CONFERENCE RESOLUTIONS

I. The Resolutions of Conference shall be printed in the Conference Minutes each year.

II. All visiting members of our own, or other Churches in harmony with our principles, shall be invited to honorary seats in the Conference.

III. The Conference President shall receive twenty dollars (\$20) per year for postage and stationery; also any needed traveling expense. At any time the President be required to travel the Conference, his duties and pay shall be defined by the Conference.

IV. The Conference Secretary shall receive twenty-five dollars (\$25) per year for his labor and incidental expenses.

V. The Conference Treasurer shall receive twenty-five dollars (\$25) per year for his services in caring for the funds.

VI. In making his report, the Conference Treasurer is authorized to close his books one week before the Conference session. The Treasurer of the Superannuated Ministers' Relief Association also shall close his books one week before the Conference session.

VII. All monies disbursed by the Conference Treasurer during the interim of Conference shall be upon order of the President, except in case of payment to the President, when such order shall be issued by the Vice-President. It is understood, of course, that any payment ordered by the Conference direct may be paid by the Treasurer without an order as directed above. (The original VII Resolution was voted rescinded.)

VIII. No monies shall be loaned by the Conference Treasurer except by order of Conference, or by consent of the President and his Advisory Board.

IX. Each elder shall make his engagement as pastor with the understanding that if he be elected Conference President he shall be released in his pastoral engagement.

X. The first Sunday in each month shall be known as Home Mission Sunday, and the Sunday-school offerings shall be given to Home Missions, and should be sent to the Conference Treasurer.

XI. In securing Evangelists for the Camp Meeting work, those of the Wesleyan Methodist Church shall be secured, if this can be done.

XII. The Camp Meeting Committee shall be composed of the Conference President as Chairman, and three ministers, and three laymen, all to be elected by ballot after the Conference of 1923, the term of office to be three years, the time of one minister and one layman expiring each year.

XIII. Pastors shall state financial items in their statistical reports in even dollars, except in items affecting the Budget, and so far as possible are requested to report all budget items in even dollars. When such rule is not followed, the Statistical Secretaries are authorized to drop decimals, except as provided above.

XIV. The offerings for Superannuated Ministers shall be taken within sixty days after Conference, and forwarded to the Treasurer of Superannuate Society.

XV. That the Committee on Credentials shall secure the necessary credentials as provided by our Discipline, from each delegate, with the post office address of the same.

XVI. That the closing Sunday of the Conference year be the Sunday following the beginning of the Annual Conference. The pastors' salary on this closing Sunday shall be paid by the church of which he is pastor; and for the first Sunday of the new Conference year it shall be paid by the charge to which he is going.

XVII. Newly elected Conference Officers shall take office after the close of Conference Sunday.

XVIII. (New standing rule as voted by the Conference of 1940.) The Conference President shall include in the Orders of the Day a special period to consider Camp Meeting business.

DAILY JOURNAL OF PROCEEDINGS

The first service of the ninety-ninth session of the Champlain Annual Conference was held Tuesday evening, July 2, 1940, at the West Chazy Campground. It was in charge of the President, Rev. L. C. Mattoon. Rev. and Mrs. Crowe were introduced to the assembly, and had charge of the singing, rendering a beautiful duet. Prayer by Rev. Jock. The opening sermon was preached by Rev. A. Northrup, the text being from John 17: 1. It was a timely message. Benediction by Rev. D. Chadwick.

Wednesday Forenoon

The devotional service was in charge of Rev. C. Dayton. Scripture read, 2 Peter 1: 1-9. Helpful remarks were given by the leader and by members of the congregation. Prayer by Brothers Hall and Lewis. Special prayer was offered for Sister Murray of Glens Falls who is critically ill.

Business: On account of the illness of his mother, Rev. Murray the Conference Secretary could not be present. Rev. C. L. Hill was elected secretary pro tem.

Roll Call: Sixteen elders and four licentiates present. Report on credentials (Delegates') was given by the Committee. It was voted to be accepted, with the privilege of adding other names.

It was voted that the bar of Conference include the first five seats of the center rows.

