DISTRICT RESOLUTIONS

SECTION I District Officers

- 1. (a) There shall be a traveling District Superintendent, who shall receive house rent and \$5,200 annually. This salary shall be apportioned to the churches and paid by them to the District Treasurer, who shall on the first of each month, beginning with August 1 each District year, forward a check for one twelfth of the amount to him. At the time of his election the first ballot shall be a nominating ballot. He shall be granted a two weeks vacation with pay plus an additional two weeks to be spent in activity of his own choosing outside the realm of his official duties.
- (b) His traveling expense at .07 per mile or actual fare, also his telephone, long distance phone calls pertaining to District work, desk and secretarial expense and parsonage utilities shall be paid from District Operational funds. The District shall assist the District Superintendent to meet his social security payment by giving him a cash gift equal to half of his social security assessment on his salary as District Superintendent, such gift to come from District Operational Fund. From District Operational Fund shall be paid 12% of his cash salary to the Wesleyan Retirement Fund.
- (c) There shall be a full-time traveling Assistant District Superintendent. His duties shall be to assist the District Superintendent in carrying out the program of the District and the District Board of Administration in the field of Pioneer Evangelism and in the General Administration of the District work. This shall include official visitations to the churches and evangelistic campaigns on mission points and in other churches of the District as time and duties permit.
- (d) From District Pioneer Funds, he shall receive living quarters, telephone and desk expense, travel expense at .07 per mile or actual fare, and a guaranteed salary of \$5,000, \$300 of which shall be applied on his utilities. His offerings from evangelistic meetings on pioneer points and in organized churches, including all monies handed to him while engaged in these meetings, shall apply on his salary. He shall be granted a two weeks vacation with pay plus an additional two weeks to be spent in activity of his own choosing outside the realm of his official duties. At the time of his election the first ballot shall be a nominating ballot.
- (e) The District shall assist the Assistant District Superintendent to meet his social security payment by giving him a cash gift equal to half of his social security assessment on his salary as Assistant District Superintendent, such gift to be paid from the District Pioneer Fund. From District Operational Fund shall be paid 12% of his cash salary to the Wesleyan Retirement Fund.
- (f) The District Action Committee shall review annually the salary arrangements pertaining to the District Superintendent and Assistant District Superintendent prior to the annual election.
- 2. (a) It shall require a written order of the Board of Administration for funds to be paid from the District Pioneer Fund.
- (b) The District Board of Administration may employ such pastors of the District as may be needed for pioneer meetings. Churches are urged to cooperate by granting their pastors a two-week leave of absence with pay, if his services are requested by the Board.
- (c) The Board of Administration and the District Trustees shall jointly administer the District Building Aid Fund.

- (d) The activities of the Board of Administration regarding Pioneer evangelism with the amounts of salaries guaranteed and the amounts invested in each project, shall be reported to the District Conference annually.
- 3. The District shall elect a Camp Meeting Committee consisting of ten members, six ministerial and four lay, to have entire supervision of the Campgrounds and its improvements, and the making of complete arrangements for Camp and Camp Meeting services, and also provide for the entertainment of the District Conference. They shall serve for terms of three years. The District Superintendent shall be an ex-officio member of the Camp Meeting Committee and presiding officer of the Camp Meeting session. This committee shall designate from among its membership a Chairman, Secretary and Treasurer. The Secretary and Treasurer shall report to the District Conference and the report shall be incorporated in the District Conference Journal. The Treasurer's report shall be audited. This Committee shall advise with the District Trustees as to the location, erection and improvements of District buildings on the Campground.
- 4. It shall be the duty of the Trustees of the Ohio District to receive, hold, and dispose of property within the bounds of the District as provided in the book of Discipline. In addition to this they shall also be empowered to act in certain instances as follows:
- A. Resolved: The Trustees of the Ohio District shall be, and they hereby are, empowered to execute all necessary papers, mortgage deeds and papers of a like character when necessary to secure loans to the Ohio District, or to any church within the District needing funds to liquidate District, church or parsonage indebtedness, provided that the party or parties requesting such action shall set forth in writing the true nature and purpose for which the loan is requested (this writing is to become a part of the permanent records of the Trustees), and that both the District Superintendent and Trustees of said District are satisfied that the object for which the loan or loans is sought is both necessary and desirable. Whenever money is borrowed for use of a local church, the local church shall agree to be responsible for its payment.
- B. Resolved: The Trustees of the Ohio District shall be, and they hereby are, empowered to execute all necessary papers, mortgage deeds and papers of like character, when necessary to secure loans for the purpose of purchasing or erecting church or parsonage buildings in the pioneer work of the District, provided that the proposed project and the financing of it by means of the proposed loan shall receive the approval of a majority of the total membership of the District Board of Administration and a majority of the total membership of the Board of Trustees.
- C. Resolved: The Trustees of the Ohio District shall be, and hereby are, empowered to sign any or all deeds and papers for the transfer of real property that is now or hereafter may be held in trust by said Trustees, provided the sale of such District property, church or parsonage, or other real estate has been authorized and approved by the District Board of Administration.
- 5. We recommend a standard traveling expense of .07 a mile to the District Trustees, District Board of Administration, the Pioneer Committee and the Camp Meeting Committee from their respective funds.
- 6. Resolved: That there be a Church Building Loan Fund to be loaned to the churches for building purposes, this fund to come from the sale of the Fairmount Church, gifts and annuities, said fund to be administered by the District Trustees, and loaned on notes to be signed by the local trustees.

Not more than 20 per cent of the fund shall be loaned to any one church unless the calls for loans are such that the trustees find it necessary to grant a larger amount in order to keep the money in use, the interest to be figured at 3 per cent for the total length of the loan or the date of final payment and paid back at the rate of not less than 1 per cent of the total per month. Special short term loans of less than one year can be made at 6 per cent interest.

