Conference Resolutions

Section 1. Conference Officers

1. (a) We shall have a traveling Conference President, who shall receive \$3900.00 annually and house rent. This salary shall be apportioned to the churches and paid by them to the Conference Treasurer, who shall on the first of each month beginning with August 1, each Conference year, forward a check for one twelfth of the amount to him. He shall be required to travel the Conference and counsel and advise with the churches in matters of doctrine, finances, and other affairs that effect the spiritual and temporal welfare of the work. After consulting with the pastors he may confer with the stewards if necessary with the purpose in mind to increase the pastor's salary. He shall visit each church at least once annually. At the time of his election the first ballot shall be a nominating ballot.

(b) His traveling expense shall be guaranteed him from the Conference Incidental Fund, at the rate of .06 a mile for automobile travel and actual train and bus fare; also his desk expense and all long distance telephone bills pertaining to his conference work shall be paid from the same fund.

2. (a) The Conference shall be divided into five districts by a line from Sandusky to Portsmouth, and from Union City to Martin's Ferry, with the exception of a central district composed of Licking, Franklin, Morrow, Knox, Delaware and Union Counties.

(b) The Conference Missionary Board shall be composed of the Conference President, and Conference Vice President, the W. M. S. President, and five additional pastors, one from each of the five districts of the Conference. These five members shall be nominated by

the Committee on Pastoral Relations, and shall be elected by ballot. In presenting these nominations at least two names shall be submitted from each district.

(c) The Missionary Board shall meet at the beginning of the Conference year to formulate policies and lay general plans for the conduct of the work of Conference Missions during the year. The actual carrying out of these plans shall be in the hands of Executive Committees which in each district shall be composed of the Conference President, the Conference Vice President, and the District man. The full board may meet at any time at the call of the Conference President and the Vice President. Desk expense, telephone calls and mileage or fares incurred in the work of Conference Missions shall be paid from the Conference Missionary Fund.

(d) The five district men, under the direction of the Conference President, shall assist him in his Pioneer duties, and shall organize the pastors in various districts for pioneer work. They shall designate one Sunday as a Pioneer Day, on which day the Pastors shall exchange pulpits to bring a Pioneer Message and raise offerings and pledges for the work.

(e) It shall require a written order of the Board for funds to be paid from the Conference Mission Fund.

(f) The Missionary Board may employ such pastors of the Conference as may be needed for pioneer meetings. Churches are urged to co-operate by granting their pastors a two-week leave of absence with pay, if his services are requested by the Board.

(g) The Missionary Board and the Conference Board of Trustees shall jointly administer the Church Extension Fund.

(h) Activities of the Board, with the amounts of salaries guaranteed and the amounts invested in each project, shall be reported to the Conference annually.

3. The Conference shall elect a Camp Meeting Committee consisting of nine members, five ministerial and four lay to have entire supervision of the Campgrounds, and its improvements and the making of complete arrangements for Camp and Camp Meeting services, and also provide for the entertainment of the Annual Conference. They shall serve for terms of three years. The president of the Conference shall be an ex-officio member of the Camp Meeting Committee and Presiding Officer of the Camp Meeting Session. This Committee shall designate one of its members as Chairman, another as Secretary, and another as Treasurer. Each shall report to the Annual Conference and the report shall be incorporated in the Conference Minutes. The Treasurer's report shall be audited. This committee shall advise with the Conference Board of Trustees as to the location, erection, and improvements of Conference buildings on the Campground.

4. It shall be the duty of the Trustees of the Ohio Conference to receive, hold, and dispose of property within the bounds of the Conference as provided in the book of Discipline, paragraph 120, and 384-389. In addition to this they shall also be empowered to act in certain instances as follows:

A. Resolved: The Trustees of the Ohio Conference shall be, and they hereby are, empowered to execute all necessary papers, mortgage deeds and papers of a like character when necessary to secure loans to the Ohio Annual Conference, or to any church within the Conference needing funds to liquidate Conference, church or parsonage indebtedness provided that the party or parties requesting such action shall set forth the true nature and purpose for which the loan is requested, and that both the President and Trustees of said Conference are satisfied that the object for which the loan or loans is sought is both necessary and desirable.

