

# Standing Resolutions

1. A Committee on Auditing and Finance, consisting of three ministerial members, the Chairman being an Elder, shall be elected each year, the duties of which shall be to examine and report on the Treasurer's books and all financial reports, save missionary, and to be a Standing Committee to advise on financial plans.

2. All persons received into membership in the churches of our Conference, excepting those whose life of Christian fidelity has been of sufficient long standing, shall be received at first as associate members only.

3. When it becomes necessary for a church to call a pastor, it shall be the duty of the calling church to make provision for the expense incurred by the pastor in removing to the new field of labor. Money raised for this purpose shall NOT be applied on the pastor's salary.

4. The Conference Sunday shall be the closing Sunday of the Conference year, and the outgoing pastor shall be paid his salary for that Sunday by the charge he is leaving.

5. At the opening of the Conference Session the President shall appoint a Nominating Committee of not less than three members, two Elders and one Layman, to bring to the Conference a slate of Nominations, for Committees, etc., for the Conference Temporary Organization. Delegates' Credentials shall be mailed to the Secretary not later than ten days before convening of Conference.

6. No person shall be received as a member of Allegheny Annual Conference until he shall have properly filled out an application blank. which application together with the recommendations of his references must pass the approval of the President and his Advisory Board. Exceptions to this rule may be made by the President and his Advisory Board, when they deem it best.

7. The pastor of any church in the Conference shall be free to hold at least one revival meeting a year, wherever he sees fit, and it is recommended that his usual salary be paid him while he is absent.

8. Each pastor shall send a monthly report on the blank provided to the Conference President showing the progress and state of the work under his care.

9. Each church may elect a Nominating Committee whose duty it shall be to nominate candidates for church offices for presentation to the church at the time of annual election of officers. Such nominations shall not exclude other nominations at the time of the business meeting.

10. Churches having business with the Conference Board of Trustees requiring a visit of that body to their church, shall be responsible for the

expense attached to such calls, unless released by the Board.

11. Inasmuch as trial sermons are hardly fair to church or candidate, and since the practice of having a trial sermon is contrary to the usual manner of locating preachers, we recommend that no preacher shall accept any such invitation, if given. Exceptions to this rule may be granted by the Conference President upon request of any church.

12. Since considerable expense of transferring of Automobile title and license attends the moving of a pastor from one state to another, we recommended that where possible the calling church bear this expense.

13. We recommend that all Districts emphasize Sunday School activities, and that Conventions be arranged for in conjunction with the visitation of the Conference Sunday School Secretary, who shall visit one Convention of each District during the year, at Convention expense.

14. We recommend that no one be elected to Elders Orders who does not have an abiding sense of a divine call to give himself wholly to the function and ministry of an Elder in the WESLEYAN METHODIST CHURCH. And that no one shall be ordained to this office and work who is not applying himself wholly to this one thing in cares and studies, and clearly determining by God's grace to give himself wholly to this holy ministry, if possible, long before the appointed day of ordination, and manifesting such a determination in faithful Christian service to the church or congregation whom he was called to serve during his years of preparation, so that, as much as lieth in himself, he has and will apply himself wholly to the work of the ministry, except in all cases of absolute necessity of such diversions' to a legitimate avocation for livelihood which neither jeopardizes the Lord's work or blames the ministry.

15. We recommend that each church equip its parsonage with the necessary heating and cooking equipment, because of the variation of requirements in this equipment for the individual parsonage.

16. We recommend that in election of the local Church Advisory Committee each church permit the pastor to nominate the members of this Committee.

#### Report No. 1

#### CONFERENCE PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Dear Brothers and Sisters in the Lord:

As I stand here reading this report, I feel that it is an auspicious occasion—the one hundredth Annual Session of The Allegheny Aunual Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Connection (or Church) of America.

What a privilege of honor has devolved itself upon me to present this report under such circumstances!

To review the work of the century is entirely beyond my ability, as well as entirely outside the sphere of this report. I am to report the work of this year.

However, reflection only brings the consciousness that just as the reporting of a century's work is an impossibility, so is the reporting of a year's work an impossibility. No man knows the waves of influence that have been put in motion in the various churches of the Conference, that will ripple out over communities and effect thousands of lives in the years to come. Eternity alone can reveal the work of the year.

