

## Journal of Daily Proceedings

The Champlain Annual Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Connection of America convened for its seventy-sixth session, at Mooers, N. Y., April 17, 1917, at 7:30 P. M.

Rev. E. D. Carpenter, the President, called the Conference to order. Song, "Jesus Understands," was sung. Prayer by Rev. G. N. Wyher. Scripture lesson, Psalm 34. Rev. E. D. Carpenter preached a very able and helpful discourse from the text, Isaiah 9:3, "They joy before Thee according to the joy of harvest."

Benediction by E. L. Elliott.

### Second Day-Wednesday-Morning Meeting.

Rev. G. D. Jock had charge of the devotional service. Song, "Blessed Assurance," was sung. Scripture lesson, first Psalm. Most of the time was spent in prayer. It proved to be a precious season of grace.

At the call of the roll the following answered to the call of their names: Thirteen elders, three licentiates, and eight delegates.

A partial report of the Committee on Credentials was approved, with the understanding that the future names be added to the roll without the necessity of a vote.

Bar of Conference was fixed to include the first five rows of pews.

The President called A. J. Allen to the chair and made his annual report. The report was approved. See Report No. 1.

The following committees were now elected:

Resolutions-F. H. Wright.

Courtesy-J. F. Wright.

Professor J. S. Luckey, of Houghton, was introduced, and made a few welcome remarks.

G. W. Summers and Mrs. Vera Lewis were also introduced.

Moved that all visiting members shall be welcome to honorary seats who are in harmony with our principles.

Committee on Pastoral Relations was elected, as follows: E. D. Carpenter, A. J. Allen, J. F. Wright, E. Trowbridge; Laymen, F. G. Lapham, S. H. Miller, and H. C. Rickett.

O. G. Wyman was made a Committee on Publication of Conference Minutes.

Upon vote, the time of opening and closing the sessions of the Conference was fixed as follows: Opening, 9 A. M. and 1:30 P. M.; closing, 11:30 A. M., and in the afternoon by vote.

Moved and carried the selling of the camp meeting tent be left with the Camp Meeting Committee, and that the money should be kept to purchase another tent.

Moved and accepted that it be the sense of this Conference that we endorse the Discipline in its position on secret societies.

The report on the orders of the day was accepted, as follows:

Connectional Representative, Friday, 10:30 A. M. W. H. and F. M. Society meeting, Friday evening. Conference Sunday School Secretary, Saturday, 10 A. M. Memorial service, Saturday, 9 A. M. Moved to adjourn for committee work. Benediction by J. F. Wright.

### Wednesday-Afternoon Meeting.

J. F. Wright conducted the devotional service, reading the first chapter of Colossians. The presence of the Lord was felt in this service.

At the call of the roll the following reported. Twelve elders, three licentiates, and ten delegates.

Reading and approval of minutes.

Rev. F. A. Butterfield. Editor of the Wesleyan Methodist, Syracuse, N. Y., was introduced, and said in his remarks that he believed the Lord was blessing the work all over the Connection.

Rev. C. E. Hill was called to the chair.

The names of E. D. Carpenter and W. A. Lewis were called and characters passed.

The following names were called and characters passed: G. D. Jock, O. G. Wyman, S. C. Fox, K. F. Schaubhuth, and A. F. Lent. Moved the President of the Conference send Brother A. F. Lent a letter of commendation for his faithfulness.

The order of the day having arrived, Conference joined in singing the song, "He Brought Me Out." Rev. F. A. Butterfield was the speaker of the hour, and addressed the audience from the words found in St. John 15:8, "So shall ye be My disciples." The speaker said it was the work of Jesus to make disciples, and spoke of the many religions, and said that religion was not the cause of the awful war, but the lack of salvation, and that we must bombard Satan from the trenches of our hearts; that a sinful life was a product of the devil, and the way to the pearly gates was by way of the Cross. In closing he spoke of the destruction of the carnal nature and our call to endure hardness as good soldiers of the Cross.

