FAIRMOUNT, INDIANA, AUGUST 16, 1948

The One-Hundredth Session of the Indiana Annual Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church convened on the Camp Ground at 7:30 P. M. August 16th.

The song service was conducted by the Rev. Russell Klinger.

Prayer was offered by the Rev. E. J. Pitts.

The message of the hour was delivered by the Rev. Milo Bowsman. His theme "The Divine Helper" was taken from Isaiah 41:10. 2. Annuity Contracts—I recommend that this Conference authorize the Conference Board of Trustees to prepare and set up an Annuity Contract Plan.

RESOLUTIONS AND LAWS OF THE INDIANA CONFERENCE

I. Houses of Worship.

1. Our houses of worship should not be open to any evangelist or minister of any other church to hold a series of meetings or to maintain a regular appointment for another congregation; provided, however, that usual denominational courtesies be extended to other ministers in occasional appointments. A waiving of the above by a contract or lease of building must be obtained through the Board of Trustees of the Indiana Conference.

II. Pastoral Duties.

- 1. It is the duty of the pastors to look after the insurance of our church and parsonage properties. All insurance shall provide for losses caused by fire and lightning, hail and tornado. A failure on the part of the pastor shall be a censurable offense. If the church fails to insure their property upon reasonable effort of the pastor to secure the same, then said failure shall be reported to the President of the Conference who shall then have the property insured. In such case all insurance monies received from losses by fire, lightning, hail, and tornado shall be used in Church Extension work as the Conference Board of Trustees considers best.
- 2. Each pastor and evangelist shall file a complete statistical report with the statistical committee before the close of the fifth day of August. The pastor shall report in open conference the items listed on special blanks furnished by the conference. The official character of any pastor or evangelist shall not be passed until he shall have submitted a satisfactory report including statistics.
- 3. All unaccounted for members appearing in the statistics in the membership list shall be referred to the discontinued list. All members in excess of the number reported shall be reported received.
- 4. The pastor shall bring a report to each Quarterly Meeting and send a duplicate to the Conference President and Vice-President, quarterly, on blanks furnished by the Conference.
- 5. This Conference asks each pastor to prepare a calling list of all the homes connected with the Church and Sunday School; listing the relationship they hold to the church; listing their names and addresses by city, street and number, the same to be kept for his own work while on the pastorate and to be given to his successor on the field.
- 6. No pastor whose total receipts are \$1500.00 or more shall hold more than two revivals yearly away from his charge, one of which is men-

tioned in resolution seven under pastoral duties, unless by consent of the President and his Advisory Board.

- 7. Each pastor whose total pastor's receipts exceed \$2000.00 a year should seek to organize a new class or give his services in a revival meeting to a new or weaker church, to help to establish it. The church which he pastors should grant him such privileges without censure, with full remuneration of salary while in such a meeting. The Vice-President shall serve as Co-ordinator, to recommend and help arrange such meetings.
- 8. Delegate's Credentials secured from the Secretary shall be mailed to the Assistant Secretary by the pastor not later than ten days before the convening of Conference.

III. Churches.

- 1. All charges with a membership of twenty-five or more shall in addition to the regular stipulated salary, assume the responsibility of providing a suitable home in which the pastor may live.
- 2. All charges and stations to which a pastor shall move shall pay the moving and transportation expenses of said pastor, the same to be done in addition to his salary. When the Conference demands the services of any one, that it shall bear the moving expenses, if any expense shall thus be incurred.
- 3. No charge shall call any one as pastor, or to supply the work by ministers coming from other **denominations** as long as there are ministers in our Conference qualified and available to take work. The President after he has exercised his prerogative in the reception of ministers coming from other denominations, is to immediately refer them to the Committee on Itineracy and Elder's Orders, who shall make a thorough investigation as to the ministry and life of such applicants, who shall report their findings to the President, after which, appointments may be made.
- 4. Each charge should grant their pastor each year two weeks vacation with pay.
- 5. The Sunday School offerings of the first Sunday of each month shall be divided equally by the local treasurer between "Home Missions" and "Conference Expense Fund" until these budgets are in full. The same to be forwarded to the Conference Treasurer, quarterly.

IV. Conference.

- 1. Each Annual Conference shall be held at Fairmount, Indiana, beginning on the Tuesday nearest August fifteenth.
- 2. The first Sunday of the Annual Gathering belongs to the old conference year and the second Sunday of the Annual Gathering belongs to the new conference year.