The effect of the war on the churches and Sunday Schools of the Conference is noticeable, but it has not defeated any church or any Sunday School anywhere in our Conference. In some places the attendance has decreased due to various factors arising out of the war situation, but always this gratifying consciousness is our portion—that no matter how many leave, our God is still on hand.

There have been a number of churches which have paid off indebtednesses of long standing. Churches have either built or bought parsonages during the year, and the finances have reached a tide never before known. Pastor's salaries have been increased, but not to the point where the pastor is paid a sum that is at all in proportion with his services.

One of the outstanding efforts of the year has been the construction of the Soldiers' Gospel Center near the Shenango Personnel Replacement Depot at Transfer, Pennsylvania. The difficulties involved in the construction of this work were well nigh insurmountable, from the human standpoint, but our God intervened in a remarkable manner. There is no explanation but that prayer accomplishes miracles. To God be all the praise and glory.

The organization of a new Camp Meeting down in West Virginia was effected in July 1941 and the first Camp was held July 1942. This new

Gamp Meeting started under the divine leadership of the Holy Spirit and the first Camp was one of the greatest Camp Meetings I have ever attended. There was not a large number of people present for the day services, but God's spirit mightily prevailed and there will be fruitage unto all eternity. We are looking forward to a gracious Camp there this July.

The Annual Stoneboro Camp Meeting was a time of blessing and a further report of it will be given in the Stoneboro Camp Meeting President's Report as required by the constitution.

There have been some splendid advances made in the Pioneer Field, which will be reported by our Pioneer Secretary. The spirit of revival has been blessed'y manifest and most remarkable gains have been made. For all the good that has been done, we give our Heavenly Father the praise and the credit.

We wish also to mention the Annual Day of Prayer and Fasting for the ministers of the conference and their wives It was a beautiful day this year, both from the physical stradpoint of weather and the spiritual standpoint of blessing. God met with us and definite work was accomplished.

Personally, it has been one of the greatest years of spiritual victory in my own life that I have ever known. Blessed be the name of the Lord! I am farther up the road and more firmly grounded in the experience of holiness than I have ever been in my life. I praise the Lord that doeth wonders.

Memorial Recommendation: During the year it has pleased the Lord to remove from our midst two Elders. On Thursday evening, December 3, 1942, Rev. A. E. Kerst was summoned home. On Sunday evening, March 7, 1943, Rev. C. B. Pugh answered the same call. I recommend that our Committee on Nominations be authorized to Nominate a committee on Memoirs to hold a suitable memorial service.

# Report No. 4

#### COMMITTEE ON AUDITING AND FINANCE

Your Committee on Auditing and Finance makes recommendations as follows:

1. Approval of Item VIII of the Conference President's Report. We recommend that the Conference President receive a salary of \$52.00 per week (of which 5 per cent victory tax is to be retained by the Treasurer) and traveling expenses incurred in the persuit of the duties of his office to the amount of \$500.00. He to provide adequate liability insurance for his car. We further recommend that when the Conference President is called for special meetings or occasions outside 'his' regular Quarterly Meeting Schedule all offerings shall be for expense incurred and no receipt for budget will be given.

2. Adoption of the Conference Treasurer's Report, as we find his books neatly and correctly kept according to our judgment; and that he be authorized to draw from the treasury the sum of \$35.00 in appreciation of his labors, and a sum equal to all expenses incurred in pursuit of the duties of his office.

3. That each Sub-Treasurer be paid by the Conference Treasurer the

sum of \$25.00 in appreciation of their labors, plus a sum equal to the expenses incurred in the pursuit of the duties of their office.

4. That the Sunday Schools be urged to continue giving the first Sunday of the month offering to Conference Missions for the use of churches not yet self sustaining, etc. according to the recommendations of the Conference Mission Board.

5. Continuation of sending Sunday School Birthday offerings to the Conference Mission Fund.

6. That the Conference New Aid Plan be published in the Conference Minutes each year and that all pastors urge their churches to the prompt payment of the \$1.00 per member assessment as set forth in the Aid Plan.

7. That **EVERY** church in the Conference be urged to contribute \$6.00 per year to provide the portion of the Group Insurance Premium as required by State Law. (Churches whose pastor is not a member of the Group Insurance are not exempt.) Money to be remitted to Sub-Treasurers with regular budget remittances.

