We rejoice in her open and fearless declaration for the fundamentals of the Christian faith. We rejoice in her unparalleled progress and view with anxiety anything which might tend to hinder her advancement, or interfere with her usefulness.

The love of the mother who brought the child into existence stands ready to defend it against every foe that would seek to enter her walls or divide her ranks. We consider an attack upon the college as an unfriendly act toward the Church.

We regret that unfriendly rumors have been circulated, which take the form of a personal attack upon the school and its management. Those who know the facts, know that these attacks are unwarranted, unkind, unchristian and vicious, and unbecoming anyone professing any state of Christian grace.

Were these attacks made by those outside our borders they might be passed with little notice; but coming as they do from those within our ranks, they demand attention and severe rebuke for those who are guilty, for our Discipline and the Word of God forbid evil speaking.

We therefore denounce such actions and express our desire and determination as a Conference, to rid ourselves of the sin of evil speaking.

A motion prevailed that the Assistant to the Treasurer receive the sum of \$10.

A motion prevailed that when we adjourn, we adjourn at the call of the chair.

The minutes were read and approved.

Upon motion the Conference adjourned.

RESOLUTIONS AND LAWS OF INDIANA CONFERENCE.

1. It is contrary to the spirit of the Discipline and our principles for our preachers to assist in any service with oath-bound societies.

2. That any candidate for Elder's Orders or to travel under the direction of the Conference, who fails to attend the Institutes and the examinations of the Committee, without sufficient cause, shall be deemed unworthy of the trust and care of souls, and refused a place among us as a minister of the Gospel, and when they shall fail to attend the Institute for two successive years they shall be dropped from the roll.

3. That it is the sense of this Conference that our houses of worship should not be open to any evangelist or minister of any other church to hold a series of meetings or to maintain a regular appointment for another congregation; provided, however, that usual denominational courtesies be extended to other ministers in occasional appointments.

4. Any waiving of the above resolution by a contract or lease of building must be obtained through the Board of Trustees of the Indiana Conference.

5. Whereas, The Discipline requires that the Stewards must meet the Pastors and agree with them as to the amount necessary for their support, be it resolved: That the circuits may at the same time enter into an agreement in writing with the Pastor as to the service he is to render to the church. In case the pastor shall fail to render said services, unless providentially hindered or released by the circuit, said failure shall be considered a sufficient cause to make an adjustment of the amount originally agreed upon. Otherwise the contract shall be binding upon both parties the same as any other financial obligation entered into by contracting parties.

6. Each pastor shall file a duplicate statistical report with the Committee before the close of the second day of Conference, said report to be kept on file one year, and hereafter these reports shall not be read in open Conference.

7. The membership, so far as possible, shall pay all their contributions for the Conference and Connectional interests to the pastors, who shall receipt them for the same and see that it is paid to the proper authorities. Where money is paid direct to the Conference Treasurer by the membership, he shall send a duplicate receipt to the pastor of the charge where such persons are members.

8. All charges with a membership of twenty-five or more shall in addition to the regular stipulated salary, assume the responsibility of providing a suitable home in which the pastor may live.

9. We recommend that all charges and stations to which the pastor moves pay the moving and transportation expenses of said pastor, the same to be done in addition to his salary; provided this shall not interfere with the previous arrangements between pastors and charges.

10. All unaccounted for members appearing in the statistics in the membership list shall be transferred to the discontinued list. The roll of all the classes upon the charges shall be put in the hands of the Pastors and they have charge of the same and make all entries therein.

11. The Committee on Elder's Orders is hereby empowered to transfer all persons to the study list who may have been recommended to travel and may not have been given work.

12. It shall be a standing rule of this Conference until revoked by vote that the President shall receive \$35.00, the Secretary \$50.00, the Assistant Secretary, \$15.00, and each member of the Statistical Committee, \$15.00, the same to be apportioned pro rata among the various funds of the Conference.

13. The official character of no Pastor shall be passed until he shall have submitted a satisfactory report, including statistics.

14. It shall be a standing rule until revoked by this body that the President shall nominate his Advisory Board and the Conference shall elect his nominations.

15. It shall be a standing rule of this Conference that in the examination of character the Conference officials and Evangelists shall be called first.

16. In the membership report all members who are found on the circuits in excess of the number reported shall be reported received.

