IN MEMORIAM



Lilly Merrifield

Lillie Meredith Merrifield was born June 11, 1878 at Fairmont, West Virginia. She answered her summons to heaven from Stoneboro Camp August 20, 1959.

Sister Merrifield was converted at the age of eight in the old Methodist Church. Married to the Rev. James F. Merrifield they began labors for the Lord in Mission Pioneering in West Virginia where they served faithfully for twenty-two years. The church early recognized Sister Merrifield's worth and she was granted a local preacher's license by the late Rev. P. B. Campbell in 1914. This license she kept inviolate through the years. She was vitally interested in the work of the Church and Missions especially. She never tired of pressing that arm of the Lord's work. She was active in the local church and missionary society, fulfilling faithfully the duties assigned her. Likewise the Conference and the Conference Missionary Society came in for their share of faithful service covering a period of over forty-five years as pastor's wife and help meet.

Her body lies resting in the Jones Cemetery, Fairmont, West Virginia. Her Spirit is with the Lord she loved so well and served so diligently.

Gertrude Lillian Mae Gordon Markell was born April 4, 1897 in Canamora, Ontario, Canada. Her earthly life ended in the Greenville City Hospital, Greenville, Pennsylvania, November 4, 1959.

Converted at an early age she was an active Christian in the Winchester, Ontario Wesleyan Methodist Church. Her appreciation and love of fine music was inborn and she graduated from Ottawa Conservatory of Music in 1915. Following this she spent some time in teaching music and lending her musical talent to the work of the local church as opportunity offered. Allegheny Conference enjoyed the benefit of this training in both Camp and Conference in Sister Markell's twenty-two years as Pianist for the Conference and Camp. Only failing health and strength compelled her to give over this loved work to younger hands. Vitally interested in mission interests she was active in the local and Conference Society, holding numerous offices with credit. In the local Church work she was an able assistant to her husband as a pastor's wife.

Her body was laid to rest in the Stevenson Cemetery near the North Salem Wesleyan Church where she and her husband, the Rev. H. A. Markell, began their ministerial life in Allegheny Conference in 1924. Her spirit is, no doubt, basking in the overtures of the Celestial Choir.

Thursday 7:30 P.M.: The Conference Sermon by Paul D. Stonebraker, Pastor of the Pittsburgh First Church. Very gracious message anointed of the Spirit.

Friday 7:30 P.M.: Missionary Service conducted by the W. M. S. Ladies. (See their Minutes)

Saturday 7:30 P.M.: Sunday School Hour under direction of Conference Sunday School Secretary, H. E. Robertson, Jr.

Sunday 9:00 A.M.: Love Feast in the large tabernacle led by H. A. Markell.

Sunday 9:00 A.M.: Sunday School in the Youth Tabernacle; Conference Sunday School Secretary, H. E. Robertson, Jr., superintending.

Sunday 10:00 A.M.: Ordination: Singing led by Wm. Leyshon, "Solid Rock" and "Hallelujah Praise Jehovah." Vice-president T. A. Robertson presented a group of Conference General Evangelist and Special Workers. Rev. Price and Mrs. Helen Stark were presented to the Conference. Solo, "All the Way My Saviour Leads Me," by David L. Robertson. Ordination Sermon by Conference General Evangelist Henry W. Lelear. Scripture read was II Peter 3:14-18, and the text was II Peter 3:17. The Secretary read the roll of candidates: Charles A. Yarnell, Frank C. Hicks and John D. Englant. President H. C. Van Wormer conducted the Ordination Service being assisted by Elders David M. Stonebraker, Donald P. Jones, Bernard C. Pollock, T. A. Robertson, Francis E. Mansell and T. W. Comadoll. The President read the "Charge" and presented a Bible with "Authority to Preach," and extended the "Right Hand of Fellowship."

Sunday 2:15 P.M.: Pioneer Service under supervision of retiring Pioneer Secretary, T. W. Comadoll. H. E. Schmul, F. E. Satterfield and Clyde A. Blair spoke of Pioneer work.

Sunday 7:00 P.M.: Youth Service under direction of Conference Youth President, Harold E. Schmul. Five men from McKinley testified. Rev. Charles Lincoln, McKinley pastor also spoke. An inspiring feature of this service was the burning of the mortgage for the Canton McKinley church building, by H. E. Schmul, Youth Society officers and President H. C. Van Wormer participating. This service closed a very gracious session of Allegheny Conference.

Standing Resolutions

1. A Committee on Auditing and Finance, consisting of three ministerial members, the Chairman being an Elder, shall be elected each year, the duties of which shall be to examine and report on the Treasurer's books and all the financial reports, except the W.M.S. and Y.M.W.B., and to be a Standing Committee to advise on Financial plans.

2. All persons received into membership in the churches of our Conference excepting those whose life of Christian fidelity has been of sufficient long standing, shall be received at first as associate members only.

3. When it becomes necessary for a church to call a pastor, it shall be the duty of the calling church to make provision for the expense incurred by the pastor in removing to a new field of labor. Money raised for this purpose shall NOT be applied on the pastor's salary. When an Elder is elected to the Conference Presidency, expenses incurred in moving to the Conference Parsonage, shall be paid from the Conference Treasury.

4. The Conference Sunday shall be the closing Sunday of Conference year, and the out-going pastor shall be paid his salary for that Sunday by the charge he is leaving.

5. At the beginning of the Conference session the president shall appoint a Nominating Committee of not less than three members, two Elders and one Layman to bring to the Conference a slate of Nominations for Committees, etc., for the Conference Temporary Organizations. Delegates Credentials shall be mailed to the Secretary not later than ten days before the convening of Conference. The Secretary shall be Chairman of the Credentials Committee and shall compile the Roll of Delegates from the regularly filled Credentials received.

6. No person shall be received into membership in Allegheny Conference until he shall have properly filled out an application blank, which application together with recommendations of his references must pass the approval of the President and his Advisory Board. Exceptions to this rule may be made by the President and his Advisory Board when they deem best.

7. The pastor of any church in the Conference shall be free to hold at least one revival meeting during the year, wherever he sees fit, and it is recommended that his salary be paid to him while he is absent.

8. Each pastor shall send a monthly report on the blank provided, to the Conference President showing the progress and the state of the work under his care.

9. Each church may elect a Nominating Committee whose duty it shall be to nominate candidates for church officers for presentation to the church at the time of the annual election of officers. Such nominations shall not exclude other nominations at the time of the business meeting.

10. Churches having business with the Conference Board of Trustees requiring a visit of that body to their church, shall be responsible for the expense attached to such calls, unless released by the Board.

11. Inasmuch as trial sermons are hardly fair to the church or candidate and since the practice of having trial sermons is contrary to the usual manner of locating preachers, we recommend that no preacher shall accept any such invitations, if given. Exceptions to this rule may be granted by the Conference President upon request of any church.

12. Since considerable expense of transferring automobile title and license attends the moving of a pastor from one state to another, we recommend that where possible the calling church bear this expense.

13. We recommend that all districts emphasize Sunday School activity, and that Conventions be arranged for in conjunction with the visitation of the Conference Sunday School Secretary, who shall visit one Convention of each District during the year, at Convention expense.

14. We recommend that no one be elected to Elders Orders who does not have an abiding sense of divine call to give himself wholly to the function and ministry of an Elder in the **WESLEYAN METHODIST CHURCH**, and that no one shall be ordained to this office and work who is not applying himself wholly to this one thing in cares and studies, and clearly determining by God's grace to give himself wholly to this holy ministry, if possible, long before the appointed day of ordination, and manifesting such a determination of faithful Christian service to the church or congregation whom he was called to serve during his years of preparation, so that as much as lieth in him, he has and will apply himself wholly to the work of the ministry, except in all cases of absolute necessity of such diversions to a legitimate avocation for livelihood which neither jeopardizes the Lord's work nor blames the ministry.

15. We recommend that each church equip its parsonage with the necessary heating and cooking equipment, because of the variation of requirements in this equipment for the individual parsonage.

16. We recommend that in election of local church Advisory Committee each church permit the pastor to nominate the members of this committee.

17. The Conference Secretary, as Chairman, with the Conference President shall be a Standing Committee on Publications, whose duty it shall be to examine all matters pertaining to Conference printing and publications, and let all contracts for same.

18. All churches shall have a systematic means of keeping records, as required by Discipline, Paragraph No. 74, The "Ideal Church Record" published by the Bethel Publishing Company, Elkhart, Indiana, is a suggested form.

19. Local church treasurer's books shall close April 30, thus making the Conference fiscal year from May 1, to April 30. All funds received after this date shall be counted in the following year. Funds will be credited on Sub-Treasurer's books if received by May 5.