"All hail the power of Jesus' name" was sung.

At the conclusion of the order of the day Miss Hattie Crosby, a returned missionary from Africa, was introduced and gave a very heart-touching talk. She said she left all well and every station manned, and had been victorious through all the time since the awful war began.

The name of F. E. Wood was called and character passed. On motion Conference adjourned for committee work. Benediction by C. C. Hill.

### Wednesday-Evening Meeting.

- F. E. Wood conducted a song service that was marked by grace divine.
- C. E. Hill led in prayer. The spirit of prayer was upon the people. It was a real Pentecost to our souls. A Scripture lesson was read from 1 Peter, 2nd chapter, first 17 verses. "God will take care of you" was sung by the congregation as though they believed it (regardless of war or high prices).

The Word was preached by A. J. Allen, from Philippians 3:14, "I press toward the mark for the prize of the high calling of God in Christ Jesus." He spoke of Paul in the old Philippian jail, yet pressing toward the prize and saying, "I have fought a good fight,"

—there is no defeat. He spoke of how God trusted us with His work, and that there was no way of our getting away from our responsibility. The great reckoning day is coming; we must help fallen humanity, because the devil has more wickedness than all Germany could think of, but God has commanded, "Be ye holy, for I am holy," "Be ye perfect, as your Father in heaven is perfect." The altar call was given and seeking souls came and found the Lord. God mightily poured out His Spirit upon His own. We could all say, "It is good to be here." Benediction by F. A. Butterfield.

#### Third Day-Thursday-Morning Meeting.

G. N. Wyher conducted the devotional service. Scripture lesson read from St. John 15th chapter, first sixteen verses. A number of prayers were offered.

Fourteen elders, four licentiates and twelve delegates responded to the roll call.

After reading the minutes they were approved.

The committee on Itinerancy and Orders made their report. The report was approved. See Report No. 2.

The election of officers being the order of the day, that business was now taken up.

E. L. Elliott and G. D. Jock were appointed tellers to prepare the ballots, and F. H. Wright and H. S. Hill were appointed to distribute and collect the ballots.

Committee on Presidency—Three elders were elected: E. L. Elliott, F. H. Wright, O. G. Wyman; two laymen: LeRoy Stafford and E. L. McKnight.

Tithing Secretary-L. M. Hayes.

Conference Missionary Board—E. D. Carpenter, W. F. Lewis, E. L. Elliott and the President of the W. H. & F. M. Society.

President's Advisory Board-It was voted that the President

make nominations. A. J. Allen and I. L. Prouty were elected.

The time and place for our next Annual Conference was then taken up. Two invitations were extended—Hague, N. Y., and Forestdale, Vt. By vote of the Conference, Hague received eleven votes and Forestdale twenty-two. The time was fixed as April 23, 1918; place, Forestdale, Vt.

E. L. Elliott was appointed to preach the opening sermon next

year; F. H. Wright, alternate.

The order of the day having arrived, J. S. Luckey, President

of Houghton Seminary, spoke in behalf of the School.

Professor Luckey said he was a steward and had come to report his stewardship, and as Wesleyan Methodists we are workers together throughout the whole Connection. He emphasized the need of preparedness, if we are to succeed; that the nations that are at war with other nations would succeed according to the way they had prepared. Stating the success of the School, the Conference rose and sang the Doxology. He stated the need of the School if we are to have trained missionaries, a trained ministry. In the closing remarks he spoke of the need of each other's prayers.

"Blest be the tie that binds" was sung. Benediction by A. C.

Dow.

### Thursday-Afternoon Meeting.

A praise service was led by J. J. Davison. Scripture lesson, St. John 14:1-16.

At the roll call 15 elders, 5 licentiates and 12 delegates responded.

Minutes of the morning session were read and approved.