17. No letter of standing shall be granted in the interim of Conference or during the session of Conference, until satisfactory evidence is given by the minister making the request that no outstanding debts are unprovided for and that he has honorably withdrawn from the contract for service made with a charge or Conference.

18. Be it resolved, That where the Conference demands the services of anyone, that it shall bear the moving expenses, if any expense shall thus be incurred.

19. The Camp Meeting Committee shall be elected as follows: One for three years, one for two years and one for one year, and that the person elected for three years be chairman of the Committee, and that thereafter each member be elected for a term of three years.

20. Be it resolved that, It shall be the duty of the pastors to look after the insurance of our church and parsonage properties. All insurance shall provide for losses caused by fire and lightning, hail and tornado. A failure on the part of the pastor shall be a censurable offence. If the church fails to insure their property upon reasonable effort of the pastor to secure the same, then said failure shall be reported to the President of the Conference, who shall then have the property insured. In such case, all insurance monies received from losses by fire, lightning, hail and tornado shall be used in Church Extension work as the Conference Board of Trustees deems best.

21. It is the duty of the Conference Evangelists to inquire, first, whether donation stewards have been elected at each church on the charge, second, whether donations are given regularly and systematically. He shall call for a report of the work of the donation stewards and urge that the charges are expected by the Conference to give freely to the pastors.

22. Whereas, We have a scholastic standard for our preachers, and whereas those saved, sanctified and called among our own number are compelled to meet these requirements before ordination: Be it resolved that the Committee on Itineracy and Elder's Orders shall require all those desiring to unite with us from any other denomination or Annual Conference to present credits equivalent to our Conference Course of Study, regardless of their standing in the body of which they have been a member, and if they cannot do this they shall be required to meet the same conditions as our local preachers before ordination.

23. Whereas our Conference has never recognized the gifts and callings of a singing evangelist, and we have within our bounds people of such calling who have no recognition, may it be the sense of this Conference that such persons may be so recognized by a vote of this Conference and that their names placed on the list of Singing Evangelists.

CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS OF THE CHURCH EXTENSION SOCIETY.

CONSTITUTION.

Article I.

The name of the Society shall be: The Church Extension Society of the Indiana Yearly Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America.

Article II.

Purpose: The purpose of this Society is to extend the kingdom of God within the bounds of said Indiana Yearly Conference by encouraging new and weak churches to build good and substantial houses of worship and comfortable parsonages by loans of money at a low rate of interest.

Article III.

The officers of this Society shall be President, Recording Secretary, Field Secretary and Sub-treasurer and Treasurer.

1. The President of the Conference shall be the President of this Society.

2. The Secretary of the Conference Board shall be the Recording Secretary of this Society.

3. The Church Extension Secretary of the Conference shall be the Field Secretary and Sub-treasurer.

4. The Treasurer of the Conference shall be the Treasurer of this Society.

5. The Board of Trustees of the Conference shall constitute the Board of Extension.

6. The Executive Board elected by the Conference Board of Trustees shall constitute the Executive Board of Extension.

THE INDIANA CONFERENCE

7. The term of office of the officers and members of the Board of Extension shall be coetaneous with the corresponding terms of the Conference officers and Board of Trustees.

Article IV.

Duties of Officers.

1. The President shall preside at all meetings of the Society and Full Board and Executive Board Meetings and shall have general oversight of the work.

2. The Recording Secretary shall keep an accurate record of the proceedings of the Annual Meetings and the meetings of the Full Board and the Executive Board Meetings.

3. The Treasurer shall keep an accurate account of all the monies of the Society reported to him, and shall hold in trust all the funds of the Society, paying out the same on order of the Board, the President signing all orders.

4. The duty of the Field Secretary shall be to travel the Conference and secure members, money, endowments and bequests for the Society. He shall have honorary membership on the Board of Extension to act in an advisory relation to the said Board.

Article V.

1. The management and general administration of the officers of this Society shall be vested in the Board of Extensions.

2. The Executive Board shall have full power to make recommendations for loans, etc., in the interim of the Full Board meetings. Three members, including the President, shall constitute a quorum.

3. This Society shall work in harmony with the Indiana Yearly Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America: Points of difference shall be decided by the said Indiana Conference in session.

Article VI.

Any person of good moral character and in harmony with the doctrines of the Wesleyan Methodist Church, may become a member of the Church Extension Society, by meeting the following requirements:

1. By paying one dollar annually into the treasury of the Society.

2. By promising to pay into the treasury the sum of one dollar

for each built or purchased by a new Church organized during the year, not to exceed four; the same to be forwarded to the Secretary upon being notified.