- (a) All notes to churches shall be drawn up according to the general form given in the Minutes of 1940.
- (b) There shall be a Pioneer Loan Fund under the administration of the District Board of Administration and the Trustees as per District Resolution 4 (b), All loans from this fund must be approved by both Boards.

Monies borrowed for this fund shall be at the best available rate of interest and shall be secured by straight notes signed by both Boards.

These funds are to be reloaned only for Pioneer Real Estate and buildings. The total amount of each loan shall not exceed 75 per cent of the estimated value of the completed building. The appraisal to be made or approved by the combined Boards. The interest charged on these loans shall not be more than the interest paid on monies borrowed for this fund.

Repayment shall be made at the rate of 1 per cent per month on the total amount of the loan. These payments shall be made at least semi-annually and shall pay interest to date with the balance to be applied on the principal. The payments shall be made by the local group unless the District Board of Administration specifically assumes that responsibility.

7. The Conference at its election shall elect a District Financial Secretary whose duties shall be to keep accurate records of District notes receivable and notes payable, and assist the District Officials in matters of finance as needed.

SECTION II - District Conference Session

- 1. (a) The District Conference shall convene on the fourth Monday of July and continue through the following Sunday.
- (b) Camp Meeting shall open with the Friday evening service or Conference week.
- (c) The Friday preceding Conference shall be set aside as a day of prayer for Conference and Camp.
- 2. The District Secretary shall provide blanks for Delegates Credentials including the following items: certificate of election, address of delegate, the Pastor's address and telephone number. These credentials are to be returned in advance of Conference to the District Secretary.
- 3. (a) It is required that each pastor obtain from the District Treasurer a signed statement of all U.S.F. monies paid to him. This statement shall agree with the pastor's statistical report, both of which shall be mailed to the chairman of the District Statistical Committee not later than July 15th.
- (b) The Conference shall omit the reading of the statistical reports by the Pastors, and instead, the District Statistical Committee shall post on the bulletin board certain items of vital interest, for the instruction of the members of the Conference.
- (c) The W.Y. Reports submitted to the Annual District Youth Conference shall be the basis for reporting W.Y. membership on the Pastor's statistical report. The District W.Y. President shall, soon after the close of Youth Camp, mail each pastor a signed statement with membership information for his annual conference report.
 - 4. The Special Orders of the District Conference shall be: MONDAY: 7:30

p.m., Communion Service and District Conference Address by the District Superintendent; TUESDAY: 9:00 a.m., Opening Business Session; 7:30 p.m., Sunday School Hour; WEDNESDAY: 11:00 a.m., Denominational Address; 1:30 p.m., Election of Officers; 7:30 p.m., Pioneer Service; THURSDAY: 10:00 a.m., Educational Service; 7:30 p.m., Missionary Service (Conducted by W.W.M.S.); FRIDAY: 1:30 p.m., Memorial Service when necessary; 7:30 p.m., First Service of Camp Meeting; SUNDAY: Morning, Ordination Service.

- 5. The annual session of the Ohio District Wesleyan Youth Conference shall be held on the fourth Monday in June and the following four days, in connection with a Youth Camp.
- 6. (a) The fiscal year for churches shall be from July 1 to June 30. All financial reports shall conform to this schedule.
- (b) The term of all church officers shall coincide with the Church fiscal year.
 - (c) The W.W.M.S. and Y.M.W.B. books shall close on June 20.
 - (d) The District Treasurer's books shall close on July 5.
- 7. There shall be a three-day Ministerial Convention for inspiration, instruction and fellowship held twice each year, meeting at the various churches by invitation and opening on the fourth Tuesday of March and the fourth Tuesday of October, with the exception that on alternate years we shall cooperate with the Marion Area Ministerial Conventions. The officers of the Convention shall be a Chairman, a Vice-Chairman, a Secretary-Treasurer, and a Reporter. There shall also be a Planning Committee consisting of a chairman, the District Supt.-ex-officio, and three elected ministers. The duties of the committee shall be to plan programs, publicize the Conventions, and have general oversight of them. All officers of the Ministerial Convention shall be elected by ballot at the time of the Spring Convention and shall serve for a term of two years.

All money for expenses shall be raised by free-will offerings during the conventions.

It shall be the duty of each minister with District appointment to attend these Conventions unless providentially hindered.

SECTION III. Churches and Pastors

- 1. In addition to the duties as outlined in the Discipline, it shall be the responsibility of our pastors to:
 - (a) Attend the annual Camp Meeting.
- (b) Remain on the work he is appointed to for the whole Conference year unless released by the District Board of Administration. Any pastor otherwise leaving the work during the year shall not have his annual service report passed except by vote of the District Conference.
- (c) Cooperate with the Local Church Board in notifying non-attending members of their financial responsibilities.
- (d) Instruct all local preachers on their charge of disciplinary requirements to study and travel under District direction and be sure they have necessary licenses and recommendations.
- (e) Submit monthly reports to the District Superintendent on prepared forms and return monthly report balnks to the District Secretary of Sunday Schools.
 - 2. It shall be the responsibility of our churches to:
 - (a) Pay the moving expense of the in-coming pastor.
- (b) Pay pastor's salary for fifty-two weeks per year, beginning with the last Sunday of Camp Meeting, and grant him a 2-week vacation.

