## **Standing Resolutions**

### **RESOLUTIONS AFFECTING THE CONFERENCE**

1. A Committee on Auditing and Finance which shall be a **STANDING COMMITTEE** to advise on financial plans, shall be elected each year. The Committee shall consist of three ministerial members, the Chairman being an Elder, and two lay members. Lay members shall be nominated by the Conference Nominating Committee and begin their year of service at the Conference wherein they are elected.

2. The Conference Secretary, as Chairman, with the Conference President shall be a Standing Committee on Publications, whose duty it shall be to examine all matters pertaining to Conference printing and publications, and let all contracts for same.

3. Minister's Pocket Credentials shall be issued to Elders and annually to Conference Preachers who are eligible.

4. When an Elder is elected to the Conference Presidency or Vice Presidency expenses incurred in moving to the Conference parsonage shall be paid from the Conference treasury.

### **RESOLUTIONS AFFECTING CONFERENCE AND CHURCH:**

1. At the beginning of the Conference session the president shall appoint a Nominating Committee of not less than three members, two Elders and one Layman to bring to the Conference a slate of Nominations for Committees, etc., for the Conference Temporary Organizations. Delegates Credentials shall be mailed to the Secretary not later than ten days before the convening of Conference. The Secretary shall be Chairman of the Credentials Committee and shall compile the Roll of Delegates from the regularly filled Credentials received.

2. Churches having business with the Conference Board of Trustees requiring a visit of that body to their church, shall be responsible for the expense attached to such calls, unless released by the Board.

3. Local church treasurer's books shall close April 30, thus making the Conference fiscal year from May 1, to April 30. All funds received after this date shall be counted in the following year. Funds will be credited on Sub-Treasurer's books if received by May 5.

To meet the requirements of Paragraph 164 of the Discipline regarding revision of the Roll of membership, April 30, may be considered the close of the Conference year for Statistical purposes.

### **RESOLUTIONS AFFECTING HOLINESS DISTRICTS**

1. We recommend that all districts emphasize Sunday School activity, and that Conventions be arranged for in conjunction with the visitation of the Conference Sunday School Secretary, who shall visit one Convention of each District during the year, at Convention expense.

### **RESOLUTIONS AFFECTING THE LOCAL CHURCH**

1. All persons received into membership in the churches of our Conference excepting those whose life of Christian fidelity has been of sufficient long standing, shall be received at first as associate members only.

2. When it becomes necessary for a church to call a pastor, it shall be the duty of the calling church to make provision for the expense incurred by the pastor in removing to a new field of labor. Money raised for this purpose shall NOT be applied on the pastor's salary.

3. The Conference Sunday shall be the closing Sunday of Conference year, and the out-going pastor shall be paid his salary for that Sunday by the charge he is leaving.

4. Each church may elect a Nominating Committee whose duty it shall be to nominate candidates for church officers for presentation to the church at the time of the annual election of officers. Such nominations shall not exclude other nominations at the time of the business meeting.

5. We recommend that each church equip its parsonage with the necessary heating and cooking equipment, because of the variation of requirements in this

equipment for the individual parsonage.

6. All churches shall have a systematic means of keeping records, as required by Discipline, Paragraph No. 74, The "Ideal Church Record" published by the Bethel Publishing Company, Elkhart, Indiana, is a suggested form.

7. The pastoral vote shall be taken on each charge on the third Sunday in April. When it is the desire of the church to vote on a week night, it will be done sometime during the week previous to the designated Sunday. Permission to vote on another Sunday may be obtained from the President and the Advisory Board.

8. The third Sunday of September shall be designated, each year, as Pioneer Sunday to present the work of the Pioneer department to our congregations and pastors be urged to exchange pulpits on this Sunday as much as possible.

#### **RESOLUTIONS AFFECTING LOCAL CHURCH AND PASTOR:**

1. The pastor of any church in the Conference shall be free to hold at least one revival meeting during the year, wherever he sees fit, and it is recommended that his salary be paid to him while he is absent.

2. Inasmuch as trial sermons are hardly fair to the church or candidate and since the practice of having trial sermons is contrary to the usual manner of locating preachers, we recommend that no preacher shall accept any such invitations, if given. Exceptions to this rule may be granted by the Conference President upon request of any church.