B. Resolved: the Trustees of the Ohio Conference shall be, and they hereby are, empowered to execute all necessary papers, mortgage deeds and papers of like character, when necessary to secure loans for the purpose of purchasing or erecting church or parsonage buildings in the pioneer work of the Conference, provided that the proposed project and the financing of it by means of the proposed loan shall receive the approval of the Conference President, a majority of the total membership of the Missionary Board, and a majority of the total membership of the Board of Trustees.

C. Resolved: the Trustees of the Ohio Conference shall be, and they hereby are, empowered to sign any or all deeds and papers for the transfer of real property that is now or hereafter may be held in trust by said Trustees, provided the sale of such Conference, church or parsonage, or other real estate has been authorized and approved by the President of the Conference with the concurrence of at least one member of his advisory board.

5. We recommend a standard traveling expense of .06 a mile to the Conference Board of Trustees from the Conference Mission Fund and the Conference Incidental Fund, to the Missionary Board from the Conference Missions Treasury, and to the Camp Meeting Committee from the Camp Meeting Treasury.

6. Resolved: that there be a Church Building Fund to be loaned to the churches for building purposes. This fund to come from the sale of the Fairmount Church, gifts, annuities and the budget item included in Conference Work, said fund to be administered by the Conference Trustees and loaned on notes to be signed by the local trustees. Not more than 20 per cent of the fund shall be loaned to any one church unless the calls for loans are such that the trustees find it necessary to grant a larger amount in order to keep the money in use, the interest to be figured at 3 per cent for the total length of the loan and paid back at the rate of not less than 1 per cent of the total per month. Special short term loans of less than one year can be made at 6 per cent interest.

Section II. Annual Conference Session

7. (a) The annual Conference shall convene on the fourth Monday of July and continue through the following Sunday.

(b) Camp Meeting shall open with the Friday evening service of Conference week.

(c) The Friday preceding Conference shall be set aside as a day of prayer for Conference and Camp.

8. All elders and licentiates are required to attend the entire session of Conference. It shall require a vote of Conference to pass the character of any minister who fails in this regard.

9. (a) It is recommended that persons elected as lay delegates to Conference shall be able to attend the entire session.

(b) The Conference Secretary shall provide blanks for Delegate's Credentials, including the following items: certificate of election, address of delegate, information as to how long the delegate intends to remain at Conference, the pastor's address and telephone number. These credentials are to be returned in advance of Conference to a Standing Committee on Credentials, appointed by the President.

10. (a) It is required that each pastor obtain from the Conference treasurer a signed statement of all budget monies paid to him. This statement shall agree with the pastor's statistical report, both of which shall be mailed to the chairman of the Statistical Committee not later than July 15th.

(b) The Conference shall omit the reading of the statistical reports by the pastors, and instead the Committee on Statistics shall post on the bulletin board certain items of vital interest, for the instruction of the members of the Conference.

(c) The W. Y. P. S. reports submitted to the Annual Youth Conference shall be the basis for reporting W. Y. P. S. membership on the pastor's statistical blank. The W. Y. P. S. President shall soon after the close of Youth Camp mail each pastor a signed statement with membership information for his annual conference report.

11. (a) The Special Orders of the Conference shall be: 7:00 p.m. Monday evening, Communion Service preceding the Conference Sermon; 1:30 p.m. Tuesday, Tithing Secretary's address; Tuesday evening, the Sunday School Hour; 9:30 a.m. Wednesday, Educational Service; 11:00 a.m. Wednesday, Denominational Address; 1:30 p.m. Wednesday, election of officers; Wednesday evening, Pioneer service; Thursday evening, Missionary Service conducted by the Women's missionary Society; Friday, 1:30 p.m. Memorial Service (when necessary); Sunday morning, ordination service.

(b) The Annual Session of the Ohio W. Y. P. S. Conference shall be held on the fourth Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday, and Friday in June of each year in connection with a Bible Conference.

12. (a) All persons recommended to Conference and those pursuing the Course of Study, shall appear before the Committee on Itineracy and Orders not later than the second day of Conference.

(b) Examination shall be taken before a member of the Committee or a person appointed by them. In order to receive credit for the current year, examinations must be taken by July 10.

