JOURNAL OF DAILY PROCEEDINGS

Fairmount, Indiana, August 13, 1945.

The ninety-seventh session of the Indiana Annual Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church convened on the Campground at 7:30 P. M. August 13th.

An inspirational song service was conducted by the Rev. Noel Winterholter singing the old fashioned songs that are full of meaning, namely, "All Hail the Power of Jesus Name," "The Solid Rock," "What a Friend We Have in Jesus," "Have Thy Way, Lord," and "Revive Us Again."

The message of the hour was delivered by the Rev. V. S. Vardaman from the text in Lamentations 3:40. "Let us search and try our ways and turn again unto the Lord." The theme was "The Revival We Need." Seven essential requirements were stressed for an old fashioned revival. The benediction was pronounced by the Rev. Loren Van Matre.

Tuesday, 8:30 a.m.

The first business session convened on Tuesday, August 14, 8:30 a.m. The song service was conducted by the Rev. Emerson Chapman.

Rev. E. L. Kierstead was in charge of the devotions. He spoke on the theme "Seeing Life Through" and took as the basis of his remarks Job 27:6. "My righteousness I hold fast," gave Biblical examples of both failure and success.

Rev. A. E. Beyler led in prayer.

The meeting was then called to order by the President, the Rev. A. M. Jackson.

The roll was called with 75 Elders, 28 Conference Preachers, and 78 delegates responding to the call of their names.

The Conference was then declared open for business. Upon vote the Conference bar was fixed as the first five tiers of seats in front, six tiers on either side and including the rostrum.

A motion was made and carried that the time for Conference to convene be fixed at 8:30 a.m. and 2:00 p.m.; to adjourn at 11:30 a.m. and upon motion in the afternoon.

The President read his annual address which upon vote was approved. The President then reported his official acts which upon vote were adopted. See Report No. 1.

The report of the Appointment of Chairmen of Committees by the President was adopted. See Report No. 1.

The President's report of the Calendar of Business was upon motion adopted. See Report No. 1.

The President's Report upon Special Orders was adopted. See Report No. 1.

The President then read two Recommendations to the Conference:

No. 1. I recommend that the Young People's Society, the Conference Missionary Society, and the Sunday School Board use the same Districts in the Conference to avoid confusion. In order to work out districts that will be satisfactory to all these departments, I recommend that the W. Y. P. S., the W. H. & F. M. S. and the Sunday School Board each have a representative on a Committee to District the Conference and report the same to this body before this session closes. I further recommend that the Conference Sunday School Secretary be the representative from the Sunday School Board to serve on this Committee.

It was moved and carried that the above recommendation be adopted.

No. 2. I recommend that this Conference elect two men to travel instead of three. The President to hold Quarterly Meetings and to have general supervision of the work of the Conference. The other man to hold Quarterly Meetings each week and promote and supervise the Missionary work of the Conference during the week. Further details to be worked out by the Committee on Finance and Appropriation.

A motion to refer this recommendation to the Committee on Finance and Appropriations was carried.

The Conference then proceeded to the election of Committees which resulted as follows:

The following resolution was presented by the Rev. E. J. Mills: "I move that this Conference elect a standing committee of three, whose duties it shall be to seek ways and to suggest methods of procedure which may conserve the time of the Conference and expedite the business of the sessions: This committee shall make its recommendations to the Conference at such

times as it may see fit and concerning any matter in the disposition of which the time of the Conference may be conserved by different methods of procedure."

J. Mills. Any needed organization may be developed at the time and place of the Preacher's meeting.

Item III. We recommend that the Vice-President appoint one preacher from each district to serve as a member of the Plans and Program committee for the year at the next session of the Annual Conference.

This report was adopted upon motion.

The Committee on Radio gave the following report:

I. The Conference Radio Secretary shall work in cooperation with the Rev. C. F. Clifton, to make the Wesleyan Radio Hour a success.

II. The Conference Radio Secretary shall urge offerings to be taken by each local Church and the same to be forwarded to Rev. C. F. Clifton by the Radio Secretary elected by the local church.

III. The expenses incidental to the Secretary's work shall be taken from the above fund.

Upon motion was adopted.

