STANDING RULES

- I. Conference President. Resolved. 1) That the Conference President be required, authorised and appointed to travel the Conference as President, having general supervision of the spiritual interests and benevolences thereof, holding at least one service.at each church during the year under such date as he may announce in advance;
- 2) That he shall raise funds to meet the demands of the Conference work, assisted by the pastors, and he shall receive contributions for Missions, Education and Superan-uated Ministers, where there are no pastors;
- 3) That he shall have general supervision of the church property, and shall inquire into the titles of the same to see that no property is loosely held, and shall look after the rental of Conference property, and see that the rent is turned into the treasury, and he shall investigate the possibility and feasibility of the sale of property not in use, and report his findings to the Board of Trustees and to the next annual conference;

4) That he shall be authorized to grant letters to disbanded classes;

That he shall be required to write non-resident members of Conference asking them, in case they cannot attend, to write the conference a letter of greeting and state the condition of their religious experience:

That he shall devote as much time as possible and as occasion may afford in 6) evangelistic and other meetings in the Conference:

- 7) That he may engage such help from time to time as may be available, and as he may consider properly qualified to assist in holding evangelistic and quarterly meetings, such help to be remunerated from the Conference Missions Fund.
- 8) That he shall represent the Conference at the annual conventions of the National Holiness Association and the National Association of Evangelicals or appoint an alternate.
- II. Trustees. 1) Authorisation. Resolved, that the duly-elected and qualified Trustees of the Illinois Conference are hereby authorized and directed to sign for the purchase, sale, mortgaging and conveyance of real estate recommended by the annual conference or, during the interim between the sessions of annual conference, by the Missionary Board which is the board of managers of the Illinois Conference. All such action or actions of the Trustees in compliance with the recommendations of the Missionary Board shall be deemed to be legal and binding upon the Illinois Conference, and of as full force and effect as they would have been if such actions on the part of the Trustees had been specially authorised by the annual conference.
- 2) Annual Report. Resolved, that the Trustees present to Conference an annual report of official acts and of assets and liabilities of the Illinois Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America, an Illinois corporation.
- Missionary Board. 1) Membership. Resolved, that the Illinois Conference Missionary Board be composed of nine members, five of which shall be ministers and four laymen; that in said number the Conference Trustees shall be included as members ex-officio, as well as the ex-officio members declared in the Discipline.
- 2) Duties. Resolved, (a) That the Missionary Board is hereby authorized to pay out all monies from the Conference Missions Fund, and during the interim between Conference sessions to act as a Committee on Finance; (b) That the Missionary Board act as the Conference Committee on Church and Parsonage Location.
- IV. Annual Conference. 1) Date. Resolved, that the annual conference begin on the first Thursday after July 27th, at 1:30 p.m., and close the following Saturday night; that Camp Meeting begin on the following Sunday and continue for eight days, including two Sundays.
- 2) Fiscal Year. Resolved that the Conference Fiscal Year close July 15th; that each local church fiscal year close June 30th.

3) <u>Budget Items</u>. Resolved, that all Treasurers shall mark receipts "Budget" or "Hot Budget."

- 4) Committee on Statistics. Resolved, that a Standing Committee on Statistics be elected, consisting of a Conference Statistical Secretary, the Conference Treasurer, two other ministerial and one lay member; that two lay members be elected at the opening of annual conference.
- 5) Statistical Report. Besolved, that no remittances postmarked later than July 5th shall apply on the church statistical report; that by July 15th each pastor shall submit to the chairman of the Statistical Committee his budget check sheet with receipts covering same, and his statistical blank completed except for the budget section; that the Statistical Committee fill in on the statistical blanks the budget items, both assigned and
- raised; that other items which are obviously incorrect be checked with the pastor.

 6) Audit. Resolved, that a competent auditor shall be appointed each year by the Committee on Finance to audit the books of the Conference.
- Sunday Schools. Resolved, that each additional Sunday School under the pastoral
 oversight of a Wesleyan Methodist pastor shall be reported on a separate annual statis tical report blank, provided each Sunday School has been recognised by the Conference Missionary Board.

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8) Board of Superannuate Ministers! Aid. Resolved, that the Board of Superannuate Ministers! Aid be composed of three members, each elected by the conference for a three year term of office, the terms to expire in successive years.

9) Orders of the Day Committee. Resolved, that the President, Vice President and

Secretary of Conference shall constitute the Orders of the Day Committee.

10) Leave. Resolved, that no member shall leave Conference session without permission of the president; that no ministerial member shall without special permission leave camp after the annual meetings until all responsibilities of the Conference are discharged, including camp clean-up.

11) Conference Officers. Esselved, that the officers be installed during annual conference at a public service announced in advance; office to take effect at the rise

of conference.

Resolved, (a) That the Conference President and Secretary constitute 12) Minutes. a committee to edit and publish the annual conference minutes; (b) That the cost of printing the annual conference minutes be paid out of the Conference Fund; (c) That the total number of minutes to be printed be ascertained on the basis of family units among the membership and active constituency, who shall each be mailed a copy.

13) N.H.A. and N.A.E. Resolved, that the Illinois Conference maintain a membership

in the Mational Holiness Association and the National Association of Evangelicals.

1) Authorisation. Resolved, that there be held an annual Camp W. Camp Meeting. 1) Authorization. Resolved, that there be held an annual wamp Meeting and that it be under the direction of a Camp Meeting Committee elected by the Illinois Conference, and that the Conference President, as chairman, the Conference W. Y. President, and the Conference W.M.S. President be members ex-officio of said Camp Meeting Committee.

2) Committee Duties. Resolved, (a) That camp grounds and buildings be under the care of the Camp Meeting Committee; (b) That the camp Meeting Committee have charge of the Camp Meeting Fund and appoint a treasurer to receive all monies and make all authorised disbursements from the same; (c) That the Cemp Meeting Committee shall have power

to engage workers beyond the present year.

