# Standing Rules

- No. 1 Date of Conference: The Annual session of the Lockport Annual Conference, Inc., shall convene the Tuesday evening following the first Sunday of June on Houghton Campgrounds.
- No. 2 Board of Trustees Report for Final Action: Resolved, That all matters involving the expenditures of money to be appropriated from the Conference Treasurer, be referred to the Board of Trustees for their consideration and to be reported back by them to the Conference for final action.
- No. 3 General Conference Delegate: Resolved, That it is the sense of the Lockport Conference that no person should accept the position as delegate to the General Conference unless he expects to be present during the entire session. The President is required to communicate this resolution to the delegates three weeks before the General Conference begins.
- No. 4 Pastor's Moving Expenses: The church calling a pastor to serve them shall pay his moving expenses to the charge. The same not to apply on his salary.
- No. 5 Statistical Report: April 30th shall be considered the close of the Conference year for statistical purposes. The pastor shall send to the Conference Treasurer all monies and receipts with both copies of their report made out (except the Budget Item, which the Treasurer will fill in and sign) by May 8. The Conference Treasurer in turn shall pass the reports to the Auditor of Statistical reports by May 15. The Auditor shall correct the reports and shall pass one copy to the Statistician and one copy back to the pastor by May 22. He shall also send the Budget Chairman the membership of the churches, Sunday schools, and the W.Y. P.S. The Statistician and Auditor shall give pastors opportunity to explain apparent errors till the time that Conference convenes.
- No. 6 Temperance, Sabbath Observance, and Public Morals: Resolved, 1. That we are definitely committed to the prohibition of the liquor traffic rather than its regulation. We consider that the legalizing of the liquor traffic is sin. We urge our people to do all within their power to elect men to public office who will outlaw the liquor traffic. 2. That we hereby affirm our belief and conviction that the Christian Sabbath was appointed as a day of rest and worship and should be so observed with resolute consistency. 3. That we believe that the highest and nobest conception of public morals is to be achieved through the regeneration of individuals rather than through the collective reformation of society. 4. That for the successful maintenance of the positions above indicated we are fully committed to the support of every valid effort for the preservation

of our democratic rights of free speech, a free press, and free religion against all enroachments of dictatorial regimentation of thought and action whether in State or Church.

- No. 7 Pastor's Vacation: Each charge shall grant to its pastor each year a two week's vacation with pay at a time he shall elect.
- No. 8. Passage of Ministerial Character: Character blanks are to be filled out in duplicate, one to be returned to the ministers, and the other to be given to the Pastoral Relations Committee. The answers to the questions Nos. 17 and 18 of Paragraph No. 141 shall be obtained from the delegate by the Committee on Pastoral Relations. The pastor shall read Item 3 of his statistical report. The Statistician shall place his copy of the pastor's statistical report in a convenient place at conference where they may be examined by persons who are interested. When the pastor's name is called, he shall state that he has, or has not, passed in the examination of his character, and briefly state his religious experience, and report on his religious work. The delegate shall also be given the same opportunity.
- No. 9 Adjustment of Pastor's Salary: Resolved, That churches which enter into a financial agreement with the pastor shall when needful, make adjustment of this obligation at each quarterly meeting. A full settlement of the pastor's salary shall be made before the time of the Annual Conference. Any financial agreement on salary entered into by a Church and pastor shall not be of force after the end of the Conference year for which it is made, unless it is renewed by the contracting parties. The financial obligation of each church to its pastor shall be in force throughout the Conference and Camp Meeting period, the Conference period to include the Sunday within or immediately following the Conference session. He shall receive his salary the same as if he were on the charge conducing services. The third Sunday of June shall be the first Sunday of the new Conference year.
- . No. 10. Delegates' Credentials: It shall be the duty of the pastors to forward to the Conference Secretary not later than one week before the Annual Conference convenes the church (not missionary) delegates' credentials from his charge.
- No. 11. Budget Apportionment: The Budget Committee shall base their appointment of the budget for Foreign Missions, Home Missions, Education, and Hephzibah Orphanage on the rate per member recommended by the Board of Administration. The Sunday school budget shall be determined by the number of persons in the Main School, at the rate of ten cents a person for Denominational and three cents a person for Conference Sunday school work, the same to be listed as separate budget items. The Conference budget shall be the sum recommended by the Board of Trustees, the same to be disbursed upon their recommendation

