Standing Rules

1. Visiting Ministers:

All visiting ministers of our own denomination and those of other denominations who hold the Bible to be the very Word of God and the final authority in faith and practice are invited to honorary seats in this conference.

2. Date of Conference:

The annual sessions of the conference shall convene on the Chambers Campground at 1:30 p.m. the last Tuesday of June, except that quadrennially it shall convene the second Tuesday after the General Conference convenes. The forenoon meetings shall convene at 8:30 and adjourn at 10:45. The afternoon meetings shall convene at 1:30 and adjourn by vote. The seven rows of seats in the front of the tabernacle, and the platform, shall comprise the bar of the conference.

3. Examinations:

Examinations shall be in the hands of the Committee on Itineracy and Orders not later than two weeks before the opening of the conference session.

4. Loans:

Any and all conference loans shall be subject to the approval of the Conference Board of Trustees.

5. Procedure:

The daily order of business shall be: 1. Hymn, 2. Roll Call, 3. Devotions, 4. Reading of Minutes, 5. Appointment of Committees, 6. Report of Committees, 7. Miscellaneous Business, 8. Passage of Characters.

6. Taking of Pastoral Vote:

To obtain uniformity it is recommended that the Pastoral Vote be taken on each charge during the third full week in April, or during the following week if Easter falls during the third week. The Pastoral Vote shall be taken on prepared official ballots for this purpose.

7. Pay for Officials:

The Secretary and the Treasurer of the conference shall receive \$75.00 each annually.

8. Statistician:

The conference shall elect a statistician, whose term of office shall expire at the close of the next session of the Annual Conference. He shall be the chairman of the Statistical Committee.

9. Closing of Records:

Each local church of the conference shall close its financial and other records for the conference year, May 31. The statistical report with all cash and receipts must be sent to the Conference Treasurer by June 10. Any money sent after that date will be applied on the next year.

10. Reporting of Statistics:

We authorize the use of the abbreviated report blanks.

11. Reports:

The report of the Woman's Missionary Society and the report of the Wesleyan Youth shall be printed in the conference minutes.

12. Ex-officio Members:

- (a) The President of the conference and the President of Wesleyan Youth shall be ex-officio members of the Camp Meeting Committee.
- (b) The President of the conference shall be ex-officio chairman and the President of the Woman's Missionary Society shall be an ex-officio member of the Missionary Board.
- (c) The conference President shall be ex-officio chairman and the Secretary of the conference shall be ex-officio member of the Nominating Committee.
- (d) The conference President shall be ex-officio chairman and the Secretary of Evangelism shall be member ex-officio of the Committee on Evangelism.

13. Sale of Properties:

All money coming to the conference from the sale of church and parsonage property shall become a part of the Church Extension Fund.

14. Committee on Location:

The Board of Trustees shall choose three of their own number to constitute a Committee on Building Location. They shall study all proposed building projects and report their findings to the Board of Trustees. The names of the committee shall be printed in the minutes.

15. Editing of Minutes:

The Secretary of the conference is authorized to edit the minutes.

16. Election of Camp Meeting Chairman:

At the time of the election of conference officers, the conference shall elect by ballot from among the elders the chairman of the Camp Meeting Committee.

17. Election of Conference Officers:

All conference officers shall be elected by ballot or after nominations by the Nominating Committee or from the floor. (See list of officers.)

18. Vacations:

Each charge shall grant its pastor at least two weeks vacation each year, with pay.

19. Apportionment of Budget:

- (a) The Budget Apportionment Committee shall apportion budget to all members-in-full, regardless of age.
- (b) The Onondaga Reservation charge shall be assigned only the denominational budget.
- (c) A newly organized church shall be exempt from Conference budget the first year following its organization and only one half the conference budget assigned the second conference year following its organization, after which it may be assigned all items of budget in full as usual.

20. Course of Study:

Persons recommended to study or to travel under the direction of the conference shall appear personally before the Committee on Itineracy and Orders before they are accepted and annually thereafter or communicate with the committee so long as they are continued. If they fail to do this for two successive years, they shall be returned to their quarterly conference.

21. Ministerial Institute:

The President of the conference shall be ex-officio chairman of the committee to plan the Ministerial Institute. The three district chairmen shall complete the committee. This committee shall arrange for the Institute following the next annual session of the conference.