3) Camp Meeting Fund. Resolved, (a) That all pledges and cash received during the sessions of Conference and Camp Meeting be placed in the Camp Meeting Fund unless otherwise designated; (b) That the incidental expenses of the annual conference while in session be paid from the Camp Meeting Fund.

- 1) Pastoral Service Report. Resolved, that each paster of the VI. Ministers. Illinois Conference shall report to his quarterly conference each quarter the total of his home calls, hospital calls, pastoral conferences and church business calls, and that the total of these items be reported to annual conference and be included in the annual statistics.
- 2) Pastors' Support During Conference. Resolved, that it be our plan that all pastors remain on their charges for one Sunday after annual conference and camp meeting and that the church's financial obligation to the pastor, whether he be leaving the field or not, be extended through that Sunday.

 3) Moving Pastors. Resolved, that each charge make provisions for the moving expenses

of the incoming pastor immediately after the annual conference adjourns.

4) Illness or Death. Resolved, that the Conference President be notified by the local church secretary in case of critical illness or death in a minister's home, and

that he shall send cards at once to the other ministers.

5) Minister's Vacation. Resolved that the Conference President and all pastors be given a two-weeks' vacation with pay, including two Sundays.

- 6) Ministerial Convention. Resolved, that there be held a Ministerial Convention from the third Tuesday evening to the following Thursday noon of February each year. Resolved further that the place of meeting and the program presented be left in the hands of the Committee on Itineracy and Orders.
- 7) Mandatory Membership in Pension Plan. Resolved, that it shall be the duty of each pastor to maintain membership in the Denominational Pension Plan or the Federal Social Security Plan. It is urged that all members presently on the roll join the Denominational Pension Plan; membership shall be mandatory upon new members accepting employment in the Illinois Conference after the rise of the 1959 esseion. It is urged that assistant pastors join the plan, paying their own assessments, or arranging with their churches to do so. The pastor's annual pension report shall be sent to the Conference Pension Treasurer no later than July 15th of each year.
- VII. Miscellaneous. 1) Conference Paper. Resolved, that the Conference publish a monthly paper called "The Illinois Tidings"; that the Conference President shall be designated Editor-in-Chief, and that the heads of the Conference auxiliary organisations be designated contributing editors.
- 2) Conference Prayer Interests. Resolved, that the information concerning coming revival meetings and other special prayer needs be published in the conference paper.
- 3) Expense of Conference Officers. Resolved, that all incidental expenses of all Conference Officers, Committees, Official Boards and helpers shall be paid by the Conference Treasurer when approved by the President.
- 4) Committee on Nominations. Resolved, that there be a standing Committee on Nominations elected to nominate the Conference Committees in advance of Annual Conference; that this Committee be composed of the Orders of the Day Committee and two lay delegates to next Annual Conference; and that these delegates be chosen in the alphabetical order of their churches.

JOURNAL OF PROCEEDINGS

First Meeting, 1:30 p.m., Thursday, July 28, 1960.

- 1. <u>Opening</u>. The eleventh annual session of the Illinois Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America was convened in the Chicago Austin Wesleyan Methodist Church, 500 North Laramie Avenue, Chicago, Illinois, on July 28, 1960, at 1:30 p.m., CDT. The Conference President, the Reverend Arthur L. Bray, led the conference in the singing of a song of old tradition, "And are We Yet Alive, and See Each Other's Face?", by Charles Wesley. The Reverend Robert Zuhl, of the Chicagoland Cak Lawn Church, led in prayer.
- 2. Communion Service. The Reverend Carl Olander, pastor of the Galesburg Church brought the communion message, besing his thoughts on Matthew 26:20-25. In presenting to the conference the sanctity of the act of communion on the part of the worshippers, Rev. Olander emphasized this central theme: "We meet here to share together, and to have impressed upon our hearts, that which Christ has done for us." Admonitions and prayers for the believer found in the communion ritual were read from the Wesleyan Methodist Discipline by the following pastors: Rev. William H. Dyer of the RevKord First Church, the Rev. Daren C. Durey of Creve Coeur, the Rev. Stanley Hill of Wyanet, and the Rev. Forrest Gearhart of Wheston. Communion was served first to the ministers, and then to the laymen, by the conference President, Rev. A.L. Bray, and the conference Vice-President, Rev. William H. Dyer. As communion was being served the conference Sang "There is A Fountain Filled With Blood". The service was blessed by the unusual presence of the Holy Spirit as ministers and laymen elike communed with God.

3. Conference Sermon. The conference sermon was brought by the Rev. David D. Grail, pastor of the newly organized church at Elk Grove Village. He brought to the attention of the conference the three exortations of the writer to the Hebrews (Hebrews 10:12-25) when he wrote, "Let us draw near", "Let us hold fast", and "Let us consider one another". In spite of these trying times, Rev. Crail admonished, we have a Christ who is interceding for our needs to an All Sufficient Father.

