

IN MEMORIAM

ELDER ETHEL ENTY: Promoted April 6, 1958. Came to the Conference in 1935 by recommendation of the Templeton First Church. Appointed to serve with her husband at this church. Ordained June 1936. Received an appointment to General Evangelism in 1937 when they moved to Houghton, N. Y. to engage in this work. Took a School Teaching appointment in 1955 and remained in this work until the death of her husband in May, 1957. Though her residence and work has been largely outside the Conference bounds she retained her Conference membership. Death came April 6, 1958 in Memorial Hospital, Buffalo, N. Y. Interment was in the Houghton, N. Y. Cemetery.

Sunday 10:00 A. M. Ordination: Singing led by David L. Robertson, "Amazing Grace," and "Is Not This The Land of Beulah." Prayer by Elder H. E. Robertson, Sr. Singing, "All For Jesus." An offering was taken for the purpose of extending the black-top walks on the Camp Grounds. Solo by Mrs. Myra Lupton. Ordination Sermon by Dr. F. R. Eddy, Denominational Agent. The Scripture read was I Timothy 6:6-11. The text was verse 11. The theme of the message was admonition to "Be a Man of God." The Roll of candidates for ordination was called by the Secretary; E. W. Brooks, Dean McIntire, Kenneth O. Brown, William L. Baker, James J. McVey and William H. Cornell. Elder H. C. Van Wormer, the president, assisted by Elders Clarence L. Chess, Charles Baker, T. W. Comadoll, T. A. Robertson, Clyde A. Blair and C. R. McPherson read the ordination service. Elder H. C. Van Wormer gave the Charge and

Dr. F. R. Eddy presented a Bible investing each candidate with authority to preach the Word. The President extended the Right Hand of Fellowship and the Secretary presented Certificates.

Sunday 2:15 P.M. Pioneer Rally with Conference Pioneer Secretary, Elder C. R. McPherson in charge.

Sunday 6:30 P. M. Memorial service for Elder Ethel Enty under direction of the Committee on Memoirs.

Sunday 7:00 P. M. Closing service of the Conference. This was Youth Night and Conference Youth Society President, Elder H. E. Schmul, Rochester pastor presented a deeply stirring message.

Alternate speakers chosen by the Committee on Religious Services were Elders L. S. Burchfield, F. E. Satterfield and Charles C. Cross.

Standing Resolutions

- 1. A Committee on Auditing and Finance, consisting of three ministerial members, the Chairman being an Elder, shall be elected each year, the duties of which shall be to examine and report on the Treasurer's books and all the financial reports, except the W.M.S. and Y.M.W.B., and to be a Standing Committee to advise on Financial plans.
- 2. All persons received into membership in the churches of our Conference excepting those whose life of Christian fidelity has been of sufficient long standing, shall be received at first as associate members only.
- 3. When it becomes necessary for a church to call a pastor, it shall be the duty of the calling church to make provision for the expense incurred by the pastor in removing to a new field of labor. Money raised for this purpose shall NOT be applied on the pastor's salary. When an Elder is elected to the Conference Presidency, expenses incurred in moving to the Conference Parsonage, shall be paid from the Conference Treasury.
- 4. The Conference Sunday shall be the closing Sunday of Conference year, and the out-going pastor shall be paid his salary for that Sunday by the charge he is leaving.
- 5. At the beginning of the Conference session the president shall appoint a Nominating Committee of not less than three members, two Elders and one Layman to bring to the Conference a slate of Nominations for Committees, etc., for the Conference Temporary Organization. Delegates Credentials shall be mailed to the Secretary not later than ten days before the convening of Conference. The Secretary shall be Chairman of the Credentials Committee and shall compile the Roll of Delegates from the regularly filled Credentials received.
- 6. No person shall be received into membership in Allegheny Conference until he shall have properly filled out an application blank, which application together with recommendations of his references must pass the approval of the President and his Advisory Board. Exceptions to this rule may be made by the President and his Advisory Board when they deem best.
- 7. The pastor of any church in the Conference shall be free to hold at least one revival meeting during the year, wherever he sees fit, and it is recommended that his salary be paid to him while he is absent.
- 8. Each pastor shall send a monthly report on the blank provided, to the Conference President showing the progress and the state of the work under his care.
- 9. Each church may elect a Nominating Committee whose duty it shall be to nominate candidates for church officers for presentation to the church at the time of the annual election of officers. Such nominations shall not exclude other nominations at the time of the business meeting.
- 10. Churches having business with the Conference Board of Trustees requiring a visit of that body to their church, shall be responsible for the expense attached to such calls, unless released by the Board.

- 11. Inasmuch as trial sermons are hardly fair to the church or candidate and since the practice of having trial sermons is contrary to the usual manner of locating preachers, we recommend that no preacher shall accept any such invitation, if given. Exceptions to this rule may be granted by the Conference President upon request of any church.
- 12. Since considerable expense of transferring automobile title and license attends the moving of a pastor from one state to another, we recommend that where possible the calling church bear this expense.
- 13. We recommend that all districts emphasize Sunday School activity, and that Conventions be arranged for in conjunction with the visitation of the Conference Sunday School Secretary, who shall visit one Convention of each District during the year, at Convention expense.
- 14. We recommend that no one be elected to Elders Orders who does not have an abiding sense of divine call to give himself wholly to the function and ministry of an Elder in the WESLEYAN METHODIST CHURCH, and that no one shall be ordained to this office and work who is not applying himself wholly to this one thing in cares and studies, and clearly determining by God's grace to give himself wholly to this holy ministry, if possible, long before the appointed day of ordination, and manifesting such a determination of faithful Christian service to the church or congregation whom he was called to serve during his years of preparation, so that as much as lieth in him, he has and will apply himself wholly to the work of the ministry, except in all cases of absolute necessity of such diversions to a legitimate avocation for livelihood which neither jeopardizes the Lord's work nor blames the ministry.
- 15. We recommend that each church equip its parsonage with the necessary heating and cooking equipment, because of the variation of requirements in this equipment for the individual parsonage.
- 16. We recommend that in election of local church Advisory Committee each church permit the pastor to nominate the members of this committee.
- 17. The Conference Secretary, as Chairman, with the Conference President shall be a Standing Committee on Publications, whose duty it shall be to examine all matters pertaining to Conference printing and publications, and let all contracts for same.
- 18. All churches shall have a systematic means of keeping records, as required by Discipline. Paragraph No. 74, The "Ideal Church Record" published by the Bethel Publishing Company, Elkhart, Indiana, is a suggested form.
- 19. Local church treasurer's books shall close April 30, thus making the Conference fiscal year from May 1, to April 30. All funds received after this date shall be counted in the following year. Funds will be credited on Sub-Treasurer's books if received by May 5.

To meet the requirements of Paragraph 164 of the Discipline regarding revision of the Roll of membership, April 30, may be considered the close of the Conference year for Statistical purpose.

20. Minister's Pocket Credentials shall be issued to Elders and annually to Conference Preachers who are eligible.

- 21. Since the use of the wedding ring is not in accord with the standards of our church, we therefore, as a Conference, disapprove of our ministers performing or taking part in the ring ceremony.
- 22. The pastoral vote shall be taken on each charge on the third Sunday in April. When it is the desire of the church to vote on a week night, it will be done sometime during the week previous to the designated Sunday. Permission to vote on another Sunday may be obtained from the President and the Advisory Board.
- 23. Each church shall allow their pastor a reasonable vacation with pay to be taken at his convenience. Two weeks is suggested.
- 24. In the judgment of the Allegheny Conference, viewing television programs of the type commonly offered in response to the public clamor for entertainment is an impediment to the development of holy character. We deplore the current television programs' evil effect upon the moral and spiritual life of the Nation. The principles of Wesleyan Methodism—being an epitome of the Christian religion—obligate Wesleyan Methodists to an unblameable life which constantly rebukes every form of evil and zealously advocates holiness of heart and life. Therefore, we most earnestly request our ministers and members, as those who must give account unto God in the Day of Judgment for anything which tends to influence toward evil, to refrain from the purchase of television sets and from viewing such programs for Jesus' sake.

Inasmuch as ministers are examples and patterns to the flock of Christ, the Allegheny Conference expects each of its ministers to set a wholesome example and to be a godly pattern in this respect, so that those to whom he ministers will follow his example and avoid exposure to this which menaces vital godliness.

REPORT NO. 1

THE CONFERENCE PRESIDENT

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ:

To the members of the Allegheny Annual Conference here assembled for its 115th Annual Session, we greet you in the name of our Lord and Master, who exhorted us concerning these last days: "But by taking heed to yourselves lest at any time your hearts are weighed down with drunken nausea and intoxication and the anxieties pertaining to the affairs of this life, and that day bursts in upon you unexpectedly, for as a snare it shall come upon all those who are living on the face of all the earth. But be circumspect, attentive, ready, in every season being in prayer, in order that you may have sufficient strength to be escaping all these things which are about to take place, and to stand before the son of Man." (Luke 21:34-36, The Gospels, An Expanded Translation, Wuest). "You must not let yourselves be distressed—you must hold on to your faith in God and to your faith in Me" (John 14:1a, Phillips).

Then in the words of the Apostle Paul, we would like to add the following exhortations: "Let love for your brother-believers be a fixed principle with you" (Heb. 13:1, Way). "Show to one another the patience of love. Be earnest to maintain the unity of which the Spirit is the author, linked together by the chain of God's peace" (Eph. 4:2b-3, Way). "... Live in harmony, be at peace with one another. So shall the God of love and peace be ever with you" (2 Cor. 13:11, Phillips). "Be on your guard, stand firm in the faith, live like men, be strong! Let everything that you do be done in love" (I Cor. 16:13, Phillips). "Don't let the world around you squeeze you into its mould, but let God re-mould your minds from within, so that you may prove in practice that the plan of God for you is good, meets all His demands and moves toward the goal of true maturity" (Rom. 12:2, Phillips). "But you—in all things do you remain calm and sane ..." (2 Tim. 4:5a, Way). Everyone of us needs earnestly to take heed to the words of the Great Apostle.

Once again it is our privilege to meet upon this old hilltop. May the Lord grant to us the wisdom and grace to work together for the advancement of His cause in this perilous hour! We are meeting together in what the majority call "the hour of destiny" for the world, our own nation and the church. Practically all agree that "mankind is standing at a decisive stage of its history." Due primarily to the rapid growth of Red Communism the world is sitting upon a powder keg. This is a day of international tension, atheistic Communism, political and moral corruption and religious apostasy and also a day of scientific break-through, most of which has been achieved, thus far, by a country under the control of godless men who recognize that the church is in the center of opposition to their dreams of world conquest. We sincerely hope mankind never becomes guilty of the insolence for which

the builders of the tower of Babel were punished. Yet already the newspapers have carried accounts quoting certain Russian leaders to the effect that they do not need God to place the stars in their sky; they will fix their own in the firmament of the heavens!

Because of all this we are living in a fast shrinking world under the threat of guided missiles and other possibilities of destruction too horrible to envision. Many are beginning to believe that "time is fast running out." When Russia's Sputnik II went into orbit a well-known radio personality, after announcing another Russian technological achievement, in the next breath, made this side remark: "Anyone know where there is a nice deep cave in which I can hide?" Little did he know that many centuries ago the prophet Isaiah wrote: "And the loftiness of man shall be bowed down, and the haughtiness of men shall shall be made low; and the Lord alone shall be exalted in that day . . . And they shall go into the holes of the rocks, and into the caves of the earth, for the fear of the Lord, and for the glory of his majesty, when he ariseth to shake terribly the earth" (Isa. 2:17, 19). Nor did he know this prophecy is confirmed in Revelation 6:15, 17.

