Standing Rules

I. CONFERENCE OFFICERS—Resolved: that the officers be installed during Conference, at a public service announced in advance, office to take effect at the rise of Conference.

II. CONFERENCE PRESIDENT—Resolved: (1) That the Conference President be appointed, authorized and required to travel the Conference as President, having general supervision of the spiritual interests and benevolences thereof, holding at least one service at each church during the year under such date as he may announce in advance.

(2) That he shall raise funds to meet the demands of the Conference work, assisted by the pastors, and he shall receive contributions for Missions, Education, and Superannuated Ministers where there are no pastors.

(3) That he shall have general supervision of the church property, and shall inquire into the titles of the same, to see that no property, is loosely held, and shall look after the rental of Conference property and see that the rent is turned into the treasury and he shall investigate the possibility and feasibility of the sale of property not in use.

(4) That he shall be authorized to grant letters to disband classes.

(5) That he shall be required to write non-resident members of the Conference asking them in case they cannot attend, to write the Conference a letter of greeting, stating the condition of their religious experience.

(6) That he shall devote as much time as possible and as occasion may afford in evangelistic and other meetings in the Conference.

(7) That he may engage help from time to time, as may be advisable and who he may consider properly qualified to assist in holding Evangelistic and Quarterly meetings, such help to be remunerated from the Church Extension Fund.

(8) That he shall be paid from the Conference President's Salary Budget the sum of seventy dollars (\$70) per week for his services, the same to begin the first Sunday following the rise of the next Conference, and to continue through the second Sunday following the rise of the next Conference, the same to be paid monthly in advance; he shall also be paid official expenses, including secretarial help up to ten dollars (\$10) per week, and he shall be paid five dollars (\$5) per week for utilities, and his premium on the Conference approved minister's health insurance policy shall also be paid. He shall also be paid twenty dollars (\$20) per month for car depreciation and ninety dollars (\$90) per month house rent or be provided a Conference Parsonage.

(9) That he shall act, or appoint to act, as Fraternal Delegate to all denominational or inter-denominational bodies as he deems advisable.

III. CONFERENCE TRUSTEES—Resolved: (1) That the Board of Trustees shall consist of nine members, three to be elected, each for a term of three years, and each to reside within the bounds of the Conference.

(2) That the duly elected and qualified Trustees of the Annual Conference are hereby authorized and directed to sign for the purchase, sale, mortgaging and conveyance of real, estate recommended by the Conference Board of Church Extension and Evangelism during the interim between the meetings of the Annual Conference, and all such action or actions shall be deemed to be legal and binding upon the Conference, and of as full force and effect as they would have been if such actions on the part of the Trustees had been specially authorized by the Annual Conference.

(3) That the President and Secretary of the Board of Trustees shall be authorized to sign on behalf of the Board of Trustees, such signatures to be valid and binding as if all members of the Board of Trustees had signed said papers.

IV. BOARD OF CHURCH EXTENSION AND EVANGELISM—Resolved:

(1) That the Conference Board of Trustees and the President of the Conference Woman's Missionary Society constitute the Board of Church Extension and Evangelism of the Conference.

(2) That the Board of Church Extension and Evangelism is hereby authorized to pay out all monies from the Conference Church Extension Fund.

V. COMMITTEE ON CHURCH AND PARSONAGE BUILDING, ALTERATION AND REMODELING—Resolved: That the Conference Board of Trustees shall constitute the Committee on Church and Parsonage Building, Location, Alteration and Remodeling.

VI. CAMP MEETING BOARD—Resolved: (1) That the Camp Meeting Board be constituted of a total of nine members, consisting of the Conference President, Conference Wesleyan Youth President, Charles City pastor, three Elders and three laymen. One Elder and one layman shall be elected by ballot each year for a term of three years.

(2) That the camp ground property shall be under the care of the Camp Meeting Board.

(3) That this Board shall have the power to engage workers beyond the present year.

(4) That this Board, together with the Conference Secretary, constitute the Orders of The Day Committee.

(5) That all pledges and cash received during the sessions of Conference and Camp Meeting be placed in the Camp Meeting Fund unless otherwise designated.