- 4. Opening of Business Session. The President called the meeting to order for the business session.
- 5. Roll Call. Twelve elders were present to answer the first Roll Call. (See Record of Attendance.)
- 6. Bar of Conference. The first five rows of the two center sections of pews were declared the bar of conference, and the elders were seated within the bar.
- 7. Conference Preachers Eligible to Vote. By prevailing motion a partial report of the Committee on Itineracy and Orders was approved, declaring that the following conference preachers would be eligible to vote: Rev. Cletus D. Kramer, Rev. C. C. McCarty, Rev. Arthur P. Mimnaugh, and Rev. Irwin Roist. (See Report No. 1.)
- 8. Credentials Committee. Rev. Wendel D. Craker and Rev. Robert W. Klatt were elected the Credentials Committee.
- 9. Report of Credentials Committee. Delegates' credentials were collected and presented to the conference. Motion prevailed that these delegates be admitted to the bar. (See Record of Attendance.)
- 10. Courtesy Committee. Rev. Cletus D. Kramer and Rev. William H. Dyer were elected the Courtesy Committee.
- 11. Report of Courtesy Committee. The Courtesy Committee presented the following people to the conference: Mrs. Cletus Kramer of Peoria, Rev. Irwin Reist of Chicago Austin, Mr. Herman Kuster of Creve Coeur, Miss Mary Tolbert of Chicago Austin, Rev. Willard Archer of Park Forrest, the Rev. and Mrs. Arthur Minnaugh of Hoopeston, Mrs. Meryl Biggame of Oak Lawn, Miss Linda Byer of Wyanet, and Mrs. Alice Woodhouse of Peoria.
- 12. Report of the Orders of the Day Committee. Copies of the report of the Orders of the Day Committee were distributed and the secretary read the report, which was adopted by vote, with revision. (See Report No. 2.)
- 13. Nominating Committee. The conference elected the following Nominating Committee by vote: Rev. A. L. Bray, chairman; Rev. W. D. Craker; Rev. William H. Dyer; Mr. Charles Kreger; and Mr. Norman Lennerville.
- 14. Adjournment. Motion prevailed that the conference adjourn for committee work, to meet again at the call of the chair. Mr. A. N. Carstensen dismissed with prayer.
 - 15. Adjourned meeting. The conference was convened by President Bray at 4:30 p.m.
- 16. Report of Courtesy Committee. The Courtesy Committee presented a lay visitor, Mr. Theodore Reigling, of Maywood, to the conference.
- 17. Report of Credentials Committee. The Credentials Committee presented Mrs. Evelyn Mimnaugh of Hoopeston to the conference, who was seated within the bar by vote.
- 18. Report of the Nominating Committee. Mr. Charles Krager presented the report of the Nominating Committee to the conference. The report was approved by vote. (See Report No. 2.)
- 19. New Meeting Place. By common consent it was agreed that the conference would meet in Hazel Hall, the downstairs auditorium, for the remainder of the conference sessions because of the extremely hot weather.
- 20. <u>Adjournment</u>. Motion prevailed that the meeting be adjourned. The session was closed with prayer by Rev. Cletus D. Kramer.

Second Meeting, 7:00 p.m., Thursday, July 28, 1960.

1. Opening. President Bray called the conference to order. Rev. William H. Dyer brought

- a devotional message based on II Cor. 12:1-8.
- 2. <u>Partial Report of the Credentials Committee</u>. The Credentials Committee presented the following people to the conference: Mrs. Valerie Cates of Chicago-Royne Avenue; Mr. Richard Priest of Cak Park; Mr. S. Hugh Paine of the Chicago-Roseland Church; and Mr. Frank Hames of Cak Park. These delegates were received by vote and admitted to the bar.

Report No. 4.

Conference President

Greetings in the name of the Lord! And high praises to our Savior whose grace has been sufficient for all the testings and challenges of another year. The price of preaching Bible Christianity in a day of overwhelming worldliness is just as high as ever, but there is a dynamic in it that results in transformed lives.

We count it a joy to be part of that great brotherhood of Christians known as the Wesleyan Methodists. We have a rich hereitage of doctrine, moral reform and evangelistic outreach. By God's grace we are doing our best to minister these blessings to the heartland of America. A goodly number of new folk are joining hands with us as we move for18 1960 Minutes of the

ward for God and the salvation of souls.

State of the Conference This eleventh year of our existence as a mission conference has witnessed the organizing of two of our pioneer projects—Elk Grove Village, pastored by Rev. David D. Crail, on September 13, 1959, and Wheaton, pastored by Rev. Forrest J. Gearhart, on June 26, 1960. These vigorous young churches have been received on your behalf and are presented for your hearty acceptance as members of the conference family of 17 churches.

The year has witnessed revival blessings in Creve Coeur and some outstanding spiritual victories in some of the other churches. On the whole, however, it has been a year of testing with a number of our churches showing losses in membership. The causes of the losses are readily apparent: First, the frequency of families moving away to other area, contrasted with the time it takes to get dedicated replacements with which to carry on the work of the church. Second, the failure of some to go on to holiness of heart, resulting in their finding the way too narrow. Third, the lack of a sufficient evangelistic movement in our churches which would cause new converts to multiply faster than our losses. The pressures of manual labor on building programs and the necessity of secular support incident to our pioneer churches take a heavy toll of the prayer and visitation time of our pastors. We do dare to believe that as some of these things are accomplished that we may be able to give ourselves to the ministry of the Word and prayer in such a manner as did the leaders of the early church, and in return experience more of their spiritual victories.

Statistically, the trends are still upward and thus are encouraging. Because of the new members received at Creve Cocur and the organization of Elk Grove Village and Wheaton, our losses were overbalanced to show a gain of 14— from 440 full members to 454. Total membership—full, associate and junior—increased to 627, a gain of over 12%, or 70 more than last year. The total amount attending one or more of the ministries of our churches exceeds 2000. The subscriptions to the Wesleyan Methodist approach the number of our full membership. The W. M. S. ladies report far more magazines than members, and the Wesleyan Youth shows excellent gains.

Total <u>Sunday School</u> enrollment increased from 1706 to 1833, or more than 7% gain. Main School enrollment increased from 1554 to 1633, and average attendance climbed from 1158 to 1200. We praise God for every gain, because each number represents an immortal soul we are trying to help.

Property holdengs have increased \$116,771 this past year to a new high of \$808,471. This excellent increase has come at a cost of only \$24,860 in increased indebtness. We paid \$17,835 on existing indebtedness, so that our total indebtedness now totals \$184,529, or less than 23% of our total holdings. Our obligations on our own church buildings are low—\$61,570 on \$477,200, with higher obligations on our parsonages due to our parsonage-chapel pioneering approach—\$122,959 on \$331,271; but parsonages are much more liquid assets than are sanctuaries.