To meet the requirements of Paragraph 164 of the Discipline regarding revision of the Roll of membership, April 30, may be considered the close of the Conference year for Statistical purpose.

20. Minister's Pocket Credentials shall be issued to Elders and annually to Conference Preachers who are eligible.

21. Since the use of the wedding ring is not in accord with the standards of our church, we therefore, as a Conference, disapprove of our ministers performing or taking part in the ring ceremony.

22. The pastoral vote shall be taken on each charge on the third Sunday in April. When it is the desire of the church to vote on a week night, it will be done sometime during the week previous to the designated Sunday. Permission to vote on another Sunday may be obtained from the President and the Advisory Board.

23. Each church shall allow their pastor a reasonable vacation with pay to be taken at his convenience. Two weeks is suggested.

24. In the judgment of the Allegheny Conference, viewing television programs of the type commonly offered in response to the public clamor for entertainment is an impediment to the development of holy character. We deplore the current television programs' evil effect upon the moral and spiritual life of the Nation. The principles of Wesleyan Methodism — being an epitome of the Christian religion — obligate Wesleyan Methodists to an unblameable life which constantly rebukes every form of evil and zealously advocates holiness of heart and life. Therefore, we most earnestly request our ministers and members, as those who must give account unto God in the Day of Judgment for anything which tends to influence toward evil, to refrain from the purchase of television sets and from viewing such programs for Jesus' sake.

Inasmuch as ministers are examples and patterns to the flock of Christ, the Allegheny Conference expects each of its ministers to set a wholesome example and to be a godly pattern in this respect, so that those to whom he ministers will follow his example and avoid exposure to this which menaces vital godliness.

25. The third Sunday of September shall be designated, each year, as Pioneer Shunday to present the work of the Pioneer department to our congregations and pastors be urged to exchange pulpits on this Sunday as much as possible.

REPORT NO. 1

THE CONFERENCE PRESIDENT

Dear Brothers and Sisters of the Allegheny Annual Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America:

Greetings in the all-worthy name of our Lord Jesus Christ!

By the grace and mercy of God we have been permitted once more to assemble on this Old Hill Top for the 117th Annual Conference Session. By the help of the Holy Spirit may we reach the hour of adjournment without having done or said anything which displeases Him. To that end each minister and delegate should pray: "Let the words of my mouth, and the meditation of my heart, be acceptable in thy sight, O Lord, my strength and my redeemer."

We do not need to remind you that the hour is desperate for everything about us calls this to our attention. Recently Dr. Robert M. Hutchins said, "The most characteristic feature of the modern world is bewilderment. We do not know where we are going or why; and we have almost given up the attempt to find out." Pitirim A. Sorokin said, "We live amidst one of the greatest crisis in human history. Not only war, famine, pestilence and revolution, but a legion of other calamities are rampant over the whole world. All values are unsettled; all norms are broken. Mental, moral, aesthetic and social anarchy reigns supreme — Humanity has become a distorted image of its own noble self. The crisis is omnipresent and involves almost the whole of culture and society from top to bottom. It is manifest in the fine arts and science, in philosophy and religion, in ethics and law. It permeates the forms of social, economic and political organization and the entire way of living and thinking."

Another one says, "One of the most disquieting phenomena in these days is the tendency to lie and deceive, increasingly evident in the individual, social, commercial and political areas of life."

The Christian Victory magazine in speaking of our times said, "Our whole society seems to be sick: teen-agers are on a rampage; cheating in exams — and in morals — is widespread in our colleges; our national crime bill is \$20 billions each year; our liquor bill is \$15 billions each year; many TV shows and most movies are corrupting in their influence; the divorce evil is growing and homes are disintegrating; most churches have lost their testimony and are powerless; instead of properly 'educating' (disciplining) our youth, most schools take the easy way out, with the 'progressive education' program, and they are developing spineless, 'spoiled' youngsters entirely unprepared to cope with the world they are going into; the result is, many of them fall easy victims to alcoholism and a slipshod manner of living. The morally strong America we once knew, walking in the fear of God, is a thing of the past. Unless we as a nation repent of our sins and forsake them, turning to God through Christ, we are doomed. God judges national sins; unless there are changes made, dreadful judgments will come to us, as a nation."

In a time such as this, the deepest kind of seriousness should characterize such a gathering as this. This is no time for the church to seek "peaceful co-existence" with modern-day evil and sign some sort of truce to evade the drawn battle. She must be alert to her opportunities. There is a sinsick world dying for the unadulterated truth of the Gospel in its full measure. Desperate situations are causing folk to look for the genuine message of salvation. Soon opportunities will have passed into history. We should do all we possibly can while here to promote a revival among ourselves which will reach our churches back home.

During this Conference year we felt led by the Holy Spirit, we believe, to start a Chain of Prayer in the Conference. We appreciate those who responded. We trust that the Chain may be continued until God visits us with an Old Time Revival.

We will not try to give any evaluation of what has been done in the Conference this year. The reports will show what has been done and also the failures. We are faced with a tremendous shift in population within the Conference due to the closing of the coal mines in some areas. This has caused a loss in Conference membership now for three years. Some churches in these areas are finding it difficult to maintain themselves financially. What the final outcome will be we do not know. In the May 16, 1960, issue of the U. S. News and World Report it gave the areas within the bounds of our Conference where unemployment is a problem. They are: Pennsylvania — Butler, Erie, Indiana, Johnstown, Kittanning-Ford City, Meadville, New Castle, Oil City-Franklin-Titusville, Pittsburgh, Sharon-Farrell; West Virginia — Bluefield, Clarksburg, Fairmont; and New York — Jamestown-Dunkirk. You may easily see how the churches of the Conference are affected by this situation.

Throughout the year we have continued in the work assigned to us at the last Annual Conference. To the best of our limited knowledge and ability, through much waiting upon God in the night hours, we have sought the guidance of the Holy Spirit in every action taken. 6. That each church labor for an old-fashioned revival;

7. That each one do his best to deepen his own spiritual life;

8. That each one spend as much time in Prayer as possible for "The inwrought energetic prayer of a righteous man, prevails;"

9. That each church strive to conserve and to build up its membership;

10. That each church labor to contact the unchurched around it by consistent visitation.

CONCLUSION:

In closing this report we desire to pass on to you some counsels given for these perilous days in which we find ourselves. They are as follows: (1) "Be kindly affectioned one to another" (Rom. 12:10-13); (2) "Be not unequally yoked" (2 Cor. 6:14); (3) "Be ready to every good work" (Titus 3:1-2); (4) "Be valiant for truth" (Jude 3); (5) "Be diligent students of the Bible" (Phil. 1:9); (6) "Be subject only to Christ" (Matt. 23:8); (7) "Be filled with the Spirit" (Eph. 5:18); (8) "Be much in prayer" (1 Thess. 5:17).

We have appreciated your prayers, your cooperation, your patience and your understanding. This has all been beyond what we have deserved. We are thankful and grateful for your help. We have greatly appreciated the good response to the plea for the Conference Chain of Prayer. We trust that each one will do his best to maintain the chain throughout the conference year 1960-61 and work to get others to join. Let us remember that God has provided that spiritual force which can bring to nought the powers of evil and spiritual wickedness in high places. He has given to us the weapon of prayer, the greatest "thrust fuel" known, which will release the infinite might of the omnipotent God. "The weapons of our warfare are not carnal, but mighty through God to the pulling down of strongholds; casting down imaginations (unholy reasonings), and every high thing that exalteth itself against the knowledge of God, and bringing into captivity every thought to the obedience of Christ" (2 Cor. 10:4, 5).

JAMES A. MAGNER**

July 8, 1959: We have examined the accounting records and other pertinent data of the Conference Treasurer's office for the fiscal year ending April 30, 1959. Our examination was conducted in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards and accordingly include such tests of the accounting records and such other auditing procedures as we considered necessary in the circumstances, except as outlined below.

We traced all receipts to see that they were credited to the proper funds. Such receipts were recorded in the Sub-Treasurer's records or were evidenced by receipt sheets for monies received from miscellaneous sources. \$58,751.18 of receipts were verified, but various miscellaneous sources of income in the amount of \$9,838.52 were impossible to trace in the scope of this audit, due to the varied character of such receipts.

Expenditures were compared with approved authorizations and agreed in amount. All cancelled checks were compared with recorded disbursements for amount as well as proper authorized signatures.

The enclosed Balance sheet does not include certain assets of the conference such as Real Estate, Buildings, and office equipment. It is respectfully recommended that such items be properly appraised and that the appraisal be furnished to the auditors so that such assets may be included in future reports.