The past year has caused evangelicals to consider more seriously than ever imminence of Christ's return. The world's spotlight is on the Middle East. All the elements are now resident in the earth for the emergence of the anti-christ. Israel as a nation is inhabiting the Holy Land after eighteen centuries of dispersion and is miraculously once again a vital part of the family of nations. Russia has the ability for the first time to invade the Near East and Middle East in power equal to that depicted in Ezekiel 38 and 39. The nations situated in the territory of the old Roman Empire are progressing (through NATO, Benelux Customs of Union Euratom, the Common Market) toward the "ten state federation," reminiscent of Daniel 2, 7 and Revelation 18. Nations are preparing for war with weapons capable of worldwide destruction. These are conditions which, unless we are badly mistaken point very directly to the near culmination of our age in the Great Tribulation preceded by the Rapture. Besides, the church is being sifted. The grain is being gathered into God's garner and the chaff is ready to be burned. We are in a day of fast moving events along the prophetic line. We need to be awake and alert.

Let us look at some of the facts of the contemporary situation:

- 1. There is a chaos in the world political scene, and in this situation is enshrined the very real possibility of armed conflict on an unprecedented scale. Recently Russia's Nikita Khrushchev declared that Soviet forces were being supplied with "the most terrifying weapons of all times . . . such weapons as have never existed before."
- There is a calamitous wave of fear sweeping over the nations, bringing tragedy, despair and death in its wake. The daily press keeps us aware of this fact
- 3. There is a critical increase of industrial unrest in many lands.
- 4. There is a collapse of moral standards in the Western Nations. The growth of immorality and vice, often practiced openly and unashamedly in our cities, villages, etc., reveals a grievous decadence in our nation. The bottom has dropped out of the morals in America. Never has blatant wickedness been so manifest in the life of this nation.

- 5. There is commission of crime upon an ascending scale now attaining alarming proportions. Special conferences in many places have been called to consider the problem of juvenile delinquency.
- There is a conspicuous absence of sound and effective leadership among the free nations. It is a remarkable thing that in many nations the governments in power have barely a working majority.
- 7. There is a challenging ignorance concerning the universal significance of current events in the Middle East, particularly in so far as they are associated with the state of Israel. The Middle East is probably the gravest danger spot in the world, and for one reason or another the eyes of the world are turned in that direction. The joining of Egypt and Syria into one nation, one political entity, may prove of gravest importance.
- 8. Against the background of these facts is the further sobering fact that the organized Christian church seems so indifferent. This is the time when the church of Jesus Christ should be the church of Jesus Christ and should have at this unparalleled hour in the history of the world something of moment to say to men and women, to the nations of the world.

Dr. James De Forest Murch had this to say in one of his editorials in the U. E. A.: "America's brief period of religious renaissance seems to be waning. For several years most of us were encouraged to believe that there was a great turning to God. Religious statistics zoomed to an all-time high and the churches were crowded. Now it is becoming increasingly evident that this was no revival with accompanying humbling of spirit, repentance from sin and transformation of life.

"In 1957 the statistics continued to mount. The latest nose-count shows around 103,000,000 Protestants, Roman Catholics, Eastern Orthodox, Jews and cultists in America. Despite the 3,000,000 gain over the previous year churches reported diminishing attendance at worship services. Crime, juvenile delinquency, divorce and pagan broadcasts reached new highs.

"It is becoming quite clear that the superficial 'turning to God' of the past few years is no match for the scientism, materialism, commercialism and paganism that are gnawing at America's vitals. Many churches are filled with worldiness and their pulpits 'tickle the ears' of people with an emasculated gospel concerned primarily with 'pie here and now'."

Bishop Marshall R. Reed of the Michigan Area Methodist Church, speaking at a Michigan Pastors' Conference, had some harsh words to describe the state of American Christianity: "Frankly, we have seen little evidence of repentance and a change of thinking and acting in the present so-called religious awakening. . We have witnessed the unholy spectacle of an increasing interest in religion paralleled with an increasing growth in immorality. . . .

"Religion has been made very popular by a success philosophy of our Gospel. It says if you think right, you will be healthy and wealthy and wise. It is difficult to make this deduction from the teaching of Jesus. . Another (problem) has to do with the respectability in which the Church is held. . . . Jesus warned His disciples to beware when men

spoke well of them. The Church has been at its best under persecution. (A third failure) is in the fact that the Church has not been distinguished by its attack upon great social issues which involve the welfare of humanity."

A commission of the National Council of Churches recently reported that not one church member out of ten claimed a climactic or "born again" experience. The majority had joined the church just as they would take out life insurance for protection. Such is a false shelter. If the New Testament is trustworthy at all, there is but one "way of escape", one shelter in the time of storm, one Rock in a weary land. Personal faith in Jesus Christ is the only way.

Dr. E. B. Blaiklock said, "Intellectually we live in a defeated age. The age has lost its bearings. The cement of faith has crumbled." Then he makes three powerful points: (1) "The fact of God's existence is being diligently eliminated from the thinking of today; (2) the Biblical view of human nature is largely rejected today, and (3) emotionally the age is in petulant revolt against order, which ultimately means against God. Behind much of the philosophy of our day lies a vast human desire to be independent of a Creater and to exalt a creature who has little to commend him. Much of the confusion in our thinking springs from the desire to find an early explanation of the universe which does not demand too much discipline of life and which leaves the conscience unchallenged. The emotional revolt against order is in essence a revolt against God. It springs from that hatred of all discipline which is the last corruption of human nature." It would be difficult to find a finer and truer analysis of today's unbelief than this. Yet if we are content to accept an explanation as justification, we are going to misread history and be faithless to our trust.

Today the world is in a moral and spiritual crisis. The Church of Jesus Christ is suffering greatly in its influence because of a departure from Biblical truth and our nation is facing chaos because of insidious evil forces at work within. Unbelief stalks abroad today— not only in the land but in the church. It is nothing for respected church leaders to deny the virgin birth, to make fun of verbal inspiration, to brand the vicarious atonement as a medieval superstition, and to laugh out of court the bodily resurrection of our Lord and any personal return of our Lord. The great doctrines of the Word of God are left to the predilection of the individual. Unquestionably, these are days of testing, a time when Christians must constantly check their perspectives for modernism, modern infidelity which would destroy the very foundation upon which our faith rests—the inspiration of the Scriptures, the deity and atoning work of our Lord Jesus Christ-goes on apace. Apostasy is upon us and moves onward to its apex and its destruction. It is in evidence today as its Christ-denying infidelity is proclaimed from pulpits, on the printed page, over the air, in schools, colleges and seminaries, and by new and ancient gnosticism in the form of the cults and isms of the day. Dr. Edward J. Young in his book, "Thy Word is Truth", says "There is a tendency among evangelicals to yield to some of the demands of modern unbelief. This is seen both in a general depreciation of doctrine and a lack of clarity and positiveness in stating it, and also in acceptance of some of the tenets of 'higher' criticism. Sometimes it is also seen in an unwillingness to come

out resolutely in opposition to the trends of the times and to bear the reproach of Christ."

Dr. Young states further: "To say that Christianity is now at the crossroads is to engage in the trite and the commonplace. Without any doubt, Christianity is at the crossroads. . . Ever since her founding, the church of God has been engaged in a spiritual battle. . . Throughout the whole course of her life the church has been faced with the choice 'for Christ' or 'against Him'. She has always been at the crossroads. Some crossroads are clearly marked so that there is no excuse for getting lost. Others, however, are poorly marked, and one comes upon those that seem not to be marked at all. What makes the present situation difficult and fraught with such dire consequences for the well being of the Church, is that the signposts have been tampered with, so that they intentionally lead one astray. . . . The real issue is not whether we are to substitute one doctrine of inspiration for That is at the most a somewhat secondary question. The real issue before the church today, and for that matter before every individual Christian, is whether the Bible is any longer to be regarded and accepted as a trustworthy teacher of doctrine. . . . The church is indeed at the crossroads. Shall she listen to God or man? Will she receive what the Spirit says concerning inspiration, or, turning her back upon Him, will she cleave unto man? This is the choice to be made. . . If the Bible is not infallable, then we can be sure of nothing. The other doctrines of Christianity will then one by one go by the board. The fortunes of Christianity stand or fall with an infallable Bible. Attempts to evade this conclusion can only lead to selfdeception."

In the midst of this critical situation Christ-honoring, Bible-believing people are a decided minority. Dr. Carl Henry, in an article, "The Christian Dynamic and the Culture Decline," said, "We Christians seem to be only a tiny band of tired minds trying to hold back the world landslide to paganism. Once again, conspicuously, the Christian movement is a decimated minority in an intensely hostile world." But this Bible-believing minority is an increasingly important factor in God's plan. In the face of the increase of this apostasy, we must bear in mind certain things:

First, we cannot destroy apostasy, for, if we consult the Holy Scriptures, we shall find that, even in the apostolic age, multitudes who were once hopeful, declined from the ways of God, and made shipwreck both of faith and of a good conscience (2 Tim. 1:15; 2:17; 4:10). The Bible in crystal clearness makes it emphatic that the onslaught of infidelity is to increase, and not to decrease, as we approach the end of the age. Only God can destroy this anti-Christian activity. But we can and we must stand against it in the name of the Lord Jesus Christ.

Second, there are two things we can do: (1) refuse to compromise with the apostasy, and (2) contend earnestly for the faith. We must proclaim and live out the whole counsel of God. The Christian is not without biblical guidance in this matter. If America has, like Rome of old, crossed its Rubicon; and if, as many keen observers now believe, America has begun charting her decline and inpending fall, we still have the Apostle's admonition given in apostolic times when conditions in the Old Roman Empire were not far different from ours. He wrote to the believers: "You know what hour

it is... The night is far gone... It is full time now for you to wake from sleep."... (Rom. 13.11ff).

Recently Dr. Carl Henry stated: "If America has crossed the Rubicon; if the nation's heritage is now beyond preservation; if the drift to the power state and to a controlled society cannot be stayed, Communist penetration from the outside is not alone to blame. Equal judgment falls upon the churches for indifference and ineffectiveness in the hour of America's greatest trial. Amid the world's subtle conflict between political and spiritual loyalties, the churches sin by their silence. Today, not Nero, but the churches fiddle while Rome burns. The churches have even approved leaders who support socializing and collectivistic trends in the name of the Christian community, and have permitted them without protest to speak for Christian conscience."

Third, we need to get back to Pauline preaching—preaching that is Christ-centered and redemption-centered. In large measure preaching today is earthbound-life-centered rather than Christ and redemption centered. It is not a proclamation of the life to come but an analysis of the life as lived today. It contains neither law which leads sinners to repentance, nor the Gospel which declares the good news of salvation in Jesus Christ. We need to get back to Law and Gospel preaching which brings a knowledge of sin and leads to Calvary. In this day of unbelief we are to maintain and teach: (1) a supernatural religion; (2) the depravity of man; (3) a vital faith in God's Word; (4) the Blood Atonement; (5) the deity of Christ; (6) the virgin birth; (7) a real Bible repentance; (8) a vital heart-changing new birth; (9) holiness which is a death to carnality; (10) the bodily resurrection of Christ; (11) a future punishment; (12) the coming judgment; (13) a real heaven; (14) high moral standards of living; (15) a true separated life; (16) the coming of Christ to rapture His saints as the blessed hope.

The need is to deal faithfully with sin. Dr. O. G. Wilson, in an article in THE WESLEYAN METHODIST said, "Wherever sin is found it must be vigorously opposed. This will bring fierce opposition; no matter, sin is the deadly enemy that must be destroyed."