22. Delegates Credentials:

It shall be the duty of the pastor not later than one week before the next annual session of the conference to forward to the Secretary of the conference, who is a Committee on Credentials, the credentials of the delegate(s) and the alternate delegate(s) from his charge.

23. Audits:

The books of the Treasurer of the conference and of other custodians of conference funds shall be audited by an accountant or recognized book-keeper approved by the President and his Advisory Board. This shall be done prior to the convening of the annual session of the conference, and a certified copy shall be furnished the President.

24. Defining Pioneer Work:

In the interim between conference sessions the Missionary Board is authorized to interpret what shall be considered a pioneer or extension work. In the event of the purchase of property, the Missionary Board may make recommendations to the Board of Trustees.

25. Offerings for Extension Work:

The third Sunday of the second month of each quarter is recommended as the time for taking the Sunday school offering for extension work.

26. Bible Study Quarter:

During the first quarter of each calendar year, which is designated as Bible Study Quarter, each church shall conduct a Bible study program. Plans for this work shall be offered each year by the President and the Bible Study Committee.

27. Committee on Orders of the Day:

The President and his Advisory Board shall constitute a committee on Orders of the Day. They shall plan the daily schedule of the conference and shall prepare a printed agenda. The following shall be the order of the evening services: Tuesday, a Sunday school rally; Wednesday, Church Extension; Thursday, Missions; Friday, the Ordination Service.

DAILY PROCEEDINGS

First Day — Tuesday Afternoon

The Rochester Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America convened at the call of the Chair for its 114th Annual Session on the Chambers' Campground at 2:00 P.M., on Tuesday, June 24, 1958. We were led in singing "Amazing Grace" by Rev. Beverly Wilson; prayer by Rev. Leon Jeliff.

The roll was called, showing 27 Elders and Conference Preachers present. The report of the Committee on Credentials was read, and after being amended to seat an Alternate Delegate, was adopted. The roll of the delegates was called showing 17 present.

The Committee on Courtesy presented Dr. Roy S. Nicholson, General Conference President of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America, to the Conference President who in turn introduced Dr. Nicholson to the Conference.

Dr. Nicholson lead the opening devotions reading Psalm 46 and spoke from the topic, "God's Call to Calmness." He emphasized the necessity of resting in God. Our perspective was lengthened. Following the message all gathered at the altar for a time of prayer.

The agenda on Orders of the Day, prepared by the Conference President and the Advisory Board, was presented to the Conference and adopted. (See Report No. 1.)

The report of the Nominating Committee was read and adopted. (See Report No. 2.)

The report of the Conference President and the Advisory Board was read by Rev. James E. Bence and adopted. (See Report No. 3.)

The report of the Conference Pension Plan Treasurer, Edward J. Willett, was given orally and adopted.

Mr. Willett then spoke to us concerning the work of Christian Service Brigade for boys, and Pioneer Girls for girls.

It was moved and voted that we adjourn after the Chairman of each committee had an opportunity to call his committee.

First Day — Tuesday Evening

The evening service was presided over by the Conference President. The Conference President introduced Rev. and Mrs. Allyn Foster. Mr. Foster then led the congregation in singing. Prayer was offered by the Rev. Frederick Gordon.

presented with words of commendation by the Conference President. The text was taken from Hebrews 11:24. Mr. Wilson ably set forth that "preaching is truth through personality" and that it is essential for genuine success that personality be surrendered entirely to God. The service was dismissed by Rev. Stanley W. Wright.

Second Day — Wednesday Morning

The Conference session was called to order by the President. We were led in singing by Rev. Gerald Wright. Rev. William Turverey, pastor of the Onondaga Reservation, conducted morning devotions. The Roll was called. The minutes of the previous session were read and adopted.

A partial report of the Missionary Board was read and adopted. (See Report No. 4.)

It was moved and passed that we reconsider the action of omitting the President's Official Acts. It was carried that the Official Acts of the Conference President be included in his report to be printed in the conference minutes.

Orders of the Day—The report of Conference Treasurer, Mr. Howard L. Dietrich, was read and referred by vote to the Auditing Committee. (See Report No. 7.)

