JOURNAL OF DAILY PROCEEDINGS

OFFICIAL RECORD

First Day-June 7, Tuesday, a. m. ·

The Allegheny Annual Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Connection (or Church) of America convened for its ninety-fifth annual session at the Camp Grounds of the Wesleyan Methodist Camp Meeting Association, Stoneboro, Pa., at 8: 30 a. m., June 7, 1938. The main auditorium was used for all public meetings and deliberation, and cottages and Boarding Hall for entertainment. Session called to order by President, J. R. Swauger. Singing, "Guide Me, O Thou Great Jehovah," and "Blessed Be the Name," led by Secretary. Prayer by D. B. Hampe. The President read 2 Corinthians 12 and spoke instructively to the Conference. Prayer around the altar, closed by singing, "Have Thine Own Way," an informal hand shaking and the Doxology.

Roll Call: 23 Elders, 16 Conference Preachers.

Bar of Conference determined: Three central sections, first seven tiers of seats.

Report: Conference Nominating Committee. Report adopted. (See Report No. 13.)

Report: Committee on Credentials. Names of 52 Delegates presented. Report adopted, names called and placed on roll. 41 Delegates responded.

STANDING RESOLUTIONS

- 1. Evangelists shall, in their reports, make a statement of the amount of salary received.
- 2. A Committee on Auditing and Finance, consisting of two Elders and one Conference Preacher, shall be elected each year, the duties of which shall be, to examine and report on the Treasurer's books and all financial reports, save missionary, and to be a Standing Committee to advise on financial plans.

- 3. We advise our pastors and people to make special effort to get persons saved, sanctified and brought into church membership during quarterly meetings.
- 4. The order and manner of electing trustees shall be the same in local churches as it is and has been in our Annual Conference, namely, to include a series of years in keeping with the number of trustees.
- 5. All persons received into membership in the churches of our Conference, excepting those whose life of Christian fidelity has been of sufficient long standing, shall be received at first as associate members only.
- 6. When it becomes necessary for any church to call a pastor, it shall be the duty of the calling church to make provision for the expense the pastor incurs in removing to the new field of labor. Money raised for this purpose shall not be applied on the pastor's salary.
- 7. The Conference Sunday shall be the closing Sunday of the Conference year, and the outgoing pastor shall be paid his salary for that Sunday by the charge he is leaving.
- 8. The Conference President will be expected to direct the attention of each Quarterly Conference attended to the various interests of the Church, including Sunday School work, and to stimulate interest in our Church Literature, especially the Wesleyan Methodist. In the general financial program of the Conference he will be expected to give such oversight and assistance as may be needed to develop every arm of the work.
- 9. At the opening of the Conference Session the President shall appoint a Nominating Committee of not less than three members, two Elders and one Layman, to bring to the Conference a slate of Nominations for Committees, etc., for the Conference Temporary Organization. Delegates' Credentials shall be mailed to the Conference Secretary not later than ten days before convening of Conference.
- 10. All persons recommended to Conference to study or travel shall be made members of Conference only when given employment.
- 11. Our pastors and churches shall engage no preachers for revival meetings or to supply their pulpits for a period of time, who are without Conference Credentials, until they have obtained consent of the Conference President and his Advisory Board.
- 12. Pastors shall recommend no persons to the Annual Conference until they have passed the perscribed course for Local Preachers, or persons who are taking active work from the Conference.
- 13. The Quarterly Conference shall renew no license of Local Preachers, unless the required one book has been passed each year according to Section VII, Paragraph 91 of the Discipline, except by special permission of the Conference President and Advisory Board. Standing Resolution No. 12, above, shall be strictly enforced. The President shall use his office in the enforcement of this Disciplinary ruling, and each pastor shall advise

each local Preacher on his charge of this ruling. Pastors shall favor the use of Exhorter's License, except in cases where Divine Providence indicates that the candidates should be in training for the Ministry.

CONFERENCE PRESIDENT'S REPORT

To the members of the Ninety-fifth Session, Allegheny Annual Conference, Dear Fellow Soldiers, We extend you greetings in the name of our Great Commander, the Ruler of earth and sky and sea.

As we bring you another annual report, we can say in the language of the Psalmist, "The Lord of hosts is with us, the God of Jacob is our refuge. Selah!"

If ever there was a time when the Soldiers of the Cross needed the confidence and support afforded by the presence of the God of Jacob, it is in these days of uncertainty and distress. Small wonder is it that "men's hearts are failing them for fear." Clouds are gathering, pernicious plottings are deepening, and perils are thickening. Infidelity is spreading, immorality is increasing and society is drifting farther and farther from God.

