RECORD OF DAILY PROCEEDINGS TUESDAY AFTERNOON

The 109th Annual Session of the Champlain Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America met on the West Chazy Camp Ground. It was opened at 2:30 p.m., Tuesday, July 10th, 1951. The President, Rev. Charles Dayton, called the assembly to order. After congregational singing led by Bro. K. Ross, Bro. Jock offered prayer.

The roll was called; and 22 elders, 10 Conference Preachers, and 23 lay delegates were present. Many others also, with unofficial relation, were present. The President read Eph. 2:1-10. He made some comments, and gave an address relating to Conference interests. Bro. R. Hewitt, the Vice-President, prayed as the Conference stood around, at the front of the tabernacle.

Bro. Dayton read his report. Included are the Official Acts of the President, and Committees appointed by the President. The reports were adopted. See Reports.

The proposed Orders of the Day were read, and adopted after two changes were voted. See Reports.

It was voted that the Bar of the Conference be the first seven center rows of seats.

Rev. H. S. Miller and Mr. Fred Lord were elected as the Committee on Passage of Character.

The time of daily meetings of the Conference was voted to be: A.M. from 8:45 to 11:30; P.M. from 1:30 to closing by vote.

The Nominating Committee was elected, to include the following: Elders—A. O. Northrup, George Jock, Fred Shippee, Aldis Lamos; Laymen—Chester Fiet, Beatrice Lombard, Fulton Prest, and Harry Wescott.

The following Pastoral Relations Committee was elected:

Elders-Reginald Hewitt, Edwin Seaman, Spencer Moon;

Laymen-Bertha Lanpher, Byron Armstrong, and Dorothy Moon.

Bro. Aldis Lamos, the Secretary of the Church Extension Board, read the report of the Board meetings. It was adopted.

It was voted that the report NOT be printed in the Conference Minutes.

It was voted that Bro. Klob report concerning the work at Wyanskill to the Committee on Church Extension. It was voted that the men who teach the youth classes be permitted absence from the Conference sessions at the time of classes.

It was voted that all Pioneer work be reported to the Church Extension Committee, and that that Committee report back to the main Body.

Floyd Phelps and Harris Earl were elected as the Auditing Committee.

It was voted to adjourn. Prayer by Bro. R. Morgan.

WEDNESDAY FORENOON

Devotional period: This was conducted by Rev. S. Brainard. He read Psalm 32, and made comments thereon. This was followed by moments of prayer.

Business: The roll was called. The minutes of the Tuesday afternoon business were read and approved.

During the forenoon, the following were introduced to the Assembly: Mr. Wm. Otis, Bro. Olsen Clark, Mr. and Mrs. Elwyn Putney, and Rev. O. G. Wilson.

Names were called and characters passed as follows: George Jock, Maurice Jesmer, Kenneth Ross, Gerald Matson, Spencer Moon and Wilbur Matson. It was voted to adjourn for Committee work.

Dismissal by Bro. Wolcott.

WEDNESDAY AFTERNOON

The roll was called.

The minutes of the forenoon business were read and adopted. Order of the Day: Memorial service, with Rev. Jock in charge. He read the names of several laymen who have died the past year. Bro. Shippee read a portion of the 91st Psalm, and prayed. Special: "God is working out His purpose" was sung by Sr. Shippee. A few of the Pastors spoke appreciatively of the departed. Closing prayer.

Second Order of the Day: Address by Rev. O. G. Wilson, Connectional Representative. He discussed three things: Our Problems, Our Plans, Our Power. It was a challenging message, indeed.

Singing, "More Love to Thee, O Christ." Prayer by Sr. Stevenson. Bro. and Sr. Perry were introduced to the Body.

Sr. Perry's name was called, and she reported on the work at Sandgate, Vermont, which she has supplied the past year. Her character was passed.

It was voted to defer the Camp-meeting Business Order of the Day to Saturday p.m.

Introduced to the Conference were Mr. and Mrs. Stanley Hill and Mr. and Mrs. Robert Finley.

The report of the Nominating Committee was read. This Committee also read three recommendations.

