Standing Rules

- No. 1. The Conference Treasurer is authorized to close his books two weeks before the opening date of Conference, therefore all receipts and monies should be in his hands by that time if credit on the statistical report is desired.
- No. 2. The President, after his fourth round of Quarterly conferences shall mail the delegate's credentials to the Conference secretary who shall be the Committee on Credentials. It shall be his duty to prepare the roll before conference begins.
- No. 3. All persons introduced to the conference shall be given honorary seats with the right to speak on all questions, but not to vote.
- No. 4. The office expense of the President, the secretary, and the treasurer shall be paid by the conference. Also all conference supplies shall be purchased by the conference.
- No. 5. The secretary and treasurer shall be paid twenty-five dollars per year for their services.
 - No. 6. The Conference Treasurer shall be bonded each year.
- No. 7. An abbreviated form of the Pastor's statistical report shall be used for conference reading.
- No. 8. The Annual Conference shall elect a Nominating Committee of five, of which one shall be the Conference President, to meet prior to the next Annual Conference and nominate the working committee for the session.
- No. 9. The Conference President and the Board of Trustees shall constitute a Committee for the Building and Location of Churches and Parsonages.
- No. 10. Each pastor shall be allowed time out from his duties as pastor to hold two revivals each year if he so desires. The church he serves as pastor shall not withhold his salary while he is absent on such authorized revivals. In case any extra expense is involved in filling the pulpit while the pastor is engaged in such said revival such extra expense shall be paid by the church whose pastor is absent holding the revival.
- No. 11. All church records shall close the last day of the month preceding the opening date of Conference.
- No. 12. It is the duty of the pastors to look after the insurance of the church and parsonage property. All insurance shall provide for fire, lightning and tornado. If the church fails to do so upon reasonable ef-

fort by the pastor, the conference president shall be notified and he shall take care of such business. A failure upon the part of the pastor shall be a censurable offense.

- No. 13. This conference asks that each pastor shall keep a file of his calling list and those connected with the church and Sunday School with names and addresses, the same to be kept for his own work and to be turned over to his successor.
- No. 14. Each pastor should seek to organize a new class or give his services in a revival meeting to a new or weaker church to help establish it. The church which he pastors should grant him such privileges without censure with full remunerations of salary while in such meeting. The president must serve as co-ordinator and help arrange such meetings.

The Conference President shall be the Ashburn Camp Meeting President and also Chairman of the camp committee, ex-officio.

MONDAY NIGHT, JULY 8, 1957

REPORTS

CONFERENCE PRESIDENT'S REPORT Report No. 1

To the Members of this Sixty-second Annual Session of the South Georgia Conference of The Wesleyan Methodist Church of America.

Dear Brethern and Co-laborers in the work of God. Once again we have met on this great annual occasion to take inventory of our past years work and make plans for the future. We want to praise God for the victories that have been ours this year. And yet as we continue to hear the Macedonian call from places right at our doors we realize that there is much to be accomplished yet.

"WHO THEN IS WILLING"

The great concern upon my heart for this conference is who is willing to help meet the need of the many calls that are extended to us in South Georgia. Truly the fields are white unto harvest around about us, but there are not enough volunteers to reap the harvest. I believe today that God has permitted this world to be in distress and fear as there are too many people

that call themselves christians that have failed God going about <u>passianless</u>, <u>prayerless</u>, and <u>powerless</u>. I am afraid that there are too few people that God can really depend upon to carry on his great work.

In the day of Gideon God was trying to over power the enemy and defeat the Midianites. Upon Gideons first call there were 32,000 that volunteered that realized the need of God. They are the group that represents the regenerated. Then when the test was put before them by asking the fearful and afraid to return hame, 22, 00 returned and 10,000 remained. These represented the santified. Then when the second test was given 9,700 returned home and 300 remained. God said to Gideon, "By the three hundred men that lapped will I save you, and deliver the Midianites into thine hand."

My Christian friends, are we among the 300 that God can count on to win for him or are we among the number that have turned back at the testing time. God can only depend upon those that carry a burden and a passion for the lost, and spend much time in prayer for others, and have power with God.

There are too many christian people that the devil is robbing of the pleasure of winning a soul for God because they spend unnecessary time over necessary things. One reason is that they lack a keen sense of the urgency of our mission. The greatest work that we have is that we might win souls. This should stand out a bove buildings, raising money, setting up great organization, or even holding to some form or fashion. Its not how we must win a a soul, but are we winning souls. Many work and make plans getting ready to do something for God, but never get to the task of doing it.

It is like the man that spent all his life going to school getting an education and degrees but never used what he had.

