CALLED MEETING OF THE INDIANA CONFERENCE

The Indiana Conference convened on the Campground at the call of the Chair on Friday August 25th, 1939 at 8:00 a. m. Opening prayer, Rev. A. M. Jackson.

The President stated the purpose of the meeting and the Conference proceeded to the transaction of the business in hand.

A Letter of Standing from the Indiana Conference of the Methodist Protestant Church was received for Ralph Owens.

Upon vote Rev. Ralph Owens was received by our Conference as an Elder on Probation.

The President expressed his desire for the approval of the Conference in appointing Rev. Ralph Owens as pastor of the Portland Church to serve under the direction of the President.

A motion was made and carried approving the President's proposed action to appoint Rev. Ralph Owens pastor of the Portland Church.

It was moved and carried that when we adjourn we adjourn to meet at the call of the Chair.

Minutes were read and approved. Adjourned upon motion.

RESOLUTIONS AND LAWS OF THE INDIANA CONFERENCE

1. That it is the sense of this Conference that our houses of worship should not be open to any evangelist or minister of any other church to hold a series of meetings or to maintain a regular appointment for another congregation; provided, however, that usual denominational courtesies be extended to other ministers in occasional appointments. And waiving of the above resolution by a contract or lease of building must be obtained through the Board of Trustees of the Indiana Conference.

2. Be it resolved, That the Committee on Itineracy and Elder's Orders shall require all those desiring to unite with us from any other denomination or Annual Conference to present credits equivalent to our Conference Course of Study, regardless of their standing in the body of which they have been a member, and if they cannot do this they shall be required to meet the same conditions as our local preachers before ordination.

3. That any candidate for Elder's Orders or traveling under the direction of the Conference, who fails to attend the Institutes and the examinations of the Committee, without sufficient cause, shall be deemed unworthy of the trust and care of souls, and refused a place among us as a minister of the Gospel, and when they shall fail to attend the Institute for two successive years they shall be dropped from the roll.

4. The Committee on Elder's Orders is hereby to transfer all persons to the study list who may have been recommended to travel and may not have been given work.

5. All charges with a membership of twenty-five or more shall in addition to the regular stipulated salary, assume the responsibility of providing a suitable home in which the Pastor may live.

6. Be it resolved, That it shall be the duty of the Pastors to look after the insurance of our church and parsonage properties. All insurance shall provide for losses caused by fire and lightning, hail and tornado. A failure on the part of the Pastor shall be a censurable offense. If the church fails to insure their property upon reasonable effort of the pastor to secure the same, then said failure shall be reported to the President of the Conference who shall then have the property insured. In such case all insurance monies received from losses by fire, lightning, hail, and tornado shall be used in Church Extension work as the Conference Board of Trustees deems best.

7. We recommend that all charges and stations to which the Pastor

moves pay the moving and transportation expenses of said Pastor, the same to be done in addition to his salary; provided this shall not interfere with the previous arrangements between Pastors and charges. That where the Conference demands the services of any one, that it shall bear the moving expenses, if any expense shall thus be incurred.

8. Each Pastor shall file a duplicate statistical report with the Committee before the close of the fifth day of August with the exception of Pastor's salary and Membership. These items to be reported the first day of Conference, said report to be kept on file one year, and hereafter the full reports shall not be read in open Conference. The official character of any Pastor shall not be passed until he shall have submitted a satisfactory report, including statistics.

9. All unaccounted for members appearing in the statistics in the membership list shall be referred to the discontinued list. All members in excess of the number reported shall be reported received. The roll of all the classes upon the charges shall be put in the hands of the Pastors and they shall have charge of the same and make all entries therein.

10. It shall be a standing rule of this Conference until revoked by vote that the President shall receive \$35.00, the Secretary \$50.00, the Treasurer \$100.00, the Assistant Secretary \$25.00, each member of the Auditing Committee \$10.00, each member of the Statistical Committee \$25.00, Assistant to the Treasurer \$10.00, the same to be apportioned pro-rata among the various funds of the Conference. The Conference Sunday School Secretary shall receive \$50.00 and each of the other members of the Conference Sunday School Board shall receive \$25.00, the same to be paid out of the Sunday School Treasury.

11. It shall be a standing rule until revoked by this body that the President shall nominate his Advisory Board and the Conference shall elect his nominations.

