All churches whose REGULAR Sunday School offerings and REGULAR church tithes and offerings do exceed \$150.00 per week shall remit 7%.

All churches whose REGULAR Sunday School offerings and REGULAR church tithes and offerings do exceed \$150.00 per week shall remit 9%.

The receipts shall be apportioned as follows:

65% for the Conference Operating Fund.

20% for the Conference Extension Fund.

8½% for the Camp Meeting Fund.

4% for the Conference Youth Work.

Journal of Daily Proceedings

The One hundred and twelfth session of the Indiana Annual Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America, convened on the Fairmount Campground, Fairmount, Indiana, at 7:30 p.m. August the 8th, 1960.

Resolutions and Laws

I. CHURCHES—

A. Houses of Worship:

Our houses of worship should not be open to any evangelist or ministers of any other church to hold a series of meetings or to maintain a regular appointment for another congregation; provided, however, that usual denominational courtesies be extended to other ministers in occasional appointments. A waiving of the above by a contract or lease of building must be obtained through the Board of Trustees of the Indiana Conference.

B. Pastoral Support:

1. All charges should in addition to the regular stipulated salary, assume the responsibility of providing a suitable home in which the pastor may live, a heating plant for that home, and, also, payment of utilities, including fuel, electricity, water, water-conditioning, and sewage, also the pastor's medical, surgical and hospitalization insurance premium. The parsonage telephone, except for personal long-distance calls, shall be considered as Church incidental expense and paid for by the church.

2. All charges and stations to which a pastor shall move shall pay the moving and transportation expenses of said pastor, the same to be done in addition to his salary. When the Conference demands the services of any one, it shall bear the moving expenses, if any expense shall be incurred.

3. Each charge should grant their pastor each year two weeks vacation with pay.

C. Pulpit Supply:

1. No charge shall call any one as pastor, or to supply the work by ministers coming from other denominations as long as there are ministers in our Conference qualified and available to take work. The President after he has exercised his prerogative in the reception of ministers coming from other denominations is to immediately refer them to the Committee on Itineracy and Elders Orders, who shall make a thorough investigation as to the ministry and life of such applicants, who shall report their findings to the President, after which, appointments may be made.

D. Annual Business:

The Annual business meeting of the local church, which is referred to in Par. 165 (4) of the Discipline, shall be held during the month of June.

II. PASTORAL DUTIES—

A. Insurance:

1. It is the duty of the pastors to look after the insurance of our church and parsonage properties. All insurance shall provide for losses caused by fire and lightning, hail, and tornado. A failure on the part of the pastor shall be a censurable offense. If the church fails to insure their property upon reasonable effort of the pastor to secure, the same, then said failure shall be reported to the President of the Conference who shall then have the property insured. In such cases all insurance monies received from losses by fire, lightning, hail and tornado shall be used in Church Extension work as the Conference Board of Trustees considers best.

B. Statistics:

1. Each pastor and evangelist shall file a complete statistical report with the statistical committee without fail by July 10th.
2. Delegate's Credentials secured from the Secretary shall be mailed to the Assistant Secretary by the pastor, by July the 10th.
 - a. The pastor shall report in open conference the items listed on special blanks furnished by the Conference.
 - b. The official character of any pastor or evangelist shall not be passed until he shall have submitted a satisfactory report including statistics.
 - c. When a pastor fails to raise, in full, the Superannuated Pension Budget, he shall report to the character committee a satisfactory reason for not doing so.
 - d. In compiling statistics report, all figures shall be given in even dollars at the nearest dollar, i.e., \$1.01 to \$1.50 shall be reported as \$1.00 and from \$1.51 to \$1.99 shall be reported as \$2.00. The item number VIII on benevolences alone to be excepted and shall be reported exactly as paid.
 - e. All unaccounted for members appearing in the statistics in the membership list shall be referred to the discontinued list. All members in excess of the number reported shall be reported received.

C. Quarterly Meetings:

1. All quarterly meetings shall be arranged for by the pastor and his advisory board and shall be held near the close of each fiscal quarter. The pastor shall report quarterly to the President and Vice President on blanks formulated by the President. This report shall be sent in immediately following the quarterly business meetings.

D. Calling List:

1. Each pastor should prepare a calling list of all the homes connected with the Church and Sunday school; listing the relationship they hold to the church; listing their names and addresses by city, street and number, the same to be kept for his own work while on the pastorate and to be given to his successor on the field.

E. Church Extension and Evangelism:

1. No pastor whose total receipts are \$3500.00 or more shall hold more than two revivals yearly from his charge, one of which is mentioned in resolution seven under pastoral duties, unless by consent of the President and his Advisory Board.
2. Each pastor whose total pastor's receipts exceed \$3500.00 a year should seek to organize a new class or give his service in a revival meeting to a new or weaker church, to help establish it. The Church which he pastors should grant him such privilege without censure, with full remuneration of salary while in such a meeting. The Vice President shall serve as Co-ordinator, to recommend and help arrange such meetings.