(c) All persons taking Conference Course of Study shall pay \$1.00 registration fee.

13. The Budget Committee shall assign new churches 25 per cent the first year, 50 per cent the second year and full budget the

third year.

14. (a) The fiscal year for churches shall be from July 1 to June 30. All financial reports shall conform to this schedule.

(b) The Conference Treasurer's books shall close July 8.

15. (a) The Ohio Conference shall be authorized to charge 4 per cent on loans to churches from the Superannuated Elders' Fund.

(b) All notes to churches shall be drawn up on the form given in the Minutes of 1940.

Section III. Churches and Pastors

16. In addition to the duties as outlined in the Discipline, it shall be the responsibility of our pastors to:

(a) Attend all sessions of Camp Meeting.

(b) Remain on the work he is appointed to for the whole Conference year. Any pastor leaving the work during the year shall not have his character passed except by vote of the Conference.

(c) See to it that all funds and receipts from his charge be sent to the Conference Treasurer at least quarterly.

(d) Co-operate with the stewards in notifying nonattending members of their financial responsibilities.

(e) Instruct all local preachers on their charge of disciplinary requirements to study and travel under Conference direction.

(f) Be sure all Conference preachers on their charge have necessary licenses and recommendations.

(g) Submit monthly reports to the Conference President on prepared forms, and also return monthly report blanks to the Sunday School secretary.

(h) We also recommend that each pastor transfer his membership to the church he is serving.

17. It shall be the responsibility of our churches to:

(a) Pay the moving expense of the in-coming pastor.

(b) Pay pastor's salary for fifty-two weeks per year, beginning with the rise of Conference.

(c) Pay traveling expenses and room and board for pastors and delegates at Conference.

18. No church shall begin or continue in any major building or remodeling program until it has conferred with the Conference Committee on Church and Parsonage Building and Location. The Building Committee of said church shall sign a written agreement, to be acted upon by this Conference Committee. They shall also report monthly in writing to this Conference Committee; the matter of such reports and agreements shall be agreed upon mutually by these two committees concerned.

19. The Committee on Pulpit Supply shall conduct the vote on retaining the pastor not later than June 1st, giving the required two weeks notice in advance. The chairman of the Committee on Pulpit Supply shall immediately inform the Conference President of the results. If the vote is for a change and the pastor so desires, his name

shall be placed on the list of available men. The list shall be sent to churches requiring same on or after June 10, and pastors desiring to be included on that list must notify the Conference President by that date.

Section IV. Standards of Practice

20. We recommend the use of associate or probationary membership for all persons received on Confession of faith.

21. We, the Ohio Conference, declare our opposition to worldly practices and adornment. We believe that the wearing of the wedding ring is a violation of the scriptural injunction against the wearing of gold, which is not purely utilitarian in its use, because the wearing of the wedding ring encourages the wearing of other superfluous ornaments and adornments. We therefore, do earnestly request that all our local churches comply with this expressed standard. It shall be the duty of our pastors and ministers to support this resolution.

22. We require that all workers, preachers and singers on the platform at Conference and Camp Meeting wear sleeves at least below the elbow, and all their apparel be in accord with the discipline.

Recessed at approximately 11:00 A.M.

Friday, July 29, 1955 - 1:30 P.M.

Conference reconvened at 1:30 P.M. to observe a memorial service in honor of Elder Arthur D. Osborn, who was called to his eternal reward during the last conference year. Rev. Charles Day was in charge of this service. Rev. Ira Shanafelt led the congregation in singing three songs: "In That City Where They Need No Sun," "When the Roll is Called Up Yonder," and "A Shelter in the Time of Storm." Rev. and Mrs. Duane Thompson sang a duet, "Under His Wings." Rev. Eugene Savage brought the message, reviewing briefly the labors and influence of our departed brother.

COMMITTEE ON COURTESY—The Committee on Courtesy presented Rev. H. C. Van Wormer, president of the Allegheny Conference, and currently engaged Campmeeting speaker.

The motion prevailed that the Conference President and the Chairman of the Committee on Itineracy and Elders' Orders make all necessary arrangements for an ordination service to be held Sunday morning.

