W. Dunbar, brought the Conference Sermon—from the text "I shall be anointed with fresh oil" Ps. 92: 10. Our problems and needs are as varied as our many fields of labor, yet there is, one answer to every need and problem, be anointed with fresh oil. PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Through the mercy of God and His divine providence we are permitted to gather for this eighty-third annual session of the Kansas Conference. We appreciate the faithful devotion of the pastors and laymen that has been manifested through the year. We are thankful for the small gains that have been registered during the past years. We trust the blessing has so rested upon the labors of this year that when the reports are compiled greater gains will be recorded.

We thank God for the three new churches organized during the year. Those organized were: Gas, Kansas; West Kansas City, Kansas; and Englewood, Colorado. They are not large organizations but we do believe there is good prospect for growth and development. A parsonage was purchased at Gas for a very reasonable sum. A new parsonage was built at Englewood, Colorado and is being used for both a chapel and parsonage. Lots have been purchased in West Kansas City and they have begun construction of a new parsonage. Items on other fields will be mentioned by the pastors.

The increased interest and co-operation in the church extension program has been most gratifying. A total of \$5220.58 has been paid into the Church Extension Loan Fund this year. Special gifts sent through the Missionary Board Treasurer for the new fields total \$1898.57. This is all above budget. Besides this, quite an amount was sent directly to the new fields. The Denver Church and pastor deserve special recognition for contributing several hundred dollars to the Englewood building program. An annuity Contract was also signed for \$10,000 for the Church Extension Fund.

I feel special mention should be made of the three churches that burned their mortgage this year. God enabled Belleville, Salina and Topeka (First) churches to complete payments on their buildings. Let us thank God for the leadership of the pastors and the generosity of the people.

For the blessings of the Lord which has been upon us through this another year of tension and satanic pressure we are indeed grateful. Facing this world torn with strife, weary of confusion, sick of bloodshed and groping in darkness, we have a challenge that can not be met except by an endowment of divine power. Thank God there is a source of power adequate and available. Let us pay the price for a mighty out-pouring of the Holy Spirit.

Resolutions

The following resolutions which pertain to the local churches shall be **READ** by the pastors to their people within six weeks after the receipt of the Conference Minutes and at least four weeks before the Annual Conference.

1. **Fiscal Year.** Resolved, that the closing date of the fiscal year be two weeks before the opening of the Annual Conference-Camp Period, and we request that all statistical reports be in the hands of the Conference Treasurer at least one week before the Conference-Camp Period. He shall forward the blanks to the Statistical Chairman who shall be able to report at an early session of Conference. (The fiscal year for 1953-54 shall close July 29, 1954).

2. **Conference and Camp Date.** Resolved, that the Conference begin annually at 1:30 p. m. on the first Tuesday in August for the organizing of Conference business and committee work, and continue daily until completed, and that Camp begin on Friday night of the same week and continue through the two following Sundays.

3. **Order of Business.** Inasmuch as it is the desire of the Conference to complete its business as soon as possible it is recommended that the following procedure of business be followed:

First, the first ten rows of the middle sections and the platform of the tabernacle constitute the Conference bar.

Second, all recommendations to travel or study be turned directly to the assistant secretary, who shall turn them to the Committee on Itinerary and Orders.

Third, Minister's reports shall be given immediately after Officer's reports are given and continue whenever other business will permit.

Fourth, the following order of business shall be followed in each session:

- a. Roll call
- b. Minutes
- c. Communications
- d. Special Committees
- e. Standing Committees
- f. Sessional Committees
- g. Unfinished business
- h. New business
- i. Minister's reports

Fifth, business shall continue from 8:30 a. m. to 12 noon and from 1:30 to 4:30 p. m. each day with no adjournment for committee work, unless deemed very necessary. It is understood that important committees may meet during sessions if necessary.

4. Nominating Committees. Resolved, that we elect a committee of five elders, including the President ex-officio, and three delegates-elect, from three churches designated by the Conference to:

First, examine the credentials that are in the hands of the committee at the time of its first meeting.

Second, nominate all sessional committees and be prepared to report at the first session of the Conference.

Third, examine all delegates' credentials, whether regular or alternate, which are turned in to the committee after the first seating of delegates, and to report such to the Secretary who shall read the names added to the roll at the next session at which they are automatically seated, if no objections are raised.

Fourth, nominate the personnel of all the Conference Boards and report at an early session of the Conference.

Fifth, nominate the Committee Chairman for next year, including the chairman of the Ministerial Association.

