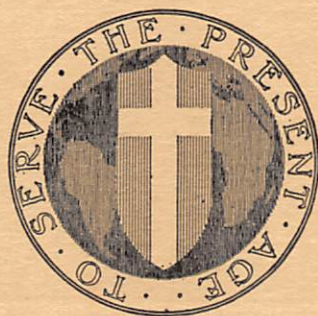

The sixty-sixth annual session of the Kansas Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Connection assembled in the auditorium at Miltonvale, Kansas, at 8.30 a. m., Monday, August 10, 1936, with the President, F. C. Hill, in the Chair.

The service was opened by singing, I've Anchored in Jesus, led by E. C. Campbell. Brother W. L. Carkuff led the devotions reading Revelations 22, and led in prayer, followed by R. O. Cooper.

SUNDAY SCHOOLS

We urge our schools to employ every available means for spreading the truth of the Word in the minds and hearts and lives of our scholars. We do not

Since there are good papers that can be obtained, let us fill our peoples' minds with worthwhile reading. No Wesleyan Methodist home should be without the "Wesleyan Missionary" and "Young People's Journal." A home should be subjected to rebuke which can afford a newspaper, but are too poor to take our Church papers. Religious news is more worthy of our reading than worldly news. May God direct us in the selection of our reading that it may be for the edification of the body of Christ and redound to the glory of God.

STATE OF THE WORK

With humble recognition of our dependence upon God and with a ready heart to give Him glory for all lest we be weakened through our seeming boast, it is fitting that we should recount the evidences of Divine blessing and favor upon the Kansas Conference the past year as manifest through definite material and spiritual gains on the various fields and through the continued and increasing degree in which a singleness of purpose and heart is gripping the entire Conference to move out and accept the challenge which the great need and responsibility of our field represents. We are seeking to be awake to discover weaknesses in our emphasis in order to correct them and also awake to appreciate fully the elements of strength in the great task of our Conference in order that we may more consistently and effectually stress them. The Grace of God has been measured to us in a marvelous degree and the blessings of the Holy Ghost have been poured out freely all over the Conference.

A new class has been organized at Hopewell with seven full and three associate members; a new class at Lawrence with five full and four as-

sociate members; and a class at Trudell with fourteen full and six associate members.

A church and parsonage property has been purchased at Naponee, Nebraska, preparatory to organizing a work there. With some further cultivation of the field there is promise of a substantial work being organized in Manhattan. The door is open to enter Leavenworth just as quickly as we can get to the field.

This has been an outstanding year with regard to acquiring, remodeling, and repairing church property. Living quarters have been added to the church building in Kansas City, Mo., and fifty opera seats have been secured for the church. Remodelling and improvements in Kansas City, Kansas include new stone steps, new bulletin board, basement wall reinforced, basement remodelled and redecorated, church and parsonage painted outside and bath tub and lavatory installed. A new church and parsonage has been purchased to good advantage at Phillipsburg. A new chapel has been completed and dedicated in connection with developments on the Salina field. The new Abilene church has been completed by the placing of face brick with white stone trim, new cement entrance steps and a wide cement sidewalk approach. The interior of the Willis church has been refinished and the outside of both church and parsonage repainted. The Union Valley church has been reroofed and refinished inside including much plastering. The Eskridge church has been redecorated, new light fixtures and furnace installed and half of church reroofed. The Mankato church has done additional building including a good double garage. Excavating is completed and sidewalk laid establishing the grade preparatory to building the new church at Gage Park. A new cement approach has been placed at the Hall church. Curbing and guttering is in process of completion at the Clay Center church. Also plans are nearing completion for the purchase of a parsonage in Clay Center. At the Langley church the interior has been papered, new window shades placed, new pulpit rug purchased, rubber matting for aisles, and new floor in parsonage kitchen. New carpet has been laid in pulpit and aisles at Gaylord. The Belleville church has been painted on the outside. A portable tabernacle has been built designed for temporary all year use in providing a place of worship on new fields.

There has been a net increase of \$6,317.91 in property valuation. The average contribution per member has been \$34.85 compared with \$38.24 last year. While there has been a noticeable and worthy increase in pastor's salaries in most instances, yet we are humiliated to observe the meager support of our good pastors in some instances, particularly due to drouth conditions. The good graces and the spirit of courage in which our pastors have borne these sacrifices give ground for grateful praise and also, we would pray, occasion for a plan by which the conference might meet these emergencies more effectively.