and approval of Conference. The Conference Entertainment Budget shall be the amount recommended by the Board of Trustees, the same to be disbursed upon their recommendation and approval of Conference. The W.Y.P.S. budget shall be determined on the rate per active member of the W.Y.P.S. according to the Discipline; the Conference W.Y.P.S. Budget shall be determined on the rate set by the Conference W.Y.P.S. The Budget for the Conference President's salary shall be the amount recommended by the Board of Trustees, the same to be approved by the Conference.

- No. 12. Budget Credit: Nothing but cash shall count on the Sunday school, Conference, or Conference Entertainment budgets. Money paid on L. S. U. pledges, or interest paid on Educational Notes and all money paid for current expenses of Houghton College shall count on the Educational budget. Cash and receipts acceptable to the Missionary Boards shall count on Orphanage, Home and Foreign Missionary budgets.
- No. 13 Date for Taking Pastoral Vote: The pastoral vote shall be taken throughout the Conference the first Sunday following March 15.
- No. 14 Communion Service: The Conference Annual Communion Service will be observed on Tuesday evening following the preaching service, the communion table to be prepared by the stewards of the Houghton Church.
- No. 15 The Conference Missionary Board and Conference Board of Church Extension: 1. The annual Conference shall elect by ballot an Extension Secretary. This is to be a non-salaried office, receiving remunerations only for travel expenses and time spent away from regular duties in the interest of the church extension work.
- 2. The Annual Conference Missionary Board shall also serve as a Conference Board of Church Extension. Membership will include the President of the Conference, the President of the Conference Woman's Missionary Society, the Conference Extension Secretary, and the President of the W.Y.P.S., these four ex-officio and two lay members elected by the Annual Conference. Whenever the offices of Conference President and Conference Extension Secretary are filled by the same person the sixth member shall be an elder elected from the Conference floor.
  - 3. The duties of the Extension Secretary shall be:
    - A. To act as Chairman of the Conference Board of Church Extension, when this committee meets as such.
    - B. To have supervision, with the Conference Board of Church Extension, of the Conference Extension work.
    - C. To act also as Conference Secretary of Evangelism.
  - The duties of the Conference Board of Church Extension shall be:
     A. To survey the Lockport Conference territory to determine

the most suitable location for extension projects.

B. To give general counselling as to the development of pioneer work in co-operation with the Conference President.

To allocate such funds as are received for the proposed designated projects.

D. To publicize throughout the local churches the work of the department.

E. To render to the Annual Conference a detailed report of the work of the past year.

- 5. The treasurer of the Conference Board of Church Extension shall be elected by the Board from their number and be authorized to receive funds for this extension program, and that all funds be sent directly to the treasurer of the Conference Board of Church Extension.
- 6. That Pioneer Envelope plan shall be used as a means of raising funds for this program. All offerings and contributions received in extension service shall go into this fund.
- 7. All pioneer works and those organized works certified to the Board by the President and his Advisory Board shall be considered as eligible for assistance from the Conference Board of Church Extension. In general, it shall be policy not to give financial assistance to any work for a longer period than three years.
- No. 16 Fire and Extended Coverage Insurance on Owned Church Property: That it be required that each charge furnish the Chairman of the Board of Trustees (1) a copy of the deed of all church and parsonage properties, (2) a certificate of insurance on all church and parsonage properites and that this be brought up-to-date at each insurance renewal. Further, the Conference highly recommends that each charge obtain Fire and Extended Coverage Insurance on all owned church properties to cover at least 80% of the current appraisal value and it shall be the duty of each pastor to bring this recommendation before the local Board of Trustees.

# Report No. 4

#### REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT

Greetings in the name of our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ, "We then as workers together with Him" are gathered together in this ninety-third session to review the happenings of the past Conference year in the Lockport Annual Conference. We trust that our Father in Heaven looks approvingly upon our ministry even as the Apostle Paul wrote in II Cor. 6:4, 7: "But in all things approving ourselves as the ministers of God by

the armor of righteousness on the right hand and on the left." We trust, by God's grace, that we have been "workmen that needeth not to be ashamed."