(6) That the incidental expenses of the Annual Conference, while in session, be paid from the Camp Meeting Fund.

VII. COMMITTEE ON STATISTICS AND CREDENTIALS—Resolved:

(1) That a standing Committee on Statistics be elected, consisting of the Statistical Secretary and three other ministerial members. That three lay members be elected at the opening of Conference.

(2) That there be a standing Committee on Credentials whose duty it shall be to send each pastor, Sunday School Report blanks, Character blanks and Delegates blanks. The Delegate Credentials shall be returned to him by July 15. The Statistical Secretary shall be the Committee on Credentials.

VIII. FINANCIAL SECRETARY—Resolved: That the Conference shall elect a Financial Secretary for the Conference year, whose duty it shall be to study finances and bring recommendations to the Committee on Finance at the next Annual Conference, of which Committee he shall be first member. He shall also require the various treasurers of the Conference to secure a competent auditor and submit a certificate of audit to them. He shall give a report of the auditors to the Conference.

IX. BUDGET ITEMS—Resolved: That all Treasurers shall mark receipts "Budget" or "Not Budget".

X. LOCAL CHURCH YEAR—Resolved: That all local churches close their books on June 30. That all statistics be figured through this date and that local church officers take office July 1.

XI. CONFERENCE FISCAL YEAR—Resolved: That the Conference Fiscal Year close July 15, and that all money shall be in the hands of the proper Treasurers on or before that date; that within seven (7) days thereafter each pastor shall submit to the Conference Treasurer his budget check sheet, with receipts covering the same, and his statistical blank, completed in full, except for the budget raised; that the Conference Treasurer shall fill in the budget raised items and hold reports for the Statistical Committee the first day of Conference.

XII. CONFERENCE DATE—Resolved: That Camp Meeting begin the first Sunday of August and continue through the second Sunday. That Conference begin the following Monday, and conclude Wednesday.

XIII. SUNDAY SCHOOL—Resolved: That Sunday School shall be held each Sunday of Conference and Camp Meeting.

XIV. LEAVE—Resolved: That no member shall leave the Conference session without permission of the President.

XV. COMMITTEE REPORTS—Resolved: That all reports of Commit-

tees be made in writing, complete and ready for the printer, and handed to the Secretary at the earliest possible date after such report has been made.

XVI. PASTORAL REPORT—Resolved: (1) That each ministerial member of our Conference report to his Quarterly Conference the number of sermons preached, prayer meetings attended, homes visited and pastoral calls made.

(2) That each Sunday School under pastoral oversight of Wesleyan Methodist pastors shall be included in a separate Statistical Report.

XVII. CONFERENCE PREACHER'S REPORT—Resolved: That all Conference Preachers not stationed by the Pastoral Relations Committee, shall report to the chairman of the Committee on Itineracy and Elder's Orders not later than 30 days prior to the first day of the Annual Conference.

XVIII. CREDENTIALS—Resolved: That each Annual Conference Preacher present his Credentials at Conference for renewal and proper signature.

XIX. TEXT BOOKS—Resolved: That all persons shall be requested to bring the text books to Conference in which they are to be examined.

XX. PASTORS SUPPORT DURING CONFERENCE—Resolved: That all pastors remain on their charges for one Sunday after Conference and that the church's financial obligation to the pastor, whether he be leaving the field or not, be extended through that Sunday.

XXI. MOVING PASTORS—Resolved: That each charge make provision for the moving expense of the incoming pastor.

XXII. MINISTER'S VACATION—Resolved: That the Conference President and all pastors be given a two weeks vacation with pay.

XXIII. MEMBERSHIP IN SUPERANNUATED PENSION PLAN—Resolved: That all ministers be required to join the Superannuated Pension Plan before receiving Conference appointment, unless they furnish the Superannuated Ministers Committee sufficient evidence of inability to join, or participation in Social Security. That this action become a Standing Rule effective as of 1954. Ministers receiving their first appointment shall have one year to join either or both.