The enclosed statement of account presents fairly the flow of funds of the Allegheny Annual Conference for the fiscal year ending April 30, 1959, in accordance with a cash receipts and expenditures method of accounting. We cannot, however, render an independent accountant's opinion on the overall fairness of the representations made in the statements as a whole, because of the exclusion of certain realty and office equipment which has never been valued for statement purposes, as noted in the immediate preceding paragraph.

We wish to thank Reverend Francis E. Mansell for his cooperation with us in our examination and we found his records to be in excellent shape.

Whereas this Conference is in favor of continuing its cooperation with the other Conferences above named within the Houghton Area for the establishment of a suitable and proper Home for the Aged.

RESOLUTIONS

RESOLUTIONS: Your Committee on Resolutions submits the following report. BE IT RESOLVED:

1. That by adopting this report, we as a Conference, re-affirm the historic stand of the church in matters of Christian doctrine and practice. Thus may we encourage our people to adhere, with hearts abounding in fervent love for God and a passion for holiness, to the General and Special Rules of our Discipline. In as much as these things are pertinent to the maintenance of our witness as a church to the world and the testimony of our people to Christian grace, therefore we urge our ministry to the preaching of the doctrine of holiness with a practical emphasis on its ethics.

2. That we re-affirm our love and our loyalty to our beloved denomination by praying for its leaders; and that we resolve to express our appreciation for the officials of our conference and the standards which they maintain by faithfully praying for them and earnestly following their example.

3. That since our conference sustains tremendous losses among our youth from our Sunday Schools and Churches, we therefore urge our pastors to encourage the Youth of our Churches to attend the annual youth conference, District Youth Rallies and Stoneboro Camp Meeting, and that every effort be put forth to lead them into a definite experience of salvation and when deemed advisable to unite with the Church. Be it further resolved that we refrain from any compromise of our standards or introduction of social programs into our church. Since such leads to superficial loyalties and spiritual decline. Such methods are an injustice to youth and a discouragement to the spiritual laity.

4. REPORT NO. 23

STONEBORO CAMP ASSOCIATION PRESIDENT'S REPORT

In compliance with the duty imposed upon the President by the Camp-meeting Association, the following report is hereby submitted:

As you come upon the camp ground this year, you will notice that Bro. Brickell, the care taker, has done an excellent job on the grounds to have them looking nice. He has worked hard and we trust that everyone will do their best to keep the grounds as neat as possible.

The last Annual Camp was blessed with four strong preachers: Dr. T. M. Anderson, who conducted the Bible study; Rev. H. Robb French, Rev. D. W. Fossitt, and Rev. Millard Downing as evangelists, who preached under the anointing of the Holy Spirit. The ministry of the camp evangelists was deep and searching. The truth which was propounded day after day reached the heart, probed the leanings of the soul, and set a standard for piety. Mrs. Millard Downing was the song evangelist.

"In the opening service, Tuesday evening, Rev. H. Robb French sounded the key note of the camp and a spirit of expectancy for a divine visitation prevailed over the 'hilltop.' In response to the challenge sounded in Brother French's message, the Holy Spirit led Rev. A. H. Elsey, the camp prayer leader, to organize a chain of prayer to prevail around the clock. As a result of such an effort, devoted prayer and intercession was heard at all hours in many parts of the grounds. The main tabernacle became the site at which many observed the hour or hours for which they felt responsible; throughout the night prayer was made in this auditorium. One person quartered adjacent to the tabernacle said, 'There was a mighty volume of prayer continually ascending throughout large parts of the night. Not one night but every night the stillness heard the cry of intercession.'"

"One of the camp leaders said, 'This is a unique camp. It is all night prayer every night and our prayer meetings are without human leadership.' In keeping with this awakening to the value of prevailing prayer, a larger group of churches than we have ever noted in previous camps of the last several years, had group prayer meetings at various times throughout the day."

"It is notable that without urging and lengthy altar calls, the altar would fill again and again with earnest, determined seekers. . . . Of a certainty the evidence of the Spirit's approval was upon the encampment. Does not this attest His pleasure with the standards maintained and the discipline prevailing at the encampment? Without recreational programs, snack bars, and other diversions which are needful to carnal elements, Stoneboro Camp was attended by the largest crowds in her history and among the number large groups of young people. Several of the older generation signified that to their recollections which took them back quite a number of years, this was the largest camp. The attendance was large on the opening night, reaching

one having fallen in love with the Saviour of his soul. Giving freely and cheerfully is a practical manifestation of our love and loyalty to Jesus Christ.

Not only does giving show love, but it is also a clear evidence of the faithfulness of stewardship. It is agreed that God is the sovereign owner of all things. Since He has given all that we possess and we are dependent upon Him for all things, it must be recognized that as stewards of His possessions we are expected to give a faithful account of this sacred trust. Our giving evidences faithfulness in other phases of this stewardship, and protects us from carelessness when dealing with many important obligations. For example, faithfulness in giving guards against covetousness (Luke 12:15); pride of ownership (Luke 12:16-20); robbing God (Mal. 3:8-15), and against the danger of forgetting God (Deut. 8:17-18). As a matter of fact the way we give to God is a mirror of our entire experience of salvation.

When he was fifteen the police called his home one night and said, "We have your boy. He is in trouble." "In trouble?" screamed the father. "It can't be my boy." But it was.

REPORT NO. 12

SECRETARY OF EDUCATION

In First Samuel 17:29 we read words spoken by David to his brothers in which the writer gives to us a very striking text in five words, "Is there not a cause?" I should like to lift this text out of its setting and consider it in regard to the juvenile situation today. In the light of this question as it applies to this phase of American life, I suggest to you that there are at least three primary conditions which contribute to this problem. First, I'm sure we all agree that the greatest cause of juvenile delinquency is the breaking down of the American home. The home is the institution which controls the trend of society. As goes the home, so goes the church, so goes the school, so goes every phase of civilization. The second cause is presented to us by Solomon when he said, "the fear of man bringeth a snare." One young girl who was keeping company with a young man for whom she confessed no love, gave as her reason for possible marriage the fact that all the other young people are getting married. Few are willing to be different. Youth is inclined to follow the crowd. The third cause of the juvenile problem is the lack of Christian education.

Those who are acquainted with the history of our nation will agree that the very foundation of American society is established on the word of God. For two centuries the school system of the nation was conducted on the assumption that the Bible is the source of all truth and must be taught if truth would live. During the first fifty years of American school history the Bible was the only text book. The New England primer, published in 1690, was filled with scripture, and also contained both the Westminster Catechism and John Cotton's "Spiritual Milk for American Babes." The series of readers by William Holmes McGuffey, published in 1836, sought to convince its students that the Ten Commandments and the teachings of Jesus are forces by which life must be directed and character must be established. For almost three centuries, every phase of American education was built around the existence of God and the revelation of Himself to mankind.

Perhaps by this time the question that we all raise is, "What happened?" To this question the answer is evident and simple. We have shut out God. About a century ago Horace Mann, Secretary of Massachusetts state Board of Education, sought to secularize American education. The word "secularize" is derived from the Latin word "secularis," which means worldly or temporal as distinguished from spiritual or eternal. In this movement all that pertains to God was crowded out and all that pertains to the world was brought in. Today the entire school system limits itself to secular instruction. The Bible is crowded out and thus we have books on Socialism, Communism, etc. The Virgin Birth is denied and when Jesus is presented at all, He is presented as a mere man. The creation of God is pushed out and the erroneous theory of evolution is presented. Today, our youth are taught that it is smart to deny God, to reject Christ, to mock the fundamental teachings of scripture, and to ridicule the standards of holiness. In the average classroom the universe and the world are presented without any reference to God. Youth is taught that conduct and human behavior are only the result of the will completely independent of salvation, that all personal desires should be gratified, and to

plan, pray, and work together to this end, and give this department of our Conference our whole-hearted support in every way throughout this coming year.

We wish to express our appreciation to our Conference President, the Mission Board, the area Pioneer Secretaries, our Pastors, and to our faithful laymen for your prayers and loyal support throughout the year. This isn't a one-man job, or one man's responsibility. Regardless of who heads this part of our Conference work, a part of the responsibility for its success rests upon each of us. Let's "Work while it is day, for the night cometh, when no man can work."

SECRETARY OF EVANGELISM

Your Secretary of Evangelism has spent the past Conference year in the field of evangelism, after a break of seven years. I have sought for a scriptural revival in every door which Providence has opened, both within our Conference and in other conferences.

The need for revival on true scriptural holiness lines is desperate. Revival on these lines must be soon forthcoming in many of our churches or the opportunity will be lost forever. In a multitude of situations, the enemy has already enthroned himself in mountains of hindrances, and the cost of true revival is becoming too dear for the ease-loving, pleasure-loving, fashion-loving, money-loving constituency of the church to pay.