It is our happy privilege to report that we have been kept busy in the service of the King. We have preached one hundred forty times, all but four of these having been in the interest of the Conference. In the realm of church business meetings we have conducted thirty-six sessions. Committee meetings for the local churches, W.Y.P.S., Houghton Camp, and the local release time program have managed to occupy uncounted hours. Evangelistic efforts in the presenting of the Word were carried out by your President in Cattaraugus, Ashwood, and Cuba. Some fruit was born of these efforts for which we praise Him. The record shows a loss of five with the present membership standing at 1109. Not one of us has a right to be satisfied. Even the few churches showing a gain have not yet realized all that God purposes to do for us. Let us humbly ask Him for clean-cut converts who will unite with our church in the coming year. He is "able to do it."

Officially we have represented our Conference at the Area Leader's Meeting held in Syracuse February 9-11 when we were accompanied by the Rev. R. Burnett Thompson; also, at two meetings of the Houghton College Development Committee and one meeting of the Local Board of Managers of our college. Unofficially we fellowshipped six of the Conference pastors at the NAE Convention April 27-30 in Cleveland, Ohio. This was a time of real rejoicing as we heard glorious reports of God's workings in England's revival.

In the field of instruction it was our privilege to teach for three weeks in the Houghton College summer school, August 3-21. For two weeks in the month of March we taught classes in the Disciplinary Course of Study here at the college. These have been intensive, though pleasant diversions from the regular routine.

March 16 was an outstanding date in our Conference year when United Fellowship Day was the joyous occasion of more than one hundred ministers and wives of the Genesee Conference of the Free Methodist Church and the Lockport Conference joining in warm fellowship here in Houghton. God gave us a glorious day in every way.

In the realm of legal acts there have been several important transactions this past year. Early in the month of July action was started to secure a Conference parsonage. Through negotiations with Dr. and Mrs. I. F. McLeister the former Slade property was purchased at a price of \$6,500. Further details are given in the report. In the month of September the deed of the Blossom property to the Conference was received after a two-year period of patient waiting. Negotiations have begun but are now pending for the transfer of the church at North Pembroke to the Lockport Annual Conference. A minor transfer of property on the south side of the Ransomville church to a private owner has been com-

pleted. The authorization for correction of the Conference corporate title has been duly carried out. The past six months have seen an "all-out" effort to secure a three-lot parcel of land in Cheektowaga, a progressive Buffalo suburb. This effort has been completed on the basis of faith and expectation that God will give us a church in this location. We are believing God.

Some interesting developments have been observed in the area of church construction and improvement. The addition at Hess Road was enclosed before winter and now rapid progress is being made toward completing the project. The new church at McRae Brook has been started but construction difficulties have presently delayed the work. By Fall we trust to worship the Lord in this new building. Progress in the Machias project has been somewhat slow, but we foresee the completion of this excellent piece of work this year. Ellicott has completed the interior decoration of their new basement unit; Silver Creek has bricked their church: Rich Valley has a new look inside of their worship chapel with a new tile floor and other improvements. Ashwood is now realizing the completion of their basement project started several years ago. East Leon is in the process of completing their Sunday school rooms; Higgins is working on a basement project with excellent Sunday school rooms in view: Oakland installed a new gas furnace in the parsonage and redecorated the chapel outside and in; Cuba is eagerly seeking to complete the auditorium of their new church. In prospect we see the enlargement of the Lockport church and renovation of the church at Leon. Along with these many improvements the Conference parsonage has seen much of improvement through the investment of labor and funds on the part of the Conference. We praise the Lord for the progressive determination to see our church properties improved.

In the realm of general statistics we make a few observations: Eighty-eight pastor's quarterly reports are on file and nineteen monthly pioneer reports. This represents 75% participation in these reports. These reports and the statistician's work reveal some facts of interest. The pastor's reporting revealed an average of two-hundred ninety-seven calls aside from general contacts. Sunday school enrollment shows an increase of eighty-nine along with an increase of thirty in the average attendance. Church properties reveal an increase in value of \$32,000. Totals for pastors reveal an increase of almost \$9,000. Totals for all purposes increased by \$13,250. If you will examine the statistics closely some losses are revealed if accurate accountings were made, but the trend is upward.

