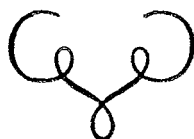

PUBLIC SERVICES

Tuesday, August 3, 1965, 7:30 P. M.

Conference Sermon — Rev. Earl T. Gentry presided at the Tuesday evening service. The congregation sang "Saved" and "Living by Faith" with Rev. Charles Heavilin leading and Mrs. Lillian Robbins at the organ. Prayer was offered by Rev. W. Lee Cockerill after which the congregation sang "The Solid Rock". An offering was received for camp improvements. Dr. George E. Failing, Editor of *The Wesleyan Methodist*, and Rev. and Mrs. Arthur Calhoun, missionaries to Haiti, were introduced to the Conference. The speaker of the evening was Rev. Paul Rampey, pastor of Richmond, First. For his scripture lesson Rev. Rampey chose Acts 26:13-32. His text was verse 22. The subject of his message was "Evangelize Now-By Witnessing to Lost Souls". Rev. Rampey stressed the need for a new vision of Christ, of God, and of lost souls. He pointed out that we are to witness to others about what Christ has done for us as we have opportunity and the Spirit helps us. Following the close of the service an all-night prayer vigil began at 9:30 p. m. and ended at 7:30 a. m.

Wednesday, August 4, 1965

Missionary Service — The opening hymns, "He Lives" and "Send the Light," were led by Mrs. Betty McKinley. In a skit entitled, "Money Talks," by the Welcome Church, the great big dollar and the little bitty cent conversing, finally convinced us that both were needed to promote missions. Prayer was offered by Dr. George Failing. A preachers' wives chorus sang, "If I Had A Thousand Lives to Live." Rev. Arthur Calhoun, Missionary to Haiti, gave remarks of their early experiences in Haiti, and using scripture cited three phases of missionary work approved by Jesus: Teaching, Preaching and Healing. Mrs. Calhoun talked of the healing ministry and suggested this as one way of "Singing the Lord's "Song In A Strange Land." The service continued with Rev. Calhoun speaking about the Preaching and Teaching Healing ministries of the Haitian Mission Field. He spoke of the importance of the Bible School Training in spreading the Gospel through trained native workers. He spoke of the financial needs and requested earnest prayer for each worker. He reminded us that the night was coming and we must work while doors are open and it is day! An offering of \$76.48 was received. Mrs. McKinley rendered a solo, "He Giveth More Grace." Rev. Earl T. Gentry presented the WMS Conference Projects: Support for Miss Rosa Bishop and the Dining Hall for our conference grounds. Pledges amounted to \$1,781.81. The service concluded with singing the "Doxology."

Thursday, August 5, 1965, 7:30 P. M.

Ordination Service — Rev. Raymond Powers, Jr. opened the Thursday evening service by leading the congregation in singing "He Abides" and "How Firm a Foundation". The service was under the direction of Rev. Paul A. Wheeler. A group of ministers and ministers' wives sang "Thou Wilt Keep Him in Perfect Peace". The evening prayer was offered by Rev. Frank B. Dennard. Speaker for the service was Rev. Hal G. Robbins, Jr. He read II Timothy 2:1-10 from the *New English Bible* for his scripture lesson. In his message Rev. Robbins emphasized the need for conviction, compassion, and courage in the life of the "man of God". Following the message a ministers' quartet sang "God Is Looking for a Man". Rev. W. Lee Cockerill then presented Rev. Kenneth Foutz and Rev. J. C. Yarborough for ordination. Rev. Earl T. Gentry, Conference President, presided over the ceremony.

First Meeting, Tuesday, 1:30 p. m., August 3, 1965

OPENING—The sixth annual session of the Virginia Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America convened at the Buckingham Tabernacle, August 3, 1965 at 1:30 p. m. Rev. Earl T. Gentry led the Conference in singing, "Faith of our Fathers" and "A Charge To Keep I Have". He then read a scripture lesson from Psalm 16 and gave a devotional message. Rev. Arthur Calhoun, missionary to Haiti, led the opening prayer.

MOTION—Mr. Alvin Thomas moved that Rev. Paul Wheeler serve as Secretary of Evangelism with directions for his duties to be given by the Board of Managers. The motion was seconded and it carried.