It was moved and seconded that these recommendations be adopted. It was voted to amend this, and vote on each recommendation separately. It was then voted to refer these recommendations to the proper committees, namely—Rec. No. 1. to the Nominating Committee; Rec. No. 2. to the Pastoral Relations Committee; and Rec. No. 3. to the Committee on Itineracy and Orders.

The following names were called and characters passed: Robert Wolcott, Harry Johnson, Ralph Seaman, Duane Chadwick, O. M. Finch.

It was voted to adjourn for Committee work. Prayer by Bro. Murray.

THURSDAY FORENOON

The roll was called.

Devotional service: Stanley Hill read the Scripture at Heb. 3:1-14, and offered prayer.

A letter from the delegate of the Brant Lake Church, Mrs. Bertha Jones, was read.

Order of the Day: Superannuate Ministers' Relief Association meeting. See Reports.

It was voted that the S. M. R. A. officers be placed with the Conference officers in the Conference minutes.

A proposed revised reading of Article V., Par. 12 of the Discipline was read to the Assembly.

It was voted unanimously to adopt the revised Article V., Par. 12, as passed by the General Conference. (64 favorable votes. None objecting).

The recommendation referred to the Nominating Committee was read. It was moved that we retain the same districts as last year, and that the leaders of each District be nominated at a caucus of the representatives (here at Conf.) of each District.

The motion carried with the vote 42 in favor, and 14 "No."

It was voted that the time be extended to hear a report.

It was voted to hear a reading of the report of the Pastoral Relations Committee.

The report was read.

Adjournment by limitation of time. Dismissal by Bro. Calberg.

THURSDAY AFTERNOON

The roll was called.

Devotional leader—Rev. Gerald Hewitt. Bro. Mein lead in singing, "Love Lifted Me." Bro. Lewis prayed. A Scripture portion was read by the leader.

The minutes of Wednesday afternoon and Thursday forenoon were approved, with one minor change.

It was voted to have a five minute recess for District caucus business.

It was voted that the Conference churches vote on the proposed change of Article V, par. 12 of the Discipline on the Sunday prior to the Ministerial Institute.

Rev. W. F. Lewis was elected as the Conference member of the Houghton College Board of Managers.

Mr. Arthur Tallman was introduced to the Conference.

Order of the Day: Dr. Stephen S. Paine, President of Houghton College, addressed the Assembly. It was a most interesting message, emphasizing the importance of keeping the College "Wesleyan" not only in Faculty, but in student body.

During the afternoon, the following names were called, and characters passed: Floyd Phelps, Edward Mein, Stanley Klob, Charles Dayton, Harris Earl, Dennis Osgood, Fred Shippee, Aldis Lamos, and Florence Shippee.

The Conference Treasurer's report was read and accepted.

The President's financial report was read and accepted. See Reports.

The second reading of the Pastoral Relations Committee was given.

A letter from Tom Boghosian was read.

It was voted to adjourn. The Doxo.ogy was sung, and Rev. Frase dismissed with prayer.

FRIDAY FORENCON

The roll was called.

Devotional: Stanley Klob, leader. Singing "When the Roll is Called." The Scripture read was at 2 P. 1:1-11, and Bro. Klob made some comments upon it. Prayer by Sr. Starks.

BUSINESS: The minutes of the Thursday afternoon business were read and approved.

Prayer was offered for Bro. and Sr. Gerald Hewitt who met with an auto accident.

During the forenoon the following names were called and characters passed: James Keysor, Howard Chapman, C. L. Hill, Elsie Taylor, Clifton Chapman, Ray Morgan, Russell Frase, L. C. Mattoon, Walter Lewis, Herbert Seaman, and Frank Wright.

Letters from some of the delegates not present were read, also one from Sr. Elsie Taylor.

The financial report of the Conference Trustees was read, and it was adopted.

A report of the Committee on Itineracy and Orders was read. After consideration, and a favorable vote to add certain names, the report was adopted. See Reports.

It was voted that the Secretary be instructed to write a letter to Bro. Frank Wright, expressing appreciation of his work and interest in the Conference.

Adjournment. Prayer by Bro. Jock.

FRIDAY AFTERNOON

The roll was called.