It was ordered that the Conference Secretary be paid \$100.00, and the "Wesleyan Messenger" Editor \$50.00 from the Conference Incidental Fund; also that the Sunday School Secretary and Child Evangelism Secretary be paid \$50.00 each from the Sunday School fund as a token of appreciation for their labours.

The motion prevailed that the President and Secretary be empowered to transact any business overlooked by the Conference.

The Pastoral Relations Committee gave the second reading of their report.

Report No. 11**REPORT OF CONFERENCE TRUSTEES**

We, your Conference Board of Trustees, wish to make the following report concerning actions taken during the past year.

Victory Campground, Galena, Ohio, August 2, 1954. First meeting of the new year. Reorganization of the board: Donald C. Fisher, Chairman; R. J. Stratton, Secretary; other members of the Board, Harry McQuigg, George Fisher and E. R. McMillan.

Authorized sale of Lot No. 12 in the Lester and Powers Highland Addition, section 2, St. Marys, Ohio, which was held in the name of Harry McQuigg, and instructed Harry McQuigg to draw up new deed for said lot to Tom J. Howell. Sale price to be \$850.

Authorized payment of \$500 from the Church Extension Fund

towards purchase price of the Middletown Nazarene Church Building.

Authorized payment from the Conference Parsonage Fund the sum of \$800 to be applied on the principal yet due on the property and the sum of \$175 on interest due on note.

Instructed the Secretary to purchase new record book for recording official actions of the Trustee Board.

August 9, 1954. Meeting held at Victory Campground. Authority given D. C. Fisher to negotiate with the proper city officials of Marion, Ohio, for necessary sewer connection to the Mark Street Church property.

August, 1954. LaRue, Ohio. All members present. Considered request of the LaRue Church to purchase two lots, Nos. 21 and 22 on McCormick Street, as building sites for a church building and a parsonage. Action deferred to a later date.

Considered architect's proposed plans for new church building at Columbus, Ohio. Definite action deferred to a later date.

September 7, 1954. Meeting held at Westerville, Ohio. Approval given to application by the St. Albans, West Virginia Church Trustees for loan of \$600 from the Conference Building Fund to be used in construction of additional rooms to the church building. The loan is to run for (3) years with interest rate at three (3) per cent for the total length of the loan and to be repaid at the rate of not less than twenty dollars (\$20) per month. Agreement signed by each of the Conference Trustees.

September 23, 1954. Victory Campground. Each member of the Board present. Voted to grant the Pioneer project at Mark Street, Marion, Ohio, the sum of \$154.09 from the Church Extension Fund as final payment of the total amount of pledge money raised by the Silver Street Church of Marion towards construction costs of the Mark Street Church building as per previous agreement. (This amount is 10 per cent of the money raised and sent in to the Conference Treasurer. The additional 90 per cent of money raised to be paid through the Conference Missions Fund.)

Approval given the LaRue Church to purchase two (2) lots on McCormick Street for building sites for a church and parsonage.

Voted to approve sale of four (4) feet of ground off the south side and the entire length of the lot on which the West View Church is built to the State of Ohio for use in contemplated plans to widen and improve State Highway No. 252 which adjoins said lot.

October 19, 1954. Victory Campground. Gave approval to the Columbus and Bellaire Churches to proceed with arrangements to construct new church buildings according to plans provided.

November 6, 1954. Gave approval of a loan of \$300 from the Church Building Fund at 3 per cent for (3) years to the Senecaville Church for repairs on the church building. Loan to be repaid at the rate of \$9 per month.

March 15, 1955. Conference Parsonage, Westerville, Ohio. All members present. A request from the Mt. Vernon Academy to use

the campground and its facilities for special meetings sometime in the month of May for boys training for medical work was considered. Request not granted.

Voted to authorize the President and Secretary of the Board of Trustees to take proper steps to provide for the benefits of the Federal Social Security Act in behalf of our campground caretaker and other employees of the Ohio Conference.

Voted to authorize Attorney Ronomus, Rittman, Ohio, to take adequate steps to clear the title to the church property on North State Street, Rittman, Ohio.