Sixth, nominate the District chairmen.

Seventh, nominate the Board of Managers of Wesleyan Hope Mission

5. Election of Conference Officers. Resolved, that the election of Conference Officers be held the second day of Conference at 8:30 a. m.

6. President's Duties. Resolved, that the Conference president shall first travel the conference, visiting each church at least twice during the year; the first series of visits to be two services per church, and the last series, one service per church. The time of the president's visits shall be established by a committee on "President's Schedule," who shall plan one month of visitation to be followed by two weeks at home for office work, administrative duties, etc. This plan or rotating field and office work is to be followed throughout the year, with cognizance taken of conventions, holidays, etc.; second, be it further resolved that the president shall secure quarterly reports of the pastors, using the findings of the same for the purpose of promoting the spiritual and material welfare of the churches; third, urge the proper repair and insurance of church property; fourth, the president may upon his own initiative or upon the request of the Board of Stewards or the Pastor of a local church call a meeting to help arrange a workable financial plan for the church; fifth, raise funds for the Church Extension Program.

7. Auditing of Financial Reports. Resolved, that all financial reports, together with the books that are to be audited by the Conference Auditing Committee be submitted to said Committee before being read on the Conference floor.

8. Introduction of New Business. Resolved, that all introduction of new business of such a nature as to require an election must be presented not later than noon of the third day of Conference.

9. Orders of the Day. Resolved, that the Camp Meeting and Camp-

ground Committees be permanently the Committee on Orders of the Day, to prepare ahead of time the Conference Program for publication in the "Visitor."

Be it further resolved, that the following services be fixed as permanent orders of the day:

Tuesday evening, Conference sermon at 7:30 by the Conference President.

Wednesday evening, Address by the Denominational representative.

Thursday evening, Public service of the W.M.S. at 7:30.

Tuesday evening of Camp Meeting week, Educational service at 6:30.

10. **Camp Meeting Committee.** Resolved, that the President of the W.Y.P.S. be a member ex-officio of the Camp Meeting Committee.

11. **Evangelistic Help.** Resolved, that the Campground and Camp Meeting Committee be authorized to engage evangelistic help for the Camp Meeting as far in advance as deemed advisable.

12. **Additional Delegate.** Resolved, that when more than one delegate from any one church presents credentials to this body, there shall appear in the credentials the name of the elder that entitles the church to the additional delegate.

13. **Superannuate Service.** Resolved, that one public service in each Annual Camp Meeting or Conference period be set aside in honor of the Superannuate Fund and that it be the duty of the Superannuate Board to arrange for such service.

14. **Tenure of Office.** Resolved, that all Conference Officers continue in office until the close of the annual session of the Conference.

15. **Board of Managers of Hope Mission.** Resolved, that the conference shall elect a Board of Managers for the Wesleyan Hope Mission in Kansas City, Mo., consisting of five elders and two laymen, including the Conference President, who shall be chairman ex-officio.

This Board shall have authority to engage workers for the operation of the Mission and shall agree on salaries and define the duties of the workers.

16. **Pastors Paid Through Conference.** Resolved, that the Church's financial obligation to the pastor whether he be leaving the field or not, be extended through the Conference and Camp Meeting Period.

17. **Pastor's Moving Expense.** Resolved, that the church hiring a minister shall within ten days after his arrival pay to him his moving expenses, this not to be applied on his salary.

18. **Pastor's Expense at Annual Conference.** Resolved, that inasmuch as the pastor is actually a representative of the local church at the Annual Camp and Conference, that the local churches pay the expense of the Pastor and his Wife, including room, board and transportation, the same to be paid in advance.

19. **Pastors Released for Meeting.** Resolved, that we earnestly request each of our churches to release their pastor for one meeting of three weeks' length to be held on a new field or on one of the weaker charges under the direction of the Missionary Board, and that the church pay his salary during his absence.

20. **Pastor Nominates Steward.** Resolved, that it be the sense of this Conference that the pastor be granted the privilege of nominating one member of the Board of Stewards from each church on his charge.

21. **Reporting of all Contributions.** Resolved, that the Conference President and each pastor urge the people to make all contributions through their local church and society treasuries, in view of more equitable distribution of funds.

22. **Vacations.** Resolved, that the Conference President be granted a vacation over two Sundays, that the greater part of three weeks might be taken if desired, and that he be given two weeks' pay in addition to his regular salary at the time he chooses for his vacation.