The report of the Treasurer of the Mutual Aid Plan, Mr. Howard L. Dietrich, was read to the conference and referred by vote to the Auditing Committee. (See Report No. 8.)

The Tithing Secretary, Rev. William Woughter, gave a verbal report.

The Committee on Courtesy introduced Dr. and Mrs. S. W. Paine and children and Dr. Claude A. Ries, of Houghton, N. Y. Mrs. Paine; Dr. Paine,

President of Houghton College, and Dr. Ries, Chairman of the Division of Religious Education, brought words of greeting.

Conference was adjourned by limitation of time.

Rev. Wallace Taylor dismissed conference with prayer.

Second Day — Wednesday Afternoon

The Conference session was called to order by the President. Rev. Allyn Foster led in singing of "He Abides."

The roll was called and the minutes of the previous session read and adopted.

Rev. Merlin Loomis, pastor of the Manlius Center Church, led the devotions.

He then spoke concerning the death and retirement of several members of the College faculty, with the resulting need of good replacements; the activities of Houghton's 75th anniversary; the completing of the chapel-auditorium; the commencing of the East Hall wing; and other college activities.

Rev. Allyn Foster led in the singing of a hymn.

The Committee on Itineracy and Orders recommended Harold Kingdon to Elder's Orders. The vote was unanimously carried. Mrs. Evelyn McKnight, from Gates church, Rochester, was seated as delegate since Harold Kingdon has been elected to elder's orders.

The Committee on Religious Services made a final report which was adopted. (See Report No. 5).

It was voted we adjourn.

Second Day — Wednesday Evening 7:00

Orders of the Day—Memorial Service for Rev. Mrs. Clara McLeister. Rev. A. Foster led in the singing of a hymn. Rev. Harley S. Hill led in prayer. The following brought words of tribute to the life of Mrs. McLeister: Rev. Wesley B. Nussey, as Pastor; Rev. James E. Bence, as a pioneer in church extension; Rev. David A. Rees, as to her conference interests; Dr. Roy S. Nicholson, as to her denominational contributions; Dr. Claude A. Ries, as a personal friend.

The service was concluded by a solo: "It Took A Miracle," by Rev. I. Leslie Conley.

Third Day — Thursday Forenoon

The conference was called to order by the President. We were led in singing by Rev. Allyn Foster. The roll was called. Rev. Arland Rees conducted devotions.

It was voted that we strike from the minutes "The report was adopted by vote" recorded in the report of the Board of Trustees.

The minutes were approved as corrected.

Orders of the Day—The Election of Conference Officers.

The Conference invited Dr. R. S. Nicholson to preside during the election of officers.

A motion was made and carried that all ballots be electing ballots unless otherwise requested.

It was voted that we proceed with all single ballots.

It was moved that those receiving the highest votes be elected on the nominating ballot where more names are presented than desired elections.

We were adjourned by limitation of time.

Third Day — Thursday Afternoon

The Conference was opened by a verse of "All Hail the Power of Jesus' Name," calling the roll, devotions by Rev. Willard G. Steele, and the reading and approving of the minutes of the morning session.

Merlin Loomis was designated to act as teller in the place of William Turvey.

It was moved that the Conference President and his Advisory Board be empowered to arrange the list according to seniority and that this become effective next Conference.

REPORT NO. 6

CONFERENCE PRESIDENT'S REPORT

To the Members of the Rochester Conference gathered on Chambers Campground for the 114th Annual Session:

Christian greetings! Another year has passed and through the good providence of God we are permitted to assemble for another annual session of the Rochester Conference. Once again we feel the urge to express deep and sincere thanks to our God that the world is still at peace though an uneasy one; when we find ourselves among nations fraught with trouble, threatenings and rumors of war, and when each year brings new inventions and development of modern weapons of destruction such as rockets, space missiles and others, we are brought to a sober realization of the awful results should any of the troubled areas flare into an open war. "The year 1957 was one of the most eventful years in the history of the world. It produced great changes in many prophetic lands, especially in Egypt and the Middle East. It saw Russia forge ahead of the United States as a world power, and it put man-made moons in the sky. The year 1958 will probably outshine 1957 in important events." In the midst of confusion and frustration we can only

find peace and assurance in God. While the world is posed almost continually on the brink of war, Satan is also increasing his effort toward an all-out war against God and righteousness. One only needs to read the papers to realize the power of our Spiritual enemy and the extensive forces over which he has command. These considerations and reflections compel us to turn to our God from whom only can come a solution to these world-wide dilemmas and bring victory over the forces of evil. Again we are compelled to cry out that "Evangelism is a Divine imperative for all the churches and forces of righteousness. It is not enough to hold our own; we must attack and ever more go forward in a positive manner against the powers of darkness."

