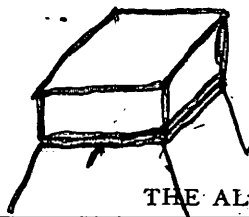

STANDING RESOLUTIONS

1. A Committee on Auditing and Finance, consisting of two Elders and one Conference Preacher, shall be elected each year, the duties of which shall be, to examine and report on the Treasurer's books and all financial reports, save missionary, and to be a Standing Committee to advise on financial plans.

2. All persons received into membership in the churches of our Conference, excepting those whose life of Christian fidelity has been of sufficient long standing, shall be received at first as associate members only.

3. When it becomes necessary for any church to call a pastor, it shall be the duty of the calling church to make provision for the expense incurred by the pastor in removing to the new field of labor. Money raised for this purpose shall NOT be applied on the pastor's salary.

4. The Conference Sunday shall be the closing Sunday of the Conference year, and the outgoing pastor shall be paid his salary for that Sunday by the charge he is leaving.

5. At the opening of the Conference Session the President shall appoint a Nominating Committee of not less than three members, two Elders and one Layman, to bring to the Conference a slate of Nominations for Committees, etc., for the Conference Temporary Organization. Delegates' Credentials shall be mailed to the Conference Secretary not later than ten days before convening of Conference.

6. No person shall be received as a member of Allegheny Annual Conference until he shall have properly filled out an Application Blank, which application together with the recommendations of his references must pass the approval of the President and his Advisory Board. Exemptions to this rule may be made by the President and his Advisory Board, when they deem it best.

7. The pastor of any church in the Conference shall be free to hold at least one revival meeting a year, wherever he sees fit, and it is recommended that his usual salary be paid him while he is absent.

8. Each pastor shall send a monthly report on the blank provided to the Conference President showing the progress and state of the work under his care.

9. Each church may elect a Nominating Committee whose duty it shall be to nominate candidates for church offices for presentation to the church at the annual election of officers. Such nominations shall not exclude other nominations at the time of the business meeting.

10. Churches having business with the Conference Board of Trustees requiring a visit of that body to their church, shall be responsible for the expense attached to such calls, unless released by the Board.

11. In as much as trial sermons are hardly fair either to church or

candidate, and since the practice of having a trial sermon is contrary to the usual manner of locating preachers, we recommend that churches shall not ask any preacher to come for a trial sermon, and that no preacher shall accept any such invitation if given. Exceptions to this rule may be granted by the Conference President upon request of any church.

12. Since considerable expense of transferring of automobile title and license attends the moving of a pastor from one state to another, we recommend that where possible the calling church bear this expense.

13. We recommend that all Districts emphasize Sunday-school activity, and that Conventions be arranged for in conjunction with the visitation of the Conference Sunday-school Secretary, who shall visit one Convention of each District during the year, at District expense.

14. We recommend that no one shall be elected to Elders Orders who does not have an abiding sense of a divine call to give himself wholly to the function and ministry of an Elder in the WESLEYAN METHODIST CHURCH. And that no one shall be ordained to this office and work who is not applying himself wholly to this one thing in cares and studies, and clearly determining by God's grace to give himself wholly to this holy ministry, if possible, long before the appointed day of ordination, and manifesting such a determination in faithful Christian service to the church or congregation whom he was called to serve during his years of preparation, so that, as much as lieth in himself, he has and will apply himself wholly to the work of the ministry, except in all cases of absolute necessity of such diversions to a legitimate avocation for livelihood which neither jeopardizes the Lord's work or blames the ministry.

It is with gratitude that we address ourselves to you as Brothers and Sisters in the Lord. Truly there is no friendship in the world equal to that fellowship which is begotten by "the love of God shed abroad in our hearts by the Holy Ghost."

Time is a powerful agent. It affects great changes. Governments rise and fall, kingdom wax and wane. Armies are annihilated, kings are dethroned, and nations overrun. Time does a mighty work and one authority after another rises into power only to descend into the dust.