3. Since considerable expense of transferring automobile title and license attends the moving of a pastor from one state to another, we recommend that where possible the calling church bear this expense.

4. We recommend that in election of local church Advisory Committee each church permit the pastor to nominate the members of this committee.

5. Each church shall allow their pastor a reasonable vacation with pay to be taken at his convenience. Two weeks is suggested.

#### **RESOLUTIONS AFFECTING THE MINISTER AND CONFERENCE:**

1. No person shall be received into membership in Allegheny Conference until he shall have properly filled out an application blank, which application together with recommendations of his references must pass the approval of the President and his Advisory Board. Exceptions to this rule may be made by the President and his Advisory Board when they deem best.

2. Each pastor shall send a monthly report on the blank provided, to the Conference President showing the progress and the state of the work under his care.

3. We recommend that no one be elected to Elders Orders who does not have an abiding sense of divine call to give himself wholly to the function and ministry of an Elder in the **WESLEYAN METHODIST CHURCH**, and that no one shall be ordained to this office and work who is not applying himself wholly to this one thing in cares and studies, and clearly determining by God's grace to give himself wholly to this holy ministry, if possible, long before the appointed day of ordination, and manifesting such a determination of faithful Christian service to the church or congregation whom he was called to serve during his years of preparation, so that as much as lieth in him, he has and will apply himself wholly to the work of the ministry, except in all cases of absolute necessity of such diversions to a legitimate avocation for livelihood which neither jeopardizes the Lord's work nor blames the ministry.

4. Since the use of the wedding ring is not in accord with the standards of our church, we therefore, as a Conference, disapprove of our ministers performing or taking part in the ring ceremony.

5. In the judgment of the Allegheny Conference, viewing television programs of the type commonly offered in response to the public clamor for entertainment is an impediment to the development of holy character. We deplore the current television programs' evil effect upon the moral and spiritual life of the Nation. The principles of Wesleyan Methodism—being an epitome of the Christian religion—obligate Wesleyan Methodists to an unblameable life which constantly rebukes every form of evil and zealously advocates holiness of heart and life. Therefore, we most earnestly request our ministers and members, as those who must give account unto God in the Day of Judgment for anything which tends to influence toward

evil, to refrain from the purchase of television sets and from viewing such programs for Jesus' sake.

Inasmuch as ministers are examples and patterns to the flock of Christ, the Allegheny Conference expects each of its ministers to set a wholesome example and to be a godly pattern in this respect, so that those to whom he ministers will follow his example and avoid exposure to this which menaces vital godliness.

6. Any Elder or Conference Preacher desiring a transfer from the Allegheny Conference to another Annual Conference, or to receive a letter of Standing, must have all notes paid to the Minister's Aid Fund, or have made satisfactory arrangements with the Chairman of the Auditing and Finance Committee for their repayment.

### THE CONFERENCE PRESIDENT'S REPORT

#### REPORT NO. 1

We consider it a privilege in the providence of God to be granted the opportunity of bringing another President's Report to this body of the Allegheny Annual Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America here assembled for its one hundred twenty-second Annual Session.

We greet you in the words of Peter who said, "Now the end of all is near, be keen to love one another" (I Pet. 4:7,8;) and the words of Paul who said, "Do not extinguish the Spirit's fire;" "Keep alive the flame of God's gracious gift that is in you....." (I Thess. 5:19; II Tim. 1:6a.)

The great need in our churches today is for spiritual leaders who are not seeking their own personal advancement and advantage, but who sincerely seek the spiritual welfare of God's people. One of the principal reasons for this spiritual dearth and barrenness prevalent in our churches today is the fact that the spiritual leaders too often are seeking after popularity and financial gain rather than the glory of God and the spiritual advancement of His people.

In these times the watchword of the early Church needs to be resounded and reemphasized. This watchword is the keynote for the present hour of darkness, confusion and worldliness, for it sounds the note of warning and also a universal hope for the Church, Israel and the nations. God's people should live in the momentary expectation of the Lord's coming for His own. Let us make the watchword of the early Church, "Our Lord Cometh," our favorite greeting and expression of our triumphant hope in this apostate hour.

We are grateful for what has been accomplished in some places, for the unusual movings of the Spirit in other areas and for the new church and parsonage buildings erected throughout the conference.