As we come to the close of another year it brings us to a time of accounting, a time when we survey the work and activities of the year. As we do this we believe the reports will reveal that it has been a good year in all phases of the work. We are happy to report that again this year there has been good progress in many of the churches by way of new educational units, remodelling and thus providing increased facilities for Sunday School and Youth activities as a more effective means of promoting the cause of Christ. The opening of the new work at Spencerport was a happy occasion both for the Pastor and Assistant Pastor as well as the people who have labored so diligently and loyally in the completing of this, our newest Pioneer Project—they certainly are to be commended. The reports from the Mother-Church and the new Church are encouraging and not only show good progress but evidence the blessing and approval of God on this whole project. Our other new work is progressing nicely and is encouraging—you will hear more in detail concerning these works—all of our new work—in the Conference Extension Service. You have read of the plans to begin construction of the new church in Baldwinsville in the near future. The interest and enthusiasm of the Pastor and people in launching this are gratifying—your prayers are earnestly solicited for this undertaking. We are pleased to note that more and more of our Sunday Schools are setting aside the offering on the third Sunday of the second month of each quarter for Extension Work—we trust that soon every Sunday School will find this possible for it is a real financial help in our new work.

We are pleased to note that many of our churches are facing the financial situation—increase in cost of living—in a realistic way and are endeavoring to make adequate provisions for the pastor, that he may give full time to the work to which God has called him. It is our sincere hope and prayer that financial conditions in all our churches can be adjusted that none of our pastors will find it necessary to work full time and, where it is essential to supplement income from the church, arrangements can be made for part time that the work of God and the church may go forward as aggressively as possible. To this end let us pray and dedicate ourselves anew to the task before us. While several of our churches have been effected by the recession, predictions are encouraging for the fall months

and we trust financially will be back to normal in the near future and we can be on our way again.

While this year has been a good year it has been fraught with some anxieties by way of sickness and death. There has been some illness among our pastors and their families but we are glad for the recovery of most back to normal health again and others are improving with His help. Sister Clara McLeister, who had served not only the local church but the Conference and the Denomination so faithfully for many years, was called to her home early in January—a memorial service is being planned in her memory.

Very soon after Conference we were fortunate in securing Merlin Loomis, one of our own Conference boys from Canisteo, as pastor for our Associate Church at Manlius Center; later in the summer we were able to secure William Turverey, also one of our Conference boys from the Willett Memorial Church, for the pastorate on the Onondaga Reservation and with the adoption of this report these men will be placed on the list as Conference Preachers. We received the transfer of both Frederick Gordon from the Canada Conference and Willard G. Steele from the Allegheny Conference—the Reverend Gordon having been accepted into the Conference last year while the name of the Reverend Steele, with the adoption of this report, will be placed on the Conference Roll of Elders. The Reverend Wesley Swauger has requested his name to be dropped because of the nature of his work which is largely in the field of radio. We recommend that his name be placed on the Unstationed List.

You will be interested to know of the progress of the Conference Book Shop in Syracuse. While we have not been able to give as much time to this project as we would have liked, the progress has been very encouraging. It is estimated the D. V. B. S. business this summer is about four times what it was a year ago and the business in general has increased. The shop is becoming widely known and the new contacts and accounts are gratifying, for which we praise Him. We are trusting God for marked increase in the fall and Christmas business. To this end it is very important that a good deal more time be given to the preparation of promotional material for this season. Right here we feel we should again point out that a business of this type requires time to reach a volume large enough to put it on a paying basis. We trust you will continue to pray definitely for this project that it may produce to His glory.