Rev. Kenneth Dunn was elected as Conference Radio Secretary.

The resignation of the Rev. E. L. Kierstead as Superintendent of the Sunday School District Number one was accepted.

Rev. M. L. Bell was elected to fill the above vacancy.

Rev. Noel Winterholter resigned his position as chairman of the Auditing Committee.

Rev. Emerson Chapman was elected as chairman to fill the above vacancy.

The President nominated and the Conference elected the Rev. Loren Van Matre and Oren Felton as his Advisory Board.

In conforming with the requirements of the Discipline, Section 8, Paragraph 137, it was moved and carried that this conference elect a carpenter

on the Board on Church and Parsonage Buildings and Location, and that the remainder of this Board be elected by the Missionary Board.

Upon motion was adopted.

Rev. Garl Beaver was elected for the above position.

It was moved and carried that when we adjourn we adjourn to meet at the call of the chair.

RESOLUTIONS AND LAWS OF THE INDIANA CONFERENCE

- 1. Our houses of worship should not be open to any evangelist or minister of any other church to hold a series of meetings or to maintain a regular appointment for another congregation; provided, however, that usual denominational courtesies be extended to other ministers in occasional appointments. A waiving of the above by a contract or lease of building must be obtained through the Board of Trustees of the Indiana Conference.
- 2. That the Committee on Itineracy and Elder's Orders shall require all those desiring to unite with us from any other denomination or Annual Conference to present credits equivalent to our Conference Course of Study, regardless of their standing in the body of which they have been a member, and if they cannot do this they shall be required to meet the same conditions as our local preachers before ordination.
- 3. Any candidate for Elder's Orders or traveling under the direction of the Conference, who fails to attend the Institutes and the examinations of the Committee, without sufficient cause, shall be deemed unworthy of the trust and care of souls, and refused a place among us as a minister of the Gospel, and when they shall fail to attend the Institute for two successive years they shall be dropped from the roll.
- 4. The Committee on Elder's Orders is to transfer all persons to the study list who may have been recommended to travel and may not have been given work.
- 5. All charges with a membership of twenty-five or more shall in addition to the regular stipulated salary, assume the responsibility of providing a suitable home in which the Pastor may live.
- 6. It is the duty of the Pastors to look after the insurance of our church and parsonage properties. All insurance shall provide for losses caused by fire and lightning, hail and tornado. A failure on the part of the Pastor shall be a censurable offense. If the church fails to insure their property upon reasonable effort of the pastor to secure the same, then said failure shall be reported to the President of the Conference who shall then have the property insured. In such case all insurance monies received from losses by fire, lightning, hail, and tornado shall be used in Church Extension work as the Conference Board of Trustees considers best.
- 7. All charges and stations to which a Pastor shall move shall pay the moving and transportation expenses of said Pastor, the same to be done in addition to his salary. When the Conference demands the services of any

one, that it shall bear the moving expenses, if any expense shall thus be incurred.

- 8. Each Pastor shall file a duplicate statistical report with the Committee before the close of the fifth day of August with the exception of Pastor's salary and Membership. These items to be reported the first day of Conference, said report to be kept on file one year. The Pastor shall report in open Conference the amount of Pastor's salary received, the amount of Budget assigned and raised, loss or gain in membership, the number of Wesleyan Methodist papers, Missionary magazines and Young People's Journals taken. The official character of any pastor shall not be passed until he shall have submitted a satisfactory report, including statistics.
- 9. All unaccounted for members appearing in the statistics in the membership list shall be referred to the discontinued list. All members in excess of the number reported shall be reported received.
- 10. The President shall receive \$100.00, the Vice-President \$35.00, the Secretary \$100.00, the Treasurer \$300.00, the Assistant Secretary \$50.00, each member of the Auditing Committee \$10.00, each member of the Statistical Committee \$40.00; the same to be paid from the Conference Missions and Expense Fund. The Conference Sunday school Secretary shall receive \$75.00 and each member of the Conference Sunday school Board \$25.00, the same to be paid out of the Sunday school Treasury.
- 11. In the examination of characters the Conference officials shall be called first.
- 12. The Conference shall elect three members of the Camp Meeting Committee, one to be elected each year for a term of three years.
- 13. The Pastor shall bring a report to each Quarterly Meeting and send a duplicate to the Conference President quarterly on blanks furnished by the Conference.
- 14. We believe that the healing of the body is among the gifts of the Spirit according to 1 Corinthians 12:7-11, hence not for all Christians at all times as it is not always the will of God to heal the body.
- 15. No charge shall call any one as pastor, or to supply the work by ministers coming from other **denominations** as long as there are ministers in our Conference qualified and available to take work. The President after he has exercised his prerogative in the reception of ministers coming from other denominations, is to immediately refer them to the Committee on Itineracy and Elder's Orders, who shall make a thorough investigation as to the ministry and life of such applicants, who shall report their findings to the President, after which, appointments may be made.