"One there is above all others" on whom time is unable to work any change. It is good to recognize that though all that comes and goes, it may be said of our God, "Thou remainest."

Report No. 4

COMMITTEE ON AUDITING AND FINANCE

Your Committee on Auditing and Finance makes recommendations as follows:

1. Approval of Item 6 of the President's Report, and that the Con-

ference President receive a salary of \$40.00 per week and traveling expenses incurred in pursuit of the duties of his office to the amount of \$500.00, he to provide adequate liability insurance for his car. Salary to be paid by the Conference Treasurer. We also recommend that when the President is called on special occasions and extra meetings outside his regular Quarterly Meeting schedule incurring extra expense, the offering on these occasions shall apply to these expenses and not be credited to regular salary. (No budget receipt will be given for these offerings.)

2. Adoption of the Conference Treasurer's Report, as we find his report correct according to our judgment, and that he draw from the treasury the sum of \$30.00 in appreciation of his labors. Also that each Sub-Treasurer be paid the sum of \$10.00 in appreciation of their labors, and that they be reimbursed for all expense incurred in their work such as banking, postage, stationery, etc.

3. That our Sunday schools be urged to continue giving the first Sunday in the month offering to Conference Missions for paying debts and mortgages, church extension, and helping pastors whose salary is inadequate. This money to be reported on statistical blanks as Conference Missions.

4. Approval of the report of the Committee on Sale of Conference Minutes, and that 650 copies, or more if demand is sufficient, be printed for this year. Cash balance on hand to be placed in Conference Incidental Fund.

5. Approval of the report of the Committee to Receive Conference Entertainment Fund. We recommend that the fee be increased to 25 cents per member.

6. Continuation of the Aid Fund.

7. Recognition and hearty support of the following Connectional interests: Foreign Missions, \$2.00 per member; Home Missions, \$.50 per member; these sums to be raised by the W. H. & F. M. Society, the Y. M. W. B., and the W. Y. P. Society, and other sources, exclusive of the Conference Missions offering from the Sunday school; Education, \$1.50 per member; Hephzibah Orphanage, \$.25 per member.

8. We recommend that the Birthday Offerings from the Sunday school which heretofore went to Bethshan Home be placed in the Conference Mission Fund.

9. That Superannuate, G. W. Richardson, be paid \$50.00 quarterly this year.

10. That Conference Budget be raised undivided. Using total obtained by adding pastor's cash salary, parsonage rent, and church incidental expenses as a determining basis, Budget apportionment shall be remitted to Conference Sub-Treasurers in monthly payments and reported on Statistical Blanks as Undivided Budget. (Budget may be paid from the Incidental Fund of the church treasury, or by offerings for that purpose.) Dis-

tribution of Budget as follows: Conference Expense, 70 per cent; Conference Missions, 20 per cent; Superannuated Ministers, 2 per cent; Miscellaneous Fund, 8 per cent. Distribution apportionment subject to revision by Auditing and Finance Committee, to maintain an equalized distribution.

11. That each church be asked to contribute \$.50 per month to provide a portion of Group Insurance Premium as required by state law. To be remitted to Conference Sub-Treasurers.

12. That the Conference continue the payment of \$15.00 per month for President's Secretary.

13. That the President be authorized to draw from the Conference Incidental Fund without contacting his Advisory Board such small miscellaneous sums as money for flowers, telegrams, etc.

14. Approval of the report of Conference Trustees.

15. Approval of the report of Conference Pioneer Secretary.

16. That the balance in General Conference Delegates Expense Fund be transferred to the Conference Miscellaneous Fund.

17. Adoption of Tithing Secretary's report and that she be reimbursed from the Conference Treasury the amount of \$4.70 for literature and printing.

18. The Treasurer show on his books and render a separate account on the money loaned from the Aid Fund to churches and to ministers.

19. We, your committee, feel that due to the long, faithful and efficient service and the declining years of our beloved Brother Dreyer, that it would be an imposition to ask him to assume the ever-increasing responsibilities in connection with the treasury of this Conference for another year. We recommend that a new treasurer be elected by this body and wish to place in nomination the name of Mr. Virgil Sell.