The time for daily business was voted to be: Forenoon, open at 8:30 and close at 11:30. Afternoon, open at 1:30 and close by vote.

The Vice-President, Rev. Stopp, occupied the Chair while the President read his annual report. It was voted that the recommendations be referred to the Committee on Pastoral Relations, and that the report be accepted. See Report No. 1.

Introduced to the Conference were: Rev. and Mrs. Price Stark, Rev. and Mrs. Wyman, and Rev. Chester Osgood.

The Conference Treasurer read his report. It was voted to be accepted. See Report No. 2.

The Committee on Pastoral Relations was elected as follows: Ministerial members—Revs. Finch, Lewis and Jock. Lay Members—Mr. Frank Mattoon, Edward Mein, and Mr. Harry Hall.

Rev. Miller and Robert Gunsalus were elected as Committee on Passage of Character.

The meeting of the Superannuate Ministers' Relief Society was called for, and held. See Report No. 3 which includes the report of the Treasurer of the Association.

The Conference then reconvened. Rev. Crowe was introduced.

It was voted that Rev. Stopp be Chairman of Committee on Group Insurance. Other members elected were: Rev. Geo. Jock and Mr. Wilbern Rigsbee, layman.

Adjournment by vote. Dismissal by Gerald Hewitt.

Wednesday Afternoon

The devotional service was led by Rev. Chester Osgood. He emphasized the verse, "This is the day which the Lord hath made."

Business: Roll call; reading of minutes which were approved as read. The following characters were passed: Duane Chadwick, E. D. Carpenter, Floyd Banker, J. J. Davison, Charles Dayton, O. M. Finch, Reginald Hewitt.

Order of the Day: After singing by the congregation, Rev. Mattoon read 2 Chron. 7: 1-15. Prayer by Rev. Hill. The Conference sermon was preached by Rev. L. C. Mattoon. It was based on the text, 2 Chr. 7: 12-14.

Business resumed: Rev. I. F. McLeister was introduced to the Conference.

Characters passed as follows: C. L. Hill, G. D. Jock, Mary Robinson, Florence Shippee, F. C. Taylor, H. C. Shares, S. H. Miller.

Adjournment by vote. Dismissal by Rev. Carpenter.

Evening Service

There was an opening song period. Rev. Frank Wright led in prayer. A duet was sung by Rev. and Mrs. Crowe. Rev. Van Wormer, Evangelist, preached on Intercessory Prayer. The message was searching and timely.

Thursday Forenoon

The devotional service was in charge of S. H. Miller who read the 84th Psalm. Prayer by Brothers Frase and Finch.

Business: Roll call. Minutes were approved as read. Introduced to the Conference were Rev. I. F. McLeister and Prof. Frank Wright, who briefly addressed the meeting.

Passage of character: W. F. Lewis, F. H. Wright, Russell Frase, Dennis Osgood, and C. R. Stopp.

Rev. Northrup read the following Resolution:

"Should Jesus tarry until the year 1941 the Champlain Conference will have been in active operation one hundred years. These years represent a century of progress under the blessing of God. Many noble men and women have served in various capacities, and many fine churches have been built and preserved. Therefore it seems right and fitting that we should honor God and His Son Jesus Christ for His favors and blessings.

"Be it Resolved, That we publish a suitable Centennial Journal to commemorate this event; and that a staff be ap-

pointed to act with Conference officers to bring out such publication." A. O. Northrup.

The following were elected as the staff for this purpose: Rev. Northrup, Rev. Mattoon, and Rev. Lewis.

Order of the Day: Report of the Sunday-school Secretary, W. F. Lewis. The financial report was read and accepted by vote. See Report No. 4. Rev. Lewis also gave an address in relation to the Sunday-school interests.

The Camp Meeting Treasurer read his report which was accepted by vote. See Report No. 5.

Order of the Day: Rev. McLeister, Connectional Representative, delivered the address. It was characteristically presented in an inspirational and enlightening manner concerning matters of general interest.

Adjourned by vote. Prayer by J. J. Davison.