Every budget item shows a substantial increase with a total of \$7,684.80 being paid on budget as compared with \$5,974.16 last year. The Sunday Schools report an increase of 120 in average attendance with indications that this arm of our work is to receive greater emphasis and have more systematic guidance than heretofore. There are 286 subscribers to the Wesleyan Methodist in the Conference. This number should be greatly enlarged in another year. Two new missionary societies have been organized with a gain of 95 members and a gain of 116 Wesleyan Missionary subscriptions making a total of 287 subscribers. Further indication that this great organization of our women is vitally awake and active all over the conference is revealed in the increase of \$455 in monies raised. The prospects for the W. Y. P. S. were never brighter. This organization of our youth is taking distinct form and is fast making her influence for Holiness felt among our young people. We are looking confidently to our leaders in the development of this arm of the work as well as that of the Y. M. W. B.

While the world outlook is dark, the outlook for scriptural holiness is bright and the uplook is glorious. Sharing the blessings of this mighty message with others in an unworthy stewardship we may carefully say that Wesleyan Methodism is more and more making a place for herself and making her influence felt in this great Conference area. May the God of Heaven lead us on and out to greater victory.

The newly elected Missionary Board held its first meeting at Miltonvale, August 17, 1936 and effected the following organization:

STATISTICS

The Committee on Statistics present the following items of interest with their report of the year's work.

This year shows another marked increase in almost every department of the Church. The average contribution per member was \$34.85. Seventy per cent of the churches report higher totals for all purposes and 70 per cent higher pastors' salaries. Pastor's salary reports show: four above \$1,000.00, and eight others above \$750.00, but sixteen below \$500.00.

The property increase is \$8,400.00, while the indebtedness increase is \$2,082.09. There has been paid on old debts \$1,085.00.

Churches filling every item of the budget are: Belleville, Concordia, Eskridge, Excelsior and Hopewell, Hall, Kansas City, Kansas; Topeka, First Church; Topeka, Gage Park; and Wichita Church. Salina raised more than their assignments but did not fill every item. Kansas Conference Fund and Kansas Conference Missions show the greatest per cent

increase of any of the budget items with an increase of \$338.77 and \$385.40 respectively, while every budget item shows a substantial increase with \$1,710.64 more paid on budget this year than last.

The Sunday Schools report an increase of 120 in average attendance.

The subscriptions to the Wesleyan Methodist show an increase of four; while the subscriptions to the Wesleyan Missionary show an increase of 208.

5. **Sanctity of God's House.** Resolved, That such work as making quilts and disposing of the same be performed in the homes of the people and not in the houses erected for public worship.

6. **Pastor's Moving Expenses.** Resolved, That the class hiring a minister shall within ten days after his arrival pay to him his moving expenses, this not to be applied on his salary.

7. **Support of Conference Evangelist.** Resolved, That in case the Conference Evangelist arrives on any circuit to hold the Quarterly Meeting and service cannot be held on account of storm or other causes, provision shall be made by the Church to recompense the Conference Evangelist.

8. **Statistical Report.** Resolved, That the Conference require each pastor and evangelist to submit their Statistical Reports upon the first roll call at the opening of the Conference. If it is not possible for him to be present at the opening session of the Conference, he shall mail his report to the Conference Secretary so that it may be submitted at that time.

9. Reporting All Offerings to Pastors. Resolved, That all monies be reported to the Pastors for entry on their Statistical Report in order to give due credit both to the Charge and to the Conference.

10. Conference Evangelists. Resolved, That it be the sense of our Conference that our Conference Evangelists by virtue of their office, if not elected as members, be advisory members of the Committee on Pastoral Relations.

11. Subscription Lists Record. Resolved. That the President and the Conference Evangelist be supplied with all Subscription Lists taken at Conference to be carried with them in traveling the Conference, and that the Secretary supply all pastors with such Subscription Lists.

12. Unleavened Bread. Resolved, That it be the sense of this Conference that all our churches use unleavened bread in the administration of the Lord's Supper. We suggest the following recipe: $\frac{1}{3}$ cup flour, 1 teaspoon butter (heaping), moisten with milk enough to roll. Mark in $\frac{1}{2}$ inch squares and make as pie dough. The above will serve 50 persons.

13. Pastor Nominates Steward. Resolved, That it be the sense of this Conference that the pastor be granted the privilege of nominating one member to the Board of Stewards from each church on his charge.