- 16. The Treasurers shall submit their reports to the Auditing Committee who shall audit the same and in their report to this body they shall show they have audited the same.
- 17. The Board of Trustees shall authorize all disbursements not otherwise provided for.
- 18. Each Pastor whose total pastor's receipts exceed \$1500.00 a year shall seek to organize a new class or give his services in a revival meeting to one of the weaker churches—whose total pastor's receipts are \$1000.00 or less—to help establish it. And that the church which he pastors grant him such privileges without censure and that with full remuneration of salary while in such a meeting. And that the Vice-President of the Conference serve as a Co-ordinator, to recommend and help arrange such meetings.
- 19. The Storehouse Tithing Plan is the Conference plan for financing the Church work and the following percentage basis is the rule for distributing the same: Local Church Work, 70%; Budget, 30%. A Tithing Secretary be elected and that one evening service in the Conference Session be given for a Tithing Service and all Tithing Bands or churches of the Conference be called to give their yearly report, and some minister be chosen to preach on the Storehouse Tithing Plan. The expenses of Tithing Literature and Postage are to be paid from the Conference Claims Fund and churches desiring literature may secure the same from the Tithing Secretary. This service is a Special Order of the Conference.
- 20. The Assistant Secretary is to act as reporter of the Conference and Camp Meeting to the Marion daily papers.
- 21. The first Sunday of the Annual gathering belongs to the old year, and the second Sunday of the Annual gathering belongs to the new year.
- 22. The Camp Meeting Committee shall nominate and the Conference elect the one to preach the opening sermon of the next Conference Year with his alternate.
- 23. The President of the Conference, Vice-President and Conference Evangelist shall be given each year a two weeks' vacation with pay, said vacation to be at a time of their own choosing.
- 24. When churches which have been placed in the hands of the President, if they can and do decide as to who shall be their pastor before the Minutes are sent to the press, the same shall be entered in the minutes the same as if ordered by this Conference.
- 25. In case of an emergency the President and the Board of Trustees are empowered to make a special assessment to meet the need, and the funds are to be sent to the Conference Treasurer and credited to the Sick Preachers Benefit fund.

- 26. Each charge shall grant to its pastor each year a two weeks' vacation with pay.
- 27. No pastor whose total receipts are \$1500.00 or more shall hold more than two revivals yearly away from his charge, one of which is mentioned in resolution number 18, unless by consent of the President and his Advisory Committee.
- 28. All building and repair on Conference property which the local church is unable to provide for satisfactorily shall pass the approval of the Conference Building Committee before obligations are assumed.
- 29. The use of the wedding ring is not in accord with our standards as a Church, therefore we as a Conference disapprove of our ministers performing or taking part in the ring ceremony.
- 30. When recommendations to travel and to study preparatory to travel are presented to the Conference in session, they shall be recorded by the Secretary and automatically referred to the Committee on Itineracy and Elders Orders, without having been read to the Conference.
- 31. The Sunday school offerings of the first Sunday of each month shall be divided equally by the local treasurer between Connectional Home Missions and Conference Missions and Expense Fund until these budgets are in full. The same shall be forwarded to the Conference Treasurer, quarterly.
- 32. The Storehouse Tithing Plan is the financial plan of the Conference; therefore, we urge our churches to conform to this plan.
- 33. The Camp Meeting Committee shall have the privilege of putting out pledge cards in the congregation, receiving these pledges from friends, taking cash offerings throughout the Camp and designating one or two nights during the Camp as "dollar night." All Camp Meeting pledges shall be sent to the Treasurer of the Camp Meeting Association.
- 34. The Board of Trustees are authorized to act as the Conference Missionary Board.
- 35. Delegate's Credentials shall be mailed to the Assistant Secretary by the pastor not later than ten days before the convening of Conference, and he shall notify the Secretary of the number of credential blanks needed before the Fourth Quarterly Meeting.
- 36. Each Annual Conference shall be held at Fairmount, Indiana, beginning on the Tuesday nearest August 15th.
- 37. The President and his advisory board shall be consulted before any love offering shall be taken.