Church extension has been a very real burden on my heart during the course of this past year. Our efforts have principally been expended in North Pembroke and Cheektowaga. Services are in progress in both locations. It is our purpose to station pastors in both communities and as a Conference to make an "all-out" effort to back the program of church extension with heart interest, believing prayer and sacrificial financial sup-

port. We cannot retreat and survive.

In closing may we say that this has been a year of problems in many respects. Sickness in the home, sickness in the Conference, changes in Conference personnel and intensive efforts toward improving the Conference parsonage have pressed us at times unduly, but we report that God has been sufficient and our soul is rejoicing in Christ and the fullness of His Spirit. To God be praise.

#### Official Acts and Appointments

June 13, 1953—Accepted the resignation of Martha Woolsey as Child Evangelism Secretary and referred the vacancy to the Sunday School Board, my Advisory Board concurring.

July 1, 1953—Appointed Clarence Barnett as pastor at Kossuth or Bolivar Mission, my Advisory Board concurring.

July 3, 1953—Received the resignation of George Failing as Conference Extension Secretary and referred it to the Committee on Vacancies.

July 8, 1953—Received the transfer of Conference Preacher, Wilbur E. Beers from the Allegheny Conference to the Lockport Conference. His name was referred to the Committee on Itineracy and Orders to pursue the course of study.

August 7, 1953—Granted letter of standing to George Failing inasmuch as he had accepted the pastorate of the Marion College.

August 11, 1953—Granted a letter of standing to Beverly J. Barnett.

August 15, 1953—As chairman of the trustees I signed the bond and mortgage for the purchase of the Conference parsonage in Houghton. The mortgage is \$5,500 at 5%. One thousand dollars was paid down on the property and \$500 was spent on improvements.

August 15, 1953—Recognized the elections of the Committee on Vacancies. R. Burnett Thompson was elected as Conference Extension Secretary and Everett E. E:liott was elected as a member of the Committee on Itineracy and Orders to fill out this year.

August 26, 1953—Received Gene DeGraff of the Blossom church to pursue the course of study under the direction of the conference committee.

September 17, 1953—Signed a note for a further loan of \$800 by the Bank of Blasdell at 5% interest to the Big Tree church—the Board of Trustees concurring.

September 29, 1953—Accepted the resignations of Herman and Helen Smith as pastors of the East Leon church, my Advisory Board and the local church consenting.

September 29, 1953—Accepted the resignation of Herman A. Smith as Sunday School Secretary, member of the Committee of Itineracy and Orders, and member of the Judiciary Committee.

September 30, 1953—Appointed Frank H. Wright as the supply pastor at Olean, my Advisory Board concurring.

September, 1953-Received North Pembroke as a pioneer work. The

Rev. S. W. Wright supplied this work for the most part until April 1, 1954. Since that time Henry Cornell of the Batavia church has supplied the work.

October 2, 1953—Recognized the elections of the Committee on Vacancies. Paul F. Markell was elected as Sunday School Secretary ond Roy M. Gibbs was elected as a member of the Committee on Itineracy and Orders to fill out the year.

October 29, 1953—Granted authorization to Wilbur Beers upon his passing the test in the Discipline.

November 16, 1953—A written request was received from nine persons of the Big Tree work to be organized as a self-supporting Wesleyan Methodist Church. My Advisory Board agreed to their request.

November 16, 1953—Upon written request from H. Erwin Enty permission was granted for him to teach in a Pilgrim Holiness Bible College this year.

November 21, 1953—Organized the Big Tree Wesleyan Methodist Church with nine members in full.

January 15, 1954—Granted request of Howard McKenzie to permit him to supply the Centerville Methodist Church.

January 26, 1954—Signed a purchase contract to secure a three-lot parcel of land in Cheektowaga on Cleveland Drive as authorized by the Board of Trustees. One thousand dollars was paid upon signing the contract. The total purchase price as \$6,800.00.

January 27, 1954—Granted a certificate of authorization to Howard Parks who was called by the East Leon church to serve as their pastor late in the month of November, 1953. An agreement was reached that was mutually agreeable to the pastor, my Advisory Board and the local church, previous to his appointment.