Resolved, that we recommend that each charge grant their pastor a one Sunday leave of absence from his work, that the greater part of two weeks might be spent for vacation and that the church give him one week's pay in addition to his regular salary at the time agreed upon by pastor and church for vacation.

23. **Money to Treasurer.** Resolved, that the treasurers be urged to send all remittances to the Conference Treasurer in whole dollars when possible. That the local treasurers' send budget money each quarter to the Conference Treasurer.

24. **Calling List.** Whereas, most of the friends and members of our local churches are won through the personal contact of the pastors; and whereas many of these friends and prospective members are lost in the changing from one pastor to another because the incoming pastor does not know of these people nor their interest in the church;

Be it resolved, that the Conference ask each pastor to prepare a calling list of all the homes connected with the church and Sunday school, listing the relationship they hold to the church, listing their names and addresses by city, street and number; the same to be kept for his own work while on the pastorate and to be given to his successor on the field.

25. **Church Delegate Expense.** Resolved, that the local church pay the Annual Conference church Delegate's room, board and transportation expenses, the same to be paid in advance.

26. **Hope Mission Support.** Resolved, that the churches be urged to take offerings once a month for Wesleyan Hope Mission, and that the Superintendent be permitted to visit the charges of the Conference in the interest of the mission.

27. **Church Extension.** Resolved, that the first Sunday school offering

of each month and all Sunday school birthday offerings be given to the Missionary Board for Church Extension and to help the weaker churches not yet self supporting; and that the pastor and superintendent help stimulate the giving in these offerings. That these monies are to be loaned under the supervision of the Missionary Board without interest.

28. **Conference Visitor.** Resolved, that each Sunday school of the Conference pay \$2.00 to supplement the subscription income of the "Visitor," the same to be sent to the Editor.

29. **Conveying Property.** Resolved, that all instruments conveying property for church or parsonage use, carry the official name of the church viz., "The Kansas Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America, Inc."

30. **Trustees Authorized.** Resolved, that all action taken heretofore by the Trustees of the Annual Conference in the interim between the meeting of such Annual Conferences concerning the purchase or conveyance of real estate are hereby approved and confirmed and held to be as binding upon the Annual Conference as they would have been if such action had been specifically authorized by the Annual Conference.

Resolved, that the duly elected and qualified Trustees of the Annual Conference are hereby authorized and directed to take such necessary action as to them seem proper and expedient and to the best interest of the Annual Conference and the local churches concerning the purchase, sale, mortgaging and conveying of real estate during the interim between the meeting of the Annual Conference and all such actions so taken by the Trustees shall be deemed to be legal and binding upon the Annual Conference and as full force as they would have been if such actions on the part of the Trustees had been specifically authorized by the Annual Conference.

31. **Board of Building and Location.** Resolved, that the Board on Church and Parsonage Building and Location consist of the Missionary Board and the Conference Trustees.

32. **Conference Loans.** Resolved, that the Conference Treasurer shall issue no loans from any Conference monies except by sanction of the Conference Trustees.

33. **Subscription Lists.** Resolved, that all subscription lists and monies raised at Conference for all purposes be put through the hands of the Treasurers of the Conference, the W.M.S. or the Camp Meeting Committee, and that said Treasurers furnish the Conference President with the copy of the subscription lists which they hold that he may furnish each pastor with a list of subscriptions from his charge.

34. **Unleavened Bread.** Resolved, that it shall be the sense of the Conference that all our churches use unleavened bread in the administration of the Lord's Supper. We suggest the following recipe: One-half cup of

flour, one rounded tablespoon butter, moisten with water enough to roll. Mark in $\frac{1}{2}$ inch squares and bake as pie dough. This recipe will serve 65-70 people.

35. **New Resolutions.** Resolved, that all proposed new resolutions and changes in existing resolutions, to be considered at the next Conference, be printed in the Conference "Visitor" at least sixty days before the next session of Conference.

All proposed resolutions and changes in existing resolutions not so printed shall require a two-thirds vote to pass.

36. **Ministerial Association.** Resolved, that the Annual Convention of the Ministerial Association be held March 31, April 1, and 2, 1954.

Provided also, that an offering equivalent to 25¢ per member be taken in each local church, to be sent to the Chairmen of the Ministerial Association. Such monies shall be used to defray the traveling expense of the pastors whose salary is \$1,500.00 or less, at the rate of 2½¢ per mile, round trip; also that the pastor and his wife from said churches be given \$1.00 each per day for meals.

Be it, further resolved, that pastors from the more distant churches that are over 200 miles from the Convention be paid 2½¢ per mile in excess of 400 miles round trip, irrespective of salary.