Report No. 3

REPORT OF SUNDAY SCHOOL BOARD

We, your Conference Sunday School Board respectfully submit the following report.

We are happy to report that the statistics reveal a healthy increase in the various departments of the Sunday School.

Thirty schools conducted D. V. B. S., the total enrollment of which was 1369 with an average attendance of 1072. This is a gain of 30%.

Ninety-two schools were reported last year in the statistical report, but we received 102 reports for Rally Day with a total attendance of 7899 or an average of 77 per school. One hundred schools reported on the Thanksgiving Day Offering. We certainly appreciate the co-operation of the pastors and workers who helped to make possible this splendid showing.

Recommendations:

- 1. We recommend that the Sunday School apportionment be 10 cents per member enrollment in the main school.
- We recommend the Tuesday night of Conference be designated as Sunday School night.
- 3. We recommend that Sunday, Sept. 30th be Sunday School Rally Day and that the pastors make a special effort for a record attendance. Also that announcement be made of a Special Offering on Rally Day to apply on the purchase of a house for the Conference President. A report of the Rally Day attendance and offering be sent at once to the Conference Sunday School Secretary and the offering be forwarded to the Conference Treasurer.
- 4. We recommend that conventions be held in each of the Districts during the week of October 16th to 26th. These dates and places are arranged.

5. We recommend that the District and the Superintendents for the same be as follows:

District No. 1. Albion, Edgerton, Ft. Wayne, Ft. Wayne Mission, Greens Chapel, Laotto, Larwill, Silver Lake, and Warsaw, M. L. Bell, Superintendent.

District No. 2. Beaver Creek, Davis, Dowagiac, Elkhart, Hamlet, Plymouth, Shiloh, South Bend, Star, Argos, and Hudson Lake. George Ott, Superintendent.

District No. 3. Division 1. Bluffton, Bryant, Pleasant Grove, Pleasant Valley, Portland, South Salem, and Uniondale.

Division 2. Huntington, Lancaster, Marion (George St.), Marion (Nelson St.), Marion (Horton St.), Monument City, Mt. Etna, Plummer's Chapel, and Warren. G. A. Appleman, Superintendent.

District No. 4. Amboy, Converse, Laketon, Logansport, Marion (West 8th St.), Miami, Peru (First Church), Peru (Second Church), Pleasant Grove, Santa Fe, Sims, and Wabash. C. A. Hoover, Superintendent.

District No. 5. Division 1. Elwood, Greentown, Kokomo (North Church), Kokomo (South Church), Mt. Olive, Mt. Zion (Howard County), and Tipton.

Division 2. Fowler, Hoopeston, LaFayette, Monticello, and Thorntown.

Report No. 4

COMMITTEE ON FINANCE AND APPROPRIATION

We, your Committee on Finance and Appropriation, submit the following report:

We recommend the following appropriation:

Item I. A. That the Budget Apportionment per member be as follows: Foreign Missions, \$2.00; Connectional Home Missions, \$1.00; Connectional Education, \$1.50; Orphanage, 25 cents; Conference Missions and Expense Fund, \$2.00; Camp Meeting Expense Fund, 75 cents; Superannuated Ministers Fund, 50 cents; Sick Preachers Benefit Fund, 25 cents. That all church budget excepting that raised by the W. H. and F. M. S. and Y. M. W. B. and the W. Y. P. S. be sent to the Treasurer of the Conference.

B. That receipts for Educational money sent through the W. H. and F. M. S. the Y. M. W. B. and the W. Y. P. S. be sent to the Treasurer of the Conference.