Another has said, "It is not long since we were treating sin rather lightly, as though it were a growing pain of the human family. Throw a man a bit more education, let him become more civilized and he will grow out of sin and will leave it behind, but we are not talking this way so much anymore. We have seen too much of evil and are now prone to talk of it as being a cancer—deadly."

Dr. Oswald Smith gives four reasons for the present dearth of souls: (1) failure to preach for souls; (2) lack of soul travail; (3) lack of enduement of power, and (4) lack of conviction of sin.

Fourth, we need a Divine intervention as desperately as England needed one in the days of the Wesley revival, as America in the great revival of 1857, as the Welsh in the Welsh Revival in 1904, and as in the days of Finney. Torrey, Moody, etc. This can be easily seen as we look at our land today, with its millions of broken homes, its emphasis on sex, its glorification of crime and brutality on TV and over the radio, its book stalls crowded with young people (and older ones too), avidly reading the lewd literature to be had for a price. What are we doing to combat effectively this degenerative process? Let us

beg of God the assistance of His Holy Spirit in a real awakening. If we fail to turn to God, the restraining hand of His providence upon those who would destroy us may be lifted and judgment may come like a flood, as it came to ancient Judah in the Babylonian captivity.

On the other hand, if we repent and turn to God, as did the people of Nineveh when confronted with destruction, we shall be saved for a time. If Nineveh had maintained her repentance and obedience to God, she would not have been destroyed. Our fathers turned to God in every national crisis of the past. This is the reason why we have survived as a nation.

Fifth, we must above all things cultivate a spirit of love for each other in this day of criticism, misunderstanding, faultfinding, suspicion, etc.—This is the characteristic feature of all God's children and want of it, whatever else we may possess, proves us to be only as sounding brass or as tinkling cymbals. A development in this grace is the surest evidence of spiritual growth. Let us then take care that "no root of bitterness" springs up in our hearts and let us daily "put on charity, which is the bond of perfectness."

Beloved, the call of the hour is for a new daring and a new heroism in our living and in our service for the Master. The word "finis" will not be written to the history of the Christian church by communism, humanism, secularism, materialism, paganism, nor modernism. The last word will be spoken by Him who is the Alpha and the Omega, the first and the last, the One who is alive from the dead and is alive forever more and who holds within His hand the keys of death and hell. That word will be spoken when He has put all His enemies under His feet and every knee shall bow and every tongue confess that He is Lord to the glory of God the Father!

Let me close this portion of my report with Ephesians 6:10-13. 18, (Phillips). "In conclusion, be strong—not in yourselves but in the Lord, in the power of His boundless resource. Put on God's complete armour so that you can successfully resist all the devil's methods of attack. For, as I expect you have learned by now, our fight is not against any physical enemy: it is against organizations and powers that are spiritual. We are up against the unseen Power that controls this dark world and spiritual agents from the very headquarters of evil. Therefore, you must wear the whole armour of God that you may be able to resist evil in its day of power, and that even when you have fought to a standstill you may still stand your ground. Pray at all times with every kind of spiritual prayer, keeping alert and persistent as you pray for all Christ's men and women."

Throughout the year we have continued in the work assigned to us at the last Annual Conference. To the best of our limited knowledge and ability, through much waiting upon God in prayer, we have sought the guidance of the Holy Spirit in every action taken. Following is a report of our actions.

- That the time of the Annual Conference Sermon be placed on Thursday evening to give more time for business during the day.
- 4. That the President and his Advisory Board be permitted to appoint the Character Committee before the Annual Session, that the character blanks be filled out and sent to the President ten days before Conference, and that the Character Committee meet on Tuesday morning of Conference week. This would make it possible for the pastors to be able to report more quickly on the floor and save considerable time.
- That all preachers and delegates to be expected to be at Conference on time and remain until the close unless excused by the Conference or the President.
- 6. That all reports which have to be referred to the Auditing and Finance Committee be made out in duplicate form, so that a report may be handed to the Auditing Committee at the beginning of the Conference Session.
- 7. That the Character Committee be enlarged by the addition of one elder and one layman.
- 8. That the first meal be served Tuesday morning so that the Committees which need to meet can meet Tuesday morning.
 - 9. That the first preaching service be Tuesday evening.

ITEM XV. A RECOMMENDATION:

On December 18, 1957, Rev. T. A. Robertson and myself journeyed to Syracuse, New York, to have a conference with Dr. Nicholson, the General President, because an appeal had been presented to Dr. Nicholson concerning Standing Resolution No. 24, which had been passed at the last annual session of the Allegheny Conference.

An atmosphere of mutual understanding prevailed as we discussed all phases of the problems involved. Being convinced that Dr. Nicholson considered Standing Resolution No. 24, as it stood, to be unconstitutional, and that since an appeal had been made, we knew that a decision would have to be rendered relative to the Resolution. Knowing that if the resolution were to be ruled unconstitutional and having on file the results of another conference which had appealed to the Board of Review when their conference was overruled in another matter, we believed that we would probably receive no different basis for action than this conference did if we appealed our case. Briefly stated the ruling was as follows: Three principles were laid down as to what an Annual Conference can do. It can: (1) By standing rule declare its opposition to worldly practices and adornment; (2) request all local churches to comply with the expressed standard adopted by vote of the conference; and (3) by disciplinary administrative processes require its ministers to comply with the resolution adopted by the conference.

Therefore, in view of all this, we felt that the best interests of the conference lay in the direction of securing as strong a resolution as possible which would be regarded without question as constitutional, backed by the General Conference President, to be presented at this annual conference session and to be voted in as a substitute for Standing Resolution No. 24. We considered this to be a much stronger position for the conference than to force the issue,

be overruled and then appeal to the Board of Review. For, when the constitutionality of a conference action is questioned, the General Conference President has no alternative than to make a decision, if no satisfactory settlement of the controversy is made. Dr. Nicholson graciously concurred with us in this and we reached what was termed a Gentleman's Agreement, so that Standing Resolution No. 24 was not declared unconstitutional. We worked together to obtain a basis upon which the Conference could accomplish the same end, and yet be without question within the bounds of constitutional law. This we believe was accomplished, and together we worked out what we consider a strong resolution which we are presenting at this conference session. This resolution has the backing of our General President who agrees with us that the ministry of the Conference is obligated to respect it and not feel that because it is based upon request it can be disregarded for upon this basis one's attitude toward the conference program may be considered as unwholesome. Thus, loyalty and integrity are involved and the one who holds a relationship to the conference is expected to be loyal to that for which the conference stands.

Therefore, we submit for your consideration the proposed substitute resolution to take the place of the present Standing Resolution No. 24. It is as follows: "In the judgment of the Allegheny Conference, viewing television programs of the type commonly offered in response to the public clamor for entertainment is an impediment to the development of holy character. We deplore the current television programs' evil effects upon the moral and spiritual life of the Nation. The principles of Wesleyan Methodism—being an epitome of the Christian religion—obligate Wesleyan Methodists to an unblameable life which constantly rebukes every form of evil and zealously advocates holiness of heart and life. Therefore, we most earnestly request our ministers and members, as those who must give account unto God in the Day of Judgment for anything which tends to influence toward evil, to refrain from the purchase of television sets and from viewing such programs for Jesus' sake.

"Inasmuch as ministers are examples and patterns to the flock of Christ, the Allegheny Conference expects each of its ministers to set a wholesome example and to be a godly pattern in this respect, so that those to whom he ministers will follow his example and avoid exposure to this which menaces vital godliness."

Here are the statements of Dr. Nicholson relative to this matter: "When a Conference adopts a resolution which respects the constitutional limitations imposed by the Discipline, the minister's responsibility toward that resolution is set forth in Paragraph 138 and Section V, subsection 4 of Paragraph 141.

"The right of the conference to supervise 'the ministry and churches within their bounds, is a constitutional right,' according to Paragraph 41 (2), subject to the limits outlined therein. Those belonging to the conference have definite obligations to the conference, as seen in Paragraphs 128, 138, 141 (character blank form) and 165, especially subparagraph 13. Thus the rights and responsibilities—neither can be independent of the other."

CONCLUSION:

Over the conference this year much material progress has been made. Buildings which were under construction last year have been completed. Some improvements have been made on other properties. Some indebtedness has been reduced while others have been incurred.

The project of the young people at Canton McKinley has made excellent progress. Our young people are to be commended for their vision, their skill in planning and the execution of their plans.

A new work at Ellwood City, Pa., under the leadership of Rev. A. H. Elsey, has been added to the Pioneer field.

Some spiritual progress has been made, numbers of revival meetings have been held and some fires kindled, yet there is room for a greater deepening. No new churches were organized this year. There is a possibility that some of the small churches will have to be closed or combined with another church if they continue to make no advance. We hate to think of the closing of any church in these days but the conference cannot continue to pour support in places that make no effort to advance.

The conference will have a loss in membership this year for the first time in twenty-seven years. The gains have not always been large but the last loss in conference membership was in 1931. Some of this present loss is due to the shifting of the population in some of the districts.

Brethren, this ought to shame and humiliate us. It ought to make our hearts bleed contrition and put us on our faces before God in humble intercession. It ought to make us tremble for the church when we consider that, after the outlay of thousands of dollars in buildings, on salaries, evangelistic efforts, campaigns, Bible schools, etc., we still have to report a loss as the outcome of the year's activity. The statistical paradox glares us out of countenance, for as one Bishop of old said concerning Methodism: "Methodism was meant to be an itinerant revival—a moving Pentecost. Into its wheels was breathed the Master's word, Go! It is not geared for standing still. Its equilibrium depends upon forward motion. It wobbles only when speed is slackened. It will topple over into the ecclesiastical scrap-pile if it stops. Therefore it must not stop." Beloved, if the soul be dying within us, what have we to legislate for? What are honors or offices worth to an army that does not win battles?

Your prayers have been appreciated; your cooperation has been wonderful; your understanding and patience have been beyond what we deserved. We are thankful and grateful for your help. Let us look forward to 1958-1959 keeping the Apostle Paul's exhortation before us: "... I beg you to live lives worthy of your high calling. Accept life with humility and patience, making allowances for each other because you love each other. Make it your aim to be at one in the Spirit, and you will inevitably be at peace with one another." (Eph. 4:1-3, Phillips).

It may appear to some that I am a blind optimist when I say that it is not too often that I think of the past. Thank God this is under the blood, and I mean to leave it there. I refuse to be burdened down with the problems of today, for God's Word says, "Cast thy burden upon the Lord, and He shall sustain thee: He shall never suffer the righteous to be moved." (Psa. 55:22) And beloved the future looks bright to me, since God has said, "Fear thou not; for I am with thee; be not dismayed; for I am thy God: I will strengthen

thee; yea, I will help thee; yea, I will uphold the with the right hand of my righteousness. Behold, all they that were incensed against thee shall be ashamed and confounded: they shall be as nothing; and they shall strive against thee and shall perish. Thou shalt seek them, and shalt not find them, even them that contended with thee; they that war against thee shall be as nothing, and as a thing of naught. For I the Lord thy God will hold thy right hand, saying unto thee, fear not; I will help thee." (Isaiah 41: 10-13) Beloved, I am happy in Him.

Someone may say, this was because of previous instruction, but I saw a young lady who came from a church that scoffed at this, pull off her rings and cry out to God, "I will mind you." And when I told her to hold steady and mind God, she said, "I have known for a long time that I should do this."

Members of the Conference, let us gird ourselves for battle, not to fight one another, just as Satan has been tempting some to do; but let us take a definite stand against sin and let us hold up the banner of Scriptural holiness everywhere we go. Amen!

REPORT NO. 4

COMMITTEE ON AUDITING AND FINANCE

Your Committee on Auditing and Finance submits the following report and recommendations:

ITEM I. WHAT SHALL THE CHURCHES PAY?