12. It shall be a standing rule of this Conference that in the examination of character the Conference officials shall be called first.

13. The Conference shall elect three members of the Camp Meeting Committee, one to be elected each year for a term of three years.

14. The Pastor shall bring a report to each Quarterly Meeting and send a duplicate to the Conference President quarterly on blanks furnished by the Conference.

15. Whereas, our people are being deceived by the erroneous teaching that Divine healing of the body through faith in the atonement is the same as for sin, therefore:

Be it Resolved, That we record our belief that the healing of the body is among the gifts of the Spirit according to 1 Corinthians 12:7-11, hence not for all Christians at all times as it is not always the will of God to heal the body.

16. Let it be a standing rule of this Conference until revoked, that

no charge shall call any one as pastor, or to supply the work by ministers coming from other denominations as long as there are ministers in our Conference qualified and available to take work; Further, we urgently request our President after he has exercised his prerogative in the reception of ministers coming from other denominations, to immediately refer them to the Committee on Itineracy and Elder's Orders, who shall make a thorough investigation as to the ministry and life of such applicants, who shall report their findings to the President, after which, appointments may be made.

17. Resolved, That the Treasurers shall submit their reports to the Auditing Committee who shall audit the same and in their report to this body they shall show they have audited the same.

18. Inasmuch as the Pastor's statistics reveal the true condition of the work as much as anything that might be said, therefore be it resolved, That the Pastors report in open Conference the amount of Pastor's salary received, the amount of budget raised and the loss or gain in membership, also the number of Wesleyan Methodist papers and Wesleyan Missionary magazines taken.

19. It shall be a standing rule of the Conference until revoked that the Board of Trustees shall authorize all disbursements not otherwise provided for.

20. Let it be the standing rule of this Conference that each Pastor whose total pastor's receipts exceed \$1000.00 a year shall seek to organize a new class or give his services in a revival meeting to one of the weaker churches—whose total pastor's receipts are \$500.00 or less—to help establish it. And that the church which he pastors grant him such privileges without censure and with full remuneration of salary while in such a meeting.

21. Let it be a standing rule of this Conference until revoked that the Storehouse Tithing Plan shall be the Conference plan for financing the Church work and the following percentage basis be the rule for distributing the same: Local Church Work, 70%; Budget, 30%. Further, that a Tithing Secretary be elected and that one evening service in the Conference Session be given for a Tithing Service and all Tithing Bands or Churches of the Conference be called to give their yearly report, and that some minister be chosen to preach on the Storehouse Tithing Plan. The expenses of Tithing Literature and Postage to be paid from the Conference Claims Fund and that churches desiring literature may secure the same from the Tithing Secretary. Further, that this service be a Special Order of the Conference.

22. Let it be a standing rule of this body until revoked that the Assistant-Secretary act as reporter of the Conference and Camp Meeting to the Marion daily papers.

23. We recommend that ten percent of the "Conference Missions"

Budget be applied on the arms liabilities as the nature of the liabilities demand, and, that the Conference Treasurer disburse the unrestricted receipts in the "College Building Fund" as the nature of the liabilities demand, with the approval of the Conference Board of Trustees.

24. By decision of the Conference President, the first Sunday of the Annual gathering shall belong to the old year, and the second Sunday of the Annual gathering shall belong to the new year.

25. Let it be a standing rule of this Conference that the Camp Meeting Committee nominate and the Conference elect the one to preach the opening sermon of the next Conference Year with his alternate.

26. Let it be a Standing Rule of this Conference that the President of the Conference be given each year a two weeks' vacation with pay, said vacation to be at a time of his own choosing.

27. Let it be a Standing Rule of this Conference until revoked that all building and repair on Conference property which the local church is unable to provide for satisfactorily shall pass the approval of the Conference Building Committee before obligations are assumed.

28. Resolved, That when churches which have been placed in the hands of the President, if they can and do decide as to who shall be their pastor before the Minutes are sent to the press, the same shall be entered in the minutes the same as if ordered by this Conference.

29. Let it be a Standing Rule until revoked by this Conference, That in case of an emergency the President and the Board of Trustees shall be empowered to make a special assessment to meet the need, and that the funds be sent to the Conference Treasurer and credited to the Sick Preachers Benefit fund.