MOTION—Rev. Wendel Craker moved that the report be amended to have Mr. J. F. Yates' name placed on the Auditing Committee instead of Rev. Kenneth Foutz. The motion was seconded and it carried.

REPORT ADOPTED—The report of the Nominating Committee was adopted as amended. (See report No. 1)

MOTION—The Rev. Paul A. Wheeler moved that the Orders of the Day be read and approved. The motion was seconded and it carried.

MOTION—The Rev. G. R. Phaup moved that these and all others so presented be made honorary members of the Body. The motion was seconded and it carried.

CONFERENCE PRESIDENT'S REPORT—The Conference President, Rev. Earl T. Gentry, read his report to the Conference. In his report he suggested a slogan, "A Search For A Soul" and stressed the need to win souls. He expressed thanks to vice president W. Lee Cockerill for helping so ably during his illness.

MOTION—Rev. J. Melvin Howard moved that the report with the President's recommendations be adopted as a whole. The motion was seconded and the report adopted. (See report No. 2)

CONFERENCE PRESIDENT'S OFFICIAL ACTS—The Conference President read a report of his official acts. The report was adopted by the Body. (See report No. 3)

PRESIDENT'S REPORT NO. 2

"And so were the churches established in the faith, and increased in number daily." Acts 16:5

My chief concern is that our churches may grow. This can only come about when each member becomes involved in the ministry of the church. This imposes tremendous strain on the pastor to plan his work and work his plans so that each believer in the fellowship becomes totally involved.

I propose that our 1965-66 year be characterized by prayerful and fervent soul winning. This ministry is not by accident. It is only fruitful and effective when planned and followed under the Spirit's anointing.

A SLOGAN

Let us make this year "A SEARCH FOR A SOUL!" Several hours were spent in contemplation of this slogan. It is felt that this should make our goal and task more of a personal one. One may think of "All Out For Souls" and more catchy phrases, but my feeling is that a believer's task is to win a soul to Christ periodically. Each one can win one. Will you labor to make it so? (In one church, it is reported, it took 86 members to win one new member on profession of faith last year.)

A PLEA

I call upon each member of our local church to read at least one searching book this year. I suggest, "The Disciplined Life". Pastors may lead the way by so reading and suggesting that their members do so. Also, I hope you will read Nate Krupp's book, "You Can Be A Soul Winner".

I call upon each pastor to make at least 400 pastoral calls this year; while making this call witness, present the claims of Christ and pray with the family wherever possible; in this effort forget not the effectiveness which secret prayer and fasting will bring to your ministry. This can greatly enhance your pulpit ministry and make your preaching more relevant.

PRESIDENT'S RECOMMENDATIONS

1. That each church elect their Annual Conference Delegates at the Third Quarterly Conference.
2. That the Camp Meeting Board meet concurrently with the announced Board of Manager's meetings, expense of the same to be met respectively by Board Treasurers and where possible, car pools be organized in the interest of economy.
3. That the Conference President be required to present the Dining Room Project and IPTAY Club at his visits to the churches within the plan already prescribed by the Board of Managers as previously presented.
4. That each pastor plan a study course for lay-leadership patterned after the Leadership Rally Program last year.
5. That pastors hold monthly business meetings with the Board of Stewards keeping in mind the following:
 - a. Pay all general apportionment and 13% apportionment.
 - b. Review the pastor's salary and seek to consistently improve his financial status.
 - c. Strive toward a unified Treasurer's System.

d. Keep records orderly and endeavor to report accurately and promptly.

6. I recommend that the Board of Managers be requested to investigate the purchase of additional land adjacent to and near our present Conference Center for future use and development.

My sincere thanks for your prayers and other remembrances during my illness in January and February. Special thanks to Vice President, W. Lee Cockerill, for ably taking over.

REPORT OF TITHING SECRETARY REPORT #5

The activities of the Tithing Secretary have been primarily in the nature of a survey and study. On May 25, 1965, I mailed to each pastor a letter, together with a table depicting the per capita giving in each church on the basis of 1964 tithing statistics, with an interpolation as to the amount total for all purposes would be in each church if 75% of the membership were tithing. This mailing also included a sheet setting forth in picture form the contrast between total for all purposes in each church based in 1964 tithing figures, and what the total for all purposes would be if 75% of the membership were tithers.