Thursday Afternoon

Devotional service. Rev. Shares read the Scripture lesson from 1 Thes. 5:13-23. Prayer by Revs. Taylor and Northrup.

Business: Roll call. Minutes read and approved.

The Chairmen of the Conference Districts were elected as follows:

Southern District, Rev. Charles Dayton. Northern District, Rev. Spencer Moon.

Passage of character: Rev. Northrup, Rev. Chapman, Leon Barse.

By common consent the Order of the Day was postponed, and the Conference business was continued. The name of Sumner Brainard was called, and character passed.

The sermon of the afternoon was given by Rev. McLeister. His theme was "Faith and Works," based on Mark 2:1-12.

Following the message, the Conference voted to adjourn for Committee work. Dismissal by Brother Northrup.

Evening Service

Rev. Van Wormer preached on the theme "A Real Revival" after which there was a general prayer service.

Friday Forenoon

The devotional service was in charge of Gerald Hewitt, who read Acts 16:22-34. Prayer by Rev. Hill.

Business: Roll call. Minutes read and approved. A partial report of the Statistical Committee was read and accepted.

It was voted that Rev. Stopp be the first member of a correcting committee. Second member, Charles Dayton; Third member, Price Stark.

Order of the Day: Election of Conference Officers. The four tellers appointed were Leon Barse, G. D. Jock, Reginald Hewitt and Gerald Hewitt.

It was voted that the 1941 Conference Session and Camp Meeting be from July 1st to 13th.

It was voted to accept the invitation to hold the Missionary and Sunday-school Convention at West Chazy, August 27th to 29th.

Voted that an offering be taken on each charge to help in the Convention expense.

Voted that the Conference recommend that each charge pay five dollars to their pastor to help pay his expense to the Ministerial Institute at Houghton.

Rev. Reginald Hewitt was elected to preach the Conference Sermon Wednesday afternoon of next Conference Session. Charles Dayton was elected as alternate. Voted to continue the Committee on Burial Locations of our honored dead—L. C. Mattoon, A. O. Northrup, E. D. Carpenter.

It was moved and carried that the Conference authorize the Camp Meeting Committee to investigate, purchase and install proper sanitary toilet facilities.

Adjournment by vote. Dismissal by Brother Northrup.

Friday Afternoon

Devotional Service. Brother Edward Mein was in charge. Prayer by Brother Stopp.

Business: Roll call. Minutes were approved as read.

Rev. Spencer Moon was elected as Educational Secretary.

The Committee on Resolutions read the report which was accepted. See Report No. 6.

Rev. Northrup was excused. Characters passed: Gerald Hewitt, Spencer Moon, L. C. Mattoon, F. H. Johnson, Flora Ressler.

Reginald Hewitt and Spencer Moon were elected as assistants to the Conference Sunday-school Secretary.

The Memorial service was in charge of Sister Shippee. Several spoke words of appreciation and tribute concerning Brother Arthur Baker. At the close, a male quartet sang "Home, Sweet Home."

Saturday Forenoon

Devotional: In charge of Rev. Hewitt. Scripture read, Psa. 92. Prayer by Brothers Brainard and Chapman.

Business: Roll call. Minutes read and approved.

It was voted that Conference Resolution No. VII be rescinded. Moved that the Camp Meeting Committee report to the Conference on Saturday afternoon of the Conference Session. Motion carried. Moved and voted that the Conference President include in the Orders of the Day a special period to consider Camp Meeting business, and that this become a standing Rule.

The Committee on Itineracy and Orders reported. Report was adopted. See Report No. 7.

The Conference Budget was fixed by vote at \$1.50 per member.

Character of Arthur Osgood was passed.

The Schenectady Statistical report was read, and the Delegate reported.

A letter from Brother and Sister Palmer was read to the Conference.

It was voted that the Conference entertain an unlimited number of young people between the ages of 12 and 20 years, that lodging be free; and that the board for these young people be at the rate of twenty-one meals for two dollars, and that all meals served be at this rate; that Mrs. Reginald Hewitt be chaperon of the girls; that she with her husband occupy a room down stairs in the old dorm, the room to be free to them; and that each charge be requested to furnish one cot for the boys' camp next year.