- 1. The following Denominational Budget items: Foreign Missions, \$2.00; Education, \$2.50; Pension, \$1.25; Home Missions, \$1.25; Hephzibah Orphanage, \$.25; Administrative Budget, \$.60; General Conference Travel and Entertainment, \$.20; Australia, \$.25; (these assessments are per church member per year.)
- 2. Undivided Conference Budget (Conference work) shall be equal to ten per cent of the sum obtained by adding the three following items: Pastor's salary, parsonage rent, and church incidental expenses. (To be remitted monthly) Included in church incidental expenses are: Parsonage tax, all kinds of insurance on church and parsonages; janitor services and supplies, church utilities and fuel, parsonage utilities, and fuel when paid by the church, pastor's car expense when provided by the church, all other items which are similar to or comparable with the above. Not included are repairs, replacements, improvements, evangelistic help and special projects, church and parsonage furnishings Sunday School and Church literature and similar items.
 - 3. Conference Group Life Insurance, \$.35 per member.
 - 4. Conference Entertainment, \$.45 per member.
- 5. Pioneer Self-denial envelopes for remittance of \$.30 or more monthly (above tithe) shall be given our continued support.
- 6. General Church Extension shall be encouraged through the use of the Card Call Plan in our churches.
- 7. The pastor or persons responsible for the sale of the Conference Minutes in the local church shall remit \$.75 per copy to the chairman of the

Committee on the Sale of Conference Minutes, by March 31st. The Chairman of said committee shall mail statements to all those who have not paid for their Minutes by March 31st, thus enabling the report of the Committee to be prepared by April 30th.

- 8. The above financial items, with the exception of those mentioned in paragraphs 6 and 7, shall be sent to the District Sub-treasurers. Church Treasurers are to make remittances by the 5th of each month to the credit of Conference Budget, Conference Missions, and Pioneer Fund.
- 9. Church Treasurers' reports to Quarterly Conference shall be made as of the close of the month preceding the Quarterly Conference. All church treasurers' records for the Conference year shall close April 30th. The Conference fiscal year is from May 1 to April 30.

ITEM II. WHAT SHALL THE SUNDAY SCHOOL PAY?

- 1. The first Sunday School offering of the month to the Conference Missions Fund for the use of churches not self-supporting, etc., according to the recommendations of the Conference Mission Board.
 - 2. Sunday School birthday offerings to the Conference Mission Fund.
- 3. Denominational Sunday School Budget of \$.15 per Sunday School member.
- 4. All three items above mentioned are to be paid to the local church treasurer for remittance to sub-treasurer.

ITEM III. WHAT SHALL THE CONFERENCE TREASURER PAY?

- 1. To the Conference President an annual salary of \$4.160.00
- 2. To the Conference Vice-president an annual salary of \$3,900.00
- 3. To the Pioneer Secretary an annual salary of \$3,796.00 plus \$600.00 rental allowance.
- 4. The three above named Conference officials shall also be paid or have paid for them the following items;
 - a. All utilities which include heat, light, gas, water and telephone.
 - b. The premium for Liability Insurance for their cars in the amount of \$100,000.00 which coverage they shall be required to maintain.
 - c. The cost of their Annual Social Security Assessment.
 - d. \$100.00 vacation bonus
 - e. \$1,100 travel expense with the provision that all traveling costs in excess of this amount be paid them up to the amount of 5c per mile for the mileage reported in their current reports to the Conference. This includes all traveling costs exclusive of car depreciation. We recommend that this be retroactive to cover the past year.
 - f. Funds paid to or for the Conference President and Vice-president shall be from the Conference Budget and those paid to or for the Pioneer Secretary shall be from the Pioneer Fund.
- 5. \$1.00 per hour for Secretarial Aid for Conference President and Secretary.
- 6. All expense incurred by Conference officials, Board and Committee members in the pursuit of the duties of their respective offices upon the

presentation of such expense accounts. Mileage will be paid at 5c per mile.

- 7. The following sums from the Conference Budget, in appreciation for their services; Conference Secretary, \$125.00; Conference Treasurer, \$125.00; each sub-treasurer, except West Virginia, \$60.00; West Virginia sub-treasurer, \$30.00; Group Insurance Secretary-treasurer, \$25.00; Conference Pension Plan treasurer, \$25.00; Superintendent of Rooms, \$25.00; Statistical Chairman, \$25.00; Aid Fund Treasurer, \$25.00.
- 8. The expense of the Sunday School Secretary to the National Sunday school Convention annually.
- 9. To the Superintendent of the Dining Hall, \$110.00 for his services plus \$150.00 for telephone, postage, and travelling expense, from the Conference Entertainment Fund.
 - 10. \$1,000.00 annually toward the support of the Campground caretaker.

It shall be fed from the Conference Budget and Conference Missions Fund when a surplus of \$10,000.00 each occurs in said funds at the close of each month. Exceptions to this rule may be made when deemed necessary by the Auditing and Finance Committee, and President and his Advisory Board.

ITEM VIII. BUDGET APPOINTMENTS:

1. The Conference Undivided Budget apportionment shall be as follows: Conference Budget, 89 per cent; Assistance Fund, 2 per cent; Pension Plan, 9 per cent.

ITEM IX. EXAMINATION OF AID FUND ACCOUNTS:

We have interviewed all who have loans from the Aid Fund but two who failed to appear, and who, according to the rules governing the Aid Fund, will be assessed 5 per cent for failure to renew.

We find all who have loans very cooperative in this matter. Last year's interviews have resulted in a response much greater than the payments made the preceding year. We have requested that the names of those persons having loans be not read in the Aid Fund Report next year.

CONFERENCE MISSION BOARD

June 7, 1957. The newly elected Conference Mission Board consisting of H. C. Van Wormer, Chairman; C. A. Blair, H. E. Schmul, C. A. West, A. H. Elsey, and W. A. Robbie, met in the office on the Camp Grounds and transacted the following business, after prayer by A. H. Elsey.

Voted to loan the Struthers church the amount needed to move their pastor: \$161.32

Voted to give Carrollton \$100.00 to assist in moving their new pastor. Voted to place the moving of Blue Eye, Brown Hill, Canton McKinley, and Loyal Oak in the hands of A. H. Elsey, to make arrangements.

Voted to set the Pioneer Secretary's salary as follows: \$68.00 per week,

\$50.00 per month house rent, \$1100.00 travel expense, (he to provide adequate liability insurance), all telephone expense incurred in the pioneer work.

December 20, By Telephone: Voted to grant Donald Boyd of the Blue Eye Church, \$50.00 per month aid until the church finances were better.

December 24, By Telephone: Voted to pay Sr. Pugh, the pastor at Riverview church, \$50.00 per month beginning with December, 1957, until finances improve.

REPORT NO. 9

THE CONFERENCE SUNDAY SCHOOL SECRETARY

To the members of Allegheny Conference: Greetings!

The writer to the Hebrews admonishes us in these words, "Let us therefore come boldly unto the throne of grace, that we may obtain mercy, and find grace to help in time of need." Hebrews 4:16. Thank God for the throne of grace! Think my brethren—"All that are chosen are vessels of mercy; all that are regenerated are patterns of mercy; all that are saved are monuments of

How can we hope to teach God's word and evangelize if we neglect the most important phase of soul winning—prayer? There is no doubt that any Sunday School will grow that is willing to Pray, Work and Believe God. Too many are too willing to do nothing. We need to do the Lord's work in the Lord's time; pray while God hears; hear while God speaks; believe while God promises; and obey while God commands!

The past conference year has been a busy one for many of our Sunday Schools. In spite of weather conditions and much sickness, real progress has been made. We have visited some of the churches in the interest of the Sunday School and have been in Sunday School Conventions in three districts. We want to say thank you for your cooperation and kindness through the year.

REPORT NO. 10

THE PIONEER SECRETARY

To the members of the one hundred fifteenth annual session of the Allegheny Conference, Christian greetings.

Through another year under His goodness, kindness and mercy, God has brought me to this hour. In many respects this past year, for me, has been the best for spiritual benefit. I have sought to give myself up fully to God and His will. Labors for Him and His interests have at times been taxing to the natural, and sometimes with fiery trial, but always with spiritual joy and heavenly consolation. Never once did He fail to support me. The Spirit's enabling insights to the love and mercy of God through Christ our Mediator

has broken my unthoughtful heart again and again. The remembrance of His tender dealings with me and my house through all my pilgrimage has often opened a new joy, love and delight in the blessed communion with God our Father and Jesus Christ our Saviour and Lord. In humblings before Him, my heart has been enlarged with His love, enablings have come to pray fervently for our pioneer pastors, their people, their spiritual needs and problems, even more so than in former years. This has not always been as constant as I wish it might have been, but the insights and spiritual rewards have been of such wonder that my heart is encouraged with new vigor to press the battle on. There are no misgivings in my heart as to the adequacy of the gospel of Jesus Christ for our day. Its author is the mighty God-man who now reigns above. He is as able to do for any and every heart even in this day what he has ever done in the past. Wherever He finds individuals or groups that give Him supreme place, with obedience to the blood, His work always results in the destruction of sin, and fruit unto righteousness and true holiness.

I am possessed at times, however, with fears and great forebodings, first for myself, lest I too be caught with the drift and apostasy that is on and fail God and my generation, second, for those of our constituency who are failing to improve their gospel privileges. A horror at times comes over me when I contemplate what terrible plight shall overtake those of our families and fellow-countrymen who are accepting a corrupt apostate form of gospel as a substitute for pure religion that saves the soul. I am amazed at times that in the face of these stark realities, we do not pray more fervently and persistently for a revival of the work of God in our midst and so far as providence affords.

The good benefits that come to individuals, communities and nations by regarding with obedience the holy, just and good laws of God, have been so largely made void by the nominal church. Her practical refusal to own the lordship of Christ so as to be governed by the law of the Spirit has brought near the day of judgment. It has caused the law to be slackened, and judgment, (God's view of right and wrong), to never go forth. Because of a corrupt, lawless, professing church people, sinners without the church are taught to have little or no fear in making an idol of money, pleasure or things. They have no regard for His name, nor for His holy day. They have learned from profane worshippers to have little regard for the sanctity for the home and its sacred vows. Life becomes valued less and less. The nominal professor, as well as the open sinner, must have the thrill of the speed demon at the race track even at the toll of life. To a godless generation, life becomes cheap. The sanctity of life and the human body is thrown to the winds. Life becomes soiled, coarse, and base. Truth is allowed to fall to the ground the moment it stands in the way of selfish interests and self-gratification.

The Word of the Lord that came to the prophet Habakkuk as he faithfully stood upon his prayer watch, is the word and vision that we, the professed servants of the Lord, need to hear and see for our day. As then, so now, to get God's living Word and insight for this day, is also to get the burden and Holy Ghost concern for our own slackness, the peril of our people and nation, in the light of imminent judgment. The Spirit of the world, (A spirit characterized by pride, covetousness and fleshly pleasures), which is so nearly universal, is taking its toll in the ranks of the holiness people. Thank God, in the face of this imminent judgment and widespread soul peril that hangs over those

that are caught with the spirit of this age, one may be assured with Habakkuk that the just or justified one shall live by his faith. The all-important burden of the ministry and laity should then be to see to it that we obtain, possess, and keep the faith once delivered to the saints. It is the hope, as an anchor to the soul, that is both steadfast and sure. As faithful stewards of the manifold grace of God, it becomes our privilege and responsibility to hold forth to our generation the true faith, the only grounds of hope for ourselves, our families and our generation. Let no man, puffed up with vain words, deceive us with fair imitations, easy short-cuts, and pleasing substitutes for the true faith that overcomes the world and unmistakably assures of the bright world to come.