XXIX. DEATH OR ILLNESS—Resolved: That the Conference Secretary be notified by telephone in case of death or critical illness in a minister's home, and that he shall send cards at once to each pastor.

XXV. MINUTES—Resolved: That the Conference Secretary bill each church for the number of Minutes ordered by that church, and that the Conference Secretary bill the Conference Fund for those Minutes not ordered by individuals or churches.

XXVI. PUBLISHING OF THE EVANGEL—Resolved: That the Evangel be published monthly; that the Editor be also Publisher, that he be nominated by a staff composed of President of the Conference, President of the Woman's Missionary Society, President of the Conference Wesleyan Youth and the Conference Sunday School Secretary, and after being elected by the Conference, the manner of financing the publishing of the Evangel be left to the Editor and his staff.

XXVII. NOMINATING COMMITTEE—Resolved: That a Nominating Committee to consist of Conference President, exofficio as chairman, three Elders elected by the Conference and three church Delegates of the Conference to serve in alphabetical order of the churches. Said Delegates shall notify the Conference President of their availability by July 1. Successive church Delegates shall serve as alternates. Said Committee to nominate Conference session committees, Trustees to Miltonvale Wesleyan College, Conference Trustees, and members of the Camp Meeting Board. That the full report be read and posted at the first session of Conference.

XXVIII. MID-YEAR CONVENTION COMMITTEE—Resolved: That the Committee on Mid-Year Convention consist of three members elected for

three years; one member to be elected each year. The host pastor to be a member exofficio.

XXIX. CITATION COMMITTEE—Resolved: That there be a Committee on Citation composed of three members. The Secretary Treasurer of the Superannuated Pension Plan shall be chairman of this Committee. The other members shall be elected annually. It shall be the duty of this Committee to prepare and present appropriately worded citations to those Elders who have served the Conference twenty-five (25) years or more on a consecutive or cumulated basis. Eligibility shall be determined by the number of years applicable to Superannuated Pension credit. Those eligible for citation shall be notified 30 days prior to the time of presentation.

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JOURNAL OF DAILY PROCEEDINGS

Monday, August 13, 1962 — 8:30 A. M.

The One-hundred-ninth session of the Iowa Annual Conference was called to order on the camp grounds at Charles City, Iowa, Monday August 13th at 8:30 a.m. by the President Rev. Paul R. Davis.

OPENING PRAYER was offered by Rev. F. L. Freiheit.

Report No. 6

Secretary Of Evangelism Report

In the interests of evangelism throughout the Conference, your Secretary of Evangelism has contributed regularly to the EVANGEL items of interest and challenge with reference to evangelism. An attempt has also been made to carry a slate of evangelistic services occurring within the bounds of the Conference but incomplete reporting on the part of pastors has made this feature at best inadequate.

To further serve the cause of evangelism, a conference-wide series of seminars on evangelism was conducted last April. The pastoral support of the afternoon sessions was good, but the attendance on the part of the laity at the evening sessions was disappointing. Nonetheless the effort was an encouragement to me and apparently a help to many of the pastors. I would recommend the program, in at least some related form, be continued.

Again we have sought to "feel the pulse" of our conference as to the matter of evangelism. The measuring instrument was a questionnaire distributed to 32 pastors. Twenty-one replied, and from these incomplete returns we would offer the following observations.

Seventeen of the reporting churches indicated some form of evangelistic effort. In this respect it is interesting to note that nine different techniques of evangelism are reported by our pastors, including revival meetings, films, weekend services, evangelism clinics, missionary conferences, youth week services, visitation campaign, D.V.B.S., and youth camps. But even in this matter there is wide variation. Some churches (4) had no evangelistic endeavors while some scheduled as many as four different events. Church size is not the only answer for this disparity. There are churches so involved in building or so disenchanted with evangelism as to be guilty of by-passing this life-blood phase of the program of the church. Clearly this becomes a matter of values or attitudes, both of which are singularly the responsibility of the pastoral leadership.

The next phase of our evaluation sought to examine attitudes toward evangelism on the part of the people and results of evangelism as seen by the pastor.