In response to a request for information as to whether pastors had conducted in their churches this conference year 1 a study on total stewardship, 2) a tithing campaign, or 3) any other systematic effort to place tithing before their people, one pastor sent me outlines of an excellent series of messages he had delivered on tithing. There was no other response to this inquiry.

The Conference President has been most co-operative and has offered to give space to the Tithing Secretary in each issue of The Virginia Vision.

ANALYSIS—An analysis of 1964 statistics as related to tithing and over-all giving reveals the following:

1. Of 26 organized churches in the conference, 6 churches had reached or exceeded the goal of 75% of active membership tithing. They were: Baily Memorial, Blacksburg, Minnie's Chapel, Mountain View, Richmond, and Welcome.

2. Other churches nearest the goal of 75% were: Roanoke First, 70%; Roanoke Valley View, 67.7%; Gladys, 66.6%; Roanoke Second, 62.5% and Danville, 61.1%.

3. Sixteen churches did not pay pastor's salary of at least \$3,000, the income figure used in the government poverty program as the dividing line.

4. Eighteen churches failed to pay all General Budget assigned. At least 4 churches failed to pay all Conference Budget, according to various reports in the 1964 minutes.

5. In 1959 the Virginia Conference was organized with 60.6% of the full membership tithing. In 1960, although there was a decrease of \$22,000 in total for all purposes, there was an increase of .5% membership tithing. In 1962 this increased to 62.6% membership tithing, with a corresponding increase in total for all purposes. In 1963 and 1964 there was a gradual decline in percentage tithing, with the 1964 statistics showing 58.7% of the full membership tithing, an all-time low since the organization of the conference. However, in 1963 there was a decrease of \$800 in total for all purposes and in 1964 there was an increase of over \$22,000 in total for all purposes. By way of comparison, in 1959 with 613 tithing members, the total for all purposes was \$196,000. In 1964 with 647 tithing members, the total for all purposes was \$235,000—an increase of \$39,000. Inaccurate reporting of the number of tithers could enter into this over-all picture. (Round figures used)

6. The conference goal is 75% of full membership tithing. The 1964 figures (58.7%) shows us to be 16.3% short of our goal.

7. Oddly enough, the decline percentagewise came when the Conference Tithing Secretary was sending out annually at least 60 pieces of mail and/or 1000 bulletin inserts on "Christian Stewardship" and pamphlets on tithing.

RECOMMENDATIONS—This study has resulted in the following recommendations:

1. That in each church all Sunday School teachers and assistant teachers be thoroughly taught (by some qualified person) the principles of total stewardship, so that they may, in turn, **at every opportunity** present this great truth to the Sunday School pupils.

2. That each pastor send to the Conference Tithing Secretary the name and address of his local Tithing Secretary.

3. That the Conference Tithing Secretary use the space made available to him in The Virginia Vision.

4. That the annual conference devote one service to the study and promotion of tithing and the Storehouse Plan, as set forth in Par. 90 (7) of the Discipline.

5. That the Conference Tithing Board have some lay members on it. Conference statistics on tithing show that such inclusion has been profitable.

6. In the light of No. 5 under ANALYSIS, that proper authority define a "tither," so that accurate and uniform reports may be made by local tithing secretaries.

7. That all our ministers become familiar with and comply with Pars. 89, 90, and 94 (3) of the Discipline.

TEMPERANCE SECRETARY REPORT #6

During this year it has been my privilege to represent the Virginia Conference as trustee to the Alcohol Education Council, Inc., of Virginia Churches. On September 15, 1964, a meeting at Richmond, Virginia was held to discuss the Statewide Referendum for Liquor-by-the-Drink. Our annual meeting was held December 7-8 at Richmond, Virginia. It was recommended that each denomination increase their contribution at least 10%, effective 1966, for the purpose of employing a full-time representative to help in the work of alcohol education in the State of Virginia.