The three, four and five day meetings I have held in the pioneer churches this past year have given opportunity to render spiritual help to those which could not have afforded an evangelist's labors. It has given me opportunity to become better acquainted with the problems of the pastor and the needs of his people and community. This has also enabled me to pray more inteligently and to carry more of a prayer burden.

The pastors and people have cooperated wonderfully with our planned schedule for the past year. I have sought to give each pastor and church under the direction of the Pioneer Department their fair share of my time and service.

The faithful, sacrificial service of the pioneer pastors of our Conference demands the prayers and grateful thanksgiving of us all. In most cases they support themselves and their families with the labors of their own hands. They give liberally of their time, prayers and money to the interest of their churches. So often they work in obscurity. They are in most cases little and unknown in the eyes of the world, but well known of God.

May God help us all to pray for our hearts to be filled again with the Pioneer spirit, for hearts that will deny self, pray and give that a New Testament revival may be forthcoming in our churches and land. Let us pray and agonize again for revival fires to be kindled in our midst and in every new advanced point of battle for souls and His Kingdom in our Conference.

OHIO CONFERENCE TAKES OVERSIGHT OF THE SHERRODSVILLE PIONEER CHURCH

Request came to investigate the possibility of organizing the Sherrods-ville Pioneer Church. It was found that eight persons qualified for full membership, and three as associates. Since the Sherrodsville Church is thirty miles south of the Allegheny Conference boundary, Rev. H. C. Van Wormer conferred with Rev. Donald Fisher, President of the Ohio Conference, concerning their disposition in the matter. The Ohio Conference manifested immediate interest in this new work. Rev. Eldon Martin, the Vice President, of the Ohio Conference, visited our pastor and church at his earliest convenience. The local congregation consented to come under the direction of the Ohio Conference.

Beckley, W. Va., project has been discontinued for the present. Some \$900.00 in cash and pledges was raised by the Southern District toward purchasing a suitable lot for a church building in the city of Beckley. Several available lots were considered, but were not thought suitable for building by the Conference trustees. Further investigations were made, but a series of

hindering providences did not permit any further development toward a work here at this time. The \$700.00 cash fund is held in reserve as a special Pioneer fund in a Bluefield bank, under the direction of the Southern District, Rev. James H. Cyphers, acting treasurer.

Rev. Emmett Coble, last September, to get needed work, accepted a position as teacher in an elementary school some seventy miles from Beckley, driving back and forth on week-ends to be with his family. This took him away from his center of operation. An opening in December came at Ashville, N.Y., and under the circumstances, the Conference felt it advisable to place Rev. Emmett Coble and his family there to fill the vacancy.

The third Southern District Wesleyan Methodist Camp Meeting which convened at Glenwood Park, Princeton, W. Va., June 25 to July 4 was signally owned of God. The Holy Ghost ministry rendered through his humble servants Rev. H. E. Robertson, Sr., Rev. T. A. Robertson, and Rev. H. Robb French has been of permanent worth in many lives of this area. The spiritual benefit to the constituency of the Southern District can hardly be overestimated. The Camp Meeting with its Holy Ghost message continues to attract the attention of many of the nominal of this territory. Its value in promoting a revival of true religion is of immeasureable worth.

The camp property road was improved with black top. The camp kitchen was furnished with new expensive equipment all for the same rent. The care taker commended the orderliness of our folk. She assured me in the presence of several others that our folk would always be desired as long as she was caretaker. This occasions much thanksgiving when one considers this day of godlessness in which we live.

Mrs. Helen Cyphers and her chosen kitchen helpers did an efficient job in serving the campers in cafeteria style. Sr. Stiltner served well as registrar. Bro. James Cyphers had everything in order for the opening. All of the pastors cooperated with their prayers and presence for the success of the Camp, encouraging their people to the battle.

Though the expenses of the three year old camp were heavier than in previous years the people were generous and sacrificial in their giving. Their obedience enabled the camp to meet its expenses with victory.

The Sunday School at Forest View, under the direction of Harry Miller, Jr., continues to go forward with good interest. For the last few months, the Sunday School has been meeting in the local community building for the rent of \$5.00 a week. There have been near 35 scholars in attendance this spring. Bro. Harry Miller, Jr., reported that several young persons sought the Lord at the close of a simple invitation after one of the morning services recently.

The three substantial wage earners of this Sunday School are placing their resources in a building fund hoping to have their own church property at a suitable time of development.

Agreeable terms were reached for the purchasing of the East Liverpool property. Pews, suitable for the present, were given by the Falconer Church. The work has made advance spiritually and numerically since a year ago. The churches of the Akron District who are contributing monthly through their District Treasurer toward the support of the East Liverpool project are rendering a real service. Bro. and Sr. McVey are sacrificial pastors. Bro.

McVey also renders sacrificial service as teacher at the Salem Bible Institute.

The Ellwood City Wesleyan Pioneer Church is a promising one. It was organized as a pioneer church just last week.

During the last Stoneboro Camp Meeting, Paul Elsey, the son of Rev. A. H. Elsey, expressed his purpose to convey this new group of folk which he had gathered, to the Conference Pioneer Department. Rev. A. H. Elsey, in cooperation with Rev. H. C. Van Wormer, and the Pioneer Department has used considerable time and expense in travel to encourage the progress of this new church. Rev. and Mrs. Joseph Miller with their three children, formerly Pilgrim pastors in the state of Indiana, have been resident pastors of this new work since its beginning in November 1957. A substantial nucleus has been gathered in the forming of this new work. A modest and neat building has been leased for the small rent of \$25.00 a month.

FUTURE PROSPECTS

The fourth South District Wesleyan Camp Meeting, if Jesus tarries, will open nine days after the close of Conference, Tuesday night, June 24, and continue through July 3, 1958. This encampment of the Southern District will be favored by the Ministry of Rev. Arthur L. Vess and the Rev. H. C. Van Wormer.

The accommodations will be the same as in former years. Lodging can be had for 30 cents per night. All meals will be given on the free-will offering plan. Each camper is expected to bring his own sheets, blankets and soap. Those who desire reservations, write to Rev. James H. Cyphers, 224 Thorn St., Bluefield, W. Va. The camp grounds are accessible by car, train, bus or plane. With our cordial welcome, we solicit your earnest prayers for a deeply spiritual Camp meeting in 1958, where souls shall find God and believers be sanctified holy.

AUTHORIZED PIONEER PROJECT PLANS IN THE SOUTHERN DISTRICT

Brown will use his own tent and be the preacher in charge under the direction of the pioneer department. Prayer is requested for this endeavor. It is desired that this endeavor shall be so directed and blessed of God that it will mean the awakening and salvation of many souls in this area of His vineyard.

RECOMMENDATIONS

We Recommend:

- 1. That prayer be offered daily for the Pioneer pastors and churches.
- That prayer be offered for the providential opening of new work with suitable pastors.
- 3. That each pastor encourage to his utmost his total membership in the participation in the 30 cents per month offering for the support of the Pioneer work of the Conference.

- 4. That there be encouragement on the part of the pastors toward a more conscientious paying of pledges made by our people in the special Pioneer offering.
- 5. That there be some time each week spent by our Pioneer pastors in house to house visitation. Wherever practicable, let a portion of scripture be read and the pastoral visit be closed with prayer.
- 6. Where deemed advisable, that a summer Bible School be conducted for the instruction of the children.
- 7. That constant prayer be made toward the precipitation of true revival in each Pioneer church.

REPORT NO. 11

REPORT OF THE SECRETARY ON EVANGELISM

Beloved brethren of the Alleghny Conference, at times we feel utterly helpless to cope with the problems of our generation. But let us not add to the problems of our day by losing faith and heart in the glorious gospel we preach. "It is still the power of God unto Salvation." There was never a day when the world needed our message more desperately than today. Our century old ministry is not finished, our message is old—yet ever new, our message is not antique. The gospel of Christ is as new and fresh as the latest headlines of the newest Sputnik. It is virile and strong and it alone is the answer to the need of our day. Any attempt to add to it only detracts from it. The world doesn't need Christ and something else, but Christ and nothing else. The "new evangelism" is diluted, emasculated and superficial. Dr. Tozer with prophetic vision said, "The swing away from popular religion is inevitable. The bogus sign your name, shake my hand, join my church crowd will be exposed for what is, religious quackery."

Men, this is no time for us to mute our message, compromise our ministry or serve expediency. We dare not sacrifice the truth that is in Jesus upon the altar of fear. Beloved, let's examine our calling. Does your call still thrill and challenge you? If not, what are you here for? Are you looking for the call to lift or do you expect God to change his mind concerning the call? I am not preaching because of family traditions or economic expediency. God laid his hand upon me, putting me in the ministry. The ordaining hand of God was laid upon me one starry night out here on this old camp ground while kneeling by an old beech log. The old beech log is gone, but the reality of the vision and the responsibility of that hour linger with me yet. The call instead of lifting is getting more intense with the passing of the days. It feels like a fire burning in my bones. And the gospel call is a fire, whose incendiary nature is expressed again and again in the lives of early apostles and holy men. We men of limited ability and education have found the inexhaustable nature of this gospel well suited to our limited resources. Its unfathomable reservoir will be our source of endless supply. The gospels we preach, brethren, is incorruptible, inexhaustible, invincible, and impregnable. This gospel is our invincible weapon. With it we can still have revival and so pull them from the fire. We are to do the work of an evangelist even in the closing hours of this dispensation. Despite the fact of perilous times we are no where admonished to throw in the sponge and head for the bomb shelters. We are to take our healing, redeeming, soul transforming gospel to the broken and bleeding, even though they spurn the overtures of mercy.

Men, let's strive to be revivalists, evangelists, prophets of the Lord. Make

it your goal to have a revival church. You need not wait for the fall meeting and the professional evangelist. Be your own evangelist. You need not wait for someone else to fight your fight or face your foe. No one knows the battle ground better than you. The Holy Ghost will show you the way to open the secret passage to Satan's seat. Pray, fast, urge your people to do the same. Set before them the goal of a revival church. Not occasionally but consistently, continually set before them the example of prayer and perfect obedience. If you have few, if any sinners at night, "dig a pit for your friends" Sunday morning. Saturate your own soul in the Word and Prayer. Tears will accomplish what broadside attacks never will. Get the fountains of your own deep pulverized and pliable. Plan and pray specifically for each Sabbath. Aim at getting some new ones saved. When you notice the tide of spiritual life ebbing, launch an attack on apathy and lethargy at once. Rally your people around the altar. Don't wait until they have drifted far beyond the shore line. Go after them while the life line will still reach them. Never tarry until their little craft is swamped and on the bottom, rush to their side and help them bail or man the pumps until complete repairs are made. In so doing you will maintain a spirit of helpfulness and mellowness in the church and create an atmosphere that is conducive to backsliders and outsiders getting to God. Confess your own weakness and failures, ask for prayer, this will not only save your soul, but will set an example that will be followed by the spiritual element and simultaneous build a fire under those who are slow to obedience.

The only salvation in sight for the holiness movement is to get the bush on fire. The limbs and branches are becoming roosting places for all kinds of lazy larvae and pusillanimous parasites. It is impossible for bossy buzzards and fussing fungi to build comfortable nests in or on our church branches if the bush is on fire. Worldly worms and beautiful butterflies will look for another location when the bush is a flame of fire. Brethren, it is a useless battle fighting to keep the world, the flesh and the devil out of the church when the fire is going out of the various branches of the church. You may squirt it with legislation, spray it with reformation, or take a portion and try and graft it anew some place else but it will never work. The infection in the old bush will soon break out in the new unless it is fire baptized. The only safeguard for the bush is to have every root, shoot, branch, limb, twig and leaf bathed in fire of the Holy Ghost. When the entire shrub is on fire, the fire will be its protection, no substitutes will be needed. When the woods is on fire, all the skunks, snakes, bugs and beetles head for the open road. It is that visitation of fire that will save us from a fate similar to some other bushes that are much larger and stronger than we.