Devotional leader—Charles McCallum. Hymn "Blessed Assurance" was sung. Prayer by Clarence Murray. The 91st and 23rd Psalms were read, and some comments were made on the latter Psalm.

The minutes of the Friday forenoon business were read, and after one correction, they were approved.

Donald Hunt was introduced, and later in the p.m., Rev. Edward C. Emery, President of the Vermont Evangelistic Association, was also presented.

During the afternoon the following names were called, and characters passed: Gerald Hewitt, Arthur Northrup, S. Harry Miller, Elton Seaman, C. C. Murray, Charles McCallum, Sumner Brainard, Pearl Keysor, Florence Northrup, and Floyd Tyler.

Bro. Jock was called to occupy the Chair, as the Committee on Pastoral Relations was excused for Committee work.

The Conference Sunday School Secretary, Aldis Lamos, gave his report. It was voted that the report be accepted as a whole.

It was voted that we have a Conference Calendar printed, and that Edwin Seaman be the first member of a Committee in charge; and that he choose his associate.

It was voted that the date for the Ministerial Institute this year be September 25, 26, and 27.

It was voted to leave the matter of the place of the Institute in the hands of the Committee.

The Assembly listened to the third and last reading of the Pastoral Relations Committee report.

It was voted that we act upon the recommendations first, and do it item by item.

It was moved that Recommendation No. 1. be adopted.

The Body voted to adjourn (30 in favor; opposed 17).

SATURDAY FORENOON

The roll was called.

Devotional leader-Sr. Florence Shippee.

A hymn was sung and Sr. Shippee read from Phil. 4th chapter. Prayer by Bro. C. Chapman.

Business. The minutes of the Friday afternoon business were read and approved.

It was voted to lay the unfinished business on the Table till 9:40. The Committee on Resolutions read its report. It was accepted.

The Committee on Apportionment made a partial report. It was adopted.

Sr. Florence Shippee was elected to gather the names for the memorial list this new Conference year, and present them to the Committee.

The Report of the Editor of the Challenger was read. It was accepted and Bro. Frase was given a rising vote of thanks.

It was voted that the Conference buy a heavy duty Standard Typewriter, for the use of the Editor of the Challenger and Conference.

It was voted that the President appoint a Committee to buy the typewriter and ship to Cobleskill.

For information the Pastoral Relations Committee report was read again.

Unfinished business: Consideration of Recommendation No. 1. of the Pastoral Relations Committee report.

There being no objection, the motion to adopt Recommendation No. 1. of the Pas. Rel. Com. report was withdrawn, and the Rec. was voted to be referred to the Nominating Committee. The Nom. Com. was excused to consider the matter.

The names called and characters passed were—Diana Miller, Herman Sebert and Carroll Bailey.

The Nominating Committee returned, and read their report.

It was voted to proceed according to the recommendation of the Nominating Committee: "That after a season of silent prayer, a vote be taken by BALLOT, and that it require a two thirds vote to adopt Recommendation No. 1 of the Pastoral Relations Com."

The Body observed a minute of silent prayer.

REPORT NO. 1

THE CONFERENCE PRESIDENT

Dear Brethren of the Champlain Conference:

It is a high and holy privilege to be placed in a position of such responsibility as the presidency of the Champlain Conference. The days and years in the position have fled swiftly by, though they have been most eventful in nearly all phases of our lives.

This past year has been a very busy one for all our people. There have been many reports coming in concerning those who have found God during the year. The churches have been strengthened by special evangelistic efforts and by the faithful pastoral work of those appointed to their respective charges by the conference in 1950.

There have been some very worthy projects undertaken by several churches. Among these is the Lisbon Church which has made a very excellent and sizeable addition to their church. Heuvelton has nobly attempted to purchase a fine parsonage as well as to redecorate the interior of their church. Colton has redecorated their church. Springfield's building project has moved up by completing several items about the property. Schenectady church has enjoyed a decided forward movement. Cobleskill has taken her place among those who will be self-supporting. Ticonderoga has made a valiant record in making their payments and interest this year.

As to distinct pioneer work this year the Church Extension Committee has been very active and extremely cooperative.