True evangelism's greatest enemy lies within. A pastor of another Conference was disappointed with the results of evangelistic effort in his church. But should he have marveled at the meager fruit when he himself was conspicuous for his absence from the public prayer meeting for revival, and when, during the meeting, he sat up far into the night reading Christian fiction?

Revivals of a superficial character, promoted with utter disregard for scriptural standards are carried on in certain areas. These deceive many by their appearance of fruitfulness. In these cases, when true revival comes, those who have affiliated themselves with the church on the basis of loose requirements take offense and generally oppose the genuine move of God. Opposition toward true revival is stiffening in many areas where revival on the old lines once held sway. The day is at hand when true evangelism can only be propagated by a ministry and people who are ready to sacrifice every temporal consideration for the eternal.

True evangelism is characterized by:

1. Purity of motive.
2. Motivation born of the inward fire of divine love versus that born of eternal ecclesiastical coercion.
3. Divine favor versus popular favor and temporal success.

During the past year our labor in this field has been very much restricted and limited. This was a recognized fact by the Mission Board when we were assigned to this task for the year. In fact, our chief assignment was to present the new financial plan for this department throughout the Conference and do what was possible in the raising of finance. This we have endeavored to do; otherwise, we have been able to do very little in the way of promoting the work that needed to be done in this field. During the year we visited every District in the Conference with the exception of the Southern West Virginia District, and presented the need of the Pioneer Department and the new financial plan as outlined by the Mission Board during last Conference. The goal set by the committee was \$20,000 for the year. It is true that we have fallen somewhat short of our goal but as of June 1, 1960, we actually had on hand the amount of \$12,096.59, which is something to be grateful for. I see no reason why we can't reach the goal of \$20,000 this year easily. A bit of cooperation and push by each church and the goal will have been reached. During the first year of any new plan there is always somewhat of a confusion and misunderstanding, but now that the plan has been in operation for a year everyone should have a fairly clear understanding of it, and when we see the balance on hand the merit of the plan speaks for itself as being worthy of our most whole-hearted support.

During the year we mimeographed and distributed throughout the Conference three editions of a Pioneer bulletin. Our plan was to edit five, but again we fell short of our goal. During the year we made two visits to the Ellwood City work, one trip to Hartville, one trip to Castlewood, and preached one time at Oil City for the Youth revival squad. We were scheduled to preach for some of the other ones but was forced to cancel. Total expenses for the year for postage, travel expense, telephone, etc., was \$178.54. During the past year the indebtedness on the East Liverpool Church was liquidated and the work there has made some progress through the year. A new church was opened at Hinton, West Virginia. This was made possible by the sacrificial labor of Brother Cyphers and the group who make up this new work. It was our hope that by Conference time we could have ready a new project to present for your consideration. To this end we labored, but again our goal was not attained. Most likely more extensive and more numerous surveys will be possible throughout this year due to the revision of this part of our Conference program, and we anticipate that by next Conference time, and we hope even before then, a definite location will have been settled upon and a program launched in some good prospective area. Let's continue to

era in which we are endeavoring to evangelize and establish new works. To fail in this respect will lead to much misunderstanding, criticism, discouragement, and failure.

3. Patience, understanding, kindness, and Christian charity will be much needed in the weeks and months that lay ahead. Many of the questions in your minds now must remain unanswered, simply because we do not have an answer. In this field the "Two Bears" are much needed today, "Bear and forebear."

4. Unity, cooperation, and faith that the Lord will help us in this part of our Conference work must be sustained constantly. Wholehearted support is needed from each church. We must realize that a part of the responsibility for the success of any new venture in this realm lays with each of us. This isn't a one-man job, or a one-committee job. In it we all have a part and we must all do our part.

REPORT NO. 7

EVALUATING PIONEER WORK IN OUR TIME

During the past year it has become very apparent to those of us who have labored together in this field of our Conference work that time and changing customs have effected this phase of our church work the same as other angles of our church life today. Personally, one year ago when we entered this field again we had no idea of the tremendous change that had taken place since we had left it seven years before. Without question our entire Conference, pastors, and laymen alike need a new and clear understanding and an up-to-date evaluation of the change that has taken place in this field of church activities in our time. By reading how others are getting the job done, and by personal canvassing and observation it is very easily seen that the days of store room, tent meeting, chicken coop, brush arbor, garage room, and basement church pioneering is largely a thing of the past. Without question it has and did succeed in past days, but also without question those days are past. The day in which we live calls for greater sums of money to be invested in new works than in past days, and also that these works be staffed with our best and most experienced personnel. Today the average community expects and demands some guarantee of permanency before they will trust their children or themselves to the gospel we offer them.

This does not make for an easy task in this day of drifting doctrines and shallow sainthood. The moulding and making of men in the image of God in our day calls for heroic service, sacrificial giving, and sympathetic understanding and patience on the part of the supporting constituency. The religious atmosphere of our time is diametrically opposed to the old-fashioned virtues and standards that we as Allegheny Wesleyans endeavor to propagate. The Hollywood, TV, big time religious circus is militantly fighting every move made by the lovers of the old paths of New Testament simplicity and Holy living. Those of our number who would look for a work of mushroom growth, or even another Canton McKinley must remember that such growth and development cannot be readily attained or duplicated by the mere selection of a location. The question in the minds of some may be, is there any use trying? Perhaps the best thing for us to do today is to seek to hold and maintain what we already have. That view and that position I grant would seem an easy way and a cheap way to settle this perplexing situation of our day, but I am definitely sure that it would be the wrong answer to our problem in the light of the task committed to us by our Crucified Saviour. I am confident of my statement when I say, there is a tremendous need and opportunity in this field today, and although we are faced with the need to radically alter our methods of the past it certainly doesn't mean that we are facing an impossible task.

We list for your consideration a few thoughts for all of us to keep in mind as we face the future with this part of our Conference program:

1. We need to pray for wisdom and guidance in the selection of a location, for the right workers, and for Divine help and guidance in every move made. A wrong move, a misstep can be costly and expensive in more ways than one. Much, much prayer is needed continually.

2. We must seek to maintain an intelligent understanding of the changing

REPORT NO. 5**CONFERENCE MISSION BOARD**

June 10, 1959. The newly elected Mission Board, consisting of Rev. H. C. Van Wormer (chairman), Rev. J. H. Cyphers, Rev. F. E. Mansell, Rev. F. E. Satterfield, Rev. H. E. Schmul, Rev. R. J. Wade, Rev. A. M. Larson, Rev. A. H. Elsey, and Rev. C. A. Blair, met in the president's office and after prayer by Bro. Larson, conducted the following business.

C. A. Blair elected secretary.

Authorized Rev. C. R. McPherson to have oversight of the campmeeting of the Southern West Virginia District.

Recommended to the finance committee that the retiring Pioneer Secretary, C. R. McPherson, receive his salary for six more weeks, including house rent and utilities.

Appointed Rev. A. H. Elsey to have charge of the moving of the pastors of these churches: Ashtabula, Blue Eye, North Springfield, Fairmount, Clarksburg, Princeton, Keepville, also the moving of Rev. Merrifield to Pittsfield, and Rev. Robbie to Sandy Lake.

Canton, \$50.00 per month for four months; Bluefield, \$50.00 per month for four months; Hooversville, \$100.00 per month for three months.

Appointed the following as District Pioneer Secretaries: Akron District, Sheridan Rainey; Canton District, Charles Lincoln; Indiana District, Jack Benninger; New Castle District, Elwood Hannold; Pittsburgh District, Jack Crouse; Titusville District, Glenn Elsey; N. West Virginia District, Wm. Cornell; S. West Virginia District, Charles Martin.

June 12, 1959. Met in the President's office with Rev. T. W. Comadoll, the new Pioneer Secretary and the district Pioneer men to formulate plans for the new Pioneer program.

The undivided Conference budget shall be equal to 7 per cent of the total of offerings of all regular Sunday worship services.

We submit the following reasons for this recommendation:

1. Simplicity. It will be much easier for the church treasurers to determine the monthly budget on one total than on three.

2. Equality among the churches. It will tend to lighten the load on any smaller churches and churches which have heavy financial loads.

3. It is more practical to base assessments on income rather than on expenditures.

4. It would tend to give churches more liberty and uniformity in directing their finances.

Our reason for recommending that this become effective one year from now rather than now, is to provide time for the necessary changes to be made in the pastors' monthly report forms and other necessary preparation.

6. Since it is expected that our evangelists, as well as pastors, attend the full session of Conference and since certain evangelists must be here at the expense of their income, we therefore recommend that the Conference pay \$50.00 each to General Evangelists Henry Lelear, H. E. Robertson, Sr., and C. R. McPherson.