We further recommend that this body extend to our Brother Dreyer a rising vote of thanks for his faithful services.

BETHSHAN HOME BOARD

To the Members of the Ninety-Eighth Session, Allegheny Annual Conference:

Dear Fellow Soldiers,

With this report we are ending officially the existence of a Conference Institution whose history has been replete with spiritual victories, and triumphant accomplishments.

Originating under the earnest prayers and sacrificial labors of Miss Fannie Wyke, Bethshan Home has served its generation without respect of persons.

In recent years the changed social trend has altered the work of the

Home, and limited its usefulness until it had degenerated into little more than a convenient hospital for state cases. Serving as such an institution, the financial income became a very gratifying phase of the institution's operations.

However, the spiritual purposes for which Bethshan existed could not be accomplished. The new attitude towards sin and sex irregularly produced a new attitude in those who were victims of lust. This new attitude robbed the Home of its chance to help the fallen girl to a life "hid in Christ Jesus." Bethshan Home might have continued to function as a financially successful institution, but such has not been the object of its existence.

The Board of Managers, recognizing these changes, faced the problem of continuing the Home, when it was not performing and could not perform its spiritual calling. The Conference President's Advisory Board was called to meet with the Board of Managers, and at this joint-meeting it was finally decided that circumstances necessitated our terminating the work of the Home. It was not the choice of the Board to close Bethshan Home. We were compelled to take the action which closed its doors.

The actual closing of the Home was not merely in discontinuing its services by action of the Board; it was the stoppage of its spiritual functioning by the attitude of the world, and over this no Board has any control.

The Board of Managers turned the matter of disposing the furnishings of the Home over to Brother and Sister V. E. Sell, of whose loyal, loving service as Superintendent, Treasurer and Secretary we cannot speak too highly. These noble workers deserve the warmest appreciation of Allegheny Annual Conference, and we wish that we were able to pay them the tribute their sacrificial labors have merited.

Certain articles were donated to the Camp and Conference and other items were sold in a private sale, after an appraising Committee consisting of Reverend Edna Patterson, Catharine Carr, and Mrs. A. D. Fero had set a valuation for them.

The Real Estate was in the name of the Allegheny Annual Conference, and the Conference Board of Trustees authorized its being placed in the hands of a real estate dealer for disposal. Within a few months, a buyer was found and the property was sold for \$7800 on a monthly payment plan.

Thus ends the report of the President of the Board of Managers, but the end of the influence of Bethshan Home cannot thus be told. Only eternity will reveal the untold benefits and blessings which this Home has conferred on the despairing victims of sin.

PIONEER SECRETARY

Your Pioneer Secretary respectfully submits the following report:

1. Dayton, Pa. The week following Conference the Pioneer Tent was pitched at Dayton, Pa., where the first meeting of the year was held. The services began Friday night, June 14, continuing until July 11. A cold, backward season and excessive rain, with accompanying muddy roads, greatly handicapped the work there. We rented a room and lived at Nu Mine, eight miles distant. This enabled us to assist in getting the Nu Mine folk to the tent. During this period we conducted a Vacation Bible School at Nu Mine, with an enrollment of between seventy and eighty. Each day we transported a load of Dayton children to and from the Bible School. The personal contacts made through calling in the homes of the community revealed only a few families who were interested in a Wesleyan Church. One family had previously united with the Nu Mine Church;

two others united following the meeting. There are several other families with Free Methodist and Christian Missionary Alliance backgrounds from the village and adjacent communities whom we might be able to interest. There was not substantial enough backing, however, to warrant immediate organization. We advised the conducting of weekly cottage prayer meetings and a Sabbath afternoon district holiness meeting once a month, with the hope of organizing a Sunday school and a regular Sunday afternoon preaching appointment. Some of the local people felt they were ready for regular services then, so the Grange Hall was engaged at a small cost and Rev. Howells went out several Sunday afternoons, but felt the response did not compensate the effort and time. Some cottage prayer meetings have been held throughout the winter. We feel that a contact of friendship and good will has been established.

