ohio. Some of the pioneer works have made progress while others have lost ground. There are a few churches which may have to be closed if there continues to be a loss.

Your prayers and cooperation have been appreciated in these trying days. Daniel 7:25 says that in the last days power shall be given to the enemy to "wear out the saints of the Most High." This word in the Hebrew means: "To vex, torment, afflict, and wear out." With the tremendous pressures that everyone seems to be facing, the wearing out process must be on. Our danger under the pressure is threefold: (1) to get tired of the battle and surrender to the forces of evil; (2) to lose "the spiritual dynamic" in contending for the faith, and (3) to sour on everything and everybody. To do either, makes us the loser. Let us stand together, keep in love with each other, keep "the spiritual dynamic" and earnestly "contend for the faith". We have the answer for this hour but we must have a Christian experience of depth. We must be transformed by the Power of God and follow a way of life that makes for Christian depth. Let us put our hands to the plow, for there is work to do, and, without looking back, dedicate all our ransomed powers to accomplish the will of God. The Word exhorts us thus: "And let us not lose heart and grow weary and faint in acting nobly and doing right, for in due time and at the appointed season we shall reap, if we do not loosen and relax our courage and faint" (Gal. 6:9, Amplified New Testament).

We believe that God's Word is clear as to the day in which we live and also as to what we are to do in this hour. "For the time is coming when (people) will not tolerate (endure) sound and wholesome instruction, but have ears itching (for something pleasing and gratifying), they will gather, to themselves one teacher after another to a considerable number, chosen to satisfy their own liking and to foster the errors they hold, and will turn aside from hearing the truth and wander off into myths and man-made fictions," (Amplified New Testament, II Tim. 4:3). "For the mystery of lawlessness — that hidden principle of rebellion against constituted authority — is already at work in the world, (but it is) restrained only until he who restrains is taken out of the way" (II Thess. 2:7, Amplified New Testament). "But amid it all, you keep your head (be calm and cool and steady — A. N. T.); endure hardship (accept and suffer unflinchingly every hardship — A. N. T.);

do the work of an evangelist; discharge to the full your duties as a minister" (II Tim. 4:5, Berk ley). "Herald and preach the Word! Keep your sense of urgency (stand by, be at hand and ready, whether the opportunity seems to be favorable or unfavorable, whether it is convenient or inconvenient, whether it be welcome or unwelcome, you as a preacher of the Word are to show people in what way their lives are wrong) and convince them, rebuking and correcting, warning and urging and encouraging them, being unflagging and inexhaustible in patience and teaching" (II Tim. 4:2, Amplified New Testament).

The Divine directive for effective work is "... wait for the promise ... ye shall be baptized with the Holy Ghost ... ye shall receive Power, after that the Holy Ghost is come ... ye shall be witnesses unto me" We cannot improve upon it. Dare we face the challenge of this experience? Let us not rely upon numbers, prosperity nor organization but let us rest upon God's promise.

REPORT NO. 1-B

THE VICE PRESIDENT

To the members of the one hundred and sixteenth session of the Allegheny Conference, greetings in the precious name of Jesus.

It is with praise and thanksgiving that I stand before you at this time to bring my report of this year's work and its experiences.

First of all I want to praise Him for His wonderful love and tender mercy He has shown to my family and me — my wife, while she is yet under the doctor's care, seems to be completely healed of the nervous depression that she was so ill with.

Her recovery, I believe, has amazed our good doctor, as he told us in the beginning not to expect a speedy recovery. A number of folk testified to us that they were ill for months and some into several years with this same trouble with the nerves. I am fully persuaded that wife's recovery is an answer to the many prayers of our people all over the conference, who prayed daily for both her and me.

Then again I am grateful to God for the times He came upon the services that we had part in during the year. I believe that He would come more often if we just knew how to make a way for Him.

I am so sorry that I am so slow in learning what is most pleasing to Him, and that I have been so slow or ignorant in adjusting myself to Hisblessed will, so that He could come upon me more often.

Dear ones, I need the help of God. I have nothing else to depend upon.

Within myself I am limited in so many ways, but there is one thing that I am certain of, and that is, that I am all His and I am fully depending upon Him. I am keenly aware of the fact that without Him I can do nothing.

But He has given me the promise that He would make up for my deficiency and I am trusting in Him to do it.

I believe that in some ways our Conference has gained ground. There are other ways that we have lost some ground during the year.

I have no desire to report this nor to discuss these. There is only one way to rise above failure that is by giving ourselves over more fully to God.

Members of the Conference, let us give ourselves more fully to God. We can never make a success spiritually by trusting alone to our ability. Some of us may be good sermon builders, but we will fail to be fishers of men without God's message. REPORT NO. 4

COMMITTEE ON AUDITING AND FINANCE

Your Committee on Auditing and Finance submits the following report and recommendations:

ITEM I. WHAT SHALL THE CHURCHES PAY?

- 1. The following Denominational Budget items: (Revised to conform to General Conference Budget askings): World Missions, \$2.00; Education, \$3.50, 20 percent to Houghton Academy; Pension, \$2.00; Church Extension and Evangelism, \$1.50; Hephzibah Orphanage, \$.35; Administrative Budget, \$1.00; General Conference Travel and Entertainment, \$.25; Australia, \$.25; Board Meeting Expense, \$.25; (these assessments are per church member per year.)
- 2. Undivided Conference Budget (Conference work) shall be equal to ten per cent of the sum obtained by adding the three following items: Pastor's salary, parsonage rent, and church incidental expenses. (to be remitted monthly) Included in church incidental expenses are: Parsonage tax, all kinds of insurance on church and parsonage; janitor services and supplies, church utilities and fuel, parsonage utilities, and fuel when paid by the church, pastor's car expense when provided by the church, all other items which are similar to or comparable with the above. Not included are repairs, replacements, improvements, evangelistic help and special projects, church and parsonage furnishings Sunday School and Church literature and similar items.
 - 3. Conference Group Life Insurance, \$.35 per member.
 - 4. Conference Entertainment, \$.45 per member.
- 5. Pioneer Self-denial envelopes for monthly remittances (above tithe) shall be given our continued support.
- 6. General Church Extension shall be encouraged through the use of the Card Call Plan in our churches.
- 7. The pastor or persons responsible for the sale of the Conference Minutes in the local church shall remit \$.75 per copy to the chairman of the Committee on the Sale of Conference Minutes, by March 31st. The Chairman of said committee shall mail statements to all those who have not paid for their Minutes by March 31st, thus enabling the report of the Committee to be prepared by April 30th.
- 8. The above financial items, with the exception of those mentioned in paragraphs 6 and 7, shall be sent to the District Sub-treasurers. Church Treasurers are to make remittances by the 5th of each month to the credit of Conference Budget, Conference Missions, and Pioneer Fund.
- 9. Church Treasurers' reports to Quarterly Conference shall be made as of the close of the month preceding the Quarterly Conference. All church treasurers' records for the Conference year shall close April 30th. The Conference fiscal year is from May 1 to April 30.

ITEM II. WHAT SHALL THE SUNDAY SCHOOL PAY?

- 1. The first Sunday School offering of the month to the Conference Missions Fund for the use of churches not self-supporting, etc., according to the recommendations of the Conference Mission Board.
 - 2. Sunday School birthday offerings to the Conference Mission Fund.

- 3. Denominational Sunday School Budget of \$.20 per Sunday School member.
- 4. All three items above mentioned are to be paid to the local church treasurer for remittance to sub-treasurer.

ITEM III. WHAT SHALL THE CONFERENCE TREASURER PAY?

- 1. To the Conference President an annual salary of \$4,160.00.
- 2. To the Conference Vice-president an annual salary of \$3,900.00.

- 3. That when a pastor requests a change in the quarterly meeting of the President or Vice-President which involves extra mileage or expense, the church or churches involved shall pay said expense.
- 4. That the churches pay all utilities for their pastors. This is now being done by a number of churches and for the Conference President and Vice President. When there is lack of uniformity at this point, the incomes of the pastors are not accurately reflected in the annual reports. For instance, one pastor may receive \$80.00 per week and another \$75.00. If the \$80.00 man is paying the parsonage utilities his actual income is less than that of the \$75.00 man whose utilities are paid by his church. For the "privilege" of

paying his own utilities the \$80.00 man may be required to pay a substantially higher income tax.

Some pastors have expressed their preference to have their utilities paid by the church, at the expense of their salaries, if necessary, because of the savings involved when income tax returns are filed.

5. The suggestion referred to this Committee last Conference relative to assessing church income rather than the present system of obtaining Conference Budget has been considered. We believe that the suggested plan is more practical than our present plan of raising the Conference Budget. Therefore we recommend that the Conference President mail out special forms to each church for the use of church treasurers for the purpose of accurately recording all regular Sunday offerings, received at both morning This information will be asked for when and evening worship services. reports are submitted for next Conference and will provide the necessary basis for determining the percentage of assessment. At the time a percentage will be determined and will provide a much simpler means of arriving at the amount which is to be paid for Conference Budget monthly. For instance, at the close of each month the church treasurers will total the offerings of the month and determine the designated percentage. Pastor's salary, parsonage rent and incidental expenses will not be taken into consideration.

In order that we may have a accurate basis for arriving at the percentage of assessment, it is important that each church cooperate in keeping an accurate record of offerings.