Report No. 2

REPORT OF THE CONFERENCE SUNDAY SCHOOL BOARD

Under the blessing of God we are glad to report a good year in the Sunday-school Department of the Church.

An increase is shown in enrollment with nine thousand three hundred ten enrolled. This is about twelve hundred more than double the membership of the Church. Benevolences show an increase of \$419.63 over last year.

Six hundred seventy-five scholars were converted during the year, and two hundred fifteen joined the Church.

In the departmental work of the Sunday school some increase is shown.

In the Teachers Training Department twenty-two have received certificates during the year and forty-nine are enrolled in classes. We urge that this work of the teachers' preparation be stressed.

In Cradle Roll and Home Department increases are shown and here the worker makes contacts that even the pastor can not make.

The Missionary Department makes a worth-while contribution in in-

structions and also put about two thousand dollars into the missionary budget of the church.

The Temperance Department can contribute much in temperance education. We feel that this is sorely needed at this time.

We would recommend that all these Departments be headed by those vitally interested in their work, and not elected as a matter of courtesy, some one that will work the job.

We have prepared postal cards for Departmental reports to convention district leaders and expect an increase in interest and a fuller report in the conventions.

We recommend that the ten cent per member assessment be continued for the support of the work.

We recommend that twenty-five dollars be paid out of this fund toward cost of printing of Conference Minutes.

We recommend that the districts remain as last year, and that conventions be held the first two weeks of October thirty-nine.

Report No. 8

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON RESOLUTIONS

Resolved, That the following article be adopted as the sentiment of the Indiana Conference:

Whereas, there is an ever increasing tendency to irreverence in our worship, especially among our children and young people, both in public and family worship, and,

Whereas, there is a seeming disregard for the house of God and sacred things, we recommend that our pastors, Sunday-school teachers, and spiritual leaders strive to combat this evil tendency and stimulate a proper respect and reverence for God and holy things. Furthermore, we urge upon our people the necessity of personal evangelism as well as mass evangelism.

Whereas, there is a prevalence of disobedience to parents, lawlessness, minimizing of ecclesiastical standards, and unconformity to God's Holy Word, let our ministers and leaders set an example by ruling well their

own homes, by observing the laws of our land, by adhering to the standards of our Discipline, and by walking carefully and humbly with our God observing all His commandments to do them.

Whereas, we recognize the growing tendencies to worldliness as to apparel, amusements, and business practices, we exhort our people to refrain from the attendance of worldly amusements, mixed bathing in public places, the wearing of scanty or improper clothing, and the use of masculine attire by women. We further intreat our people to refrain from the borrowing of money or the purchase of goods without a probability of meeting these obligations and to live exemplary lives in regard to these matters.

Whereas, we are aware of the tendency to modernism which discounts the inspiration of the Scriptures, the virgin birth of Christ, the vicarious atonement for sin, the glorious resurrection, and the second coming of the Lord, we exhort our people to preach and practice the fundamentals of the gospel, to emphasize with no uncertainty the necessity of the spiritual birth, heart cleansing as a second definite work of grace, and prevailing prayer.

We call upon our leaders and ministers to pledge themselves in united opposition to the growing tendencies to Communism, Fascism, and Nazism and other forces which are calculated to rob us of our religious and national freedom. We urge our pastors and evangelists to preach and teach a definite, practical holiness, which will bring forth the fruit of perfect love and Christian fellowship between the pastor and the Church, and which will counteract the spirit of unrest found in some churches.

We deplore the increasing prevalence of the sale and use of alcoholic beverages with the attendant increase of traffic accidents, disease, destitution, immorality, crime and misery. We recognize the liquor traffic as perhaps the greatest menace to progress and civilization, for it wastes money, produces hunger, breaks hearts, disrupts homes, blights hopes, dethrones reason, poisons the body, deadens the conscience, destroys individual initiative and moral fortitude, and jeopardizes the life and property of every member of society.

The American people undertook to drink themselves into prosperity and fight the depression through the legalized sale of liquor. This plan, supported by some on the ground that it would eliminate bootleggers, has utterly failed. Reliable statistics reveal that in Indiana alone at least 10,000 individuals or places are selling liquor without a legal license while there are only 6,150 licensed places selling it.

