#### ADMINISTRATION

- 1. A report to be made to each Conference at the close of each year covering the distribution of the fund.
  - 2. Scholarship award to apply solely on tuition or fees.
- 3. A student who boards or rooms in the dormitory may receive full tuition and fees.
- 4. A student who boards and rooms outside the dormitory may receive no more than half tuition and fees.

## REGULATIONS COVERING APPLICANTS

- 1. Must be a member of the Wesleyan Methodist Church.
- 2. Must be a member of a church within the contributing Conference.
  - 3. Individual must be unable to finance schooling.

# RESOLUTIONS AND LAWS OF THE INDIANA CONFERENCE

- 1. That it is the sense of this Conference that our houses of worship should not be open to any evangelist or minister of any other church to hold a series of meetings or to maintain a regular appointment for another congregation; provided, however, that usual denominational courtesies be extended to other ministers in occasional appointments. And waiving of the above resolution by a contract or lease of building must be obtained through the Board of Trustees of the Indiana Conference.
- 2. Be it resolved, That the Committee on Itineracy and Elder's Orders shall require all those desiring to unite with us from any other denomination or Annual Conference to present credits equivalent to our Conference Course of Study, regardless of their standing in the body of which they have been a member, and if they cannot do this they shall be required to meet the same conditions as our local preachers before ordination.
- 3. That any candidate for Elder's Orders or traveling under the direction of the Conference, who fails to attend the Institutes and the examinations of the Committee, without sufficient cause, shall be deemed unworthy of the trust and care of souls, and refused a place among us as a minister of the Gospel, and when they shall fail to attend the Institute for two successive years they shall be dropped from the roll.
- 4. The Committee on Elder's Orders is hereby to transfer all persons to the study list who may have been recommended to travel and may not have been given work.
- 5. All charges with a membership of twenty-five or more shall in addition to the regular stipulated salary, assume the responsibility of providing a suitable home in which the Pastor may live.
- 6. Be it resolved, That it shall be the duty of the Pastors to look after the insurance of our church and parsonage properties. All insurance shall provide for losses caused by fire and lightning, hail and tornado. A failure on the part of the Pastor shall be a censurable offense. If the church fails to insure their property upon reasonable effort of the pastor to secure the same, then said failure shall be reported to the President of the Conference who shall then have the property insured. In such case all insurance monies received from losses by fire, lightning, hail, and tornado shall be used in Church Extension work as the Conference Board of Trustees deems best.
  - 7. We recommend that all charges and stations to which the Pastor

moves pay the moving and transportation expenses of said Pastor, the same to be done in addition to his salary; provided this shall not interfere with the previous arrangements between Pastors and charges. That where the Conference demands the services of any one, that it shall bear the moving expenses, if any expense shall thus be incurred.

- 8. Each Pastor shall file a duplicate statistical report with the Committee before the close of the fifth day of August with the exception of Pastor's salary and Membership. These items to be reported the first day of Conference, said report to be kept on file one year, and hereafter the full reports shall not be read in open Conference. The official character of any Pastor shall not be passed until he shall have submitted a satisfactory report, including statistics.
- 9. All unaccounted for members appearing in the statistics in the membership list shall be referred to the discontinued list. All members in excess of the number reported shall be reported received. The roll of all the classes upon the charges shall be put in the hands of the Pastors and they shall have charge of the same and make all entries therein.
- 10. It shall be a standing rule of this Conference until revoked by vote that the President shall receive \$35.00, the Secretary \$50.00, the Treasurer \$100.00, the Assistant Secretary \$25.00, each member of the Auditing Committee \$10.00, Assistant to the Treasurer \$10.00, the same to be apportioned pro-rata among the various funds of the Conference. The Conference Sunday School Secretary shall receive \$50.00 and each of the other members of the Conference Sunday School Board shall receive \$25.00, the same to be paid out of the Sunday School Treasury.
- 11. It shall be a standing rule until revoked by this body that the President shall nominate his Advisory Board and the Conference shall elect his nominations.
- 12. It shall be a standing rule of this Conference that in the examination of character the Conference officials shall be called first.
- 13. The Conference shall elect three members of the Camp Meeting Committee, one to be elected each year for a term of three years.
- 14. The Pastor shall bring a report to each Quarterly Meeting and send a duplicate to the Conference President quarterly on blanks furnished by the Conference.
- 15. Whereas, our people are being deceived by the erroneous teaching that Divine healing of the body through faith in the Atonement is the same as for sin, therefore:

Be it resolved, That we record our belief that the healing of the body is among the gifts of the Spirit according to 1 Cor. 12:7-11, hence not for all Christians at all times as it is not always the will of God to heal the body.