With thirteen million men out of work, with the national debt reaching unparalleled proportions, with public officials brazenly consenting to deeds which would have made our fathers blush, with moral standards trailing in the dust, and with political practices that shamelessly betray the solemn trust of fellow citizens, our nation and our age are in a condition so

serious that the bravest heart must needs look up to heaven for encouragement.

It behooves us, in the midst of such swirling maelstroms of uncontrollable and malignant forces, to recognize the issue that is upon us and face things squarely.

A remedy is needed, but, thank God, we know that remedy. It is the Gospel of Jesus Christ applied to the hearts and consciences of men. Into our hands is committed this sacred trust. We dare not fail. The call is upon us, and we can solemnly declare, "Woe unto us, if we preach not the gospel."

New fields lie out before us. Great is our need for Missionary Funds for local use, so that we may enter these whitened fields. While some holiness bodies have swung to the popular line, there is still an appeal in the old-fashioned Bible principles to which we, as a Conference, have clung.

Many, whose sense of the fitness of things is disturbed by the compromise to be found on every hand, instinctively turn to us for a church home, where they may find and enjoy that old-fashioned strictness to which we are committed. Brethren, it pays to stand true to the Old Paths. After others shall have had their meteor-like displays, and shall have disappeared in darkness, those whose lights, though perhaps less brilliant, have shone steadily with a pure radiance, shall continue to lighten the pathway of the pilgrim in his journey to the Eternal City. Let us then hold strictly and sensibly to the Old Paths. Sensibly strict and strictly sensible would be a motto not inconsistent with our ideals.

We are a holiness organization. Let us renew and intensify our efforts to get folks so thoroughly sanctified that they will spontaneously testify to Two Works of Grace with a clearness that is unmistakable. There is altogether too much shallowness in Christian experience within our organization. Many testimonies are vague and have no heavenly ring. Lives are inconsistent and irregular. Loyalty lags in many instances. There is much need for the continued presentation of the clear requirements of the gospel. Let us determine to do our part in this time of need.

It is a pleasure to report that, as a whole, the Conference was visited with revival fires that burned with greater illumination and fervor than has been known for a long time. God has been pleased to honor the united cry of His children, and the results have been a cause for gratitude.

Prospects for additional members lies ahead.

This building was purchased and affords an excellent place of worship. Rev. Florence B. Dray, Pastor. Rev. I. F. McLeister preached the Dedicatory Sermon.
- 7. Special Appointments: June 21, 1937, with the approval of the Advisory Board, Olin Pfautz was appointed to the pastorate of the new work at Punxsutawney, after the resignation of Edward Howells.

CONFERENCE SUNDAY SCHOOL SECRETARY

We wish to register our hearty thanks to God for His guiding hand and manifold blessings on this part of the work of our Zion. While the average Sunday School enrollment in the United States of America has in the last ten years dropped about forty per cent, our gain in enrollment as a Connection for the same period has been a little over twenty-three thousand. That is something for which to be devoutly grateful. But, we must not stop here. The statistics of our Conference for last year showed a general and serious decline in attendance. This is to be regretted and we must earnestly and faithfully labor to correct this decline and advance in the right direction. We are persuaded that the work of the Sunday School is a very worthy and important arm of the work of the Church. It has for some time been our profound conviction that the Sunday School when properly organized and conducted can be and will be a feeder to the

Church. The Sunday School is one of the Church's best agencies for reaching the unsaved, especially children of non-Christian homes. Statistics show that more than eighty per cent of the additions to the churches by conversion came through the Sunday School and ninety-six per cent of all conversions occur before the individual has reached twenty-five years of age. So we can readily see that here is a large and fertile field which if properly and faithfully worked will yield a bountiful harvest.

While it is exceedingly difficult, out of the material at hand, to get teachers who in years, ability and temperament are adapted to work in particular grades, yet it is our opinion that as far as possible this ought to be striven for. Especially does this apply to the teen age classes, for a misfit here is likely to work damage that can never be repaired. Seventy-five per cent of the boys and sixty-five per cent of the girls who leave Sunday School do so in their teen age; and many of them go out to lose all interest in the Church and religion and abandon themselves to lives of sin and crime. For this reason we believe care should be exercised in the selection of teachers and that the work of Teacher Training should be pushed in a greater measure.

We were happy during the year to authorize the organization of a Teacher Training Class on the Greenville Charge and expect from time to time to receive favorable reports from this class. We hope other Sunday Schools will catch the spirit of Teacher Training. Three new Sunday Schools have been organized in the Indiana District all of which are under Wesleyan direction and are using our literature.