February 1, 1954—Appointed Dr. Willard Smith, Ernest Nichols, Robert Fiegl, James Hurd, and Carl Aylor as a committee to study the specifications and plans for a portable chapel for the Cheektowaga project.

February 19, 1954—Granted letters of transfer to the Canada Conference for Herman and Helen Smith.

February 19, 1954—Approved the appointment of Elisabeth Eyler as Director of Child Evangelism for the remaining part of the year.

March 15-April 15, 1954—Negotiated loans totaling \$6500 at a maximum of 5% interest to cover the purchase of the Cheektowaga property. An additional \$500 was given by one layman of the Conference toward this same project.

April 23, 1954—Comp'eted the transfer of a piece of land from the Ransomville church property to Charles Denny. This parcel had a street frontage of 40 feet on the south side of the church. The sale price as \$500.

May 3, 1954—Paid the balance of \$5800 and the necessary tax adjustment and received the deed to the Cheektowaga lots.

May 20, 1954—Appointed Daniel Heinz, Roy M. Gibbs, and Geneva M. Pritchard to the Committee on Temporary Organization.

May 27, 1954—Approved the officers elected by the W.Y.P.S. for the coming year, my Advisory Board concurring.

June 2, 1954—Received the transfer of Conference Preacher Carl Schultz from the Allegheny Conference.

June 4, 1954—Appointed LeRoy Fancher, Clarence Pritchard, and Won Crandall as lay members of the Committee on Itineracy and Orders.

June 7, 1954—Granted a letter of transfer to the Dakota Conference for Richard Sprowl.

## REPORT OF CONFERENCE MISSSIONARY BOARD AND BOARD OF CHURCH EXTENSION

The work of church extension has progressed this year by the grace of God. Changes in personnel during the year have hindered the effectiveness of the Conference Missionary Board and Board of Church Extension, but some definite gains are evident. After the resignation of Brother George Failing, who was elected Extension Secretary at the last Conference session, most of the work fell on the shoulders of the Conference President. Through his efforts and the co-operation of others of the brethren in survey work, we are able to report a good year.

Wellsville has received \$25.00 a week toward the salary of its pastor. The diligent labors of Brother and Sister Klatt have born fruit. The beginning of this Conference year sees a need of only about half this amount. Our investment in this difficult field has already shown a profit, as Wellsville was awarded the first "Sunday School of the Year" award.

The work at Big Tree has been entirely self-supporting this year, having been organized in November with nine charter members. Brother Clair Day and his family have worked faithfully to care for the Lord's vineyard in this needy community.

Brother Clarence Barnett has devoted his week-ends to the work in Bolivar. The Conference Missionary Board and Board of Church Extension has paid \$10.00 a week toward his expenses. Tent meetings are scheduled for late June, and further action by the pioneer board is pending the results of these meetings.

The survey of Cheektowaga which was begun last year has been resumed, and a group of interested people have been meeting with the Extension Secretary for a weekly prayer meeting since last Report of Conference Missionary Board and Board of Church Extension Fall. The Prospects for this thickly populated community are bright indeed.

In North Pembroke, a small community near Batavia, a group of believers have expressed their desire to be organized into a Wesleyan Methodist Church as soon as circumstances are favorable. Begun under the direction of Robert Ingraham, this work was supplied for a time by the Rev. Stanley Wright. Since early April, Henry Cornell has been holding services and is well received by the people.

The prospects for the future are bright, but they call for sacrifice on the part of all not just those who are considered pioneer pastors. We believe that there are bright days ahead if we are willing to work and give to this great cause.

The Woman's Missionary Society brings the following report to the Annual Conference: We are happy to report that two new societies were organized this year—Lockport with 10 members and Oakland with 8. We are hoping for at least one more this year.

We are praising the Lord that our statistical report shows an increase in membership and magazines with a gain of \$2,230.22 in finances. The following are our totals for the year. Six hundred twenty-one active members (gain of 89), 130 honorary members (loss of 5), Wesleyan Missionarys taken, 534 (gain of 12). Total receipts of \$18,800.92. The disbursements: Home, \$1313.92; Foreign, \$7356.18; Medical student, \$79.00; Hephzibah, \$223.85; Education, \$605.64; Local church work, \$705.23; Membership dues, \$367.50; other objects, \$7,950.96; Administrative fund, \$153.00; Australia, \$109.50; Total Disbursements, \$18888.75; new balance \$197.71; Grand total of \$19086.46.