Gave approval to plans submitted by the Rittman Church for construction of a 34 feet by 60 feet church edifice.

Authorized a mortgage of \$12,000 on the Rittman property for the purpose of assisting in the construction of the church building. Instructed the President of the Conference Trustees to make application to the Court for approval of said loan. (Later developments necessitated a change in these plans.)

Gave approval to the Weirton Church to increase the amount of indebtedness on their property from \$4,300 to \$8,000 to assist in completion of a parsonage on the lot adjacent to the church building.

Voted to grant from the Church Extension Fund \$100 to Chillicothe Church to help in construction of a parsonage; \$400 to the Columbus Church to help with their new church building; \$150 to White's Chapel Church to assist with their church building; and \$100 to the Africa Church to assist in construction costs of an addition to the church building. These amounts are to be paid by the Conference Treasurer as needed.

May 30, 1955. Victory Campground. D. C. Fisher, E. R. McMillan, Harry McQuigg, R. J. Stratton present. Approval given to the Chillicothe Church to increase their present mortgage loan an additional \$4000 to assist in the construction of a parsonage. This mortgage increase to be placed on both the church and parsonage properties.

Authorized loan of \$300 to the Paden City, West Virginia Church from the Conference Church Building Fund at 3 per cent annually for four years to aid in repairing and rewiring of church building.

Authorized Harry McQuigg to insure Conference parsonage for \$8,500 for one year beginning July 1, 1955.

July 1, 1955. Victory Campground. All members present. Granted the Rittman Church and the Toronto Church \$200 each from Church Extension Fund to assist with their real estate purchase projects.

Gave approval of a loan of \$1000 from the Church Building Fund at 3 per cent for six and one-half years ($6\frac{1}{2}$) to the Rittman Church. The church to repay the loan at a minimum of \$15 per month.

Authorized the Rittman Church to borrow three thousand dollars (\$3000) at 4 per cent for two (2) years from private sources to be used towards purchase of a church property at the corner of Fairlawn and Home Streets, Rittman, Ohio. Conference Trustees agreed to countersign a note as security.

July 2, 1955. Victory Campground. D. C. Fisher, E. R. McMillan, Harry McQuigg, and R. J. Stratton present. Authorized the Rittman Church to purchase four lots and community building for use as a church at the above location.

Approved sale of the two lots owned by the church on North State Street to assist in the purchase of the property on Fairlawn and Home Streets.

Approval was given the Toronto Church to purchase lot and two houses on Daniel Street. One to be used as a parsonage and the other as an income property. Purchase price of the property to be \$11,000. A blanket mortgage of \$11,000 on the parsonage and church properties was authorized.

Authorized the Chillicothe Church to borrow \$1000 at 5 per cent for two years from a private source. This action was taken in lieu of former action taken by the trustees, May 30, 1955. The trustees agreed to countersign a note as security.

Granted the Chillicothe Church \$100 from the Church Extension Fund to assist with construction costs of the parsonage.

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

To the women of this 48th session of the Ohio Conference of the W.M.S., greetings in Jesus' Name:

I would say with the Psalmist, "I will lift up mine eyes unto the hills from whence cometh my help." This past year has been a strenuous year because of my lack of knowledge of the duties and responsibilities. But how many times I have looked up and how wonderfully I have felt my help come from Him. Thus my heart cries, "O magnify the Lord with me, and let us exalt his name together." Like Mary of old I say, "My soul doth magnify the Lord and my spirit hath rejoiced in God my Savior." Luke 1:46-47. Even as Mary did not comprehend all that was to happen to her when she uttered those words, I have not and do not understand all, but this one thing I want to do is to magnify the Name of the Lord who is worthy of all praise and honor. All that has been done this year is because He has helped and blessed.

In the interest of the Ohio W.M.S. and promoting missionary interest and vision, I traveled 3,000 miles, visited twenty-six churches, organized three new societies, spoke, exhorted or whatever else I was asked to do. I also attended the quadrennial session of the W.M.S. representing the Conference. I received \$38.50 for desk expense and telephone, \$12.55 for travel other than the Edna Taylor tour from the Conference Treasurer.