Due to many other gatherings demanding our attendance and attention as a Conference it is difficult to arrange a Conference Sunday School Convention, but I believe that conventions held annually at least within the Districts will lend gracious impetus to the work.

We are expecting growing and glowing reports from every Sunday School. Let us push forward in this great work which will mean the salvation of our children, the blessing of our homes, the building up of our churches and the extension of Christ's Kingdom.

Brother Blanchard described the location of Zion's Hill Mission, which is located 100 miles east of Lexington in Bloody Breathitt County, which he hopes may soon be changed to Beautiful Breathitt County. For many years the road leading to the Mission has been a difficult one to travel, but thanks to the W. P. A. which has been working for some time, they expect soon to have a good road. He also stated that he had experienced a definite call to the mountain work. The people are mostly of purest Anglo-Saxon blood, but are ignorant, superstitious, deceitful, but religiously inclined. Very few cars are used, most of travel being done by walking or on mule back. The school, while the primary aim is spiritual, aids in physical and mental development also. Some of the needs expressed were: a revival, Christian workers, a teacher, a cook, a handy man and funds to complete the school building and much prayer.

Rev. E. F. McCarty reported the work on Foreign Fields in prosperous condition, with better roads, school systems, many native preachers and several self-supporting churches, and medical work in Africa and India. Several missionaries are booked to sail this fall. Some are going for the first time, while others are returning after furlough. Conditions in Japan are not so conducive to evangelism as its people are forced to support the military program.

- (d) That each Delegate take back to her society a report of the business transacted.
- 8. That Delegates be instructed to give their report to the Statistical Committee upon arrival at Conference.
- 9. We suggest: That where suitable the society have a Mercy and Help Committee.
- 10. We suggest: That our Holiness District Conventions, where possible, observe a Missionary Service.
- 11. That a yearly meeting in the interest of Medical Missions be held and the offering received be used for that purpose.
- 12. That we endeavor during the year to raise one-fourth of the Church Educational Budget.
- 13. That the Red Letter Days as given in the Standard of Efficiency be observed. That Easter and Self-Denial offerings be used for Home Missions.
- 14. That we manifest our interest in Bethshan Home by prayer, cash offerings, clothing, donations of fruit and vegetables and household supplies, considering the Prayer Sheets.
- 15. That each local society raise the General Conference Budget of not less that six dollars for Mountain Missions and five dollars for Hephzibah Orphanage. Let all dues and Budget obligations be sent to the Conference Society Treasurer, Mrs. Rachel L. Dreyer, Tionesta, Pennsylvania.
- 16. That if one dollar dues seems to heavy a tax, we accept fifty cents, in which case the entire amount be sent to the Treasurer, designated as fifty dent dues.
- 17. That we send clothing and supplies to our Mountain Missions and Hephzibah Orphanage, including a few bandages. (Note: Bandages should be cut two inches to four inches wide and rolled tightly. These may be valued at fifty cents per pound, the amount to be credited on Statistical Report but not counted on Budget.)
 - 18. That we continue our support of Dr. Sim I. McMillen.
- 19. That we stress the need of Home Missions, raising as much as possible; two hundred dollars of the amount raised to be used at Zion's Hill Mission.
- 20. That we remember to raise the ten cents per member for General Conference Delegates' Expense.

Be it Resolved:

1. That we, the members of the Woman's Home and Foreign Missionary Society, adhere faithfully to prayer, reading the Bible, sacrificial giving, and in recognition of the fact that the observance of standards in

itself is not sufficient, we urge the importance of being deeply and consistently spiritual, and in order to do this, the necessity of having the glory in our lives and His rich anointings upon our hearts.

- 2. That we systematically pray earnestly each day for Home and Foreign Missionary Work.
- 3. That we read as widely as possible such literature as will instruct us about each branch of our Missionary Work in order to aid us in maintaining our interest and zeal.
- 4. That our youth be watched over with godly jealousy and that we instruct by example and precept the dignity and necessity of social purity; insisting upon modesty of dress; assisting them in the choices of wholesome companionships and reading matter; also creating a sympathetic home atmosphere which will hold them to the Church and interest them in Spiritual welfare.
- 5. We deeply deplore the increased prevalence of drinking and cigarette smoking among our women and girls and the loose divorce laws. That as far as possible, we refuse to patronize groceries, stores, restaurants, or other establishments selling liquor.
- 6. That we, by example and testimony maintain our stand against public amusement parks, public bathing beaches, and moving picture shows.
- 7. That we further urge our people to reread our Discipline and renewedly pledge our allegiance to its doctrines and precepts.
- 8. That these resolutions be read before each society, also in the public meeting one or more times during the year.