- (c) Pay traveling expenses and room and board for pastors and delegates at District Conference. We recommend that the expenses at District Conference of each General Evangelist be paid by the church of which he is a member, such expenses to include travel expense for a distance not to exceed that from his home church to the District Conference.
- (d) We recommend that each church assist its pastor to meet his social security payment by giving him a cash gift equal to at least half of the social security assessment on his salary as pastor.
- (e) Accept a campground work assignment from the Camp Meeting Committee and when unable to fulfill this responsibility, make a financial arrangement for substitute workers. The Camp Meeting Committee in making such assignments shall give consideration both to the size and financial status of each church.
- 3. No church shall begin or continue in any major building or remodeling program until it has conferred with the District Building Committee on Church and Parsonage Buildings and Location. The Building Committee of said church shall sign a written agreement, to be acted upon by this District Committee; they shall also report monthly in writing to this District Committee; the matter of such reports and agreements shall be agreed upon mutually by these two committees concerned.

SECTION IV. Standards of Practice

- 1. We, the Ohio District, declare our opposition to worldly practices and adornment. We believe that the wearing of the wedding ring is a violation of the scriptural injunction against the wearing of gold, which is not purely utilitarian in its use, because the wearing of the wedding ring encourages the wearing of other superfluous adornments. We, therefore, do earnestly request that all our local churches comply with this expressed standard. It shall be the duty of our pastors and ministers to support this resolution.
- 2. We require that all workers, preachers, and singers at Children's and Youth Camps, District Conference and Camp Meeting, wear sleeves below the elbow, and all their apparel be in accord with the Wesleyan Discipline.
- 3. In the judgment of the Ohio District the common use of television is an impediment to the development of holy character. Inasmuch as ministers are examples, and patterns to the flock of Christ, the Ohio District expects each of its ministers to set a wholesome example and to be a godly pattern in this respect by not owning or permitting a television set to be brought into a church parsonage or minister's residence.

These resolutions have been edited only and recommended resolutions will be presented at the next annual District Conference.

Report No. 3 CONFERENCE PRESIDENT

To the ministers and laymen, members of the sixty-first and last session of the Ohio Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church and the first session of the Ohio District of the Wesleyan Church, and to all interested friends assembled on these grounds, greetings: -

Trusting in the words of the Master, "I will never leave thee nor forsake thee", we have continued unto this day. This has been a year of intense activity in the work of the presidency. Many have been the battles and many have been the blessed victories as we have sought to carry out the responsibilities assigned to us by this Annual Conference. There have been some moments of frustration, some of elation, and some of inspiration, but rever a dull moment in the service of the King. His grace has been sufficient, His strength adequate, His supporting arm upholding, His love abounding. While the pressures have been intense, the burdens heavy, and the problems manifold, yet we feel constrained to say in the words of the Apostle Paul, "I would have you understand, brethern, that the things which happened unto me have fallen out rather unto the furtherance of the Gospel." and, "In all these things we are more than conqueror through Him that loved us."

Our theme for the year, "A YEAR OF INCREASE", has been realized in many of our churches. Real revival has come, souls have been renewed, saved, and many have been genuinely sanctified, a goodly number of adults, youth and children have been added to the church rolls, new missionary societies have been organized, new youth societies and new Wesleyan Men organizations have been launched. God has prospered His work, and we praise Him who alone is worthy.

We have visited all the churches and missions of the Conference with the exception of two missions. Most of the churches have been given a Sunday service and a week-night service. The informal and informative nature of the week-night meetings have been well received throughout, and we believe they have been profitable to all participating. I have endeavored to faithfully discharge my responsibilities both to the Conference and to the General Church, and have sought to always have a conscience void of offence toward God and toward men.

I am very appreciative of the fine cooperation given us from the ministers and laymen of the churches. Also for the fine cooperation and support of the Vice President as he assisted in carrying the Conference responsibilities. Mrs. Howard has been of much assistance in the office in the work of promotion, information, correspondence, etc., and has faithfully acted as secretary in the Conference Office. To all who have had a part whether large or small, to all who have prayed faithfully and sincerely, to one and all we say a sincere "Thank You."

This has been an historical year for our Church. Merger with the Pilgrim Holiness Church has been consumated, and we are now one people called THE WESLEYAN CHURCH. The future will be what we make it plus how we take it. The emphasis of the General Conference was on evangelism and revival. Let us now join hands and hearts to spread Scriptural Holiness across the world and be a united witness for Christ and His Salvation.

We have traveled a total of 20,300 miles. I preached eighty-eight times, held fourty-six week-night information meetings, attended four Marion College Board Meetings, conducted six Pioneer District meetings, held one dedica-

tion service, conducted one wedding, and attended The National Holiness Association Convention, attended the General and Merging General Conferences, plus many other services too numerous to mention. "Hitherto hath the Lord Helped us."

I received in salary \$5,200.00, \$300 of which was designated for utilities; for travel expense \$1,120.00, one half of my Social Security Tax amounting to \$179.30.

December 11/67 with the concurrence of my Advisory Board I relieved Dennis Dean from his responsibilities as supply pastor of the South Zanesville Church.

February 6/68 With the concurrence of my Advisory Board I added the following names to the Conference Comity Committee: Howard B. Castle, Walter E. McKee, Jr., Walter W. Jeffries, Leroy A. Wilcox, James Vermilya, Don A. Glenn.

February 6/68 I appointed H. F. Clark as supply pastor of the South Zanesville Church.

June 10/68 I received a letter of standing for Lelon Glasure from the Bible Missionary Church and referred him to the C.I.O. for standing classification. June 15/68 I appointed Elwanda Porter and Warren G. Toops to the Auditing Committee, Camp Meeting and Conference Books respectively.

Report No. 4 THE VICE PRESIDENT

To the 61st session of the Ohio Annual Conference, and the first session of the Ohio District of the Wesleyan Church, Greetings:

We pause again as we conclude the labors of another important and historic year — the last year as the Ohio Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church, to report our labors for the year. It would be easy to get sentimental and begin to reminesce of the 27 years of ministry and fellowship as pastor and official in the Ohio Conference, for these have been wonderful years in so many ways.