Inasmuch as alcoholism afflicts not only the individual but also his family, employer and community, and as there are estimated in excess of 45,000 alcoholics in Virginia with approximately 4,000 additional people becoming alcoholics each year; and

WHEREAS the present facilities of the Division of Alcohol Studies and Rehabilitation of the Commonwealth of Virginia are able to care for only about 1,400 alcoholics a year and other State facilities are very limited.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED: That the Virginia Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America urge the State Budget Committee and the General Assembly of Virginia to allocate funds for a Hospital for Alcoholics as requested in the State Health Department's Capital Outlay program.

We are convinced that increased outlets for the sale of alcoholic beverages results in increased consumption with accompanying results of increasing drunkenness, alcoholism, automobile accidents and fatalities, disruption of family and community life.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED: That the Virginia Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America go on record as opposing any change in the present Alcohol Beverage Control Act that would permit the legislation of liquor-by-the-drink and any proposed legislation that would weaken the present Alcohol Beverage Control Act.

May 25, 1965—Signed Report and Recommendation of the Committee on Church locations for a lot for the Wesleyan Methodist Church, Newport News, Virginia, estimated cost of the lot was \$8,000.

REPORT OF THE VIRGINIA CONFERENCE APPORTIONMENT COMMITTEE REPORT #16

(A) The Conference Apportionment shall be sent to the Conference Treasurer by the 15th of each month for the previous month.

(B) Each church shall pay 13% of the total Sunday School and Church Tithes and offerings except the amounts paid for buildings indebtedness and the cost of indebtedness.

EXPLANATION OF "the amounts paid for buildings, indebtedness and the cost of indebtedness" which each church is permitted to deduct from total income before determining the 13% apportionment is as follows:

1. "Buildings" are understood to be new buildings or the enlargement of present buildings.

2. "Amounts paid for buildings, indebtedness and the cost of indebtedness" must be funds raised in the current month.

3. Amounts paid for buildings may include funds placed in a bona fide building fund reserve (Separate Account)

4. All other funds are subject to the 13% apportionment.

(C) We recommend that the Virginia Conference apportionment be distributed to the several Conference Funds by the Virginia Conference Board of Managers as follows:

62% Conference Operation

- President's salary and allowances
- Office expenses
- Committee Expenses
- Entertaining the Annual Conference
- Conference property, (exclusive of camp grounds)

4% Conference Church Extension

20% Minister's Insurance & Pension

14% Camp Meeting (Retirement of loans-development)

(D) We recommend that in the interest of Conference Church Extension that each Sunday School in the Conference be assessed \$1.00 per week as during the previous year.

(E) The Virginia Annual Conference Assignment of General Church Budget for the Conference Year 1965-66 is as follows:

(G) We recommend that the "Form to Accompany Payment of Apportionment" be supplied to each local Treasurer and pastor.

DAILY PROCEEDINGS

Tuesday Afternoon, August 3, 1965

The Sixth Annual Session of the Woman's Missionary Society of Virginia Conference convened on August 3, 1965 at 1:30 p. m., under the canopy of the new snack bar. President, Mrs. Eulalia Gentry, presided. After a moment of silent prayer, Mrs. Gentry led in the opening prayer.

Music for the opening session was directed by Lillian Robbins. We sang the conference theme chorus, "Saved to Serve-Living to Give," and "Jesus Saves."

Devotions were given by Mrs. Arthur Calhoun, missionary to Haiti. She had Scripture read from Mark 14:3-8 and presented some lessons from the life of Mary, sister of Lazarus. Like Mary, we cannot receive a blessing until we first sit at Jesus' feet. When her brother died, she sought comfort at Jesus' feet because she had been in communion with Him many times before. In her worship, with ointment, she gave beyond herself, beyond her means and the fragrance spread to everyone in the room. The closing challenge was "may our lives be so fragrant that the gospel can be spread around the world."

Business: Conference was called to order and the roll call with 21 delegates and 21 presidents and executive officers present.

Three new societies were presented. Aspen Hill Church was represented by Vice President Norma Jean Craker and reported 8 charter members. Mount Regis Church, Salem, organized with 21 members, represented by President Lucille Overstreet. Galax was organized with 12 new members and represented by President Mae Shockley.