3. Any person making a gift of \$100 or more to this Society, shall be granted a certificate of life membership.

4. Upon failure to pay said dues as indicated in (1 and 2) membership shall be considered forfeited.

Article VII.

A meeting shall be held during the session of the Annual Conference at which appropriate exercises shall be given, including a report of the work accomplished during the year, and a discussion of plans and methods for the advancing of the work. The time of the meeting to be a special order by the President of the Conference.

Article VIII.

The Constitution may be amended at any session of the yearly Conference.

Article IX.

The Society may adopt such Rules and By-laws as are necessary for the prosecution of the work.

BY-LAWS.

No. 1. Adopted by the Board of Extension in full meeting August 22, 1924:

All loans shall be for a period of not more than five years:

First year without interest.

Second year with 2% interest.

Third year with 3% interest.

Fourth year with 4% interest.

Fifth year with 5% interest.

If the loan cannot then be paid in full, satisfactory notes shall be given with bankable interest, the Board of Extension to be the judge.

No. 2. Adopted August 22, 1924, by Full Board meeting.

Loans from this Society shall not exceed 25% of the appraised valuation of the property concerned.

Report No. 2.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON FINANCE AND APPROPRIATIONS.

We, your Committee on Finance and Appropriations, submit the following report:

Inasmuch as the gospel ministry is a high and holy calling and should receive the loyal support of all the membership of the church, we recommend and insist that proper support be given the pastors of the several charges and also those ministers engaged in other lines of gospel work. We urge that our people consider the responsibility that is upon them and rally to the support of the work as the needs appear. We recommend the sum of \$1,000 as a reasonable minimum salary for pastoral support and we also recommend that pastors receiving \$1,000 or more cash salary, they shall

give their entire time, whereas those charges which have adopted the weekly pay system, or the envelope system, for supporting the pastor and meeting other expenses of their work have found it workable and successful, we urge its general use as a step toward the adoption of the storehouse plan as given in Mal. 3:10.

Recognizing the sacredness of the contract between a church and pastor and that it is binding until it is fulfilled by both parties, we insist that the provisions of such contracts be faithfully performed.

Evangelists.

We recommend that the Conference President's salary be \$1,500 with an additional \$100 as a compensation for his official duties as President, and that his expenses incident to his official duties as President be paid out of the arm of the work he represents.

We recommend that the two Conference Evangelists receive \$1,400 each, and wherein the quarterly meeting appointments fail to meet this amount the deficit be paid out of the arm of the work they represent.

College.

Inasmuch as Marion College has made some gains in enrollment and that the spiritual atmosphere has been good, we recommend that the Conference pledge hearty co-operation and loyal support to the school.

We, therefore, recommend that our pastors raise the educational budget assigned them and send the same in quarterly payments to the Treasurer of the College.

Believing that Marion College is a gift of God and that the duty is devolved upon us to give it our loyal support, we recommend that each pastor raise thirty-one cents per member, as per enrollment, for the purpose of meeting their portion of the College deficit as handed down to us by the educational society and apportioned by this Conference, the same to be paid during the first quarter.

Inasmuch as in the President's report the plan has been adopted for the raising of \$1,000 annually and interest on College Building Fund until the debt is paid, we recommend the previous plan of 15 cents per member be discontinued; and any remaining amount be referred back to the charges.

Inasmuch as the Educational Board has levied an apportionment of \$1.50 per member, we recommend the Educational Budget be raised on this basis on each charge.

Home Missions.

Whereas the results of using the Sunday School offerings on the first Sunday of each month for Home Missions has been so gratifying, we urge our pastors and people to the universal adoption of the plan. We recommend further that these offerings be promptly forwarded to the Conference Treasurer so that the thirty per cent which is apportioned to the Home Missionary Secretary may reach him without unnecessary delay. We recommend further that all monies raised for Home Missions go through the Conference Treasurer, except gifts for special work.

All monies raised for Home Missions shall apply on the budget of \$1.50 per member.

We also recommend all Foreign Missionary funds raised shall apply on the budget of \$2.50 per member.

We recommend that the Minute Fund be raised on the basis of thirty cents per copy and the quota be kept up to the present level.