- 16. Let it be a standing rule of this Conference until revoked, that no charge shall call any one as Pastor, or to supply the work, from without the bounds of the Conference as long as there are ministers in the Conference qualified and available to take the work.
- 17. Resolved, That the Treasurers shall submit their reports to the Auditing Committee who shall audit the same and in their report to this body they shall show they have audited the same.
- 18. Inasmuch as the Pastor's statistics reveal the true condition of the work as much as anything that might be said, therefore be it resolved, That the Pastors report in open Conference the amount of Pastor's salary received, the amount of budget raised and the loss or gain in membership, also the number of Wesleyan Methodist papers and Wesleyan Missionary magazines taken.
- 19. It shall be the standing rule of this Conference until revoked, that the term of office of the President of our Conference shall not exceed six consecutive years.
- 20. It shall be a standing rule of the Conference until revoked that the Board of Trustees shall authorize all disbursements not otherwise provided for.
- 21. Let it be the standing rule of this Conference that each Pastor whose total pastor's receipts exceed \$1000.00 a year shall seek to organize a new class or give his services in a revival meeting to one of the weaker churches—whose total pastor's receipts are \$500.00 or less—to help establish it. And that the church which he pastors grant him such privileges without censure and with full remuneration of salary while in such a meeting.
- 22. Let it be a standing rule of this Conference until revoked that the Storehouse Tithing Plan shall be the Conference plan for financing the Church work and the following percentage basis be the rule for distributing the same: Local Church Work, 70%; Budget, 30%. Further, that a Tithing Secretary be elected and that one evening service in the Conference Session be given for a Tithing Service and all Tithing Bands or Churches of the Conference be called to give their yearly report, and that some minister be chosen to preach on the Storehouse Tithing Plan. The expenses of Tithing Literature and Postage to be paid from the Conference Claims Fund and that churches desiring literature may secure the same from the Tithing Secretary. Further, that this service be a Special Order of the Conference.
- 23. Let it be a standing rule of this body until revoked that the Assistant-Secretary act as reporter of the Conference and Camp Meeting to the Marion daily papers.

#### Report No. 3

# REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON FINANCE AND APPROPRIATION

We your Committee on Finance and Appropriation, make the following recommendations:

1. The President shall have oversight of all the work of the Conference, and wherein possible he shall hold two quarterly meetings on each charge, and the pastors shall arrange for the others. He shall coöperate with the pastors in raising the various budgets and the pastors shall report to him quarterly, and wherein a pastor fails to report it shall require a vote of the Conference to pass his character. The President's salary shall be \$1500.00 and expenses incident to his work.

#### 2. Conference Missions:

First—That the Conference be divided into districts corresponding to the Sunday School Districts.

Second—That Superintendent and an Advisory Committee of two members from each District be nominated by the Stationing Committee, and elected by the Conference.

Third—That the Missionary Board shall have general supervision of all the work carried on in these Districts.

Fourth—That the District Superintendent and his Advisory Committee have authority to call to their aid Evangelistic Help as they deem advisable.

Fifth—That the travelling expenses of the Superintendent shall not exceed 2cts. per mile.

Sixth—That the Evangelistic Help and Superintendent's expenses which are not raised within the District shall be drawn from the Conference Missions Fund as it is available.

- 3. That the Conference Claims Budget be forwarded to the Conference Treasurer quarterly, except that the Quarterly Meeting Apportionment shall be paid to the President when he holds the Quarterly Meeting. And that the Conference Treasurer pay the Conference President's salary and other expenses incident to the Conference work monthly from this fund.
- 4. That newly organized churches are only asked for free will offerings for the first two years.