The bar of Conference was set as the first four rows of chairs on both sides of the aisle and including the platform.

The printed program was adopted as the orders of the day.

Report of Nominating Committee was read by Gladys Talbot. A motion carried that we accept the report of the Nominating Committee. (See Report No. 1)

Report of Conference President Mrs. Eulalia Gentry. A motion was made and carried that we accept her report with a rising vote of thanks. (See Report No. 2)

Officers were elected intermittently with reports. Eulalia Gentry was re-elected president with 36 votes out of 40. Vice President Virginia Cockerill was elected with 38 votes out of 40.

Report of Y.M.W.B., Superintendent, Margy King. First she distributed packets of material for local band superintendents. She gave an interesting report of gains over the previous year making our Conference an Honor Conference. A motion was made by Stella King to accept her report. Motion was carried. (See Report Nos. 3-14)

3:00 P. M. —MISSIONARY SERVICE

Music was directed by Norma Jean Craker as we repeated the theme chorus and sang "Lord Lay Some Soul Upon My Heart." Prayer was led by Mrs. Ethel Yarborough.

The missionary address was given by Rev. Arthur Calhoun, missionary to Haiti. Reading from II Corinthians 8:1-9, he noted Paul boasting for the Macedonian churches because of their giving and urging the Corinthian church to abound in this grace also. Brother Calhoun pointed out that before we can have this abounding grace or abundant life, the very message of the Wesleyan Methodist Church, we must receive life or be converted. Just so, before we can abound in giving, we must be converted to giving. God wants us to be converted to giving so He can trust us to give the extra money He puts into our hands. The closing thought was "May God help us to grow in the grace of giving until we abound."

The message was followed with a solo by Jane Hunter, singing "What Can I Bring, Blessed Master?"

After a few announcements, we proceeded with the Problem Clinic, a workshop directed by Mrs. Gentry. Various questions or problems were presented from the floor while "doctors" Fern Cooper, Doris Powers and Lillian Robbins were ready with the answers. Questions were discussed such as programming, things to do at work meetings, how to increase membership, etc. This session was then recessed for the day.

At 6:30 P. M. an informal meeting of local presidents met for discussion of general problems.

Wednesday Morning, August 4, 1965

Opening hymn were "Oh For a Thousand Tongues" and the theme chorus directed by Norma Jean Craker. Mrs. Lucille Overstreet offered the opening prayer.

Roll was called, minutes read and approved.

While ballots were counted for election of secretary, we heard the **Report of the Membership Chairman, Stella King**. She noted a gain in membership of 27. A motion was made by NaDean Jones to accept this report. Motion carried. (See Report No. 4)

Secretary elected—Doris Powers was declared elected by 43 votes out of 46.

While ballots were counted for treasurer, we listened to the **Report of the Solicitor** given by Ethel Phaup. Preceding her report she gave a few instructions for delegates to give local solicitors. She reported a gain of 40 subscriptions. A prize was awarded to the society having the greatest gain which was Farnville. The prize was a copy of "**The Disciplined Life**," a 1965 Reading Course Book. A motion was made and carried to accept this report as corrected. (See Report No. 5)

The elected treasurer was Marie Wheeler with 44 votes out of 46.

"Mobilize for Community Missions" was the theme Virginia Cockerill used to promote this important function of not only the W.M.S., but the entire church.

Tellers reported that Margy King was re-elected Y.M.W.B. Superintendant with 41 votes out of 46.

Report of the W.W.F. Secretary, given by Lucille Overstreet, revealed gains in all phases of this work. After a few instructions and aids given to local WWF secretaries, a motion was made to adopt this report. Motion carried. (See Report No. 6)

Report of Reading Course Secretary, Nell Thomas, was read by the secretary. Gains were shown in the number of readers. This report was adopted by motion. (See Report No. 7) Reading course certificates were distributed to local societies.

A motion was made by Marie Wheeler that we send Mary King to General Conference strictly as a YMWB delegate. The motion carried.

Report of District Chairmen: We listened to reports from Virginia Cockerill of the Eastern District and Stella King from the Western District. Mrs. B. C. Ayers from the South Virginia District was not present. A motion carried to adopt the reports. (See Report 8A, 8B. and 8C.)