Total budgets assigned came to \$17,835; total paid, \$18,662. Total for pastor's support was \$64,058; for local church expenses, \$78,376; for budget. \$18,664; for benevolences, \$14,771; GRAND TOTAL, \$175,869 or more than \$387 per capits! For the faithfulness of our pastors and laymen in the matter of supporting the denominational and conference program and outreach, we give fervent thanks to everyone!

Report of Personal Service. This past year has been the fullest year of the nine I have served as the administrative officer of the Illinois Conference. So full, in fact, that inadequate records of personal service have been kept. My labors during the latter part of August and during September and part of October were curtailed due to an enfeebled physical condition which followed my severe illness and hospital experience just before last conference time. During this period, Elk Grove Village was organized and much time was put in closing the purchase of the Rockford-Harrison Avenue Church site and the efforts toward securing adequate building plans and a construction loan. However, during an evangelistic meeting in Minneapolis in October the Lord saw fit to heal my body and grant strength for a busy year.

The total miles traveled in visiting the churches and promotiong the pioneer projects are 12,418. 5,000 additional miles were travelled in making three round trips to Marion as a member of the Local Board of Trustees, and in making two trips to Macon, Georgia, as a member of the Board of Managers of Hephzibah Orphanage. On the last trip to Macon a visit was made to Asbury Seminary to seek ministerial reinforcements for the conference. Contact was made with Dr. Roy S. Nicholson at Central College. He sends his personal greetings to those he loved and served so long. In addition 2,100 miles were travelled in evangelistic ministries outside our conference making a total of 19,518 miles travelled this year.

Official letters totalled 496. Due to the pressure of the pioneer program only 4 issues of the "Iddings" were put out to an ever increasing mailing list. Calls and conferences totalled more than 800. In addition the Roseland and Oak Park pulpits were supplied over a period of months in the absence of their pastors. The first went to Africa as a missionary in May and the letter united with another denomination in June. The churches have been visited in January and July in Quarterly Meetings, plus some other Quarterly Meetings in the other quarters and local church visitations for special

occasions.

It is a delight to serve the Lord and the Conference. His grace has prevented the burdens and unmet challenges from overwhelming my spirit and causing me to lose the glory of the work. The future is bright with the promises of God!

Comments: The above table shows that we have almost three times as many in our Sunday Schools as we have in total membership. This indicates that we have an outstanding evangelistic possibility in our Sunday School. Since membership is limited to those with a personal experience of divine grace who are willing to take upon them the standards of Christian discipleship, let us not fail to enlist the hundreds within our doors to the Savior and His cause!

OFFICIAL ACTS

- 1) As Chairman of the Missionary Board and as President of the Board of Trustees of the Illinois Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America, an Illinois corporation, I helped promote pioneer and other building projects, sought and obtained necessary loans amounting to many thousands of dollars, executed legal documents and signed the same together with Mr. S. Hugh Paine, Jr., Secretary of the Illinois Conference Board of Trustees. (See Trustee's Report.)
- 2) As President of the Illinois Conference and also as a member of the Committee on Itineracy and Orders, I certified our theological students and draft-age ministers to their draft boards as legally qualifying for proper draft exemption.
- 3) Throughout the year I have ordered payment of all bills owed by the Conference, using
- a requisition form to the Conference Treasurer in each instance. 4) September 10, 1959. Helped secure one-half tax exemption for Roseland and Maywood.
- 5) September 13, 1959. Organized Elk Grove Village Wesleyan Methodist Church with 12 members: 4 full, 4 associate, 4 junior. (They have 10 full, 2 associate, and 4 junior members now.)
- 6) September 27, 1959. Appointed Vernon Swanson supply pastor of Roseland.
 7) November 10, 1959. Received Vernon Swanson as an elder of the Illinois Conference by transfer from the Iowa Conference.
- 8) February 3, 1960. Filed annual corporation report with the Secretary of State of the State of Illinois as required by law.
- 9) February 3, 1960. Reported to Rev. Garl Beaver, Secretary of the General Conference, that the Illinois Conference and all our member churches had approved the new constitution of the denomination by a 100% vote.
- 10) May 5, 1960. Transferred Rev. Joseph T. Ledwell to the Chicago Presbytry of the Presbyterian Church at his request. He was accepted by them on June 14, 1960.
- 11) May 5, 1960. Accepted the resignation of Rev. Vernon Swanson of Roseland in order
- for him to sail for Africa as a missionary that week.

 12) May 7, 1960. Received Rev. Inwin Reist as a minister of the Illinois Conference by recommendation of the Austin Church and appointed him associate paster of Austin.
- 13) June 3, 1960. Appealed to the Illinois Department of Revenue for a reversal of their ruling declining to exempt the Rockford First Church parsonage from taxation. They

granted a 75% exemption. (25% remains because of a rental apartment upstairs.) 14) June 26, 1960. Organized the Wheaton Church with 19 full members. Subsequent addi-

tions bring the total to 20 full and 3 associate. 15) June 29, 1960. Granted Rockford-First permission to call Rev. Donald Edwards of our

- Englewood Church in suburban Denver, as their new pastor. 16) July 1, 1960. Granted Austin permission to call Rev. Hubert Mitchell as an evangel-
- ist for a fall meeting. He is a beloved brother of another denomination.
- 17) July 1, 1960. Appointed Rev. David D. Crail to preach the Conference Sermon because those elected would not be able to serve.
- 18) July 7, 1960. Filed tax exemption for Rockford-Harrison Avenue Church property.
- 19) July 20, 1960. Transferred Rev. Harry Moeller to the Wisconsin Conference at his request and their ruling.
- 20) July 21, 1960. Received the resignation of Rev. George Durey as a Conference preacher at his request that he might better serve the Galesburg Church in a layman status.
- 21) September, '60. Appointed Philip Crail assistant pastor of the Elk Grove Village Church.