I am afraid that many times we are more concerned about our own worship and our own salvation, and kneel at the stream of personal satisfaction as did the 9,700 of Gideons day and fail to realize that we are at war with the devil. If we are not careful we will allow ourselves to be so concious of our many problems and difficulties that we fail to be concious of God and what he wants us to do.

God said, UP, MEN, LAP and MARCH we must possess the land and take the enemy. This is a continious war of seven days a week. The task is ours and we must carry on where our fathers left off. We can not let a spirit of indifference and laziness get hold of us and the enemy just walk in and take over. Brethern we can be winners, "If God be for us who can be against us."

The need of the hour is fighting men who are courageous, filled with the Holy Ghost, Men who have a vision and dare to venture out for God. God needs truly consecrated men that are willing to give their lives for the cause of God. Men that are willing to sacrifice some of the comforts of life to see souls saved and the church grow. Are we truly willing to obey God and answer the call he is still giving today for labors in his harvest field.

I am concerned why so few of our Wesleyan Homes and Churches are not producing more preachers and missionaries to carry on the work of God. Brethern, God hasn't forgotten his work and will not let it fade away. But I am afraid that we are too slack concerning the work of the Lord and are pushing our young people out into other fields instead of carrying a concern and burden for them to be used for God.

Many are more concerned over the proper use of their money than they are the proper use of the lives of their young people.

Will you be one of those that have a passion for souls, that spends much time in prayer over the salvation of souls and the interest of the advancement of Gods Kingdom. The call is still being made,"WHO THEN IS WILLING"

When the great Titanic was sinking she gave out the S.O.S.. Close by was the great ship California and she replied, "If you need us we will come" Before the Titanic could call again she was already going under. But at the same time a smaller ship answered, "We are coming," and they rescued 711 lives while 1635 went down.

President's Report

WHY MISSIONS

"For God so loved the world, that He gave His only begotten Son, that whosoever believeth in Him should not perish but have everlasting life." John 3:16 has been considered the "Bible in miniature," or a complete summary of the entire Bible. Upon examination we find that the theme is definitely none other than missionary. From this we may safely conclude that the theme that the theme of the entire Bible is that which is set forth in John 3:16. Indeed from the first chapter of Genesis through the closing words of the Revelation, God Himself is seen as the first and greatest Missionary in His successive outreaches into the soul of man. One characteristic of the Bible which may add to its uniqueness is the fact that the Bible as a whole depicts God's search for man, while all other sacred books show man's search for God.

In the Old Testament God chose a man, a family, a nation; This group having its origin in Abraham, God's chosen vessel. He was not chosen to be the recipient of special blessings and affections for his own good a lone, but rather that he might be the channel through which would be united the all-consuming love of the Father with the parched and starving souls of mankind. Professor W. O. Carver states it thus: "If He takes this one tribe to His heart for the time it is not to forget the rest, but to do good to all. His aim is that Israel should serve Him as a kingdom of priests, a nation set apart to the prophetic service. But when the priest and the prophet are a nation, the people for whom they minister and to whom they prophesy are the other nations". How miserably the Jews stumbled in this purpose by failing to see that they were to be the servant nation. Instead thay hoarded to themselves God's benefits selfishly and thereby causing God to set them a side for a time.

Every section of the New Testament was written by a missionary, with the primary object of meeting a missionary need and promoting missionary work. With reference to the books of the New Testament, it has been stated that "If there had been no Commission, or no obedience to its spirit, there would have been no occasion for their production." Another writer says:

"The New Testament draws its breath in missions, it incarnated missions, wherever it goes it creates missions." The book of Acts does not close like

other books with a completed story. Instead it breaks off abruptly with Paul at Rome "preaching the kingdom of God, and teaching those things which concern the Lord Jesus Christ, with all confidence, no man forbidding him". The work was not finished and will not be until the end of the present ago.

Too often when a minister announces his subject to be along the line of missions, he is met with a deep sigh. And if sighs could talk, they might say, "It must be time for that annual missionary sermon which every minister is supposed to preach. I suppose I could have taken that trip this week-end after all" May I say to you that if you do not believe in and support the work of missions, you cannot prove to God that you believe any of His inspired Word. "If we have not the spirit of Christ, we are none of His." and who ever has been or ever shall be a greater missionary than our Lord and Savior?

What are we doing with the command, "Go ye therefore and teach all nations baptizing them in the name of the Father, of the Son and of the Holy Ghost"? The story is told by Pastor Hsi of an old woman in China who was apparently a devoted Christian, but who refused to join the church. When the missionary asked her why she would not confess Christ when she loved Him, The old woman at last said that it was because there was one commandment of His which she could not obey: being old and afflicted with rheumatism, she cloud not go into all the world to preach the Gospel. She could only te'll all her family and friends about Him! How simply this woman had taken for granted that Christs' words to His first disciples are binding on every true disciple today.