Most pastors reported good response by their people in praying for the services, fair to good cooperation in publicizing the meetings, and good attendance on the part of the church people. (Of course, there were departures in each category both below and above the norm we have here established.) Moreover, most replying ministers credited their parishoners with a general interest in evangelism, although several pastors cited the need for a real vision for souls, for leadership in evangelism, and for a more dynamic expectation from evangelistic efforts. It seems valid to conclude that most of our pastors have a nucleus of prayerful, cooperative and concerned people. The need is for leadership in attitudes, methods and setting up of achievement goals.

Reporting pastors were nearly unanimous in their conviction that the evangelistic efforts they had sponsored were of definite assistance to them in their own pastoral ministry. With but a single exception, ministers reported a carry-over of the benefits of evangelism into the spiritual life of the church. And, contrary to what we have usually expected, a high percentage of the churches reported more than general blessing but definite decisions signalling a personal spiritual advance. It is in community impact that the greatest sense of disappointment and frustration were evidenced in an evaluation of the submitted questionnaires. Clearly this is a challenge, but the desirability of community impact cannot overshadow the desirability of help to the pastor, church and individuals.

In summary it seems clear from the reports that evangelism does do good and that our people (at least a meaningful segment of them) are helpful allies in the cause of evangelism. What a priceless heritage—to be part

of a church with an evangelistic thrust and to be fortified by a supporting constituency. It is incumbent upon us to not forfeit this asset by indifferent leadership.

This concern prompted the final issue of the questionnaire—a query as to the practical service the Conference Secretary of Evangelism might render to his ministering brethren. I believe such a vital cause as evangelism merits an aggressive and helpful leadership. That leadership should carefully evaluate the following suggestions as submitted by the ministers of our conference:

1. Continue the emphasis of the Evangelism Seminars.
2. Encourage personal evangelism, such as the Nate Krupp program.
3. Encourage revivals.
4. A list of recommended evangelists who could serve us well in consideration of our doctrinal positions, financial resources, and spiritual needs.
5. Stimulate a spirit of rival among the pastors.
6. Pastors exchange pulpits as evangelists.
7. Publicize conventions where evangelism is stressed; and encourage attendance.
8. Promote a fund to help smaller churches secure competent evangelists.
9. Distribute promotional materials re: evangelism.
10. Give guidance toward evangelism which is effective for this day.
11. Promote union services.
12. Editorial matter in the Evangel stimulating interest in evangelism and soliciting prayer support for scheduled services.

The cause of evangelism is a vital part of my ministry, and for that reason it has been a joy to lend my small influence to this phase of our church's ministry. You will need to select other leadership for the next conference year, since my work at Iowa City would preclude the possibility of my serving again even should you so desire.

Director Of C.Y.C. Report

This past year has been a transitional period throughout the denomination from the leaders down to the local level.

The "Christian Youth Crusaders" program, more commonly known as the C.Y.C. is a new organization which was adopted by our denomination in 1961.

It will take time, as is expected, to realize the importance of this type of program for our pre-youth and to project our thinking into the future to see the end results, but we feel it is the answer to the crying need of our church today. It will not only "stop the leaks" and improve our churches today, but it will produce informed, loyal, and dedicated young people for the church of tomorrow.

This past year has been spent in introducing this program to the churches of the Conference. A presentation was made in seven churches last fall both Iowa and Minnesota, where the uniforms were modeled and all available information released. Since that time the manuals included in the Director's Packet have been printed and are available to the public.

A total of 70 letters were mailed from this desk, including promotional ideas and sample tracts.

Sample leadership aids were also sent from Headquarters to each church throughout the Conference.

We believe that if the C.Y.C. is put into action it will prove its value in the days to come. Through dedication and diligence on the part of appointed local directors this can be possible.

Several churches are making a start in this direction. At present we have two registered CYC's with a total of 16 registered Cadets. They are the Cedar Falls and Denison Churches. This coming year we anticipate more progress in this area among the churches of the Iowa Conference.

However, many other churches have an active children's work and all are listed under the department of CYC. We appreciate every effort.