Report of the Auditing Committee by Dorothy Proffit was accepted by motion. (See Report No. 9)

Delegates elected to General Conference were as follows:

Marie Wheeler — 39 votes out of 47

Virginia Cockerill — 36 votes out of 46

This session recessed to hear the denominational address by Dr. George Failing in the main tabernacle.

Wednesday Afternoon, August 4, 1965

We were inspired by a skit entitled "No Vision" given by the Washington area ladies. A very appropriate climax was the duet, "Lord Give Me a Vision", sung by Rev. and Mrs. Hal Robbins.

Business resumed with the election of an alternate delegate to General Conference. Doris Powers was elected as alternate delegate.

Report of the Checking Committee was given by Mae Bayse. She commented that in general, reports were much better this year. Her report was accepted by motion. (See Report No. 10)

Treasurer, Marie Wheeler, reported a loss in receipts with "great grief." Envelopes containing supplies and instructions for local societies were distributed. At the conclusion of her report, she was given a rising vote of thanks. (See Report No. 11)

Plan of Work and Treasurer's Guide were presented to the group. After some discussion, a motion was made to adopt this report. (See Reports No. 12 & 12A)

1:45 P. M. — Y.M.W.B. SERVICE

Using verse, paintings, music and silent prayer, Margy King gave an entirely new approach to the devotional message. Further comments were given by Mrs. Ethel Yarborough. She read scripture from Mark 9:14-29 emphasizing a parent's concern for his child. Parents often send their children to us for help and we are just as weak as the disciples were on this occasion. Mrs. Yarborough reminded us that it is important to fast and pray for our children who are our future missionaries.

Margy King introduced the new scripture memory verses for this year and then called on three different local band superintendents to present various phases of YMWB work: Alice Foutz of Welcome Church told of contests and ideas her band had used to achieve the greatest gain in receipts last year; Lois Wade of Blacksburg spoke of the YMWB Reading Course Books; Frances Cobler of Valley View reported on the area rally conducted at her church and gave helpful suggestions on ways to make such rallies more effective.

Margy introduced the new theme song, "Send the Light," with her own large illustrated song book.

Prizes were awarded to the boy and girl who received the most money for the support of Angela Cowart. The girl was Debbie Smith from Welcome Church, the boy David Robinson from Blacksburg. Each received a beautiful and appropriate painting drawn by Margy King, our own gifted artist.

After an inspiring puppet story, honor bands were recognized and pictures taken. A dedicatory prayer was offered by Doris Powers, closing the YMWB service.

The Courtesy Committee presented Dr. George Failing, editor of the **WESLEYAN METHODIST**. He made appropriate remarks and brought information about our world Headquarters, Marion, Indiana.

3:00 P. M.—MISSIONARY SERVICE

Betty McKinley led the group in singing "Jesus Saves." Then we were favored with a trio: Ethel Phaup, Barbara Heavilin and Janie Martindale, singing "I Give To Thee This Pair of Hands."

The missionary message for the afternoon was delivered by Mrs. Arthur Calhoun. After discussing some of the grievous conditions existing in Haiti, she talked to us about the Haitian women who share many of the same problems as we only under different circumstances. She mentioned how very cheap life is in Haiti and the unimportance of little girls. A number of illustrations were given of women who have become witnesses under most difficult conditions. She requested prayer especially for the ministers' wives of Haiti. Our hearts were challenged with the tremendous need to pray for these requests.

Following the missionary service, Margy King conducted a YMWB Workshop.

PUBLIC MISSIONARY SERVICE

Wednesday, August 4, 1965

From the opening hymns, "He Lives" and "Send the Light," led by Betty McKinley, the Holy Spirit hovered very near.

In a skit entitled "Money Talks," by the Welcome Church, the great big dollar and the little bitty cent conversing finally convinced us that both were needed to promote missions.

Prayer was led by Dr. George Failing.

A preachers' wives chorus sang, "If I Had a Thousand Lives to Live."

Rev. Arthur Calhoun, missionary to Haiti, introduced the message with remarks of their early missionary experiences and then using scripture pointed out three phases of missionary work approved by Jesus: "Teaching, Preaching and Healing. Mrs. Calhoun talked to us of the Healing ministry as the Lord showed her it was one way to "sing the Lord's song in a strange land."