During the year Jewish missions was presented to the Conference in districts by Edward Sitt and Irene Hanley. A vitally new interest has been shown in Jewish missions with a total of \$1731.09 being raised. Foreign missions was presented in a church to church tour by Edna Taylor accompanied by your president when possible. A total of \$1047.97 was raised on this tour with travelling expense of \$118.50. Home missions was presented in many churches by Mrs. Magdalene DeMille and Rev. George Hawthorne bringing the receipts for both Brainerd and Card Call more than usual. I firmly believe that we have complied with the W.M.S. purpose which according to the Discipline No. 282, Art. 2 is "To extend the kingdom of God in the home and foreign field by stimulating interest therein, and encouraging a spirit of prayer and giving for the work." It is only because that God has helped us, we have totalled \$17,463.68 in cash for all purposes this year.

As a challenge for the coming year I would refer you to Abigail who stood in the gap between her sinful, wicked husband and the powerful David who became King of Israel. She was the intercessor and I challenge each of us as women of the Ohio W.M.S. to be intercessors standing in the gap between a wicked, sinful, lost world and

a great and powerful God who has the help and salvation they need.
Let's pray more, give more and do more than we ever have done before.

PLAN OF WORK

General Items

We recommend:

1. That a consecration and installation service for the newly elected W.M.S. officers be held the first meeting after the annual election.
2. That we observe the monthly "Fast and Prayer" day with April continued as self-denial month. That we continue the "Penny-a-meal-Plan" which applies on Foreign missions.
3. The promotion of a Prayer Partner Circle in each society making use of the new prayer partner reminders or missionary picture sets.
4. That a continued use of the W.M.S. calendar and the frequent use or reference to the Conference Minutes be emphasized.
5. That a special drive for the Wesleyan Missionary be held beginning with the rise of Conference through November first.
6. That we stress the Memorial Folders to assist in furthering the cause of Home and Foreign Missions, rather than expensive floral tributes for the deceased.
7. That the local societies send Christmas boxes to the Home Missions, particularly Zions Hill and Wheelrim, by December first, and that the sending society evaluate the same, the voucher of evaluation signed by the missionary to be forwarded to the Conference Treasurer for proper receipting.
8. That we contribute toward the Women's Institute in Africa as the needs are presented, suggesting large sized quilt blocks, simple or easy patterns on pillow cases, etc., also dress material, for beginning sewers.
9. That stress be placed upon personal evangelism including children, adolescents, the aged, with special emphasis upon the Jew and Negro.
10. That each society member participate in the reading course, and an effort be made to get others to participate.
11. That a special effort be made for active and honorary membership dues to be paid during the first quarter.

Financial Items

We recommend:

1. That each society pay annually an equivalent of \$.25 per active member to be used as a General Administrative Fund.
2. That the dues of \$1.00 per member be sent directly to the Conference W.M.S. Treasurer undivided, and that all monies and voucher receipts be sent to the Treasurer quarterly.
3. That each society contribute \$3.00 or more annually to the Medical Student Fund.
4. That each society respond to the Card Call Plan, thus assist-

ing in the Extension program of the church.

5. That each society render an annual program at which time an offering be taken for the support of Medical Missions.

6. That we observe Educational Harvest Day with program and cash contribution to apply on budget.

7. That each society contribute \$5.00 or more annually for the support of Hephzibah Orphanage.

8. The continued use of Thank Offering Boxes especially for aiding in raising Home Missionary funds.

9. That we contribute to the Australia Fund.

10. That each society continue the Christmas offering for the Mexican Mission, the amount of not less than \$1.00 to be sent to the Conference W.M.S. Treasurer by Dec. 1.

11. That each society contribute \$1.00 to the Dormitory Incidental fund.

12. We urge each society to pay their "shares" for "Our Million for Lost Millions."

13. That each society contribute to the "mile of dimes" project for Mission field Equipment to the Equivalent of one foot per total membership.

14. That each society participate in the Honorary Enrollment Plan for our colleges.

15. That we stress giving toward Jewish work.

16. That we pay an amount equivalent to \$3.00 per active member to the Missionary Reserve Fund, from which fund Freda Farmer is supported.

17. We recommend that each society send an offering to the Y.M.W.B. Supt. for the Children's Building.
