## JOURNAL OF DAILY PROCEEDINGS

The Lockport Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Connection (or Church) of America convened for its SEVENTIETH ANNUAL SESSION in the Wesleyan Methodist Church at Fillmore, N. Y., at 9:00 A. M., April 8th, 1931.

The opening sermon was preached the evening previous by Rev. A. O. Northrup from 1 Corinthians 16:8, 9. The keynote of evangelism was clearly sounded.

The opening session was called to order by the President and the devotional exercises were conducted by the Secretary and Rev. O. G. McKinley.

The roll was called and 18 pastors and 19 delegates were marked present.

On motion the first six rows of seats across the body of the Church was made to constitute the Bar of Conference.

The time for opening and closing the sessions of Conference is as follows: Morning sessions to open at 8:30 and to close at 11:30. The afternoon sessions to open at 1:30 and to close by vote of Conference.

It was moved and duly seconded that the President appoint a Committee on Resolutions composed of five members, to whom all special resolutions are to be referred and reported to Conference. The following constitute the Committee: Walter Readett, A. J. Taylor, Orval Howard, E. L. Elliott, Glenn E. Burgess.

The Committee on Temporary Organization submitted its report, which was considered item by item and adopted. See Report No. 1.

On motion the Secretary was requested to post in a conspicuous place a copy of the above report.

The Vice-President was called to the chair and the Conference President submitted his Annual Report. This was adopted as a whole, after referring an item relative to the Scranton appointment to the Committee on Pastoral Relations, also referring the Scranton and North Tonawanda appointments to the Committee on Boundaries to state the name of said appointments. See Report No. 3.

On motion the election of Conference Officials was made the Order of the Day for Thursday morning, April 9th, at 9:30.

. By Conference action the Vice-President was made a member of the Committee on Religious Services.

The following persons were introduced to Conference and made a few suitable remarks: Rev. J. S. Willett, Connectional Agent; Rev. Nelson Taylor, Rev. David Rees.

A recess was voted for committee work.

The Conference was called to order by the President and the time was extended to receive the reports of the Committees on Religious Services and Auditing. See Report No. 2 on Religious Services. The Auditing Committee had O. K.'d the President's Financial Report. Both reports were adopted.

Adjourned on motion, the benediction being given by Rev. Charles Sicard.

#### First Day, Afternoon Session, April 8, 1931

The session was called to order by the President and the devotional exercises were conducted by Rev. G. E. Bathurst.

The roll was called and the minutes approved as read.

The Treasurer of the Board of Trustees submitted his Annual Report, which was referred to the Auditing Committee. See Report No. 4.

The following names were called and their characters were passed: Edward L. Elliott, Walter Readett, A. A. Hickok, A. J. Taylor, William Osgood, G. E. Bathurst, J. E. Bruce, Francis B. Markell, O. G. Mc-Kinley.

On motion the Secretary was authorized to secure 250 copies of the minutes, to be sent pro rata to the various Charges.

On motion a committee was elected to consider the time and place of the next session of the Annual Conference. The following persons were elected on the Committee: J. S. Luckey, C. F. Ball, C. I. Armstrong, A. J. Taylor, and the President of the Conference.

A motion was made and duly seconded to reconsider the time for the election of Conference Officials. The motion was lost by a vote of 5 for and 18 against.

The following Committee was elected to define the duties of the President for the coming year: E. L. Elliott, Charles Sicard, J. S. Luckey, C. I. Armstrong, C. F. Ball.

On motion the Delegate from the Ellicott Charge was excused from Thursday's Session of Conference.

A recess was granted for committee work.

The Conference was called to order by the President at 4:18, and the Auditing Committee submitted a partial report having O. K.'d the report of the Treasurer of the Board of Trustees. The report of the Committee, also the Treasurer's report was adopted.

The Committee to whom was referred the matter of the time and place for holding the next session of the Annual Conference submitted its report, which was adopted. See Report No. 5.

The Committee to whom was referred the work of defining the duties of the Conference President for the year 1931-32 submitted its report, which was adopted. See Report No. 6.

Rev. G. I. Norman, of Chicago, Ill., was introduced to Conference and made a few remarks.

Adjourned on motion, the benediction being given by Rev. Edward Elliott.