III. CONFERENCE—**A. Conference Officials:**

1. There shall be a President and two Vice-Presidents elected, one of these shall be designated as the First Vice-President and the other as the Second Vice-President. One Vice-President's work shall be primarily in Districts 1-6, and the other in Districts 7-12. The three officials shall determine which vice-president shall work in which division. The First

Vice-President shall assist the President in presiding at the Annual Conference.

B. Official Duties:

1. Visitation by the President and Vice-Presidents—This may include the following: bringing a message, listening to a pastoral message, visiting the business meeting, sitting in with the board of stewards, counselling the pastor, the working toward a closer understanding between the Conference and local church. Every church shall be visited at least once by the Conference officials, but some churches, at the discretion of the officials, should be visited more often.

2. President—The Conference President shall supervise the entire program of the Conference, being responsible for all matters of a general nature and devoting as much of his time as possible to visitation of the local churches.

3. The Vice-Presidents—The Vice-Presidents shall cooperate in editing and circulating the Indiana Wesleyan Messenger. They shall be responsible for visiting the churches of their area. Especially they shall work with the weaker churches in counselling, holding revivals, securing pastors for holding revivals (SEE Resolutions and Laws, II Pastoral Duties sub paragraph E and sub paragraph 1 and 2.) and making every effort to strengthen these weaker churches. They shall keep in close contact with those churches receiving conference support with the aim of making them self-supporting as quickly as possible. They shall promote church extension work in their visitation of local churches and shall see that funds are raised for this work. As a goal every effort should be put forth to organize one new church in each area during the next Conference year. They shall work with the Board on Conference Extension and Evangelism in planning of this new work.

C. Annual Conference:

1. Each Annual Conference shall be held at Fairmount, Indiana, beginning on the Tuesday nearest August eighth.

2. The first Sunday of the Annual Gathering belongs to the old conference year and the second Sunday of the Annual Gathering belongs to the new conference year, this applies to pastoral appointment.

3. The fiscal year begins July 1st and ends June 30.

4. The sitting of the Conference for each day is considered as one meeting.

5. In examination of characters the Conference officials shall be called first.

6. The Conference shall assume the responsibility of payment of the hospitalization premium for the superannuates, Conference President, and Vice-Presidents.

D. President and Vice-Presidents

1. The President and his advisory board shall be consulted before any love offering shall be taken.

2. The President and Vice-Presidents of the Conference shall be given a two week vacation with pay, and may have the privilege of holding one outside meeting during the conference year, at the time of their own choosing.

3. When the churches which have been placed in the hands of the President decide as to who shall be their pastor before the Minutes are

sent to press, the same shall be entered in the minutes as if ordered by this Conference.

4. The Emergency Benefit Fund shall be used for the relief of ministers of the conference or their widows who shall make application to the Conference President for financial assistance in time of emergency. This fund to be administered by the Conference Board of Trustees.

5. In the election of President and Vice-Presidents, the first ballot shall be a nominating ballot. The two names receiving the highest number of votes shall be the nominees.

6. The President shall call a meeting of the ministers and their wives in the different parts of the conference during the conference year. The purpose of this meeting is to promote the work of the conference. The president shall set worth goals, suggest means of attaining these goals and in general seek to promote a greater interest in the Conference program. All pastors shall be required to attend this meeting except when a legitimate cause may hinder.

7. The President and Vice-Presidents shall constitute the executive committee of the WESLEYAN MESSENGER. They shall be responsible for editing and circulating it. The departments which use the columns of the Wesleyan Messenger regularly shall make contributions toward the expense of the same.

E. Secretaries:

1. The Secretary and the Assistant Secretary constitute a committee on communications.

2. The Assistant Secretary is to act as reporter of the Conference to the Marion Daily papers, and the church periodicals.

3. The Conference Secretary is authorized to purchase a floral offering for the family in the event of death of any of our ministers. The same to apply to elders or conference preachers in the events of the death of the minister's husband, wife, son or daughter. The father and mother of the Conference Officials, who are not pastors, shall be included. When requested, the price of the flowers shall be given as a missionary memorial. The memorial to be paid from the Conference Operating Fund.

F. Treasurers:

1. The Treasurers shall submit their reports by July 25th, to the Auditing Committee who shall audit the same and in their report to this body they shall show they have audited the same.

G. Boards:

1. Board of Conference Extension and Evangelism:

a. The Conference Board of Extension and Evangelism shall be composed of the Conference President, the two Conference Vice-Presidents, the Conference W. M. S. President, and two elders and two layman nominated by the Nominating Committee and elected by the Conference. The term of the elected members shall be for one year and they shall not serve for more than four consecutive years. It is recommended that no one, other than Conference President and the two Vice-Presidents be at the same time a member of the Conference Board of Extension and Evangelism.