2. Punxsutawney, Pa. From Dayton, the pioneer tent was sent to Punxsutawney where it was used in a profitable campaign with Rev. and Mrs. Andrew West as evangelists.

3. Lovejoy, Pa. While the Conference tent was engaged at Punxsutawney, we rented the Wanchisn tent and entered Lovejoy, beginning Sunday, July 14, and continuing through the 28th. Here we also conducted a successful Vacation Bible School. The School reached an enrollment of seventy local children the first week. The second week a number came in from Hillsdale and outlying territories until by the closing day the registration had reached 125. The Bible School did much to help win our way into the community and was met by a hearty response and interest from the people in general. There were other encouraging spiritual features about this meeting.

4. Tent Meeting. At this point your Secretary dropped out of the pioneer field to fill an appointment as young people's worker at Victory Camp. The Reverend T. A. Robertson took the Conference tent from Punxsutawney to a rural section about nine miles from Nu Mine, where he conducted a meeting in which some good work was accomplished.

5. Stewart Run. After Stoneboro Camp your Secretary proceeded as instructed by the committee to concentrate the pioneer efforts through the winter months to the building and evangelizing of some already open fields. The first of these campaigns was launched at Stewart Run. A three weeks meeting was conducted here, Sept. 1-22. The Lord gave an encouraging revival. A house to house visitation disclosed an open, hungry community, which no doubt under concentrated pastoral administration could soon be nursed into a self-supporting work.

6. Emeigh, Pa. Our next endeavor was at Emeigh, Pa. The meeting here began October 7, continuing through the 27th. The Lord came in gracious visitation. In answer to prayer money was given for the painting of the church. Immediately following the meeting a church was organized with twenty-five charter members.

7. Blue Eye. Blue Eye Mission was our next pioneer effort. The campaign here was conducted December 8-22. There is a beautiful little chapel at Blue Eye; also a large area from which to draw for a Holiness Church. Some outstanding results attended this meeting which we hope may contribute to the upbuilding and stabilizing of the work. Several splendid Christian families form a nucleus for a real Holiness Church in this area.

8. Nu Mine, Pa. The first meeting after Christmas was conducted at Nu Mine, Pa., January 5-19. Again the Lord came in unusual power. In spite of severe persecutions from the liquor interests and their friends, there was scarcely a barren altar service throughout the meeting. New people were brought into the church and new friends were won to the cause. It was during this meeting that arrangements were made for a Sunday-school census at Margaret Mine. Plans are now under way for the building of a new church at Nu Mine.

9. Mentcle, Pa. Mentcle was our next engagement. The date of organization here outlawed this meeting from the pioneer program. Two of the severest weeks of the winter marked the weather for this campaign. Country roads were drifted shut almost the entire time, and the main highways were a glare of ice. In spite of this and a flu epidemic, the Lord gave some precious trophies. Mentcle offers an open field for pioneering. Brown Town and Pipperary, both small mining towns, lie within a mile of the church; Mentcle is one half mile back the other way; Heilwood and Pine Flats are not more than four miles distant, also a rural community which can be drawn from. Besides a house to house visitation, the inclement weather and sickness directed us to daily afternoon prayer meetings in the homes. The Lord especially sealed these efforts in soul saving. There is a company of praying people at Mentcle, which increases the possibilities in this open community. The mines which had been closed for several years have been recently purchased by a new company and are opening. This also adds prospect to the field.

10. Twin Rocks, Pa. Here was our next field of labor, March 3-16. God gave special attention to this needy field. The campaign was conducted in an independent mission which Brother and Sister Trimble had been supplying for several months. The beautiful little chapel here had been recently remodeled and the debt reduced to less than \$120.00. The outlook is encouraging for a Wesleyan Methodist Church which will be a penetration into the great untouched areas of Cambria County. Both pastors and myself felt it would be premature to stress the matter of a church at present.