An offering was received in the amount of \$76.48, and Betty McKinley rendered a solo, "He Giveth More Grace."

Rev. Calhoun spoke of the Preaching and Teaching ministries of the Haitian work. He spoke of the importance of the Bible School work in spreading the gospel with native workers. He spoke of the financial need and he requested our earnest prayers. He reminded us that the night is coming and we must work fast while the doors are still open.

Pledges toward the Conference Project—support of Rosa Bishop and the campground dining hall project—were received by Rev. Earl T. Gentry. Pledges amounted to over \$1781.81.

The service concluded with the singing of the "Doxology" in praise for what had been done. Slides of the Calhoun's work were shown in the WMS tabernacle.

Thursday Morning, August 5, 1965

The "Missionary Doxology" and Conference theme chorus led by Norma Jean Craker were sung with all the freshness of the morning. How near was His lovely presence as Mrs. Calhoun led the opening prayer!

For devotions we were privileged to have Dr. George Failing share his burden of concern for the great losses in Wesleyan Methodist churches among our own ranks. He read from Matthew 8:5-13 pointing out that the children of the kingdom were lost. He noted that it is small comfort to watch the mighty conversions of numerous Haitians and see our own children lost. It was a time of heart-searching as Dr. Failing closed in prayer.

Oh how blessed was the melting time that followed with many testifying! How sweet the Spirit as Jane Hunter and Barbara Heavilin sang His praises in the duet "O Love of God."

As business resumed, Dr. Failing gave a pep talk about our periodicals. He said that the WESLEYAN MISSIONARY was paying its own way. His main appeal was for the WESLEYAN METHODIST. He requested that we help one another in the campaigns.

A motion was adopted to altar the orders of the day exchanging the

Extension Service with "Spotlighting Haiti" in order to accomodate the Calhouns.

"Spotlighting Haiti" was a period of discussion. Various questions were directed to the Calhouns regarding the work and needs of Haiti. Most of the discussion seemed to be a concern of ways to help the poor since it is impractical to send used clothing into the country.

Mrs. Calhoun complimented all for our poster display. After other appropriate remarks, the Calhouns bid us "God's best" and departed for their next appointment.

The Courtesy Committee presented Dr. Mullinax, President of Central College. He reported upon the accomplishments and needs at Central College.

The wife of Pastor-elect at Valley View Church, Barbara Heavilin, was introduced to the assembly.

Roll was called, minutes read and approved.

Margy King asked for a few minutes to distribute YMWB supplies left from the workshop of Wednesday.

Zip codes of local presidents were requested by the secretary.

The session was then recessed for the District Caucus meetings.

Thursday Afternoon, August 5, 1965

1:00 P. M. — CHURCH EXTENSION SERVICE

Virginia Cockerill led the choruses "Evangelize Now" and "Workers Together." Jean Duecker led us in prayer.

Rev. Wendel Craker, pastor of the new Aspen Hill Church, gave an interesting report of their accomplishments and future plans. Dr. and Mrs. H. C. Duecker, lay leaders, were asked to comment. Mrs. Deucker, explained her work as chairman of the visitation plan. Dr. Duecker, chairman of finance and property, inspired us with the evident faith in this tremendous undertaking. "Workers Together" seemed to express the feeling as Mrs. Craker led in singing this chorus again.

Rev. Hal Robbins spoke of developments on the North Altavista project. He requested our prayers that God will make His will clear while they are trying to work out the financial problems.

The Card Call plan was presented by Mr. M. F. Hanger. He explained the Wesleyan Investment Foundation and then urged our faithfulness to the Card Call plan.

Business: Mae Bayse gave the Statistician's Report and moved its adoption. The motion carried. (See Report No. 13)

A motion was made and carried to adopt the report of this committee as stated above.

Fern Cooper asked for a few minutes to explain work items on display.

Mrs. Gentry asked for the names of all persons going to the Greenville Area Missionary Convention in September.

With no further business, the chairman called for the final reading of the minutes. Minutes approved.