## ITEM XIV. A STATEMENT CONCERNING THE CHARTER AMENDMENTS PASSED AT THE LAST ANNUAL SESSION.

Following the Annual Conference Session of 1964, your Conference officers initiated the Charter changes mandated by that Conference.

On June 26, 1964, eight dissident members of the Allegheny Conference took an appeal from the action of the Conference to the General Superintendents of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America alleging, among other things, that the Charter amendments were beyond the power of the Allegheny Conference and were in conflict with the Discipline of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America. This appeal was sustained by the General Superintendents on July 21, 1964.

The position of the Allegheny Annual Conference has been from the very beginning that the question of Charter relationship with the State of Pennsylvania is a matter only between the State and the Conference and, further that the Discipline of the Wesleyan Methodist Church does not at any place prescribe or regulate this relationship, nor does it prohibit a Conference from assuming whatever charter position is most fitting for the internal operation of the Conference. This position is substantiated by the legal opinion of the law firm of Barco and Barco of Meadville, Pennsylvania, and of our general counsel, Joseph N. Mack, Esq., of Indiana, Pennsylvania.

The charter amendment favorably acted upon in the 1964 Conference Session were approved November 30, 1964, by the Court of Common Pleas of Crawford County after due notice and legal advertisement.

On the 18th of January, 1965, seven weeks later, General Superintendents Phaup and Mitchell filed a petition with the Court of Crawford County asking that the charter amendments be set aside. The Court ordered the matter referred to a Master to hold a full hearing on the basis of this petition by the Superintendents, and to report to the Court which will make final disposition of the matter.

In an attempt to narrow and clarify the issues involved, your Conference officers met with Superintendents Phaup and Mitchell at Meadville, Pennsylvania, on April 1, 1965, for a general discussion. It was hoped that the controversy might be amicably resolved.

At this writing the hearing before the Master has not yet been scheduled. It is expected by your officers that further discussions will take place before the hearing is held.

ITEM VIII. We recommend that credit for no book in the Course of Study be allowed for more than one quadrennium after that book has been officially dropped from the course.

ITEM IX. We will not recommend to the Pastoral Relations Committee any person who has not complied with Paragraph 267, Sub-paragraph 1 of the Discipline. We further insist that recommendation to Study and Travel with Transcripts of grade for which credit is desired will be in the hands of the Committee on the first day of the Annual Conference, also that with each transcript the Committee shall be furnished a copy of the School catalogue from which the transcript came.

ITEM X. We require that students who are ready to take an examination in any book shall designate an acceptable member of the Wesleyan Methodist Church outside their immediate family, to whom Authorized Examiner shall mail the selected list of questions, and in whose presence the examination shall be taken in accordance with the rules and general instructions, for examinations. Such person shall certify that the examination was taken in his presence in an honorable manner, and shall return the examination paper to the examiner with self-addressed, stamped envelope to return to the student.

ITEM XI We place in nomination the name of Rev. F. B. Miller for election to the office of Custodian of Conference Books. We recommend that no books be mailed from the library unless sufficient postage accompanies application for the same and that this library be reserved for the use of those who are pursuing the Course of Study as Conference Preachers and Song Evangelists. We also insist that no study book or reading book be kept by one individual longer than forty-five days. In case of necessity, upon application to the Custodian, an extension of thirty days may be granted.

ITEM XII. We urge that in writing examinations special attention be given to neatness, spelling and composition. The Committee cannot give the same credit to papers that lack neatness and are poorly composed as to those that have received proper attention in this respect. We require papers to be typewritten or written in ink.

ITEM XIII. In taking examinations, when a specified number of answers are asked for and more are answered, the grade will be based on the number ask-

ed for. As an example, if 10 answers were asked for and 12 were given, the grade will be based on the first 10. If less answers are given than the number requested, the grade will be based on the full number requested.

ITEM XIV. We wish to call to your attention that those wishing to take examinations on Wiley's Theology are to contact the member of the Committee for that particular year, sending postage, in order to receive the select list of questions for study.

ITEM XV. When anyone has completed a course of study in school and is to appear before this Committee, he shall bring a transcript from that school in which the work was taken.

ITEM XVI. We recommend that those coming from another denomination must have a letter of recommendation from their superior.