C. That the Conference Sunday School apportionment be 10 cents per enrolled member in the main school.

D. That the price of the Conference Minutes shall be 25 cents per copy with an allotment of one copy of the minutes for every six members; and should any deficit in this fund occur, that it be paid from Conference Missions and Expense Fund.

E. That the W. Y. P. S. Connectional dues be 50 cents per active member of the W. Y. P. S.

Item II. We recommend that there be three men in full time conference work. The Conference President, Vice-President, and a Conference Missionary Evangelist.

That the President shall have supervision of the general work of the Conference and shall not be required to hold more than 30 quarterly meetings during the year.

He shall be assisted by the Vice-President and the Missionary Evangelist, both of whom shall devote their full time to holding of quarterly meetings and Conference Extension in new or needy fields within the bound of the Conference.

The Vice-President and the Missionary Evangelist shall be responsible for the promotion of the Conference Missionary work, but under the supervision of the Conference President and the Missionary Board.

The President, Vice-President and the Missionary Evangelist shall work jointly and co-operatively in planning the program of the quarterly meetings and of Conference Extension work.

And we further recommend that at least one quarterly meeting be held on each charge during the year by one of these officials.

- Item III. We recommend that the salary of the President be \$2400.00 per year and expenses incidental to his work; and the salary of the Vice-President and the Conference Missionary Evangelist shall be \$2100.00 each per year and expenses incidental to their work.
- Item IV. We recommend that the Conference Trustees purchase a home, within the next year if possible, which is to be centrally located in the Conference, the same to be paid for through the Sunday School and to be called the Conference President's Home.
- Item V. Knowing the fine co-operation and support that has been given to the larger program of Evangelism and Church Extension, we recommend that this plan be continued. That this fund be raised by special appeals to our churches, Sunday Schools and W. Y. P. S. organizations, by the Conference President, Vice-President and Missionary Evangelist. This Fund is to be under the supervision of the Conference Missionary Board. All money raised for this fund to be sent to the Conference Treasurer.
- Item VI. We recommend that the proposed building program for Marion College be continued as recommended by the Local Board of Managers and passed by the Book Committee, and that the Conference accept the goal of \$2.00 per member per year for a three year campaign for this purpose. The same to be sent to the Treasurer of Marion College.
- Item VII. We recommend that standing rule No. 10 be changed (page 31) to read as follows: The President shall receive \$100.00, the Vice-President \$35.00, the Secretary \$100.00, the assistant Secretary \$50.00, the Treasurer \$300.00, each member of the Auditing Committee \$10.00, each member of the Statistical Committee \$40.00, the same to be paid from the Conference Missions and Expense Fund and to begin at this Conference session. The Conference Sunday School Secretary shall receive \$75.00 and each member of the Conference Sunday School Board \$25.00, the same to be paid out of the Sunday School Treasury.
- Item VIII. We recommend that Rev. Cecil Clifton be granted permission of securing support for the "Wesleyan Hour" Radio Broadcast in the Indiana Conference.

First: We as a conference re-assert the historic position of our church regarding her Christian doctrines and reform principles.

Second: In view of the announcement of V-J Day, we gratefully acknowledge our thanksgiving to Almighty God for national Victory. Realizing our constant dependence upon God we solicit the continued prayers of our people for the completion of the peace and the establishment of goodwill toward all men. STANDING RULES OF THE INDIANA W. Y. P. S. CONFERENCE

1. The first session of the W. Y. P. S. Conference shall convene Wednesday afternoon of conference week at one o'clock and sessions shall be continued daily until all business is transacted.