14. Group Convention Leaders. Resolved, That a Convention Committee be composed of representatives of the W. H. & F. M. S., Holiness Conventions, Sunday School Rally, and the W. Y. P. S. for their respective Districts to plan such joint conventions over such period of days as they may see fit.

15. To Hold Quarterly Meetings. Resolved, That the Conference President shall travel the Conference and care for one-half of the Quarterly Meetings.

Further, That we have a Conference Evangelist who shall travel the Conference and care for the other half of the Quarterly Meetings, together with any other duties assigned him by the Conference.

16. Offerings For Minutes. Resolved, That the pastors of the various charges of the Conference take an offering on their charge some time during the year to defray the expense of publishing the Conference Minutes, the amount of the same to apply on the Conference Budget.

17. Inspection of Church Property. Resolved, That it is the sense of the Annual Conference that the Conference President and Quarterly Conference Evangelist should inquire at each Quarterly Conference whether the local church property is properly repaired and insured.

THE KANSAS CONFERENCE

18. Opening Date of Conference. Resolved, That the opening date for Conference be on the Monday nearest August 10.

19. Nominating Committee. Resolved, That all Conference Sessional Committees be filled through a Nominating Committee, and that the Conference President be Chairman ex-officio.

20. Night Services Evangelistic. Resolved, That it is the sense of this body that all its night services be conducted along strictly evangelistic lines.

21. Delegate Arranging for Pastor. Resolved, That if any Delegate leaves Conference without completing arrangements for a pastor, the Pastoral Relations Committee may be free to appoint to their charge any pastor that they may select.

22. Theological Institute. Resolved, That the Theological Institute begin the first Monday in April and continue through Thursday, and that the Ministerial Association begin Thursday at 2 p. m. of that week and continue over Friday.

23. Vote on Pastor. Resolved, That we as a Conference set the second week in June as the time when the churches shall take the vote on retaining their pastor, providing he has not expressed his purpose to change.

24. Emergency Dollar Crusade. Resolved, That an Emergency Volunteer Dollar Crusade be organized to be ready for call at the discretion of the President and his Advisory Committee to meet any emergencies which may arise having to do with the best interest of God's work in the Conference. It is understood that not more than 5 calls be made in any one Conference year.

PLAN OF WORK

We, the Committee on Plan of Work, hereby recommend the following:

Division I. Local Work

1. That this Plan of Work be read quarterly in each Local Society.
2. That we observe the "Red Letter Days:"
 - A. Harvest Home Day for Educational Work.
 - B. Easter—programs and offerings for Home Missions Connectionally supported.
 - C. The World Day of Prayer—we recommend that the District Organizers make definite plans for the observance either by districts or local societies.
 - D. May Day—to be known as gift day, bandages and such gifts as can be sent out with outgoing missionaries or used in our home fields.
 - E. Wesleyan Missionary Day—public presentation of Missionary Magazine in effort to secure subscriptions.
3. That October 23 be observed as Harvest Home Day. We urge each Society to send cash or make donations to the Dormitory and report some to Harvest Home Committee to receive credit on the Educational Budget.
4. That by recommendation of the General Conference Society all local dues be sent to our Conference Treasurer and be divided as follows: 25 cents to be forwarded to the Treasurer of the General Conference for General Fund, 25 cents to be retained in the Conference Treasury, and the remaining 50 cents be used for missionary work and be applied on Church Budget. Please designate specifically where credit is desired.
5. That each Local Society elect a Solicitor for the Wesleyan Missionary, the same to be a permanent officer. Her duties shall be to secure renewals and fill up the quota for her society.
6. We recommend the use of a monthly envelope system for the collection of dues, the Treasurer to keep record of the amounts paid in.
7. That each Society contribute 10 cents per member to pay General Conference Delegate's expenses.

8. That each Society contribute at least \$6.00 for Home Missions Connectionally supported.

9. We urge each Society to contribute at least \$5.00 to the Hephzibah Orphanage. Such contribution to be applied on Budget.

10. That each Local President appoint a Committee of two quarterly, whose duty shall be to visit the sick and to work in harmony with the pastor in rendering assistance that will help in reaching souls and building up the kingdom of God.