ITEM XVII. All Conference Preachers must remember that Paragraphs 166 and 167 of the Discipline require that the holder of an Annual Conference license must continue to hold an effective Quarterly Conference license and that license must be renewed each year and this requires the passing at least one book in the Course of Study.

ITEM XVIII. All Conference Preachers must remember that Paragraph 267, sub-item (2) of the Discipline states that continued authorization to marry and to administer the sacraments depends on passing at least two books of the Course of Study.

REPORT NO. 4

COMMITTEE ON AUDITING AND FINANCE

Your Committee on Auditing and Finance submits the following report and recommendations:

(This item is revised to conform to the latest General Conference Budget set up after this item was presented to the annual conference.)

ITEM I. WHAT SHALL THE CHURCHES PAY?

1. The following Denominational Budget items: World Missions, \$2.00; Education, \$4.00, (20 per cent to Houghton Academy); Pension, \$3.50; Brainerd, \$.25; Church Extension and Evangelism, \$1.50; Hephzibah Home, \$.35; Administrative Budget, \$2.00; General Conference Travel and Entertainment, \$.50; Australia, \$.25; Board Meeting Expense, \$.15; Wesleyan Seminary Foundation, \$.30; (these assessments are per church member per year).

2. Undivided Conference Budget (Conference work) shall be equal to ten per cent of the sum obtained by adding the three following items: Pastor's salary, parsonage rent, and church incidental expense (to be remitted monthly). (Included in church incidental expenses are: Parsonage tax, all kinds of insurance on church and parsonage; janitor services and supplies, church utilities and fuel, parsonage utilities, and fuel when paid by the church, pastor's car expense when provided by the church), and all other items which are similar to or comparable with the above. Not included are repairs, replacements, improvements, evangelistic help and special projects, church and parsonage furnishings, Sunday School and Church literature and similar items.

3. Conference Group Life Insurance, \$.35 per member.

4. Conference Entertainment, \$.45 per member.

5. Pioneer Self-Denial envelopes for monthly remittances (above tithe) shall be given our continued support.

6. The above financial items shall be sent to the District Sub-Treasurers. Church Treasurers are to make remittances by the 5th of each month to the credit of Conference Budget, Conference Missions, and Pioneer Fund.



7. The Pastor or persons responsible for the sale of the Conference Minutes in the local church shall remit \$1.25 per copy to the chairman of the Committee on the Sale of Conference Minutes, by March 31. The Chairman of said committee shall mail statements to all those who have not paid for their Minutes by March 31, thus enabling the report of the Committee to be prepared by April 30.

8. Church Treasurers' reports to Quarterly Conference shall be made as of the close of the month preceding the Quarterly Conference. All church treasurers' records for the Conference year shall close April 30. The Conference fiscal year is from May 1 to April 30.

#### ITEM II. WHAT SHALL THE SUNDAY SCHOOL PAY?

1. The first Sunday School offerings of the month to the Conference Missions Fund for the use of churches not self-supporting, etc., according to the recommendations of the Conference Mission Board.

2. Sunday School birthday offerings to the Conference Mission Fund.

3. Denominational Sunday School Budget of \$.25 per Sunday School member.

4. All three items above mentioned are to be paid to the local church treasurer for remittance to sub-treasurer.

#### ITEM III. WHAT SHALL THE CONFERENCE TREASURER PAY?

1. To the Conference President an annual salary of \$4,680.00.

2. To the Conference First and Second Vice-Presidents an annual salary of \$4,420.00.

3. The three above named Conference officials shall also be paid or have paid for them the following items:

a. All utilities which include heat, light, gas, water and telephone.

b. The premium for Liability Insurance for their cars in the amount \$100,000.00 which coverage they shall be required to maintain.

c. The cost of their Annual Social Security Assessment.

d. The cost of Blue Cross Premiums.

e. \$100.00 vacation bonus.

f. \$1,100.00 Travel Expense—with the provision that all traveling costs in excess of this amount be paid them up to the amount of 5c per mile for the mileage reported in their current reports to the Conference. This includes all traveling costs exclusive of car depreciation. Any unused portion of above expense account shall be returned to the Conference Treasurer.

g. To the Second Vice President a rental allowance of \$75.00 per month.