#### Second Day, Morning Session, April 9, 1931

The session was called to order by the President and the devotional exercises were conducted by Rev. O. G. McKinley.

The roll was called and the minutes approved as read.

The Sunday School Secretary submitted his report, which was adopted. See Report No. 7.

Letters were read from the following: Florence Yorton, C. H. Dow, Lindford Sicard, and M. A. Bateman. The characters of this sister and these brethren were passed and the Secretary instructed to reply to their communications.

The following names were called and their characters were passed: Charles Sicard, Jesse Steves, A. O. Northrup.

The time for the Orders of the Day having arrived, the President appointed E. L. Elliott, Wallace Barnett, Jesse Steves and Glenn E. Burgess as tellers and the Conference proceeded with the election of Conference Officials, which resulted as follows:

President Rev. Edward L. Elliott.

Vice-President Rev. Arthur J. Taylor.

Secretary Rev. Francis B. Markell.

Assistant Secretary Rev. Walter Readett.

Treasurer Rev. Charles L. Horton.

Sunday School Secretary Miss Josephine Rickard.

Tithing Secretary Rev. Jesse Steves.

Statistical Secretary Rev. John E. Bruce.

The election of members on the Board of Trustees resulted as follows: On first ballot for ministerial member, Rev. Joseph R. Pitt

received 23 of 38 votes cast and was declared elected. On the second ballot, Rev. James A. Bain received 20 of 39 votes cast and was declared elected. The election of lay members resulted as follows: On the first ballot for lay member, Orval H. Howard received 27 of 38 votes cast and was declared elected. On the second ballot, Edwin A. Gibbs received 21 of 37 votes cast and was declared elected for one year to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Henry R. Barnett.

The election of Delegates to the General Conference resulted as follows: Ministerial Members, Edward L. Elliott, Charles Sicard.

Adjourned by limitation of time, the benediction being given by Rev. A. O. Northrup.

#### Second Day, Afternoon Session, April 9, 1931

The session was called to order by the President and the devotional exercises were conducted by Rev. Nelson Taylor.

The roll was called and the minutes approved as read.

The matter of unfinished business was taken up and the Conference proceeded with the completion of the election of Delegates to the General Conference. The result is as follows: First Ministerial Reserve, Arthur J. Taylor. Second Ministerial Reserve, Chauncey I. Armstrong. Lay Delegates, James S. Luckey, Glenn E. Burgess. First Lay Reserve, Ernest B. Houghton. Second Lay Reserve, LeVay Fancher.

By vote it was made the decision of this body that in case of emergency the first alternate delegate is expected to fill the first

vacancy that may be created.

At this period in the Conference proceedure the former Conference President, Rev. James A. Bain, graciously gave over to the President-elect, Rev. Edward L. Elliott, the office, responsibility, and blessings of the President's office, praying God's blessing upon him. The President-elect took the chair and a rising vote of thanks was tendered to the outgoing President for his faithful and unselfish service to the Conference during his seven and one-half years of ministry and official oversight of the Lockport Conference. The Conference then united in singing "Blest Be the Tie That Binds."

The time for the Orders of the Day having arrived, Rev. J. S. Willett, Connectional Agent, presented the Connectional Interests to the Conference. Following his inspirational address the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper was administered. God's Spirit was manifestly

present.

The Conference was called to order by the President at 4:00 P. M. and adjourned on motion.

## Third Day, Morning Session, April 10, 1931

The session was called to order by Rev. A. O. Northrup, who also conducted the devotional exercises.

The roll was called and the minutes approved as read.

The following names were called and their characters were passed: J. R. Pitt, Louise Gifford, A. C. Dow, Charles L. Horton, C. I. Armstrong, Harry J. Bullock, James A. Bain.

The following persons were introduced to Conference and made a few remarks: Rev. E. F. McCarty, Connectional Foreign Missionary Secretary; Rev. Stanley Wright, President of the Rochester Conference; Rev. Byron H. Maybury, Pastor of the Nazarene Church, Bradford, Pa.; Rev. and Mrs. W. H. Marvin, President of the Allegheny Conference, and Rev. and Mrs. Noah R. Shaffer, also of the Allegheny Conference and Pastor of the Dixonville Charge of the Wesleyan Methodist Church.