In all the above actions where the Discipline requires, I have received the full approval of the President's Advisory Board.

Recommendations: 1) Since Rev. Donald Edwards, an elder of the Kansas Conference has requested a transfer of his membership to the Illinois Conference and has made this request in writing to his Conference President, I recommend he be received as an elder of the Illinois Conference, since he is in good standing in the Kansas Conference. 2) Since the Peoria Church has called Robert Fisher of Marion, Indiana, as their new pastor, and since he is known to the President's Advisory Board who have approved his reception into our Conference, I recommend that he be received as a Conference Preacher and referred to the Committee on Itineracy and Orders for referral to the Pastoral Relations Committee.

Report No. 5.

Missionary Board

We, the members of the Missionary Board, report as follows: By action of the last Conference a Standing Rule was adopted providing that the Missionary Board continue as the Board of Managers, as per the provision of the 1959 General Conference. In this capacity we have held meetings on August 3, 1959, and February 6 and May 7, 1960, to consider the state of the churches and plan for the extension of the Conference.

Out of the full record of decisions made we report the following:

WHRATUN. This pioneer project launched in the fall of 1958 has moved steadily ahead on the dedicated leadership of Pastor and Mrs. Forrest J. Gearhart. Public services began in the largely completed building on May 17, 1959. The denomination Wesleyan Youth support stopped at the end of August last, and the infant congregation has fully supported its pastor this past year as well as paying all local operating expenses. The denominational Department of Church Extension paid \$250 a month of the \$400 property payments for the first few months and have continued in recent months to pay \$200 a month. The Conference Missions budget has paid much of the balance due with the local church assuming

on May 15 the first anniversary was observed with great delight, and on June 26 the new church was organized with 19 full members. Additions since then bring the total now to 20 full and 3 associate members. On July 24 a full staff of competent officers was elected. The church faces the future with high confidence in God.

ROCKFORD HARRISON AVENUE. This second church project in Rockford, a result of the vision of Pastor William H. Dyer and the membership of our First Church in that city, validation of resolvent and an amount of the second of the forward during the fall for a chapel-parsonage building, 24 by 70 feet, but a construction loan was difficult to secure. Finally, in November, the funds were made available by the Home Savings and Loan Association of Rockford and construction of the building on a foundation which had already been started was approved. The shell of the new building was completed early in January, but unseemly weather and heavy spring rains retarded the construction. Then, in May, water pressure in the ground cracked the foundation walls and forced them in on one side. This was followed by a ten-week construction strike in Rockford. At the present time the building is being jacked up preparatory to putting new walls under it. Pastor and Mrs. Long and their faithful people have continued services in the chapel at Ken-Rock waiting for the day when their new building

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is completed. This young couple have taught school all year— he to support themselves in order that most of the pastor's salary could be diverted to the building program; she has put her entire check into the building fund each month. Such devotion to the cause of Christ merits and receives our highest appreciation! Let us pray that God will remove the roadblocks to the completion of the building in order that services can begin in the new location in the fall.

EIK GROVE VILLAGE. In similar manner Pastor and Mrs. David D. Crail have continued to teach school to finance their new pioneer project. On September 13, 1959, we organized the church with 12 members - 4 full, 4 associate, and 4 junior. Today the membership stands at 18-10 full, 2 associate, and 4 junior. The year has been full of problems with some going back to walk with liberal church fellowship because the way was too narrow. However, in addition to the victory of church organization, there has finally come the consent of the Centex Company to sell us land, the securing af adequate loans to do so and the transfer by deed to us of a fine plot approximately 149 by 523 feet right across the street from the parsonage on Landmeier Road. Plans are completed for building a 32 by 64 foot educational unit which will serve also as an apartment for the present for the pastor's parents who are selling their home in Maywood to help finance the new project. A community nursery school is planned to be held in the building, in order to provide a point of contact with the young couples of the Village, serve a tremendous need, and also provide finances for the construction of the church. The pastor's mother, Mrs. Faye Crail, who has conducted such a school in Maywood, will be in charge.

GALESBURG. Galesburg is moving ahead with the construction of their 32 by 64 foot kimbel Wildwood contemporary sanctuary and have the basement walls up and the first floor deck constructed. Finances are in hand for this project and Pastor Clander and his people plan to erect the superstructure as soon after Conference as possible. This is now a fully self-supporting work, but the demands of this new building program may require some aid.

CREVE COEUR is purchasing an acre of ground on which to build a new church. OAK LAWN is planning an expansion program. MAYWOCD has extensively remodeled the interior of their church this past year and has equiped it with new pews, pulpit furniture and rugs. It is delightful beyond description. OTHER improvements have been made in several churches of the Conference, too numerous to mention, but are a cause of rejoicing because of the advances accomplished.

NO NEW PROJECTS are contemplated this year. The present projects need to be brought to fulfillment and are tremendously demanding in time and finances needed. Let us continue to stand by our pioneer pastors with prayer, manual labor in their building projects, and faithfully paying the Conference Missions Budget.

Report No. 6.

Camp Meeting Committee

By action of last Annual Conference the contract for use of the Free Methodist Camp Grounds was ordered renewed for five years. This was done and the contract is in the President's file. Board of Trustees

The Board of Trustees took the following actions during the Conference year 1959-1960:

1) August 3, 1959. The Board resolved to purchase a tract of land for the Harrison Ave-

nue (Rockford) Church for the price of \$6783 (3.23 acres) to be financed as follows:

\$5000.00 loan from the Wesleyan Investment Foundation.

\$1600.00 loan from Mr. and Mrs. Fred Winterberg.

It is imperative that we guard carefully the time and interest they deserve and demand. With national emphasis upon youth, let us evaluate our past efforts, and, if need be, invest more sacrificially in moulding young men to match our missiles.