2. Board of Trustees:

- a. The Board of Trustees shall authorize all disbursements not otherwise provided for.

H. Salaries:

1. The President shall receive \$100.00, the first Vice-President \$50.00, Secretary \$100.00, Treasurer \$300.00, Assistant Secretary \$50.00, each member of the Auditing Committee \$25.00, each member of the Statistical Committee \$40.00, Pension Plan Treasurer \$100.00 and expenses; the expense of the Committee on Itineracy and Elders Orders; the same to be paid from the Conference Operating Fund. The Conference Sunday School Secretary shall receive \$100.00 and each member of the Conference Sunday School Board \$50.00, the same to be paid out of the Sunday School Treasury.

I. Minutes:

1. The Conference Minutes are to be distributed with a minimum of 1 for every 4 members of the church or fraction thereof. Single copies of the minutes shall be 50 cents.

IV. COMMITTEES:

A. Itineracy and Elders Orders—

1. The Committee on Elders Orders is to transfer all persons to the study list who may have been recommended to travel and may not have been given work, providing they are meeting the disciplinary requirements in the course of study.

2. When recommendations to travel and to study preparatory to travel are presented to the Conference in session, they shall be recorded by the Secretary and automatically referred to the Committee on Itineracy and Elders Orders, without having been read to the Conference.

B. Camp Meeting—

1. The Camp Meeting Committee shall nominate and the Conference elect the one to preach the opening sermon of the next Conference with his alternate.

2. The Conference shall elect five members of the Camp Meeting Committee. Three of which are to be ministerial members, one to be elected each year for a term of three years; two to be lay members one to be elected each year for a term of two years.

C. Building—

1. No building or major repair involving structural changes on church property shall be undertaken without the approval of the Conference Building Committee.

D. Nominating—

1. A nominating committee shall be elected during the session of Conference, consisting of two ministers and two laymen, the President as chairman. This committee shall meet prior to the next Annual Conference and fill committees with nominees to be approved or disapproved by the conference. This committee shall be nominated and elected from the open floor of conference and shall serve for one year only, except, the chairman who retains this position by virtue of his office.

V. OTHER RESOLUTIONS.

1. The use of the wedding ring is not in accord with our standards as a Church, therefore we as a Conference disapprove of our ministers performing or taking part in the ring ceremony.

VI. BURIAL ASSOCIATION.

1. Each local church should elect a Local Secretary for the Burial

Association, whose duty it would be to promote the interests of the Association and to seek to obtain new members for the same. And if the church so elects, collect the dues of members and forward them to the General Secretary.

2. We earnestly request that the pastor present, or have presented, the work of the Burial Association at last once during the conference year, and seek to obtain new members for the same.

VII. PENSION PLAN.

1. Let it be clearly understood by every member of the Conference that aside from the provisions of the Pension Plan the Conference has no fund upon which to draw to meet the financial needs of the superannuated or permanently incapacitated ministers or their dependents.

2. Let it further be understood by the membership of the Conference that following the rise of the 1952 Indiana Annual Conference any eligible minister who has failed to join the plan will have voluntarily waived his right, and that of his dependents, to any financial aid from the Conference in the case of his superannuation, or physical disability, which forced him to retire from active service within the Conference before or after the age of retirement.

3. Any person receiving a pastoral or general evangelist appointment, excepting those who were serving at the time of the 1954 annual conference or those appointed to such work at that conference, shall be required to be a member of the Superannuated Pension Plan. If any person finds it financially impossible to pay his assessments for a given year, with the consent of the Pension Plan Board, he may waive service credit for that year.

OFFICIAL ACTS OF THE PRESIDENT

1. August 20—Upon learning of the desire of the Lafayette church to have the Rev. B. O. Crowe serve as their pastor, I appointed B. O. Crowe pastor of the LaFayette Church.
2. August 20—After talking with representatives of the Victory Chapel Church, I appointed Rev. Arlace Duncan pastor of the Victory Chapel Church.
3. August 20—After talking with representatives of the Victory Chapel Heights Church in which they expressed their desire that the Rev. Gene Clarke serve as their pastor, I appointed Gene Clarke as pastor of the Kingsford Heights Church.
4. August 28—Upon vote of the South Kokomo Church, I appointed William Degenkolb as their pastor, subject to his transfer from the Allegheny Conference.

A. The budget Apportionment shall be as follows:

Conference Budget:

The Conference Budget shall be sent to the Conference Treasurer as Undivided Budget, at the end of each month, and shall be figured on the following percentages:

All churches whose regular Sunday School offerings and Regular church tithes and offerings do not exceed \$150.00 per week shall remit 7%.