But "Time and tide wait for no man", and we must move on in new relationships and labors. Most of us like to maintain the "Status quo", but that is impossible in these revolutionary days. So much has happened in our national life in the past few years! How many adjustments we have made in our thinking and our way of life. Adjustment must become a part of our Church life in the years ahead — the same doctrines, but new government and methods, new associates and relationships. And all these adjustments can make a more effective church, for God is not limited to our old (and sometimes inefficient and ineffective) way of doing things. There can, and must, be no adjustment or watering down of doctrine or holy living. These are the landmarks of our inheritance — the ancient landmarks which cannot be moved. But our methods are incidental and must keep pace with our day.

This has been a busy and rewarding year in the work of Pioneer Missions and the evangelistic outreach of our churches. God has visited us time after time in revivals and other services in the Churches of the Conference, and the joy of souls finding victory at our altars of prayer has sustained us in hours of pressure and heaviness, as we have dealt with the unpleasant situations inherent in administration.

Our Major Pioneer Project, Skyview, near Tipp City in the Dayton Area, has exceeded our expectations in many ways. As we began the Conference year, we had a vacant five acres and a pastor and wife with a vision and a burden for this challenging field.

Soon plans for building were completed and the contract awarded to Mr. Harmon, a member of the Church of the Nazarene, and a conscientious christian. While Rev. and Mrs. Toops worked diligently in the homes of the community in preparation for opening day of our new church, Mr. Harmon and his workers kept the building program moving along.

February 18th was Red Letter Day! Everything was in readiness. How we rejoiced as the people came for the first session of Sunday School, and the first worship service in our newest church. Over 100 present in both Sunday

School and Church! Dedication on March 31st was another historic day. The sanctuary was filled as our area churches came to take part in this wonderful service.

Skyview has responsed so well financially. They have paid rent and utilities for the pastor from the beginning of the Conference Year. Since opening services, they have assumed the utilities on the Church and have been paying the pastor's salary for many weeks. They are hoping to begin paying the mortgage payments (To the Wesley Investment Foundation) of \$250.00 per month, for this conference year. (detailed financial report will be given separately)

The potential of this church for future growth seems unlimited, and the spiritual atmosphere is very good. The cost is greater in this type of project, but the rewards are in proportion to cost. We feel that Skyview is a pattern for Pioneering that succeeds in this day.

After a crisis at South Zanesville, Rev. and Mrs. H. F. Clark were secured as pastors by the Board of Church Extension and Evangelism. They came at a time when the work was at a very low ebb, and have seen some outstanding progress under their ministry. South Zanesville is on the move in the right direction. At the close of last Conference year, the Lima Church voted to affiliate with our Conference as an unorganized church, Rev. and Mrs. Carl Huff were appointed pastors, and living in the Conference mobile home, have been faithful shepherds of this flock, Regardless of some trying circumstances, the work has made steady progress during the year and appears to be a fruitful field of labor. Millersburg has made some good gains in Sunday School and church attendance under the leadership of Glen Rader and his faithful companion. They will be missed by the church as they enter new doors of service. This sacrificial pastor has taught in public school to help support his family, and has only received remuneration after all bills were met. He and our other dedicated Pioneer Pastors are to be commended for their devoted labors of love. At this writing, Parkersburg, and Bellaire, in addition to Millersburg, are without pastoral leadership and need our prayers in this behalf.

We conducted revivals at Lima, Bellaire, Millersburg, Piqua, Marion Mark Street, Fargo, Newark, Westview, Jonesboro, Ind., S. Zanesville, Mansfield Pilgrim (vacation) Week-end at Madisonville Pilgrim, Youth Evangelist at Ky. Youth Camp (vacation). I served as delegate to N.H.A. in Cleveland, to the final General Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church, and the Merging General Conference of the Wesleyan Church at Anderson, Indiana.

I travelled 18,500 miles on official Conference assignments, and received \$1303.85 for mileage allowance. We received \$435.00 in offerings which were remitted to the Conference Treasurer. We preached 160 times during the year on many occasions: Homecoming, Watchnight service, Youth Rallies, Youth Camp, Wesleyan Men, Revivals, and regular visitation of churches, and various other occasions.

We have endeavoured to promote Church Extension, assist the Conference President in administration, help our churches in evangelistic services, and supervise the churches under the direction of the Board of Church Extension and Evangelism. We thank the people of the Ohio Conference for the privilege of laboring with such a cooperative and congenial family as you have proved to be. Your prayers and financial support has made the entire Pioneer Program possible. May God lead us in the future in pleasant and fruitful paths as he has so faithfully done in the past.

Greetings to the sixty-first Ohio Annual Conference.

It has been my privilege to serve you this past year as your Sunday School Secretary. I have tried to serve you through the Messenger, Conference promotions, display tables at conference functions, and personal correspondence. I now place the results of these efforts in God's precious hands for eternal fruitage.

Your spirit of cooperation has been deeply appreciated. I trust your local Sunday school leaders have shown the same spirit to you.

The Dayton Skyview Sunday school was born last February. It averages eighty-six the first month of its life. Its growth pattern is very satisfying. Thanks to God, the Ohio Conference, Rev. Eldon Martin and Rev. and Mrs. Warren G. Toops for their faith and labor in making this new school possible.

Based on the reports received to date and the monthly records I kept through the year I am happy to report an increase in average attendance of about 61 over last year. Even a small gain is gain.

I attribute this trend to a definite overcrowded condition the preceding year. Perhaps merger negotiations will change this problem in the future but it is one we should bear in mind.