This year \$446.08 was raised for our Pioneer Project which was the Harrison Avenue Church in Rockford Last year our Pioneer Project was Wheaton and \$201.00 was received. A new plan of assessed Pioneer Goals more than doubled our usual giving through Conference dues. Special recognition should go to the W. Y. Locals of Oak Lawn and Wheaton.

They both exceeded their goals by \$25.00.

The Conference activities have stimulated more interest in the churches, and were consequently better attended. The usual fall North and South District rallies attended by approximately 55 young people, were changed to a Conference—wide rally at Wheeton with approximately 85 in attendance. Our Annual Spring Overnight Retreat was held at Palos Park with 91 registering. This increase of attendance reflects greater Conference and greater local church activity. It is regretable than only nine of our seventeen churches have an organized W. Y. Local. Of these remaining eight, most are running an active program of Christian Service Brigade or Pioneer Girls. Two churches have youth groups that meet but are not officially associated with Wesleyan Youth. Wheaton organized a W. Y. this year, and Roseland disbanded their W. Y.

The Youth Council, composed of Ida Craker, Marcena Wallace, pastors Gearhart, Kramer, and Strawser, and Rev. A. L. Bray, have proposed a new step in local youth leadership training. A leadership conference is scheduled at Lake Bloomington for Friday night and Saturday, September 16-17. It will include pastors, youth sponsors, and local youth leaders. (President, Vice-President, Secretary, and Treasurer.) The pastor's support of

this venture is urgently needed.

Personal labors have included a monthly mail contact with each pastor and president. A Conference efficiency rating was sent, with 4 to 5 Locals responding each month. There were 5 issues of the Youth Notes sent to approximately 250 young people each time. Galesburg was visited during Youth Week in behalf of Illinois W. Y. In collaboration with Rev. Forrest Gearhart a list of qualifications for a youth sponsor were compiled and sent to all pastors. The Conference Youth Council met three times during the year.

May our young people be impressed with our mission and impelled to have a share in

our ministry.

Member Local Board of Trustees of Marion College.

The report from Marion College is the most encouraging one we have been able to bring to you in the history of the Conference. The years have been long and struggling, but it appears that the Lord has made Dr. William F. McConn's last year the best in every way.

Student enrollment of 444 is the highest of any but the "G. I. Bill" years immediately

30 1960 Minutes of the

following the Second World War. Finances are at an all time high, with a total income of \$332,894.93 reported as of May 31, 1960. With expenses at \$266,875.00 you will note that the balance is \$66,019. This is not all clear profit because it must carry the College through until the fall with some assist from summer school income. However, Mr. Baldwin, our treasurer, states that we had \$30,000 additional this past year which was di-vided approximately equally between an increase in teacher's salaries, retirement of debt and additional working funds. The increase in income is explained partly be an increase in tuition, but largely in the increase in enrollment. When student income is more than \$1,000 per student, an increase in 50 students is an increase of \$50,000 or more. Actually the cost is nearer \$1200 per student which raises the figures some more. Most of our increase in students has been without the necessity of increasing the number of faculty needed.

This is the year the College is taking title to the Marion College Church to use for our new College chapel and classroom building. The basement is to be remodelled into classrooms and study areas. This represents an outstanding advancement for Marion College. The cost of the new chapel and the remodelling will exceed \$50,000 and is being covered now by a mortgage on the church building. The Board will need to present plans to the Marion Area conference concerning a method of financing this new advance. We have another year to go before the 17 acres campus enlargement is paid for, but will have

to face up to the price of progress.

The retirement of Dr. William Finney McConn on June 30, 1960, climaxing a lifetime of service to the youth of our church as president of both Miltonvale and Marion Colleges, brought to the helm of our College, Dr. Woodrow Goodman, the registrar of Houghton College, and for 13 years president of Bethel College near South Bend, Indiana. Already, Dr. Goodman has set forth plans for a vigorous administration and development of the college, looking towards North Central accreditation, and a more effective realisation of our educational goals.

Let me emphasise that lack of regional accreditation does not mean that Marion College is not accredited. She is fully accredited by the State of Indiana and Indiana Iniversity, and is accepted by a great number of institutions of higher learning. She is fulfilling the task given her by her parent denomination and deserves our heartiest support. She is located in a great industrial center and is also at the headquarters of our denomination. For the training of our young ministers this is important, and it commands itself to all our Illinois Comference youth. We have four excellent area schools, but as your trustee on the Marion College Board, I would exert you to be loyal to our area school. Lack of adequate finances have prevented Marion from paying adequate teacher's salaries which has been a main hurdle in regional accreditation. Increased enrollment based on area loyalty will meet this need and we will find answers to our other problems. Let us not magnify our problems; let us rejoice in our possibilities!

3. No one has invested as much in the progress of our churches as the noble wives and mothers who serve in the parsonages of our Conference. These noble women, carrying herculean burdens, and enduring, yea triumphing, over burdens that would defeat most of us, deserve, and are offered herewith, the affection and appreciation of this Conference. Corsages shall also be sent to any minister's wives who shall not be able to be present, and the expense of this recommendation shall be taken from the Conference Mission Fund. These are our missionaries without them every advance of our Conference would be stalemated.

4. For incomparable efficiency, and magnanimity unlimited, this Conference expresses its thanks to the Austin Church, her pastor, associate pastor, and people for the entertainment of this Conference. Special mention is made of the gracious services of the custodian of the Lord's House, who has labored to care for this Conference. As an expression of our appreciation we recommend that all lost and found articles, unclaimed when the delegates depart, shall become the personal property of the custodian. He may keep them or auction them back to the owners at the Camp Meeting site.

5. We do humbly thank the Lord for our Conference President, and all the official family of the Conference and its various departments: the Missionary Society, Wesleyan Youth, Sunday School, YAWB, and Child Evangelism; and we recommend that during the Camp Meeting session the officers be called together and receive free from all charge, a deluxe hamburger, with onions, and appropriate liquid refreshment; the cost of this to be absorbed by the dining hall operation.