Our Home Missionaries were again remembered at Christmas time with the White Gift plan. Only one district convention was held but we solicit your help for a convention in each district this year.

We are grateful to all who helped us in supporting Louise Lytle and June Wolfe. Keep it up!

#### Report No. 14

#### REPORT OF THE SUNDAY SCHOOL SECRETARY

There are evidences of increasing Sunday School enthusiasm in our Conference. We praise the Lord for this. It is our conviction that the Sunday school is the greatest evangelistic arm of the church. Amid the enthusiasm for greater numbers we are encouraged to note that there seems to be a greater concern to win our scholars to Jesus Christ.

I was appointed on October 2 as Sunday School Secretary to fill the vacancy left by Brother Herman Smith. Acting in that capacity we were privileged to represent the Conference at the National Sunday School Convention at Minneapolis. The great emphasis at that convention was Sunday school evangelism. We came back determined to emphasize the need for winning the lost through the avenue of the Sunday school. We are happy to report that Mary E. Bennett, Richard E. Weber, George F. Kilpatrick and Dale Gainder were also able to attend the convention.

On October 29 the second Annual Conference Sunday School Convention was held at Houghton. Miss Bennett, Promotional Secretary of the Sunday School Department of the Denomination, urged that our Sunday schools should not emphasize large numbers above the salvation of the individual pupils. She challenged us by reminding us of the little boy giving his all to Christ, five loaves and two fishes, to feed a hungry multitude. She reminded us that we as Sunday school workers are to give our all to meet the need of the hungry multitudes.

Perhaps the most outstanding event this year was the Sunday school hour at Conference on Wednesday, June 9. Nearly five hundred enthusiastic Sunday school-minded people turned out to enjoy the demonstrations that were given by eight participating Sunday schools. We wish to express our appreciation to all the pastors and superintendents and scholars who worked so hard to make this service a success.

This year for the first time, the most outstanding Sunday school of the year was chosen and a beautiful walnut plaque was presented to the pastor. Wellsville has the honor of being the first school to receive the award. The judging was on the basis of the largest percentage increase in attendance, number of scholars converted as well as participation and attendance at the Sunday school program. Next year the outstanding school will be chosen on the basis of the following, by action of the Sunday School Board:

- 1. Increase in average attendance
- 2. Number of scholars converted
- 3. Participation in the Adult Evangelism Crusade
- 4. Attendance at the Conference Sunday School Convention
- 5. Teacher Training

#### Report No. 17

#### REPORT OF BOARD OF TRUSTEES

The Board of Trustees of the Lockport Annual Conference meeting in regular session at Houghton, N. Y., June 8, 1954 at 3:30 p.m. respectfully present to the Conference now in session the following recommendations:

- 1. That the President of the Conference and the Committee on Entertainment pay the workers in the kitchen in accordance with the usual custom as they shall see fit, and all financial accounts incident to the present session of Annual Conference.
- 2. The payment to the Annual Conference Secretary and to the Annual Conference Treasurer the sum of \$75.00 each, plus office expenses for the year ending June, 1955.
- 3. That the budget for Conference Work be at the rate of \$2.25 per member.
- 4. That the budget for Conference entertainment be at the rate of 50 cents per member.
- 5. That the Secretary canvass various Conferences to compare the salaries paid other Conference Presidents with the amount paid to our President. Also, how much salaries are raised.
- 6. That the Budget for the Conference President's salary be at the rate of \$60.00 per week with 7 cents per mile for traveling expenses, plus house rent, telephone and office expenses, and that an offering be taken to apply on this budget at each of the President's quarterly visits to the charges.
- 7. That the repairs and improvements made this year on the Conference President's parsonage amounting to approximately \$100.00 be paid out of the Conference Work budget.
- 8. That Dr. Stephen W. Paine and Dr. Robert R. Luckey together with the Conference President, be a committee with authority to approve expenditures up to \$100.00 during the coming Conference year, for repairs and maintenance on the Conference President's parsonage.
- 9. That the financial transactions in connection with the Conference parsonage be channeled through the Conference Work fund. Also, that two payments be made on the Conference parsonage as follows: (1) In August 1954, a payment on the principal of \$900.00 and interest. (2) In February 1955, a payment on the principal of not less than \$100.00, and interest.
- 10. That the Ransomville church be dropped from the budget apportionment for this year.
- 11. That we authorize the President to rent the Ransomville parsonage subject to sale. That the funds of said rental be cleared to the Treasurer of the Board of Trustees, when the officers of the local church cease to exist.
  - 12. That we authorize the President of the Conference to receive bids