As we face a new year, I find our task as Sunday school officers in Luke 24:45: "Then Jesus opened their understanding, that they might understand the scriptures." This is an unfinished task which He expects us to work at until the time of His soon appearing. Let us be faithful.

Report No. 15

CONFERENCE COMITY COMMITTEE

We, the Comity Committee on district boundaries, composed of the following members: Donald E. Howard, Chairman, Eldon R. Martin & Andrew Wilson, Conference trustees, and Leroy A. Wilcox, Walter E. McKee Jr., Howard B. Castle, Don A. Glenn, Walter W. Jeffries, and James Vermilya, members at large, after due consideration and prayer submit the following statements and recommendations as a progress report for your consideration.

We have met twice in recent weeks and once in March for study of the question of re-alignment of district boundaries. The executive committee met with the executive committees of the Eastern District and Western District in April. The following report was authorized by your Conference Committee in its meeting of July 11th.

STATEMENT: We feel that the merging of the Wesleyan Methodist Churches and the Pilgrim Holiness Churches in the State of Ohio into one Church, The Wesleyan Church, and the dividing of the sum total of these one hundred and sixty three churches into properly arranged districts must be something more than a mechanical re-arrangement without due consideration of the feelings and desires of the people involved. We must first find the will of the Lord. What does He want? Secondly, we must seek to discover what is best for the work of the Lord through the Wesleyan Church and for the cause of Scriptural Holiness. And thirdly, what is most satisfactory to our Wesleyan People involved; and in that order. By "Wesleyan people" we mean the entire constituency of the one-hundred and sixty-three Wesleyan Churches in the State of Ohio or in the territory in question.

It is with these considerations in mind that we now present this progress report with its proposals and recommendations for the study and consider-

ation of all involved.

Five proposals for the re-arranging of district boundary lines have been submitted for study to date. They are as follows in the order submitted:

Proposal number ONE: It is suggested that we have three districts in the State of Ohio with a line drawn from North to South dividing and including about one third of the State, the section west of that line to be called The Western Ohio District. From that line East following approximately Interstate Route Seventy to Bridgeport, Ohio. The section falling South of that line to be called the South East District, and the section falling North of that line to be called the North East District, Statistics were presented to show a fairly equal division of strength, numerically and financially.

Proposal number TWO: It is suggested that we have only one large district to be known as THE OHIO DISTRICT of the WESLEYAN CHURCH including the one-hundred and sixty three churches now in the present three districts. Such a district would be administered by two full time district leaders working in close relationship with zone leaders. It was suggested that this might be done for the first quadrennium, giving all of us time and opportunity to get acquainted through conventions, rallies, fellowship meetings, etc., drawing the whole group together. It was also suggested that at the end of the quadrennium, if this arrangement had been proved satisfactory, it might become a permanent one, also that we would be in better position after one quadrennium to wisely re-arrange district boundaries, if it seemed wise to do so.

Proposal number THREE: It is suggested that we have two districts, the dividing line being Interstate Seventy from East to West. The section of the State falling North of that line would be called the Northern Ohio District, and the section falling South of that line would be called the Southern Ohio District. This would give about eighty-one churches in the Northern District and eighty two churches in the Southern District. The statistics show that this would give a fairly equal distribution of strength, numerically and financially. In this arrangement both Victory Camp and Bethel Camp would fall in the Northern District, a rather awkard arrangement. Some adjustment would have to be made. It was suggested that both districts could have the use of Victory Camp grounds at different periods for Conference and Camp activities.

Proposal number FOUR: It is suggested that we have three districts divided by county lines so that there would be a Northern Ohio District, a South Eastern Ohio District, and a South Western Ohio District. Statistics reveal about an equal distribution of strength, numerically and financially. Victory Camp would fall in the Northern District, Bethel Camp in the South Eastern District, and West Milton Camp in the South Western District.

Proposal number FIVE: It was suggested that we have two districts, divided by county lines beginning at the North West point of Erie County, South, following the western borders of Erie, Huron, Richland, Knox, Licking Counties; thence West through Franklin County by Interstate Seventy to the western border of Franklin, then South, following the Western borders of Franklin, Pickway, Ross, Pike, and Scioto Counties to the Southern border of the State. All counties East of this line would be called The East Ohio District, and all counties West of the line would be called the West Ohio District. In this arrangement the three former Pilgrim Holiness Churches in Franklin County would be in the East Ohio District, and the three former Wesleyan Methodist Churches in Franklin County would be inthe West Ohio District, Victory Camp grounds would be the meeting place for the West Ohio District, and Bethel Camp grounds would be the meeting place for the East Ohio District. Statis-

tics show a fair and equal distribution of strength, numerically and financially. It is after much prayer, thought and deliberation that your Committee presents the following for your consideration:

We are here presenting a first choice and a second choice concerning the proposals presented above. The decision was arrived at by majority vote of the Committee.

FIRST CHOICE: Our first choice is that of proposal number TWO, that of making one large district to be known as The Ohio District of The Wesleyan Church, See proposal number TWO for details,

SECOND CHOICE: Our second choice is proposal number FIVE, that of two districts divided by county lines as stated, the districts to be known as, The East Ohio District and the West Ohio District of the Wesleyan Church. See proposal number FIVE for details. May it be understood that these choices here presented are the choices of your Conference Comity Committee, and are only for study and consideration. These proposals will be studied later by the joint Comity Committees so as to arrive at a determined plan for merging the districts. Then a final vote will be taken by each of the districts before the merging can be consumated.

Further recommendations: We recommend that those churches of our district located in the State of West Virginia be permitted to choose whether they shall become a part of the East Ohio District or of the West Virginia District.

We also recommend that all our people, former Wesleyan Methodists and former Pilgrim Holiness, be given the privilege of choosing where they shall attend camp meeting and which camp they shall support, in order that past fellowships may not be broken and that tender ties of relationships may be respected.