- 6. Since it is expected that our evangelists, as well as pastors, attend the full session of Conference and since certain evangelists must be here at the expense of their income, we therefore recommend that the Conference pay \$50.00 each to General Evangelists Henry Lelear and H. E. Robertson, Sr.
- 7. That \$200.00 be paid to W. R. Kopp as a love gift, most of this amount having been given in a special offering at Conference.

ITEM VII. BUDGET APPOINTMENTS:

1. The Conference Undivided Budget apportionment shall be as follows: Conference Budget, 89 percent; Assistance Fund, 2 percent; Pension Plan, 9 percent.

ITEM VIII. EXAMINATION OF AID FUND ACCOUNTS:

We have interviewed those who have loans from the Aid Fund with the exception of several who failed to appear, and who, according to the rules governing the Aid Fund, will be assessed 5 percent for failure to renew.

After considerable discussion concerning the Pioneer program, Bro. Mc-Pherson, the Pioneer Secretary joined us.

A motion was made and carried that the Mission Board instruct the Pioneer Secretary to survey a designated locality within the bounds of the Conference, with the idea of the Pioneer Secretary locating in that locality sometime in the future.

A motion was made and carried that a Conference Pioneer Sunday be set for September 27, 1959.

A motion was made and carried that the Punxsutawney church be given \$200.00 to help put a new roof on the parsonage.

March 24, 1959. The Conference Mission Board met in the Titusville church at 10:30 a.m., with the following members present: Bro. Van Wormer, Bro. Satterfield, Bro. Wade, Bro. Schmul, Bro. Blair. Bro. Comadoll sat in on the meeting by invitation.

SPECIAL RECOMMENDATION MISSION BOARD

McPherson felt that the Lord released him to return to his first love which is evangelism, the Mission board felt an entirely new Fioneer program should be presented.

We recommend:

- 3. That September 27, 1959 be designated as Conference Pioneer Sunday, at which time the Pioneer charts be given out and pledges taken for the proposed Pioneer work. Our goal to be \$20,000.

- 5. That during the interim between Conference and Pioneer Sunday, the churches continue on the honor roll by taking a monthly Pioneer offering.

REPORT NO. 7

CHURCH MERGER

Report of the Conference Committee on Church Merger:

During the conference session of 1958, official word was received that the Pilgrim Holiness Church assembled in its General Conference session had voted by more than a two-thirds majority for merger with the Wesleyan Methodist Church. Despite the fact that the merger committees of both churches had been working on proposed merger, there was very little information available as to what the merged church would consist of in the way of government, policies, and standards. Then too many rumors of a disturbing nature were circulating throughout both churches, making it difficult to know what to believe and what not to believe; for this reason the Conference President, with the approval of the advisory board, appointed a committee to study and investigate the entire field of the church merger. The committee appointed is as follows: C. A. Blair, chairman; T. O. Mc-Cracken; A. Mark Larson; Dr. Robert Benninger; C. R. McPherson; T. W. Comadoll; H. E. Schmul; and J. B. Markey. Four meetings were held throughout the conference year, one during camp, one at West Middlesex, one during the Ministerial Institute, and finally, at the conference grounds, June 9. A sub-committee was given the responsibility of gathering information and presenting it to the full committee for discussion. The results of such an investigation were the publishing of a pamphlet, "A Discussion of Church Merger." These booklets were distributed to the pastors at the time of the institute at Indiana, Pa. The committee felt that the laity of our conference should be well informed as to what was involved in a merger for them as well as for the ministry of our conference and churches. sufficient number was printed in order that each local church could be informed on this vital issue. We trust this has been done.

We, as a committee, offer the following resolution for the consideration and action of this conference body:

Whereas the present merger, as proposed, is contrary to the spirit of our founding fathers and out of harmony with the Utica convention; and since it would mean the end of more than a century of democratic safeguards and;

Whereas it would mean demotion for our conference presidents, pastors, evangelists, and laity, and;

Whereas such a merger would restrict the liberty and freedom of the individual conscience, and mean the imposition of eccessiastical mandates and the lowering of conference standards to the level of the lowest common denominator, and;

Whereas this plan as proposed did not begin with a "grass roots desire" on the part of "God's little people" and;

Whereas local and conference management would suffer, and since conferences would enter into a period of unprecedented confusion and conflict due to the shifting of conference boundaries, policies, standards and methods precluding any faint hope of revival we might have, and;

Whereas the proposed merger is a complete departure from our historic and democratic past as well as the abandoment of the New Testament principle of decentralized authority and a return to iron-fisted superintendancy that our forefathers fled from over a century ago, the committee for the study of merger, after carefully and fully weighing all the facts available, after prayerful consideration, and in the light of the history of mergers, therefore propose to let it be resolved:

That the following vote be taken:

1. Do you favor merger with the Pilgrim Church?

REPORT NO. 10

THE PIONEER SECRETARY

To the members of the one hundred sixteenth annual session of the Allegheny Conference, Christian greetings!

Through the merciful providence of God, the magnanimous love of the brethren and the prayers and support of the faithful constituency of Allegheny, I have been enabled to finish seven years of service in the work of Pioneering under the authorization of the Conference Mission Board. My heart responds with deep gratitude to God and to my Conference for your patience and indulgence with me. My heart has felt a deep sense of peace and

surety in the clear conviction that God has released me to enter anew into the field of old-fashioned holiness evangelism. This new field will not be less difficult, but herein I desire to spend and be spent in seeking the eternal interests of souls and His true church.

Certainly no one could have received kinder treatment at the hands of our faithful Conference President and Vice President than I. It has been a pleasant relationship to work under Brother H. C. Van Wormer, Brother T. A. Robertson and the Mission Board. Their love, patience and counsel has been invaluable to me and the Pioneer work.

I am humbled greatly at the meager visible showing which I am able to present to my Lord and the beloved Conference. I can truly say, however, that I have sought God's help continually, to build upon "the sure foundation," for eternity and not for the passing show of time. I have sought for myself and people to be zealously affected always in a good thing, Galations 4. As Wesley writes in his sermon on zeal — "Zeal or Love on Fire" — I have sought first for a zeal for divine love for God and man to reign on the throne of my heart; second, a zeal for holiness as described by Jesus in the Beatitudes; third, a zeal for the works of mercy; fourth, a zeal for piety; fifth, a zeal for that part of the branch into which Providence and God's leadings have placed me. These zeals were given in the order of their importance.

A close observer will note that with modern holiness the order is reversed. Promotional success for the visible church is ranked first. Piety is valued less, works of mercy wrought out of a heart on fire with love pleasing to God, valued even less. The zeal for true inward holiness is valued as near derangement of mind, and outmoded for these modern days. Old-fashioned Divine love is so little known and valued in most places, that he who labors for it is charged of preaching a new doctrine, and the whole lukewarm church takes up arms against it. Such are the sure marks of that apostasy, that great falling away that has taken away the heart of the modern holiness professor and church. Of such the Lord would say, "They have gone far from me and have walked after vanity and are become vain." Ieremiah 2:5.

At the beginning of the Conference year the Conference President and the Mission Board gave some twenty pioneer churches to the oversight of the Pioneer Secretary. They were: English, Princeton, Bluefield, Tazewell, Ebenezer, Ellwood City, East Liverpool, Hadley, Salem, Canton McKinley, Hillville, North Canton, Butler, Hartville, Alliance, Cabin Run, Warren, Jamestown, Hooversville, and Forestville. Due to some cancellations in my schedule, it was not possible to visit Cabin Run nor Forestview. Special labors were given both to the East Liverpool and the Hooversville churches.

Through the instrumentality of Rev. James H. Cyphers, a Tabernacle group in Wrights Valley, Va., some few miles out of Bluefield, engaged Rev. Charles Martin as their pastor for the past Conference year. These good folk have rallied to his faithful ministry paying his moving expense, house rent and travel, besides donating liberal supplies of meat, milk, eggs, and vegetables raised in their gardens.

Brother James Cyphers has just closed a successful revival with Brother

Martin and his people. Several were soundly converted who attended from Bluefield. The Bluefield church profited much from the revival as well as did the Wrights Valley church. The progress and response of this people has encouraged Brother Martin to labor with them for another year. Brother Charles Martin is a graduate from Central College. He is an elder from the North Carolina Conference of good report and has transferred to Allegheny Conference. He has an excellent wife who is in harmony with Bible standards. They have three fine young children. God has been blessing the ministry of this praying earnest brother.

Near the first of December, 1958, Brother Edwin Alexander was duly appointed to Columbiana, Ohio, by Rev. H. C. Van Wormer, under the Pioneer department, in association with the Salem Wesleyan Methodist Church. Since this time, Brother Alexander has made his residence in Columbiana, with his wife and three children. He is at present supporting himself with a full time job. Some formative plans have been made towards a possible tent meeting sponsored by the Salem Wesleyan Church, pending upon the success of securing a suitable tent.

At an earlier request of the Conference President and Rev. George Adamson, I formed a pioneer organization at Eighty-four, Penna., March 2, 1959. This group was meeting in the local Grange Hall. Brother and Sister Adamson had gathered this group out of a Sunday School project of theirs. Some good interest was being manifest toward this new endeavor at the time of the temporary organization.

The fourth Southern District Wesleyan Methodist Camp Meeting proved in many ways to win a hearing and favor with the people of the local area which no camp before had received. The Lord used mightily the ministry of Rev. H. C. Van Wormer and Rev. A. L. Vess. Several of the young people of the Camp received eternal benefit. They really were dug out and got their feet down to a genuine experience in God.

The Pastors and people cooperated wonderfully, supporting heartily the Camp with their presence, prayers and offerings.