We recommend that 15 cents per member be raised by the charge to defray the expense of delegates to the General Conference, same to be paid by January 1, 1927. We recommend all Superannuated Funds in the form of notes be collected by the Treasurer of the Conference and that the charges take an offering for this fund.

Report No. 6.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON RESOLUTIONS.

We, your Committee on Resolutions, beg leave to submit the following report:

Considering the great evils that are pressing in upon the free spirited American people, we desire to emphasize our position in the following remarks:

THE INDIANA CONFERENCE

1. We wish to reaffirm the Wesleyan Methodist position concerning secret orders.

2. We insist that the rules of the Discipline relative to dress be followed, that it be as "becometh holiness" and believe that those who do not comply with these rules should not be seated as Conference delegates.

3. Seeing that tobacco is becoming one of the greatest evils and that the Church makes it a test of membership, we ask that our preachers will keep the harm of this great evil before the people so that we might do our part in checking this sin.

4. The Eighteenth Amendment is no more an experiment, but has been proven a reality. Therefore we urge our people to lend all the support possible to make it a success.

5. We regret the spirit of Sabbath desecration that prevails and are fearful that the Sabbath is fast becoming a wide open day in this country as in other countries. We see the open theatre, the dance hall, the baseball game, picnics, reunions and visiting, on the Lord's day. We request that our people refrain from these and teach others the necessity of being faithful to the command, "Remember the sabbath day to keep it holy."

6. The spirit of the age doubtless is due much to the failure of the pulpit. The Old Fashioned Message was filled with warning of the on-approaching judgment and hell, but the modern preacher has left it out of his discourse because it grates on the ears of his hearers and he has turned to the prophecy of smooth things. There has not been enough of good theology included in the modern message for the people to discover that there is a God, much less pointing out the way to Him for redemption. Thus men have become lovers of pleasure more than lovers of God, disregarding civil and moral law, fearless of consequences, whether they sit in the judgment seat or in the electric chair, and the age is rapidly coming to the fulfillment of prophecy as recorded in the Word. Therefore let every loyal Wesleyan thrust in the sword, preach the Word without fear or favor, and be possessed with the Spirit of prayer rather than the spirit of the age.

7. We consider that the unity of the brethren is the most essential factor in the onward progress of the Church. It is said "United we stand, divided we fall." Truly this is no time for the Church to be divided, but there is every reason to believe that we should stand together and support our faithful leaders who have sacrificed every possible power to bring to us what we have as a Church. It will take the love of God, divine love, the love that

Report No. 10.

REPORT OF CONFERENCE SUNDAY SCHOOL BOARD.

We, the Sunday School Board, beg leave to submit the following report:

The Sunday School Secretary has traveled the Conference the entire year, attending Sunday School every Sunday but one in the year and addressing every School where he has been given the opportunity. He has sought to give constant encouragement and help to the local work and workers, advising and informing them as to the Standards of the Church. Almost without exception splendid co-operation has been found. Gratifying devotion and a deep degree of spirituality has been found almost everywhere in the work of the Schools. In the month of May the Secretary, accompanied by the other members of the Board, held six Conventions in the State, the entire Board taking part in each Convention.

This has proved an inspiration to the Board and a blessing to the Conventions.

The interest at present is quite low in the Teachers' Training work, only one or two classes in operation. The Board has paid Connectional office, \$210.58; Secretary's salary, \$200; printing, \$13.25; postage, \$2.30; received for Secretary's salary and Convention expenses from districts, \$128.

The Sunday Schools have raised for Home Missions the sum of \$2,446.10, reporting 8,060 in Sunday School, with 486 converted and 224 joining the church, and expended for local expenses the sum of \$6,133.92.

The Sunday School is a distinct element in the evangelistic work of the Church. It ought, therefore, to be carefully safeguarded and organized and supervised that it may be effective and its work conserved.

We, therefore, recommend that the classes and departments be carefully enrolled and those thus enrolled become a serious concern to the ones in their charge.

No literature in print excels our own in spirituality combined with efficiency. The primary grades are well provided for both with quarterlies and papers and we feel like insisting that all our schools use our literature and thus avoid the light and trashy element so prevalent in the print of the day.

Districting.

We recommend that the Conference work be divided and superintendents be supplied as follows:

Northern—Amos Jackson.
North Central—F. O. Spitler.
Eastern—Eugene Hunter.
South Central—J. H. Brown.
Western—C. L. Enyeart.
Southern—Webb Perry.