In view of these facts, we pledge ourselves to wage an aggressive warfare on the liquor interests through the avenues of education, regeneration, and legislation. We pledge our coöperation with the anti-alcoholic forces in their efforts to inform people of the evils of the liquor traffic, to change

WESLEYAN METHODIST CHURCH

their hearts through the power of the gospel, and to secure legislation that will remove the liquor traffic from our country.

Furthermore, we will endeavor to use our influence against the use of tobacco, opiates, marijuana, and other harmful, habit-forming drugs by means of a concerted program of instruction and evangelism.

In contrast to the standards and practices of most of our governmental officials including the occupant of the White House whose matron early in the administration advised the young women of America to see how much booze they could imbibe without staggering, it is a great relief to see the contrast in spirit and practice as set forth in the "Life" and official acts of Governor Luren D. Dickinson who is the governor of our adjoining state of Michigan in his recent attack upon the booze problem and practices of the high officials of our land and the low moral standards set forth by the mistress of the White House, and also his standard for the old-time Sabbath.

Be it Resolved, That we, the members of the Wesleyan Methodist Annual Conference of the State of Indiana in session this 19th day of August, 1939, do voice our endorsement of his bold stand for civic righteousness and constitutional government and that we in every way possible seek to strengthen the hand and position of all such public officials that are thus seeking to stem the tide and inflow of communism and immorality by holding up the old-time standards to righteous citizenship, and that it further be Resolved, That we convey to Governor Luren D. Dickinson our hearty approval of his position and assure him of our hearty moral support. That a copy of this resolution be forwarded by the Secretary of the Conference to Governor Dickinson.

Report No. 9

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON FINANCE AND APPROPRIATIONS

We, your Committee on Finance and Appropriations, offer the following report:

Item 1. That the President shall have supervision of the work of the Conference, and shall hold at least one quarterly meeting on each charge during the year, and also shall render whatever assistance he may find necessary to the weaker charges of the Conference, as his time will permit. He shall coöperate with the pastors in the raising of their budgets and

THE INDIANA CONFERENCE

render assistance as needed in organizing the financial system of the charges to conform as nearly as possible with that adopted by the Conference. The salary of the President shall be \$1600.00 per year and expenses incidental to his work.

Item 2. Conference Missions:

First—That the Conference be divided into sections corresponding to the Sunday-school sections as of 1938 and 1939.

Second—That a Superintendent and Advisory Committee of two members be nominated for each section by the Committee on Pastoral Relations and elected by the Conference.

Third—That the Sectional Superintendent and his Advisory Committee shall have authority to call to their aid evangelistic help as they may deem advisable, subject, however, to the approval of the Missionary Board, who shall have general supervision of all work in these sections; and that the traveling expenses of the Superintendents shall not exceed three cents per mile. Also, that all expenses incidental to the work in any section shall be raised, if possible, on the local field; and should there be a deficit it shall be met by the Conference Missions Arm, as funds are available.

Item 3. That the Conference Claims Budget be forwarded quarterly to the Conference Treasurer, excepting that the Quarterly Meeting apportionment shall be paid to the President when he holds the Quarterly Meeting on the respective charges; and that the Conference Treasurer shall pay the Conference President's salary and his expenses from this fund monthly.

Item 4. That the Sunday-school offerings of the first Sunday of each month be divided by the local Treasurer equally between Home and Conference Missions and shall be forwarded to the Conference Treasurer at least quarterly; and that the Conference and Connectional Sunday-school Apportionment shall be ten cents per member of all enrolled in the main school.

Item 5. Since the Storehouse Tithing Plan has been adopted by this Conference as the financial plan of the Conference, we urge our churches to conform to this plan as soon as possible. Also, the pastors shall be required to report quarterly to the President the condition of their budget apportionments, and their failure to do so shall necessitate a vote of Conference to pass their character.

Item 6. That each church, that is not using the Storehouse Tithing Plan, shall elect a Board of Stewards of at least three members whose duty shall be to cooperate with the pastor in raising the Budget, and that the pastor shall forward the same to the proper Treasurer at least quarterly.

Item 7. First—We recommend that the Budget Apportionment per member be as follows: Foreign Missions, \$2.00; Orphanage, 25 cents; Connectional Education, \$1.50; Conference Claims, 75 cents; Conference Missions, 75 cents; Home Missions, 50 cents; College Building Fund, 50 cents.