Brother William Hash and his assistants rendered faithful service in the children's meetings.

Mrs. Helen Cyphers and her assistants rendered a wonderful service in the dining hall.

The fifth Southern District Camp Meeting will convene at Glenwood Park, June 23 — July 2. Rev. H. Robb French and Rev. Carroll Miller are engaged to be the workers for this Camp Meeting.

I have sought through the year to discharge each task that was at hand with the enabling that God gave. In the interests of the Conference and Kingdom I have traveled 32,000 miles.

REPORT NO. 11

REPORT OF THE SECRETARY OF EVANGELISM

The activities of your secretary have been very limited this year due to numerous duties and conference responsibilities. However, we have not been unmindful of the great need for a genuine revival of vital godliness. We have endeavored to keep abreast of the trends of evangelism and the shifting currents of religious thought in the church world as well as in our own zion.

There has been much action in the field of mass evangelism, but there is no evidence whatsoever of a revival. In all frankness, we holiness people are in grave danger of accepting a shallow believism colored by Calvinism, at the expense of a vital personal relationship to Christ. Many modern converts of mass evangelism make decisions without being delivered from sinning, others are converted to the church without being regenerated. This danger is becoming so apparent to thinking men that articles of warning are frequently appearing from the pen of such men as Dr. Tozer, Dr. Bob Shuler, Sr., Dr. Oswald Smith and others. If men of such moderate spiritual goals are alarmed at dangers of superficial evangelism, would it not be folly for Wesleyan Methodists, with our great heritage and high spiritual aims to accept, promote, and adopt a similar program for our church. Yet, there is every evidence that such a program of evangelism will be launched in our church this year. The General Conference will consider, and probably

adopt a program of evangelism that unintentionally carries the potential to undermine the doctrines and standards of the Wesleyan Methodist Church. The Brooksville, Fla. Conference on Evangelism gave birth to such a program. It is basically the same idea and plan "the old line churches" used the first half of this century and lead to their down fall and ruin. It is geared for membership recruitment. It is the abortive fruit of frustrated desires. It is not the product of evangelistic fervor or revival passion, or else it would not have passed out of the picture so quickly.

Such a program of evangelism will be successful. It is apparent that many of our pastors and leaders feel that the present revival meeting emphasis of prayer, fasting, confession and restitution are too slow and hard, if not out The church builders are impatient. These men believe a faster method of making saints and building church membership rolls must be found. If the new evangelism is adopted it will prove so successful as to make the "old time" revivalist seem unnecessary. Like "old generals" The so-called "diggers and skinners" will no longer he will fade away. be needed. The hell fire and brimstone, repentance and restitution, comeout-from among them prophet of God will no longer be in demand in our But remember, God's callings are without repentance, and "he has called some evangelists". God will always have a job and a place for the true God-called evangelist to work. The surest, safest, fastest way of building our church is the way Jesus admonished His disciples, "Tarry until ye be endued with power from on high". This baptism of fire will purify our hearts and empower us to render fruitful service in the power of His name. After this experience, additions were made daily to the church and the spiritual welfare of the church was safeguarded for those that were added brought forth the fruits of repentance and "abode in the apostle doctrine."

However, instead of such steadfastness, the new program of evangelism.

However, if the new evangelism follows the general pattern used by others it will be a social, friendly, recreational, no harm done evangelism. Our church rolls will be enlarged, by ring wearers, worldlings, and perhaps lodge members. We will be admonished to "clean our fish" after we catch them. Such unregenerate, unconverted, unrepentant, unchanged, individuals will constitute an unholy leaven that will eventually leaven the "whole lump".

If present trends continue, I envision the day when evangelists of the "old school" will be as scarce in the Wesleyan Methodist Church as they are in the "old mother church." Those men available in this field will be approved by the church as safe, sane, and sensible. For one to be thus approved the program of the church will be safe from criticism, the popular sins in and out of the church will be handled with such wisdom, that the worldly and ungodly will not be offended and good sense will dictate that the drift and compromise of the church and its leadership will be acclaimed as progress and revival. The need for such approval will be requested to eliminate the unequalified and incompetent, the result will be unable to keep a clear conscience and at the same time have the approval of the church. Such fears are not groundless. Wesley is the eminent forerunner, using a tomb stone for a rostrum, the open heavens for a tabernacle and the hungry

hearted for a congregation. The fear expressed is based on the lessons learned from history. In most every town where we have a holiness witness can be found a decadent and apostate churches that have had a form of evangelism without the vital necessity of a Holy Ghost revival. The only thing that will save us from a similar fate is a revival awakening in the ministry of such a magnitude that God's way of evangelism through revival will be seen as the right and only way to reach a lost world.

SECRETARY OF EDUCATION

Leaders have sought to remove all spiritual and even religious training, and the general school system is practically controlled by an anti-Christ force which seeks to crowd God out of the entire program. Teachers these days are not permitted to teach God, but they may talk about God. They must not teach religion, but they may talk about religion. This is only a sham to appease those who would complain because of the lack of religious training in the public schools.

As we see these conditions, we naturally raise the question, "What should we expect of a Christian school? What should we expect of the school to which we send our children?" In answer to these questions, I should like to list five things:

- 1. Christian Instruction. A Christian School should place God's word first in its curriculum. To train lawyers, we must teach books of law; to train doctors, we must teach books on medicine; and to train ministers, we must teach the Bible. Yet most of our colleges today are removing the Bible from the classroom, and are endeavoring to train ministers by teaching other secular books.
- 2. Bible Standards. Students should not control the standards of the school. These principles and practices of Holiness should be so established in the life of a Christian school that students who attend should feel the influence and adjust their lives accordingly.
- 3. Spiritual environment. The surroundings should become so permeated with the presence of God that it would be hard to do wrong and easy to do right.
 - 4. Self Denial. Most young people today know more about self-indulgence

than self-sacrifice. Youth must be taught to "endure hardness as a good soldier of Jesus Christ."

5. An Unmoveable Faith. The lives of the faculty and the influence of the school should be a challenge to its students to send them forth with an unchangeable faith.

In closing, let us not be ignorant of Satan's devices: Let us seek to maintain schools which are truly christian; and let us seek for our children an education which will lead them to Jesus Christ.

CHILD EVANGELISM REPORT

It's a new day; and we're living in an advanced age, they say. It's a day of building. People are busy building new homes, the government is building new roads and highways to accommodate the new cars and motor vehicles, educators are building new schools and colleges to further education, scientists are building new rockets and missiles to explore outer space, religious leaders are building new churches for places to worship, but what is the Church building? It's the job of the Church to build Christian Character. In comparison with all the advancement and building in the other phases of life, it seems the Church is lagging behind, missing the mark, not meeting the spiritual demands of the day. Moral degeneracy is at an all time low, while crime and delinquency is at an all time high.

Beautiful homes, schools, highways, cars and all the rest are to be appreciated, but what good is a beautiful home and the children lost in sin? It seems we've advanced every other way but morally and spiritually. Sin is on a rampage. You do not have to be a pessimist to recognize the fact. A great percentage of crime is committed by the youth and teen-agers. It's needless to give statistics, the daily newspapers alone confirm these facts.

While man is striving to conquer outer space, as is often the case, he can't conquer his own household. And while trying to orbit the sun and moon, he fails to bring his own little "Johnny and Susie" in orbit. Why all the moral and spiritual decline? Generally speaking, we've tried to advance and build without God. Matthew 6:33 says: "But seek ye first the kingdom of God, and His righteousness; and all these things shall be added unto you." We've said: "But seek ye first all these thing, and add God last, if at all." And the answer doesn't come out right. Instead of being a problem in addition, it has been a problem of subtraction. The things that are worth while have been gradually taken away—moral principles, reverence for God and the high ideals of life. And so, we reap the harvest of a lost generation.

God and the Bible are still the answer to the world's need. In Deut. 4:10 the Lord is speaking: "Gather me the people together, and I will make them hear my words, that they may learn to fear me all the days that they shall live upon the earth, and that they may teach their children." Deut. 6:7 commands that thou shalt teach thy children diligently. It takes work, time, effort, and money to build buildings, and things. Likewise it takes work.

time, effort, and money to build Christian Character. In building things the reward is in the accomplishment of the completed task—a beautiful building, a lovely home. In building Christian Character, the reward is the knowledge that you have had a small share in transforming the lives of young people for the kingdom of God.

The Church has golden opportunities everywhere for building Christian Character into the lives of boys and girls through the study and teaching If the Church doesn't train the children for Christ, the world is anxiously waiting to train them in the ways of sin. One of the greatest menaces, if not the greatest, in the training of children is the T.V. A very common greeting among the small fry is: "Bangl Bangl Bangl Stick 'em up; or I'll shoot you dead!" Exaggerated? I don't think so. carefully the next time you watch a group of children playing unobserved. It's guns, and more guns. And T.V. promises to get worse. Quoting from the October, 1958 issue of the Newsweek: "Special T.V. -Radio Report The script for the T.V. season might be entitled, "Dial Anything For Murder." A recent survey in Los Angeles covering T.V. fare for one week, up to the hour of nine o'clock, (when the smaller children presumably go to bed) logged 161 murders (500 per cent more than five years ago), 60 justifiable homicides, 192 attempted murders, 83 robberies, 15 kidnappings, 24 conspiracies to commit murder, 21 jail breaks, 7 attempted lynchings, 6 dynamitings, 11 extortions, 2 cases of arson, and instances of torture, not to mention uncountable numbers of prolonged and brutal fights, threats to kill, sluggings, and mauling, and so on."