Reorganization, Statistics and Information.

1. We recommend that all our schools reorganize between July first and fifteenth.
2. Each Sunday School Superintendent shall report the work of the Sunday School to each quarterly meeting.
3. The pastor shall report each School under his care to the Conference Sunday School Secretary by August first on the blank furnished for that purpose.
4. It is the duty of the Departmental Superintendent in each School to have general oversight of their respective departments in the School and seek to increase interest in the same.
5. Each District Departmental Superintendent shall have general oversight of the general interest of his department in the district and shall seek to assist and encourage the local workers.

The District Conventions have proven a unifying and inspiring element in the work and should be continued.

1. We recommend that conventions be held in the spring and that we seek to make them powerful spiritual forces.

2. These conventions shall be held by the District Superintendents under the direction of the Conference Sunday School Secretary.

3. We recommend that the Conference apportionment be ten cents per member, total enrollment, including Cradle Roll and Home Department. One-half shall be used in the Conference work and one-half sent to the Connectional Secretary to be used in advancing the general efficiency of the work.

4. We urge that this amount be sent to the Conference Treasurer not later than August 1st.

5. We would urge all our schools to comply with the Discipline in giving the first Sunday's offering of each month for Home Missions. God has especially blessed this plan of work.

PRESIDENT'S ADDRESS.

Dear Sisters and Members of the Woman's Home and Foreign
Missionary Society of the Indiana Conference:

God, in His all-wise providence, has seen fit to spare our lives
till today, and has permitted us to gather once more on this hallow-
ed spot in an annual Conference gathering. Hallowed, first, because
of the presence of Him who has bid us go into all the world and
preach the gospel to every creature; secondly, it is hallowed by a
thousand precious memories of happy times spent here together in
the many years of the past!

While we are happy to greet each other, many faces we beheld last year will never be seen here again, but they have gone to join their Saviour and the saints who have preceded them to the heavenly home!

We wish here to mention our Gleaner's President, Mrs. Irma Higgins, and the local President of the writer's home Society, Mrs. Dora Norman, both faithful, godly women of precious memory, and we can but pray that their mantle will fall on others equally competent and worthy!

In view of the fact that this is my last year to serve the Church as President of the Conference W. H. & F. M. Society, my thoughts have been rather retrospective, and so I have hunted up some of the old minutes to compare the work of then and now. I find in 1906 we had thirty-eight circuits, with a membership of 3,709. The church raised for Conference Missions \$888.86, for Educational purposes \$126.31, for Foreign Missions \$796.05. There were eleven Missionary Societies and four Y. M. W. B.'s. The total amount raised by both was \$441.72, the four Bands raising \$25.42.

From the minutes of 1925 I can only give the W. H. & F. M. Society and Y. M. W. B. reports as the 1906 pastors include ours with their reports; but there were sixty-one societies, and a total membership of 1,139 members, and the amount raised by these for all purposes was \$6,913.88. There were sixty-seven Bands and the amount raised \$3,826.78. Making a total of \$10,740.66.

As there has only been an increase of 373 in the membership of the church, we must admit that there has been a great awakening along missionary lines.

The returned missionaries giving their stirring addresses, the yearly missionary conventions, with our splendid conference gatherings from year to year, no doubt have had much to do with the rapid strides that have been made. Then, too, most of our pastors and church officials have co-operated with us to help bring about the success of the work. Let us give all honor to Christ who has come into our hearts, and caused us to want to help spread His glorious gospel to the uttermost parts of the world.

Dear sisters, a great task still lies before us. Sin is rampant in our own country, which calls us to holy living and liberal giving, and the heathen world is steeped in filth of both body and soul, and is bound by superstition and sin, which nothing but the gospel of our Lord will ever reach. May I not admonish us all to faithful service and diligent study of this great task, so that as one by one

we cross the great divide between two worlds, we may hear that coveted sentence, "Well done, thou good and faithful servant."

I wish to thank you for your patience with me through all the years I have served you as your President, and also commend you for your hearty co-operation in every detail of the work. It is with a feeling of sadness I preside at this gathering, for I love each of you and know that I shall feel a great hunger for your companionship. I believe I will still have your love, as you shall have mine, and I ask that you continue to hold up the hands of her whom you shall choose to serve you in the coming years.