The work of nominating the Standing Committees was referred to the Committee on Temporary Organization, with the authorization to include in their report the Committee on Religious Services.

On motion each Charge in the Lockport Conference was assessed fifteen cents per member for the purpose of defraying the expenses of the Delegates to the General Conference.

It was made the decision of this body that the Conference Budget be assigned on the basis of two dollars and fifty cents per member.

On motion a Committee of three was elected to prepare a list of the Conferences with entertaining Pastor and Charge, dates and Conference Presidents from the organization of the Conference until the present. The following were made to constitute the Committee: Mrs. Bessie Willett, Rev. Louise Gifford and Miss Marian Wright.

The name of George Osgood was called and his character passed.

The Statistical Report of the Driftwood Charge was read by Rev.

John E. Bruce, Statistical Secretary.

The Tithing Secretary submitted his report, which was adopted. See Report No. 10.

Rev. C. O. Brown, Pastor of the Christian Church in Machias, was introduced to Conference and made a few remarks.

On motion the work of ordering the Conference stationery was placed in the hands of the Conference President.

At this time A. O. Northrup and J. A. Bain placed before the Conference the possibilities and prospects of the new work in North Tonawanda.

The time for the Orders of the Day having arrived, President Luckey presented the Educational Interests and the deficit on the Educational Budget was raised.

The Orders of the Day relative to the Memorial Service were postponed until Saturday the eleventh at three P. M.

Adjourned on motion, the benediction being given by Rev. E. F. McCarty.

#### Fourth Day, Morning Session, April 11, 1931

The session was called to order by the Secretary and the devotional exercises were conducted by Rev. Jesse Steves.

The roll was called and the minutes approved.

The Committee to whom was referred the work of preparing a list of the Conferences reported their work completed and in the hands of the Secretary.

The Committee on Post Office Addresses read a partial report, submitting a list of the Sunday School Superintendents with their addresses. The report was adopted. See Report No. 11.

The Conference Treasurer submitted his report, which was referred to the Auditing Committee. See Report No. 12.

The following persons were introduced to Conference and made a few remarks: Rev. J. R. Smeltzer, of Falconer, N. Y., and Rev. Benjamin F. Armstrong of the American Sunday School Union of Brocton, N. Y.

On motion all visiting brethren, introduced to Conference, were given an honorary seat within the Bar of Conference.

By request, Rev. and Mrs. Arthur J. Taylor sang "Jesus Saves Me." This song was blessed to our hearts.

A letter was read from Sister Sarah Wilcox conveying greeting to the Conference, and her character was declared passed.

On motion the Secretary of the Camp Meeting Association was authorized to insert an item in the Conference Minutes advertising Houghton Camp Meeting for next August.

The Statistical Secretary submitted his report, which was referred back to the committee until the Secretary secures from President Luckey the total cash amount received by him on the Educational Budget. See Report No. 13. The report was received later.

Owing to the lull in Conference activities on account of waiting for Committees to complete the work assigned to them, the Conference joined in a song and praise service. The atmosphere was very refreshing.

On motion the Conference Treasurer was authorized to send to each Charge at the end of each quarter a statement of the amount that each is short on the Conference Budget.

A recess was voted for committee work.

The Conference was called to order at 11:24, and the Sunday School Secretary nominated Rev. Royal Woodhead and Miss Bessie Fancher as her assistants; the Conference President nominated Rev. Charles Sicard and Glenn E. Burgess as his Advisory Board, and these nominations were endorsed by Conference action.

The Judiciary Committee to whom was referred the case of Rev. H. H. Schoonover submitted its report, which was adopted. See Report No. 14.

The Board of Review, to whom was referred the case of Rev. George Clement, submitted its report, which was adopted. See Report No. 15.

The time for adjournment having arrived, the time was extended for fifteen minutes and the Committee on Temporary Organization, to whom was referred the matter of nomination of the Standing Committees, submitted its report, and two items relative to the nomination of the Judiciary Committee and the Chairman of the Central District were referred back to the Committee for reconsideration.

Adjourned by limitation of time, the benediction being given by Rev. James A. Bain.

#### Fourth Day, Afternoon Session, April 11, 1931

The Conference was called to order by the Vice-President and the devotional exercises were conducted by Rev. Charles L. Horton.