6. Our cooks are new this year. In a limited sense, this is the type of adventure which faces every bridegroom and prompted the words of the famous poem by Gates Hebbard entitled "Advice For Grooms to Be." From the indications of these first meals,

we anticipate that the members of this Conference will become dilettante gourmets by the close of the Camp session, and we express our thanks to the kitchen crew, as they strive to outperform our wildest gastronomic imaginings.

7. Lay statesman extraordinary, irreplaceable, indispensable, almost incontrovert-

able, Mr. S. Hugh Paine, Jr.
To this gentleman, his wife and family, the Illinois Conference is deeply indebted. In Illinois, Houghton, India, Africa and Michigan the influence of this family is felt as God expresses Himself through their lives. Mr. Paine's desire to escape public attention is legendary. But even actual humility must make way for sincere and earnest recognition, and this committee recommends that the Conference President set a day in November to be known as the S. Hugh Paine Day in Illinois churches, on which day each church shall take an offering for church extension, and shall be instructed to communicate with Mr. and Mrs. Paine by letter, sharing Christian sentiments of appreciation for their past service, and anticipated future investments in our Conference.

8. To our verbose and vibrant Conference Secretary we extend felicitations on a job admirably begun. We commend him on his predictions that the Conference Minutes will be ready for printing at the close of the Camp Sessions. We recommend that if these high ideals be realized, that at the next annual Conference he be given a standing ovation of thanks, and that his Conference Secretary's salary be doubled.

9. Finally, brethren, we are thankful to the Lord that His blessings in a marked way

have rested upon this Conference in all its sessions. We are thankful for each victory won- each blessing shared. We express gratitude to the Lord for the strength to share throughout these long sessions, and for the alertness, enthusiasm, and participation of each delegate; and we recommend that no member of the Thanks Committee shall be permitted to succeed himself.

III. Miscellaneous assessments shall be:

Marion College Campus Expansion Fund: \$1.00 per member. General Sunday School Dues: 20% per member in main school. Conference Sunday School Dues: 10% per member in main school.

IV. President's Support and Expense:

- A. The tithe from the cash church salary of each pastor (excluding assistant pastors) be paid through the local church treasurer monthly into the Conference President's Support Fund. It is requested that pastors working at secular labors prayerfully consider giving one-half of their tithe from this source in addition to tithe of ministerial salary. · B. The Conference President's cash salary, in addition to housing, be \$400.00 per month.
- C. 7/ per mile travel allowance, in addition to other incidental expenses be allowed the Conference President. This expense shall be paid out of the Conference Pund.
- D. The President be paid \$20.00 per month for parsonage fuel expense, and that the Conference pay his group insurance premium and 12 pension membership assessment. This expense shall be paid out of the Conference Fund. V. Miscellaneous Recommendations:
- A. We request that the Missionary Board be authorized to subsidize the financing of the Conference parsonage by monthly payments of \$50.00 out of the Conference Missions Fund.
- B. We nominate Rev. Cletus D. Kramer as Assistant Conference Treasurer, and Mr. S. Hugh Paine as Conference Pension Pund Treasurer.
- C. We recommend that arrears in the general pension budget receipts be paid this year out of unassigned funds held in the Pension Fund.
- D. We recommend that churches remit pension fund payments on an undivided basis, and that the Conference Pension Fund Treasurer be instructed to pro rate such payments to general pension budget and to pastoral assessment proportionally so that they will become paid up at the same time. In case of failure of the church to completely pay the assessment, the pastor will be responsible to make up the arrears in pastor's assessment so as to retain status in the Plan.
- E. We recommend payment of pastor's insurance and pastor's pension assessments budget be required only for that time during which the church is served by a pastor.

Greetings in the name of our wonderful Lord.

At the close of the 11th year of our Conference we humbly thank the Lord for what He has done. We rejoice over the faithful efforts of our people who have diligently worked to see His cause advance.

<u>Visitation</u>: We made a total of eleven visits this year ministering to all fourteen societies. Creve Coeur and Peoria and the Peoria Church, and Wyanet, Princeton, and Sheffield at the Sheffield Church.

Correspondence: Letters and communications numbering about 150 have been sent from our desk this year.

Missionary Projects: The Lord has blessed our Conference by sending three of our young couples out to the mission field of His choice this year. Needless to say, much time was spent in making arrangements to provide outgoing equipment for Dr. and Mrs. Charles Paine and three daughters, and Rev. and Mrs. Vernon Swanson and daughter. We thank each of you for the part you have played in making it possible for these people to get to the mission field. Our ladies also co-operated heartily with the request of our annual Conference President in supplying needs for the Thomas Murray family who went to Mexico in January. There was almost \$3,000.00 raised for the three families in supplies and money.

Workshops. We made plans and promoted two W.M.S. Workshops last September - one in each of the districts. The Lord blessed, and we felt that it was well worth our efforts.

Missionary Tours. Three attempts were made for missionaries to tour the Conference this last year. Due to circumstances beyond our control one was cancelled for September with Rev. K. M. Ridgway. Then arrangements were made for a representative from Brainerd Indian School to tour the Conference the first of the year, but it was cancelled until this fall because of the special missionary emphasis to the Tom Murrays who are with the Wycliff Translators. Then again at the request of the Department of World Missions the Swansons toured the Conference in the place of Rev. Robert Lytle who had planned to be with us in May. Final arrangements have been made with the Brainerd Indian School for Rev. Neal Phipps, Field Representative, to tour the Conference September 20-October 4.

Organizations: It was a real privilege to organize a missionary society at the Galesburg Church on June 30th.

Statistics: We are grateful for an increase in our statistics this year. There are 202 active and 72 honorary members with a total of 274. While last year's total membership was 258, making a gain of more than 6%. Total receipts for this year were \$4,270.58, while last year's total receipts were \$3,929.99, making a gain of almost 9%.