Voted that the Statistical Report be accepted as completed. See Report No. 11.

The report of the Apportionment Committee was read and adopted as corrected. See Report No. 8.

The Educational service was in charge of Prof. F. H. Wright, Houghton girls spoke of school interests. The girls' quartet sang selections. Brother Wright then addressed the assembly concerning Houghton College.

Saturday Afternoon

Business: Roll call. Minutes read and corrected.

The Tithing Secretary was given a period of time to present the matter of tithing. Report accepted. See Report No. 9.

The Committee on Pastoral Relations read its report. It was voted to consider the report item by item.

Item I—Pastoral Relations was discussed, and left as unfinished business on account of an Order of the Day.

Then Gerald Hewitt, Spencer Moon and C. C. Murray were ordained to the Christian ministry in the Wesleyan Methodist Church, taking the ordination vows to become elders.

Rev. Van Wormer preached in the afternoon, and Rev. Wise again in the evening. Thus ended the Conference session of 1940, the following week being regular Camp Meeting services.

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE TO CONFERENCE

God gave us two new churches during the year, one at Watervliet, N. Y. and another at Ticonderoga, N. Y. Both seem to be healthy and bid fare to be among our strong circuits in the near future. This is as it should be. We must not fail to keep the vision before us, and seek to expand and enlarge our borders, as fast as we can, safely. The church at Watervliet is a fine brick building, and God helped us to purchase it at about one third the cost of its real value. A new parsonage is in the process of construction at the present time. The class at Ticonderoga are at the present worshipping in a hall which they rent. This class was organized about the first of May, and under the spiritual leadership of Brother Barse we have reason to believe that this class will increase in numbers and influence rapidly. We have sought to carry out the duties that you enjoined upon us at the last Conference, to the best of our ability, and we have really enjoyed the work. We take this opportunity to thank all the pastors for their fine and friendly co-operation in the work of the year. We are praying and believing for a mighty outpouring of the Spirit on this session of Conference, on the Camp Meeting that is to follow, and also upon our beloved Conference throughout the year, if Jesus tarries. These are days of testing, but also days of great privilege, and opportunity. Let us rise to meet the challenge, as men of faith, in the Name of our Christ.

We Would Recommend the Following

1st. That the Conference take action in the matter of the Brasie Corners church, that arrangements may be made to sell the building.

2nd. That the Macomb and Heuvelton Charges be combined to make one circuit. And that the parsonage and church at State Road, Macomb Charge, be disposed of to the best advantage, and the proceeds, together with whatever may be realized from the Brasie church be used to buy or build a parsonage at Heuvelton, N. Y. I would also recommend the sale of the parsonage at Acorn Hill. In as much as we are not using it for a parsonage, and it has been rented for a number of years and is greatly in

need of repairs, so that we might put the money to work where it is needed.

3rd. In as much as we have no house of worship at Ticonderoga, and at present are renting a hall, and are in need of a church there, I recommend that the Conference delegate a committee with power to act in the matter, to investigate the matter of removing our church at Darrowsville, N. Y. and moving it to Ticonderoga, N. Y. I believe there is a good opportunity at Ticonderoga for a strong work, and we should do all in our power to help and encourage our church there.

Report No. 6 RESOLUTIONS

We, as ministers of this Conference, are called to present Jesus to our congregations. The people of this generation are on a quest to see Jesus, just as surely as the Greeks were, in their day, when they expressed their desire in the words "Sirs, we would see Jesus."

It is the duty of the Church to make our generation feel how indispensable Jesus is. The people are not "gospel hardened." For one to be thus hardened he must hear and continually reject it. Instead of being hardened, they are gospel starved. Too often Jesus has been hidden behind theological statements and personal hobbies and notions. The average man has a hungry heart. He is not interested in long discussions or sermons on fundamentals. Nor is he primarily interested in the Second Coming of Jesus. His need is immediate. Some one who can help him with his present burdens, relieve the pressure of condemnation, and satisfy his heart hunger: this is what he wants.