The roll was called and the minutes approved as read.

Having O. K.'d the Treasurer's Report, the Auditing Committee reported the same to Conference, and this and the Treasurer's Report were adopted.

Adjourned on motion, subject to the call of the Chair.

The Conference was called to order by the President at 3:00 P. M., and a Memorial Service in charge of Rev. Walter Readett was conducted in behalf of Rev. B. S. Laughlin, Rev. John R. Babcock and Mr. Henry R. Barnett. The order of the service was as follows:

Congregational singing, "In the Sweet Bye and Bye."

Prayer, Rev. Arthur J. Taylor.

Scripture Reading, Rev. Walter Readett; Psalm 116:15, Revelation 14:13, Numbers 23:10.

The name of Mr. Henry R. Barnett was then called and those who spoke in commemoration and appreciation of his memory were President J. S. Luckey and Rev. John E. Bruce. The name of Rev. B. S. Laughlin was next presented and Rev. Walter Readett, Rev. Francis B. Markell and Rev. John S. Willett spoke in honor of his memory. The final name was that of Rev. John R. Babcock, former President of the Lockport Conference. The following persons spoke in high appreciation of his character, ministry and labors in the Lockport Conference and for the Cross of Calvary: Rev. Charles Sicard and Rev. James A. Bain. May the mantle of these faithful men of God and soldiers of the Cross of Christ fall upon the shoulders of some worthy sons in the Gospel ministry. #### Report No. 3.

#### PRESIDENT'S REPORT

To the members of the Lockport Annual Conference: Greetings in the name of our precious Lord.

Through the kind providence of God we have come to the seventieth year in the history and work of our Conference. As your President, after the rise of last Conference we formulated our plans as far as possible to comply with the order of program adopted by the Conference concerning the duties and responsibilities of the Conference President. Owing to our being Pastor of a Charge and President at the same time, our field of service has been large, and our responsibilities great. The year has not been without its perplexing problems which we have met and tried to solve in the Spirit of the Master, for the best interest of the work of God and the enlargement of our Conference. We believe the plan formulated at the Conference session of last year has been one of the best we have had for the encouragement of the Church and the upbuilding of the cause of God. In our effort to fulfill the demands of the Conference we have had much to encourage us. We have felt we have had the sympathetic cooperation of our Pastors and people in all the Quarterly Conferences we have held. We have had each Charge incorporate in their Quarterly Conference Minutes that they were enthusiastically behind the program of work the Conference is trying to do.

As we view the past, we see where much more could be accomplished, had we been able to devote more time to this arm of God's work. As we turn our eyes toward the future we see great opportunities on every hand for the development of our Church and the enlarging of our borders both in the established Church and in new fields. To meet our responsibility in this matter is no small task. Christ said over nineteen hundred years ago, "The fields are white and ready to harvest; pray ye that the Lord of the harvest may send forth laborers into His harvest." The harvest truly is great and the laborers are few. The situation can only be met by an apostolic ministry who know only God's will. Men who are not afraid to sacrifice for God and His Church. We need men of prayer who have tarried till they have seen the vision of God and the world's need. Holy men whose hearts are pure, whose lives are clean, who speak as the oracles of God in the power of the Holy Ghost. We need a consecrated and devoted laity who will enter into sympathetic coöperation with the plans and programs adopted by the Conference for the building up of the Church of God.

The perpetuity of our Church can only be assured by a spiritual

leadership who have been tried and proven. Men who are open to conviction relative to the best methods of spiritual development even if old plans and programs have to be relegated to the scrap heap; for, systems sometimes die with the occasion. There is a great field of opportunity before us. There is much land to be possessed and only as our work is marked by the spirit of aggressiveness do we attract those who are looking for spiritual help and for a chance to work. May we not as Pastors and laymen unite in one grand systematic program to make the Lockport Conference the best in the Connection, spiritually and constructively. In this alone will the ideal of our dreams be realized.

1. Granted Authorization Papers to Jesse Steves, Charles Horton, Lulu Tanner, Florence Yorton and George Osgood.

2. Granted Rev. H. H. Schoonover a letter of transfer to the Can-

ada Conference.

3. Received by letter of transfer from the Champlain Conference, Rev. William Osgood and appointed him to the Higgins Charge.