for the sale of the Ransomville church and parsonage.

- 13. That the Executive Committee be authorized to review and approve plans and financing for a proposed additional building to be joined to the back of the Bradford church, and, that they report their decision back to this Board.
- 14. That we approve the tentative building plans of the Lockport church.
- 15. That we authorize the Cuba church to borrow up to \$6000.00 on a mortgage with interest not to exceed 5% for the completion of the church building, and that we authorize the officers of the Board of Trustees to sign all necessary papers to complete the transaction.
- 16. That we authorize the Blossom church to go ahead with construction of a parsonage similar to the Bel Air model house of the Buffalo House Wrecking Company, at a cost not to exceed \$10,000.00; the final plans and location to be reviewed by the President and his Advisory Board.
- 17. That the Blossom church be authorized to borrow an amount not to exceed \$8,500.00 on a mortgage, at a rate of interest not to exceed 5%, and that the officers of the Board of Trustees sign all necessary papers.
- 18. That we authorize the building of a portable chapel at a cost not to exceed \$7,000.00 when the funds are available.
- 19. That the Rally Day offering be for a portable chapel for church extension work.
- 20. That the deficit of \$18.00 on the Conference Itinerator be paid out of the Conference Work budget.
- 21. That we continue the Itinerator on the subscription basis and authorize any deficit to be paid out of the Conference Work budget with the limitation that no quarterly issue cost more than \$60.00.
- 22. That we authorize \$15.00 for the office expenses of the Secretary of the Committee on Itineracy and Orders.
- 23. That the Rev. and Mrs. A. A. Hickok be paid the sum of \$10.00 for the management of Dow Hall during this session of Annual Conference.
- 24. That the Conference Secretary be authorized to distribute suitable stationery as shall be approved by the Executive Committee of the Board of Trustees. Also, five hundred (500) copies of the Minutes of this session of Conference to be distributed to the several charges.
- 25. That the Rev. Everett E. Elliott be Chairman of the Board of Trustees; that the Rev. George N. Osgood be Secretary; that Rudolph C. Nelson be Treasurer; that the Executive Committee be composed of the officers of the Board.
- 26. That the Secretary of the Board of Trustees be authorized to use the Conference seal on all legal papers.

Item I: Regarding Conference Preachers. Page 98, Par. 3 After the words "where the laws of the state permit," insert "and he is entitled to a vote in the Annual Conference. A lay delegate shall be elected from the church of which he is a member," striking out the balance of the paragraph.

Item II: Regarding W.M.S. officers. Page 163, Par. 301, Article 6 (1) After the words "who shall be a member of the Wesleyan Methodist Church" insert "except in the case of a pioneer work or mission not yet organized as a Wesleyan Methodist Church."

Item III: Regarding W.Y.P.S. officers. Page 252, Par. 398, Article IV, (1) After the words "shall be members of the Wesleyan Methodist Church," insert "providing that a society on a pioneer work or mission not yet organized as a Wesleyan Methodist Church may waive these requirements except for adult counsellor."

