JOURNAL OF DAILY PROCEEDINGS

The Kansas Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America assembled for the seventy-sixth annual session in the Conference Tabernacle at Miltonvale, Kansas, at 10:00 a. m., Thursday, August 1, 1946, with the President, the Rev. E. A. Coates in the Chair.

The devotional hour was led by President Emeritus, the Rev. F. C. Hill. After words of greetings and testimony and prayer by Sister Currie, he read from Deut. 2:8 and Philippians 4, emphasizing the truths that some things we ought to forget and some things we ought to remember. Our souls were inspired as he spoke of God's deliverances, visitations and blessings which we should remember.

Dearly beloved in the Lord; for as much as devout and holy men, as well under the law as under the gospel, moved either by expressed command of God, or by the secret inspiration of the blessed Spirit, and acting agreeably to their own reason and sense of the natural decency of things, have erected homes for God's ministers, separated to a special ministry in things spiritual in order to fill men's minds with greater reverence for God in His glorious Majesty and effect their hearts with more devotion and humility in His service; which pious works have been approved of and graciously accepted by our Heavenly Father; let us not doubt but that He will also favorably approve our godly purpose of setting apart this building as a home for those called to minister in holy things, and let us faithfully and devoutly beseech His blessing upon this our undertaking, in the name of Jesus Christ our Lord.

Prayer

Regard, O Lord, the supplication of Thy servants, and grant that whosoever shall dwell in this home shall be so yielded and dedicated to Thy service as "Vessels sanctified and meet for the Master's use, prepared unto every good work" to the end that their ministry shall be a heavenly benediction to all they meet.

Grant, O Lord, that whosoever shall enter this the home of Thy ministering servants shall be made to sense Thy presence and as they depart shall be strengthened to walk in Thy Holy Commandments. And that all who minister to the material comforts of Thy servants in this home shall by Thee be richly rewarded.

Grant, O Lord, that all who come to this home for spiritual counsel and comfort, shall by Thy blessing be made to both perceive and know what things they ought to do, and may have power and strength to fulfill the same.

Grant, O Lord, that whosoever shall be joined together in holy estate of matrimony in this home may faithfully perform and keep the vow and covenant between them made, and may remain in perfect love together unto their lives' end.

Grant, O Lord, we beseech Thee, that at the family altar of this home when prayer with thanksgiving and supplications shall be offered that they may receive from Thy hand such things as are requisite and necessary. Also, that as Thy servants study and search Thy Word that divine illumination for life and duty may be given as in Thy infinite wisdom Thou shalt see to be most expedient for them; all of which we ask for Jesus Christ's sake, our most blessed Lord and Savior.

(Appropriate Sermon) Dedicatory Prayer

O most glorious Lord, we acknowledge that we are not worthy to offer unto Thee anything belonging to us; yet we beseech Thee, in Thy great goodness, graciously to accept the dedication of this home to Thy service, and to prosper this our undertaking; receive the prayers and intercessions of all Thy servants who shall call upon Thee in this home; and give them grace to prepare their hearts to serve Thee with reverence and godly fear; affect them with a solemn apprehension of Thy Majesty, and a deep sense of their own unworthiness; that those who dwell in this home may walk before Thee with lowliness and devotion, with clean thoughts and pure hearts, with bodies undefiled, and minds sanctified, that they may always perform a service acceptable to Thee; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

We, the Kansas Conference, petition the General Conference to amend (a) paragraph 334 sub-division (1) by inserting the following sentence after the first sentence "The Superintendent and Assistant Superintendent shall be elected by ballot at the annual election of the church as provided in paragraph 165, sub-paragraph (4)" and adding the "other" between the first two words of sentence two, making the whole to read, "The officers of the Sunday school shall be Superintendent, Assistant Superintendent, Secretary, Assistant-Secretary, Treasurer, Librarian and others that may be necessary in the work of the school. The Superintendent and Assistant Superintendent shall be elected by ballot at the election of the church as provided in paragraph 165, sub-paragraph (4). The other officers and teachers shall be nominated by the Local Sunday School Board and shall be elected at a business meeting of the church, held for that purpose."