7. That \$200.00 be paid to W. R. Kopp as a love gift, most of this amount having been given in a special offering at Conference.

8. That all churches do their best to see that their pastors are not hindered from attending the annual Ministerial Institute for financial reasons.

9. That \$1,000.00 be transferred from the Pioneer Fund to the Conference Budget Fund for the purpose of paying a portion of the Vice President's Salary since he has been given the responsibility of supervising the Pioneer Department.

10. That all persons who are not attending Conference on official business be requested to pay the Superintendent of Rooms a flat rate fee of \$1.00 to defray the cost of utilities.

11. That the recommendation embodied in the report of Certified Public Accountant James A. Magner, be referred to the Conference Board of Trustees for action. That recommendation is as follows:

"It is respectfully recommended that such items as real estate, buildings, and office equipment be properly appraised and that the appraisal be furnished to the auditors so that such assets may be included in further reports.

12. That the Group Insurance Secretary-treasurer be paid \$50.00 annually for his services from the Group Life Insurance Fund.

ITEM VII. BUDGET APPOINTMENTS:

1. The Conference Undivided Budget apportionment shall be as follows: Conference Budget, 89 percent; Assistance Fund, 2 percent; Pension Plan, 9 percent.

ITEM VIII. EXAMINATION OF AID FUND ACCOUNTS:

We have interviewed almost all who have loans from the Aid Funds and have renewed the notes of those so requesting. Most all loans are being consistently reduced by both churches and pastors. We believe this fund to be of great value and are doing our best to keep it revolving.

9. March 30, 1960, Rev. Robert Miller, Personal emergency aid \$225.00 from Assistance Fund.

3. That when a pastor requests a change in the quarterly meeting of the President or Vice-President which involves extra mileage or expense, the church or churches involved shall pay said expense.

4. That the churches pay all utilities for their pastors.

5. Pursuant to special recommendation No. 5 under Item VI of the report of the Finance Committee of 1959, we have reviewed the financial reports of the receipts of the regular Sunday offerings of the local churches which have been provided. Sixty churches submitted reports in time for our consideration; consequently, we are compelled to estimate the Sunday offering receipts of the remaining 47 churches.

After thoughtful consideration, we hereby recommend that, beginning with the rise of Conference 1961, the following system of conference budget apportionment be used:

- b. The premium for Liability Insurance for their cars in the amount \$100,000.00 which coverage they shall be required to maintain.
- c. The cost of their Annual Social Security Assessment.
- d. \$100.00 vacation bonus.
- e. \$1,100 Travel expense with the provision that all traveling costs in excess of this amount be paid them up to the amount of 5c per mile for the mileage reported in their current reports to the Conference. This includes all traveling costs exclusive of car depreciation.
4. \$1.00 per hour for Secretarial Aid for Conference President's Secretary.
5. All expense incurred by Conference officials, Board and Committee members in the pursuit of the duties of their respective offices upon the presentation of such expense accounts. Mileage will be paid at 5c per mile.
6. The following sums from the Conference Budget, in appreciation for their services; Conference Secretary, \$125.00; Conference Treasurer, \$125.00; each sub-treasurer, except West Virginia, \$60.00; West Virginia sub-treasurer, \$30.00; Conference Pension Plan treasurer, \$25.00; Superintendent of Rooms, \$25.00; Statistical Chairman, \$25.00; Aid Fund Treasurer, \$25.00.
7. The expense of the Sunday School Secretary to the National Sunday school Convention annually.
8. To the Superintendent of the Dining Hall, \$110.00 for his services plus \$150.00 for telephone, postage, and traveling expense, from the Conference Entertainment Fund.
9. \$1,000.00 annually toward the support of the Campground caretaker.

4. Conference Entertainment, \$.45 per member.

5. Pioneer Self-denial envelopes for monthly remittances (above tithe) shall be given our continued support.

6. General Church Extension shall be encouraged through the use of the Card Call Plan in our churches.

7. The pastor or persons responsible for the sale of the Conference Minutes in the local church shall remit \$.75 per copy to the chairman of the Committee on the Sale of Conference Minutes, by March 31st. The Chairman of said committee shall mail statements to all those who have not paid for their Minutes by March 31st, thus enabling the report of the Committee to be prepared by April 30th.

8. The above financial items, with the exception of those mentioned in paragraphs 6 and 7, shall be sent to the District Sub-treasurers. Church Treasurers are to make remittances by the 5th of each month to the credit of Conference Budget, Conference Missions, and Pioneer Fund.

9. Church Treasurers' reports to Quarterly Conference shall be made as of the close of the month preceding the Quarterly Conference. All church treasurers' records for the Conference year shall close April 30th. The Conference fiscal year is from May 1 to April 30.

Discipline. We further insist that recommendations to Study and Travel with Transcripts of grade for which credit is desired will be in the hands of the Committee on the first day of the Annual Conference, also that with each transcript the Committee shall be furnished a copy of the School catalogue from which the Transcript came.

ITEM XI. We require that students who are ready to take an examination in any book shall designate an acceptable member of the Wesleyan Methodist Church outside their immediate family, to whom Authorized Examiner shall mail the selected list of questions, and in whose presence the examination shall be taken in accordance with the rules and general instructions, for examinations. Such person shall certify that the examination was taken in his presence in an honorable manner, and shall return the examination paper to the examiner with self-addressed stamped envelope to return to the student.

ITEM XII. We place in nomination the name of Rev. Frank B. Miller for election to the office of Custodian of Conference Books. We recommend that no books be mailed from the library unless sufficient postage accompanies application for the same and that this library be reserved for the use of those who are pursuing the Course of Study as Conference Preachers and Song Evangelists. We also insist that no study book or reading book be kept by one individual longer than forty-five days. In case of necessity, upon application to the Custodian an extension of thirty days may be granted.

ITEM XIII. We urge that in writing examinations special attention be given to neatness, spelling, and composition. The Committee cannot give the same credit to papers that lack neatness and are poorly composed, as to those that have received proper attention in this respect. We require papers to be typewritten or written in ink.

ITEM XIV. We wish to call to your attention that those wishing to take examinations on Wiley's Theology are to contact the member of the Committee for that particular year, sending postage, in order to receive the select list of questions for study.

ITEM XV. When anyone has completed a course of study in school and is to appear before this Committee he shall bring a Transcript from that school in which the work was taken.

ITEM XVI. All Conference Preachers must remember that Paragraphs 91 and 92 of the Discipline require that the holder of an Annual Conference license must continue to hold an effective Quarterly Conference license and that license must be renewed each year and this requires the passing at least one book in the Course of Study.

THE VICE PRESIDENT

REPORT NO. 3

W. M. S. PRESIDENT'S REPORT — 1959-1960

To the 54th Annual Session of the Allegheny Conference Woman's Missionary Society, greetings in the Matchless Name of Jesus!

A marvelous portion of Scripture impressed our heart with which to begin our report. It is Jeremiah 17:7, 8 — "Blessed is the man that trusteth in the Lord, and whose hope the Lord is. For he shall be as a tree planted by the waters, and that spreadeth out her roots by the river, and shall not see when heat cometh, but her leaf shall be green; and shall not be careful in the year of drought, neither shall cease from yielding fruit."

Also, in connection with this, we wish to mention another Scripture, Luke 18:8, "Nevertheless when the Son of Man cometh, shall He find faith on the earth?"

Let us look at the first Scripture mentioned, Jeremiah 17:7, 8. According to God's promise here the man who trusts and hopes in the Lord is blessed or happy and safe. Other Scriptures reiterate and emphasize this truth. Notice further that he shall be like a tree that is planted beside an abundance or never-failing source of water supply, which never notices the heat because of this ever-sustaining, life-giving water to nourish it. Its leaf (or the trustful man) shall ever remain green and it, the tree or the trustful man, does not have to worry about the supply of water running out nor be careful or stinting in the use of it for fear of its giving out. Best of all, the result of such sustenance, it (or he) shall never cease from bearing fruit.

Since this is true, for God's word cannot fail, let us look up, trust God and put our faith roots down a little deeper for the coming stormy days ahead.

Already we are in the hottest and most subtle fight against sin, worldliness and compromise that probably this world has ever known for satan's days are short. The pressure of the enemy is wearing us down in body, spiritual power and vital faith. He is rushing us beyond the strength of the human but God has still promised that we can stay green and bear fruit in spite of it all — if we trust and hope in the Lord.

Besides, we are in a spiritual drought, not of religious profession but of vital, saving faith and power. Everyone has a religion but it is a selfish, self-willed, pleasure-loving, pampering something that can do as it pleases, ignoring God's commandments and warnings and still call itself Christian and expect to go to Heaven. Everyone has "a faith," so-called, in some creed or religion but there is only one real, vital, saving faith and that is God-given, God-inspired and God-kept by complying first to God's complete Word and then by constantly abiding where the Divine, life-giving living waters can enervate, pulsate and saturate through our souls making them living vines that still bring forth fruit under pressure, heat and drought.