11. Luciusboro, Pa. At the close of the Twin Rocks meeting we visited the newly organized church at Luciusboro, conducted a one-night service and organized a missionary society with twenty charter members.

12. Brady's Bend. Rev. Charles Gray, who attended the Dayton

meeting and during the Nu Mine revival transferred his membership from the Free Methodist Church to Nu Mine; has the beginning of a work at Brady's Bend. Rev. Andrew West conducted two meetings there. Prospects here point toward a Wesleyan work.

13. Fulton Run, Pa. Rev. Clair Tucker reports an encouraging revival at Fulton Run, Pa.

14. Kenmore, Ohio. More than a year ago a group of people from Kenmore contacted Brother A. D. Fero, desiring that the Wesleyan Methodists open a work there. He conducted two revival campaigns and others of the Akron area held prayer meetings and gave other aid until a revival meeting was launched which resulted in an organization with 16 charter members and a Sunday school which has grown to over forty members. Brother Byron Zike was appointed to the pastorate.

15. Margaret Mine. A canvass was made of Margaret Mine and a Sunday school has been opened there with a local enrollment of from 60 to 65. There is a splendid school auditorium which can be procured for church and Sunday school purposes at a price of fifty cents a week.

16. Sharon, Pa. Prospecting has been done through the year in the city of Sharon, Pa. We had planned a revival campaign with the Cliftons here last September, but through an oversight in their slate they were unable to keep the appointment. It was then arranged that Brother and Sister Huntsman would enter Sharon from Greenville organizing a prayer group and conducting prayer meetings as an entering wedge and in anticipation of opening a work. Due to sickness in the Huntsman home they have been unable to accomplish this.

17. Altoona, Pa. We have, also, done some prospecting in Altoona. James and Beatrice Spicher, and Mr. and Mrs. Robert Stephens, two of our church couples were then living in Altoona. The Spichers moved later. We tried to interest the Indiana District pastors, but they were unable to do anything during the winter months.

18. West Virginia. We have also been in correspondence with representatives of groups in Parkersburg and Ravenswood, W. Va. Nothing definite has materialized in either of these places as yet relative to the opening of a Wesleyan work.

19. Andover, Ohio. Brother E. W. Brooks, assisted by Harold Schmul and the East Conneaut Trio, pitched a tent in Andover after Camp Meeting last fall. He and four ladies went through the community, gave out circulars advertising the meeting, visited and prayed in a number of homes. The cold fall nights greatly hindered the attendance. A few sought and found the Lord but from the number of seekers only two could be depended upon to attend the services if a work were opened. Consequently, Brother Brooks thought best to let matters rest for the present.

20. Clairton, and Wilkensburg. These are now under consideration

as prospective openings, but as yet we are unable to make definite announcement concerning either of the places.

21. Niles, Ohio. We closed a pioneer meeting last Sunday night, June 1, with Brother and Sister W. N. Saunders and their people at Niles. The work here has undergone a time of sifting during the last year, but God has helped the pastors and the little band to hold steady. New contacts are being made and the plans are under way for a permanent place of worship. Future prospects are very encouraging.

CONFERENCE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

The Conference Board of Trustees met on the Stoneboro Campgrounds on August 22, 1940, and, by motion approved plans and authorized the enlarging of the McLeister Memorial Church.

At Tarentum on Sept. 20, 1940 to consider purchasing the Church building being used there.

Authorized the Trustees at Niles, Ohio, to purchase two lots on Emma Street.

On Nov. 4, 1940, in the vicinity of Greenwood Church to consider the purchase of a parsonage property for that charge. By motion authorized the local trustees to purchase a part of the Wilbur Peterson property.

Authorized the sale of Bethshan property as soon as possible. By motion J. R. Swauger was made committee to arrange sale of same. Authorized the President and Secretary of the Board to sign necessary papers in the purchase of the Brownsville property.

On Nov. 6, 1940, the President and Secretary of the Conference Board of Trustees met in the office of Attorney Espy Sherrard in Union Town, Pa., and signed the mortgage and bond required by the Home Owner's Loan Corp. as the final step in the purchase of the Brownsville property.