We would like to take this opportunity to express thanks and appreciation to Brother Bence our Vice-President for his faithful and continued cooperation, to the Advisory Board, the Conference Board of Trustees and Building Committee for the counsel and fine work, to the pastors and laymen who have labored in the spirit to team-work and thus have helped to share the burdens. We would like to express thanks to Mrs. Nora Woodhead and Mrs. Ruth Potter who have worked so faithfully in the Book Shop at a real financial sacrifice; to Mrs. Rees who has served loyally in the

office work—all of which is so important to the work of the Conference. Again we would say thanks to our fine neighbors, Brother and Sister Conley for their help and cooperation in many ways. Above all we humbly acknowledge our dependence upon God and to Him give thanks and praise. We will soon be launching out into a new Conference year and we go with the assurance and confidence in Him that His grace and strength will be sufficient for our task whatever it may be for the coming year.

COMMITTEE ON EVANGELISM

Your Committee on Evangelism has the honor to present the following report:

This convention was held in the Waterloo Wesleyan Church, October 7th, with Rev. Martin Cox, Pastor of Houghton College, as speaker. REPORT NO. 12

REPORT OF THE SUNDAY SCHOOL SECRETARY

To the 114th Session of The Rochester Conference:

Ten people (five of whom were pastors) representing five Sunday Schools of our Conference, attended the National Sunday School Convention last year. Of the three award winning Sunday Schools, Rochester sent their assistant pastor, Harold Kingdon. Blatchley and Pine Meadows were unable to be represented. The privilege of the trip was passed along to Canandaigua and Boylston, but they were unable to send a representative. It was possible for Rev. Wallace Taylor, a member of our Conference Sunday School Board to fill one of these vacancies. Your Conference Sunday School Secretary was privileged to attend and receive instruction concerning: enrolling men in the Sunday School; the Pastor and the Sunday School; Sunday School Superintendents; records and secretarial staff; Sunday School extension; how to plan a Sunday School Convention; and, teaching techniques for young people and adults.

Two Sunday School Institutes were held last winter. The one at Corning on January 18th, with the Elmira, Horseheads, Corning, Chambers, Shady Grove, and Odessa Schools. A prize was offered to the School having the best representation of teachers and officers present. Corning was awarded the prize which was the free use of the "Successful Teaching" filmstrips. The second Institute was held at Canandaigua on February 23rd, with the Avon, Waterloo, and Canandaigua School. The prize for this Institute was awarded to Canandaigua. Both Institutes were well attended. Two others had to be cancelled because of bad weather.

Sunday School work is worth the work. Every Sunday School worker has discovered that to do the job well takes vigilance without recess. Sunday School time-servers do not bother to check on themselves or the effectiveness of what they do. But not so with the worker. One of the check points that the workers must watch is, are we keeping the SCHOOL in Sunday School? Are we maintaining high standards of achievement? Are our pupils

STUDENTS or merely attendants? Do they park their brains outside before coming to class? Is it not true that our expectations as to what will happen in the minds and hearts of our pupils during that Sunday School hour each week, is far too low? Let's upgrade our teaching and pupil achievement requirements!

AWARDS

The Conference Awards for the year June 1, 1957 — May 31, 1958 go to the following Schools:

1. The cup for the school making the greatest numerical gain in average attendance goes to Wallace, having a gain of 17.

2. The cup for the school above 50 in average attendance which has the greatest percentage increase, goes to Wallace, having a gain of 23%.

3. The cup for the school below 50 in average attendance which has the greatest percentage increase, goes to Millview, having a gain of 44%.

4. Free transportation with the Conference Sunday School Secretary to the New England Sunday School Convention is awarded to the following: Pastor Edwin Macumber or a Key Leader from Wallace; Pastor Richard Brown or a Key Leader from Millview; Pastor Allyn Foster or a Key Leader from Fyler.

THE SILVER CUP AND AWARD STANDARD

1. A silver cup to the Sunday School gaining the most in average attendance over its previous year's average attendance.

2. A second cup to the Sunday School having an average above 50 that gains the most in percentage.

3. A third cup to the Sunday School having an average under 50 that gains the most in percentage.

4. The pastor or a key leader of each cup winning Sunday School will be awarded the privilege of traveling without charge to the National Sunday School Convention with the Conference Sunday School Secretary. In the event that a Sunday School receives more than one silver cup, only one of these awards will be available to that School. The other will be given to the next in line in average gain.