- 3. The fiscal year begins August 1st and ends July 31st.
- 4. The sitting of the Conference for each day is considered as one meeting.
- 5. In examination of characters the Conference officials shall be called first.
- 5. The President and his advisory board shall be consulted before any love offering shall be taken.
- 6. The Secretary and the Assistant Secretary constitute a committee on communications.
- 7. The Assistant Secretary is to act as reporter of the Conference to the Marion daily papers.
- 8. The Treasurers shall submit their reports to the Auditing Committee who shall audit the same and in their report to this body they shall show they have audited the same.
- 9. The Board of Trustees are authorized to act as the Conference Missionary Board.
- 10. The Board of Trustees shall authorize all disbursements not otherwise provided for.
- 11. The President shall receive \$100.00, the Vice-President \$50.00, the Secretary \$100.00, the Treasurer \$300.00, the Assistant Secretary \$50.00, each member of the Auditing Committee \$10.00, each member of the Statistical Committee \$40.00; the same to be paid from the Conference Mission and Expense Fund. The Conference Sunday School Secretary shall receive \$100.00 and each member of the Conference Sunday School Board \$50.00, the same to be paid out of the Sunday School Treasury.
- 12. The President of the Conference, and Vice-President shall be given each year a two weeks' vacation with pay, said vacation to be at a time of their own choosing.
- 13. When the churches, which have been placed in the hands of the President, decide as to who shall be their pastor before the Minutes are sent to press, the same shall be entered in the minutes as if ordered by this Conference.

V. Committees.

- 1. The Committee on Elder's Orders is to transfer all persons to the study list who may have been recommended to travel and may not have been given work, providing they are meeting the disciplinary requirements in the course of study.
- 2. When recommendations to travel and to study preparatory to travel are presented to the Conference in session, they shall be recorded

by the Secretary and automatically referred to the Committee on Itineracy and Elders Orders, without having been read to the Conference.

- 3. The Camp Meeting Committee shall nominate and the Conference elect the one to preach the opening sermon of the next Conference Year with his alternate.
- 4. The Conference shall elect five members of the Camp Meeting Committee. Three of which are to be ministerial, one to be elected each year for a term of three years; two to be lay members, one to be elected each year for a term of two years.
- 5. No building or major repair involving structural changes on church property shall be undertaken without the approval of the Conference Building Committee.

VI. Other resolutions.

- 1. We believe that the healing of the body is among the gifts of the Spirit according to I Corinthians 12:7-11, hence not for all Christians at all times as it is not always the will of God to heal the body.
- 2. The use of the wedding ring is not in accord with our standards as a Church, therefore we as a Conference disapprove of our ministers performing or taking part in the ring ceremony.

We are grateful to our Heavenly Father, also, for the splendid material gains which have been observed in the different sections of the Conference. New churches have been completed, parsonages have been bought and debts liquidated. This is very encouraging.

The work of the Woman's Missionary Society, the Young Missionary Workers' Band, the Young People's Society, and the Sunday School Department is going forward in a very encouraging manner. The Conference President is appreciative of the fact that these departments are co-operating whole-heartedly in the full program of the church.

The Conference is loyal to the General Interests of the Church. The churches of our Conference have given \$21973.79 to Foreign Missions. An average of over five dollars per member. An increase over last year of \$3445.16. \$13452.01 to Home Missions—gain of \$3631.02—an average of over three dollars per member. \$8452.17 to Education—a gain of \$1539.57—an average of almost two dollars per member. Total for Benevolences raised this year was \$115938.44—an average of almost \$27.00 per member.

Our churches are loyal to the Conference assignments. Conference budgets were well cared for. Conference Extension money to the amount of \$11747.69 was raised—\$661.84 above last year. A large number of the churches of the Conference raised their budgets in full. An average of \$132.00 per member for all purpose. Value of churches and parsonages increased over last year \$221100.00. Indebtedness on churches and parsonages is \$1114700.00. Indebtedness \$39742.00 or three per cent. Total

for pastors this year was \$209529.00, an increase of \$21955.00 over last year. Our great need is a spiritual awakening of a holy enthusiasm which grips our hearts and lives concerning the unsaved in our Sunday-schools and those in the immediate community where our churches operate.

It seems that the need of the hour is personal evangelism—a passion to possess us relative to the spiritual needs of those with whom we live; those with whom we work; and those outside of Christ, who are all about us.