The following names were called and characters passed: J. F. Wright, A. J. Allen, Mrs. S. A. Green, C. C. Hill, V. D. Otis.

The order of the day having arrived, Mrs. George Stevenson sang a solo, "If You Will," and Rev. F. A. Butterfield preached a very helpful sermon from St. Luke 2:49, "I must be about My Father's business." He spoke of the ministry of Jesus in the temple at the age of twelve years; that we must have a vision of Jesus; adoption into the family of God; that separation from home or friends to be about our Father's business is a service that brings

joy to the heart; we are His sons and daughters and each have a work to do.

The congregation sang "Close to Thee."

Conference resumed business again.

The names of H. H. Rickett and G. N. Wyher were called and characters passed.

The Camp Meeting Committee reported. The report was adopted. See report No. 3.

A resolution was read that the members of the Camp Meeting Committee should be Rev. E. D. Carpenter, the pastors of the Wesleyan Methodist Churches at Mooers, N. Y., West Chazy, N. Y., and West Plattsburg, N. Y. The resolution was adopted. See Resolution No. 4.

It was voted to have two laymen on the Camp Meeting Committee. LeRoy Stafford and Dr. Walter Stevenson were elected.

It was moved to leave with the Camp Meeting Committee to retain the Beulah Trio for the coming camp meeting.

Motion to adjourn. Benediction by G. N. Wyher.

### Thursday-Evening Meeting.

A song service was led by Brother W. F. Lewis. Scripture lesson, Isaiah 53. Song, "The Old Prophetic Mantle," was sung by Mrs. George and Lillian Stevenson. The Spirit of the Lord was upon the singing. G. D. Jock brought the message to a large congregation from words recorded in St. Matthew 22:42, "What Think Ye of Christ?" If we were to think right, we must love the Lord with all the heart and our neighbor as ourself; faith in Christ is a finished product; one of the prophets said, "He is the Lily of the Valley"; another that He is the "Bright and Morning Star." By the spirit that was manifested through the meeting, most of the people could say with the poet, "He is the fairest of ten thousand to my soul,"

Our President made a few heart-searching remarks. Thus closed a very spiritual and helpful service.

Benediction by E. D. Carpenter.

### Fourth Day-Friday-Morning Meeting.

A half-hour devotional service was conducted by C. A. Heath, and enjoyed by all.

Fourteen elders, four licentiates and twelve delegates responded to the roll call.

Minutes read and approved, after slight correction.

E. L. Elliott was nominated for Sunday School Secretary for the northern part of the Conference, and W. A. Lewis for the southern part of the Conference, the same to be members of the Sunday School Board. They were elected.

The names of T. A. Moses, A. E. Moses and C. E. Hill were called and characters passed.

The order of the day having arrived for the meeting of the Superannuated Minister's Relief Association, the Conference took a recess. For minutes of the same see Report No. 4.

Upon the adjournment of said Association Conference again resumed business.

The passage of character was again taken up.

The names of F. H. Wright and H. S. Hill were called and characters passed.

The order of the day gave way to the Connectional interests. represented by F. A. Butterfield. First, the Connectional interests are our interests—yours and mine; that the body has many members, but all have a part; that the Wesleyan Methodist has a mission, and is against slavery and secrecy, and advertises full salvation, and as a Church we must be true to our own publications, and that promptness to the Publishing House made more aggressive work for God.

Major Anderson was introduced to the Conference. In his remarks he said he had been going up and down the country for thirty years in the interests of the Master. He made a brief but heart-felt prayer.

Adjourned by limitation. Benediction by O. G. Wyman.

#### Friday-Afternoon Meeting.

A devotional service was led by C. C. Hill. The Scripture lesson read was 1 John 3.

At the call of the roll sixteen elders, five licentiates and fourteen delegates responded.

Minutes of the morning session were read and approved.

The following names were called and their characters passed: W. N. Abare, C. A. Heath, J. J. Davison, E. Trowbridge and A. C. Dow.