All churches whose regular Sunday School offerings and Regular church tithes and offerings do exceed \$150.00 per week shall remit 9%.

These receipts shall be apportioned as follows:

65% for the Conference operating fund.

20% for the Conference Extension.

8½% for Camp Meeting.

4% for Conference Youth Work.

2½% for Conference Sunday School Work.

This is retroactive as of July 1, 1960.

B. In accordance with the Discipline, paragraph 377, exact assessments will be made for each church on the above basis and mailed to the respective pastors by the Conference Secretary within two weeks of the rise of this Conference session.

C. All church budget excepting that raised by the W. M. S., the Y. M. W. B., and the Wesleyan Youth shall be sent to the Conference Treasurer.

D. All adjusting of funds and renaming of funds shall be under the direction of the Board of Trustees, and if during the Conference year there becomes a deficit in funds the Board of Trustees shall be authorized to raise the Conference Budget 1% for the balance of the year.

E. The Board of Trustees shall be authorized to purchase a parsonage for the second vice-president if deemed advisable. The rental allowance shall be used for this purpose.

Item II

The salary of the president shall be \$375.00 per month plus utilities (including fuel, electricity, water conditioning, and sewage) and that the vice-presidents be \$325.00 plus utilities, the same to be paid by the Conference Treasurer monthly, and expenses incidental to their work. The salary, utilities and expenses of the president and vice presidents shall be paid from

RESOLUTIONS

We, your committee on Resolutions, submit the following report:

- I. BE IT RESOLVED that we as Wesleyan Methodists of the Indiana Conference support the doctrines and standards of our church through:
 - a. the preaching of the Word and emphasis upon the necessity of living a consistent saved and sanctified life;
 - b. the proper use of our time and the tithing of our income;
 - c. the regular, punctual attendance at all church services including the mid-week prayer meeting.
- II. BE IT RESOLVED:
 - a. that our ministers re-emphasize the observance of the Lord's Day.
 - b. that every family examine its standards and concepts of modesty and the outward life, that all be consistent with holy living.
 - c. that as a conference our position on television be that of the Board of Administration as printed in the July 6, 1960, issue of THE WESLEYAN METHODIST (page three).
- III. Believing the Sunday School to be the mission field of the local church, we cannot over-emphasize the responsibility of each church to prayerfully and earnestly promote the work of the Sunday School.
 Since we now have available for the first time through our own Publishing House WETT, The Wesleyan Evangelical Teacher Training Program, we do urge the promotion of teacher training in each local church. Believing the Wesleyan Methodist Sunday School literature to be the best antidote for the tragic influx of obscene literature, made so easily accessible to our children and youth, we stress the necessity of using our Sunday School literature in every church.
- IV. Revival-evangelism is a must in every one of the churches in the Indiana conference. Therefore let each pastor and layman resolve to pray in contrition and intercession until God's revival fire falls on the church and reaches out into the community. Let us experience revival in our our hearts and lives to the extent that it will move us out to do something about the lost around us.

Therefore, BE IT RESOLVED:

- a. That we earnestly urge our people to acquaint themselves with, and support, our denominational program of Operation Outreach.

- b. that every church engage in concerted effort and organized planning for visitation, backed by much prayer.
- V. WHEREAS: The Papal Bull, The Unum Sanctum, pronounces that temporal power is subordinate to ecclesiastical; and
- WHEREAS: The Syllabus of Errors of 1864 condemned and refuted eighty errors, including freedom of the press, Protestantism, Bible studies, civil marriages, free scientific investigation, studies, civil marriages, free scientific investigation, separation of Church and State, public schools and religious toleration; and
- WHEREAS: These decrees have have been repudiated, but are still the canon law of the Roman Catholic church; and
- WHEREAS: The Roman Catholic church is a political power; and
- WHEREAS: The Roman Catholic church has claimed and exercised authority over one of the candidates for president of the United States of America while he was in high public office;
- BE IT RESOLVED THAT: Apart from any reference to political philosophies, personalities, or religious convictions, the Indiana Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America objects to the nomination for president of the United States of America one who is subject to the dictates of the Roman Catholic Church and one who, if elected to the highest office of the nation, would be prevented from properly fulfilling the requirements of that office; and we ask our people to be aware of the dangers involved and act accordingly.
- BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED THAT: While our nation is seeking a solution to the many crucial problems of present-day world affairs, we will pray for our leaders to be effectively resisting the scourge of Atheistic Communism which already has more than 950,000,000 people under its banner.

We recommend that these resolutions be read in each of the churches of the conference immediately following this annual camp meeting.

The Woman's Missionary Society of the Indiana Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America convened for the seventy-first Annual Session in the Youth Tabernacle on the Fairmount Camp Ground, Fairmount, Indiana, August 9, 1960.