What harm is it bringing upon the children? Quoting again from the same magazine. A doctor, a judge, and a penologist speak their minds. Psychiatrist and Author, Frederic Wertham (Seduction of the Innocent): "Every month, every year I've been working on this problem in clinics and private practice. Why does a child commit a violent act? Not only because of impulse, but also because of rationalism to do it. T.V. supplies the rationalism. The non T.V.-affected child has compassion and an awareness of suffering; the T.V. affected child has a callousness, a lack of understanding. There is a moral and emotional harm."

Judges Frank J. Kronenberg, President of the New York State County Judges Association: "I believe that television is an instrument of intense pressure that convinces the inmature mind that violence is an accented way of life. It is a subtle form of American brain-washing. Hour after hour simply by the flick of a switch, a child can see a swiftly flowing panorama of human misery, despair, homicide, and thievery. Exposing children to such violence can be compared with taking children to public tortures and hangings in medieval times."

James V. Bennett, director of the Federal Bureau of Prisons: "The increasing number of prisoners young and old whose crime closely parallels what they have seen on television, or where the methods used show they committed a crime similar to something they saw on television is a matter of increasing concern to me. The impressionable, maladjusted and rebellious young person sees these and re-enacts them, believing he can avoid the mistakes. What we need most are producers as much interested in character

building, as they are in shows that can be cheaply produced. We need parents who don't look upon T.V. as a built-in substitute for parental guidance and a sense of responsibility. We also need people who will protest and protest, and protest again and again to stations, sponsors, public officials, radio commissioners, magazines, and others against such programs."

If the world recognizes the menace of the T.V. surely we as the Church should recognize the harm in it.

Arise, O Church to the need of the day and begin building Christian Character for the Kingdom of God.

REPORT NO. 16

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

ITEM NO. 1: The Board of Trustees met in the president's office on Stoneboro Camp Grounds, Stoneboro, Pa., on June 14, 1958. Those present were Rev. H. C. Van Wormer, Rev. T. W. Comadoll, and Homer Waid. Reorganization was affected as follows: Rev. H. C. Van Wormer, Chairman; Rev. T. W. Comadoll, Secretary. Motion to adjourn was carried.

ITEM NO. 2: The Board of Trustees met at the Ashville Church, Ashville, N. Y., on June 17, 1958, to consider their request to put a basement under the church and other remodeling. Those present were Rev. H. C. Van Wormer, Rev. T. W. Comadoll, Homer Waid, and Ernest Rough. After a careful inspection of the building, permission was granted to proceed with the basement and to remodel otherwise as funds became available.

The Board granted the request of Rev. Jack Crouse a loan of \$200.00 from the Ministers Aid Fund.

Expenses of the trip were: Homer Waid, \$3.36; T. W. Comadoll, \$3.36.

ITEM NO. 3: July 12, 1958. By correspondence the Board granted a loan of \$1,000.00 to the Ashville Church from the Church Aid Fund.

ITEM NO. 4: July 16, 1958. By correspondence a loan of \$800.00 was approved for the Cabin Run Church from the Church Aid Fund.

ITEM NO. 5: August 20, 1958. By correspondence the Trustees authorized a loan of \$750.00 to the Barkley Church from the Church Aid Fund to complete their parsonage, and also a loan of \$50.00 from the Ministers Aid Fund to Rev. Sherman Beers.

ITEM NO. 6: September 6, 1958. By correspondence the Trustees authorized a loan of \$300.00 to Rev. E. R. Barris from the Ministers Aid Fund.

ITEM NO. 7: September 12, 1958. By correspondence the Trustees agreed to a loan of \$250.00 to the Pleasant View Church for the repair of their furnace. Loan taken from Church Aid Fund.

ITEM NO. 8: September 15, 1958. The Board of Trustees made a trip to New Kensington, Pa., to consider a request of a group for permission to erect a basement church. Those present were Rev. A. G. Carlson, Rev. T. W. Comadoll, Homer Waid, Ernest Rough, and Rev. T. A. Robertson, who acted as chairman in the absence of the Conference President. After carefully considering all angles of the proposed building and other circumstances involved, there was a unanimous vote against the proposal.

Expenses of the trip: T. W. Comadoll, \$2.18; Homer Waid, \$16.36; Ernest Rough, \$8; T. A. Robertson, \$12; A. G. Carlson, \$8.

ITEM NO. 9: September 17, 1958. By correspondence the Trustees granted a loan of \$650.00 from the Church Aid Fund to the Blue Eye Church for needed repair about the parsonage.

ITEM NO. 10: October 15, 1958. By correspondence the Trustees authorized the following loans: Rev. George Kopp, \$150.00 from the Ministers Aid Fund, Isabella Church, \$400.00 from Church Aid Fund.

ITEM NO. 11: October 22, 1958. By correspondence it was agreed to loan the Riverview Church the sum of \$720.00 from the Church Aid Fund for the installation of a new furnace.

ITEM NO. 12: November 6, 1958. By correspondence the Board of Trustees granted the request of the Rock Run Church to purchase a house in Smithburg, W. Va., located on Route 50, to be used as a parsonage. The purchase price was \$5,000 00. They also authorized a loan of \$1,000.00 from the Church Aid Fund, and granted the Rock Run Church the privilege of borrowing the balance needed for said purchase to best advantage.

ITEM NO. 13: November 24, 1958. The Board of Trustees met at Alliance, Ohio, at the request of the Alliance Church to consider their request for the purchase of a parsonage. Trustees present were Rev. H. C. Van Wormer, Rev. A. G. Carlson, Rev. T. W. Comadoll, Homer Waid, and Ernest Rough. After a careful inspection of the house under consideration and the terms on which it could be purchased, it was unanimously agreed to grant their request. Said property is located at 617 S. Freedom Street. The purchase price was set at \$8,500.00, with a down payment of \$800.00 and the balance to be paid at \$60.00 a month or more, if possible. The Trustees agreed to loan them the down payment of \$800.00 from the Church Aid Fund.

Expenses of the trip: A. G. Carlson, \$13.52; Homer Waid, \$24.96; Ernest Rough, \$17.92.

ITEM NO. 14: December 10, 1958. By correspondence it was agreed to loan Rev. Charles Lincoln \$65.00 from the Ministers Aid Fund to meet a pressing obligation brought about by illness in his family.

ITEM NO. 15: December 12, 1958. By correspondence it was agreed to loan Rev. Robert Miller the sum of \$200.00 from the Ministers Aid Fund.

ITEM NO. 16: January 19, 1959. By correspondence a loan of \$150.00 was granted Rev. Paul Betz from the Ministers Aid Fund to meet pressing obligations at that time.

ITEM NO. 17: On January 9, 1959, Trustees Ernest Rough and T. W. Comadoll made a trip to the president's parsonage at 413 E. Main St., Titusville, Pa., to determine what could be done in the way of remodeling the kitchen. After a careful, thorough check, the decision was made to lower the ceiling, put in new cupboards and sink, install a built-in oven and stove move the semi-bath, and put new covering on the floor. Plans were made for a few other minor alterations. These plans were laid before the other trustees, and they all agreed that the work should be done as soon as possible.

ITEM NO. 18: February 5, 1959. Plans for the remodeling and enlarging of the basement at the Hampe Memorial Church, Tallmadge, Ohio, were received by the trustees and checked, after which permission was granted to proceed with this project as planned.

ITEM NO. 19: February 6, 1959. During the remodeling of the kitchen at the president's parsonage, it was discovered that the wiring of the house was both inadequate and dangerous. This matter was called to the attention of the Trustees, who immediately authorized the complete rewiring of the house to meet present-day code regulations.

ITEM NO. 20: February 26, 1959. The Trustees met at the president's parsonage at Titusville, Pa., to consider the request of the Harbor Church for permission to remodel the old church building into a parsonage. The pastors, two of the trustees, and others from the church were present. After a careful inspection of the plans and listening to the well-planned method of getting the job done, permission was granted.

At this same time, a request of the Pioneer Secretary to consider the purchase of some property in Columbiana, Ohio, was taken up. Due to the amount involved to purchase said property along with some other factors, this request was rejected.

Expenses for the trip were: Homer Waid, \$3.80; Ernest Rough, \$2.50; T. W. Comadoll, \$1.55.

ITEM NO. 21: March 4, 1959. The Trustees met at the parsonage in Punxsutawney, Pa., to consider the urgent need of repairing the roof on the parsonage, which was leaking badly. The full board, consisting of Rev. H. C. Van Wormer, Chairman, A. G. Carlson, T. W. Comadoll, Homer Waid, and Ernest Rough were present. After an inspection of the house and noting the need, careful consideration was given as to what would be the most practical way to meet this need. Due to the fact that the house had been built with a flat roof, which had always caused trouble, and considering the added fact that a new covering had been put on the house just a few years before at quite some expense, the trustees decided that the best and most permanent way to meet this need would be to put a gable roof on the building. This would provide an upstairs for later use and give ample space for two bedrooms.

Due to the rapidly deteriorating condition of the interior of the house because of the leaking roof, vote was made to hire Ernest and Richard Rough to put up the rafters and do other needed work to the point where the men of the church could finish the work.

Because of the fact that some of the men of this church had been out of work and that their finances were very limited, the decision was made to pay the wages of these two workmen from the Conference Budget. The need here was extremely urgent, and the trustees felt that this was a justifiable step.