37. **Prayer Convention.** Resolved, that each district be urged to hold a District Prayer Convention, and that the District Chairmen shall be responsible for planning such Conventions, the time and place to be announced in an early issue of the "Visitor."

38. **Candidates to Elders Orders.** Resolved, that all candidates to Elders Orders present to the Committee on Itineracy and Orders a transcript of credits which may be accepted in lieu of the Conference Course and a list of books and readings other than textbooks.

W.Y.P.S. PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Greetings to the 29th Annual Session of the Wesleyan Methodist Young People's Society of the Kansas Conference.

The books have been closed on another year's activity and we are called to give an account of our stewardship. It is impossible to go into detail on all of the various activities related to this office, but the following report may reflect in part our services for the past 14 months.

Youth Camp

It has been our privilege to assist in planning and execution of two Youth Camps. "Fellowship Youth Camp" was a joint camp with the Free Methodist youth, held at Forest Park in Topeka, August 11-17, 1952.

June 15-19 was the date of our Kansas W.Y.P.S. sponsored Youth Camp held again at Forest Park. Rev. W. C. Lovin, Central Area President, proved to be God's man for the Evangelistic emphasis and many youth received definite spiritual help.

"God's Volunteers"

Two campaigns were planned and effected this year. One at Paola in which Dale Campbell was the evangelist, assisted by Volunteers from Leavenworth, Kansas City, Ottawa and Topeka. Some slides are available depicting various phases of this campaign held Sept. 9-19, 1952.

The other campaign was held at Arkansas City the last of October. Charles Groves was the Volunteer Evangelist, assisted by the Wichita Churches and a team from Miltonvale College.

These campaigns have at least shown the potential available from Volunteer teams. They have also shown the need for a Director to head up this special phase of our Conference program.

District Visitation

It was our privilege to contact each of the nine districts this year. Our ministry in the districts was largely through the "workshop" type of service. In some cases, a combination of rally and workshop. The real desire on the part of many local leaders to see their societies go forward was evident in the interest shown in these discussional periods.

Conventions and Conferences

It was our privilege, along with four other Conference Youth Leaders, to attend the National Leaders Convention held on the Campus of Marion College, Dec. 2-4. The theme of the Convention was "Keep the Fires

Burning." More detailed report of this inspiring time will be given by the delegates present, as time will permit during this present session.

On Feb. 18, the Executive Council and District leaders met at Miltonvale in an effort to better promote the Conference and District youth work. The response was gratifying with some 15 leaders present. The success of this Conference was reflected in the advances on each of the Districts thereafter.

Summary

We traveled 5105 miles in the Conference youth work.

Some 260 pieces of mail were sent out.

Attended 5 meetings of the Camp Meeting Board.

Conducted organization committee meeting for Youth Camp.

Held 9 District workshops.

Attended and took part in Church-wide Youth Leaders Convention.

Directed two Youth Camps.

We have received \$277.87 from the W.Y.P.S. Treasurer which was disbursed as follows:

SUGGESTIONS FOR W.Y.P.S.

The local president shall read these suggestions to the society within 30 days after conference and 30 days before conference.

Local

1. That each society sponsor a Youth Revival. the Executive Council being responsible for securing the evangelist, advertising and financing the meeting.

2. That the leaders for Young People's services be carefully chosen and the leaders' names be posted quarterly. It is recommended that the President lead at least once a quarter.

3. That emphasis be given to the monthly Missionary Meeting of the W.Y.P.S., noting that the offering received applies on Church Budget

and is divided 50% to Foreign Missions, 25% to Home Missions, and 25% to Education.

4. That emphasis be placed on the offering of W.Y.P.S. Educational Sunday which is the third Sunday in July. All educational budget money received during the summer quarter may be credited to the W.Y.P.S. (See paragraph 254, Section 13 of the Book of Discipline)

5. That all societies sending money to the Conference Treasurer remit the same quarterly by check or money order rather than small change and that remittance slips be used and filled out properly.

6. That attention be given to local representation at the Annual W.Y. P.S. Conference:

- a. The newly elected President or Vice President.
- b. Two delegates. (One additional delegate for societies whose membership exceeds 25)
- c. The Pastor.
- d. In case there is no local W.Y.P.S. organization, the Pastor may appoint a representative (age 13-40).

7. That the deadline for reports being sent to Mrs. Richard Tasker, Delphos, Kansas is July 27, 1954. These include:

- a. The Annual Report
- b. Delegate credentials
- c. Membership mailing list
- d. Efficiency Standard Report

8. That each society endeavor to bring a poster related to youth work to conference. The poster to be judged by the executive council and suitable awards presented to 1st, 2nd, and 3rd place winners.