We further recommend that copies of this report be submitted to the Board of General Superintendents for their study and for their information, also to the District Superintendents of the present Eastern Ohio District and Western Ohio District, and that, if a satisfactory plan of merging the districts can be agreed upon by the three districts involved and it is approved by the proper General authorities, that be implemented as rapidly as possible with a goal set for consumation in the Summer of 1969.

We further recommend that at the time of the merging of the districts, at the merging conference or conferences as the case may be, a proper percentage of parity be maintained in effecting the organizations, in the election of district officials, boards and committees, so that the identity of the merging groups will be satisfactorily maintained.

Report No. 18 PROPERTY SETTLEMENT COMMITTEE

At the Annual Conference of 1967 your Committee was authorized to: "Ask our Counsel, Mr. Roy Metz, Attorney, to take necessary steps to clarify title and ownership of the properties," that to date had not made settlement with the Conference. This was done immediately after the rise of Conference. Court action was filed in both Montgomery County and Marion County for this clarification. The courts being slow, none of the cases have as yet come to a hearing.

Early in the year the Marion Silver Street Tabernacle, through their attorney, Mr. Stucky, made an offer of settlement for the sum of \$8,000.00. This, by action of the Committee and approval of the General Board, was accepted, and on July 11, 1968 the checks were delivered to our attorney, Mr. Metz. In accord with a clause in the title deed \$500.00 of the settlement goes to the Wesleyan Women's Missionary Society for the work in India and Africa.

The cases in Dayton, Montgomery County, regarding the Belmont Dayton and Radcliff Dayton properties are still pending at this date. Our attorney has done his best to get these settlements made, but he has met with a very uncooperative attitude on the part of those involved, so that much extra delay and expense has been incurred. A property settlement committee should be designated or elected by this Conference to continue until final settlements are made.

OHIO WESLEYAN YOUTH PRESIDENT

Cordial greetings to the members of this historical session of conference. Again it is our privilege to represent a most promising segment of the Church -- the 301 Active and 45 Associate members of Ohio Wesleyan Youth.

This has been a "year of increase" for Ohio WY in several areas. Subscriptions to our denominational youth periodical increased by 14.4% enabling us to retain our position of fourth in total number of subscriptions and third in proportion to membership. Three new locals were organized (Athens, North Woodbury and Miamisburg) and another (Bradford) was reactivated. Quiz team participation increased from 3 to 7 teams this year with another fine Weirton team emerging as Conference "Champs."

The highlight of mid-year activity was doubtless the Mid-Winter Convention held at the Lincoln Lodge, Columbus, December 28-29, 1967. The 152 persons in attendance enjoyed the unique ministry of Dr. Charles DeVol, a veteran in missionary and Christian educational fields, and the melodious ministries of the Kentucky Melody-Aires and the Indiana Top Teens. A second such convention is being planned for December 27-28, 1968, and the cooperation of every pastor is solicited.

SPECIAL PROJECT -- The new information center and public address system now in use at Victory Camp has been provided by the Ohio WY'ers as a special project through funds raised in district rallies.

The spiritual victories were numerous with a real "breaking through" on Thursday night of the camp as young people sought the Lord into the early morning hours.

The camp was again completely managed by Wesleyan Youth under a contract agreement with the Camp Meeting Committee. It is the desire of the Youth Council to continue this basis of functional camp operation.

LOOKING AHEAD -- With the Merging General Conference now history and

the new Discipline now in effect, the District and local Wesleyan Youth organization is faced with the making of only minor adjustments -- mostly those of terminology. The prospect of an active, spiritual program for our youth in The Wesleyan Church is excellent. However, as before, the success of such a program is dependent upon each of us -- pastors, local churches and local youth. Let us renew our commitment to Christ, His Church and The Wesleyan Church as we face the challenging future.

Report No. 23 CYC DIRECTOR

Greetings in the name of the Christ who said, "Suffer the little children let them come unto me." It has been a privilege to work for the Lord and the conference as CYC Director during the past year. It is a joy to work with children and to see their tender young hearts when so many people all around us have hardened themselves to the gospel message. CYC Camp has never failed to thrill my heart! My duties during the coming year will not permit me to continue taking an active part in CYC or camping activities. I know that I will miss it after twelve continuous years of involvement.

CYC has not seen much of a growth in the conference this year, but an active chapter has been added at the Chillicothe Church. Congratulations to them! I would ask each pastor to seriously explore the reasons why his church has not used this avenue to reach the souls of children. Dare we neglect any means of reaching their hearts?

CYC camp enrolled 211 campers this summer. Forty-nine adults were necessary to make this camp a success and worked faithfully. Were you aware that so much help was necessary to operate a camp? Help is often very hard to get. I realize that not every pastor or his wife finds it possible to help in camp but I would urge those who can to offer their services -- it is a great experience.

I want to thank the fine Sunday School board, conference officials, and a dedicated staff for their fine cooperation. These are some of God's best people. Especially would I like to thank Kenneth Hostetler for his fine help.

Over the last few years the Sunday School board has worked hard to improve the quality of the CYC camp. Many improvements have been introduced. Graded lesson materials are being used, the staff has been upgraded, the program in general expanded, and board control over the kitchen and grounds has been achieved. I trust that you will continue to give your support to this type of a program so that your conference can continue to give to its children quality camping at a budget price.