Tuesday, August 9, 1: 00 p.m.

Opening—The meeting was called to order by the President, Mrs. Elizabeth Leach, who offered the opening prayer. Mrs. Joan Degenkolb led in group singing with Mrs. Lavonne Poe at the piano.

Devotions—The devotional period was conducted by Mrs. Alberta Metz. She read Zechariah 2: 1-5, emphasizing the fact that we often limit God by taking the wrong attitude toward circumstances; that Faith sees beyond earthly, human boundaries; that it is important to "Let Him be the Glory in our midst." Mrs. Metz led in prayer, after which Mrs. Degenkolb and Mrs. Marcella Klinger sang a duet entitled "Nothing But Leaves."

Roll Call—5 Conference officials, 47 Presidents, 64 delegates responded to the calling of the roll.

Conference Bar—By motion the Conference bar was fixed as the first eight tiers of seats in all three sections.

President's Message—The President gave her annual message which was accepted by motion. (See Report No. 1).

President's Report—The President read the report of her Official Acts, Organizers Report, Orders of the Day, and Calendar of Special Orders, which were adopted by vote. (See Report No. 1)

Auditing Report—The report of the Auditor was read and adopted by motion. (See Report No. 3)

Statistical Report—The Statistical Committee gave the report on Statistics, which was accepted by motion. (See Report No. 10)

Praise and Testimony—The business was interrupted by a down pour of rain and as showers fell from heaven watering the dry ground, showers of blessing watered our thirsty souls through praise in song and testimony. In a very real way we felt "His Glory in our midst."

Special Prayer—Mrs. Zella Enyeart led us to the throne of grace in behalf of Mrs. Mary McAninch and others who have been under the hand of affliction.

Dormitory Report—Mrs. Loucile Winterholter gave an informative report of the care and upkeep of the Dormitory rooms on the Camp ground. Twenty Societies were represented on "Work Day" with 125 different people registered. Seventeen Societies cleaned rooms at other times. A total of 129 rooms were cleaned and 40 room painted. Each Society was urged to be responsible for at least one room this year, cleaning, painting, furnishings or whatever is needed. There is still a shortage of mattress pads and sheet blankets. She expressed appreciation for the kind co-operation and fine work of Mrs. R. J. Otis, wife of the Camp Ground Superintendent.

local and conference Solicitors, starting there were 15,125 magazines in circulation at the last count.

Magazine Solicitor—The Conference Magazine Solicitor gave her report, stating there had an increase of only sixteen subscriptions to the Wesleyan Missionary the past year. Wednesday August 10, 8: 00 a.m.

Opening—The meeting opened with congregational singing conducted by Mrs. Joan Degenkolb. Our hearts were warmed as we sang together "No Never Alone" "I Will Make the Darkness Light" and "Let the Beauty of Jesus be Seen in me."

Devotions—Mrs. Vivian Bardsley spoke from the theme, "The Holy Spirit," using II Kings 4: 1-7 as a basis for her message. She said in part: "Oil is a type of the Holy Spirit. All the woman had was a pot of oil. All we need is the Holy Spirit. He is the answer to all of our problems." We, the Plan of Work Committee, submit the following recommendations:

- I. **INSPIRATIONAL**—To arouse and give direction to a missionary spirit.
 - A. Keeping a monthly Fast and Prayer Day and promoting a Women's World Fellowship Circle in each local society with each secretary sending in her Annual Prayer Partner Report to the Women's World Fellowship Secretary within sixty days after the Annual Conference.
 - B. Seeking spiritual depth and missionary appeal in each meeting and nurturing a spirit of prayer.
 - C. Inviting returned missionaries (Wesleyan Methodist if possible) for special rallies or individual missionary services.
 - D. Providing a missionary library, adding the books of the reading course each year, as well as encouraging the study of the outlined course of Bible reading in the Gospel of John with the use of the **LIGHT AND LIFE** Bible correspondence course.
- II. **INSTRUCTIONAL**—To guide by teaching and by precept the Christian's responsibilities.
 - A. That as mothers and Christian women to live lives filled by the Holy Spirit that will make Christianity attractive to our youth. We further recommend that every effort be made to conserve the tremendous potentialities of our children for Wesleyan Methodism by encouraging them to accept the church calender of activities as foremost.
 - B. That as members of the Woman's Missionary Society to exercise in the coming political national election, Christian conscience over and above political preference. (This is not to indicate partisanship,

for regardless of party affiliation, we would urge our people to exercise their voting power against putting a Roman Catholic in high office in the land as we believe catholicism to be a totalatarian system of dictatorship. We know from experiences of our mission works in catholic areas that the catholic church is tyrannical and intolerant of the Protestant view. Failure to vote as a Protestant Christian in this coming election would be playing in the hands of the Roman Catholic cause.)