4. \$1.30 per hour for Secretarial aid for Conference President's Secretary.

5. All expense incurred by Conference officials, Board and Committee members in the pursuit of the duties of their respective offices upon the presentation of itemized expense accounts. Mileage will be paid at 5c per mile.

6. The following sums from the Conference Budget, in appreciation for their services; Conference Secretary, \$125.00; Conference Treasurer, \$150.00; each sub-treasurer, except West Virginia, \$60.00; West Virginia sub-treasurer, \$30.00; Superintendent of Rooms, \$25.00; Statistical Chairman, \$25.00.

7. \$25.00 to each sub-treasurer for an expense account.

## REPORT NO. 7

## COMMITTEE ON ALLEGHENY APARTMENTS

A letter written by Dr. Dean E. Marsh, D.C., to Rev. H. C. VanWormer under date of February 8, 1965, was placed in our hands by Brother VanWormer for our consideration.

Dr. Marsh owns and operates the Countryside Convalescent Home on Mercer-Sharpville Road, near Mercer, Pa. and was offering it for sale.

The Committee met with Dr. Marsh at the Home on March 10th and surveyed the situation.

Our findings were as follows:

1. It would involve the operation of a well equipped nursing home, for which we have little need at present, and not provide ample housing for able bodied retired ministers.
2. The sale price of \$125,000.00 we believe would be prohibitive for our Conference.

In response to our report of a year ago the following thought was advanced by one individual, "That 'Senior Citizens' who are able to live in apartments as described in the committee report, would be able to live almost anywhere and do not need Conference sponsored housing".

Expressions of those of retirement age were not forthcoming.

In view of the above circumstances we recommend that no further pursuit of this matter be made and that the Committee be dissolved upon the adoption of this report.

### STONEBORO WESLEYAN SCHOOL ASSOCIATION REPORT FOR YEAR 1964-1965

ENROLLMENT: The Stoneboro Wesleyan School was temporarily located this year in the basement of the Oak Grove Wesleyan Methodist Church. School opened August 31, 1964 and closed May 28, 1965. We had a total enrollment of 32 students ranging from first grade through tenth grade.



**STAFF:** Rev. David Phelps is our supervising principal and teacher in the High School Department. Rev. C. A. Hoiem taught High School Biology and Mrs. Ruth Hoiem taught High School English. Miss Leota Benninger was our teacher for grades one and two. Mrs. Rosalie Cupp was our teacher for grades three, four, and five. Mr. Andrew Youngblood was our teacher for grades six, seven, and eight.

**PROSPECTS:** School will open August 30, 1965 and will close May 27, 1966. We will add at least grade eleven, and possibly grade twelve. Our enrollment for this fall term is expected to raise to near sixty. Presently we are engaged in a building project, constructing a new building next to the Camp Grounds, near the Youth Tabernacle. This new school building will be 48'x76' and will include six class rooms, rest rooms, a furnace room and a small office. The proposed total cost of this building has been set at \$10,000 providing we have all volunteer labor. As of April 24, 1965 we had \$2,929.85 in this building fund.

### REPORT NO. 18 RESOLUTIONS COMMITTEE

Your Committee on Resolutions recommends a continuation of the Resolutions adopted at the 1963 session.

#### RESOLUTIONS: Be It Resolved:

1. That since the tendency of our times is towards indistinct lines as pertains to doctrine and compromise as pertains to practice, we as a Conference, by adopting this report, re-affirm our position to adhere to the general and special rules of our Discipline as interpreted by Allegheny Conference.

2. That we re-affirm our love and our loyalty to our beloved denomination by praying for its leaders; and that we resolve to express our appreciation for the officials of our Conference and the standards which they maintain by faithfully praying for them and earnestly following their example.

3. That since our conference sustains tremendous losses among our youth from our Sunday Schools and Churches, we therefore urge our pastors to encourage the Youth of our Churches to attend the Annual Youth Conference, District Youth Rallies and Stoneboro Camp Meeting, and that every effort be put forth to lead them into a definite experience of salvation and when deemed advisable to unite with the Church. Be it further resolved that we refrain from any compromise of our standards or introduction of social programs into our churches, which only lead to superficial loyalties, spiritual decline, and discouragement of the spiritual laity.