(b) Paragraph 165, sub-paragraph (4) by omitting the word "and" before the words "Church Clerk" in sentence one and by adding "Sunday School Superintendent and Assistant Superintendent" to the end of the sentence, making it read, "To call a meeting of each church on his pastoral charge within thirty days of the next session of the Annual Conference, for the purpose of revising the roll of membership of the same, and the election of church officers, standing committees (except pulpit supply as

provided for in paragraph 86), stewards, class leaders, church clerk, Sunday school Superintendent and Assistant Sunday School Superintendent."

Resolution—Miltonvale Wesleyan College—The following resolution concerning Miltonvale Wesleyan College was approved and the Secretary was instructed to send a copy to the General Board:

Resolutions Concerning Miltonvale Wesleyan College

To the Book Committee of the Wesleyan Methodist Church and to the Local Board of Managers of Miltonvale Wesleyan College and to the members of the Conferences of the Miltonvale Area, we, the Kansas Conference, wish to submit the following recommendations concerning our school at Miltonvale:

Whereas, there is need for a school in our Area that can fully meet the demands placed upon our youth in this generation, and

Whereas, our Local and General Board of Managers have approved a five-year achievement program to build at Miltonvale sufficient facilities for a four-year fully accredited college, and

Whereas, there has been extended to each Conference the privilege of finding attractive offers for the relocation of our school, and nothing tangible has been offered, and

Whereas, Miltonvale, Kansas, has served well as a location for our school for thirty-seven years and its name means much to an Alumni Association and a large constituency, and

Whereas, our school is free of debt, and over \$50,000.00 has been raised in cash and pledges for a building program at Miltonvale, and

Whereas, there is no spiritual, moral or social reason for moving our school elsewhere,

Be it Resolved:

That we give unanimous support to the continued location of our school at Miltonvale,

That we assure the school full support in the five-year achievement program,

That we pledge ourselves as a Conference to a greater support of the New Building Program at Miltonvale as an expression of appreciation for the school's being in our Conference,

That we continue to urge all our youth in the bounds of our Conference to attend Miltonvale College, and

That we will back any honest effort put forth at Miltonvale to provide employment for students, and

That we express appreciation for our retiring President, C. Floyd Hester, for the noble and efficient work he has done for our college through difficult and strenuous years, and

That we hereby pledge full support to our new President, Rev. Rufus Reisdorph, in the great task he is undertaking.

It is with regret that our loss shows a loss of 50 in subscriptions to the Wesleyan Methodist, but a slight gain in Missionary Magazines and Wesleyan Youths; also an increase in pastors' salaries of \$4.50 per month; a gain in Sunday-school attendance of 60, and two new churches added.

Take heed to budget items. Our report shows all Connectional items except Sunday School are overpaid and all Conference items are underpaid. Our total for all purposes increase was \$28,925.82.

May we, "Forgetting those things which are behind, and reaching forth unto those things which are before, press toward the mark for the prize of the high calling of God in Christ Jesus."

due credit to the Charge and to the Conference.

7. Unleavened Bread. Resolved, That it be the sense of this Conference that all our churches use unleavened bread in the administration of the Lord's Supper. We suggest the following recipe: One-third cup flour, one teaspoon butter (heaping), moisten with milk enough to roll. Mark in one-inch squares and bake as pie dough. The above will serve 50 persons.

8. Pastor Nominates Stewards. Resolved, That it be the sense of this Conference that the pastor be granted the privilege of nominating one

member of the Board of Stewards from each church on his charge.

9. President's Duties. Resolved, That the Conference President shall, First, travel the Conference and hold one half of the Quarterly Meetings, Second, urge the proper repair and insurance of church property, Third, call a meeting of the Board of Stewards and help arrange a workable financial plan for that church.

10. Vacations. Resolved, That the Conference President be granted a vacation over two Sundays, that the greater part of three weeks might be taken if desired, and that he be given two week's pay in addition to his

regular salary at the time he chooses for vacation.