8. That the present deficit of \$117.89 in the Group Insurance Fund be paid from the Conference Expense Fund.

9. That each church send a monthy remittance to Sub-Treasurer for the maintainance of the Transfer Gospel Center. Remittance to be equal to two cents per week per enrolled membership of the Sunday School. This money to be raised either from the church or Sunday School or in any way agreed upon by the Pastor and his church or Sunday School.

10. That the Conference Budget be raised undivided, said budget to be equal to 10 per cent of the sum obtained by adding the following three items: Pastor's cash salary, Parsonage rent, and Church incidental expenses. Budget to be remitted to Sub-Treasurers monthly. Distribution of Budget to be made by Conference Treasurer as follows: Conference expense, 75 per cent; Conference Missions, 10 per cent; Superannuated Minister's Fund, 7 per cent; Incidental Fund, 8 per cent; Distribution apportionment subject to revision by Auditing and Finance Committee, to maintain an equalized distribution.

11. That the Conference Miscellaneous Fund be diverted to and known as the Conference Incidental Fund.

12. That the Pioneer self-denial envelopes for monthly remittances of twenty-five cents be given our continued support.

13. Recognition and hearty support of the following Connectional Budget askings: Foreign Missions, \$2.00 per member; Home Missions, \$.50 per member. (Please distinguish from Conference Missions.) Education, \$1.50 per member; Hephzibah Orphanage, \$.25 per member.

14. Approval of the report of the Committee on Sale of Conference Minutes, and that the price of Minutes be increased to \$.30 per copy

because of advancing printing cost. Any balance from sale of Minutes to revert to Conference Incidental Fund.

15. Approval of the report of the Committee to receive Conference Entertainment Fund. We recommend that the fee for this purpose remain at \$.25 per member.

16. Payment of \$75.00 quarterly to Superannuate, G. W. Richardson.

17. Payment of \$30.00 monthly toward the salary of the Conference President's Secretary.

18. Approval of the financial item of the Pioneer Secretary's report, and that the Pioneer Secretary receive a salary of \$36.21 per week (of which amount \$1.21 is to be retained by the Conference Treasurer for victory tax) and that she be paid \$300.00 annually for traveling expenses, she to provide adequate liability insurance for her car. That all offerings received in pioneer meetings not needed for local expense and offerings from other meetings in the pursuit of the duties of her office be turned over to the Conference Treasurer to be placed in the Pioneer Fund.

19. Approval of the Report of the Conference Trustees.

20. That the Conference President be authorized to draw from Incidental Fund for such miscellaneous items as flowers telegrams, phone calls, etc., without contacting his advisory board.

21. We do not approve of the item referred to us that the Committee on Itineracy and Orders be granted \$3.00 each for meals at Conference before the boarding hall opens. We recommend that the Conference Treasurer be authorized to pay all members of Conference Boards and Standing Committees an amount equal to all expenses incurred in the pursuit of the duties of their respective offices, upon presentation of their bill.

22. Granting the petition of the Bethel, W. Va., Church for \$100.00 for pastor's moving expenses. (Referred to Mission Board.)

23. That all delegates be instructed to ask their churches through the Stewards or other proper disciplinary method to increase their pastor's salary so that the previous untaxed salary will not be decreased by the victory tax. We submit below the scale of increase:

(Tabulation omitted because of change in Federal Tax Plan.-J. B. M.) 24. Adoption of the recommendation of the Conference Board of

24. Adoption of the recommendation of the Conference Board of Trustees that funds from the sale of Bethshan Home be set aside for the purchase or construction of a Conference President's Parsonage and that the Conference pay his rent until such time as a parsonage is provided.

25. That all church treasurers adopt the use of the new unified system of bookkeeping since this system corresponds with the system being used by the Conference Sub-Treasurers.

We further recommend that the reports of the Church treasurers to

Quarterly Conferences close at the end of the month preceding the Quarterly Conference; and that all church treasurers' records for the Annual Conference Year close April 30. (The Conference fiscal year is thus from April 30 to April 30.

That the above paragraph of instructions appear on the instruction sheet in the new treasurer's record books.

## CONFERENCE SUNDAY SCHOOL SECRETARY

To our dear fellow-laborers in the Gospel, Greetings: Another year of service in this part of the Lord's Vineyard is history,

and while the record of activity is very small, we trust that over all may be written, "good and faithful."