4. That since divorce is one of the great curses of our land, a corruption of the morals of our youth, a destroyer of our homes, and a violation of God's law, we therefore urge our pastors to prayerfully and tenderly warn our people, young and old, of this popular evil and its consequences.

5. That we go on record as being unalterably opposed to any affiliation whatsoever with the National Council of Churches or any of its departments. That we maintain our guard against the modernistic bias reflected in the Revised Standard Version of the Bible and the "Interpreter's Bible" which has been produced under the auspices of the National Council of Churches.

6. That since we recognize the religious motion picture to be an evil and not consistent with the divine plan for the presentation and propagation of the Gospel of Jesus Christ, and since we recognize the use of plays and other entertaining diversions as substitutes for Holy Spirit anointed presentation of truth, we therefore urge our pastors and churches to refrain from using such in the Churches of the Conference.

7. That we urge our ministers and laymen to maintain the family altar as a spiritual institution in our homes, to practice the grace of systematic fasting and give themselves to intercessory prayer.

8. Since our Conference boundaries include areas of shifting population, we recommend that our pastors keep each other informed of those, who move from area to area who attend our Sunday Schools and Churches.

9. That since we recognize Communism to be a subtle, godless influence, and that the present trends to a welfare state are opening wedges to supplant our democratic way of life—be it resolved:

a. That our ministers and church leaders warn our people through the preached Word and the printed page of the subtle approach, satanic origin, and destructive results of this political philosophy.

b. That we recognize our solemn obligation to pray for the President of our Nation and committees of Congress who are engaged in exposing and opposing Communistic infiltration into our American system, that God will grant them wisdom and courage to fight this evil.

10. That since the continued advancement of the Roman Catholic system in numerical strength and political power in our nation, school systems and local governments constitutes a menace to free government, freedom of worship, and conscience, we therefore urge that the ministry of the Conference instruct the people in our Sunday Schools and churches concerning the prevalent practices and teachings of the Roman Church, relative to civil government and marriage.

1. That we recognize crime comic books and pulp magazines, which depict violence sadism, brutality, and blood lust unparalleled in the history of children's literature of any time or nation, to be a contributing factor to the present delinquency problem. We therefore urge our people to war against this evil wherever practicable by withholding patronage from those engaged in the distribution of these tools of Satan and by reproving and rebuking them with Christian love.

12. That we declare ourselves as supporting the reading of the Holy Scriptures in the public schools and that we urge our ministers and parents to seek by all ethical means to improve the moral character of our youth through the boards of education, offices of superintendent, principal, faculty, and Parent-Teacher Associations. And be it further resolved: that we endeavor to arouse our constituency to support, by prayer and other methods, Christian day schools which adhere to Bible principles.

13. That we continue to register our opposition to the trends toward socialism in our federal government, especially in such areas as Federal Aid to Education and Medical care for the aged under Social Security; and that we urge our people to make this opposition known to the Senators, Representatives and other officials who may have to do with the determination of such issues.

14. That we urge: a. Special prayer by our people for our nation's racial problem that God's solution may be found before it shall be further exploited by Communists and Black Muslims. b. That our churches take advantage of the opportunities for ministering to people of our races in their neighborhoods by doing their best to carry to them the message of full salvation.

15. That these resolutions together with the standing resolutions be read on each charge at the first quarterly meeting following the distribution of the Conference Minutes.

and

Whereas: it has been the custom of the conference to accept as a reading course those books suggested by the General W.M.S.,

and

Whereas: there has been in the past mostly good and wholesome reading in these books, but also some practices referred to and pictures printed which has drawn wholesome and justified criticism,

and

Whereas: many of our people are refusing to read these books due to these objectionable features,

**WE THEREFORE RESOLVE:**

1. That the Conference Reading Course Secretary obtain and read these books at the earliest possible moment.

2. That any books which contain any objectionable material be dropped from the list, and a like number be secured in their place which can be whole-heartedly endorsed to be read by all.

3. That some form of recognition be given to those reading the substituted books.

**President's Message:** Through the leading of the Lord our president brought us a heart-searching message on the "Constraining Love of Christ" lifted out of II Corinthians 5:14. She pointed out two phases of this love. Not only does it constrain us to reveal love, joy, peace, etc., but His love constrains us to hate evil. She gave us two reasons for the lack of this love. The first is no definite experience of Christ. The second is a lack of prayer. The results of the lack of this love are clearly evidenced. May the Lord help us to accept this loving admonition.