#### WESLEYAN METHODIST CHURCH

- 5. That the Sunday School offerings on the first Sunday of each month be divided equally between Home and Conference Missions and shall be forwarded to the Conference Treasurer at least quarterly.
- 6. That any deficit in the Minutes Fund be apportioned to the various Conference Funds.
- 7. That each church elect a Board of Stewards whose duty shall be to cooperate with the pastor in raising the Budget and that the pastor shall forward the same to the proper Treasurer quarterly.
- 8. Since the Storehouse Tithing Plan has been adopted by this Conference as the financial plan of the Conference, we urge our pastors to conform to this plan as quickly as possible.
- 9. We recommend that the Budget be apportioned as follows: Foreign Missions, \$2.00; Orphanage, \$.25; Connectional Education, \$1.50; Conference Claims, \$.75; Conference Missions, \$.75; Home Missions, \$.50; College Building Fund, \$.50.
- 10. Let all Churches or Ministers purchasing church property or beginning a building program comply with our Book of Discipline, page 66, paragraph 110.
- 11. We recommend that the Superannuated Ministers offering shall not be less than \$.10 per member.
- 12. That the Board of Trustees shall issue an order to the Conference Treasurer for the payment of all liabilities of the various arms of the work as funds are available.

#### Report No. 5

#### REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON RESOLUTIONS

#### 1. Spiritual Life

We realize the vital importance of the spiritual life of our churches, and the fact that spirituality can be ours only as we desire it wholeheartedly and obey God fully. Be it resolved, That we put forth every effort to evangelize the community in which we live. We should endeavor to keep our churches spirit-filled, and to awaken every community where we operate.

God designed the (in the New Testament) Lord's Day to be a day of worship and rest, but the world has made it a day of destruction and death. Therefore, we as a Church should remember the Lord's Day and keep it holy unto the Lord, refraining from family reunions and worldly pleasures on Sunday.

The church building has been dedicated to God for worship. Therefore we should maintain a godly reverence in His Sanctuary and demand respect from those who seek to disturb the services.

The Second Coming of the Lord draweth nigh; our day of labor is fast passing. Each year brings us closer to the end. Therefore let us unite in prayer for a Connection-wide Revival praying that it begin at home, and make this year memorable because of the visitation of the Lord upon our churches.

In order to accomplish the foregoing resolutions, let us teach and practice a deepening of spiritual life, a more intensive study of God's Word, and a strict adherence to the family altar.

#### 2. Church Program

Our pastors receive a cash salary, a home to live in, and donations. Our Conference President, on the other hand, receives his cash salary, but must provide the rest for himself. Therefore, be it resolved, That each pastor, as far as is feasible, give our Conference President a donation when he comes to hold our Quarterly Meeting. If the pastor does not feel free to solicit a donation let him tithe his donations, and give a portion to the Conference President.

We believe that tithing by all Wesleyan Methodists and the intelligent use of the Storehouse Plan would largely solve the financial problems of our Church. We recommend that each pastor preach at least four sermons each year on the subject of tithing to each society on his charge; also that every church in the Conference proceed as rapidly as possible to the adoption of the Storehouse Plan as recommended in the Discipline.

No part of our Church program is more vital than the Christian Education of our Youth. To this end Marion College has been instituted, with much prayer and sacrifice, and is striving to carry out the work to which it is dedicated. Be it resolved, That we coöperate with our School in every way: by redoubling our efforts to raise the Educational Budget in full, by sending our young people to Marion College, by informing ourselves carefully as to the work of the Institution, and by praying for the faculty and student body.

#### 3. Moral Reform

Our Nation is falling rapidly into the trap of destruction that is set for it. The Church of the Living God is the only Institution that can redeem America. Therefore be it resolved, That we do all in our power to check the Communist and Fascist movements that threaten to overrun the world and destroy our liberties.

We are in hearty sympathy with sane, constructive efforts to provide pensions for the aged and to relieve poverty and distress through governmental agencies: but, on the other hand, we believe that such programs as the Townsend Pension Plan, the late Huey Long's Share-the-Wealth Movement, and Father Charles E. Coughlin's National Union for Social Justice, are ultra-radical in nature, and mean certain disappointment to those who rely upon them. Therefore we warn our people against becoming obsessed with such radicalism to the detriment of their interest in the cause of Christ.

Be it known that as a Church we oppose reckless indebtedness whether on the part of individuals or of Government. Therefore be it resolved, That we shall use our voting powers to check the climbing of local, State, and Federal debts.

The war fever is spreading over the world, threatening to engulf millions in another great conflict. Hence, be it resolved, That we earnestly pray and preach against Foreign entanglements which would drag America into war.

We believe in the teaching of 1 Peter 3: 3, 4 concerning the necessity of modesty in dress. Therefore we enlist our efforts against the shocking indecency in attire manifested by both men and women in public, particularly by many women and girls as they ride bicycles in our streets.