On Nov. 26, 1940, met at Sandy Lake, Pa., to consider the request of Mt. Pleasant Church for assistance in solving the problem in financing the

completion of their new church building. Motion carried that the Board of Trustees endorse a note for said church for \$500.00 for a period of 18 months.

Authorized the Conference President to offer Bethshan property for sale for the sum of \$7,500.00 cash.

On February 8, 1941, by correspondence, approved the sale of Bethshan Home real estate for the sum of \$7,800.00 subject to terms as recorded on page 19 of the minutes of the Board of Trustees.

On February 25, 1941, met at the Wesleyan Methodist Church in Meadville to consider purchase of parsonage property for the Meadville Church. Authorized the purchase of the property at 745 Stewart Street for the sum of \$2,800.00 subject to terms as recorded on page 20 of the minutes of the Board.

Approved plans for the erection of a church building in Oil City, Pa.

President and Secretary authorized to sign necessary papers involved in the sale of Bethshan property.

On February 18, 1941, the President and Secretary of the Board went to Canton, Ohio, and signed Articles of Agreement and Land Contract consummating the sale of Bethshan Home real estate.

By correspondence the Board signed an Article of Agreement between said Board of Trustees and the People's Bank of Clymer, Clymer, Pa., that allowed the Tarentum Wesleyan Methodist Church to borrow the sum of \$5,000.00 at 5 per cent interest and purchase the church property at 528 East 8th Street, Tarentum, Pa. Copy of Article inserted in Minutes Record Book.

March 25, 1941, by correspondence, authorized the trustees of Mc-Leister Memorial Church to purchase two lots next to the church for parsonage purposes.

April 11, 1941, by correspondence, authorized the trustees of the Ashville Church to transfer a strip of land wide enough for a driveway, to the township.

May 8, 1941, by correspondence, approved the sale of the Sandy Lake Church property for the sum of \$1000.00 cash and the acceptance of the offer of Mr. R. C. Walker to purchase two corner lots on Main Street and present same to Church, provided a new church building is erected.

May 21, 1941, met in Oil City, Pa., and authorized the local trustees to purchase the vacant school building on Seldon Street and convert same into a combined church and parsonage. Terms and restrictions recorded on page 22 of the Minutes of the Board.

Authorized the sale of the lot on Plummer Street for the highest possible price, subject to terms and restrictions recorded on page 22 of Minutes Book.

Loans Authorized From the Aid Fund**From the Ministerial Aid Fund as follows:**

August 22, 1940. To Rev. John McLain, \$15.00 to be applied on debts acquired while pastor at Oil City.

November 4, 1940. To Rev. E. D. Lupton, \$30.00 to apply on hospital expenses.

January 24, 1941. To Rev. Cecil Huntsman, \$40.00 to apply on hospital and medical expenses.

January 24, 1941. To Rev. E. D. Lupton, \$75.00 to apply on medical and hospital expenses.

April 11, 1941. To Rev. Gerald Rodgers, \$75.00 to apply as payment on car.

May 21, 1941. To Rev. Cecil Huntsman, whatever amount may be necessary to apply on hospital and medical expense following an emergency operation.

From the Church Aid Fund as follows:

November 4, 1940. To Canton Second Church, \$65.00 to apply on the construction of Sunday-school rooms in the basement of the church building.

To the Annandale Church, \$65.00 to apply on the expense of reroofing the church building.

February 25, 1941. To the Oil City Church, \$100.00 to apply on construction of new church building when the local trustees have succeeded in negotiating a loan of \$500.00 from a bank.

February 25, 1941. \$100.00 to the Meadville Church to aid in purchasing parsonage property at 745 Stewart Street.

March 25, 1941. \$50.00 to the West Middlesex Church to aid in completion of basement church.

April 3, 1941. \$200.00 to Mt. Pleasant Church to aid in finishing the new church building.

May 21, 1941. Motion carried rescinding the action of the Board on February 25, granting a loan of \$100.00 to the Oil City Church to apply on new church building.