Theological terms explain what Jesus does for us, and are only valuable in helping us to see what He can do for us. The average person needs one who can relieve the weight of guilt; One able to make him anew; blot out the past record, and enable him to live a holy life.

We need to magnify Jesus. The sweetest word to a burdened heart is the name of Jesus. There is no life without Him; therefore we should speak of Him as a Savior. Some emphasize ordinances and some negatives, but these cloud the vision of Him. There is no greater appeal for clean living than to enthrone Jesus in our lives, and by having a true conception of Him, it will forever settle the question of worldliness.

Therefore, be it Resolved, That we magnify Christ above the terms that describe what He does, and urge others to see that He is the One who can satisfy every need; and when our present needs are satisfied, the future will take care of itself. Our Lord taught this great truth when He said, "Take no thought for the morrow."

Further, be it Resolved, That we make Jesus seem indispensable to our congregations, for there is still an intense longing for Him.

STANDING RULES

1. The Standing Rules of the Conference Missionary Society shall be printed in the Conference minutes each year.

2. In making her report, the Conference Treasurer is authorized to close her books one week before the Conference session.

3. One of the two statistical blanks sent to each society, after being carefully filled out, is to be given to the Statistical Committee at the beginning of the Conference, the other is to be retained by the delegate and later read to the local society. Receipts and disbursements must be made to balance before being placed in the hands of the Statistical Committee.

4. All money raised by the society shall be used for missionary work, and no money shall be paid out without a vote of the society.

5. The Conference President shall receive annually \$5.00, the Treasurer \$3.00, and Secretary \$2.00 to defray expense of postage and writing material.

6. The voting body shall be composed of the Conference officers, Presidents of local societies, one delegate from each local society, Y. M. W. B. Superintendents, pastor's wives and lady pastors.

REPORTS

Report No. 1

PLAN OF WORK

The Committee Recommends:

1. That each local society shall have some Missionary Study or Program at each meeting to broaden our vision and inspire us to pray definitely for our work and workers. Aids to this are the Missionary Magazine, a Study book, and planned monthly correspondence with our missionaries.
2. That each society shall have at least one public, well advertised meeting, in which missionary needs shall be emphasized.
3. That we observe special days such as Harvest Day, "Wesleyan Missionary" Day and World Day of Prayer.
4. That each society elect a solicitor for the "Wesleyan Missionary" to keep the Magazine in circulation.
5. That the President, the Secretary and the Treasurer be subscribers to the "Wesleyan Missionary" and the "Wesleyan Methodist," and that fifty per cent of the membership be subscribers to the "Wesleyan Missionary."
6. That each local society continue sending \$6.00 to Southern Mountain Work, and \$5.00 to Hephzibah Orphanage. This should be sent through the Conference Treasurer, and applies on Budget.
7. That each society send \$1.00 per member dues to the Conference Treasurer, one fourth of which is to be retained in the Conference for expenses, one fourth to be forwarded to the General Treasurer, one fourth is applied on Home Missions and one fourth on Foreign Missions.
8. That we continue sending supplies to the various mission fields as requested by the workers in charge.
9. That instead of buying clothing for children at Hephzibah as in the past, we send an additional cash offering which may be used as most needed on arrival.
10. That we make special effort to can things for the Camp Meeting dining hall, and to make and send as many as possible of the following: pillows and quilts for the dormitories, sheets for cots, spreads for workers' beds, mirrors for rooms, furnishings for workers' rooms and mattresses for cots.
11. That the societies have one District Missionary Service each year,

the Chairman of each district to be appointed by the voting body of the Conference Missionary Society. It is recommended that the services of a returned missionary be secured by these five chairmen for each of these district meetings. It is suggested that said chairmen meet during camp to decide upon and if possible contact a missionary. That a General Missionary offering be taken of which the cash shall be given to the missionary and all pledges shall be accredited to the charge from which they came.*

12. That each delegate report to her society at the first meeting after Conference the proceedings of the Conference Society and spread the information gained concerning the work.

13. That each local secretary report quarterly to the Conference Secretary as to their rating according to the efficiency standard.