We are very grateful to our pastors and to our laymen—both men and women—for their fine co-operation in the advancement of His kingdom.

Any montes and vouchers credited on the Conference Treasurer receipts will be accepted for Statistical credit.
 - B. That each society contribute canned fruits or fruit juices or monetary donations for canned foods for camp.
 - C. Delegate to bring a list of all officers and their addresses to conference.
- VI. Conference Awards.
 - A. Issuing an award to the societies that qualify according to the following points:
 - 1. Making the Honor Roll in the Efficiency Standard.
 - Securing Magazine subscriptions equal to active membership of the society, promptly reporting quarterly to the Conference Magazine Solicitor.
 - 3. Pursuing the Mission Study and Reading Course and presenting name of local secretary to Conference Mission Study Secretary.
 - 4. Newly elected W.M.S. President and Y.M.W.B. Superintendent attend the Annual Conference session.
 - B. We report the General W.M.S. Efficiency Standard for the local society is as follows:

- 1. That the Efficiency Standard be read in the first monthly meeting after Conference (5% credit), and that arrangements be made with the pastor for one missionary prayer meeting each month (5% credit).
- 2. That a minimum of ten meetings be held during the year at which time prayer requests are presented and remembered and business transacted (5% credit), and at least one public meeting (5% credit).
- 3. That a Women's World Fellowship Secretary be appointed by the local W.M.S. Executive Board, who shall promote the program of the General Women's World Fellowship (5% credit). That a Women's World Prayer Circle be formed under the direction of the W.W.F. secretary, within sixty days after the annual Conference (5% credit).
- 4. That a solicitor be elected for the Wesleyan Missionary, gaining not less than two subscriptions a year, and that she use the Conference church key combination on all subscriptions (5% credit). - 5. That a Mission Study Secretary be elected and she report to the Conference Mission Study Secretary by January 15th (5% credit). That 10% of the active members read at least four of the recommended books (5% credit).

 6. That a delegate be elected to the Annual Conference W.M.S. and that she be
- instructed by the local society regarding the amount to be pledged by that society at the Annual Conference session (5% credit), and that the Y.M.W.B. superintendent be seated in the Annual session and be granted the privilege of speaking, and provision be made by her society for such representation (5% credit).
- That the \$1.00 membership dues be sent to the Conference W.M.S. Treasurer and be forwarded to the General W.M.S. Treasurer for the general fund.
- 8. That we secure every woman in the church as a member of the society, or acheive a 10% gain in total membership.
- That each local society pay annually into the Conference Working Fund the amount assessed by the Conference W.M.S. Executive Board.
- 10. That the local President (or Vice President) attend the Conference sessions and provision be made by her society for such representation. (10% shall be given for each of the above items, except those otherwise specified, and all societies making a grade of 80% shall be placed on the Honor Roll.)

Greetings to the Wesleyan Youth of Illinois.

You are a select group representing not only your churches, but a host of young people all over the world who want to serve Christ in this day of careless living. May you sense anew a great commission amid the conflict of life. The forces of evil seem arrayed for a life and death battle. This is our day to stand up and be counted whatever the cost. I have appreciated your past devotion and dedication. I hope that the following statistics will challenge each of us to realize the above words through greater work.

Many of our young people have enrolled in our colleges and new members need to be enlisted to fill the ranks. Our goal for WY subscriptions was 200. This excellent periodical still needs our constant support and promotion. This year \$446.08 was raised for our Pioneer Project which was the Harrison Avenue Rockford church. Last year our Pioneer Project was Wheaton and \$201.00 was received. A new plan of assessed Pioneer Goals more than doubled our usual pioneer giving which was through regular Conference Dues. Special recognition should go to the W. Y. Locals of Oak Lawn and Wheaton. They both exceeded their goals be \$25,00.

The Conference activities have stimulated more interest in the churches and were consequently better attended. The usual fall North and South District rallies attended by approximately 55 young people, were changed to a Conference-wide rally at Wheaton with approximately 85 in attendance. Our annual Spring Overnight Retreat was held at Palos Park with 91 registering. This increase of attendance reflects greater Conference interest and greater local church activity. It is regretted that only nine (9) of our seventeen (17) churches have an organized W.Y. Local. Of these remaining eight, most are running an active program of Christian Service Brigade or Pioneer Girls. Two churches have youth groups that meet, but are not officially associated with Wesleyan Youth, Wheaton organized a new W. Y. this year while Roseland disbanded their W.Y.

Personal labors have included a monthly mail contact with each Pastor and youth President. A Conference efficiency standard set up by the youth council was sent and 5 to 6 Locals responded each month. There were five issues of the Youth Notes which is the newsletter of the W. Y. of Illinois. I sent approximately 250 at each mailing. Galesburg was visited during Youth Week and other personal contacts were made with youth leaders throughout the year. In collaboration with Rev. Forrest Gearhart a list of qualifications for a Youth Sponsor were compiled and sent to all Pastors of the Conference. I attended an Area leaders meeting in Ohio and much of the discussion was centered around the coming denominational quadrennial convention to be held in the winter of 1961. The Conference youth council met three times during the year.

A new step for Illinois Wesleyan Youth is a Leaders Conference to be held at Lake Bloomington, Friday night and Saturday, September 16-17. This will be a training session for all W officers, youth sponsors and Pastors. Each church will be asked to have a representative at this meeting.

Let each of us renew our efforts for Christ through the channel of Wesleyan Youth. The harvest is ripe and every laborer must keep faithful.

- 11. That each local have a youth "Kick-Off" program before October 31, and the youth age attendance be reported to the Conference President by the 5th of November. 12. That every Wesleyan Youth member be issued a membership card.
 - 13. That we set a goal of \$560.00 for debt retirement at the Creve Coeur Church.