Jesus gave us great examples of personal evangelism, time and again in his ministry:—when he talked to the Samaritan woman at Jacob's well; when he advised with Nicodemus; when he counselled with the Rich Young Ruler; when he spoke words of salvation to Zacchaeus, dining with him in his home;—and many other instances could be mentioned.

Jesus set the example. Many Christians have found personal evangelism of inestimable value. We hope that the Camp Meeting, which is to follow this session of Conference, will be a great revival force which will send us back to our respective places to push the battle with new emphasis, new zeal, and new fire; and that the revival fires of personal evangelism will permeate every church of our beloved Zion.

A PARAPHASE OF THE 13th CHAPTER OF FIRST CORINTHIANS

The Greatest of these is Evangelism

Though I speak with the tongues of scholarship, and though I use approved methods of education, and fail to win people to Christ, or to build them up in Christian character, I am become as the moan of the wind in a Syrian desert.

And though I have the best of teaching skill and knowledge, and understand all the mysteries of religion, and lose not myself in the task of winning others to Christ, I am become as a cloud of mist in an open sea.

And though I read good Christian iterature and attend spiritual conventions and institutes and summer schools, and yet am satisfied with less than winning people to Christ, and establishing my friends in Christian character and service, it profiteth me nothing.

The soul winning Christian, the character building Christian, suffereth long and is kind; he envieth not others who take no interest in the task; he vaunteth not himself, is not puffed up with intellectual pride.

Such a Christian does not behave himself unseemly between Sundays, seeketh not his own comfort, is not easily provoked.

Beareth all things, believeth all things, hopeth all things.

COMMITTEE ON FINANCE AND APPROPRIATION

We, your Committee on Finance and Appropriation, submit the following report:

We recommend the following appropriations:

Item I. That the Budget Apportionment be per member as follows: General Executive, 25 cents: Foreign Missions, \$2.00; Home Missions, \$1.00; Education, \$1.50; Superannuate Pension Fund, \$1.50; Orphanage, 25 cents; Conference Expense Fund, \$2.50; Camp Meeting Expense, 75 cents; Emergency Benefit Fund, (to be disbursed at the discretion of the Conference Trustees) 25 cents. That all church budget excepting that raised by the W. M. S., Y. M. W. B., W. Y. P. S., be sent to the Conference Treasurer, Rev. C. D. Crabill.

Item II. Superannuate Pension Plan.

Item V. That the General W. Y. P. S. dues be 50 cents per active member of the W. Y. P. S. This money to be sent to the Conference W. Y. P. S. treasurer.

Item VI. That a goal of \$1.00 per member be set for a Conference Parsonage, and that the Rally Day Offering count toward this goal, as recommended by the Conference Sunday School Board.

We further recommend that a conference wide drive be carried out immediately following Rally Day for the purpose of raising this amount. Such drive to be under the direction of such person or persons as the Conference Board of Trustees may select.

Item VII. That the President shall have general supervision of the work of the Conference.

- a. Each church shall be visited by one of the Conference officials during the year, and when possible for a Sunday service. He shall inquire as to the state of the church, and counsel and advise with the pastor, and he shall present the interests of the General and Conference Work.
- b. The Vice-President shall have direct supervision of the Conference Missionary work, subject to the counsel and approval of the Conference Missionary Board. He shall be responsible for the raising of Conference Missionary Funds, and he may secure assistance as he may deem necessary to successfully carry out the same.
- c. We further recommend that there be appointed by the Conference Missionary Board one man in each of the Conference districts who

shall assist the Vice-President in the carrying out of the Conference Missionary Work. It shall be his duty to inform the Vice-President of any possible openings for the extension of the work of the church in his district and the Vice-President shall investigate the same.

Item VIII. All quarterly Meetings shall be arranged by the Pastor, and shall be held near the close of each fiscal quarter. The Pastor shall report quarterly to the President and Vice-President on blanks formulated by the President.

Item IX. That the salary of the President be \$65.00 per week and that of the Vice-President be \$60.00 per week, the same to be paid by the Conference Treasurer Monthly, with expenses incidental to their work.