Resolved, That we recommend that each charge grant their pastor a one week Sunday leave of absence from his work, that the greater part of two weeks might be used for vacation and that the church give him one week's pay in addition to his regular salary at the time he may choose for vacation.

11. Nominating Committee. Resolved, That we elect a Committee of five elders, including the President ex-officio, and three delegates-elect, from three churches designated by the Conference to: First, examine all credentials that are in the hands of the committee at the time of it's first meeting. Second, nominate all sessional committees and be prepared to report at the first session of the Conference. Third, nominate the personnel of all Conference Boards and report at an early session of the Conference. Fourth, nominate the Committee Chairman for next year. Fifth, nominate the District Chairmans. Sixth, nominate a minister of the gospel to preach the Conference sermon next year.

Theological Institute. Resolved, That the traveling expense of instructors to and from the Institute be paid from the Conference Fund, and also such books as may be needed.

13. Superannuate Service. Resolved, That one public service in each

Annual Conference Session be set aside in honor of the Superannuate Ministers and for the purpose of creating interest in the Superannuate Fund and that it be the duty of the Second Vice-President to arrange for such a service.

- 14. Superannuate Constitution. Resolved, That the Constitution of the Kansas Superannuate Association be printed in the Conference Minutes once in five years, and that a note be carried regularly in the Resolutions stating the year of last publication. (Published in 1943 Minutes.)
- 15. 1 Per Cent Assessment. Resolved, That we require all active ministers to pay one per cent of their cash salary to the Superannuate Fund, this not to be applied on budget.
- 16. Conference Loans. Resolved, That the Conference Treasurer shall issue no loans from any Conference monies except by sanction of the Conference Board of Trustees.
- 17. Additional Delegate. Resolved, That when more than one delegate from any one church presents credentials to this body, there shall appear in the credentials the name of the elder that entitles the church to the additional delegate.
- 18. Fiscal Year. Resolved, That the fiscal year of the local church close ten days before Conference and that the statistical report be made on the basis of money received up to that time. That the pastors mail immediately to the Conference Treasurer the complete Statistical Report and budget receipts, who shall check them and give them to the Statistical Chairman, who shall then be prepared to report at an early session of Conference.
- 19. Pastors Paid Through Conference. Resolved, That the church's financial obligation to the pastor, whether he be leaving the field or not, be extended throughout the Conference and Camp Meeting period.
- 20. Orders of the Day Committee. Resolved, That the Camp Meeting and Campground Committee be permanently the Committee on Orders of the Day, to prepare ahead of time the Conference Program for publication in the "Visitor."
- 21. Camp Meeting Committee. Resolved, That the President of the W. Y. P. S. be a member ex-officio of the Camp Meeting Committee.
- 22. Trustees Authorized. Resolved, That all action heretofore taken by the Trustees of the Annual Conference in the interim between the meetings of such Annual Conference concerning the purchase or conveyance of real estate are hereby approved and confirmed and held to be as binding upon the Annual Conference as they would have been if such actions had been specifically authorized by the Annual Conference.

Resolved, That the duly elected and qualified Trustees of the Annual Conference are hereby authorized and directed to take such necessary actions as to them may seem proper and expedient and to the best interest of

the Annual Conference and the local churches concerning the purchase, sale, mortgaging and conveyance of real estate during the interim between the meeting of the Annual Conference and all such actions so taken by the Trustees shall be deemed to be legal and binding upon the Annual Conference and as full force and effect as they would have been if such actions on the part of the Trustees had been specifically authorized by the Annual Conference.

23. Introduction of New Business. Resolved, That all introduction of new business of such a nature as to require an election must be presented

not later than noon of the third day of Conference.

24. Installation of Officers. Resolved, That all Conference Officers continue in office until the close of the annual session of the Conference when there shall be an installation service held, for the installation of the officers as are to appear in the Conference Minutes: this service to be arranged by the Pastoral Relations Committee.

25. Pastors—Released for Meetings. Resolved, That we earnestly request each of our churches to release its pastor for one meeting of three weeks length to be held on a new field or on one of the weaker charges under the direction of the Missionary Board, and that the church pay his

salary during his absence.