In Luke 18:8, Jesus teaches that when He comes again there will be a scarcity of such faith — "Shall He find faith on the earth?" This implies that one can easily lose this vital faith and miss Heaven even with a profession

of religion or holiness. Thus, we need to awaken and realize that the most important thing we can do in this life is to work whole-heartedly and strive earnestly to keep the Faith at the expense of anything and everything else in this world, lest we lose our souls like the five foolish virgins who let their supply of oil give out.

Let us reason a little further, we cannot keep "the faith" if we are doing doubtful or questionable things in our lives, if we have broadened our view of things and compromised with God's word and will, if we are spending a life of self-indulgence, ease and pleasure, if we are working only for the physical and intellectual welfare of our families instead of the spiritual, if we are getting so taken up with the redecorating and remodeling of our homes and the replenishing of our wardrobes to keep up with the times and styles, if we are engaged in parties, picnics and feasting instead of the place of prayer or anything else that detracts from godliness, we will miss the Way and lose our faith as surely as we live. Then the tragedy of it all will be that we will not only lose our souls but that we also will quit bearing fruit for the Master and instead drag others down with us when we should be pointing them to the Living Christ by example and precept.

God grant that none of us shall faint nor fail Him in this subtle hour but that we may keep the faith, maintain a living, vital experience of regeneration and holiness and thus keep alive spiritually as well as bear fruit for Him until He comes again.

The activities for the Conference year are as follows:

The missionary service last Conference was a great success spiritually with Rev. Levi Troyer, missionary in La Gonave, Haiti, as speaker. An offering of cash and pledges amounting to over \$29,000.00 was raised at this time.

The General WMS Conference, which convened at Houghton, New York, June 23-30, 1959, was attended by Mrs. Erma Blair, Conference WMS Vice-president and the following WMS delegates: Mrs. Eunice Comadoll, Miss Elda Bence, Mrs. Helen Kuhn, Mrs. Muriel Terpe, Mrs. Evangeline Hannold and Mrs. Dorothy Larson, YMWB Superintendent.

Many activities and changes were reported by our delegates, one important one of which was the new Program and Plan of Work which we were able to mail out to the presidents before camp time. Many of these changes we hope to have more fully explained during this session.

The WMS Camp service was held August 25th with Rev. Daniel McCandless, returned missionary from Haiti, as speaker. Rev. H. Robb French followed by taking up the offering which amounted to nearly as much as usual in spite of the heavy pledging at Conference.

Other speakers at the WMS afternoon camp services were our own missionaries recently returned from Japan, Rev. and Mrs. William Cessna. Also, our own Conference girl, Miss Olive Stonebraker, who is now working at All Tribes Indian Mission in New Mexico, spoke once as well as Rev. and Mrs. Howard Barefoot also from All Tribes Mission. Rev. and Mrs. Glenn Pelfrey from Jamaica presented first hand information of this newly acquired mission field. All of these speakers, we believe, were anointed of the Spirit.

A sadness settled over the Camp as Sr. Lilly Merrifield, taken ill the second day of camp, August 20th, was ushered into her Heavenly reward in a very few hours time. A memorial offering was raised before Camp closed in

honor of our beloved Sr. Merrifield, who for many years was a faithful WMS President and a genuine missionary enthusiast. This offering at the request of her loved ones was sent for the support of native workers in Africa.

September 2, 1959—Mrs. Eunice Comadoll was duly authorized by the WMS President to organize a WMS at the Ellwood City Church, Ellwood City, Pa., with 10 active and 7 honorary members. The Conference WMS hereby extend a hearty welcome to this new Society and wish them God's speed and God's blessing.

Our fall missionary tour conducted by Rev. William Cessna was very fruitful and used of God. The exact dates were to have been September 15th to December 13th with one week off. However, it was necessary to give Brother Cessna time off November 3 to 14 as well as October 26-31. Some of the churches he filled in later.

Another sudden grief which came to us, though a spiritual triumph to her, was the passing of our beloved Sister Lillian Markell, November 4, 1959, after a short, severe illness. She will be greatly missed in both the local church where she was WMS President and throughout the Conference where she was engaged in so many activities, especially as Camp pianist for years and WMS President wherever her husband pastored. A memorial offering was taken for her during the year which the family have decided to give to secure a piano for Brainerd Indian School. A plaque will be furnished to designate this Memorial.

A memorial service will be held here this Friday afternoon at 2 o'clock for our beloved departed Sisters Lilly Merrifield and Lillian Markell.

At this Conference Missionary Service, June 17, 1960, the missionary speaker is to be the Rev. K. M. Ridgway from Australia, who wishes to present the project of entering New Guinea for missionary work. Let us pray much for this service and for God's will in the offering. Can we not make our goal \$30,000.00?

Also, we are expecting our General WMS President, Mrs. Helen Stark, to be with us from Wednesday afternoon to the close of the session. May the Lord make her presence a great blessing to us and make us a blessing to her as she may speak from time to time and mingle in our midst.

Miss Ruth Stearns, music teacher at Brainerd Indian School, will be with us some time during this session to give us news of the School. Besides, there may be others coming of whom we have not been informed.

D. V., we expect Rev. William Gale, President of Brainerd Indian School, to be with us for our Camp missionary service, August 23rd. Several of the Indian students are expected to accompany him.

In order to carry on our WMS business this year we have written six circular letters and other correspondence amounting to 765 pieces of mail. Our standard of efficiency rating for the year is 77%.

In closing our report, we wish to express our indebtedness and gratitude to Mrs. Erma Blair, vice president, who so kindly took our place at General Conference, June, 1959, and to all our other officers, who have been so patient and cooperative in every way throughout the year. Especially, do we wish to express our regrets at the resignations of our faithful and efficient treasurer, Miss Elda Bence, and likewise, faithful and efficient YMWB

Superintendent, Mrs. Dorothy Larson. May God bless and reward them for their past labors and open to them new fields of greater service to their Master.

Furthermore, words cannot express our wonder and deep appreciation for all our dear WMS ladies for these past years of cooperation, kindness and loyalty to your unworthy servant and for your bountiful support of the missionary work and cause of Christ. May the Lord reward you many fold.

As we look forward to a new year, let us set our goal a little higher and work a little more diligently, for we have one year less to glean in the Master's vineyard and there are still so many, many souls outside the Kingdom of Christ.

REPORT NO. 4

COMMITTEE ON PROGRAM AND PLAN OF WORK

We Recommend:

1. That the first meeting after conference each local society hold an installation service at which time the duties of each officer are read. (Note: New officers to assume duties first meeting after Conference. Refer to Wesleyan Methodist Discipline, Paragraph 301, 302).

2. That the program and plan of work be read and discussed as soon as the minutes are received and that it be referred to frequently.

3. a. That each society endeavor to hold a public monthly meeting, praying for those requests found in the Wesleyan Missionary and stress be placed upon personal evangelism. That each member feel a personal responsibility to bring at least one soul to Christ during the year.

b. That each district during the year observe one missionary service.

4. a. That we urge our societies to promote the Women's World Fellowship by meeting in two's and three's as convenient each Tuesday morning to pray for women around the world.

b. That a service early in the conference year be given to the local W.W.F. Secretary for enlisting prayer partners and encouraging prayer. Reports to be sent by September 1, to Conference WWF Secretary, Mrs. Mary Huntsman, 1220 Second Street, Brownsville, Pa.

c. Since we are requested by the General WWF Secretary to have a monthly prayer and fast service, we urge that all societies refrain from having meals at any missionary service since it does not become the interest of missions to be feasting when we should be praying.

5. a. That each society have an aggressive solicitor for the Wesleyan Missionary, whose duty it shall be to report all subscriptions to the district solicitor, send a quarterly report to the conference solicitor, Mrs. Evangeline Hannold, Boyers, Pa., and strive to place the magazine in each home of the

church and Sunday School. If possible, each society send at least one gift subscription to some interested family.

b. When sending in subscriptions always be sure to identify your church by its number and conference letter, A1, as published in the Conference Minutes.

6. a. That all society officers and delegates to Annual Conference be members of the Wesleyan Methodist Church. We also recommend that Conference Society Members be members of the Wesleyan Church and their local Wesleyan Missionary Society.

b. That each local society have a nominating committee if possible.

c. That the society send the incoming President to conference and elect the retiring President as delegate, assuming the expense for transportation.

d. That each society instruct the delegate the amount to pledge at the public missionary service.