Each School shall have the privilege of omitting from its record of attendance the two Camp Meeting Sundays, and any two additional Sundays of the year. To be counted present scholars must be in attendance at least half of the Sunday School session.

REPORT NO. 13

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON STEWARDSHIP

Your committee on stewardship has met on several occasions during the year and at two of these meetings the Conference President has been with us. Our purpose has been to discover better methods of financing the work of God at both the local church and conference levels. Improvement at this point will result in greater efficiency in advancing God's Kingdom and thus enabling each of us to discharge our stewardship. That these aims may be achieved we submit the following recommendations.

1. That we of the Rochester Conference commit ourselves to a period of education and training in the field of stewardship.

2. That all of the churches report to the Conference Treasurer quarterly and that the vouchers from the Missionary Society, the Y. M. W. B., or individuals be included in these quarterly reports.

3. That as far as possible all cash be forwarded to the Conference Treasurer as undivided budget (see Discipline Paragraph 378 at the top of page 227). He in turn will disburse the funds where the need is greatest (home and foreign missions excepted) until each item is paid in full.

4. That each church shall exercise proper care in engaging outside speakers who will be making an appeal for funds.

5. That a stewardship committee be elected by this session of Conference and continue through the year and report at the next session.

REPORT NO. 14

FINANCE COMMITTEE

We recommend that the Woman's Missionary Society and Wesleyan Youth be asked to pay for the printing of the number of pages in their portion of the Conference Minutes.

We recommend that where the pastor is a member of the Social Security Plan that the church give the pastor a bonus sufficient to cover his social security payment.

We recommend that where the pastor is a member of our Conference Mutual Aid, that the church assume the payment of the minimum fifteen dollars.

We recommend that where the financial needs of the new International Headquarters has not been presented, that the fourth Sunday of October be designated as Headquarters Sunday at which time this project will be presented.

We recommend that for the Conference year 1958-1959 the expenditures for the Conference Administrative work be approximately \$5,000.00 as follows:

A. The salary of the President be at the rate of \$65.00 per week, for fifty-two weeks.

B. The Conference President shall be allowed travel expense at the rate of six cents per mile and miscellaneous expenses.

C. The Conference is to assume the expenses of the parsonage utilities.

D. We recommend that the Conference Treasurer be authorized to give the Conference President a bonus sufficient to cover his social security assessment plus the fifteen dollar minimum for Mutual Aid.

In order to finance the above program we recommend that the following be adopted:

1. The Conference Budget shall be \$6.00 per member, of which 25c will go for the maintenance of grounds and equipment.

2. Should there be a deficit in the Administrative Funds, the Treasurer be authorized to borrow from the present Extension Fund.

3. The expense incurred by the Conference President and Missionary Board in Conference Extension shall be paid from the Extension Fund.

4. When the Conference President shall hold revival meetings within the bounds of the Conference, \$65.00 per week shall apply on budget. Any balance above this amount, shall be a love-offering to the President.

The Budget Apportionment is assigned on a per capita basis and is divided at the rate of \$15.30 per full member of the church, and is divided as follows: Foreign Mission, \$2.00; Home Missions, \$1.25; Education, \$2.50; Australia, \$.25; Orphanage, \$.25; Executive Budget Fund, \$.60; Superannuate Pension Plan, \$1.50; General Conference Expense, \$.45; Conference Work, \$6.00; Mutual Aid Fund, \$.50.

The Sunday School Budget for the General Conference and the local Conference work is based on the total number of members enrolled in the Sunday School and is based as follows: Denominational Sunday School, \$.15; Conference Sunday School, \$.05.

6. He shall seek to co-ordinate the evangelizing efforts of the various churches of the Conference by suggesting to pastors a suited arrangement of meetings, and by counseling with reference to evangelists.

7. His Conference evangelistic dates shall be established by the President and his Advisory Board.

8. The Conference President is to be permitted to take two meetings per year outside the bounds of the Conference.

9. He shall be a member ex-officio of the Budget Committee.

5. There shall be elected a Conference Statistician whose term of office shall not expire until the close of the Conference session following her election. She shall be the chairman of the Statistical Committee and shall be authorized to choose the members of said committee. She shall be seated within the bar of Conference and shall be given board and room during Conference. The local treasurers shall send both of their statistical reports to the Conference treasurer by June 5th. The local Y.M.W.B. Superintendents shall send their reports to the Conference Y.M.W.B. Superintendent by June 5th.