Item X. We recommend that the following concerning the Indiana Wesleyan Messenger:

- A. That the President and Vice-President constitute the Executive Committee of the Wesleyan Messenger.
 - B. That the Vice-President be the Editor.
- C. That the Executive Committee be empowered to select some person to act as Business and Circulation Manager.
- D. That the Executive Committee be authorized to employ an assistant as need demands to be typist and Mailing Secretary for the Editor and Business Manager.
- E. That the Various departments which use the columns of the Wesleyan Messenger regularly shall make contributions toward the expense of the same.
- Item XI. A. That Paragraph 4, Item 11, be changed to read, "The President shall receive \$100.00, the Vice-President \$50.00" the remainder of the item to remain as it is.
- B. That Standing Rules, Paragraph 3, Item 5 be amended to read as follows: "The S. S. Offerings of the first Sunday of each month shall be divided equally by the local treasurer between "Home Missions" and the Conference Expense Fund," until these funds are full. The same to be forwarded to the Conference Treasurer quarterly.
- C. That a Standing Rule be added to Section IV as follows: "The Emergency Benefit Fund" shall be used only for the relief of the Ministers, or their widows, of the Conference in times of sickness, or death, or other needs of emergency character. This fund to be administered by the Conference Board of Trustees.
 - D. That the Conference Pension Treasurer be paid \$100.00 per year.

Item XIII. That the balance in the Conference Treasury be held in the Pension Treasury for emergency needs. This fund to be administered by the Conference Pension Board subject to the Approval of the Conference Board of Trustees.

- 3. All organized societies shall keep permanent records of membership and finances. The list of members shall include a classification of active and associate members and shall be revised at the close of each Conference year.
 - 5. The Ways and Means Committee shall be composed of five mem-

bers elected by the W. Y. P. S. conference and a sixth member chosen from and by the Committee on Finance and Appropriations of the main Conference Body.

- 5. There shall be a Youth Camp of one week duration and that the date of the camp be set by the W. Y. P. S. Camp Meeting Committee.

- 14. All money raised by the local societies, other than local projects be sent to the conference W. Y. P. S. treasurer not later than August 4.
- 15. The manner of nominating District Officials shall be by a Nominating Committee, composed of five members, the chairman of which shall be a Pastor, who is vitally interested in young people's work. All members shall be from separate churches where possible. This Committee shall be elected at the last rally of the year and their duties shall be as follows:
 - A. To present two names of nomination through the District Secretary to the W. Y. P. S. Annual conference for the election of a District President.
 - B. To present nomination at the first rally after conference for the remaining officials. Two names for each office should be presented.
- 16. There shall be a missionary committee elected by each local society to be responsible for one missionary service each month.

17. The W. Y. P. S. Treasurer pay from the general fund each year the sum of twenty-five dollars for the expense of printing the minutes. And that the W. Y. P. S. Secretary cooperate with the Conference Secretaries in determining the number of pages used.

Ways and Means Committee

We, your committee on Ways and Mans, submit the following report: I. We recommend that each district cooperate with the following state program as to conventions:

- At least four conventions be held in each district and that these conventions be held quarterly.
- State convention at Campgrounds May 30.
- II. That either the state president or vice-president visit each district convention at least once during the year.

Finance

- I. That the area president receive traveling expenses while traveling our conference, the same to be paid by the group asking his services.
 - II. That the salary of the conference officers be as follows:
 - a. President, \$125.00.
 - b. Vice-President, \$25.00.
 - c. Secretary, \$35.00.
 - d. Treasurer, \$50.00.

Said salary to be paid at the end of first quarter.

- III. That the desk and traveling expenses of the president, vicepresident, secretary, and treasurer be paid from the conference fund, and the desk and traveling expenses of the campmeeting committee be paid from the Youth Camp fund; and that said expenses be paid at least quarterly.
 - IV. That the budget be as follows:
 - a. Budget to be paid quarterly.
 - b. General dues, 50 cents per active member of the local society.
 - c. Conference budget: 30 cents, pioneer evangelism; 10 cents, conference general funds; 20 cents Youth Camp. The conference budget is based on church membership and shall be paid by the local society.
- V. That traveling expenses be figured on the basis of five cents per mile.
- VI. That the executive council shall have power to appropriate money from the general fund for the general promotion of the youth work.
- VII. That all offerings above expenses of district conventions be sent to the conference treasurer to apply on pioneer evangelism.
- VIII. That we urge each local society to cooperate with the church in raising money for church extension and use of the college loyalty fund chart.
- IX. That all monies raised within the society for missions be forwarded to the conference treasurer for department credit, and that said money be raised by monthly missionary offerings.