III. ORGANIZATIONAL—To devise lawful means to interest others in missionary work.

- A. Membership—sponsoring aggressive membership campaigns throughout the church and Sunday School.
- B. Leadership—training members to become capable leaders.
- C. Service—inaugurating an “Every Member Service Crusade” among W. M. S. members, thereby producing a spirit of “Service consciousness” for meeting Christian obligations which money and prayer cannot liquidate.
- D. Youth—seeking to reach young people with the missionary message.

IV. FINANCIAL—To put forth a systematic effort to raise money for the support of the gospel at home and abroad.

- A. That all money raising projects be in harmony with the spirit and principle of the church.
- B. That we recognize our responsibility to Marion College beyond the point of financial appeals including Honorary Enrollment and the Foreign Student Aid Fund by intercessory prayer for the Administration, Faculty, and present Student Body and that we train our youth in loyalty to our church related college.
- C. That each society support the work of the American Bible Society, by an annual offering, preferably taken during the Universal Bible Reading Period with funds channeled through the Conference Treasurer.
- D. That inasmuch as the \$1.00 dues must go to the General Fund, the assessment authorized by the Executive Board for the Conference Working Fund be as follows:

Based on total membership:

1. 20 or less members	\$10.00
2. 21 to 50 members	20.00
3. 51 to 75 members	25.00
4. 75 and up	35.00

V. BENEVOLENT—To do such other work as may be for the good of the souls and bodies of perishing humanity.

- A. Purpose of Community Missions
 - 1. To enlist every W.M.S. member in some form of personal service in the home community.
 - 2. To enlarge our Christian impact on community morals.
 - 3. To strengthen the influence of the church on the outside world.
- B. Method of Operation
 - 1. Visitation—a systematic campaign of visitation by a volunteer staff. Each may choose the type of call she will make.
 - a. Supervision—to be directed by the local vice-president and a committee of two others.

- b. Areas of Visitation—the ill, aged, unchurched, Sunday School absentees, newcomers to the community, delinquent families, bereaved homes, friendless ones, needy (spiritually or financially) people or any others who might benefit by a call made in the spirit of Jesus.
 - 2. Evangelism—a campaign of individual witnessing and personal soul winning.
 - a. Supervision—to be directed by the local Executive Board.
 - b. General aims—to stress importance of Christian's testimony wherever opportunity presents itself.
 - 3. Relief Work—a program of social service with the Gospel as its motive, rendered in the spirit and with the understanding of the good Samaritan.
 - a. Supervision—To be directed by the Work Director and a committee of two others in counsel with the local president.
 - b. Areas of Activity—needs arising from unemployment, illness or emergencies.
 - c. Working Plan—use volunteers to
 - 1. Investigate cases, recommended to Relief Committee the help to be given, and distribute the same.
 - 2. Take charge of supplies—receive, repair, retain, and disburse as directed by the Relief Work Committee.
 - 4. Nature of Reports
 - a. Number of contacts made for Christ by letter, phone, or visit.
 - b. Number of hours so employed.
 - c. Total amount of cash and supplies disbursed for community missions.
- VI. DIRECTIONAL—To stress the promotion and the reading of the outlined literature.
- A. That, for increased knowledge of missionary activities, the local society promote a "Let us Read—to Intercede" campaign, the secretary keeping a monthly record of individuals reading the WESLEYAN MISSIONARY completely, with due annual recognition to be given by the local society.
 - B. That each local strive for 100% subscription to the WESLEYAN MISSIONARY plus a 10% increase in subscription and that an endeavor be made to send gift subscriptions to the public library, offices, hospitals, homes for the aged, and such other public places deemed advisable. Also we recommend that subscriptions be encouraged as gifts for weddings, anniversaries, new converts and new families contacted by the church.
 - C. That the Bible correspondence course in the Gospel of John be purchased from the WORLD GOSPEL CRUSADES, P. O. Box 9812 Los Feliz Station, Los Angeles 27, California, U. S. A. and that each society encourage the W. M. S. members to enroll in this course.
 - D. That the following form be used in reporting the Community Missions:

REPORT OF COMMUNITY MISSIONS

- 1. Visitation in at least one home a week (other than personal friends) with prayer and personal witness most of the time.

2. Evangelism—speaking to at least 10 people about their souls during the year and leading at least one person to Christ.
3. Relief—rendering at least 10 hours of social service to families or individuals outside the church such as:
 - a. Migrant workers _____
 - b. Delinquents _____
 - c. Alcoholics _____
 - d. Reading to the aged _____
 - e. Other needy groups _____
- Total amount of cash and supplies disbursed _____
- Total number of hours so employed _____

Daily Proceedings

Tuesday, July 19, 1960, 11: 00 a.m.