Visitation for the year has been confined almost entirely to our own district. An invitation was extended to us to visit the West Virginia district, but because of the unfavorableness of the time it was deemed best to defer this visit until next year.

The annual report blanks were mailed out, and we are anticipating encouraging reports from all of our schools. We mailed out, too, 1237 copies of the booklet. "Youth For Christ." We are pleased to report that this new effort met with an enthusiastic response from our pastors and churches. We believe that the furnishing of our people with challenging reading such as this book presented, will be a great stimulus to Sunday School interest and activity. We deeply appreciate the effort of the Swauger Publishing Company in assisting us to purchase this fine reading for our people. A one hundred percent response financially from all our pastors would enable us to completely discharge our obligation in this matter.

Statistics reveal there has been a 57 per cent increase in juvenile delinquency since Pearl Harbor, due undoubtedly to the breaking of homes by war work and the draft. This, along with the terrible breakdown in morals, the increase in drinking and social evils, makes the place of the Sunday School imperative and outstanding. Let us recognize this and give ourselves to a more whole-hearted and vigorous prosecution of the interests of the Sunday School.

The value of the Daily Vacation Bible School as an auxiliary of the Sunday School is being recognized more and more; and, I trust, will soon become the rule rather than the exception in the Sunday Schools of our Conference. Teacher training, likewise, is of first rank importance, if we are to have workmen who need not be ashamed, rightly dividing the word of truth. An enthusiastic and spiritual observance of special days will bring its rewards in larger contacts and increased attendance as evidenced in the all-time high of 357 reached by the Akron First Church on Mother's Day.

Adequate equipment, efficient instructors and wise management are important factors in Sunday School work. These, coupled with earnest prayer, persevering effort, undaunted courage and an unwavering faith, are bound to bring results. #### Report No 12

# CONFERENCE PIONEER SECRETARY

To the members of the one hundredth session of the Allegheny Annual Conference, Greetings! It is with strange emotions that we stand on the boundary line of two centuries—a boundary line which divides the historic past and an unknown future.

From the days of its organization, the Allegheny Conference has been a conference of pioneers. Its successive frontiers as they moved forward, frontiers not only the outposts, but the mileposts of holines\* evangelism and reform. Dr. Slocum says that these frontiers are more important than America's wilderness frontier which vanished with the buffalo, and their conquest demands far higher qualities than the spirit of adventure which built America.

It was the Spirit of God that gripped our early pioneers. At the third session of Allegheny Conference a letter was read asking for a preacher to be sent to a group of forty Christians who had adopted the Wesleyan Methodist Discipline in Guilford County, North Carolina. After a season of silent prayer for guidance, Adam Crooks, a young pastor twenty-three years old volunteered. The historian says: "Brother Crooks arose—his cheeks pale as marble—and said, 'I will go sustained by your prayers'."

Year after year through the century the Allegheny Conference has had visions of service, and her sons and daughters have gone forth over unbroken roads to carry the "Evangel of Light" to those who sit in darkness and the shadow of death.

Few people have any conception of the difficulties which confronted the early pioneers. Fewer still realize that our frontier today is beset with more subtle, even greater difficulties and hardships than those encountered by our early ancestors. Notwithstanding this, during the past year, aggressive work has been done in every district in the Conference.

#### Akron District

In the Akron District prospecting was done at Chagrin Falls, Cuyahoga Falls and in the city of Akron. A two weeks meeting was conducted at Alliance where a group of people are interested in having a Wesleyan church.

A tabernacle work at Carrollton, Ohio, came under Wesleyan supervision during the year and Rev. Mrs. Florence Dray was called to the pastorate. Carrollton is the county seat of Carroll County, and is only twelve miles from Leesville, the little village where the second session of our conference was entertained ninety-nine years ago. The tabernacle was built by Dick and Tillie Albright in 1908. In the first years an annual camp meeting was held there and bands of workers went out to pioneer the surrounding territory. The building which originally seated 2500 people is now being remodeled into a neat chapel with living quarters for the pastor under the same roof. There is promise of a strong work at Carrollton.

A tent meeting was conducted at Niles, Ohio, with Rev. Walter Kopp, Rev. H. E. Schmul and Rev. and Mrs. J. I. Rambo as workers. Owing to the fact that there had been no resident pastor at Niles for three months at the beginning of the year, the results of the meeting were not all we had hoped.