It is a natural law as well as spiritual law, it takes fire to set fire. Brethren, we cannot hope to set the woods on fire, we cannot expect to set the bush on fire unless our own little shrub is on fire. Will we tarry for the fire of the Holy Ghost?

REPORT NO. 12

THE SECRETARY OF EDUCATION

In order to deal with a subject so important and so vital to economic and

spiritual success today, let us first consider the meaning of the term "education." In a general sense, education is the acquiring of knowledge. In this sense, communists may be educated. The atheist and agnostic may be educated. According to scripture, however, "the fear of the Lord is the beginning of wisdom." MacLaurin says that "the end of education is to fit men to deal with the affairs of life honestly, intellectually, and efficiently." Thwing says, "The supreme purpose of education is to equip the student for life." Professor Burton says that "by education we mean all of the processes within and without our institutions of learning by which personality is developed." Knowledge is not virtue as some hold today. Someone has said, "An educated fool is the greatest fool." We cannot deny that a crook who is educated is a more dangerous crook. In view of these facts, we must conclude that education which does not lead man to Christ is dangerous. Since Jesus Christ is the foundation of real life, then education in its true meaning must not only develop the mind in avenues that are secular, but must also instruct the soul in the ways of life that are spiritual. As we consider this vital subject, let us observe three aspects which I trust will enlighten our minds and quicken our hearts in the realm of true or spiritual education. We shall observe first the purpose of Christian education, second, the plight of modern education, and third, the possibilities in the field of education.

It is evident that much of the failure in this field may be charged to the lack of vision concerning its importance. Before Jesus sent His disciples out as world evangelists he first said, "Look on the field"-get your eyes opened—view the need. In regard to education, so important was this phase of life among the Jews that God did not delegate the responsibility to others. He said to parents, heads of families, and Hebrew leaders, "Thou shalt teach thy children." There is such a thing as education, or culture that limits one's vision and develops a selfish, self-centered life. One may acquire knowledge in order to increase his own pleasure, enlarge his own resources, or expand his own interests. Christian education teaches self-denial instead of self indulgence. Someone has said, "The worst education which teaches self-denial is better than the best which teaches everything else and not that." Then, too, the importance of the subject is seen in the nature of material with which we work. Here we are not working with wood or stone. We work with humanity-personality-immortal souls. Daniel Webster said, "If we work with marble, it will perish; if we work upon brass, time will efface it; if we rear temples, they will crumble into dust, but if we work upon immortal minds, if we fill them with principles, with the just fear of God and love of our fellowmen, we engrave on these tablets something which will brighten to all eternity.

In the second place, let us consider the perils of today's system of education. Since our time is brief, we will sum these into three categories: namely, intellectual perils, social perils, and spiritual perils. By intellectual perils we include the dangers which arise in actual class-room life. Among the many dangers in this group, the most subtle and perhaps the most detrimental is the influences of communism. Many of our high schools and colleges are being infested with communistic leaders whose primary motive is not to teach children, but by subtle and deceptive methods they seek to inject into the minds and hearts of their pupils, the principles of com-

munism. In order to accomplish this, these wolves in sheep clothing endeavor to undermind our own form of government and to exalt communism as a government which is super and superior. The social problems of youth today are many. Influences which occur outside the class-rooms seek to rob of all that is spiritual, and draw young people away from God. The spiritual perils are varied. In order to understand a little of these perils. let us note some of the conditions of this day. Last Christmas many schools would not allow the singing of songs which refer in any way to the observances of the holiday season, and in some schools the children were taught the modern Rock and Roll to replace the traditional Christmas Carols. In some states, laws have since been enacted prohibiting religious holiday observances this year. In the state of New Jersey it is not only against the law for school children to return thanks before eating, but even to bow the head for two minutes of silent meditation is prohibited. The high court of the state of New Jersey refers to the Ten Commandments in worldly terms by saying, "Taboo with the Ten Commandments." It declares further that these commandments are both unreasonable and unsafe as a guide of life and will have no place in the schools of that state. In the city of Milwaukee there will be no more baccalaureate sermons because, since this is a religious service, some of the graduates cannot take part and, therefore, the schools will tolerate nothing that is spiritual or religious. In some Ohio schools dancing is being taught as low as the 3rd grade. In a Pennsylvania school a woman teacher dispensed of the studies and taught a group of boys to gamble with playing cards in the back of the school room while other students looked on. These are only a few of the many influences which are advanced by anti-God groups who have aspired to positions of leadership and are robbing our youth of the worth-while ideals of life.

Finally, the question which naturally suggests itself to our thinking is, "What are the possibilities in this phase of American life?" To this question there is only one answer, and that is found in Jesus Christ. Christian education is the hope of our nation. If our people grow up in succeeding generations without the permeating and saving influences of Divine truth in their hearts and lives, we will become increasingly materialistic, unbelieving, immoral, selfish, hard, and lost to the true principles of holy character. In the kindergarten and first grade we must start our children in a school that is spiritual. Christian day schools and Christian colleges should throb at the very heart beat of American life. No nation could remain Christian whose youth is being taught by non-christian and even anti-God leaders. Let us heed the commands of the scriptures and see that our children are educated in the true sense of the term.

In conclusion, since Christian education is the hope of our nation, let us pray that God will raise up Christian leaders in this field and that schools which are truly Christian will be available for our youth. Let us pray that Christian Day schools will be opened throughout our conference and nation in order to provide such education for our children, and let us support such schools with our prayers and our means.

MODERN TIME HERALD — EXTRA EXTRA EXTRA!! LATEST EDITION: CHILDREN LOST! WORST CATASTROPHE IN HISTORY — TRAGEDY COULD HAVE BEEN AVERTED!!!!

While fathers and mothers stood idly by—too busy with the cares of life or often too neglectful—and the Church was fast asleep; many children and teen-agers were lost and others are still perishing in the awful Modern Maelstrom of sin.

The scene of the disaster is almost beyond description. Many boys and girls caught are trapped under the influence of television and the movies; which leave their minds foggy and dizzy with the spirit of make-believe and unreality; until actually some have committed cold-blooded murder. Others are left stranded with baby-sitters that need watching themselves. Many, many more are giddily rocking and rolling their way to a devil's hell while their ma and pa helps beat time to the senseless music of the Rock 'N Roll.

"Crazy Kids in a Crazy world" or should it more properly be said: "Poor disillusioned children with no one to safely pilot them over the rough sea of life."

Cause of the tragedy is due mostly to the pace of American living-no time to bother with the kids-let them shift for themselves. Oh-Lazy indulgent parents, Oh-sleepy dead church.

The saddest thing about the tragedy is not many seemed concerned enough to help the boys and girls, they could view these shocking scenes of spiritual disaster and suffering with dry eyes and prayerless hearts. Many of the boys and girls could have been saved—if parents and the church would have been on the alert.

If we would read this article in a daily newspaper where children would have literally perished in some terrible tragedy and parents and church-members would have stood idly by and witnessed the scene, almost everyone with an intelligent mind would have been shocked and horrified at such carelessness and negligence, but spiritually speaking we can see these same spiritual tragedies happen every day and are apparently unmoved.

Here is some authentic information for J. Edgar Hoover, director of the F. B. I. in his reports and analysis on Juvenile Delinquency. QUOTE:

"Juvenile Delinquency in the twenties and thirties in general meant such things as truancy, minor vadalism, and petty theft. Today, the term Juvenile Delinquency encompasses armed robbery, assault and murder.

"The American citizen does not require a sheaf of statistics to inform him that a scourge of juvenile delinquency blights our national life. Even the most cursory glance at any daily paper will enlighten him on that score. But even the stories reflected in the papers cannot give the full picture of the extent of delinquent activity on the part of the juveniles. Recorded statistics measure only a portion of it. Juvenile delinquency is on the increase.

"Broken homes have been a major factor contributing to delinquent behavior. No respect for those in authority. A decline in religion that man is God-centered and responsible for his thoughts and behavior to a High Power as well as to his fellow man." He further states some things that can be done about Juvenile Delinquency. Give children 'chores' or something to do; a return to religion, the real worship of God, and provide a wholesome home atmosphere for them.

Are the children worth it? Let's heed what the Master said about a little child:

"Whosoever therefore shall humble himself as this little child the same is greatest in the kingdom of heaven."

"And whose shall receive one such little child in my name receive th me." Matt. 18:4, 5.

Shall we accept the challenge, and do our best for the children of this generation?

BURIAL ASSOCIATION SECRETARY

In 1929, in response to the widespread need for a plan by which the Church could give financial aid to Wesleyan Methodist homes stricken by the death of a loved one, the Wesleyan Burial Association was organized. Its worth was quickly recognized and applications for membership were received from all parts of the denomination. The Association's membership is approximately 1900 persons, representing every conference. It operates as a recognized and approved part of the general program of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America.

Its membership is open to all members of the Wesleyan Methodist Church, their husbands, wives, and minor children.

The entrance fees are as follows:

From six months to 20 years\$	1.00
20 years to 30 years	2.00
30 years to 40 years	5.00
40 years to 45 years	10.00
45 years to 50 years	25.00
50 years to 55 years	50.00
55 years to 60 years	75.00

Upon the death of a member of this Association an assessment of \$.20 shall be levied upon each member. A notice is sent out each time five deaths have occurred.

The benefits now being paid is \$300.00.

The exact membership of the conference is not known as the reports at conference time are incomplete, however, we have shown a good gain this year.

REPORT NO. 15

TITHING SECRETARY'S REPORT

II Corinthians 9:7, "Every man according as he purposeth in his heart, so let him give; not grudgingly, or of necessity: for God loveth a cheerful giver."

Giving of our means is as much a part of worship as singing, preaching, and prayer. Yet, there is often a sigh of endurance rather than joy of anticipation when offerings are taken in our churches. In a large measure we seem to have lost the blessing which should attend the bringing of our tithes and offerings into the storehouse. Of course, one cannot expect blessing if he is putting his tithe elsewhere than his local church which is the storehouse. To reason otherwise would be as foolish as to purchase groceries in one store and cross the street to the competitor to pay for them! Many folks appear very liberal when spreading their tithes around, but the church, and not the individual, is the steward or dispenser of the tithe.

Our attitude will determine the amount of blessing we receive from paying our tithe. One has as much right to get blessed during the offering as any other part of the service; yes, the easiest finances have been raised when the blessing of the Lord rested on the people.

It is not that we must, as some seem to think, 'help the Poor Lord out' for He owns the cattle on a thousand hills, but He is pleased by this expression of our obedience and love.

The tithe, ten per cent, is just the minimum and God may lead to give more. He never asks us to empty our pocketbooks, but what He fills our heart with His rich blessing. There is a danger in this day of being careful to provide for ourselves with insurance policies and pension plans of becoming a legal ten-per center and lose the blessing of giving.

In treating this subject, we should guard against leaving the false impression that paying one's tithe is an insurance policy for health and security: Our full obedience to God is the basis of our security and paying the tithe is a part of that obedience. Fulfilling one's stewardship obligations makes for solid ground for faith.

The record reveals a loss in number of tithers this year. Of the 3,479 full members, 2,391 are reported as tithers. Let each pastor and local secretary instruct and enlist each member in the storehouse plan. Let emphasis be laid upon the privilege as well as the duty of tithing.