ITEM NO. 22: March 4, 1959. The trustees met at the church in Sagamore, Pa., to consider their request to erect a new church building. After inspecting their plans, viewing their lots on which they expected to build, and taking note of their financial condition, their request was granted.

ITEM NO. 23: March 4, 1959. A request from the Hampe Memorial Church, Tallmadge, Ohio, asking for a loan of \$2,000.00 from the Church Aid Fund was presented. Due to the financial condition of this Fund, a loan of \$1,000.00 was granted.

Expenses for the trip were: A. G. Carlson, \$3.10; Homer Waid, \$18.80; Ernest Rough, \$19.60.

ITEM NO. 24: March 5, 1959. By correspondence the trustees authorized a loan of \$200.00 to Rev. D. L. Robertson from the Ministers Aid Fund.

ITEM NO. 25: April 14, 1959. The trustees made a trip to Eighty Four,

Pa., to inspect a building with a view in mind of purchasing it. Those present were Rev. H. C. Van Wormer, Rev. A. G. Carlson, Rev. T. W. Comadoll, Ernest Rough, and Homer Waid. After a careful inspection of the building, both within and without, it was evident that considerable repair would be needed to put the building in good condition. Also taken into consideration was the fact that the building had been built in 1917. These factors made the asking price of the building, \$10.000.00, seem entirely out of reason. After a lengthy discussion, an offer of \$5,000 00 was made to the group who held the building for sale. This offer was to be conveyed to the group by Rev. George Adamson.

ITEM NO. 26: May 20, 1959. By correspondence the trustees authorized a loan of \$200.00 to Rev. Charles Lincoln from the Ministers Aid Fund.

ITEM NO. 27: May 20, 1959. By correspondence the Trustees authorized a loan of \$1000.00 to the Oak Grove church from the Church Aid Fund.

ITEM NO. 28. May 21, 1959. By correspondence the Trustees authorized a loan of \$200 00 from the Ministers Aid Fund to Rev. George Christy.

ITEM NO. 29. May 25, 1959. By correspondence the trustees authorized a loan of \$60.00 to Rev. David Robertson from the Ministers Aid Fund.

ITEM NO. 30: June 2, 1959. The Board of Trustees made a trip to Hartville, Ohio to inspect a lot located by the local group as a possible site on which to build at a later date. The lot consists of 1 ²/³ acres about one half mile west of Hartville on West Maple Street on State Route 619. The purchase price was \$2500.00. Permission to purchase the lot was granted by a unanimous vote of the trustees. Trustees present were, Rev. H. C. Van Wormer, Rev. T. W. Comadoll, Rev. A. G. Carlson, Homer Waid, Ernest Rough.

As you came on the Campground this year, you noticed a real change, for the old office building had been moved onto a new location and the new

REPORT NO. 25

RESOLUTIONS

RESOLUTIONS: Your Committee on Resolutions submits the following report.

BE IT RESOLVED:

- 1. That by adopting this report, we as a Conference, re-affirm the historic stand of the church in matters of Christian doctrine and practice. Thus may we encourage our people to adhere, not from sense of staid, cold duty, but from a heart abounding in fervent love for God and a passion for holiness, to the General and Special Rules of our Discipline, especially as they regard the matters of dress, Sabbath observance, parental authority, and holy things. In as much as these things are important to the maintaining of our witness, may our ministry give itself to the preaching of the doctrine of holiness to maintain the heart relationship of our people to God in these matters.
- 2. That we re-affirm our love and our loyalty to our beloved denomination by praying for its leaders; and that we resolve to express our appreciation for the officials of our conference and the standards which they maintain by praying for them, and by declaring our stand to be with them and further; that we pledge ourselves, when seeking their council, not to over-burden them with the trivial.
- 3. That we engage ourselves earnestly in the task of reaching and leading our youth into a definite experience of salvation, and further that we ecourage them, as soon as it is practical and wise to unite with the church. Since the losses to our church are tremendous among our teen age young people, let us endeavor by all proper means to engage their talents

and abilities in the service of God and the church, thus creating in them a feeling of responsibility for the church.

- 4. That since the divorce evil is one of the great curses of our land, a corruption to the morals of our youth, and a destroyer of our homes, therefore we deem it essential to preach against this great evil, and that we go to the head of the stream and instruct our youth in the sanctity of marriage.
- 5. That since we recognize the religious motion picture to be an evil, and not consistent with God's divine plan for the presentation and propagation of the Gospel of Jesus Christ; and since we recognize that its use in our churches would supplant deep spiritual worship, we urge that our churches and pastors refuse their endorsement, and to refrain from using them in the churches of our Conference.
- 6. That we go on record as being unalterably opposed to any affiliation whatsoever with the National Council of Churches or any of its departments.
- 7. That we urge our ministers and laymen to maintain the family altar as a spiritual institution in our homes, to practice the grace of systematic fasting and to engage themselves in deeper prayer lives issuing forth in bleeding intercession, motivated by fervent love for God and a burning passion for souls.
- 8. That we recommend that our pastors keep each other informed of those who move from area to area from our Sunday Schools and churches.
- 9. That we maintain our guard against the modernistic bias reflected in many passages of the Revised Standard Version of the Bible and in much of the "Interpreter's Bible."
- 10. That since we recognize Communism to be a subtle, Godless influence, and that the present trends to a welfare state are opening wedges in our nation to its supplanting our democratic way of life—be it resolved:
- a. That our ministers and church leaders warn our people through the preached Word and the printed page of the subtle approach, Satanic origin, and destructive results of this political philosophy.
- b. That we recognize our solemn obligation to pray for the President of our Nation and the committees of Congress who are engaged in opposing this Communistic infiltration into our American system, and further, that God will grant them wisdom and courage to fight this evil.
- 11. Where as we recognize the continued advancement of the Roman Catholic system in numerical strength and political power in our nation, schools and local governments and that since we recognize this constitutes a menace to free government, freedom of worship, and conscience if it should gain a majority position, be it therefore resolved:
- a. That the ministry of the Conference warn the people in our Sunday Schools and churches concerning the prevalent practices of the Roman Church.
- b. That we resist Romanism with Christian grace, and by zealous evangelism in our communities glean the unsaved lest they become the prey of the present advance of Romanism.
 - c. That we endeavor, by the persuasion of the Holy Spirit through the

Gospel, to lead, through love, as many adherents of the spurious faith to Christ as possible.

- d. That we warn the youth of our churches about the dangers of marriage with those who are adherents to the Roman church.
- 12. That we recognize crime comic books and pulp magazines, which depict violence, sadism, brutality, and blood lust unparalled in the history of children's literature of any time or nation, to be a contributing factor to the present delinquency problem. We therefore urge our people to war against this evil wherever practicable by withholding patronage from those engaged in the distribution of these tools of Satan and by reproving and rebuking them with Christian love.
- 13. That we declare ourselves as supporting action which would encourage the instruction in our public schools of Christian principles as they regard character and conduct. Therefore, we urge our ministers and parents to unite and, by all ethical means, seek to improve the moral character of our youth through the boards of education, offices of superintendent and principal, faculties, and Parent Teachers Associations. And be it further resolved: that we endeavor to arouse our constituency to support, by prayer and other methods, Christian day schools which adhere to Bible principles and standards, and which are sane and consistent in Biblical interpretation and Christian experiences.
- 14. That these resolutions together with the standing resolutions be read on each charge at the first quarterly meeting following the distribution of the Conference Minutes.

REPORT NO. 3

W. M. S. PRESIDENT'S REPORT — 1958-1959

To the 53rd Annual Session of the Allegheny Conference Woman's Missionary Society, greetings in the Precious Name of Jesus.

"Except the Lord build the house, they labor in vain that build it". (Psa. 127:1) As we come to the Master Builder to report at the close of an-

other year, He alone can properly evaluate the deeds and efforts of His children as He alone can determine the motives and desires of each heart. Whether the visible results be large or small we may each hear a still small voice within our hearts saying, "Well done thou faithful servant", if we have each one put our best, our deepest devotion and love into our service for our Lord.

Then as we face the new conference year with new untried paths of duty and servcie let us draw closer to the Lord by leaning more heavily upon His word and by spending more earnest time in prayer lest we fail and come short of His will for us. These are confusing, perilous times when the enemy tests our faith and strength to the limit of our endurance both physically and spiritually but He has promised "as thy days so shall thy strength be." (Deut. 33:25b). Again, "Be thou faithful unto death and I will give thee a crown of life." (Rev. 2:10). Also, "In the world ye shall have tribulation: but be of good cheer; I have overcome the world." (John 16:33).

Likewise, let us remember our days of service for Jesus are short, even for the one who will live to be the oldest. Daily souls are being swiftly hurled into eternity, some with warning, some without, some with the knowledge of God, some who have never heard. It is our duty and privilege to show our love for our Savior by doubling our efforts to win souls, for the Coming of the Lord draweth nigh and how can we go to our Heavenly Home without bringing sheaves for our Master.

Our first activity of the year was Stoneboro Camp, which we felt was a great spiritual victory and unusual financial success after the heavy pledging at conference and in spite of the prevalent unemployment. Rev. Wm. Gale. President of Brainerd Indian School, Miss Ruth Stearns, music teacher, and five of the Brainerd Indian young folk were present for missionary day. Bro. Gale brought a stirring message of truth and information; Miss Ruth Stearns sang and everyone was enthusiastic about the singing and testimonies of the Brainerd Indian young people.