#### **Indiana** District

Two of the churches of the Indiana District sponsored building programs the past year. The trustees of the Nu Mine church purchased a church building in Adrian, Pennsylvania, razed it, and transported the lumber to Nu Mine where they rebuilt it. Nu Mine will soon dedicate and present to the Conference a lovely new building At Mentcle the church building in which they had worshiped for years was bought and an annex was built. The church was dedicated free of debt.

Rev. J. C. Himes conducted a fruitful tent meeting at Rimersburg, Pennsylvania. Brother Himes followed up the work by conducting prayer meeting and street meeting each week for several months This effort proved a great benefit to the work at Bethany.

September 27th a Wesleyan Methodist Church was organized at Johnstown, Pennsylvania with eight charter members. Later we moved from the conference tabernacle to more comfortable temporary quarters, and Rev. Guy Terpe was appointed pastor. An encouraging revival has just closed in which Rev. George Hawthorne gave excellent service as evangelist. Johnstown is slowly moving forward. For this we humbly praise the Lord.

A group of people at Soldier, Pennsylvania, placed themselves under conference supervision. Brother Earl Garvin and Herbert Troupe have assisted in pastoring the work A Young Missionary Workers Band was organized with a membership of thirty-three. Some complications relative to a title for the church building, which we hope may soon be eliminated, have hindered an organization.

Some prospecting was done at Gallitzin and Barnesboro, and an effort was made to open a work at Rock Run, a rural district near Emeigh. New Castle District

A penetration was made at Vanport, Pennsylvania in the New Castle District. At the close of a tent meeting which was under the leadership of Rev. T. McCracken and Rev. and Mrs. J. I. Rambo, a Sunday School was organized with an enrollment of thirty-six. Two regular preaching services are being conducted each Sunday. Brother McCracken has had the oversight of the work. For a few weeks Paul West has assisted him. The services are conducted in a neat portable tabernacle, the fuilding of which was financed by the district. The Akron district has raised the money to erect a similar one in their pioneer field.

Some prospecting was done at Hadley, Pennsylvania, and Brother E. W. Brooks has been conducting Sunday School and a preaching service each Sunday afternoon.

The Gospel Center for Transfer Army Camp has moved under the most severe reverses. God has kept His hand over the project, however, and it now appears that we shall be able to realize our ambitions for this worthy cause.

#### **Titusville District**

In the Titusville District some thought was given to Rouseville and several other places as possible projects, and Brother T. A. Robertson is working on a possible project in Titusville.

The Sunday School at Stewart Run, which has been conducted under the direction of the American Sunday School Union was transferred and Stewart Run is once more a fully organized Wesleyan Methodist Church. West Virginia District

One of the outstanding ventures of the year was made in the West Virginia District. A camp ground was purchased near Clarksburg and

the first West Virginia Camp Meeting was held. The opening of this camp ushered in a new era for the whole State, and our workers faced the challenge with a new faith and courage. Following the camp a tent meeting was conducted at Phillipi with Rev. John Bruce as the evangelist. Rev. Gerald Rodgers has conducted services at Cooks Mine, which we trust will terminate in an organization. Considerable time was spent in prospecting in the District. We visited Parkersburg, Weston, Elkin, Buckhannon, Fairmount and a number of other towns.

Daily Vacation Bible Schools: Your Secretary conducted Daily Vacation Bible Schools at Stewart Run and Emeigh. Revivals were held at Emeigh, Soldier, Kenmore, Bridgeport, Alliance and Bethany.

While the world is waging an all-out warfare of sin and destruction, let us conquest for Christ and share in His eternal victories Let us give ourselves as channels through which God can effect His purpose of bringing light to souls through His Son. Finally, in these closing days of grace, when we look for the return of our Lord, let us give ourselves to the ministry of intercessory prayer and the material support of His work that we may come before Him with joy bringing our sheaves with us.