I would like to note to the conference a drop of thirty in the enrollment of CYC camp this year, and point out to them at least the main reason for this decline. We have reached the saturation point in housing for our campers. Last year we had every available space full, many children in cottages, and nearly twenty in tents. Some children complained of being crowded and having too many in a bed. Likely these children did not return this year. We are fortunate in that the very year we seemed to reach our saturation point the Youth Camp dropped their age limit and helped take the load from our camp. Thus the total number of campers this year is about the same as last year. Not much further growth in the CYC Camp seems possible without the addition of another dormitory at Victory Camp. Division of the camp into two

sections is not the answer because of the difficulty in obtaining help. Our camp is a quality camp and will grow; let's build to make it possible. Because of the close proximity of CYC camp to our conference it will be necessary to give the financial report of the 1968 camp at next year's conference session. Following is the report for 1967.

Report No. 24 COMMITTEE ON MORAL REFORM

No alert Christian needs to be told that we live in perilous times. The upheavals, the confusion, the uncertainties, as well as the outright unbelief and the loss of moral guideposts in our age are all painfully apparent. This is an age which needs more than ever before the positive and challenging message of the transforming grace of God. This message must be preached in no uncertain terms but it must also be exemplified by lives that bear unmistakable witness to the truth of that message and to its relevance for our day.

To provide such a witness to the message, it behooves us as a people to keep our spiritual identity by a living, personal relationship to God. Many Scriptures make an appeal for a personal and individual appropriation and application of salvation in the life. This can be accomplished only by devotion and faithfulness in Bible reading and prayer, in church attendance and in the constant practice of Christian principles in daily contact with mankind. We are also admonished in the Scripture not to be entangled with the cares of this life lest "that day" take us unawares.

We firmly believe that the Gospel is still the power of God unto salvation. We have the belief. Let us make sure that we provide in actual experience the necessary complement to that belief, so that a transforming power may be seen in transformed lives.

The apostles were concerned that this should be so in their day. Certainly they would be no less concerned for our age. Perhaps no more relevant message can be given to our day than to recall and restate their exhortations.

To the Ephesians the message was, "Let no one deceive you with vain words; for because of these things cometh the wrath of God on the children of disobedience. Be not ye therefore partakers with them for ye were sometimes darkness, but now are ye light in the Lord. Walk as children of light".

The Thessalonians were exhorted, "Ye are all the children of light and the children of the day. We are not of the night nor of darkness. Therefore let us not sleep as do others but let us watch and be sober. For they that sleep, sleep in the night, and they that be drunken are drunken in the night. But let us who are of the day be sober, putting on the breastplate of faith and of love".

We may hear the same concern that the church may demonstrate the transforming power of the Gospel in the words of the apostle Peter, "As Christ for he that hath suffered in the flesh hath ceased from sin that he no longer should spend the rest of his time in the flesh to the lusts of men but to the will of God?".

To Timothy the apostle gave advice of timeless value, "Be thou an example of the believers in word, in conversation, in charity, in spirit, in faith, in purity." To put this in other words, it means that it is absolutely imperative for the person who would represent the Gospel to be free from the practice and principle of sin in any and every form. The Biblical standard of deliverance from sin is of paramount importance, for without holiness no man shall see the Lord, It is also equally true that without holiness no man will see the Lord in us.

- 8. The Conference Wesleyan Executive Council shall, as soon as possible after Conference, arrange a meeting with the District Chairman regarding the plan of work for the year. Each District shall care for the expense involved in sending their Chairman to said meeting.
- 9. We recommend that the Conference Wesleyan Youth Treasurer pay the Marion Area Assessment from the Conference dues.
- 10. We recommend that the Conference Wesleyan Youth pay for eight copies of the Conference Minutes to be sent to the Area President, the General President, and Marion Area Conference Presidents.
- 11. We recommend that each local pay the traveling expenses, room and board and registration fee for its delegates to the Youth Conference; and each District pay the traveling expenses, room, board and registration fee to the Youth Conference for its District President.
- 12. All youth locals shall observe Youth Week, and churches without locals shall be urged to aid youth work by such observance.
 - 13. We recommend that the Youth Conference pay the expenses of our Ohio

Wesleyan Youth President as he visits other youth camps, in order to bring back to us observations which will help us in improving our own camp.

14. The WY Sales Manager and the Conference Quiz Master shall be members of the Executive Council.

15. All pastors who are members of the WY local will be seated in the Bar of Conference.

REPORTS

Report No. 1 PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Cordial greetings to the members of the 1968 session of the Ohio WY Conference. Again we gather in the Name above all other names -- the Name of Jesus Christ.

This has been a good year for Ohio Wesleyan Youth. God has given us increase in certain areas for which we praise Him.

The highlight of mid-year activity centered upon the Mid-Winter Convention held at the Lincoln Lodge, Columbus, December 28-29, 1967. While initial goals called for 100 in attendance, the actual total present reached 152 with the majority present being between the ages 13 to 25. Dr. Charles DeVol. a veteran in missionary and Christian educational fields, ably challenged our hearts to Christian service while the Kentucky Melody-Aires and the Indiana Top Teens lifted our spirits in song. These guest workers plus our own talented and willing Ohio WY'ers made this convention one long to be remembered. Plans are presently in the making for another such convention to be held December 27-28, 1968.

Wesleyan Youth subscriptions in Ohio again increased as Conference Sales-manager David Fruth led us to a new record of 326. This represented an increase of almost 10% over last year's campaign and enabled us to retain our position of fourth in total number of subscriptions and third in proportion to membership. However, our percentage of youth week reports to the General office decreased slightly. We need to improve our record in this area.

It has been our privilege to welcome three newly organized locals into our fellowship this year. They are Athens, North Woodbury and Miamisburg. We also joyfully report the reactivating of the Bradford local. Certainly the Pastors of these churches are to be commended for assisting their youth in taking this vital step forward. May their example be

heeded by other Ohio Conference pastors this year.