Besides, we were privileged to have a number of good speakers at the afternoon services. Rev. and Mrs. Saunders brought excellent, ever fresh messages. Mrs. Jenny Gordeuk, converted Russian, spoke on Saturday with the anointing of the Lord. Prof. Stephen Gordeuk was also introduced and gave a brief testimony. Miss Clara Campbell, early missionary to Africa, gave two wonderfully enlightening talks about the beginning of the work in Africa. Rev. Wm. Plants, who is now working with the Indians in Arizona, gave an inspiring account of his work on the last day of Camp. Miss Pearl Crapo, furloughed missionary from Haiti, gave only brief remarks since other speakers were scheduled. However, we enjoyed having her unexpectedly in our midst a day or so.

A shadow of sadness was cast upon the women one day as we held a memorial service for little Teddy Reid. Yet there was rejoicing to know his suffering was over and he was safely Home with his Lord. A memorial offering, which was given for a pew in the new Medellin, S. A., Church, was taken at this time. Though we miss Teddy's presence in our midst his memory continues to be an inspiration.

For the fall itineracy, we were blessed with missionaries until we fear some thought they had too many. As a whole everyone enjoyed an abundance for a change. Prof. and Mrs. Stephen Gordeuk visited churches six week ends from August 30, 31 through Nov. 8, 9. They gave a service to at least two churches each week end. These were profitable visits in spite of the fact they had been heard before at camp by many.

Miss Freda Farmer, furloughed missionary from Taiwan, spent September 14 — October 5 among us, giving each church in the Southern West Virginia District a service and visiting several churches in the other four districts, about 23 meetings in all. Her sweet spirit and sincere messages telling of conditions in Formosa won the hearts of our people.

Finally, Rev. Harris Earl, furloughed missionary from Medellin, Columbia, S. A., made the major tour of the conference with the exception of West Virginia District from October 19 to December 21. Services scheduled on December 1 to 4 were cancelled, however, to allow him to attend an outside convention. Good reports came in of the visits of this sincere, devoted young man who surely aroused much interest in South America.

One new society has joined our ranks. Rev. Mrs. Mary Huntsman was duly authorized to organize a W. M. S. at our pioneer church at Canton McKinley, Canton, Ohio. This was accomplished November 5, 1958, with 8 active and 8 honorary members—a good beginning of equality with honorary membership, which we trust they can keep up and others will emulate.

Not so pleasant to report is the result of the membership—subscription drives held during September, 1958, and again during January and February, 1959. Only an average of 70 of 100 societies reported both times. This is not so good as it should be. Surely, we could do better even allowing for occasional, unavoidable hinderances. Let us earnestly strive to do better next time.

Our Standard of Efficiency Rating for this conference year is 95%. Following is a comparison of this year's and last year's report of membership, subscriptions and receipts:

REPORT NO. 4

COMMITTEE ON PROGRAM AND PLAN OF WORK WE RECOMMEND:

- 1. That the first meeting after conference each local society hold an installation service which includes the outline of the work and consecration for their office.
- 2. a. That the program and plan of work be read and discussed as soon as the minutes are received.
- b. That we urge the president of each new society to refer to those as a reminder during the year.
- 3. a. That each society endeavor to hold a public monthly meeting, praying for those requests found in the WESLEYAN MISSIONARY and stress be placed upon personal evangelism including children, adolescents, the aged, and with special emphasis upon the Jew. That each one feel a personal responsibility to bring at least one soul to Christ during the year.
- b. That our District Holiness Convention, where possible observe a missionary service.
- 4. a. That we urge our societies to carry out the Prayer Partner Plan, and keep in touch with our Home and Foreign Mission Field, thereby bringing first hand knowledge to our societies. Reports to be sent to Conference Prayer Partner Secretary, Mrs. Mary Huntsman, 1220 Second Street, Brownsville, Penna., by September 1.
- b. That a service, early in the conference year, be given to the local Prayer Partner Secretary for enlisting prayer partners and encouraging prayer.
- c. That, where possible each society participate in the Women's World Fellowship, meeting in twos or threes as convenient each Tuesday morning to pray for women around the world.

- d. Since we are requested by the General Prayer Partner Secretary to have a monthly prayer and fast service, we urge that all societies refrain from having meals at any missionary service since it does not become the interest of missions to be feasting when we should be praying.
- 5. a. That each society have an aggressive solicitor for the WESLEYAN MISSIONARY, whose duty it shall be to report all subscriptions to the district solicitor, send a quarterly report to the conference solicitor, Mrs. Evangeline Hannold, and strive to place the magazine in each home of the church and Sunday School. If possible, each society send at least one gift subscription to some interested family. January to be observed as subscription month.
- b. When sending in subscriptions always be sure to identify your church by its number and conference letter, Al, as published in the Conference Minutes.
- 6. a. That all society officers and delegates to annual conference be members of the Wesleyan Methodist Church. We also recommend that Conference Society Members be members of the Wesleyan Church and their local Wesleyan Missionary Society.
 - b. That each local society have a nominating committee if possible.
- c. That since the retiring president is Acting President during the Conference Session, we suggest that the Society send her to the Conference and elect the new president as delegate, assuming the expense for transportation.
- d. That each society instruct their delegate how much to pledge at the public missionary service. Unless otherwise specified pledges will be divided one-third for Home and two-thirds for Foreign Missions.
- 7. a. That each society use the designated study book, also urge the use of the program calendar and other helps. That we encourage our members to follow the Missionary Reading Course as recommended by General Conference. All literature to be obtained from the W. M. S. Literature Department, Houghton, N. Y.
- b. That each society have a program committee varying once a quarter. We suggest that the president act as chairman of said committee.
- 8. That each society be urged to respond to the Card Call Plan and thus assist in the Extension Program of the Church. All Card Call money to be sent to: Home Missionary Department, Rev. V. A. Mitchell, Secretary, 124 W. 39th St., Marion, Indiana, and stubs to be sent to Mrs. Neva Golden with the statistical blank. This not to apply on budget.
- 9. That we, when requested, send program suggestions, Sunday school Literature, flannelgraph materials and used Christmas Greeting cards to our Foreign Missions, Mountain Missions, Hephzibah Orphanage and Indian Missions. Bandages for home and foreign, when required. These to be held until a new address at Marion, Indiana is established. (Note: Bandages should be cut two to four inches wide, sewed twice in a flat seam in ten yard lengths and tightly rolled. Rolls should not exceed 3 inches in diameter. Number of pounds to be reported as Items of Interest on Annual Statistical Blank.)

That the number of boxes of used clothing sent to home missions be reported on the Statistical Blanks under Items of Interest. No monetary value to be placed thereon.

- 10. That the Red Letter Days as given in the Program Calendar be observed where possible. That Easter and April Self-Denial offerings be used for Home Missions, and Penny-a-meal offerings be used for Foreign Missions.
- 11. a. That, where possible, each society have a Mercy and Help Committee, whose duty it shall be to visit the sick and needy and give aid where necessary, and send flowers and greeting cards to shut-ins.
- b. That we encourage the giving of special remembrance gifts as recommended by General Conference for the promotion of definite missionary work as living tribute to the memory of deceased loved ones, instead of the usual extravagant floral tribute.
- 12. a. That we put forth a special effort to secure every woman in the church as a member of the society, or bring about a 10 per cent gain in membership.
 - b. That the month of September be designated as membership month.

REPORTS

- 13. That the delegates credentials be sent at least two weeks before conference to the Conference Wesleyan Missionary Secretary, Mrs. Eunice Comadoll, R. D. 2, Utica, Penna.
- 14. That statistical blanks with all vouchers not sent to the Subtreasurer, and statements, both for local church work, and "Other Objects" grouped together be sent with an itemized list attached to receipts and WITH SUFFICIENT POSTAGE, at least by May 15 to the Statistical Chairman, Mrs. Neva Golden, 1431½ E. Main Street, Reynoldsville, Pa.
- 15. That local missionary treasurers keep a record of all money paid in pledges and report the amount on each pledge, at least two weeks before Conference to the Conference W. M. S. Treasurer, Miss Elda Bence, Marion Center, Penna.
- 16. That the report of the Reading Course Secretary be sent to Mrs. Muriel Terpe, 20 South 13th St., Indiana, Penna., Conference Secretary of the Mission Reading Course, by January 15, if possible.

FINANCIAL

- 17. That \$.40 be raised for each active member for Conference entertainment and sent to the Sub-Treasurer before the books close, April 30.
- 18. That each society be assessed \$.25 per active member for General W. M. S. Administrative Fund. This is not a budget item.
- 19. That each society contribute \$5.00 or more annually for the support of Hephzibah Home, the same to be applied on budget.
- 20. That each society contribute \$3.00 or more annually to the Medical Student Fund. This not to apply on budget.
- 21. That we endeavor to raise one-quarter of the church educational budget. This is to include the L. S. U. pledges.
- 22. That \$1.00 dues be paid by all members, active and honorary. That said dues be sent, UNDIVIDED, through the local church treasurer, to the Sub-treasurer. The sub-treasurer shall divide them thus: \$.25 Foreign Missions,

\$.25 Home Missions, and \$.50 dues. All monies to be sent in at least

quarterly.

23. That each society give the delegate an appropriate amount of money for the purchasing of literature for the society and for small offerings taken during conference.