\$100.00 to the Oil City Church according to the conditions on page 22 of the minutes of the Board of Trustees.

3. COMMITTEE ON RESOLUTIONS

Be it Resolved:

(1). That we, the members of the Woman's Home and Foreign Mis-

(4). That we, our people, young and old, uphold, by precept and example, modesty of dress, by which we mean wearing long hose on children, avoiding short sleeves, short skirts, and nude shades of hosiery which draw attention to our bodies and so tend to destroy purity and deep spirituality.

(5). That we persistently adhere to Christian standards that create an atmosphere in the home and in the church so conducive to spirituality in these perilous times of departing from the faith of our fathers that the world may know we belong to the King of kings and look for His return for His holy bride.

(6). That as far as possible we refuse to patronize grocery stores, restaurants or other places selling liquor, since we most deeply abhor drinking or smoking.

(7). That we continue to maintain our stand against divorce laws, public amusement parks, public bathing beaches, and moving picture shows.

(8). That these resolutions be read in each local society frequently enough that all members be well informed of their proposed attainments and requisites.

COMMITTEE ON PROGRAM AND WORK

We recommend:

1. That at the first meeting after Conference each society, having new officers, hold an installation service.

2. That the Program and Plan of Work be read and discussed as soon as the Minutes are received. We also urge that the President of each society refer to this as a reminder during the year.

3. That each society endeavor to hold a public prayer meeting monthly, using Sister Reisdorph's prayer page, praying especially for the requests listed. Also, we suggest, that a spirit of evangelism be carried on in our local community, by the members of our society, each one feeling a personal responsibility to bring at least one soul to Christ during the year.

4. That each society elect a Corresponding Secretary to keep in touch with our different mission fields, thereby bringing firsthand knowledge to our women.

5. That we have an aggressive Solicitor for the Wesleyan Missionary in each society. Where it is difficult to get subscriptions we urge the use of the club plan.

6. That the President of each society remind those attending Stoneboro Camp Meeting of the daily missionary prayer meetings from 4:15 to 5:00 urging them to be faithful in this work of intercession.

7. (a) That each society put forth a special effort to send their President and Delegate to the Annual Conference, assuming their expenses for transportation, also the Delegate's Credentials be sent in at least two weeks before Conference, to Mrs. Verna Vogan, Sandy Lake, Penna.

(b) That fifteen cents per member be raised for Delegate's Entertainment and sent to Conference with the Delegate.

(c) That each society send at least one dozen cans of fruit or vegetables.

(d) That each society instruct their Delegate how much to pledge at the Public Missionary Meeting.

8. That we urge the use of the study book and the excellent programs in the Wesleyan Missionary.

9. That we endeavor during the year to raise one fourth of the Church Educational Budget.

10. That each local society raise the General Conference Budget of not less than six dollars for mountain missions and five dollars for Hephzibah Orphanage. Let all dues and budget obligations be sent to the Conference Treasurer, Mrs. Rachel L. Dreyer, Tionesta, Penna.

11. That we send clothing and supplies to our mountain missions, Hephzibah Orphanage, and Indian Mission including a few bandages. (Note: Bandages should be cut two inches to four inches wide and tightly rolled. These may be valued at fifty cents per pound, the amount credited on the Statistical Report, but not on the Budget.)

12. That we stress the need of Home Missions, raising as much for this as possible. Two hundred dollars of the total Conference receipts to be used at Zion's Hill Mission.

13. That we continue the support of Dr. Sim I. McMillen.

14. That the Red Letter Days as given in the Standard of Efficiency be observed. That Easter and Self-Denial offering be used for Home Missions.

15. (a) We suggest that where suitable each society have a Mercy and Help Committee.

(b) That our Holiness District Conventions, where possible, observe a missionary service.

(c) That each society have a live program committee, varying once a month, thereby each member be made to feel a greater interest in Missionary Work. We suggest the President act as Chairman of said committee.

(d) We urge that dollar dues be paid by all our members.

16. We further suggest that if possible a missionary travel the Conference this coming year.