# Standing Rules

- 1. That the Committee on Temporary Organization consists of the President, Vice President and Secretary of the Conference Society. They shall also include a Committee on Standing Rules.
- 2. That the election of the Society officials be held on Thursday afternoon.
- 3. That all missionary money from the local society shall be remitted quarterly to the Conference Treasurer, through the local treasurer. The quarters are designated as closing: July 1; Oct. 1; Jan. 1; April 1.
- 4. That all Y.M.W.B. money shall be sent to Mrs. Aileen Shea, Houghton, New York, through the Conference Y.M.W.B. Superintendent, by the local Superintendents. One cent per member shall be sent to the Conference Superintendent as Desk Fund.
- 5. Local Societies shall observe White Gift Christmas to Home Missionaries.
- 6. That it shall be the duty of the incoming local President to attend Conference. The name of the new President and the Delegate's credentials shall be sent to the Conference Secretary at least one week prior to Conference.
- 7. That each local Society Treasurer's books shall be closed April 1st and all money and receipts be sent to the Conference Treasurer. One Local Statistical Report blank shall be filled out, balanced, and immediately sent to the checking committee, to be appointed by the President. The other blank is kept, to be read by the delegate, at the Annual Conference and at the first meeting of the society following Conference. The checking committee shall audit the reports before submitting them to the statistician.
- 8. Each local Y.M.W.B. shall close their year by April 1st. and shall send all money raised to the Conference Superintendent.
- 9. The Friday before Conference shall be observed as a day of fasting and prayer.
- 10. That all money raised by the Societies shall be used for missionary work, and no money shall be paid out without the vote of the local society.
- 11. That one-half of the membership dues, both active and honorary, shall be used for Home or Foreign Missions, as voted by the Society. The other half shall be sent as membership dues to the Conference Treasurer. There shall also be sent twenty-five cents per active member for General Administrative Fund.
- 12. That all benevolent receipts must be sent to the Conference Treasurer, if they are to be included in the annual report. (Benevolence include all receipts for new clothing, offerings for individuals and projects, for whom appeals have been made through the Society. Also all receipts for radio work, floral funds, postage, freight, gift subscriptions, foreign work, materials, white gift receipts, etc.)

- 13. That the membership of the Conference Society voting body shall consist of: lady pastors, pastor's wives, Y.M.W.B. Superintendents, and Missionaries as well as the Conference officers, Presidents and Delegates from each local society.
- 14. All delegates' reports shall be preceded by their testimony. In reading the report they shall only read: The name of Society, number of members, Magazines taken, Efficiency Standard, total receipts, and all of the disbursements. They shall also speak of items of interest.
  - 15. Memorials should include dues paid in memory of someone.

- 1. That we continue the present Prayer Partner Plan; that we write to our prayer partners on the field; and that the local societies continue the practice of praying by name for our Missionaries and native workers on the field.
- 2. That each local society follow the reading course as outlined by the Mission Study Secretary and use the program calendars.
- 3. That we continue the support of Mrs. Louise Lytle in South America and of Mrs. June Wolfe in Japan.
- 4. That each local society promote the Penny-a-Meal Plan and that funds thus collected be turned in on the general fund for Foreign Missions.
- 5. That one meeting be given to the study of the spiritual need of the Jews and praying especially for them.
- 6. That each society contribute \$3.00 annually and as much more as possible to the Medical Fund.
- 7. That we continue the support of Home Missions in its various needs by cash contributions and personal gifts for the Missionaries, and that each society communicate with the various Home Mission Stations regarding their needs before sending out boxes.
- 8. That we observe World Day of Prayer in February, Self-Denial in April, and Educational Day in October, and White Gift Christmas for Home Missionaries.
- 9. That the President of each society be responsible for having the Efficiency Standard, Plan of Work, and Standing Rules distributed to the officers of each society and that these be read at least once each year.
- 10. That each society contribute \$8.00 or more for the support of Hephzibah Orphanage and at least \$10.00 for Home Missions.
- 11. That each society respond to the Card Call Plan, and that a Card Call Secretary be chosen whose duty shall be to promote this work and collect receipts from individual contributors, card call contributions not to be counted toward Home Missions budget.
- 12. That we earnestly strive to increase our membership at least 10% during the year.
- 13. That each society appoint a Temperance Secretary to bring in Temperance information and prayer items.
- 14. That we as a Society, in case of the death of a member or other person in the community, encourage setting aside of collecting money for some missionary project, rather than buying flowers and that a memorial card be sent to the family.
  - 15. That each society provide a quantity of canned fruit or vegetables

of one variety for use in the Dining Hall during Camp Meeting.

16. That special prayer be made for Dr. Nicholson as he coninues his tour of world mission fields. That we also pray earnestly that God's will be acomplished in our coming General Conference next year.