- 2. Each organized society shall elect two delegates and one alternate delegate to the annual conference. All pastors in the conference shall be considered members of the conference.
- 3. (a) The president, vice-president, and secretary-treasurer shall be elected by ballot. (b) The divisional caucuses shall be held at the close of the first session by each of the divisions to nominate a divisional superintendent to be elected by the conference.
- 4. The executive officers and the divisional superintendents shall constitute a committee to nominate the chairmen and members of committees, their report to be read and voted upon in the first session of the Annual Conference.
- 5. All organized societies shall keep permanent records of membership and finances. The list of members shall include a classification of active and associate members and shall be revised at the close of each Conference year.
- 6. The president, secretary-treasurer, and the divisional superintendents shall be the W. Y. P. S. Missionary board.
- 7. The Ways and Means Committee shall be composed of five members elected by the W. Y. P. S. conference and a sixth member chosen from the Committee on Finance and Appropriations of the main Conference body.
- 8. The W. Y. P. S. conference shall be composed of four divisions. A superintendent shall be elected annually for each division, whose duty it shall be to work with the district presidents in seeing that all churches in the districts have organized societies with a complete membership roll.
- 9. All delegates' credentials shall be sent with the statistical blanks to the statistician not later than August 4.

Report No. 2

To the youth of the Indiana Conference:

We call upon you to join with us today in gratitude and praise to God

for the blessings which have come to us since we last met.

As we review the past year, we are reminded that it was not without its problems, but God has been good to us and given victory.

Of course there is a sense of sadness when we think of our youth who have fallen on the fields of battle and of the many who have and will in the future return with physical handicaps; yet, we praise God that victory has finally come and soon many more of our youth will return to take their places in the church. I feel that we as a youth organization must accept a large share of the responsibility in helping them to adjust themselves to civilian life. We must not fail in our duty to those who have sacrificed so much for us.

We are happy to report that during the past year definite advancement has been made. There have been some new societies organized, a very good financial gain—especially for pioneer evangelism, and a good increase in subscriptions to the Wesleyan Youth. We are glad to report that practically every church with an organized society has paid the connectional dues.

Our pioneer project at Monticello has been organized into a Wesleyan Methodist Church, which at the present has thirteen full and seventeen associate members. The local congregation is at the present assuming the greater part of the pastor's support and we feel confident that soon the work will be self-supporting. I feel that God is blessing the program of pioneer evangelism and urge that we continue to launch out into new fields. These gains have been made possible only through the blessings of God and your cooperation. For this, we wish to thank you.

The connectional executive committee, at its last meeting, adopted a plan of work for the coming year. We have set as our goal for the denomination: 1000 new subscriptions to the Wesleyan Youth, the recruiting of 100 young people not already pledged to full time Christian service, 100 new local societies; looking forward to a local society in every church and a local youth rally conducted in every church during the year. As a conference, we must not fail in doing our part to reach these goals.

Realizing the need for more trained leaders among our youth, and the danger of losing them from the church, I hope it will be possible in the coming year to sponsor a Youth Training Week to be held on the camp ground. Shall we pray and work toward this end.

We feel that the future prospects for our youth organization are bright. We must maintain an attitude of utter dependence upon God and look to Him for whatever increase may come our way. If we keep the emphasis of Wesleyanism and maintain our margins of safety from all that would undermine spiritual life; if we keep our hearts hot with the love of God and filled with compassion for lost men, the future will bring rich blessings.

May I say that I have appreciated the honor and privilege of serving for the past five years as president of the W. Y. P. S. Conference. The cooperation of all the pastors and youth leaders of the conference has been commendable and as president of the Marion College Area, I trust that I will have your continued cooperation. May I close with the admonition of the Apostle Paul to the Corinthians: "Therefore, my beloved brethren, be ye stedfast, unmovable, always abounding in the work of the Lord, for as much as ye know that your labor is not in vain in the Lord."

RESOLUTIONS COMMITTEE

We, your Committee on Resolutions, submit the following report:

- 1. We of the W. Y. P. S. resolve to support the General and Annual Conferences in all the work of the Church, we also wish to express our gratitude and appreciation for permission to hold a youth training week, and the privilege of supervising all W. Y. P. S. activities.
- 2. We reaffirm our faith in the inspired Word of God and the doctrine of our Church. We urge our local societies to have at least one public service in which is conducted a Bible Study of the twenty-one articles of religion in our Church Discipline.
- 3. We resolve to support Marion College with our prayers and finances; we encourage our young people whenever possible to attend Marion College.
- 4. We resolve to pledge ourselves to be more Christ-like in that we will not clothe ourselves in a nude or semi-nude state; we will at all times protest the use of cigarettes and intoxicating liquors. We shall endeavor to educate our young people until they are awakened to the great danger of these poisons.