## REPORT NO. 2

**1964-65 REPORT OF ALLEGHENY CONFERENCE WMS PRESIDENT**

To the members of the Fifty-ninth Annual Allegheny Conference Woman's Missionary Society, greetings in Jesus' Name!

"Nevertheless when the Son of man cometh shall He find faith on the earth?" Luke 18:8.

The word "faith" means "a firm conviction of the truth of what is declared by another, simply on the ground of his truth or faithfulness; belief; trust, especially, such belief and trust exercised toward God and Christ." This is the first definition of faith given in the dictionary.

May God help us, the women of the Allegheny Conference WMS, to keep the faith, hold to the vision, burn with the passion for souls, bow at the Cross, die out to sin, pride, self and the world in order that we may not be ashamed nor lost at the soon coming again of our Blessed Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ.

Let us strive earnestly to be able to say with the Apostle Paul, "I have fought a good fight, I have finished my course, I have kept the faith: henceforth, there is laid up for me a crown of righteousness, which the Lord, the righteous Judge, shall give me at that day: and not to me only, but unto all them also that love His appearing." (II Tim. 4:7, 8).

**ACTIVITIES OF THE YEAR 1964-65**

As we endeavored to carry on the activities of the WMS this past year, we have sought diligently to be faithful, to find the will of the Lord and to have the anointing and leadership of the Spirit in all of our decisions, contacts and work.

We have never felt our dependence upon the Lord more than we have the past year as it has been the most strenuous and difficult year we have known due to the increased demands and complications of these strenuous times in which we live. By God's help we have done the best we could to please and honor our Lord and be faithful to the tasks assigned us.

In order to meet these obligations we have sent out over 1,040 pieces of mail, which consists of six full circular letters, one full circular letter sent for Sr. Huntsman, the WWF Secretary, during her illness, three partial circular letters for missionary tours in different districts and several packages of mimeographed letters done in our office and sent to the following officials: YMWB Superintendent, Magazine Solicitor, Treasurer, WWF Secretary, and Reading Course Secretary, besides reports for all these which were not mailed. This amounts to considerable work done by our Conference Secretary, who not only deserves our thanks and appreciation but also the Conference who so graciously gives us much of the material and pays for the time of labor, though we do give them an estimated offering toward these expenses.

**I—Our Conference standard of Efficiency Rating for the year 1964-65 is 88%**

**II—New Society—**Merrifield Memorial organized May 20, 1965, with 7 active and 5 honorary members. This makes us 104 Societies, the most we have ever had. We thank God for this new society and request your prayers for them as they start on this new undertaking for missions.

**III—Stoneboro Camp**

(a) At the beginning of the Camp Christian and American Flags were placed in the Youth Tabernacle by the WMS as a memorial to Mrs. Bessie Robbie whose love for her country caused her to suggest Article No. 11c in the WMS Resolutions. Even more than ever we should appreciate and preserve the freedom and religious liberty of our nation in this critical hour.

(b) Cabinet—During the camp Rev. Paul Betz graciously took time off to make us a very useful and necessary storage space for our books and WMS material where they would be safe and neatly cared for. We sincerely thank Bro. Betz for his kindness in making this cabinet and thank all those who gave to finance it.

Thanks are also due Mr. Larry Bogart who volunteered to shellac and thus finish to cupboard for use immediately at the close of camp.

(c) Speakers—Among the speakers at Camp in the afternoon services was Miss

Norma Gentle of Honduras, whom Miss Louise Lupton brought back with her after a summer of helping the Davises in Honduras. All enjoyed Miss Gentle, who endeared herself to us. Mr. Larry Bogart, a medical missionary student, also spoke. He was much appreciated for his humble, sincere devotion to the Lord and His cause. Miss Hazel Jones, retired missionary to India, thrilled us anew with her stories of Indian missionary work. It is always a treat to hear Miss Jones recall past days of venture for the Lord in India.

The speaker for the public missionary service was Rev. Harris Earl, missionary to Colombia, South America, who challenged us with the needs and work there. However, the offering at this service was below par probably because of the unusually large one given at the conference service.