7. a. That each society use the designated study book, and other helps, and encourage members to follow the Mission Study Course as recommended by General Conference. All literature to be obtained from the Wesley Press, Box 2000, Marion, Indiana.

b. That each society have a program committee of which the president is chairman.

8. That each society be urged to respond to the Card Call Plan and thus assist in the Extension Program of the Church. All Card Call money to be sent to Church Extension and Evangelism Department, Rev. V. A. Mitchell, Secretary, Box 2000, Marion, Indiana, and stubs to be sent to Mrs. Neva Golden with the statistical blank. This not to apply on budget.

9. That in as much as the American Bible Society prints our Bible transcripts without charge, we support it with prayer and finance.

10. a. That, where possible, each society have a Mercy and Help Committee, whose duty it shall be to visit the sick and needy and give aid where necessary, and send flowers and greeting cards to shut-ins.

b. That we encourage the giving of special memorial gifts as recommended by General Conference for the promotion of definite missionary work as living tribute to the memory of deceased loved ones, instead of the usual extravagant floral tribute.

11. a. That we put forth a special effort to secure every woman in the church as a member of the society, or bring about a 10 per cent gain in membership.

12. That we follow the Denomination Monthly Emphasis:

June—Installation of officers

September—Membership

October—Education

November—American Bible Society

December—White Christmas

January—Subscription

February—Women's World Fellowship

March—Personal Evangelism

April—Self Denial

REPORTS

13. That the delegate's credentials be sent at least two weeks before conference to the Conference Wesleyan Missionary Secretary, Mrs. Eunice Comadoll, R. D. 2, Utica, Pa.

14. That statistical blanks with all vouchers not sent to the sub-treasurer and statements, both for local church work and "Other Objects" grouped together, be sent with an itemized list attached to receipts and with sufficient postage, at least by May 15, to the Statistical Chairman, Mrs. Neva Golden, R. D. 2, Reynoldsville, Pa.

15. That local missionary treasurers keep a record of all money paid in pledges and report the amount on each pledge, at least two weeks before Conference to the Conference WMS Treasurer, Mrs. Edith Christy, 225 Brook Street, Titusville, Pa.

16. That the report of the Mission Study Secretary be sent to Mrs. Muriel Terpe, R. D. 4, Mercer, Pa., Conference Secretary of the Mission Study Course, by January 15.

FINANCIAL

17. That \$.40 be raised for each active member for Conference entertainment and sent to the Sub-treasurer before the books close, April 30. An extra donation of canned fruits and vegetables or cash will be much appreciated and needed.

18. That each society be assessed \$.50 per active member for Conference WMS Working, which includes \$.10 per active member for Conference missionary cottage upkeep. This is not a budget item. (Southern W. Va. District exempted from the missionary cottage upkeep assessment).

19. That each society contribute \$5.00 or more annually for the support of Hephzibah Home, the same to be applied on budget.

20. That each society contribute \$3.00 or more annually to the Medical Fund. This not to apply on budget.

21. That we endeavor to raise one-quarter of the church education budget. This is to include the L. S. U. pledges.

22. That \$1.00 dues be paid by all members, active and honorary. That said dues be sent undivided through the local church treasurer to the sub-treasurer. All monies to be sent in at least quarterly.

23. That each society give the delegate an appropriate amount of money for the purchasing of literature for the society and for small offerings taken during conference.

24. That each society contribute at least \$5.00 for General Church extension and evangelism. This is a budget item.

REPORT NO. 5

COMMITTEE ON RESOLUTIONS

Be It Resolved:

1. That, since the theme of our Annual Conference is "Price of Revival" our Woman's Missionary Society adopt this theme for the coming year.

2. a. That we give ourselves to systematic Bible Study, fasting and intercessory prayer.

b. That we be faithful witnesses to those whom we contact, and when possible go out two by two in home visitation. "All things are possible to him that believeth."—Mark 9:23

3. a. That we be faithful in attending our missionary services, and not by indifference hinder our missionary work at home and abroad.

b. That we strive to obtain all of our men as honorary members.

4. That we give ourselves to prayerful study of the "Wesleyan Missionary and other helpful material, and that we do our best to interest our people in getting the Wesleyan Missionary into other homes and institutions.

5. That we adhere strictly to Scriptural methods:

a. In raising funds for missions, by sacrificial giving. "Freely ye have received, freely give." Matt. 10:8

b. In our programs by abstaining from the use of movies, slides, skits and plays in the church.

6. a. That we faithfully hold to the Biblical standards of our Discipline in creating a wholesome atmosphere in our homes.

b. That we stress the maintenance of a family altar in every home, with the children having a part. That we, as parents, faithfully instruct our children concerning the plan of salvation, urging them to obtain a definite personal experience, knowing that this will create in them the desire to follow Bible standards.

c. That we encourage our children to use their own Bible, and have a regular system of memorizing scripture in the home. Psalm 119:11

d. That we pray faithfully for our children in school, that they may reject any erroneous teachings presented and be careful in choosing their friends and associates. That we urge parents to take a firm stand against the immodest dress and evil practices of the modern athletic and music program.

7. a. That we abstain from all worldly amusements, including the theater, both private and public, the dance, cards, unwholesome radio programs, etc. That we abstain from reading or allowing our children to read comic books and other unwholesome magazines and books, and that we provide wholesome literature for our children.

b. That since modern mixed bathing is conducive to loose morals, we urge parents to refrain from visiting and permitting their children to visit, such places of questionable amusement.

c. That we abstain from all Sabbath desecration such as buying Sunday newspapers, pleasure riding, visiting, reunions, buying, etc. Isaiah 58:13, 14. Also that we refrain from patronizing establishments open on the Sabbath Day.

The Allegheny Conference

d. That we urge our people to refrain, where it is in their power, from having television sets in the home realizing that television is an evil influence, and will mean the loss of the soul if one indulges in looking at it.

8. a. That we who are mothers tell our children the true story of life and instruct them in the care of their bodies before they start school in order that they may hold these truths sacred and be prepared to withstand the low moral standards of this day.

b. That we parents be companions to our children, and provide for them wholesome recreation frequently, and as far as possible know where they are and what they are doing at all times. Also, that mothers carefully select their "baby-sitters" since there is so much immorality prevalent today.

9. a. That we uphold by precept and example modesty of dress, as becometh holiness, by which we mean wearing dresses half-way between the knee and ankle, with long sleeves and modest neckline, which things accompany purity and deep spirituality. I Tim. 2:9, 10 Also that we adhere to Deut. 22:5, "The woman shall not wear that which pertaineth unto a man — for all that do so are an abomination unto the Lord thy God."

b. That we refrain from the wearing of jewelry, which includes brooches and all other ornaments. Isa. 3 Also that we do not wear nude shades of hose, toeless and heelless shoes, or hats which display flowers, veiling, and other superfluous adornments. Furthermore, we urge our women to wear hose and dress modestly in the home, that we may be examples of modesty to those who approach our doors.

c. That we do not adhere to the worldly style of cutting of curling the hair, or the long bob. I Cor. 11:15 Also we believe with John Wesley on the Scripture, I Tim. 2:9, that "Broidered hair" means curled hair.

d. That we also dress our boys and girls modestly, thus teaching them early the importance of modesty in dress. Not permitting our boys to go without shirts, to wear shorts or sheer shirts, and that our girls wear long hose, and not be allowed to wear sheer blouses, shorts or slacks.

10. That we urge the avoidance of unnecessary debts, and the neglecting of long standing bills. "Owe no man anything." Rom. 13:8

11. a. That as far as possible, we refrain from patronizing establishments selling intoxicating beverages, and also that we discourage the use of tobacco in all its forms since we greatly detest the use and effect of both. II Cor. 7:1

b. We urge that our children be given early scientific instruction on the evils of tobacco and alcohol.

c. That we be patriotic by displaying the American Flag in observing national holidays, thereby honoring God who gives us freedom and liberty.

12. That resolutions be read in each society semi-annually.

These resolutions were heartily endorsed by the Conference body by a rising vote.

CONVENTION MINUTES**First Day — July 15, 1960**

The 29th annual Youth Convention of the Allegheny Conference convened on Stoneboro Camp Ground with the first service on July 14, 1960. At this service the appointments for temporary organization were read. The first business meeting was held on July 15, 1960 and was called to order by Rev. H. E. Schmul. Rev. Don Boyd led in singing, "Since Jesus Came Into My Heart." Roll was called with 32 pastors present, 71 delegates, and 9 presidents.

The Bar of Conference was set as the two central tiers of seats and the platform. The Vice President took the chair and the President gave his report. His report was accepted as read. The report of the executive committee on nominations for district and zone chairman was read and adopted. The treasurer's report and read and adopted. The auditor's report was read and adopted. The secretary was instructed to respond to a letter from the Orlips. The report of the efficiency standard chairman was read and adopted. The report of the prayer league secretary was read and adopted.