# STATISTICS- SUB-TREASURERS, JOINT COMMITTEE

## Recommendation for Statistics:

1. That ALL Budget (Conference Budget, Conference Missions, Pioneer, New Aid. Group Insurance, Gospel Center, Home Missions, Foreign Missions, W. H. and F. M. S., and Y. M. W. B., Educational (excepting L. S. U. pledges, which should be sent direct to Houghton, and receipt sent to Sub-Treasurer for credit), and Hephzibah Orphanage, be sent through the local church treasurer to the Conference Sub-Treasurer in ONE monthly remittance. Conference Budget, Conference Missions, Pioneer, New Aid, Group Insurance and Gospel Center will be combined under the

head CONFERENCE WORK and reported in Items VIII and X under that head. Report other funds under their proper heads in these Items. In Item XI fully itemize all budget funds under their proper headings. Receipts for cash given by Conference or Connectional Treasurers for Home Missions, Foreign Missions, Y. M. W. B., Education, Hephzibah etc., may be reported in Item X provided said receipts have been sent to the Sub-Treasurer before the books close for the year.

2. That local church treasurer's books close April 30, thus making the Conference fiscal year from May 1 to April 30. All funds received after that date shall be counted in the following year. Funds will be credited on Sub-Treasurer's books if received by May 10.

3. That the Secretary supply each Sub-Treasurer with sufficient number of Statistical Blanks to supply one to each pastor of his district. Sub-Treasurers to fill Item X in accordance with receipts shown on his books May 10 and mail signed copy to pastors as soon thereafter as convenient. Pastor may then make up Statistical Blanks as usual, working from Item X as signed by his Sub-Treasurer. (This does not mean that pastor must wait till receiving signed Statistical Blank before making up statistics He should have all information well in hand, ready to complete his blank upon receipt of the signed form.)

4. That pastor's Statistical Blanks, with any necessary correction, be in the hands of the Statistical Committee not later than noon of Conference Thursday.

Recommendations for local Treasurers and Missionary Societies:

1. That local church treasurers specify the ORGANIZATION SEND-ING and note PROPER DISTRIBUTION of all funds in each remittance. This is essential for proper credit.

2. That wherever practical local Missionary Societies make proper division of funds before placing in hand of local treasurer for remittance to Sub-Treasurer. This refers especially to Conference and Camp pledges and W. H. and F. M. Society dues. Conference Pledges are properly divided one-fourth Home Missions and three-fourths Foreign Missions (Unless otherwise specified.) Camp Pledges are divided three-eighths Home, and five-eighths Foreign (unless otherwise specified.) W. H. and F. M. S. dues of \$1.00 are divided one-fourth Home and one-fourth Foreign (Unless otherwise specified.) (One half of dues, or the entire sum when only fifty cents is credited to Other Benevolences, and cannot be credited to Home or Foreign Missions.) Y. M. W. B. Conference and Camp Pledges and dues are ALL CREDITED TO FOREIGN MISSIONS. Y M. W. B. allows one (month's) offering for Education and one (month's) offering for Home Missions. All other Y. M. W. B. funds are Foreign Missions.

3. That Conference Y. M W. B. pledges be sent THROUGH THE

SUB-TREASURERS to the Conference Y. M. W. B. Treasurer, Mrs. Robinson. Conference W. H. and F. M. S. pledges be sent THROUGH THE SUB-TREASURERS to the Conference W. H. and F. M. S. Treasurer, Mrs. Rachel L. Dreyer.

4. That local societies be informed that personal gifts to individuals are not counted on Budget, but may be credited on Other Benevolences.

The Auditing Committee report was adopted.

Ballots were cast for treasurer. Sister Rachel L. Dreyer re-elected. Adjourned on motion. Prayer by Mrs. Lillian Markell.

#### COMMITTEE ON RESOLUTIONS

Be It Resolved:

1 That we, the members of the Women's Home and Foreign Missionary Society, shall not be diverted from our sacred task of arousing and directing missionary spirit by habitually attending missionary activities, and with clean hands and pure hearts, devise lawful means to interest them in missionary work at home and abroad.

2. That we give ourselves unto prayer in our monthly day-meetings in a much greater way than in the past; realizing that out of an awakening within the society will come a deeper interest in the church. Proverbs 29:18.

3. That we individually give ourselves to a more persistent and faithful study of the Misssionary Magazine, thus keeping ourselves informed of our Missionary activities and needs.

4. That with minds informed with the progress and needs of each branch of our missionary work and with hearts of one accord with passion for the lost of earth, we cease not to pray daily for the missionary enterprise in the Home and Foreign fields.

5. That we shall adhere to Scriptural methods of raising funds for missions, but out of sacrificial hearts and lives, give heartily as unto the Lord and His holy cause.