Full management of the 1967 Youth Camp proved successful and is being repeated this year through the approval of the Conference Camp Committee. While this increases responsibility on certain of the Executive Council it is undertaken in an effort to maintain a youth camp at a reasonable cost of operation. The Camp Business Manager, Rev. Marvin Taylor, is to be commended for his careful financial supervision of the camp operation.

One phase of the youth program encountered some difficulty this year. Last year's conference ordered a Conference Project (an information center and PA System for Victory Camp) financed through district rallies conducted by the Youth President. Six such rallies were held and produced only \$128.25 of the \$264.00 needed. No arrangements were made by three districts for the President to present this project. It seems evident that an alternate means of raising the Project funds will need to be found by this conference session.

We have endeavored to faithfully serve the youth of the Ohio Conference through the following mediums: (1) represented Ohio WY in Marion Area Council (2) directed music for Marion area WY Convention (3) conducted five executive council meetings (4) conducted Mid-Winter Youth Convention (5) prepared monthly articles for Conference Messenger and Ohio WY Action (6) promoted the work of the Ohio WY through 612 mailings and over 4770 miles of travel plus miscellaneous activities.

It has been a privilege indeed to serve the youth of this Conference for we sincerely believe Ohio WY'ers to be dedicated and devoted to Christ and the Wesleyan Church. As the Wesleyan Church, takes on new demintion through merger may our dedication and devotion likewise expand to encompass the vast spiritual needs of today's restless and turbulent youth outside the Church. May our vision of God's plan for us be transformed to God's will through us.

Report No. 2 PRESIDENT'S REPORT

To the Sixty-first Annual Session of the Woman's Missionary Society of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America, and to the First Annual Session of the Wesleyan Women's Missionary Society, 1968; Greetings in the name of Christ our Savior. We are met here in this closing and opening session of conference: the closing of the Wesleyan Methodist and the opening of the Wesleyan. It is a milestone in the history of our beloved Zion. The Church's new quadrennial motto, "One - That the World May Believe" is appropriate for the new merged Church. Particularly for the Wesleyan Women's Missionary Society we can say, "One - That the World at our Doorstep May Believe." In his letter to the Philippians Paul states, "But I would ye should understand, brethren, that the things which happened unto me have fallen out rather unto the furtherance of the gospel. The merger was intended that both churches should be strengthened and the voice of evangelism be more effective.

ORGANIZATION AND PROMOTION

This has been a year of unusual activity. In August I was invited to speak to the youth group at the Fargo Church. In September I planned a tour in which Dr. Marilyn Birch from Africa visited nineteen churches in the conference. On October I Miss Margaret Wright from Nepal began the tour which I scheduled. She visited the remaining thirty churches of the conference. In November and December I scheduled Miss Dorothy Marville from Haiti to visit the districts of the conference and in March I planned the visit of Miss Florence Glass from Haiti to all the districts also.

At the request of the joint Wesleyan Methodist and Pilgrim ministerial program committee I prepared a paper on "A Challenge in Missions" and read it at the fall Ministerial Meeting at the First Pilgrim Church in Columbus.

In November I was invited to the Fargo Missionary Prayer Meeting to read the paper I had prepared for the ministerial. In December the Sunbury president asked me to speak at their missionary prayer meeting. In January Mrs. Ada White invited me to participate in an informative discussion at the First Pilgrim Church in Columbus. I spoke briefly at

the Newark World Day of Prayer service in March.

On May 22 I organized a WMS at the new Skyview Church with ten members and at Lima on June 5, I organized a WMS with eight members. We all rejoice over these who have become an active part of our missionary outreach.

On June 14, I installed the officers of the local WMS at Marion, Mark Street.

FUNDS

The Birch Tour offerings brought \$820.73 which went to the Kamakwie High School Staff Quarters in Africa. The Wright Tour offerings came to \$683.28 and went to the General World Missions Fund. The Marville Tour offerings netted \$380.08 and went to help build the church in Port-au-Prince, Haiti. The Glass Tour receipts amounted to \$391.32 and went to build a retaining wall at Petit Goave, Haiti. All expenses of the tours were taken from the offerings received.

White Christmas offerings went to advance in New Guinea and amounted to \$1367.23 which is double last year's offering. Selfdenial offerings brought \$948.16 and went to assist in pioneering a church in Honolulu, Hawaii.

Total cash receipts this year were \$27,495.59. Grand total including vouchers, cash on hand and cash receipts amounted to \$39,023.17, a gain of \$4,772.14.

We had a gain of 26 members.

ADMINISTRATIVE

I have written a message for each of the eleven monthly Messengers. I have written once to each pastor, twice to each district chairman, and three times to each local president. I have sent a total of 305 letters, 25 cards and 47 other pieces of mail. My expenses have been \$68.00 which is broken down thus: \$31.03 for desk and postage, \$6.97 for telephone, and \$30.00 for travel.

Let us say with Samuel of old, "Hitherto hath the Lord helped us." God has blessed our efforts for Him in the cause we represent today. We have ceased being a small group and now we have become a larger family. Thus the chapter of our Acts as Wesleyan Methodists has closed and we begin a new chapter as the Wesleyan Women's Missionary Society.

David said, "Let Israel hope in the Lord from henceforth and for ever." Psalms 131.3. As Wesleyan women today let us acknowledge that our 'hithertos' and 'henceforths' are in the hands of our conquering Christ and we will unite in heart with all women of the new Wesleyan Church to see the furtherance of the gospel in the time that remains for us to contribute to the book of Acts.

REPORT ON HONORS COMMITTEE

We have carefully examined the statistical reports and are pleased to announce that there are 17 Honor Societies this year, as compared to 14 last year. One society has 100% rating in the Efficiency Standard.

Twenty-three societies had a gain in membership. Athens has an in-

crease of 18 members, a gain of 85.7%.