The thirty-first session of the Indiana Wesleyan Youth Annual Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America convened in the Main Tabernacle on the Fairmount Campground at 11:00 a.m. on July 19, 1960.

Motion—It was moved and seconded that all pastors be seated as honorary members and given the right to speak on any matter.

President's Message—The president read his annual message which upon vote was accepted.

Calendar of Business—The Calendar of Business and Special Orders was read by the president and adopted by the conference. (See Report No. 1.)

Report—The Nominating Committee Report was read and adopted as read. (See Report No. 2.)

Nomination—Merwin Logsdon and Nancy Kierstead were nominated for the Finance and Appropriation Committee to fill the vacancy left by Marvin Carlisle and June Cherry who were unable to serve on this committee. Merwin Logsdon was not a delegate and withdrew her name. Linda Goodman was nominated.

Election—Nancy Kierstead and Linda Goodman were elected to serve on the Finance and Appropriations Committee. Roger Reed was elected to serve on the Courtesy Committee. Joyce Fraker was elected to serve on the Devotional Committee.

Special Order of the Day—Report of District No. 1 was read and approved.

Introduction—The Rev. Lester Lockard, chairman of the Courtesy Committee, introduced the Rev. Walter Jeffries, Marion Area Wesleyan Youth president, to the youth conference. Rev. Standing Rules

I. AREA

- A. THE AREA PRESIDENT is to receive entertainment and traveling expenses while traveling our conference the same to be paid by the group asking his service.

II. CONFERENCE

- A. The first session of the WESLEYAN YOUTH CONFERENCE shall convene on Tuesday of Youth Camp, the time to be determined by the Wesleyan Youth Camp Committee, and the sessions shall continue daily throughout the camp until all business is transacted.
- B. The PRESIDENT shall appoint the chairman of each committee, and the Executive Council shall nominate the rest of the members of the committee; their report to be read and voted upon in the first session of annual conference.
- C. There shall be elected an ASSISTANT SECRETARY whose duty shall be to assist the secretary and to compile the statistics. The secretary shall be given the privilege of making the nomination.
- D. The TREASURER shall report at the annual conference the locals that have raised the budget in full.
- E. The WESLEYAN YOUTH TREASURER shall pay from the Conference Expense Fund each year the sum of fifty dollars toward the expense of printing the minutes. The Wesleyan Youth secretary shall co-operate with the conference secretaries in determining the number of pages used.
- F. The FINANCE AND APPROPRIATIONS COMMITTEE shall be composed of five members elected by the Wesleyan Youth Conference and a sixth member chosen from and by the Committee on Finance Appropriations of the main conference body.
- G. Copies of the REPORT OF THE FINANCES AND APPROPRIATIONS COMMITTEE shall be mailed within three weeks after the close of conference, one copy to each district chairman, pastor and local president. These reports shall be carefully presented to each local by its president as soon after conference as possible.
- H. There shall be a WESLEYAN YOUTH CAMP COMMITTEE of seven members. The Executive Council shall be members ex-officio; the president of Wesleyan Youth shall be chairman of said committee; the other three members to be elected for a term of three years. One shall be elected annually or until his successor is elected so that the term of all will not expire at the same time. The Wesleyan Youth Camp Committee shall elect one of its members as treasurer of the Youth Camp.
- I. The WESLEYAN YOUTH CAMP MEETING COMMITTEE shall be seated as members of the conference.
- J. There shall be a YOUTH CAMP of one week duration and the date of the camp shall be set by the Wesleyan Youth Camp Committee.
- K. The YOUTH CAMP recreational equipment is to be accessible during the conference and camp meeting, and the Youth Camp Committee is to be responsible for such.

- L. The EXECUTIVE COUNCIL of the Wesleyan shall have complete charge of helping new works.
- M. Members of the EXECUTIVE COUNCIL shall not hold the office of District Chairman, but shall work in co-operation with and under the direction of the president.

III. DISTRICT

- A. That the Executive Council call a meeting of all DISTRICT CHAIRMEN semi-annually.
- B. Each district shall elect an ADULT COUNSELOR to counsel and assist in the plans of the district. This advisor may be beyond the age of membership in Wesleyan Youth.

IV. LOCAL

- A. All organized locals keep permanent records of MEMBERSHIP AND FINANCES. This list of members shall be revised at the close of each conference year.
- B. All churches shall send their DELEGATES CREDENTIALS and STATISTICAL REPORTS to the secretary by July 5.
- C. The LOCAL PRESIDENT shall consult with pastor when making out his annual WESLEYAN YOUTH REPORT, to avoid inconsistencies in the same.
- D. The EXECUTIVE COUNCIL of each local Wesleyan Youth should consult with the pastor and his board of stewards before planning its financial program for the year.
- E. The General Wesleyan Youth EFFICIENCY STANDARD is to be adopted and promoted, and each society rating is to be reported in the annual statistical reports.

