Attractive features in the parsonage are the four bedrooms, one and onehalf baths with shower facilities in the basement; carpeted living room and hall, a kitchen dinette as well as a formal dining area, ample closet space and a tiled foyer. This makes the parsonage not only a very comfortable, but a very attractive home.

NHA RECEIVES REPORT ON SOCIAL ACTION

A feature of the National Holiness Association's Centennial Convention in Cleveland was the report of the NHA Committee on Social Action, "The Christian's Biblical Concerns".

The committee, under chairman Bishop Arthur Climenhaga outlined the following areas:

- Oppose legalization of narcotics, psychedelic drugs, gambling, pornographic films or literature and hemesexuality.
- Support the educational programs of competent counselors for voluntary family planning.
- 3. Called for the NHA to develop Biblical concepts of life and death that may serve as guides for a position and for participation in the decisions on such normal issues as birth and genetic controls, abortion and organ transplants.
- 4. Oppose open or <u>de facto</u> discrimination, to oppose irresponsible and violent methods to achieve human rights.
- 5. Oppose the advocates of anarchism as well as the advocates of government without limits. We share the grief and shame of a nation that is tern by hate and assassination, violence and revolutionary tactics.

The 1969 One Hundred and First Annual Convention of the NHA was announced to meet in St. Louis, Missouri, April 8-11 at the Sheraton-Jefferson Hotel.


M W C HIGHLIGHTS

JUNIOR YOUTH CAMP, JUNE 18-21

We are rapidly approaching the dates which have been set for the 1968 youth camps. The Junior Camp, designed for boys and girls 8 to 11 years of age, is to be held on the Miltonvale Camp Grounds June 18 to 21.

A great amount of preparatory work has already been invested in this camp and a heavy load is being carried by a few of our people. The work of the counselors will include general supervision of a group of approximately 8 to 10 boys or girls. This will involve such duties as staying in the dorms or tents with them at night, conducting daily devotions with your group, giving counsel at the altar or in personal interview as opportunity is afforded, sitting at a designated place in the dining room at meal time, attending a daily counselor's session for discussion and prayer and the giving of assistance with any situation which may arise that affects the spiritual welfare of the campers and the work of the camp. The counselors for the Junior Camp will not be required to pay the registration fee for rooms and meals.

Morgan Chapel Observes 75th


Morgan Chapel Wesleyan Church celebrated their 75th anniversary on Sunday, November 10 with a full day of activities from Sunday school to worship service, basket dinner and evening services.

The small church congregation was organized in December 1882 with six charter members and was known at that time as the "Forty Church" because its services were held in District 40 school house.

Undoubtedly at that time one of the charter members of the group, Mrs. Deborah Campbell Morgan, was hoping for realization of a fervent dream of a house of God in which to hold regular services because the pioneer mother pledged \$500 toward the building of a church. The prairie church was named the Morgan Chapel Church after Mrs. Morgan. Mrs. Deborah Campbell Morgan was the mother of Debora Morgan Freeborn Hamlin, Kinsley Morgan and Benson Morgan who each pledged \$100 to the new church.

During the planning stages of the Morgan Chapel many members of the congregation gave money and labor until materials were soon purchased and building operations were started in 1892. The chapel was dedicated on September 14, 1893 with the Rev. G. B. Howard preaching the sermon.