6. Each local society of the Conference shall close its financial and other records for the year, May 31st.

7. To receive credit all cash and vouchers must be sent to the Conference Treasurer and Y.M.W.B. Superintendent by June 5th. Any money sent after that date shall be applied on the next year.

8. It shall be the duty of the local president to forward to the Conference Secretary, who is a Committee on Credentials, not later than one week before the Annual Conference convenes the Credentials of the delegate from her society.

9. The Matron of the Dormitories shall be elected by the Executive Committee. Her salary shall be \$35.00 per year. Her board and room is to be paid during Conference and Camp. She may choose her own assistant whom the Conference will pay \$5.00.

10. The Y.M.W.B. Superintendent and the Conference Treasurer shall have their books audited by a competent bookkeeper before coming to Conference and the auditor send the report to the President.

11. There shall be a member of the Camp Meeting Committee present to council with the Executive Committee when plans affecting the Camp are being acted upon.

12. The method for paying traveling Missionaries shall be as follows:

Societies with less than ten members—\$2.00.

Societies with from 10-20 members—\$3.00.

Societies with over 20 members—\$5.00.

13. All lady missionaries and General Officers who are members of the Wesleyan Methodist Church shall be seated within the Bar of Conference and given the right to speak.

14. All local Y.M.W.B. Superintendents shall be seated within the Bar of Conference and given the right to speak.

15. The conference shall elect 3 members for a committee on committees which shall meet before conference convenes to nominate committees for the organization of conference. The President and Secretary shall be members Ex-officio.

16. The Executive Committee shall act as Orders of The Day Committee. The Secretary shall act as Committee on Credentials.

17. The offerings taken at Spring Conventions and Conference Public Missionary Meeting shall be divided as follow: 1-3 Foreign, 1-3 Home and 1-3 Conference Pioneer.

STANDARD OF EFFICIENCY

We recommend:

1. That the Efficiency Standard be read in the society the first monthly meeting after Conference (5% credit) and that arrangements be made with the pastor for one missionary prayer meeting each month (5%).

2. That a minimum of ten meetings be held during the year at which time prayer requests are presented and remembered and business transacted (5%) and at least one public meeting (5%).

3. The formation of one or more Prayer Partner Circles in each society with a Prayer Partner Secretary, who shall report the names of same to Conference Prayer Partner Secretary within sixty days after the rise of Annual Conference.

4. That the President, Secretary, Treasurer, and the equivalent of seventy-five percent of the active membership be subscribers to the WESLEYAN MISSIONARY.

5. That a solicitor be elected for the WESLEYAN MISSIONARY gaining not less than two subscriptions a year, reporting quarterly to the Conference Missionary Solicitor.

6. That a delegate be elected to the Annual Conference Woman's Missionary Society and that she be instructed by local society regarding the amount to be pledged by that society at the Annual Conference Session (5%) and that the President attend the Annual Conference Session (5%) provision being made for their expenses.

7. That the dues (one dollar per member) be sent directly to the Conference Treasurer, twenty-five cents of which shall apply on Foreign Missions and twenty-five cents on Home Missions, and shall apply on budget (5%) and that all monies and vouchers be sent to the Conference Treasurer at least quarterly using combination Treasurer's blanks. These should be mailed by Sept. 5, Dec. 5, March 5, and June 5 (5%).

8. That we secure every woman in the church as a member of the society or achieve a ten percent gain in total membership.

9. That each local society pay annually an amount equal to twenty-five cents per active member to be used as a General Administrative Fund, not to apply on budget.

10. That the local Y.M.W.B. Superintendent be seated in the Annual Session and be granted the privilege of speaking and provision be made by her W.M.S. Society for such representation.

(Ten percent credit will be given for each of the above items, and all societies making a grade of eighty per cent shall be placed on the Honor Roll).