11. That the President of each Local Society be made responsible to arrange with the pastor for one evening of the third week of each month to pray especially for the Mission work, the same to be preceded by a day of fasting. We also recommend that an offering be taken at each of these services as follows:

- A. September, December, March and June, Grace Davis' salary.
- B. October and November for Education.
- C. January—Hephzibah Orphanage.
- D. February—Kansas Conference Missions.
- E. April—Home Missions.
- F. May—Bethshan Home.
- G. July—Medical Missions.

12. In harmony with the recommendation of the General Society we urge that our ladies observe Friday of each week as a day of fasting and prayer for a Connection-wide revival, until it comes.

13. We recommend the use of the Programs printed in the Wesleyan Missionary.

14. That all bandages be sent to Rev. E. F. McCarty, 222 S. Clemens Ave., Lansing, Mich., receiving credit of 50 cents per pound but does not apply on Local Church Budget. Before sending donations of clothing for use in Home Mission work secure information from the workers concerning proper addresses for mailing packages. See Magazine Directory for addresses.

15. That all money be disbursed through our Local and Conference Treasurers. That all money or receipts applying on Budget be sent from the Local W. H. and F. M. S. Treasurer to the Conference Treasurer quarterly. This money should all be in the hands of the Conference Treasurer by August 1. That each Local Society use the Treasurer's Book prepared by the General Conference Society, the same to be audited by a committee of two before the report is adopted.

THE KANSAS CONFERENCE

16. That the annual report be prepared by the President, Secretary and Treasurer of the Local Society, one copy to be sent to Committee on Statistics, Mrs. N. Mae Clark, Perry, Kansas, two weeks before Conference, the duplicate copy to be brought to Conference by Delegate. The names of the out-going President and Secretary should appear on the regular report and the names of the newly elected President and Secretary should appear on the back of the Report Blank.

17. That each Society grade themselves by the Efficiency Standard, which is to be read at the last business meeting. A grade of 10 percent will be given on each of any ten points chosen. Societies making a grade of 90 percent will receive honorable mention and those making a grade of 100 percent will be placed on the Honor Roll.

18. We urge the reading of the Report on Moral Reform at four public meetings during the year.

19. That each Society have a Committee of two to see to the gathering in of foodstuffs for the Conference dining hall. The minimum for each Society shall be: 10 quarts of fruit spread, 10 quarts of pickles, relish or catsup, 10 pounds of noodles, and one-half dozen tea towels. Fruit, vegetables, rice, beans or macaroni may be substituted. This does not apply on Budget or Society apportionment. We recommend that churches sending larger delegations increase their proportion according to their delegation.

20. That the Local Society cooperate with the Temperance Superintendent of the Sunday School in observance of Temperance Sunday.

21. That our Conference goal for the coming year be 650 members, 375 magazines and \$5,500 Budget.

22. That honorary membership be undivided and applied on Missionary Budget.

Division II. Conference Work

23. That the W. H. and F. M. S. Conference open Thursday at 10 a. m. of Camp Meeting week and that we accept the kindly offer of the Camp Meeting Committee giving us the first Sabbath afternoon of the Camp for our Public Meeting.

24. That the President and District Organizers arrange the time and recommend the worker for the Convention also that they prepare the schedule for the visitation of our worker.

25. That each District be supervised by the District Organizer under the direction of the Conference President. The organizer shall be Prayer

Secretary and Magazine Committee of her District and shall report the conditions of her District to the President quarterly. We suggest that each Organizer meet with each Local Society once during the year.

26. The Districts are as follows:

District No. 1—Topeka 1st, Gage Park, Ottawa, Fairview, Eskridge, William's Chapel, Kansas City, Kans.; Kansas City, Mo.; Willis, Easton, Brotherly Love Mission, Lawrence.

District No. 2—Clay Center, Antioch, Bethany Chapel, Wesley Chapel, Abilene, Trudell, Miltonvale, Salina.

District No. 3—Concordia, Hall, Belleville, New Hope, Morgan Chapel, Heber, Hollis, Union Valley.

District No. 4—Wichita Church, Wichita Mission, Excelsior, Grace Chapel.

District No. 5—Mankato, Wesley Center, Formoso, Victor, Hardy.

District No. 6—Cedar, Phillipsburg, Iowa Union, Inglewood, Gaylord, Naponee.

27. That the Gleaners each:

- A. Observe the monthly Prayer Hour.
- B. Be a subscriber to the Wesleyan Missionary.
- C. Furnish five pounds of bandages.
- D. Write at least once to each of the Mission Fields.
- E. Write to some other member of the Gleaners once quarterly.