Second—That the price of the Conference Minutes shall be 25 cents per copy, and should there be any deficit occur in this fund that it be met pro rata by the Various Conference arms.

Third—That we conform to the Discipline relative to the Superannuate Apportionment which is that we shall raise 52 cents per member. We strongly urge that our pastors faithfully present this subject to their people for the support of our Superannuates.

Item 8. We recommend that it be a Standing Rule, until revoked by this Conference, That in case of an emergency the President and the Board of Trustees shall be empowered to make a special assessment to meet the need, and that the funds be sent to the Conference Treasurer and credited to the Sick Preachers Benefit Fund.

Item 9. That the word "fifteen" in rule 24 on page 37 of this year's minutes be changed to read "ten" per cent and otherwise left as it is.

Report No. 6

REPORT OF PLANS COMMITTEE

We, the Plans Committee, beg leave to submit the following report:

1. The Committee recommends that a Gospel Team visit each district, the team to consist of the State President, Vice-President, and six others, two of whom shall be students of Marion College, the six being chosen by the State President, these visitations being Saturday all-day rallies, and the place of the rally to be decided by the President of the district.

2. We recommend that each district coöperate with the following state program as to rallies:

(a) A District Rally at the time of the visit of the Gospel Team in each district.

(b) The State Rally to be held on May 30 at the Fairmount Camp-ground.

(c) At least three other rallies.

3. We recommend that the Divisional Superintendents be given at least two weeks notification by the District Secretary as to the time and place of each District Rally, and that he attend at least one of them.

4. For the encouragement of the young people we recommend that the churches in each district be visited by the District President, or some one chosen by the President, with two or three other young people, holding a service, these helpers being chosen by the President of that district where possible.

5. We recommend that at least one service, early in the year, include a careful study of the Connectional Constitution and that all societies work earnestly toward complete organization according to the constitution.

6. We recommend that our young people give their hearty support to the Wesleyan Methodist and Young People's Journal and the use of the same in their services.

7. (a) We recommend that each district sponsor a revival, at least two weeks in length in either one of the weaker churches or a new field in that district, using a tent where advisable.

(b) We recommend that the Executive Committee serve as the Evangelistic Committee of the State. This committee to work in harmony with the Conference President for the promotion of evangelistic work in new fields.

That this Committee shall carefully select a location in which to hold a meeting and to choose such workers as they count advisable.

8. Whereas there is a great need for evangelization in the African Mission field, and since it only requires ten dollars to evangelize a village

in the Susu land; we recommend that the W. Y. P. S. attempt the evangelization of at least fifteen of these villages through the efforts of our Rev. and Mrs. C. C. Decker and family.

Report No. 7

COMMITTEE ON FINANCE AND APPROPRIATION

We, the Committee on Finance and Appropriations, beg leave to submit the following recommendations:

1. That the traveling expenses of the State Gospel Team be paid from the district offerings on the basis of three cents per mile.
2. That the traveling expenses of each Divisional Superintendent be paid by the district at the time of his visit on the basis of three cents per mile.
3. That the traveling expenses of the District Gospel Team be paid by the churches visited.
4. That the expenses of the pioneer revival be met as far as possible out of the money raised at the place of the meeting, but if sufficient funds are not raised that they be paid out of the State Treasury not to exceed twenty dollars per worker and that not more than two workers be paid.
5. We recommend that the President receive from the State treasury the amount of thirty-five dollars for State work and that the Secretary's desk expense be paid from the State treasury.
6. We recommend that each local society use the W. Y. P. S. Loyalty Fund Chart to raise its quarter of the Educational Budget, where there is not a workable plan in operation.
7. We recommend that the books of the W. Y. P. S. Treasurer be closed by August first, next.
8. We recommend that each society pay to the State Treasurer an amount equivalent to ten cents per member of its church. (This assessment covers connectional dues, President's allotment, Secretary's desk expense and part of the expenses of the pioneer revival.)

9. Whereas, Rev. and Mrs. C. C. Decker and family are missionaries from our own state, and whereas a village can be evangelized for the small sum of ten dollars, we recommend that the sum of one hundred fifty dollars be raised this year for evangelization in the African mission field and that the following plan for raising this amount be used: That the Executive Committee apportion the amount to be raised by each district and that the district raise the specified amount in its rallies through the year, the same to be forwarded to the State W. Y. P. S. Treasurer following each rally.