Y.M.W.B. EFFICIENCY STANDARD

1. Twelve Band Services in which prayer, God's Word and personal service were stressed. (10%)
 2. One public service during the year. (10%)
 3. Band funds remitted quarterly (to be sent by Sept. 5, Dec. 5, March 5, and June 5). (10%)
 4. The use of mite boxes, envelopes, membership cards, or some other systematic method for gathering in dues and offerings. (10%)
 5. The Superintendent of the Band be a reader of the WESLEYAN MISSIONARY. (10%)
 6. An increase in membership. (5%)
 7. An increase in funds raised. (5%) credit items.
 8. An offering for Home Missions. (10%)
 9. An offering for Education. (10%)
 10. One per cent per member sent to the Conference Y.M.W.B. Superintendent as desk fund. (10%)
 11. The annual report sent in by June 5th. (10%)
- Note: To be eligible to receive a banner a band must have an 80% rating.

RULES FOR ROOMERS

1. Write to Dormitory Matron for room reservations.
2. To hold a room from year to year one dollar deposit must be made with the matron. If the roomholder does not desire to use the room for any certain year, by notifying the matron two weeks before conference, the room may still be held the following year.
3. A room holder may not sublet a room.

PLAN OF WORK

For each Woman's Missionary Society we recommend:

1. The election of consecrated officers with a vision to carry on all phases of the missionary work.
2. Cooperation with the Foreign in support of its entire missionary program including "Penny a Meal."
3. The use of program calendars, world maps, pictures, and other helps.
4. The observance of a monthly Fast and Prayer Day; April to be designated as Self-Denial Month.

5. The entire October offering (or any other month if preferable) be sent to the Conference W. M. S. Treasurer for Pioneer Work within the Conference.
 6. The election of a Mission Study Secretary to promote the Mission Study and Reading Course, sending the annual report to the Conference Mission Study Secretary by the 15th of January.
 7. That, as far as possible, all monies be sent through the W. M. S. Conference Treasurer.
 8. The observance of Educational Harvest Day with the program and offering (budget) the promotion of Honorary Enrollment, and a contribution to Houghton Chapel Fund.
 9. Payment of 25c per member to constitute a W. M. S. Working Fund from which the Treasurer may pay necessary expenses. (non-budget)
 10. That \$5.00 be given for the Camp Building Fund; \$3.00 or more for the Medical Student Fund; Promotion of the mile of dimes to be used for Mission Field Equipment; Contributions to Brainerd Indian School; Jewish evangelism; and the Card-Call Plan (non-budget)
 11. A contribution of \$5.00 for the Hephzibah Orphanage; \$5.00 for Australia; and liberal contributions to the General Home Fund for the support of our Home Missions (budget).
 12. That stress be placed on personal evangelism with special emphasis on the Jew.
 13. The choosing from this suggested list of projects: New items will be credited according to cost; no cash credit for used items. Home: Boxes of clothing (see Missionary Magazine for list of stations desiring such); quilts for Camp and needy families; cancer dressings, clothing for child at Hephzibah, Canning Bee for Camp—LARGE jars of fruit, vegetables, jams, jellies, and pickles. Camp needs are: double bed size sheets (colored), single quilts 63", Army blankets, water glasses, sauce dishes, cereal bowls, cups, large bath towels and wash cloths, plastic waste baskets; money for dinner plates and serving trays. Foreign: Baby layettes—essential parts, receiving blankets, bright dresses or materials for Africa and Haiti, embroidery work, S. S. charts, cards, flannelgraph; World Relief (N. A. E.)

W. M. S. PRESIDENT'S REPORT

To fully realize that "He is God" and that "He will be exalted" enables one to fully trust Him and to be willing to be used or not be used as He sees fit. I rejoice today in the lessons of submission to His will that He has taught me during the past year. Verily "in Him" have I put my trust.

Many pastors and churches have expressed their appreciation for having had Miss Margaret Wright, R. N. in their churches this last fall. We have arranged for Rev. Harris Earl to visit each of you this fall. The dates are Sept. 2 — Oct. 6.

It was indeed a privilege for the delegates, Mrs. Reba Wright and Mrs. Velma Wilhelm and myself to attend the Area Missionary Convention held at West Chazy last July 23-25. We are sorry that our membership is down 27 from last year, but are very happy to report that our finances are up nearly \$700.