Report No. 5

REPORT OF THE FINANCE AND APPROPRIATIONS COMMITTEE

I. Rallies

We recommend that each district co-operate with the following conference program as to rallies.

- A. That the district chairman be responsible for the rallies and that notices of said rallies be sent to the local church pastor and youth president and to the Conference Youth President at least two Sundays in advance in order to promote closer co-operation between the district chairman and the president. Rallies should be held quarterly and, if possible, monthly. If no other system is being provided by

the district, rallies should be held on the fifth Sunday when it occurs.

- B. As the Scripture recognizes that Christ grew in wisdom (education), stature (physical), and in favor with God (spiritual), and man (social), we too suggest that the rallies be as equally balanced in their interests.
- C. As soon as possible after conference a rally be held in each district under the direction of the district chairman. This shall be a banner count rally. One of the purposes of this rally shall be to organize for the new year.
- D. A special youth rally be held in each district during the months of May or June for the express purpose of promoting the Indiana Wesleyan Youth Camp and Conference.
- E. That the district chairman call a meeting of the local presidents, district officers, and district adult counselor within a month after the rise of this conference for the purpose of planning district rallies for the year. A notice of this should be sent to the Youth Conference President.
- F. That the following point system for district banner be adopted: local president or vice president at rally, 5 points; pastor present, 5 points; for each 1% of active members present (to be based on the current number of members except for those in college), 1 point; for each active WY member present, 1 point; for each non-member present, 1 point; for each mile traveled to the rally site, 1 point.
- G. That a loving cup be passed to the society, and the award be based on the percentage of subscribers to THE WESLEYAN YOUTH as to the number of church members plus the number of subscriptions to THE WESLEYAN YOUTH.
- H. That the conference print and distribute to the locals suitable blanks to implement the point system.
- I. That a state wide youth rally be held on the Fairmount Campground Friday night of Youth Camp week with the conference banner and loving cup being awarded on the same basis as that of district rallies. That the executive council and the youth camp committee share the responsibility of this rally.

II. Locals

- A. The local president shall be responsible to see that each active and associate member signs a membership card annually. No one shall be reported as a member until the pledge card is signed.
- B. That the local president, adult youth counselor, and youth solicitor shall be responsible for promotions to subscriptions to THE WESLEYAN YOUTH and shall see that members subscribe.
- C. The local president shall be responsible for promoting projects suggested in Item III, Projects, Section B.

III. Projects

- A. For conference project we recommend the following:
 1. That the executive council take up the advisement of a leader's conference for local presidents or representative, district chairmen, and the Executive Council, and that the program be planned by the Executive Council.
 2. In keeping with the emphasis of the church extension program that assistance be rendered in such area as deemed advisable by

the Conference Board of Trustees, and to such extent as deemed advisable by the Missionary Board.

3. The Executive Council be responsible to promote the Bible quiz program and provide the information to the local presidents of such.

- B. For locals we recommend the following: That the locals plan and promote the interests of the Bible quiz in organizing and preparing a team, plan visitation program and special meetings with members of the local, such as jail services, hospital and shut-in visitations, distributing tracts, and radio programs.

IV. For finance we recommend the following:

- A. That the salary of the conference officers be as follows:

1. President—\$120.00
2. VicePresident—\$50.00
3. Secretary—\$75.00
4. Treasurer—\$75.00
5. Assistant Secretary—\$10.00

Said salary to be paid in equal payments, on December 5, and the other June 1.

- B. That the desk and traveling expenses of the president, vice-president, secretary, and treasurer, be paid from the Youth Conference Budget; and the desk and traveling expenses of the Youth Camp Committee be paid from the Youth Camp Treasury and the said expenses be paid at least quarterly. That traveling expense be figured on the basis of 6 cents per mile.

- C. That the budget for the following year be as follows:

1. General Dues, \$1.50 per active member of the local
2. Conference Budget (based on church membership) 60¢
3. One third or the Conference Budget to be designated for the Youth Camp and the rest used at the discretion of the Executive Council.
4. On the basis of the above apportionment exact assessments for each item shall be made for each local and mailed to the pastors and local presidents by the conference secretary within two weeks of the rise of the conference session.
5. That above funds be sent in quarterly on remittance blanks furnished by the conference. Inasmuch as this is based on church membership, the church should feel its responsibility to aid the local when necessary.

- D. That the Executive Council shall have power to appropriate money from the Conference Budget for the general promotion of the Youth Work.

- E. That all monies raised with the local for missions be forwarded to the Wesleyan Youth Treasurer for departmental credit and that said money be raised by monthly missionary offerings and be sent in quarterly with the Wesleyan Youth Budget.