Several places have been under the observation of the committee who were working with the local pastors in their endeavors to reach needy fields within their area. These points have been encouraging but have not appeared ready for Conference action. It has been the aim of your committee to leave no stone unturned to go forward in spreading the word of life. However each and every project has been carefully considered and wherever there were indications that it was God's will positive steps were immediately taken. At East Pitcairn, N. Y., a church building was secured and the title procured. A building lot in a very good location has been secured in Wynanskill, N. Y. For three years the Conference has made repeated efforts to get access to an unused church in this growing village on the outskirts of the city of Troy. Although this field seemed ready to cultivate the possibility of reopening this church became dimmer as the days passed by. Accordingly, when an opportunity afforded itself we deposited \$500.00 which is payment in full for a well-located lot sufficient in size to accommodate a sizeable church.

There have been, and are, other places which have been brought to the attention of the committee, but after careful investigation and consideration all those concerned felt that the opportune time to buy or build had not yet arrived. Frankly, your Church Extension Committee is aggressive, but also is cautious lest the force of your strength as a conference be diverted into channels which are not and will not be for the best good of all and for the glory of God. We have appreciated very much the labor and sacrifice of these men who have given freely and joyfully the labor of love which has amounted to considerable effort this year.

The Sunday School work under the leadership of Rev. Aldis Lamos has made healthy gains and a gratifying expansion along many lines.

The Woman's Missionary Society with Mrs. Marjorie Stevenson as president, has made a splendid record. The contribution which this organization makes to the Conference is of immeasurable value. In fact they are to the Conference what the local societies are to the program of the church. Without their faithful, devoted, loyal service the work would suffer an extreme lack along lines that are the most vital to the life of our beloved church.

The Conference Young People's Society has undoubtedly set new records this year under the noble leadership of Rev. Elton Seaman. We are very pleased to have had the privilege of providing one of the Gospel Crusade teams to Haiti in the person of Rev. Edwin Seaman, who, we are informed did a very excellent job in representing us in that fertile missionary field.

Brethren, we are in position at the convening of this Conference that is breathtaking in its challenge. We cannot, and are not, expected to do as much as conferences four times our size; but with every church, pastor, leader and layman in his or her place, God can and will use us in a measure never before witnessed. By stationing our president over the period of the last two years, and the hearty cooperation in our pioneer offerings we have reduced our indebtedness and have some funds to utilize as we plunge into the conflict before us. Our prayer is that we may diligently seek God's whole will in the program which will be set in motion at this session of the Conference.

STANDING RULES

- 1. The Resolutions of this Conference shall be printed in the Minutes of this Conference each year.
- 2. All visiting members of our own, or other Churches in harmony with our principles, shall be invited to honorary seats in the Conference.
- 3. The Conference President shall receive twenty dollars (\$20) per year for postage and stationery; also any needed traveling expense. At any time the President be required to travel the Conference, his duties and pay shall be defined by the Conference.
- 4. The Conference Secretary shall receive fifty dollars (\$50) per year for his labor and incidental expenses.
- 5. The Conference Treasurer shall receive fifty dollars (\$50) per year for his services in caring for the funds.
- 6. In making his report, the Conference Treasurer is authorized to close his books one week before Conference session. The Treasurer of the Superannuate Ministers' Relief Association also shall close his books one week before the Conference session.
- 7. All monies disbursed by the Conference Treasurer during the interim of Conference shall be upon order of the President, except in case of payment to the President, when such order shall be issued by the Vice President. It is understood that any payment ordered by the Conference direct may be paid by the Treasurer without an order as directed above.
- 8. No monies shall be loaned by the Conference Treasurer except by order of Conference, or by the consent of the President and his Advisory Board.
- 9. Each Elder shall make his engagement as Pastor with the understanding that if he be elected Conference President he shall be released from his engagement as Pastor within the period of three months following his election.
- 10. The first Sunday of each month shall be known as Missions Sunday, the Sunday School offerings to go alternately to Home Missions and Conference Missions, in that order, and be sent to the Conference Treasurer. (The Committee on Finance defines "Conference Missions" as the establishing of new and (or) subsidizing of the needy fields of the Conference.)
- 11. In securing Evangelists for the Camp meeting, the Camp meeting Committee is privileged to secure not more than one worker outside the Denomination.
- 12. The Camp meeting Committee shall be composed of the Conference President, as Chairman, and three ministers and three laymen,

all to be elected by ballot (after the Conference of 1923), the term of office to be three years, the time of one minister and one layman expiring each year.