REPORT NO. 5

COMMITTEE ON RESOLUTIONS

BE IT RESOLVED:

- 1. That, since the theme of our Annual Conference is "Not by might, nor by power but by my Spirit," our Woman's Missionary Society adopt this theme for the coming year.
- 2. That we give ourselves to Bible study, systematic fasting, and intercessory prayer, and that we be "doers of the Word;" going out two by two in home visitation, believing that "Prayer and a holy purpose plus faith in Jesus Christ can accomplish anything."
- 3. a. That we do not by our indifference neglect our missionary work at home and abroad; and that we be faithful in attending our missionary services.
 - b. That we strive to obtain all of our men as honorary members.
- 4. That we give ourselves to prayerful study of the "WESLEYAN MIS-SIONARY" and other helpful material, and that we do our best to interest our people in getting the WESLEYAN MISSIONARY in other homes and institutions.
 - 5. That we adher to Scriptural methods:
- a. In raising funds for missions, by sacrificial giving. "Freely ye have received, freely give." Matt. 10:8.
- b. In our programs by abstaining from the use of movies, slides, and plays in the church.
- 6. a. That we faithfully hold to the Biblical standards of our Discipline in creating a wholesome atmosphere in our homes.
- b. That we stress the maintenance of a family altar in every home, with the children having a part. That we, as parents, faithfully instruct our children concerning the plan of salvation, urging them to obtain a personal experience, knowing that this will create in them the desire to follow Bible standards.
- c. That we encourage our children to use their own Bible, and have a regular system of memorizing scripture in the home. Psa. 119:11.

- d. That we pray faithfully for our children in school, that they may reject any erroneous teachings presented and be careful in choosing their friends and associates. That we urge parents to take a firm stand against the immodest dress and evil practices of the modern athletic and music programs.
- 7. a. That we abstain from all worldly amusements, including the theater, both private and public, the dance, cards, unwholesome radio programs, etc. That we abstain from reading or allowing our children to read comic books and other unwholesome magazines and books, and that we provide wholesome literature for our children.
- b. That since modern mixed bathing is conducive to loose morals, we urge parents to refrain from visiting and permitting their children to visit, such places of questionable amusement.
- c. That we abstain from all Sabbath descration such as buying Sunday newspapers, pleasure riding, visiting, reunions, buying, etc. Isaiah 58:13, 14. Also that we refrain from patronizing establishments open on the Sabbath Day.
- d. That we urge our people to refrain, where it is in their power, from having television sets in the home realizing that television is an evil influence, and will mean the loss of the soul if one indulges in looking at it.
- 8. a. That we who are mothers tell our children the true story of life and instruct them in the care of their bodies before they start school in order that they may hold these truths sacred and be prepared to withstand the low moral standards of this day.
- b. That we parents be companions to our children, and provide for them wholesome recreation frequently, and as far as possible know where they are and what they are doing at all times. Also, that mothers carefully select their "baby-sitters" since there is so much immorality prevalent today.
- 9. a. That we uphold by precept and example modesty of dress, as becometh holiness, by which we mean wearing dresses half-way between the knee and ankle, with long sleeves and modest neckline, which things accompany purity and deep spirituality. I Tim. 2:9, 10. Also that we adhere to Deut. 22:5, "The woman shall not wear that which pertaineth unto a manfor all that do so are an abomination unto the Lord thy God."
- b. That we refrain from the wearing of jewelry, which includes brooches and all other ornaments. Isa. 3 Also that we do not wear nude shades of hose, toeless and heelless shoes, or hats which display flowers, veiling, and other superfluous adornments. Furthermore, we urge our women to wear hose and dress modestly in the home, that we may be examples of modesty to those who approach our doors.
- c. That we do not adhere to the worldly style of cutting or curling the hair, or the long bob, I Cor. 11:15. Also we believe with John Wesley on the Scripture, I Tim. 2:9, that "broidered hair" means curled hair.
- d. That we also dress our boys and girls modestly, thus teaching them early the importance of modesty in dress. Not permitting our boys to go without shirts, to wear shorts or sheer shirts, and that our girls wear long hose, and not be allowed to wear sheer blouses, shorts or slacks.
- 10. That we urge the avoidance of unnecessary debts, and the neglecting of long standing bills.

- 11. a. That as far as possible, we refrain from patronizing establishments selling intoxicating beverages, and also that we discourage the use of tobacco in all its forms since we greatly detest the use and effect of both. II Cor. 7:1.
- b. We urge that our children be given early scientific instruction on the evils of tobacco and alcohol.
- c. That we be patriotic by displaying the American Flag in observing national holidays, thereby honoring God who gives us freedom and liberty.
- 12. That the resolutions be read in each society semi-annually, that all members be kept informed by the proposed attainments and requirements.

Prayer Partner Secretary's Report

CONVENTION MINUTES

First Day - July 10, 1959

The 28th annual Youth Convention of the Allegheny Conference convened on Stoneboro Camp Ground with the first service on July 9, 1959. At this meeting the appointments for temporary organization were read. The first business session was called to order Friday by Rev. H. E. Schmul. Rev. The Bar of Conference was set as two central tiers of seats and platform. The Vice President took the chair and the president read his report. Report was accepted as read. Efficiency standard chairman, James Hogg, reported. This report adopted. Report of executive committee on nominations for district and zone chairman read and adopted. Motion made and supported that the first goal in president's report concerning tabernacle roof be adopted. Discussion ensued. Motion carried. Second goal to supplement McKinley's pastor's salary by \$100.00 a month was made, supported and passed.

Adjourned by vote.

Second Day - July 11, 1959

The second business meeting was called to order by President Schmul. Prayer by Rev. Roy Wade. The roll was called. There was an additional report of the Committee on Credentials. The Treasurer's report was read and adopted. The Committee on Goals and Methods report was read, discussion ensued, an amendment to item 3 was lost, and the report was adopted as corrected. The report of the Efficiency Standard was read and adopted. The report of the Committee on Nominations was read. Tellers were appointed as follows: First team—David Phelps, William Cornell; Second team—William Baker, William Blair. Ballots for President were cast. The Statistical Report was read and adopted. The report of the Committee on Resolutions was read and adopted. Ballots for President were returned: H. E. Schmul receiving 106 of 110 votes was elected. Ballots for Vice President were cast.

The Wesleyan Youth Solicitor's report was read and adopted. The Prayer League Report was read and adopted. Ballots for Vice President were returned: H. E. Robertson, Jr. receiving 97 of 105 votes was elected. Jack Crouse was elected Prayer League Secretary. David Robinson was elected Youth Solicitor.

Ballots for Secretary were cast. A. Mark Larson having received 97 of 105 votes cast was elected. A report from the Finance Committee was read and discussed. A vote on the report was to be taken by ballot. Ballots for Treasurer were cast. Elwood Hannold having received 91 of 94 votes cast was elected Treasurer. James Hogg was elected Efficiency Standard Secretary.

An additional report of the Finance Committee was read and adopted by a rising vote. The result of the vote of the first item of the Finance Committee's report having to do with raising of the registration fee was passed by a 71 to 35 vote. Action was taken to chance the name of the zones in the Indiana District. This action was "that whereas the Indiana and Dixonville Zones have been operating as one zone that the name of the zone be known as the Indiana Zone of the Indiana District.

Any unfinished business was left in the hands of the Executive Committee.

THE WESLEYAN YOUTH PRESIDENT'S REPORT

to the Twenty-Eighth
Annual Youth Convention, Stoneboro, Penna.
July 9-12, 1959

Greetings to non-delinquent youth: It is a pleasure to meet and greet you on this sacred "hill top" where many young people have settled the great issue of their future. My own call to the ministry was clarified and settled late one night by an "old beech tree" not far from this tabernacle. It is our prayer that this gathering will not fall behind in the business of helping young people make their God honoring decisions. If we cease to do business for eternity, if we neglect to keep our lines clear and our purposes clean-cut, then we have no justifiable reason to continue our present expenditure of time, money, and energy. Thus far we are fully persuaded that handsome dividends have been realized from the investments made in the youth of yesterday. The need for dedicated, disciplined youth was never greater. The church of today shows signs of weariness, the church of tomorrow is quietly being harnessed with the task of carrying on the work of Christ and the church. In this errotic, atomic age, we invite and urge each of you to lay your all on the altar for sacrifice and service.

This year has brought to completion the conference youth project at Canton, Ohio. On April 19th Canton McKinley was organized with 16 full members. A value of \$40,000.00 to \$50,000.00 has been placed upon the church and parsonage. We hope to have the church debt free before the convention closes Sunday night. We feel this is a great accomplishment for our Conference Youth. It is a concrete example of the vision and vigor of the Conference Young People. Such accomplishments by our Sprit-filled youth are too often overlooked in the hastle over what to do with juvenile delinquency. We respectfully request our pastors and parents to keep faith in the youth of the church.

The district chairmen have done a good job. There is no other element of the Lord's work that demands as much love, patience and understanding as the supervision of young people. We have a great need for consecrated, dedicated men and women to work without discouragement and frustration.

The Bible Quiz on Genesis has been well received. Great credit is due Brother and Sister Lupton. They have worked long and hard to make this program interesting and spiritual. We do not have figures as to how many participated throughout the conference, but we are persuaded that a similar quiz will be held this coming year, probably on the book of Acts. Every pastor and church should make room in their schedule for such a Bible study this year. Young and old will be blessed and benefitted by it.

Our conference Wesleyan Youth won the Houghton Area Plaque last year. This makes three times out of the last four years that our conference has won the trophy. This is the highest award of our area and represents hard work and excellent cooperation. Your continued cooperation is prayerfully solicited.