We continue to condemn the public bathing beach and the beer parlor as agencies of moral decay. We urge our ministry and laity to cooperate with such organizations as seek to abolish such debaucheries and uplift our plane of living.

The liquor interests are striving with devilish ingenuity to make America a nation of alcoholics, and are flaunting temptation before our people at every turn. Be it resolved, That Wesleyan Methodists observe with scrupulous care the rules of Discipline which forbid not only the "manufacture, buying, selling, or using intoxicating liquors" but also "in any way intentionally or knowingly aiding others who do so;" also that we intensify our efforts to educate the rising generation in our Sunday Schools and Young People's Societies with regard to the evil effects of alcohol; and that we use our influence to secure the return of legislation for the control of the liquor traffic.

Likewise the Tobacco Interests are using every means, systematically and shamelessly, to make America a nation of smokers. Particularly are they striving to put a cigarette in the mouth of every woman and girl in this country. Therefore be it resolved, That we protest strongly against deceptive advertising and flagrant disregard for health and decency displayed by tobacco dealers; and that we develop a more effect educational program as to the demoralizing effects of nicotine.

### Report No. 6

#### REPORT OF CONFERENCE SUNDAY SCHOOL BOARD

God has called the Wesleyan Methodist Church to a place of responsibility in His world program, and one of the effectual agencies of this world-wide work is the Sunday School.

Under the blessings of God the work of our Sunday Schools show some advances for the past year. The enrollment is more than double church membership, with an increase for the year of 234. The amount raised for benevolences totals \$2096.65, an increase of \$355.91.

Almost 700 scholars were converted and 250 of these were enrolled in church membership. We thank God for these increases and look into the new year with courage and hope.

The spring conventions were not so largely attended as formerly, due possibly to the weather conditions that retarded farm work; but a splendid degree of enthusiasm was shown and we hope carried back to the home Sunday Schools. We recommend the holding of conventions in the various districts during the two middle weeks of May, and that our pastors and people plan ahead to give this time in the interests of the Sunday School. For convention expenses we recommend the continuation of the 1c per member assessment.

We recommend that the districting be as follows:

Northern District, Western Section: Hamlet, South Bend, North

Liberty, Elkhart, Plymouth; with C. C. Decker as Superintendent.

Northern District, Eastern Section: Edgerton, Albion, Fort Wayne, Larwill, Warsaw; with C. D. Crabill as Superintendent.

Central District, Western Section: Elwood, Peru (1st and 2nd), Greentown, Amboy Mission, LaFayette, Fowler, Kokomo (1st and 2nd), Marion (West 8th), Marion (Nelson), Logansport, Mt. Olive, Mt. Zion (Howard Co.), Miami, Santa Fe, Wabash, Converse, Tipton, Hoopston, Sims; with A. M. Jackson as Superintendent.

Central District, Eastern Section: Bryant, Fairmount, Matthews, Gaston, Fowlerton, Gas City, Hartford City, Jonesboro, Lancaster, Marion (South), Marion (George St.), Mt. Etna, Portland, South Salem, Summitville, Laketon, Warren, Bluffton; with Thomas Ballard as Superintendent.

Southern District, Western Section: Anderson, Byron, Indianapolis, Kirklin, Sheridan, Westfield, Carmel, Baker's Corner, Robert's Chapel, Cicero, Fishersburg, Thorntown; with F. L. Berkebile as Superintendent.

Southern District, Eastern Section: Blue River, Shelbyville, Lewis Creek, Mt. Zion (Henry County), New Castle, Muncie, Fountain City, Grant City; with C. C. Fields as Superintendent.

If any charge has been overlooked in the districting, please join your nearest district.

We recommend that the 10c per member assessment be continued for the financing of the Connectional and Conference Sunday School work.

We recommend that the Board Treasurer, enclose with his regular assessment notice a pastor's Annual Report Blank to be filled out by the pastor, and sent to the Conference Sunday School Secretary immediately after July 31st.

Four persons have graduated from the Teacher's Training Course during the year and eight classes are engaged in this work, with prospects of several more persons to finish in the near future. This is one of the best educational equipments for Sunday School Teachers, and we would urge our pastors and people to emphasize this work.

Temperance Teaching is very effectually done in the Sunday School, and we would urge our workers to give renewed interest to this work with regular temperance programs at least quarterly.

Finally, the Sunday School Board solicits the prayers of our people that God may make our Sunday School a mighty agency of evangelization, that the year before us may be one of victory in winning our Sunday School Scholars to Christ and our Church.