- 13. Pastors shall state financial items in their statistical reports in even dollars, except in items affecting the Budget; and as far as possible are requested to report all Budget items in even dollars. When such rule is not followed, the Statistical Secretaries are authorized to drop decimals, except as provided above.
- 14. The Committee on Credentials shall secure from each delegate the necessary credentials as provided by our Discipline, with Post Office address of the same.
- 15. The closing Sunday of the Conference year shall be the Sunday following the beginning of the Annual Conference. The Pastor's salary for this closing Sunday shall be paid by the Church of which he is Pastor; and for the Sunday of the new Conference year it shall be paid by the Charge to which he is going.
- 16. Newly elected Conference officers shall take office after the close of the Conference Sunday.
- 17. The Conference shall include in the Orders of the Day a special period to consider Camp meeting business.
- 18. A Nominating Committee shall be elected to consider and nominate all elective officers of the Conference. The Committee shall consist of four Elders and four laymen. The report of the Nominating Committee shall be read to the Conference the day preceding the election.
- 19. Each Church member over fourteen years of age shall be apportioned fifty-two cents per year for Church Extension.
- 20. The Delegate's Credentials shall be sent to the Committee on Credentials BEFORE THE OPENING DAY OF CONFERENCE, and the Conference Secretary shall send printed blanks with the Statistical, Character, etc.
- 21. The Conference recommends that each Charge grant its Pastor two weeks vacation, and also grant him permission to hold a two weeks meeting (over two Sundays) away from his local Charge,—both vacation and meeting to be without loss of pay, and exclusive of attending the Annual Conference and Camp meeting.
 - 22. The first Sunday in May shall be PASTORAL VOTE SUNDAY.
- 23. CHURCH EXTENSION. (1) The Conference President shall act as Pioneer Secretary. (This does not create the office of Pioneer Secretary.) The Conference Board on Church and Parsonage Building and Location shall be the Church Extension Committee.

(2) There shall be at least one Church Extension service on each charge in the Conference this year, at which time all of the Church Extension activities within the Conference shall be presented.

This service shall be under the supervision of the Conference President, or one whom he may appoint. Any person traveling the Conference in the interests of Church Extension must be appointed and under the direction of the Conference President. Those thus appointed to travel the Conference in the interest of Church Extension shall receive not to exceed five cents per mile.

- (3) All offerings taken for Church Extension shall be forwarded to the Conference Treasurer, and credited to Church Extension. The Conference Treasurer, upon recommendation of the Conference President and the Committee on Church Extension, shall disburse these funds. Any designated funds can be disbursed by notice received in writing from the Conference President.
- (4) Whereas the W.Y.P.S. is an organization that is aggressively supporting the Conference Pioneer projects, we recommend that as far as possible all monies for Pioneer work be passed through the local W. Y. P. S. Treasurer to the Treasurer of the Champlain Conference.

We further recommend that the local Church Extension program be sponsored by the local W. Y. P. S. as far as possible.

- 24. During the year each Sunday School shall take an offering for the maintenance of the Conference President's home.
- 25. The Conference President shall be ex-officio member of the Board on Church and Parsonage Building and Location; the term of the other four members shall be two years each, the term of two members expiring each year.

CAMP GROUND RULES

GENERAL RULES

Ever bear in mind that these grounds and buildings are church property, and respect them as such.

The religious services are for your benefit—take advantage of them.

Only young people who come at the recommendation of their pastor will be permitted the benefits of the Young People's Financial Plan.

Each young person is required to attend the regular Young People's Meeting; also—the evening service, and one other service during the day.