We cannot long receive benefits for which we do not pay. If the high percentage of churches which do not pay this budget item is not definitely reduced the only alternative will be to ask for an increase in the present budget rates which is 35c per church member per year. We kindly solicit the cooperation of every pastor in this important matter.

REPORT NO. 25

RESOLUTIONS

RESOLUTIONS: Your Committee on Resolutions submits the following report.

BE IT RESOLVED:

- 1. That by adopting this report, we as a Conference, re-affirm the historic stand of the church in matters of Christian doctrine and practice. Thus may we encourage our people to adhere, not from sense of staid, cold duty, but from a heart abounding in fervent love for God and a passion for holiness, to the General and Special Rules of our Discipline, especially as they regard the matters of dress, Sabbath observance, parental authority, and holy things. In as much as these things are important to the maintaining of our witness, may our ministry give itself to the preaching of the doctrine of holiness to maintain the heart relationship of our people to God in these matters.
- 2. That we re-affirm our love and our loyalty to our beloved denomination by praying for its leaders; and that we resolve to express our appreciation for the officials of our conference and the standards which they maintain by praying for them, and by declaring our stand to be with them, and further; that we pledge ourselves, when seeking their council, not to everburden them with the trivial.

- 3. That we engage ourselves earnestly in the task of reaching and leading our youth into a definite experience of salvation, and further that we encourage them, as soon as it is practical and wise to unite with the church. Since the losses to our church are tremendous among our teen age young people, let us endeavor by all proper means to engage their talents and abilities in the service of God and the church, thus creating in them a feeling of responsibility for the church.
- 4. That since the divorce evil is one of the great curses of our land, a corruption to the morals of our youth, and a destroyer of our homes, therefore we deem it essential to preach against this great evil, and that we go to the head of the stream and instruct our youth in the sanctity of marriage.
- 5. That since we recognize the religious motion picture to be an evil, and not consistent with God's divine plan for the presentation and propagation of the Gospel of Jesus Christ; and since we recognize that its use in our churches would supplant deep spiritual worship, we urge that our churches and pastors refuse their endorsement, and to refrain from using them in the churches of our Conference.
- 6. That we recognize that television as presently operated is an evil, a destroyer of the sanctity of our homes and a definite hindrance to spiritual life and growth. We therefore urge our people to refrain from the use and ownership of television sets.
- 7. That we urge our people, through the preaching and example of our ministry, to maintain the family altar as a spiritual institution in our homes, to practice the grace of systematic fasting and to engage themselves in deeper prayer lives issueing forth in bleeding intercession, motivated by fervent love for God and a burning passion for souls.
- 8. That since there is a rapid population shift to some of the industrial areas of our conference from the farm and coal regions, we recommend that our pastors keep each other informed of those who move from area to area from our Sunday Schools and churches.
- 9. That we maintain our guard against the modernistic bias reflected in many passages of the Revised Standard Version of the Bible and in much of the "Interpreter's Bible."
- 10. That since we recognize Communism to be a subtle, Godless influence, and that the present trends to a welfare state are opening wedges in our nation to its supplanting our democratic way of life—be it resolved:
- a. That our ministers and church leaders warn our people through the preached Word and the printed page of the subtle approach, Satanic origin, and destructive results of this political philosophy.
- b. That we recognize our solemn obligation to pray for the President of our Nation and the committees of Congress who are engaged in opposing this Communistic infiltratation in our American system, and further, that God will grant them wisdom and courage to fight this evil.
- 11. Where as we recognize the continued advancement of the Roman Catholic system in numerical strength and political power in our nation, schools and local governments and that since we recognize this constitutes a menace to free government, freedom of worship, and conscience if it should gain a majority position, be it therefore resolved:

- a. That the ministry of the Conference warn the people in our Sunday Schools and churches concerning the prevalent practices of the Roman Church.
- b. That we resist Romanism with Christian grace, and by zealous evangelism in our communities glean the unsaved lest they become the prey of the present advance of Romanism.
- c. That we endeavor, by the persuasion of the Holy Spirit through the Gospel, to lead, through love, as many adherents of the spurious faith to Christ as possible.
- d. That we warn the youth of our churches about the dangers of marriage with those who are adherents to the Roman church.
- 12. That we recognize crime comic books and pulp magazines, which depict violence, sadism, brutality, and blood lust unparalled in the history of children's literature of any time or nation, to be a contributing factor to the present delinquency problem. We therefore urge our people to war against this evil wherever practicable by withholding patronage from those engaged in the distribution of these tools of Satan and by reproving and rebuking them with Christian love.
- 13. That we declare ourselves as supporting action which would encourage the instruction in our public schools of Christian principles as they regard character and conduct. Therefore, we urge our ministers and parents to unite and, by all ethical means, seek to improve the moral character of our youth through the boards of education, offices of superintendent and principal, faculties, and Parent Teachers Associations. And be it further resolved: that we endeavor to arouse our constituency to support, by prayer and other methods, Christian day schools which adhere to Bible principles and standards, and which are sane and consistent in Biblical interpretation and Christian experiences.
- 14. That these resolutions together with the standing resolutions be read on each charge at the first quarterly meeting following the distribution of the Conference Minutes.

REPORT NO 3

W. M. S. PRESIDENT'S REPORT—1957-1958

This has been a very busy year with greater and more subtle attacks of the enemy to face than ever before in the past. Yet in spite of his opposition we have seen many blessed victories of Divine intervention.

As all spiritual individuals realize, we are living in a time of apostasy, compromise, worldliness and drift which is affecting every missionary as well as every Holiness Church or Denomination in the home land. Because of this we are facing problems and forces of darkness which we never knew about a few years ago. Missionary endeavor is at a crisis as well as that of the home church and the great question that faces all is, will we stand true to old-fashioned holiness standards as taught by the Bible and our early leaders or shall we let down, condone and finally even participate ourselves in those things that once God saved us from and called us to separate from when we came out of the world and became His children, called unto holiness and a life free from sin and worldliness. We must—we will make this choice—we are even now making it and by so doing our destiny will be sealed.

Some are already suffering for standing for the old-fashioned way not only from the world that has lost its respect and fear of Christianity since it has lost its power but more keenly from the very church to which they belong and to which they have given their lives and service.

There is no alternative—either we must face suffering, persecution and misunderstanding here or lose grace and God out of our lives and finally meet His wrath hereafter. These may seem like hard words, but we can find no altering in God's Eternal Word and Way of Truth.

Consequently, this brings the all important question into the matter of missions. Whom can we support? How far can we go in the program that once was spurned by Holiness people? There is so much sham, so much lightness, shallowness and liberality in both the home churches and the missionary activities today. Only God can give us the Divine answer to these questions, but it behooves us to be ready to follow the leading of the Spirit and God's Word at any cost.

There are two attitudes we may take, both of which are wrong. First.

we may fall in with everything and "follow the leader" so to speak, and do all that is suggested or promoted no matter what we were formerly taught or how we were convicted by the Lord in the beginning of our Christian Experience. Or else we may become critical, bitter and selfish, throw up our hands and do nothing, shift our responsibilities and refuse to support missions at all.

No matter what we do we cannot get away from the Great Commission, "Go ye into all the world . . . " We must go, or if we cannot go in person, we must send of our substance and pray the Lord of the Harvest to send out reapers and save souls.

Let us be careful then not to deviate from the will of the Lord. Let us hold steady, not scatter our means where we have no knowledge or assurance of what they are doing, but let us get back of our own spiritual missionaries, pray, pay and push them to victory and soul winning. They have the same battle we have plus first hand contact with the powers of heathen darkness. They need us and they must have our backing to succeed. As long as we are allowed to select our missionaries to support we need have no question of what is right to do.

Needless to say, our hearts are heavy and burdened as we hear some are taking the attitude last mentioned and are getting careless and indifferent to the need of whole heartedly supporting missions. God forbid we would misjudge any, but the loss of membership, subscriptions to the magazine and a falling away of some societies makes us fear the enemy is doing his best to throw over us a blanket of indifference and unconcern. May the Lord keep us from this sin, stir our hearts to the eleventh hour effort to snatch lost souls from eternal burning. Soon we cannot work. Oh, sisters, let us shake ourselves, throw off our lethargy and excuse-making and work for souls and missions as we will wish we had when we meet our Lord at the Judgment Bar. Like Judah of old, let us ask ourselves conscientiously the question, "how shall I go up to my father, and the lad (the lost for which I am responsible) be not with me?" Gen. 44:34.

It is true financial conditions are serious. We do not have the money we had last year. This calls for greater sacrifices, the like of which most of us do not yet know. However, Scripture promises that if we cast our bread upon the waters it will in due time return to us.

Again, as the widow daily gave of her meal and her cruse of oil the supply failed not. May the Lord help us never to grow selfish nor stingy toward His cause and the work of souls.

Also, we admit that it is harder these days to get folk interested in missions, harder to get members when there are so many things in the world to detract their attention from spiritual things. Still we believe that if we truly pray, faithfully work and keep the fire on our souls some honest hearts, yes, many more than we think, will be attracted to join the ranks of the Lord. According to God's Word He has ordained that it is by the "foolishness of preaching" that souls are saved. So let us not be deceived into thinking that religious movies, or the showing of slides, or any kind of social program will in any way replace the effectiveness of the simple preaching of the gospel. Instead, these things will detract and hinder the Spirit's working and deep

spirituality. Our only hope is in standing by the Word and plan of God. That and that only will produce the right results—the transforming of lives from the bondage of sin and Satan to become new creatures in Christ Jesus.

As we mentioned in the beginning, this has been a busy year. Missionary activities commenced soon after conference by the Area Convention, held July 23, 25, at West Chazy Campground, West Chazy, N. Y. Five delegates were sent to represent our conference: Erma Blair, Eunice Comadoll, Elda Bence, Helen Kuhn, and Muriel Terpe. We were requested to send a poster to the convention on the theme, "Conquered to Conquer." Mrs. Eileen Bell, from Canal Society, kindly consented to make such a poster. Naturally we were pleased and grateful to the Lord and Sister Bell that her poster received first place.

The Campmeeting missionary services were owned of God. Though the first two prayer meetings had the smallest attendance we remember of seeing for many years, they were excellent services. At these two services the Area Convention delegates gave inspiring reports of the Convention. We almost felt we had been there. After this our missionaries began to appear and our services were crowded with speakers: the Wm. Davises, Rev. and Mrs. Henry Ortlip, Rev. and Mrs. W. N. Saunders, Rev. and Mrs. J. L. Landrey and several home missionaries. Rev. and Mrs. Davis gave stirring messages at the annual camp missionary service.

The fall missionary tour began early September 15th, with Miss Orie Spaulding a returned missionary from Africa, touring quite thoroughly the four large districts up to November 25th. Rev. and Mrs. Wm. Saunders kindly consented to visit the entire West Virginia District from October 8 to 18. From these visits we heard good reports and results.

Rev. and Mrs. Wm. Davis and family—field conventions or separate church services within the four Districts from December 15-29. These were also well received and beneficial.

January 28, 1958, Mrs. Ruby Dunn organized a Society at Salem with 20 members, 9 active and 11 honorary. We heartily welcome this new society and pray God will richly bless and use it.

This made us 100 Societies, but now we are sorry to say we are going back to 99 at the close of conference as Sherrodsville, being in that area. has gone to the Ohio Conference. We greatly regret this loss which throws out to us the challenge for greater endeavor for the coming year, for surely it is not the Lord's will that we decrease in numbers.

To fulfill the work of the year, we sent out 7 circular letters and regular correspondence amounting in all to over 800 pieces of mail.

Our Standard of Efficiency Rating for this year is 86%; for the quadrennium 90%. (According to General Conference ruling these three years close our quadrennium because of the proximity of our conference date to the General Conference Session the same year.)