We are recommending two projects for the coming year. They are very moderate in comparison with the project just completed, yet, I am sure they are of sufficient interest to inspire each youth society to do their best.

- 1. Remodel the roof and interior of the Youth Tabernacle. This is to include a new roof, with natural finish. Approximate cost \$1200.00 to us, the Women's Missionary Society has already raised \$1000.00 to assist us.
- 2. Support the Canton McKinley Pastor with our prayers and finance. The Conference has asked us to supplement his salary with \$100.00 a month for the coming year. This can be done if we all bend to the effort.

Conclusion — A total of \$2400.00 is needed to meet these goals over our regular dues and budget. This is very easily within our reach if we pray and work together as we have in the past.

Let me take this occasion to thank you for your prayers, patience and your understanding heart as we have done our best to lead our young people in the paths of "Bible holiness."

REPORT OF THE ALLEGHENY CONFERENCE WESLEYAN YOUTH SOLICITOR

We thank the Lord for His help to us during this past year and for the privilege of being gathered here once again.

The number of subscriptions to the Wesleyan Youth is not as good as it should be. The total number reported to this youth conference is only 164. This is few more than the actual number of churches in our conference. That is not good. Eight locals report that there are no subscriptions in their societies. Several with memberships in the twenties and over have fewer than four subscriptions. There are a number of reasons this is true. We ought to give at least as much support to our own magazine as we do the other official organs of our church. Our pastors ought to make definite efforts to help, and if the local WY solicitors will make a positive attempt to reach the goal presented in our efficiency standard, we can make a marked increase in the number of subscriptions in this conference.

I would like to submit the following recommendations: 1. That the local WY solicitors be required to report to the conference WY solicitor twice a year: once after the regular denominational campaign month in the fall, and also two weeks before our annual youth convention. 2. I recommend that the names and addresses of the local WY solicitors be supplied to the conference solicitor before the end of this convention or within two weeks afterward. This would follow every year.

I believe that if these things are done the conference solicitor will be better enabled to keep in touch with the locals and help to organize a more effective program. We are Wesleyan Methodists and are duty bound as members of the church to support whole-heartedly the official papers of the church. A better Christian, holiness young people's periodical than the Wesleyan Youth would be hard to find.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON GOALS AND METHODS

The Committee on Goals and Methods submits the following report:

- 1. That every church organize a Wesleyan Youth Society.
- 2. That each society send the name and address of the local W. Y. President and Secretary to the Conference W. Y. President not later than one week after election.
- 3. That each society pay annually: \$1.50 per full member for General Conference dues and \$.50 per full member for Conference dues, and request that each unorganized society pay Conference dues for each regular attender to weekly Youth meetings, and that this and all other monies to be dispersed be sent through the regular channel of local church treasurer and District sub-treasurer, books to close April 30th.
- 4. a. That our pastors and local W.Y. Presidents carefully read and do their best to carry out the program of our Efficiency Standard.
- b. That a committee composed of the Pastor, W. Y. President and Secretary or the Efficiency Standard Chairman, shall grade the local society quarterly, according to the Efficiency Standard which shall be issued in the Convention Minutes, to qualify for the Efficiency Banner. This rating shall be submitted to the Conference Efficiency Standard Chairman quarterly and the annual report two weeks before the Annual Young People's Conference.
- c. That the secretary keep such records as are necessary for this committee to make this rating.
- 5. That each W.Y. support the Pioneer project of the conference and submit pioneer money through the local W.Y. treasurer to give full credit to the W.Y.

- 6. That each W.Y. heartily support our missionary endeavor according to the requirements of the Discipline with one service a month for missions and we suggest that the offering of said meeting be given for missions.
- 7. It is suggested that each local society elect a "Wesleyan Youth" solicitor whose duty shall be to confer and cooperate with the Conference Solicitor.
- 8. That each local society strive to engage in as many of the following as possible:
 - a. Street and institutional meetings.
 - b. Cottage prayer meetings.
 - c. Tract distribution,
 - d. Door-knob evangelism.
 - e. Visitation of sick and shut-ins.
 - f. Cooperation with child evangelism, Daily Vacation Bible School, and Religious Education in public schools.
- 9. That each local WY cooperate 100% to make Wesleyan Youth Week all God wants it to be, and strive to interest other young people outside the church in these services.
- 10. a. That a local Prayer League Leader be elected to cooperate with the Conference Leader to recruit volunteers for the WY Prayer League.
- b. That the name and address of this leader be sent at once to the Conference Prayer League Leader.
- 11. That the WY augment the church and Sunday School library, or where there is none, sponsor one with good church literature approved by the pastor and adult counselor.
- 12. That each WY Society send the President, two delegates, chaperon, and pastor, with expenses paid, to the annual WY Convention.
- 13. a. That the Conference W.Y. President arrange to hold at least one service in each zone of each district during the year.
- b. That his traveling expenses be paid by a free will offering taken at the above mentioned service.
- 14. That the Districts and Zones evaluate their activities according to the following point system and an appropriate award be given to the one achieving the highest percentage.
 - 10 points for having at least 6 Rallies a year (except W. Va.)
 - 10 points for over-subscribing the Zone Pledge by 10 percent.
 - 10 points for the organization of each new society.
 - 10 points for a Paid Conference Budget for every organized society. (50 cents per member)
 - 10 points for District or Zone Youth revival.
 - 5 points for Conference dues for every unorganized society.
 - 5 points for Chairman attending Annual Conference Convention.
 - 5 points for Chairman reporting the year's activities to the Annual Conference Convention.
 - 5 points for report of Zone Rallies sent into the Conference Messenger.
 - 5 points for report of one Zone Rally sent into the Wesleyan Youth magazine.
 - 15. That 1% of the General Fund be set aside as the Literature Fund,

in order that pertinent literature be distributed to our Youth. Said literature to be approved by the Conference President, the Chairman of the Committee on Itineracy and Orders, and the Conference W.Y. President.

GOALS FOR 1959 - 1960

- 1. That we seek to have a spiritual program that is God honoring, Christ centered, and Spirit-directed.
 - 2. That all Youth Societies report to the Annual Conference Convention.
- 3. That at least 35 W.Y. Societies report their Efficiency Standard rating to the Efficiency Standard Chairman.
 - 4. That at least 5 new W.Y. Societies be organized.
 - 5. That we heartily support the Conference W.Y. projects:
 - a. Our part of the new roof in the Youth Tabernacle.
 - b. Supplement the Canton McKinley's pastor salary with \$100 a month.

COMMITTEE ON RESOLUTIONS

We, the committee on Resolutions of the Wesleyan Youth of the Allegheny Conference submit the following:

- 1. That we as Wesleyan Youth, govern our lives by adhering to the standards of the Bible and the principles set forth in the Discipline, as interpreted by the Allegheny Conference.
- a. That we, as Christian youth, have a definite plan of daily Bible reading, Bible memorization, and prayer, and accept privileges of carrying a soul burden.
- b. That we strive to have each active member of the Wesleyan youth become a member of the Wesleyan Youth Prayer League.
- a. That we refrain from reading unwholesome literature such as comics, Detective and True Story or other literature detrimental to our spiritual life.
- b. That we build Christian character through careful and extensive reading of edifying literature.
- 4. That, because of the physical, moral and spiritual degeneration resulting from the use of tobacco, narcotics and alcoholic beverages, especially among our youth, we take a vigorous stand against these evils.
- 5. That we take a positive stand against worldliness in that we refrain from the following:
- a. Card playing, games of chance, theatre attendance, public beaches, mixed bathing, dance halls (including participation in Senior Proms), skating rinks, bowling, circuses, carnivals, fairs, and viewing television.
 - b. Immodesty of dress and immoral conduct.

- c. Wearing of jewelry.
- d. Worldly amusements and worldly organized sports.
- 6. That, due to the problems of modern education, in as far as possible and advisable, we will support our own church schools with our prayers and finances.
- 7. That our societies be evangelistic in our plan of work by supporting the Sunday School and other church services, by distributing tracts, street meetings, personal work and pioneer work.
- 8. That our regular meetings be restricted to a time of spiritual uplift instead of a time of eating, drinking, and frivolity.
- 9. That each society shall appoint a proper chaperon for their group attending the annual convention, who shall be responsible for their conduct and attendance at all services of the convention; and we request the presence of the pastors.
- 10. That each society have two adult counselors, one of which shall be the pastor.
- 11. That a copy of these resolutions be posted and that they be read in the local society quarterly.

PRAYER LEAGUE SECRETARY'S REPORT

- 3. That prayer groups and special times of prayer and fasting be practiced in each local society.

The Financial Committee submits the following recommendation:

1. Due to the increase in prices and rising cost of living and whereas

the present registration fee has been insufficient to meet the need of the Youth Convention we recommend an increase in the registration fee from \$3.00 to \$5.00, with a \$1.00 pre-registration fee to be sent to the treasurer, from two to three weeks before the Convention, which at time of convention will be applied to the remaining \$4.00.

We recommend that no refunds will be made on the same.

- 2. We further recommend a plan that will benefit the families who desire to come and feel the cost is more than they can meet as a unit. Therefore, a fee of \$5.00 each for husband and wife and \$3.50 for the first child and \$2.50 for each additional child is urged. All over two years of age are included in this plan.
- 3. We recommend that each unorganized Society send \$5.00; each organized society with fifteen members or less contribute \$10.00; and each organized society with more than fifteen members contribute \$15.00 toward the expense of Youth Convention.
