THE KANSAS CONFERENCE

JOURNAL OF DAILY PROCEEDINGS

The sixtieth annual session of the Kansas Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Connection (or Church) of America assembled in the auditorium at Miltonvale, Kansas, at 1:30 P. M., Monday, August 11, 1930, with the President, Rev. F. C. Hill, in the chair.

The opening devotions were led by E. A. Coates, who read 1 Peter 5:1-12, with comment. Brother F. E. Shivers led in prayer.

BOOKS AND PERIODICALS

Holiness people should be as careful in selecting their reading matter as they are in selecting the food which they eat. Poisonous food can only affect physical health while poisonous reading will cause serious moral disease and spiritual death.

The wise man has said, "Of making books there is no end." Read-

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ing matter is so plentiful that most of it can be bought at a very low price. Yet in the midst of this abundant supply the Bible continues to be "The Book of all books." It still retains a commercial lead. It is the best selling book on the market. But its claim to the title "The Book of all books" is due to the fact that it is the revelation of the Divine, and points out the plan of salvation. Holiness people have the Book and will continue to accord first place to it.

We urge our own people to use our own literature in their Sunday Schools. There may be other literature which may be a few cents cheaper but we cannot afford to barter our convictions on doctrinal truths for a few pennies. We know that the literature put out by our publishing house is orthodox and spiritual.

Each Wesleyan Methodist home should have the Wesleyan Methodist and the Wesleyan Missionary in it. These papers will provide proper doctrinal truths and will also give needed information concerning our church work and Mission fields which can be secured from no other source. Subscriptions to these papers will also help our Publishing House.

Book-stores and Magazine counters contain much reading matter that is not fit to be read. As Holiness people we should guard jealously the literature which enters our home and shield our children from that which might be detrimental. We recommend that our people patronize our own Publishing House in purchasing books. We can rest assured that only the best of books will be handled by our Publishing House, and if they do not have the book which we want, they can get it for us as cheaply as we could from another Publishing House and still have a small margin of profit left.

There are a few story magazines which we can recommend to our people, such as, "The Youth's Companion," "The American Girl," and some others of like standard. But we wish to warn against the reading of cheap, trashy literature which comprises the larger part of the display in magazine counters today. Those who read such literature do so at the peril of their own souls.

MEMORIAL TO GENERAL CONFERENCE

Inasmuch as the departments of the Church can not hope to reach their highest state of efficiency without adequate leadership, and since the Wesleyan Methodist Connection pays its Connectional Officials a living wage, we, the members of the Kansas Conference, do hereby memorialize the General Conference to so define the duties of Connectional Officials, that their entire time and energies shall be devoted to the work of their several departments, to the end that the entire Connection may have the benefit of Connectional Official visitation, whenever the work of the several departments may be advanced by it. However, this resolution shall not be interpreted as requesting that the Connectional Agent or Editor be required to leave his office for Conference visitation.

RESOLUTIONS

1. **Evangelistic Help.**—Resolved, That the Camp Ground and Camp Meeting Committee be authorized, if they see fit to do so, to engage Evangelistic help for Camp Meeting two years in advance.

2. **Pastor's Support.**—Resolved, That it be a part of the Quarterly Conference Evangelist's duties at the first Quarterly Meeting to assist the Stewards of the Circuits to secure proper subscriptions for the Pastor's support.

3. **Election of Permanent Officers.**—Resolved, That the Kansas Conference fix the second day of its regular session as the time of the election of its Conference officers.

4. **Subscription Lists.**—Resolved, That all subscription lists and money raised at Conference for all purposes be put through the hands of the Conference Treasurer or the Treasurer of the W. H. & F. M. Society, and that all subscription lists be kept by these Treasurers, and that notice of indebtedness be given all subscribers by means of a list sent to their pastors early in the year.

5. **Sanctity of God's House.**—Resolved, That such work as making quilts and disposing of the same be performed in the homes of the people and not in the houses erected for public worship.

6. **Pastor's Moving Expenses.**—Resolved, That the class hiring a minister shall within ten days after his arrival pay to him his moving expenses, this not to be applied on his salary.

7. That the President of each local Society be made responsible to arrange with the Pastor for one evening of the third week of each month to pray especially for the Mission work, the same to be preceded by a day of fasting. We also recommend that a Thank Offering be taken at the monthly Prayer Service to be applied on Sister Grace Davis' salary.

8. That each Missionary Society have a basket to be filled with such articles as can be sent with out-going Missionaries or in Home work.

9. That the Study Book, "India Looks To Her Future," by Dr. Oscar MacMillian Buck, be used. Said book may be obtained from the Wesleyan Publishing House, 330 E. Onondaga St., Syracuse, N. Y.

10. That our women of the W. H. and F. M. Societies be modest examples in their dress and encourage others to do likewise.

11. That our Societies make bandages and send them to Rev. E. F. McCarty, 222 S. Clemens Ave., Lansing, Mich., and receive credit of 50 cents per pound for the same. Also, that donations of clothing to the

12. That our Societies contribute to the support of the Hephzibah Orphanage. Cash contributions will apply on Budget.

13. That each local President appoint a Committee of two whose duty shall be to visit the sick and to work in harmony with the Pastor in rendering any assistance that will help in reaching souls and building up the Kingdom of God.

14. That all money be disbursed through our Local and Conference Treasurers, and that each Local Society use the Treasurer's book prepared by the General Conference Society and that the Treasurer's book be sent to Conference with the Delegate.

Division II

15. That our Conference President, Y. M. W. B. Superintendent, and District Organizers arrange two programs for the coming year, the first to be on Foreign Missions, to be given in December, and the second on Home Missions at Convention time.

16. That the President and District Organizers arrange the time and recommend the Worker for the Conventions. Also that they prepare the schedule for the visitation of our worker and report before the close of Conference.

17. That each District be supervised by the District Organizer under direction of the Conference President. She shall be Prayer Secretary and Magazine Committee of her District and shall report the condition of her District to the President quarterly.

18. That the Secretary be instructed to supply each local President with a copy of the Efficiency Standard. And that a grade of 10% be given on any ten points chosen. A grade of 90% be given honorable mention, and a Society making a grade of 100% be placed on the Honor Roll.

19. That the Gleaners observe the monthly Prayer Hour. That each be a subscriber to the Missionary Magazine, furnish ten pounds of bandages and write at least once to each of the Mission fields.