4. May 6th we made a trip to Bradford to look after the renewal or changing of the mortgage on the Bradford Church. This matter was adjusted in a very satisfactory manner.

5. On May 15, by invitation from the Rev. A. O. Northrup, we visited North Tonawanda to consider the advisability of taking over an independent mission and of organizing a Wesleyan Church.

6. On Sunday evening, June 1st, we went again to North Tonawanda and met with the mission people and organized a small class

and appointed Rev. A. O. Northrup as Pastor.

7. On June the 13th we held the First Quarterly Conference for the Olean Charge and laid before them the plans and programs adopted by Conference for carrying on its work. The Conference went on record as endorsing the system.

8. On June 15th, with the Pastor, Rev. A. C. Dow, we held a rededication service for the Emporium Church. At this service money

was raised to dedicate the building free of debt.

9. June the 29th and 30th we held the first Quarterly Meeting for the Cataraugus Charge. This was indeed a great pleasure to us to minister again to those whom we had served so long. The Charge is in a prosperous condition under the efficient labors of Rev. A. J. Taylor.

10. July 2nd we held the first Quarterly Meeting for the Batavia Charge. We had a splendid Quarterly Conference. It went on record as being behind the Conference program.

11. July 3rd we held the first Quarterly Conference for the Chestnut Ridge Charge. At this Conference the Church went on record as endorsing the program of the Conference.

12. July 6th we held the first Quarterly Conference for the Higgins Charge, at which meeting we brought before them the Conference

Program, which was endorsed by the Quarterly Conference.

13. July 26th, on invitation from Miss Fancher, we visited Scranton, N. Y., to consider the advisability of organizing a Church Society. The people as a whole did not seem ready to organize. Miss Fancher

is doing splendid work in this place.

14. July 19th we held the first Quarterly Conference for the Allegany Charge at which meeting we brought before the Conference the new program of work. This was adopted by the Charge. At this meeting we accepted the resignation of the Rev. M. D. Warburton as Pastor of the Charge. The Charge extended a call to the Rev. Johnson and we appointed him Pastor of the Charge.

15. September 16th we held the second Quarterly Conference for the Hess Road Charge with the Pastor, Rev. Francis B. Markell. The Quarterly Conference went on record as endorsing the program of our

work.

16. September 17th we held the second Quarterly Conference for the Ransomville Charge with Rev. Readett, the Pastor. This meeting was a season of refreshing and blessing.

17. October 1st, at the request of the Driftwood Charge, we attended a business meeting of the Charge to make arrangements for the supplying of the appointment that had been made vacant by the resignation of Rev. A. C. Dow, the Pastor. The appointment since that time has been supplied by Rev. Frank Wright.

18. October 18th, in company with our Advisory Board, we went to Batavia to investigate charges made against the Rev. George Clement, Pastor of the Batavia Charge. This matter was passed into the hands of the Judiciary Committee, who has dealt with the case.

19. In October we held the second Quarterly Meeting for the Houghton Charge and found the charge in line with the work and pro-

grams of the Conference.

20. November 18th we held the second Quarterly Meeting for the Ashwood Charge with the Pastor, Rev. Bathurst. This service was blessed with the presence and grace of God. The Church pledged their loyalty to the Conference programs.

21. December 12th we held the third Quarterly Conference for the Higgins Charge with the Pastor, William Osgood. This service was

a season of refreshing and blessing.

22. Held the third Quarterly Meeting for the Alleghany Charge

and found the Pastor and people deeply interested in the work of the

- 23. January 28th we made a trip to Bradford on Conference business relative to the collections for the sale of the Bethesda Home.
- 24. February 10th, at the call of the Pulpit Supply Committee, we made a trip to Olean to advise relative to the calling of a Pastor from outside our Church to serve the Olean Charge for the coming year. This privilege was granted subject to the approval of the Annual Conference.