I. Care of Grounds

- 1. Place waste paper and garbage only in containers provided. Do not throw it on the grounds.
- 2. Waste paper and other refuse may be burned only in drums provided for this purpose.
- 3. Empty waste paper in appointed place—at back of the grounds. Do not throw it out the window or on the grounds.
- 4. Do your part toward keeping the grounds around your cottage or dormitory neat and looking clean.

II. Personal Conduct

- 1. The use of tobacco, profanity, obscene literature, card playing and gambling are prohibited on the Camp Grounds.
- 2. Wearing apparel must be modest at all times. The wearing of slacks, shorts, gym clothes or bathing suits is prohibited on the grounds.

Men are requested to wear shirts, and ladies to wear hose.

III. Dormitory and Cottage Rules

- 1. Campers are requested to be in their rooms for the night at 10:30 unless engaged in the tabernacle.
- 2. The rights of your neighbors must be respected: therefore, quiet must prevail in all rooms and dormitories.
- 3. Remember that there are others who will occupy these rooms after you; therefore, keep them clean, and leave them in good condition.
- 4. Because of fire hazards, there must be no cooking of food in the Dormitories.

PLAN OF WORK

Report No. 6

For each local W.M.S. we recommend:

- The effort to secure every woman of the congregation as members, and to enlist the men as honorary members unless they have a missionary organization of their own.
- 2. The formation of an active prayer partner group with a prayer partner secretary reporting to the Conference prayer partner secretary by 60 days after Conference. It is also urged that a prayer and fast day be observed monthly.
 - 3. The election of officers who are subscribers to and readers of the Wesleyan Methodist and the Wesleyan Missionary and that effort be made to place the Wesleyan Missionary in every home.
 - 4. The continuation of sending goods, usable clothing, notions, pictures and medical supplies to our home missionaries.
 - 5. That we forward promptly all Sunday School charts, cards and flannelgraph material to our foreign mission fields, remembering to enclose the charts in their original pasteboard rolls.

- The preparation of exhibits for our home and foreign missionary stations. These exhibits shall be packed for mailing at the close of Conference, the postage being paid from the Conference Treasury.
- 7. The sending of canned goods and other supplies for the campground, and that the upkeep of assigned rooms be continued.
- 8. That at a meeting before Conference, officers for the coming year be elected, including a magazine solicitor and a delegate (other than a church delegate, if possible). The room and board of the delegate shall be provided for Conference week and she shall be instructed as to the amount of pledge for missions.
- 9. That each delegate give a complete report to the local society at the first meeting after Conference.
- 10. The sending of equivalent of 10c per member per month to the Conference Treasurer, quarterly, toward the pioneer project.
- 11. The election of a missionary study secretary who will supervise a mission study class, keeping a record of all reading and study work done, and reporting the statistics to the Conference mission study secretary each quarter;
- 12. That each society render an annual program at which time an offering shall be taken for the support of medical missions.
- 13. That the dues of \$1.00 per member be sent directly to the Conference Treasurer, 50c of which shall be divided by her and applied on the budget, half home and half foreign unless otherwise specified, and that all monies and vouchers be sent to the Conference Treasurer at least quarterly.
- 14. That each local society pay annually an amount equal to 25c per active member to be used as general administrative fund, not to apply on budget.

ANNUAL CONFERENCE OF THE CHAMPLAIN CONFERENCE W. Y. P. S.

JULY 14, 1951

THIRTY-SECOND CONFERENCE

The Annual Session of the Champlain W.Y.P.S. convened July 14, 1951, at 1:30 p.m., and was opened with prayer by the president and the singing of "He That Goeth Forth and Weepeth."

It was voted to have the first six rows of seats as the Bar of Conference.

Roll call was taken of the delegates. It was voted to seat two delegates who did not have their credentials.

The President's report was read and accepted. (See report No. 1).

The President presented the work of Youth Crusades—in relation to the Crusade in Haiti and the prospects which present themselves in our own conference. He challenged our youth to offer their time for work in gospel teams.

The Treasurer's report was read and accepted. (See report No. 2).

The reports of the District Chairmen was dispensed with because of their absence. Every district has had at least one district convention in the last year.

An explanation of the large sum as balance in the Treasury was given by the Treasurer.