6. That we, our people, young and old, uphold by precept and example, modesty of dress, by which we mean wearing long hose on children, avoiding short sleeves low necked dreeses, short skirts, and nude shades of hosiery which draw attention to our bodies and so tend to destroy purity and deep spirituality; also that we adhere to Deuteronomy 22:5 and I Timothy 2:9-10.

7. That we persistently adhere to Christian standards that create an atmosphere in the home and in the church so conducive to spirituality in these perilous times of departing from the faith of our fathers, that the world may know we belong to the King of Kings and look for His return for His holy bride.

8. That, as far as possible, we refuse to patronize grocery stores, restaurants or other places selling liquor, since we most deeply abhor drinking and smoking.

9. That we, as members of the Society, join the mothers, who are sacrificing their sons for our country in prayer for their salvation and protection.

10. That these resolutions be read in each society frequently enough that all members be well informed of their proposed attainments and requisites.

### COMMITTE ON PROGRAM AND PLAN OF WORK

We recommend:

1. That at the first meeting after Conference each local society having new officers, hold an installation service.

2. That the program and plan of work be read and discussed as soon as the minutes are received. We also urge that the president of each society refer to this as a reminder during the year.

3. That each society endeavor to hold a public meeting monthly, using Sister Reisdorph's prayer page, praying especially for the requests found in the Wesleyan Missionary. We suggest that a spirit of evangelism be carried on in our local community by the members of societies, each one feeling a personal responsibility to bring at least one soul to Christ during the year.

4. That each society elect one or more corresponding secretaries to keep in touch with our different mission fields, thereby bringing firsthand knowledge to cur women.

5. That each society have an aggressive solicitor for the Wesleyan Missionary. Where it is difficult to get subscriptions we urge the use of the club plan.

6. That the President of each society remind those attending Stoneboro Camp Meeting of the daily Missionary Prayer Meeting from 4:15 to 5 o'clock, urging them to be faithful in this work of intercession.

7. (a) That each society put forth a special effort to send their President and delegates to the annual Conference, assuming their expense for transportation.

(b) That delegate's credentials be sent to Mrs. Verna E. Vogan, Sandy Lake, Penna., at least two weeks before Conference.

(c) That each society send at least one dozen quarts of fruit or vegetables to Conference. Fruit to be credited at twenty cents per quart and vegetables at fifteen cents per quart.

(d) That fifteen cents per member be raised for delegate's entertainment and sent to the Conference with the delegate.

(e) That each society instruct their delegate how much to pledge at the Public Meeting. Unless otherwise specified, the pledge is divided one-fourth for Home and three-fourth for Foreign missions.

(f) That each society send its statistical report either by the delegate or the President, or by mail, to be in the hands of the Statistical Committee the first day of the Conference session.

8. That we urge the use of the Study Book and the excellent programs in the Wesleyan Missionary. We believe the use of the book review method is the most successful.

9. That each local society raise a General Conference budget of not

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less than six dollars for Mountain Missions, and five dollars for Hephzibah Orphanage. Let all dues and budget obligations be sent through the local church treasurer to the representative district Sub-Treasurer.

10. That we send programs and supplies to our Mountain Missions, Hephzibah Orphanage, and the Indian Mission, including a few bandages. (Note: Bandages should be cut from 2 to 4 inches wide and tightly rolled. These may be valued at fifty cents per pound. The amount is to be credited on the Statistical report but not applied on budget.)

11. That we endeavor to raise one-fourth of the Church Educational Budget.

12. That we stress the need of Home Missions, raising as much as possible for this. Two hundred dollars of the total conference receipts to be used for Zion's Hill Mission.

13. That the Red Letter Days as given in the Standard of Efficiency be observed when possible. That Easter and Self-Denial offerings be used for Home Missions.

14. (a) We suggest that where suitable, each society have a Mercy and Help Committee, whose duty shall be to visit the sick and needy and give aid where necessary and to send sympathy and greeting cards to shut-ins.

(b) That our Holiness District Conventions, where possible, observe a Missionary Service.

(c) That each society have a live Program Committee, varying once a month thereby each member be made to feel a greater interest in missionary work. We suggest the President act as Chairman of said committee.

(d) We urge that dollar dues be paid by all members.

15. That since the retiring President is Acting President during the Conference session, we suggest that the society send her to Conference and elect the new president as delegate, where possible.

16. We further suggest that where possible, a Missionary be secured to hold special services some time during the year.