#### Report No. 6.

#### PRESIDENT'S DUTIES

In addition to the duties defined by the Discipline, the duties of the President of the Lockport Conference for the year 1931-32 shall be as follows:

- 1. To oversee the spiritual and temporal business of the Churches of his Conference.
- 2. To give careful attention to the administrative work of the Conference, to evangelism, and to the young and inexperienced Pastors so as to enable them, by careful counselling, to become efficient in the work and to look after all the general interests of the denomination.
- 3. To hold one or two Quarterly Conferences on each Charge during the year. It shall be understood that these Conferences, as far as possible, shall be the first and third, and that the President may hold them on any day or night of the week and that the compensation shall be a flat rate of five dollars per meeting and expenses, to be paid from the Conference Fund. The compensation for other Conference services by the President shall be at the rate of five dollars per day and expenses.
- 4. To have the authority to prepare a list of the Quarterly Conferences that he is to visit, to consult with the Pastors with regard to this list, but to have the final authority in deciding the schedule of dates.
  - 5. To direct the attention of the Quarterly Conference to all the

general interests of the Conference and Denomination, Church Extension, Home and Foreign Missions, Education and the Sunday School.

- 6. To counsel with the Pastors faithfully and to offer them any assistance within his power.
- 7. To meet the Official Boards of the local Churches, to counsel with them with reference to spiritual, financial and pastoral matters and to give such advice and assistance as he may be able.

8. To see that the Denominational Budgets are being raised, and, if necessary, to suggest ways and means of doing this.

- 9. To take upon himself, definitely, the problem and responsibility of raising the Conference Budget, to suggest ways and means of doing this, to present the matter persistently and to do all in his power to raise the Budget in full.
- 10. To endeavor earnestly to arouse the membership to a more uniform performance of their duties as to a minimum salary for ordained ministers of one thousand dollars cash and parsonage on each charge, and shall suggest the most practical means of doing this.
- 11. To try faithfully to have our Church literature used on every Charge, and to endeavor earnestly to have the Wesleyan taken in every home.
- 12. As necessity demands, and the President so desires and can, he is hereby authorized to secure the assistance of the Vice-President in the performance of the President's duties.

#### Report No. 18.

#### BUDGET APPORTIONMENT

- 1. The part of the Budget for Education is \$1,500, and all money paid for current expenses of Houghton College, all money on L. S. U. Pledges for Houghton College, and all interest (but not principal) paid on Educational notes for Houghton College, and all money raised on Educational Day by the Y. M. W. B. and on Harvest Day by the W. H. and F. M. Society may count toward this Budget.
- 2. The part of the Budget for Foreign Missions is \$2,500.00 and all money paid for current expenses for Foreign Missions, all money appropriated for this purpose by the W. H. and F. M. Society, and all money paid by the Y. M. W. B. may count toward this Budget.
- 3. We recommend that the part of the Budget for Home Missions be \$1,500.00, and all money paid for Home Missions and all money appropriated for this purpose by the W. H. and F. M. Society may count toward this Budget; also money paid on the Batavia Liability and for work authorized by the Conference Missionary Board may count toward this Budget, and this work may include tent work, building Churches, organizing Sunday Schools in unoccupied territory, and strengthening and building up work already established but not self-supporting. However, it is understood that thirty per cent (30%) of the total Conference apportionment for Home Missions must be paid in cash into the Connectional Home Missionary Treasury, and seventy per cent (70%) shall be used in the Conference. This amounts to a little more than one thousand dollars, and we recommend that this be used to apply on the principal of the Batavia Liability.

#### THE LOCKPORT CONFERENCE

4. We recommend that the part of the Budget for Conference be \$2,500.00, and nothing but cash may count toward this Budget. We recommend that this Budget be distributed as follows:

- 5. The General Conference Budget is for the expenses of the Delegates, and averages fifteen cents per member. This should be raised at once and sent to the Conference Treasurer on or before June first.
- 6. We recommend that no Charge shall receive credit on its Budget except for cash or receipts sent to the Conference Treasurer.
- 7. We recommend that the Pastors include in their Statistical Reports these items: Total Budget Assigned, Total Budget Raised; that the second item shall not be filled in until the Pastor has settled with the Conference Treasurer, and that the amount placed in the second item be the amount reported to the Pastor by the Conference Treasurer.
- 8. We recommend that the Conference authorize each Pastor to hand to the Budget Committee at the next Annual Conference a list of members on his Charge under sixteen years of age, provided that he declares that he knows personally each one on the list is under sixteen. This list shall be deducted from the number determining Budget apportionment on that Charge.