9. That the local president and adult counsellor receive the Conference Visitor, the subscription to be paid from the society treasury.

Y.M.W.B. PLAN OF WORK

We, the Y.M.W.B. Executive Committee, submit the following Plan of Work Report:

We recommend:

1. That by careful study of the Plan of Work and Efficiency Standard, each Superintendent strive to make a goal of 100%.

2. For memory work, the use of the Songs and Scriptures required by Aileen Shea in the "Young Missionary"; also the names and stations of our missionaries.

3. The solicitation of the entire Sunday School as members of the Y.M.W.B. Those 1-13 as active members, and all over 14 as Honorary members.

4. The Bands to have at least one meeting each month and weekly where possible and the money be sent quarterly to the Superintendent, Mrs. Oletha Hoerner, Rt. 5, Clay Center, Kansas. See No. 2 under Item 7.

5. Our Membership goal to be 2,200 and our goal for dues and offerings be \$3,300.

6. That each Band bring a poster to conference.

7. An award be given at Conference to the Band that has the greatest per cent on the following items:

- (1.) Held at least twelve meetings.

- (2.) Sent money to Conference Superintendent quarterly. Quarters ending November 15, February 15, May 15, and July 15, yearly report postmarked not later than July 15, 1954.

- (3.) Annual report sent in on time.

- (4.) Having the greatest per cent increase in active membership.

- (5.) For raising the largest amount of money per member.

- (6.) For bringing poster to Conference.

- (7.) For having some plan of Scripture memorization.
- (8.) For having reached a goal of 100% on the Efficiency Standard.
- 8. The new Superintendent elected at the annual election of the W.M.S., take office immediately following Conference and the same be Treasurer of the band. We request each Superintendent to attend Conference.
- 9. The Superintendents books be closed and the annual report sent to the Conference Superintendent, postmarked not latter than July 15, 1954.
- 10. One cent per active and Honorary member be sent to the Conference Superintendent as Desk Fund. (Superintendents expense)
- 11. Each Band pay 20 cents per member, active and honorary, for the Support of David Wolfe. Foreign budget credit given.
- 12. That each Band raise a special "Recruit" offering, for the purpose of helping send out new "Recruits" to the various fields. Foreign budget credit to be given.
- 13. All checks and money orders be made payable to the "Kansas Y.M.W.B."

President Beulah Gilger presented the goals set for the Golden Jubilee year and the new slogan, "Each One Win One." Mrs. June Gibbs Wolfe spoke a few words of greeting. Rev. Gordon Wolfe was introduced as the speaker of the evening. John 5:1-9 was used as a basis of his message. He told of the miraculous opening up of new channels through which to present the Gospel to the Japanese. A few thoughts to challenge our thinking were these: "Just two miles

from the northern tip of the islands of Japan, the Iron Curtain has fallen; to the south of the islands fly the Stars and Stripes—the two great powers of the earth striving for supremacy with Japan as a figurative battleground. The door to missionary enterprise is not only standing wide open. "The door has fallen off its hinges." As he recounted events leading up to the great revival in Japan, his impassioned appeal to us in the homeland came as a challenge to humble confession that God might reveal Himself in great glory. Division I. Local Work

1. Conference goal for the coming year: 800 members, 325 honorary members, and 100 magazines.
2. A Men and Missions program shall be sponsored by the men, the offering for Foreign Missions. Non-budget.
3. Observe at least three "Challenge Days":
 - A. Harvest Home Day, October 30th
Send cash to the Conference W.M.S. Treasurer and provisions to the college kitchen. Non-budget.
 - B. Wesleyan Missionary Day. See program calendar for date. Energy should be expended in getting new subscriptions among the unsaved.
 - C. World Day of Prayer, February. Offering for Medical Missions. Non-budget.
4. The President of each society is responsible for arranging for one evening each month to pray especially for Mission Work, the same to be preceded by a day of fasting. Offerings are to be applied as follows:

August—Child Evangelism. Non-budget.
 September—Jewish Work. Non-budget.
 October and November—Education. Budget.
 December—Orphanage. Budget.
 January and February—Kansas Conference Missions. Budget.
 March and April—Home Missions. Budget.
 May and June—Foreign Missions. Budget.
 July—Wesleyan Hope Missions. Non-budget.
5. Each society should devote some definite time and attention to the Jewish Work.
6. Let us continue to support the Pension Plan. Send all monies to Conference W.M. S. Treasurer. Budget.
7. Look for an increase in Card Call pledges. Non-budget.
8. Each Society shall contribute at least \$5.00 for Hephzibah. Budget.
9. Each active and honorary member pay \$1.00 to keep Rev. Edward Eddy in Africa. Non-budget.
10. Each Society shall contribute 10¢ per member, active and honorary, for a mimeograph to be used by the W.M.S. and the Y.M.W.B.
11. Each Society pay 25¢ per active member to continue the redecoration of Abbot Hall. Non-budget.