Report No. 15

Board Of Trustees, Board Of Church Extension And Evangelism Report.

To the 109th session of the Iowa Annual Conference:

"Evangelism is to so present Christ so as to attract men savingly." This definition of evangelism was given on January 9, 1962, by our beloved president, Rev. Clarence Budensiek, to the committee. This definition was not only significant of his own life and ministry, but, I trust of the intent of this Board in all its work and ministry.

BOARD ACTIONS

At the September 12, 1961 meeting there was discussion of the possible caucus of the Minnesota churches for the consideration of organizing a Minnesota Conference. Chairman Budensiek reported that contact should be made with the mortgage holder by the churches with sizeable mortgages to secure their written consent for such a move. This legal procedure came from the General Secretary of Church Extension and Evangelism, Rev. Virgil A. Mitchell. This involves only the Minnesota churches.

A loan of \$1,000.00 was called in because of illness.

ROCKFORD: The approval of the sale of the extra lot on the parsonage property at Rockford, Iowa, for the sum of \$200.00 with the understanding that the present owner of the property stand the transfer fee.

DES MOINES: That we grant approval to the Des Moines Church to secure \$1,000.00 to finish their church.

OSKALOOSA: Approval was given to the Oskaloosa Church to build a temporary room in the basement under the parsonage area.

MARENGO: Approval was given to Marengo for the improving of the parsonage with plumbing, plastering, sidewalk and that the Conference stand the expense.

September 12, 1961—Exhortation was given by Rev. Budensiek urging ten day revivals where the word of God is expounded night after night to keep up the spiritual tone of the Church.

TELEPHONE: Authorization of special long distance telephone service for the Conference office at the rate of \$10.00 per month for as long as this service is available.

CEDAR RAPIDS: It was recommended that the Cedar Rapids Church investigate the possibility of refinancing their loan with the Bohemian Loan Company to bring it back to its original status so as to release small loans for other projects.

ROSLYN PARK: It was recommended that the Roslyn Park church investigate the possibility of increasing their loan at the Minneapolis Savings & Loan Company to its original status so as to cover indebtedness on the parsonage and release smaller loans to a new project.

PRINCIPLE FOR ALL CHURCHES: For those desiring Conference Assistance:

1. Let no side projects be undertaken that would cost above \$100.00 which would obligate the church, and/or Conference financially, without Conference Board approval.

2. Loans may be secured by the church only after clearing with the Conference President.

3. That no church buy or sell property without the approval of Conference Board of Trustees.

4. That building plans, a bona-fide builder and adequate financial provision be presented to the Conference Board of Church extension and Evangelism.

5. Those desiring counsel on building, financing, remodeling, may present their problem to the Conference Board of Church Extension and Evangelism for counsel and advice.

6. If the church cannot meet a payment, either principal or interest or

both, on their loan, please contact the Conference Church Extension and Evangelism Board instead of the party who holds the note.

January 9, 1962, Conference Office, Cedar Falls, Iowa:

At the opening of this session, President Budensiek directed a brainstorming session on Evangelism. The following comments were given:

1. Present Christ so as to attract men savingly.
2. Something of an educational program for the laymen to help them to feel their responsibility to the church.
3. Recognize the need. Real burden for soul saving which goes beyond the average revival meeting.
4. How can we keep from going the way modernistic churches have gone?
5. Youth of our church families a needy field. Heading off a cold formalism in the lives of second-generation Christian.
6. Danger of losing the purpose in our efforts. Not to gain more churches primarily, but more souls.
7. Need of those totally ignorant of Christ. Saved are inclined to take things for granted.

8. Revival is when the eyes of a man meets the eyes of Christ, when the heart of man meets the heart of Christ. The word adequately exposed to the preacher as well as to hearer. Minister's heart possessed by the Word.

ROSLYN PARK: Both Church and parsonage properties at Roslyn Park were refinanced at the Minneapolis Savings and Loan Company for \$35,000.00 at 6% interest, with monthly payments of \$297.00 per month. \$9,729.55 were returned to the Conference Treasury. From this amount \$3,650.93 was paid on the parsonage which left \$6,073.62 in the Treasury.