Gratefully we thank you all for your patience and cooperation throughout the year. With renewed zeal, enlarged vision and earnest endeavor let us go forward to "possess the land" for "all that the soles of your feet shall tread upon," or all that your arm of faith shall claim, shall be yours.

REPORT NO. 4

COMMITTEE ON PROGRAM AND PLAN OF WORK

WE RECOMMEND:

- 1. That the first meeting after conference each local society hold an installation service which includes the outline of the work and consecration for their office.
- 2. a. That the program and plan of work be read and discussed as soon as the minutes are received.
- b. That we urge the president of each new society to refer to those as a reminder during the year.
- 3. a. That each society endeavor to hold a public monthly meeting, praying for those requests found in the WESLEYAN MISSIONARY and stress be placed upon personal evangelism including children, adolescents, the aged, and with special emphasis upon the Jew. That each one feel a personal responsibility to bring at least one soul to Christ during the year.
- b. That our District Holiness Convention, where possible observe a missionary service.
- 4. a. That we urge our societies to carry out the Prayer Partner Plan, and keep in touch with our Home and Foreign Mission field, thereby bringing first hand knowledge to our societies. Reports to be sent to Conference Prayer Partner Secretary, Mrs. Mary Huntsman, 838 Green Ave., S. W., Massillon, Ohio, by Sept. 1.
- b. That a service, early in the conference year, be given to the local Prayer Partner Secretary for enlisting prayer partners and encouraging prayer.
- c. That, where possible each society participate in the Womens World Fellowship, meeting in twos or threes as convenient each Tuesday morning to pray for women around the world.
- 5. a. That each society have an aggressive solicitor for the WES-LEYAN MISSIONARY, whose duty it shall be to report all subscriptions to the district solicitor, send a quarterly report to the conference solicitor, Mrs. Evangeline Hannold, and strive to place the magazine in each home of the church and Sunday School. January to be observed as subscription month.
- b. When sending in subscriptions always be sure to identify your church by its number and conference letter, Al, as published in the Conference Minutes.
- 6. a. That all society officers and delegates to annual conference be members of the Wesleyan Methodist Church. We also recommend that Conference Society Members be members of the Wesleyan Church and their local Wesleyan Missionary Society.
 - b. That each local society have a nominating committee if possible.
- c. That since the retiring president is Acting President during the Conference Session, we suggest that the society send her to the Conference and elect the new president as delegate, assuming the expense for transportation.
- d. That each society instruct their delegate how much to pledge at the public missionary service. Unless otherwise specified pledges will be divided one-third for Home and two-thirds for Foreign Missions.

- 7. a. That each society use the designated study book, also urge the use of the program calendar and other helps. That we encourage our members to follow the Missionary Reading Course as recommended by General Conference. All literature to be obtained from the W. M. S. Literature Department, Houghton, N. Y.
- b. That each society have a program committee varying once a quarter. We suggest that the president act as chairman of said committee.
- 8. That each society be urged to respond to the Card Call Plan and thus assist in the Extension Program of the Church. All Card Call money to be sent to: "Home Missionary Department, Rev. H. K. Sheets, Secretary, 124 W. 39th St., Marion, Indiana, and stubs to be sent to Mrs. Neva Golden with the statistical blank. This not to apply on budget.
- 9. That we, when requested, send program suggestions, Sunday School Literature, flannelgraph materials and used Christmas Greeting cards to our Foreign Missions, Mountain Missions, Hephzibah Orphanage and Indian Missions. Bandages for home and foreign, when required. These to be held until a new address at Marion, Indiana is established. (Note: Bandages should be cut two to four inches wide, sewed twice in a flat seam in ten yard lengths and tightly rolled. Rolls should not exceed 3 inches in diameter. Number of pounds to be reported as Items of Interest on Annual Statistical Blank.)

That the number of boxes of used clothing sent to home missions be reported on the Statistical Blanks under Items of Interest. No monetary value to be placed thereon.

- 10. That the Red Letter Days as given in the Program Calendar be observed where possible. That Easter and April Self-Denial offerings be used for Home Missions, and Penny-a-Meal offerings be used for Foreign Missions.
- 11. a. That, where possible, each society have a Mercy and Help Committee, whose duty it shall be to visit the sick and needy and give aid where necessary, and send flowers and greeting cards to shut-ins.
- b. That we encourage the giving of special remembrance gifts as recommended by General Conference for the promotion of definite missionary work as living tribute to the memory of deceased loved ones, instead of the usual extravagant floral tribute.
- 12. a. That we put forth a special effort to secure every woman in the church as a member of the society, or bring about a 10 per cent gain in membership.
 - b. That the month of September be designated as membership month.

REPORTS

- 13. That the delegates credentials be sent at least two weeks before conference to the Conference Wesleyan Missionary Secretary, Mrs. Eunice Comadoll, R. D. 2, Utica, Pa.
- 14. That statistical Blanks with all vouchers not sent to the Sub-Treasurer, and statements, both for local church work, and "Other Objects" grouped together be sent with an itemized list attached to receipts and WITH SUFFI-CIENT POSTAGE, at least by May 15 to the Statistical Chairman, Mrs. Neva Golden, 1431½ E. Main St., Reynoldsville, Pa.

- 15. That local missionary treasurers keep a record of all money paid in pledges and report the amount on each pledge, at least two weeks before Conference to the Conference W. M. S. Treasurer, Miss Elda Bence, Marion Center, Pa.
- 16. That the report of the Reading Course Secretary be sent to Mrs. Muriel Terpe, 20 South 13th St., Indiana, Pa., Conference Secretary of the Mission Reading Course, by January 15, if possible.

FINANCIAL

- 17. That forty cents be raised for each active member for Conference entertainment and sent to the Sub-Treasurer before the books close, April 30.
- 18. That each society be assessed \$.25 per active member for General Conference Administrative Fund. This is not a budget item.
- 19. That each society contribute five dollars or more annually for the support of Hephzibah Home, the same to be applied on budget.
- 20. That each society contribute three dollars or more annually to the Medical Student Fund. This not to apply on budget.
- 21. That we endeavor to raise one-quarter of the church educational budget. This is to include the L.S.U. pledges.
- 22. That one dollar dues be paid by all members, active and honorary. That said dues be sent, UNDIVIDED, through the local church treasurer, to the Sub-treasurer. The sub-treasurer shall divide them thus: .25 Foreign Missions, .25 Home Missions, and .50 dues. All monies to be sent in at least quarterly.

STANDARD OF EFFICIENCY FOR LOCAL SOCIETIES

- 1. That the Efficiency Standard be read in the society the first monthly meeting after conference (5 per cent credit) and that arrangements be made with the pastor for one missionary prayer meeting each month (5 per cent credit)
- 2. That a minimum of ten meetings be held during the year at which time prayer requests are presented and remembered and business transacted. (5 per cent credit), and at least one public meeting. (5 per cent credit)
- 3. The formation of one or more Prayer Partner Circles in each society with a Prayer Partner Secretary, who shall report the names of same to Conference Prayer Partner Secretary within sixty days after the sitting of Annual Conference.
- 4. That the President, Secretary, Treasurer, and the equivalent of seventy-five per cent of the active membership be subscribers to THE WESLEYAN MISSIONARY.
- 5. That a Solicitor be elected for THE WESLEYAN MISSIONARY, gaining not less than two subscriptions a year.
- 6. That a Delegate be elected to the Annual Conference Woman's Missionary Society and that she be instructed by local society regarding the amount to be pledged by that society at the Annual Conference session (5 per cent credit) and that the President attend the annual Conference session. (5 per cent credit)
- 7. That the dues, one dollar per member, be sent directly to the Conference Treasurer, fifty cents of which shall be divided by her as specified and applied on budget, (5 per cent credit), and that all monies and vouchers be sent to the Conference treasurer at least quarterly. (5 per cent credit)
- 8. That we secure every woman in the church as a member of the Society, or achieve a ten per cent gain in total membership.
- 9. That each local society pay annually an amount equal to twenty-five cents per active member to be used as a General Administrative Fund, not to apply on budget.
- 10. That the local Y. M. W. B. Superintendent be seated in the Annual session and be granted the privilege of speaking, and provision be made by her society for such representation. (10 per cent credit shall be given for each of the above items, and all societies making a grade of eighty per cent shall be placed on the Honor Roll.)

That we, as parents, faithfully instruct our children concerning the plan of salvation, urging them to obtain a personal experience, knowing that this will create in them the desire to follow Bible standards.
- c. That we encourage our children to use their own Bible, and have a regular system of memorizing scripture in the home. Psa. 119:11.
- d. That we pray faithfully for our children in school, that they may reject any erroneous teachings presented and be careful in choosing their friends and associates. That we urge parents to take a firm stand against the immodest dress and evil practices of the modern athletic and music programs.
- 7. a. That we abstain from all worldly amusements, including the theater, the dance, cards, unwholesome radio programs, etc. That we abstain from reading or allowing our children to read comic books and other unwholesome magazines and books, and that we provide wholesome literature for our children.
- b. That since modern mixed bathing is conducive to loose morals, we urge parents to refrain from visiting and permitting their children to visit, such places of questionable amusement.
- c. That we abstain from all Sabbath desecration such as buying Sunday newspapers, pleasure riding, visiting, reunions, buying, etc. Isaiah 58:13, 14. Also that we refrain from patronizing establishments open on the Sabbath Day.
- d. That we urge our people to refrain, where it is in their power, from having television sets in the home realizing that television is an evil influence, and will mean the loss of the soul if one indulges in looking at it.

- 8. a. That we who are mothers tell our children the true story of life and instruct them in the care of their bodies before they start school in order that they may hold these truths sacred and be prepared to withstand the low moral standards of this day.
- b. That we parents be companions to our children, and provide for them wholesome recreation frequently, and as far as possible know where they are and what they are doing at all times. Also, that mothers carefully select their "baby-sitters" since there is so much immorality prevalent today.
- 9. a. That we uphold by precept and example modesty of dress, as becometh holiness, by which we mean wearing dresses half-way between the knee and ankle, with long sleeves and modest neckline, which things accompany purity and deep spirituality. I Tim. 2:9, 10. Also that we adhere to Deut. 22:5, "The woman shall not wear that which pertaineth unto a man—for all that do so are an abomination unto the Lord thy God."
- b. That we refrain from the wearing of jewelry, which includes brooches and all other ornaments. Isa. 3. Also that we do not wear nude shades of hose, toeless and heelless shoes, or hats which display flowers, veiling, and other superfluous adornments. Furthermore, we urge our women to wear hose and dress modestly in the home, that we may be examples of modesty to those who approach our doors.
- c. That we do not adhere to the worldly style of cutting or curling the hair, or the long bob, I Cor. 11:15. Also we believe with John Wesley on the Scripture, I Tim. 2:9, that "broidered hair" means curled hair.
- d. That we also dress our boys and girls modestly. Not permitting our boys to go without shirts, to wear shorts or sheer shirts, and that our girls wear long hose, and not be allowed to wear sheer blouses, shorts or slacks.
- 10. That we urge the avoidance of unnecessary debts, and the neglecting of long standing bills.
- 11. a. That as far as possible, we refrain from patronizing establishments selling intoxicating beverages, and also that we discourage the use of tobacco in all its forms since we greatly detest the use and effect of both. II Cor. 7:1.
- b. We urge that our children be given early scientific instruction on the evils of tobacco and alcohol.
- c. That we be patriotic by displaying the American Flag in observing national holidays, thereby honoring God who gives us freedom and liberty.
- 12. That the resolutions be read in each society semi-annually, that all members be kept informed by the proposed attainments and requirements.