Dr. William Ashmore gives us this illustration: "I am going to suppose a case. Such an actual case never happened. It would have made a stir over all Christendom if it had. It was at the Lord's Supper; here was a good churchfull of disciples, and the deacons came along with the cup. The rule was for the man at the end of the pew to partake himself, and then pass it along to the next, and he to the next, and so on till the last one was reached. One man, right in the middle of the pew, got hold of it and partook and then held on to the cup.

"Pass it on," said the man next to him who had it, but he would not do it.

"Pass it on," said the man beyond who wanted it, but he would not do it.

"Pass it on," said the deacon in a low but earnest voice, but he would not do it.

"The pastor saw there was some trouble in that pew. He slipped down on tip-toe, and, seeing how it stood, he said, 'Pass it on; the cup is not intended for you acone. It has come all the way down from the table til it reached you. Don't stop it; pass it along.' But the man clutched all the harder and would not pass it on. He wanted to keep it all for himself.

"There is the Cup of Salvation. Christ filled it with His own hands He gave it to His disciples to drink. Drink and pass it along. 'Freely ye have received, freely give.' 'Ye shall be witnesses unto me both in Jerusalem, and in all Judea, and in Samaria, and unto all the uttermost parts of the earth. 'Go ye, therefore.' So the apostles partook and then passed it on. They of Jerusalem passed it on to Antioch; and they of Antioch passed it on to Ephesus, Corinth, and Philippi; and they of Ephesus, Corinth and Philippe, passed it on to Rome; and they of Rome passed it on to Britain; and they of Britain passed it on to us in America; and we of America are to pass it on to Japan and China and India, and to the isles of the sea which have it not.

"But now some there are who have got the cup and hold on to it, and will not pass it on. 'It is good,' they say; 'blessed—oh, most blessed'—but they will not pass it on. The heathern are perishing for want of the cup, but they will not pass it on. There is more salvation in that cup than they can ever use themselves, but they will not pass any of it along. When the brethern in other places conclude they must do something to hold forth the Word and spread the blessing and come and ask them to join, saying, 'We have found it so good ourselves, let us pass it over to those millions of poor Chinamen': they say, 'No, we do not believe in passing the cup along.'

And may I ask the same question? Is it all right that we have gained access to the throne of God and have tasted of His bountiful goodness but refuse to share the ever—abundent supply with others? Is it all right that our section of the country has been the recipient of some of the most outstanding leaders of the Holiness movement (one of these being John Wesley himself), yet as a conference we are not entirely supporting one single missionary to any other place in the whole world? Is God satisfied that we should be sponges, always taking in of the blessings and goodness of God but failing to produce missionaries and leaders from our own churches to bless the world?

As I look back upon the past conference year, I see much that has been done in our societies. For this I commend you. However, I cannot help but wonder if we have fallen short of God's expectations for our conference. "Without a vision the people perish." What is our vision? Are we satisfied with it? Is God satisfied? If He is not satisfied with our vision, He is not satisfied with us. "Give, and it shall be given unto you; good measure, pressed, and shaken together, and running over...For with the same measure that ye mote withal it shall be measured to you again."Luke 6:38 If our socie. ties and churches are not thriving spiritually as they should and if the vision seems to be somewhat dim, maybe we should take a little inventory. I don't mean just in our giving of money, but also of ourselves and our sons and daughters for the spreading of the Gospel. The more we give, the richer we become. On this the threshold of another conference year, will you not pledge with me to seek earnestly for a broader vision of God and His purposes, and to give not only that which we can spare of our money, time and conveniences, but rather all that we may have. In so doing let us prove to God and others that we are grateful that we have been recipients of His divine love.

It has been a pleasure indeed to work in the capacity of president of your Woman's Missionary Society during the past conference year. I only regret that due to the birth and very serious illness of our infant daughter, I have not been able to be more active.

On Sept. 17, I organized a W.M.S. at the Bethlehem Church. On. Sept. 18, I spoke at the Liberty Missionary Service.

Arrangements were completed for a tour by Rev. & Mrs. Henry Ortlip March 22 through April 7. There have been many reports of real blessing as a result of the tour.

Arrangements have also been made to secure Miss Ruth Gibson, returned missionary from South America, for a tour of our conference, Oct.3-20.

There has been the purchasing of a commercial gas stove, a grill and a potato masher for the kitchen. Also we appreciate the various showers given by the societies for the kitchen.

I have sent four papers or letters to each society.

The mail sent out amounts to 155 letters and 17 post cards.

Arrangements are in the making to secure a representative of Brainerd Indian School to travel our conference the early part of 1958.

Taught a class in missions in the Children's camp July 1-5.