26. Engaging Pastors. Resolved, That charges when engaging a pas-

tor take note of paragraphs 86 and 131 in the Discipline.

27. Conference and Camp Date. Resolved, That Conference convene at 10:00 a. m. on Tuesday nearest August First and that our Camp Meeting begin Saturday evening of the same week.

REPORTS

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

In Mark's Gospel we read that Mary of Bethany broke the alabaster box containing sweet perfume, that the treasure might never be used for any other purpose than that of the anointing of Jesus. We also read in the same account that Judas, posing as a practical benevolent man, looks on enviously and says, "Why this waste?"

'Tis true the ointment was precious. It resembled our present-day Attar of Roses, of which 150 pounds of roses are required to make one pound. It represented the work of an entire year for one man. The container which held this precious ointment was a flask of some description which was hermetically sealed, which fact indicated that it must be broken to obtain any portion of the perfume. We do not know what effort or what sacrifice was required on the part of Mary to obtain it, but whatever the cost we see her breaking the box and pouring the contents profusely on the head of her Lord. It was an outpouring that had no reservation, but rather a fountain of love, bent only on expressing itself without regard to cost. How representative it is of the outpouring of life that asks no pay. To reach a constant, flaming love for God, we must be willing to break all boxes in which is bound the very essence of our lives. Sometimes it is a box of some secret, almost unknown, reserve in the will, a half timid, half-tearful holding back of ourselves from some line of duty, some road of suffering, or from some lonely and strange looking path of service. These may often scarcely be perceived, but form deep reservations from a boundless abandonment to God. This is the box to be broken.

Mary lived to see that her alabaster box was a fitting type of the spotless body of Jesus, which was utterly broken; and the spikenard of His life was poured out to the last drop for her redemption. But more than that the very life of the Infinite Christ is poured out through us in the proportion that we are broken.

What great dividends are paid to those who give their all. I am sure your hearts have been awe-inspired as you have studied of the life of Hudson Taylor and his co-workers, as they spear-headed deeper and deeper into the vast recesses of China. The success which awaited them because of their self-denial was an inspiration to their faith. But we have some modern parallels to these lives in the consecrated workers which have manned our Mission Fields in other days and who are on the fields today. May the Lord richly bless these poured-out lives.

There is still the conservative, like Judas, who is shocked at the expense of doing things for God, and wonder at the consecration of God's

holy ones. Yet this pouring out of ourselves is the last and sweetest stage of the Christ-life on earth. It lends fragrance to all with whom we come in contact, and unwittingly our own lives are enriched. When Mary wiped the feet of Jesus with her hair, the perfume came back upon her own head. Those who give the most receive the most. That which is poured out in loving service to God now, will some day settle back as sweet odor upon our heads.

PLAN OF WORK

We, the Committee on Plan of Work, hereby recommend:

Division 1. Local Work

- 1. That the President review the Plan of Work and keep the seasonal items before the Society.
 - 2. That we observe at least four of the "Red Letter Days.":
- A. Harvest Home Day, October 18. We urge each Society to send cash or donations to the Harvest Home Committee to receive credit on the Educational Budget.
- B. Easter—Programs and offerings for Home Missions Connectionally supported.
- C. The World Day of Prayer—We recommend that the District Organizers make definite plans for the observance either by District or Local Societies.
- D. May Day to be known as gift day, gifts of clothing, bandages, money, or other articles such as can be sent out with outgoing missionaries or used on home fields.

Before sending donations please secure information concerning proper addresses. (See Magazine Directory.)

- E. Wesleyan Missionary Day.
- 3. That each Society elect annually a Magazine Solicitor to secure new subscriptions and renewals.
- 4. That each Society establish a circulating Missionary Library and thereby stimulate the reading of Missionary books; and that a record of books read be kept by each reader on Activity Record in Program Booklets.

(NOTE—Library to be in hands of a librarian elected by the Society. Allow no books to become part of library which have not first been approved by Pastor of the church and President of the W. H. & F. M. S.)