MARENGO: Entire downstairs of the Marengo parsonage, except the bath, was replastered for \$60.00. Sidewalk was poured by a Ready-Mix firm for \$172.40. These items were authorized by the Board.

WASECA: Authorized the President and Secretary of the Board to sign the \$20,000 note with the Trustees of the Waseca, Minnesota Wesleyan Methodist Church. Also, a Conference Card Call was authorized.

CROSBY, MINNESOTA: Authorized the President to offer lots in Crosby for \$150 with the understanding that the buyer stand assessments held against the property, issuing only a quit-claim deed to the purchaser.

IOWA-MINNESOTA CONFERENCE CAUCUS: A caucus was taken of the churches in the State of Minnesota concerning their desire to form a separate Conference. Membership 435 Indebtedness \$155,000.00 (328 per member).

South Troy: 11 to stay in the Iowa Conference; 1 for Minnesota Conference
Zumbrota: 7 to stay in the Iowa Conference; 0 for Minnesota Conference
Albert Lea: 11 to stay in the Iowa Conference; 2 for Minnesota Conference
Rochester: 13 to stay in the Iowa Conference; 6 for Minnesota Conference

Waite Park: Voted that a commission be set up to study.

Minnehaha: Voted that a commission be set up to study.

Little Pine: Unanimous to stay with the Iowa Conference.

E. R. Dodd Memorial: 25 for Minnesota Conference.

Roslyn Park: 7 to stay in the Conference, continue to study.

Riverview: Table the proposition, until more desire for division.

ALBERT LEA: Authorized the President and Secretary to sign a note with the local trustees up to \$4,200.00.

March 20, 1962, Waterloo First Church, Waterloo, Iowa

A report of the Conference Committee on Vacancies was given and approved.

A motion prevailed that we cast a unanimous ballot for Rev. Paul R. Davis to serve as Chairman of the Conference Board of Trustees.

CONFERENCE PRESIDENT'S HOME AND OFFICE: It was moved that the Conference President appoint a committee of three members to study

the advisability for a Conference President's home and Conference office. Motion was approved.

FALLS AVENUE: Authorized the Falls Avenue Church to proceed with their new church superstructure with a debt limit of \$25,000.00.

Report No. 15

Standards of Efficiency

I. CONFERENCE SOCIETY

We recommend:

1. That at the annual conference the Study Book and books in the Reading Course be introduced and recommended for use in the local societies.
2. That each conference provide some form of leadership training designed to help the local societies present better planned programs and render more efficient service (5% credit), and that the conference literature table be well-stocked with such materials for sale. (5% credit)
3. That there be missionary visitation of the conference annually, if possible.
4. That a conference or district convention be held annually.
5. That each conference have at least ten percent gain in total membership during the quadrennium.
6. That at least the equivalent of seventy-five percent of the active membership be subscribers to the WESLEYAN MISSIONARY, that Tag Day be observed at annual conference session, (5% credit) and that each local society be given a number in the conference-church key combination plan. (5% credit)
7. That the Conference WMS President organize a Women's Missionary Society if feasible, where such does not exist (5% credit) and that the conference YMWB Superintendent organize a YMWB where such does not exist. (5% credit)
- 8 That every society be represented in the annual conference by the newly elected President (or Vice-President) and a delegate, and that provision be made for such representation by each local society.
9. That each conference be represented in the quadrennial session by the president and delegates. (15% credit)
10. That each Conference YMWB Superintendent be seated in the quadrennial session and be granted the privilege of speaking and that provision be made by said conference for such representation. (5% credit)

(Ten per cent credit shall be given for each of the above items, except

those otherwise specified, and all conferences making a grade of 50% annually shall be placed on the Honor Roll). (Quadrennial Honor Roll: 80%)

II. LOCAL SOCIETY

We recommend:

1. That the Efficiency Standard be read in the society the first meeting after conference (5% credit) and that arrangement be made for one missionary prayer meeting each month. (5% credit)
2. That a minimum of ten meetings be held during the year at which time prayer requests are presented and remembered and business transacted (5% credit) and at least one public meeting. (5% credit)
3. That a Women's World Fellowship Secretary be appointed by the local WMS Executive Board, who shall promote the program of the General Women's World Fellowship. (5% credit) That a Women's World Prayer Circle be formed under the direction of the WWF secretary, and that the report be sent to the conference WWF secretary, within sixty days after the annual conference. (5% credit)
4. That a solicitor be elected for the WESLEYAN MISSIONARY, gaining not less than two subscriptions a year, and that she use the conference-church key combination on all subscriptions. (5% credit) That the President, Secretary, and Treasurer and the equivalent of 75% of the active members be subscribers to the WESLEYAN MISSIONARY. (5% credit)
5. That a Mission Study Secretary be elected and she report to the Conference Mission Study Secretary by January 15th. (5% credit) That 10% of the active members read at least four of the recommended books. (5% credit)
6. That a delegate be elected to the annual conference WMS and that she be instructed by the local society regarding the amount to be pledged by that society at the annual conference session (5% credit), and that the Y. M. W. B. Superintendent be seated in the annual session and be granted the privilege of speaking, and provision be made by her society for such representation. (5% credit)
7. That the \$1.00 membership dues be sent to the conference WMS Treasurer and be forwarded to the General Treasurer for the general fund.
8. That we secure every woman in the church as a member of the society, or achieve a ten percent gain in total membership.
9. That each local society pay annually into the Conference Working Fund the amount assessed by the Conference WMS Executive Board.
10. That the local President (or Vice-President) attend the conference session and provision be made by her society for such representation. (Ten percent shall be given for each of the above items, except those otherwise specified, and all societies making a grade of eighty per cent shall be placed on the Honor Roll).

1. The W. M. S. shall elect the Y. M. W. B. Supt. at the annual election of officers. Her duties shall begin with the new Conference year, July 1st.
2. Each Band is assessed 3 cents per member, based on the membership reported last year, two cents for the Conference Superintendents desk expense and one cent each year during the quadrennium for the expense of the Conference Y. M. W. B. Superintendent to General Conference. This amount is to be sent in with the first quarterly report.
3. The November offering is received for Church Extension and Evangelism—the May offering for Education.
4. Each Band will pay 25 cents or more per active and honorary member for the \$300 support of Matthew Woolsey.
5. Send all money raised by the Y.M.W.B. to the Conference Y.M.W.B. Superintendent quarterly, postmarked not later than
 - October 13, 1962 — First Quarter
 - January 15, 1963 — Second Quarter
 - April 13, 1963 — Third Quarter
 - July 1, 1963 — Fourth Quarter
6. Each Y. M. W. B. should solicit the entire S. S. and church as members of the Y.M.W.B. Those through 13 as active members and those over 13 as Honorary.
7. Each Y. M. W. B. should use the materials found in the Young Missionary and subscribe to the flannelgraph, using both in the monthly meetings.
8. We recommend the continued use of the Missionary Reading Course,

the issuing of awards as they are earned, and the distribution of Prayer Partners among our children.

9. We recommend a careful study of this Plan of Work and the Efficiency Standard.. Each Supt. should strive to make the Honor Roll.
10. An award will be given at the Annual Conference to the most outstanding 100% Honor Band of the year, consideration being given to the following items —
 - (1) For having the greatest percent increase in membership.
 - (2) For raising the largest amount of money per member.
 - (3) For bringing a poster and a membership chart to Conference.
 - (4) For having the greatest percentage of active members memorizing each monthly Scripture verse.
 - (5) For raising the assigned support of Matthew Woolsey.
 - (6) For having the greatest percent participation in the Reading Course and Prayer Partner Plan.

Once again the Iowa Conference has met the requirements of a Honor Conference, increasing funds raised by \$186.87. Seventeen Bands within the Conference were placed on the Honor Roll, including one newly organized Band from the Cedar Rapids Church.

We received \$241.73 toward the support of Matthew Woolsey, the Conference project of the year.

Two hundred three pieces of mail were sent during the year, plus 136 receipts to the local Superintendents.