A very beautiful installation service followed with Helen Yates giving the charge to the officers of the Conference. After the appropriate response, officers further responded by singing "I Can Give A Little Bit More."

In conclusion we formed the traditional friendship circle about the tabernacle and sang "Blest Be the Tie That Binds."

PRESIDENT'S REPORT #2

Greetings at this Sixth Session of the Women's Missionary Society of the Virginia Conference!

First we want to thank you for your prayers. God answered your prayers in a wonderful spirit of unity, a vision of the task to be accomplished, and a deep sense that God goes before as growth is made in the Conference.

First Missionary: From our newest organized church, Aspen Hill, went our first missionary to answer the call of full-time service overseas. Nurse Rosa Bishop left America in December, 1964, for Africa to become a staff member of the hospital at Kamakwie.

If our prayers continue in her behalf, God alone knows what can be accomplished through an individual as dedicated as Miss Bishop. Our aim, our hope, and our prayers are that Miss Bishop answering the call is only the beginning of others who will "go out" from our ranks.

New Societies: Three new societies were organized this Conference year. Our Vice President, Mrs. Cockerill, organized the society at Aspen Hill with eight members. Your President organized Mt. Regis with twenty members and Galax Society with twelve. All three societies have good leadership and they have already made contributions to the missionary program of the Conference.

Missionary Tours: This Conference year two very successful missionary tours were conducted. Rev. Harris Earl, missionary to South America and Rev. Robert Stowell, missionary to Puerto Rico, toured the Conference in the fall. Miss Rosa Bishop spoke in four churches filling in for Rev. Earl when he returned to Pennsylvania for Mrs. Earl's parents Golden Wedding Anniversary.

In March of this year, Marie Evatt visited all of the churches but one. Your President accompanied her to most of the churches. The hospitality in the homes and churches was wonderful. We left each place feeling we had gained spiritually and a few extra pounds of weight.

Conference Projects: Our Conference Project, Rosa Bishop's support and Pioneer Pastor's salary, was not contributed to as enthusiastically as last Conference year. For the icemaker you contributed \$381.34. It cost \$350.00 plus \$10.0 transportation.

Commendations:

To the eleven local societies that had an increase in magazine subscriptions—Altavista, Danville, Farmville, Jordantown, Newport News, Radford, Roanoke First, Roanoke Second, Roanoke Valley View, Bailey Memorial and Welcome.

To Farmville Society with highest gain in subscriptions of seven.

To eight societies making the Honor Roll or having obtained a rating of at least 85% of Efficiency Standard—Aiken Summit, Altavista, Blacksburg, Newport News, Roanoke, First, Bailey Memorial, Welcome and Falls Church.

To thirteen societies for gain in membership—Aiken Summit, Altavista, Farmville, Blacksburg, Chantilly, Crewe, Jordantown, Richmond, Roanoke First, Bailey Memorial, Washington, Welcome and Yellow Branch.

To Bailey Memorial and Welcome for a gain of eight members each.

To Blacksburg society having the largest gain in finances.

To nine societies having a gain in finances—Blacksburg, Crewe, Jordantown, Richmond, Salem, Washington D. C., Welcome and Yellow Branch.

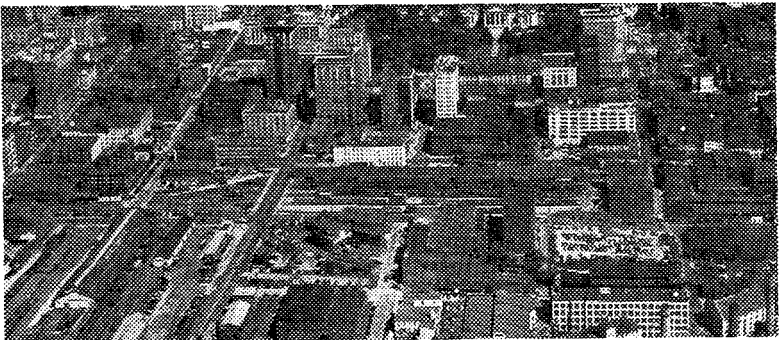

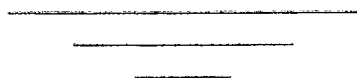