- 5. That we recommend the use of a monthly envelope system for the collection of dues, the Treasurer to keep record of the amounts paid in.
- 6. That all local dues be sent to our Missionary Treasurer, Mrs. Bertha Wilson, 647 Watson Ave., Topeka, Kansas. One-half of the same to be applied on Missionary Budget. Please designate specifically where

the credit is desired. (See Treasurer's book, Item C. under Number 4). Honorary membership dues apply on Missionary Budget.

7. That all money be disbursed through our Local and Conference W. H. & F. M. S. Treasurers. That all money or receipts applying on budget be sent from the local W. H. & F. M. S. Treasurer to the Conference W. H. & F. M. S. Treasurer quarterly.

That this money be in the hands of the Conference Treasurer at least two weeks before Conference.

- 8. That each Society contribute 5 cents per active member to pay General Conference Delegates expenses.
- 9. That each Society contribute at least \$6.00 for Home Missions Connectionally supported.
- 10. That an effort be made by each Society to secure subscriptions to the Card Call Plan either by individuals or by Societies.
- 11. That we urge each Society to contribute at least \$5.00 to the Hephzibah Orphanage, except in cases where the church budget is less than \$5.00.
- 12. That we urge each society to contribute \$5.00 for the W. H. & F. M. S. Assembly room in the new building.
- 13. That, since the Kansas Conference has a candidate for Medical Missionary work, the interests of Medical Missions in the local societies and conventions and offerings be taken.
- 14. That each local President appoint a committee whose duty shall be to contact the sick in person or by correspondence and to work in harmony with the pastor in rendering assistance that will help in reaching souls and building up the Kingdom of God.
- 15. That the President of each local Society be made responsible to arrange with the pastor for one evening of the third week each month to pray especially for mission work, the same to be preceded by a day of fasting. We also recommend that an offering be taken at each of these services as follows:
 - A. September for Child Evangelism.
 - B. October and November for Education.
 - C. December for Orphanage.
 - D. January and February for Kansas Conference Missions.
 - E. March and April for Home Missions.
 - F. May and June for Foreign Missions.
 - G. July for the Wesleyan Hope Mission, Kansas City, Mo.
- 16. That in harmony with the recommendations of the General Society we urge that our ladies observe Friday of each week as a day of fasting and prayer for a Connection-wide revival until it comes.
- 17. That we use material printed in the Wesleyan Missionary, also the new study book "Adventures with God" in our regular meetings.

- 18. That the annual report be prepared by the President, Secretary, and Treasurer of the local Society, which serves as an audit of the Treasurer's report. One copy to be sent to Committee on Statistics. Ruby Anderson, 410 Monroe Street, Topeka, Kansas, two weeks before Conference. The duplicate to be brought to Conference by the Delegate. Place the name of the President for the coming year on the back of the report blank.
- 19. That each Society grade themselves by the Efficiency Standard. A grade of 10 per cent will be given on each of any ten points chosen. Societies making 100 per cent will be placed on the Honor Roll.
- 20. That the President of each Society be responsible for the reading of the Moral Reform at some suitable service during the year.
- 21. That the President of each Society appoint a committee of two to see the gathering of supplies and cash for the Conference dining hall.
- 22. That the President of each local Society appoint a Committee to cooperate with the Temperance Superintendent of the Sunday School in observance of Temperance Sunday and distribution of Temperance literature.
- 23. That November be Men and Missions Month. Program shall be sponsored by the men.
- 24. That our Conference goal for the coming year be 775 members, 325 honorary members, 600 magazines and \$15,000 apportionment. We urge that each Society make a gain in the above.

Division II. Conference Work

- 25. That the President and District Organizer arrange the time and recommend the worker for Conventions or Conference visitation.
- 26. That each District be supervised by the District Organizer under the direction of the Conference President.
 - 27. That the Districts are as follows:

Lawrence District—St. Louis, Mo.; Kansas City, Mo.; Kansas City, Kansas; Ottawa, Paola, Lawrence, and Leavenworth.