The meeting was adjourned by vote.

Second Day — July 16, 1960

The second business meeting was called to order by President Schmul. Rev. Donald Boyd led in singing, "We're Marching to Zion." Sixteen presidents, 82 delegates, and 31 pastors were present. The nominating committee read a partial report. Balloting for president ensued. Tellers were Roscoe Wilson, William Baker, and William Rosengreen. The second team of tellers was Charles Lincoln, Roy Wade, and C. L. Boston. The statistical committee report was read and adopted. The result of the first ballot was no election. The report of the committee of Goals and Methods was read and adopted. The second ballot reported — no election. The report of the committee on Resolutions was read and adopted. The third ballot brought the election of Paul D. Stonebraker as president by a vote of 82 of 149 ballots cast. Balloting for vice-president ensued.

A motion was made, supported, and passed that the new officers assume their responsibilities after the final public service of the youth convention.

The ballot for vice president resulted in the election of H. E. Robertson, Jr., by 115 of 144 votes cast. Balloting for secretary ensued. William Rosengreen and C. L. Boston were nominated for Prayer League secretary. C. L. Boston was elected by 71 of 132 votes cast. Donald Boyd was elected Efficiency Standard secretary. Ballots were cast for secretary. There was no election. The second ballot for secretary resulted in the election of David Phelps with 83 of 137 votes cast. Elwood Hannold was elected treasurer.

The motion was passed that all unfinished business be left in the hands of the executive committee. Adjourned by vote.

The system the Prayer League uses is for the primary effort in teaching our young people to pray, fast and read their Bible. Jesus taught that the greatest powers were demonstrated by those who knew how to pray and fast. Unless our generation of young people becomes skilled in the Word of God and knows what they believe and why, they are surely setting-stool pigeons for the false cults and isms that are fast taking our fair land. It is amazing to learn how few have a system of Bible study, a set time of prayer, or ever feel the importance of fasting. This should not be, but the fact that it seemingly is so prevalent among our young people is manifested in the fact that they find it so extremely difficult to retain an experience of grace in the high schools. While we readily recognize

all the godlessness in various forms, such as immodesty, the teaching of the theory of evolution, and the fads that are set by the popular group, still God can anchor many by the practicing of these few simple rules that are set forth in the Prayer League system.

There are still many of the churches and pastors who never responded to the request of establishing a Prayer League Society among each organized W.Y.S.

I suggest the following goals for this year:

1. That every W.Y.S. organize a Prayer League Society.
2. That every society elect a Prayer League Secretary, also to be sure to forward that person's name to the Prayer League Secretary.
3. That each local Prayer League Secretary be granted the opportunity to speak to each local group on the subject of Bible reading, prayer, and fasting.
4. That all membership cards that are now outstanding be gathered and forwarded to the Prayer League Secretary.

At present there are approximately 600 members in the League. May God grant that this would be the group that would prevail mightily in prayer to help turn the currents of modern day thinking into a gracious revival which we so very definitely need.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON GOALS AND METHODS

The Committee on Goals and Methods submits the following report:

1. That every church organize a Wesleyan Youth Society.
2. That each society send the name and address of the local W. Y. President and Secretary to the Conference W. Y. President not later than one week after election.
3. That each society pay annually: \$1.50 per full member for General Conference dues and \$.50 per full member for Conference dues, and request that each unorganized society pay Conference dues for each regular attender to weekly Youth meetings, and that this and all other monies to be dispersed be sent through the regular channel of local church treasurer and District sub-treasurer, books to close April 30th.
4. a. That our pastors and local W. Y. Presidents carefully read and do their best to carry out the program of our Efficiency Standard.
- b. That a committee composed of the Pastor, W. Y. President and Secretary or the Efficiency Standard Chairman, shall grade the local society quarterly, according to the Efficiency Standard. This rating shall be submitted to the Conference Efficiency Standard Chairman quarterly and the annual report two weeks before the Annual Young People's Conference.

c. That the secretary keep such records as are necessary for this committee to make this rating.

5. That each W. Y. support the Pioneer project of the conference.

6. That each W. Y. heartily support our missionary endeavor according to the requirements of the Discipline with one service a month for missions and we suggest that the offering of said meeting be given for missions.

7. It is suggested that each local society elect a "Wesleyan Youth" solicitor whose duty shall be to confer and cooperate with the Conference Solicitor.

8. That each local society strive to engage in as many of the following as possible:

- a. Street and institutional meetings.
- b. Cottage prayer meetings.
- c. Tract distribution.
- d. Door-knob evangelism.
- e. Visitation of sick and shut-ins.
- f. Cooperation with child evangelism, Daily Vacation Bible School, and Religious Education in public schools.

9. a. That each local W. Y. cooperate 100 percent to make Wesleyan Youth Week all God wants it to be, and strive to interest other young people outside the church in these services.

10. a. That a Local Prayer League Leader be elected to cooperate with the Conference Prayer League Leader to recruit volunteers for the W. Y. League.

b. That the name and address of this leader be sent at once to the Conference Prayer League Leader.

11. That the W. Y. augment the church and Sunday School library, or where there is none, sponsor one with good church literature approved by the pastor and adult counselor.

12. That each society send the President, two delegates, chaperon, and pastor, with expenses paid, to the Annual W. Y. Convention.

13. a. That the Conference W. Y. President arrange to hold at least one service in each zone of each district during the year.

b. That his traveling expenses be paid by a free will offering taken at the above mentioned place.

14. That the District and Zones evaluate their activities according to the following point system and an appropriate award be given to one achieving the highest percentage.

10 points for having at least 6 Rallies a year (except W. Va.)

10 points for over-subscribing the Zone Pledge by 10%.

10 points for the organization of each new society.

10 points for a Paid Conference Budget for every organized society.
(50 cents per member)

10 points for District or Zone Youth revival.

5 points for Conference dues for every unorganized society.

5 points for Chairman attending Annual Conference Convention.

5 points for Chairman reporting the year's activities to the Annual Conference Convention.

5 points for report of Zone Rallies sent into the Conference Messenger.

5 points for report of one Zone Rally sent into the Wesleyan Youth magazine.

15. That 1% of the General Fund be set aside as the Literature Fund, in order that pertinent literature be distributed to our Youth. Said literature to be approved by the Conference President, the Chairman of the Committee on Itineracy and Orders, and the Conference W. Y. President.

Goals for 1960 - 1961

1. That we seek to have a spiritual program that is God-honoring, Christ-centered, and Spiritual-directed.

2. That all Youth Societies report to the Annual Youth Convention.

3. That at least 35 W. Y. Societies report their Efficiency Standard rating to the Efficiency Standard Chairman.

4. That at least 5 new W. Y. Societies be organized.

5. That we heartily support the Conference W. Y. projects.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON RESOLUTIONS

We, the committee on Resolutions of the Wesleyan Youth of the Allegheny Conference submit the following:

1. That we as Wesleyan Youth, govern our lives by adhering to the Standards of the Bible and the principles set forth in the Discipline, as interpreted by the Allegheny Conference.

2. a. That we, as Christian youth, have a definite plan of daily Bible reading, Bible memorization, and prayer, and accept privileges of carrying a soul burden.

b. That we strive to have each active member of the Wesleyan Youth become a member of the Wesleyan Youth Prayer League.

3. a. That we refrain from reading unwholesome literature such as comics, Detective and True Story or other literature detrimental to our spiritual life.

b. That we build Christian character through careful and extensive reading of edifying literature.

4. That, because of the physical, moral and spiritual degeneration resulting from the use of tobacco, narcotics and alcoholic beverages, especially among our youth, we take a vigorous stand against these evils.

5. That we take a positive stand against worldliness in that we refrain from the following:

a. Card playing, games of chance, theatre attendance, public beaches, mixed bathing, dance halls (including participation in Senior Proms), skating rinks, bowling, circuses, carnivals, fairs, and viewing television.

b. Wearing of jewelry.

c. Worldly amusements and worldly organized sports.

6. That due to the problems of modern education, in as far as possible and advisable, we will support our own church schools with our prayers and finances.

7. That our societies be evangelistic in our plan of work by supporting the Sunday School and other church services, by distributing tracts, street meetings, personal work and pioneer work.

8. That our regular meetings be restricted to a time of spiritual uplift instead of a time of eating, drinking, and frivolity.

9. That each society shall appoint a proper chaperon for their group attending the annual convention, who shall be responsible for their conduct and attendance at all service of the convention; and we request the presence of the pastors.

10. That each society have two adult counselors, one of which shall be the pastor.

11. That a copy of these resolutions be posted and that they be read in the local society quarterly.