- 5. Let us this year attempt to do more to evangelize the world by our prayers, finance, attendance, and by backing our special project of pioneer evangelism with all our hearts and strength as God gives us strength.
- 6. Whenever entertainment and recreation are needed between services at W. Y. P. S. rallies we resolve to encourage only the forms of recreation which are unquestionably those which conform with keeping the Sabbath day holy.
- 7. We resolve that all W. Y. P. S. rallies be held for the definite purpose of evangelizing, increasing interest in the W. Y. P. S., and encouraging a higher standard of Christian living among our youth.
- 8. We urge that each returning service man or woman be welcomed to our services and invited to take part whenever possible. Until our youth do all come home again let those societies which have been sending literature continue to do this good work.
- 9. We recommend that all reports in the W. Y. P. S. minutes be read at public services and attention directed to the meaning of these reports by the W. Y. P. S. delegate when the new minutes come out.

WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE

We, your committee on Ways and Means, submit the following report:

I. We recommend that the following become a standing rule: That the Conference continue the four divisions and that a superintendent be elected for each division, whose duties shall be to work with the district presidents in seeing that all churches in the districts are organized and have a complete membership roll.

II. That each district cooperate with the following state program as to rallies: (a) One group rally to be held in each division on Friday during Teachers' Institute. (b) At least three other rallies to be held in each district, the time and place being set by the respective districts. (c) Conference Rally at Campgrounds May 30.

III. That each district secure its divisional superintendent as speaker for one rally during the year.

IV. That the manner of election of district officials shall be by a nominating committee that shall be elected at the first rally of the year which committee shall be composed of five members, the chairman, who shall be a pastor in the district who is vitally interested in young people, and four other members from different churches where possible. This nominating committee shall bring in a report at the last rally of the year. It shall bring

at least two names for each office. The president shall be elected by ballot.

V. That all churches send their statistical report to the statistician by August 4, and that the statistician shall list those churches not reporting a W. Y. P. S.

VI. That the Missionary Board of the W. Y. P. S. have complete charge of helping new works and also support at least one new pioneer work this year. That this board also send bulletins of information, pictures, etc., concerning this work so that the local presidents, district presidents, and divisional superintendents may know concerning the work.

FINANCE

I. That the area president receive traveling expenses while traveling our conference, the same to be paid by the group asking his services.

II. That the salary of the conference officers be as follows: (a) President, \$50.00; (b) Secretary-Treasurer, \$40.00; (c) Divisional Superintendents, \$20.00 each; (d) Statistician, \$10.00.

III. That desk and traveling expenses of the president and secretary-treasurer be paid from the general fund, and of the divisional superintendents from the evangelistic fund.

IV. That the budget be as follows: (a) Connectional dues, 50 cents per active member of the local society to be paid by December 31, 1945; (b) Conference budget, 10 cents per church member; (c) Budget for evangelism in pioneer fields, 30 cents per church member; (d) Youth Training Program, 10 cents per church member.

V. That traveling expenses be figured on the basis of four cents per mile.

VI. That all finances raised in pioneer evangelistic campaigns conducted under the auspices of the conference W. Y. P. S. shall go on the expense of the meeting and receipts turned in for the same except three offerings which shall remain with the new work. In the case no new work is effected, all offerings shall go for the expenses of the meeting.

VII. That all offerings above expenses of divisional and district rallies be sent to the conference treasurer to apply on pioneer evangelism.

VIII. That we urge each local society to cooperate with the church in raising money for the college building project, conference extension, and use of the college loyalty fund chart.

IX. That two copies of the report of the Ways and Means Committee be mailed to each church and district president within three weeks after the close of conference.

X. That special mention be made of all societies raising a full budget.

XI. That the executive committee of each local W. Y. P. S. consult with the pastor and his board of stewards before planning its financial program for the year.

XII. That all money paid by local societies, other than local projects, be sent to the conference W. Y. P. S. treasurer not later than August 4.

XIII. That \$300.00 be appropriated as payment on the Monticello Church note.

XIV. That we continue to help support the Monticello Church.