The Conference Treasurer's report was read and adopted. See Report No. 5.

Conference voted that the Treasurer of the Champlain Conference be duly authorized to give a note on behalf of the Conference to the Trustees of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of West Chazy, N. Y., for five hundred seventy-five dollars (\$575.00) at 4% interest, the same being the purchase price of the lumber for the Tabernacle to be built on the camp ground at West Chazy, N. Y.

The order of the day having arrived, Rev. F. A. Butterfield took charge of the service. Prayer was offered by C. E. Hill. The forty-eighth Psalm was read and a very helpful sermon preached from the same.

A resolution presented by the Woman's Home and Foreign Missionary Society, and which had been adopted by the Rochester Conference, was read. Amendment passed. The following resolution was accepted:

Resolved, That the day known as Educational Rally Day in October, in the Young Missionary Workers' Band, be made a Memorial Day for the memory of Mrs. Elizabeth G. Hartson, our Conference and Denominational Superintendent, who has been called from labor to reward. That the fund established to which offerings are made be known as the Elizabeth G. Hartson Fund, this fund to be used for educational purposes, and used in such a way as will be applicable to our budget system.

The Committee on Resolutions reported. The same was adopted. Moved that we request that Resolutions Nos. 2 and 3 be published in the Wesleyan Methodist. See Resolutions 1, 2 and 3.

Name of E. L. Elliott was called and character passed.

It was moved and adopted that we adjourn. Benediction by E. L. Elliott.

#### Friday Evening Service.

The service of the evening was a missionary meeting, and in charge of the Woman's Home and Foreign Missionary Society.

The speaker of the evening was Miss Hattie Crosby, a returned missionary from Africa. In her remarks she spoke of some of the improvements in Africa. They travel by train over the railroad, and they have the telegraph and telephone. She spoke of the mission work under three heads—what has been done, what is being done,

and what needs to be done. We gained a point by being first on the field, thereby winning the natives' confidence, for they confide in the missionary. She spoke of the necessity of keeping our stations ahead of the railroad, and of the good buildings and the improvements that were being made, and the good work being done in the schools; that in the near future they would have native teachers. The whole address was very interesting, instructive and helpful. See minutes of same.

#### Fifth Day-Morning Meeting.

In the devotional service the 1st Psalm was read, and the time spent in a gracious season of prayer.

The Committee on statistics made their report, and the same was adopted. See Report No. 9.

The Woman's Home and Foreign Missionary Society made a very good report. See Report No. 10.

The Treasurer of the Woman's Home and Foreign Missionary Society made a very satisfactory report. See Report No. 11.

It was moved and supported to adjourn to the call of the chair. The minutes were accepted.

Thus closed a very busy but pleasant session of Conference.

Our President, Rev. E. D. Carpenter, offered the closing prayer and pronounced the benediction. Amen.

### Saturday-Evening Meeting.

A large number took part in a promise meeting. "Thy Word is a lamp unto my feet, and a light unto my path." Brother A. Baker led in prayer. "Still Sweeter Every Day" was sung. Scripture les-

son, Isaiah 55. Rev. A. C. Dow was the preacher of the hour and preached a very able sermon from Rev. 2:17, "To him that overcometh will I give to eat of the hidden manna, and will give him a white stone, and in the stone a new name written which no man knoweth saving he that receiveth it." 1. John was one of the young men Jesus called. 2. As the mountains are around about Jerusalem, so Jesus is about His people. 3. The Church of God is a great magnet. The form of the Fourth was with John on the island. The promises of God are conditional; we are overcomers by the Word of God. He spoke upon the following heads: A. Man is not likely to obtain good things until he really wants them. B. Hunger and thirst of the soul is a condition of restlessness and dissatisfaction.