12. Each Society shall contribute at least \$3.00 to the Medical Student Fund. Non-budget.
13. Pay all dues, including honorary, to the Conference W.M.S. Treasurer. One half budget credit. Please designate specifically where the credit is desired.
14. All money is to be disbursed quarterly through the treasurer. Quarters: October 26, January 25, April 26 and July 13. All money is to be sent to the Conference W.M.S. Treasurer postmarked not later than July 16.
15. The annual report is to be prepared by the president, secretary, and treasurer, which serves as an audit of the treasurer's report and sent to the Chairman on Statistics postmarked not later than July 16. Duplicate to be brought to Conference by the delegate.
16. Elect an alert magazine solicitor to secure new subscriptions and all renewals.
17. Elect an active Prayer Partner Secretary.
18. Choose a wide-awake Mission Study secretary. "The woman who does not read good books has no advantage over one who cannot read."
19. The President shall review the Plan of Work and the Efficiency Standard Quarterly before the society.
20. Read the Moral Reform Report publicly once a year.
21. An Award will be issued to each society who meets the Conference Golden Jubilee goals: 15% gain in 1. GIVING—Kansas Conference Missions and General Home and Foreign Missions; 2. MEMBERSHIP, including honorary; and 3. MAGAZINE SUBSCRIPTIONS.
22. WORK! WORK! WORK! Send clothing generously to those stations using same and bandages and new clothing to the Missionary Home, 32 Bergen Ave., Jersey City, New Jersey. Send voucher receipts for same to Conference W.M.S. Treasurer. Benevolence credit.
23. The forms in the Discipline, page 316, Article 438 be used for the delegate credentials for annual conference.
24. Each Society shall grade themselves by the Efficiency Standard.

Efficiency Standard

A. That arrangements be made with the pastor for one missionary prayer meeting each month.

B. That a minimum of ten meetings be held during the year in which prayer is given prominent place and business transacted (5% credit) and at least one public meeting (5% credit).

C. We recommend the formation of prayer partner circles in each

society with a Prayer Partner Secretary to keep record of the same and report to the Conference Prayer Partner Secretary, to be sent at least sixty days after the setting of the Annual Conference.

D. That the President, Secretary, Treasurer, and seventy-five per cent of the active membership be subscribers to the WESLEYAN MISSIONARY.

E. That a Solicitor be elected for the WESLEYAN MISSIONARY, gaining not less than two subscriptions a year.

F. That a Delegate be elected to the Annual Conference Woman's Missionary Society (5% credit), and that the Delegate be instructed by local society regarding the amount to be pledged by that society at the Annual Conference Session. (5% credit)

G. That the dues on dollar per member be sent directly to the Conference treasurer, fifty cents of which shall be divided by her as specified and applied on budget, (5% credit) and that all monies and vouchers be sent to the Conference treasurer at least quarterly. (5% credit)

H. That we secure every woman in the Church as a member of the Society, or bring about a ten per cent gain in total membership.

I. That each local society pay annually an amount equal to twenty-five cents per active member to be used as a General Administrative Fund, not to apply on budget.

J. That the Efficiency Standard be read in the society at least once a year. (Ten per cent credit shall be given each of the above items, and all societies making a grade of 80% shall be placed on the Honor Roll.)

Division II. Conference Work

25. The President and District Chairman arrange the time and recommend the worker for Conventions or Conference Visitations.
26. Each district supervised by the District Chairmen under the direction of the Conference President.

Concordia—Concordia, New Hope, Hall, Morgan Chapel, Heber, Hollis.

Wichita District—Wichita First, Wichita West Side, Wichita Seneca Street, Hopewell, Hutchinson, Arkansas City.

Mankato District—Belleville, Mankato, Wesley Center, Victor.

Phillipsburg District—Cedar, Gaylord, Phillipsburg, Englewood.

Denver District—Denver, Englewood, Colorado Springs, Greeley.