1. It is a conviction that there are better things for one than he now enjoys, a fixed desire to obtain them, and a determination to do so. C. How to obtain the food the soul needs: 1. Be earnest in your search for it (Psa. 42:1, 2); 2. We must realize that soul food is our only hope; 3. We must have faith. D. Righteousness means right relations with God. 1. The possession of God insures right relations with Him; 2. The normal relation is in God's image. E. The Christian is filled with: 1. Wisdom; 2. Love.

#### Sunday-Evening Meeting.

At seven o'clock, just preceding the evening preaching service, the suffering and death of our Lord and Saviour was commemorated by the Sacrament. Rev. E. D. Carpenter was in charge. Rev. A. J. Allen offered the consecration prayer. It was a blessed season, in which about a hundred participated in memory of the broken body and shed blood of Christ.

Song, "Can a Boy Forget His Mother," was sung by the choir. A. C. Dow offered prayer.

A. Jesus Christ was more than the perfect and ideal man; He was God.

B. The crucifixion of Jesus was: 1. The accomplishment of a master purpose; 2. A precious example of self-sacrifice for the greatest good; 3. A living example of suffering for others.

C. The paradox of life by death. 1. Jesus did a kingly act when he bowed His head upon the cross and died; but He lived again. So we shall only come into our inheritance of life as we die with Him. 2. Our fair sons must give up their lives on the foreign battle-

fields, if we are to continue to enjoy liberty. Life must come by death.

Closing prayer and benediction by Rev. O. G. Wyman.

Thus closed the seventy-sixth session of the Champlain Conference. The Holy Spirit was manifest throughout the session. It began under the Spirit, continued in the Spirit, and closed with the Spirit's unction resting specially upon His people, as we separate to go to our several homes, and to take up the arduous duties in the Master's service. Psa. 126:6, "He that goeth forth and weepeth, bearing precious seed, shall doubtless come again with rejoicing, bringing his sheaves with him."

#### Report No. 7.

#### Conference Sunday School Secretary

The year has been one of progress in our Sunday School work, a progress made possible under God's blessing and guidance, by the co-operation of the Sunday School organizations, by the interested pastors and by the constructive labors of your Connectional Secretary. In my attempts to assist our Connectional Secretary in reaching local needs, I have found him a great help in the Conference work.

In accordance with the action of our last Annual Conference in adopting the report of our former Secretary the Conference has been divided into two districts. The northern district contains all the charges from Plattsburg to Ogdensburg, the southern district contains all charges south of Plattsburg. Rev. E. L. Elliott was chosen as superintendent of the northern district; Rev. H. S. Hill of the southern.

A Sunday School Convention was held in each of these districts. We trust these conventions were both interesting and profitable. To be sure these attempts were rather experimental and perhaps crude, but our God who will not quench a smoking flax blessed the crude experiments. At each of these conventions a permanent holiness organization was affected and five holiness conventions have been held during the year.

We were ably represented at the State Convention at Albany last June by Rev. H. S. Hill, whose report will be given later.

We have as a fruition of the year's work four Teacher Training classes registering a total of forty-five members, we also have organized classes in our Sunday Schools.

I have received from all sources \$34.68 for this work. I have paid out \$21.31, leaving a balance on hand of \$13,37. There are thirty-three Sunday Schools in the Conference. Nine of these contributed an offering to the work. If each local Sunday School would contribute \$1.00 annually and the Conference contribute \$5.00 on the state delegates' expenses I think it would secure the work financially for the coming year.

I have sent to each pastor in our conference valuable printed matter explaining in detail every phase of the work. Answers to these letters accompanied by the reports asked for have not yet been received.

The outlook is really encouraging. I am enamored with my

office. The work is delightful. Our needs are many and cannot be met at a single stroke. The greatest human obstacle has been the lack of interest. Two conventions this year, attended by the pastors and by a delegate from each charge will bring much of inspiration to the local schools.

I appreciate the services rendered by those who have done their best and bespeak for your secretary the hearty co-operation of all in a work that is at once the nucleus of the church and the hope of to-morrow's morals.