#### IV. MISSIONARY TOURS

Again we were forced to secure four different missionaries as we could not secure any one missionary long enough to cover our conference territory.

- (a) First, Miss Rebecca Bibbee from India traveled the Akron and Canton Districts and parts of the New Castle and Titusville Districts from September 15 to October 23, 1964. We heard good reports of her visits and heard her give an excellent message at Titusville but were unable, to our great regret, to secure any report from her.
- (b) Bro. William Ward, a former missionary to Africa and a present pastor in our conference, graciously consented to tour the West Virginia Districts from October 5-19, 1964. According to his report in the "Messenger," it was evident that God blessed his ministry and, we believe, used it to help the cause of missions. We were greatly interested in his account of early revivals in Methodism near or at the places where he visited.
- (c) Bro. Neal Phipps, co-ordinator of our Indian Missions and President of our Indian Orphanage or Home in Custer, South Dakota, traveled in different districts for us from Nov. 22-Dec. 23, 1964, besides being in the conference territory the latter part of October and early November as well as at other times before and since. Wherever Bro. Phipps goes he leaves a trail of interest in Indian work. May God grant him a fresh touch in body and in soul as he is ill at this writing and in need of our earnest prayers. Late word says he has recovered enough to be on his way to visit us at this conference.
- (d) Finally, to complete Indiana District tour we secured Miss Pearl Crapo, missionary to Haiti, March 28 to April 25, 1965, excepting the week of the Ministerial Institute. It was our privilege to hear Miss Crapo at Franklin, where she came back to fill in as they had missed out on the missionary assigned them earlier. Miss Crapo gave an excellent, stirring message majoring on the spiritual needs and victories of the work. This we greatly appreciated. Miss Crapo gave a very good report of over \$1,200 being raised for missions during her short tour, as well as giving us first-hand information about Haiti.

#### V. SICKNESS

- (a) WMS Treasurer—to our great regret and sorrow, Mrs. Edith Christy, our faithful, competent treasurer, became ill. In fact, she was ill at conference time, but we did not realize it. She carried on beyond her strength until November 6, 1964, when she resigned her work to her assistant, Mrs. Dolores Boughner, who has assumed this very important office efficiently the rest of the year. Please remember both ladies in prayer, especially Sr. Christy in her affliction. We miss her more than words can tell.
- (b) Vice President—Then around Christmas time, or after, our vice-president, Mrs. Erma Blair, underwent surgery and after several weeks was hospitalized again for further surgery. We are grateful for the recovery she is making, but continue to pray for her.

#### VI DEATHS

- (a) Mrs. Florence Butts, former WMS President of the Ashville Society, passed away June 23, 1964. She had served satisfactorily a number of years and had attended Conference at least several times.
- (b) Mrs. Annie Hampe, former WMS President and missionary-minded pastor's wife of our conference, went to be with her Lord, March 2, 1965, at the age



wife of our conference, went to be with her Lord, March 2, 1965, at the age of 97 years. Mrs. Hampe was a pioneer in spirit and life both by precept and example. To you young folk she is only a name but to us who knew her she was a bundle of missionary enthusiasm and a model of sacrificial giving to the cause of missions, for which she fasted and prayed systematically. Now she is reaping her eternal reward and rejoicing with those who have gone on before.

## VII DESTRUCTION OF HEADQUARTERS

Last, but not least, we must mention our great loss in the destruction of our Headquarters Building at Marion, Indiana, by the tornado which struck April 11, 1965. With gratitude they reported no loss of life and that the World Missions offices were the most intact and that the office of the Wesleyan Missionary Editor was the least harmed of all. Surely there is cause for thanks because of this but at the same time there is an urgent appeal for prayer for our leaders and all engaged in the work at Headquarters that the Lord will rule and overrule and bring all things out for His honor and glory. (Rom. 8:28)

## VIII ADMONITION FOR THE FUTURE

We cannot be faithful in giving our report without making an earnest request to you all, first to be prayerful and to seek diligently the whole will of God for your own personal lives. These are days of treachery when vital Christianity is being attacked on every angle. If we make it through, we will have to do as Christian in "Pilgrim's Progress" did, put our fingers in our ears to everything that would sap us spiritually and cry "Life, Life, Eternal Life!" Second, we will have to take our stand against worldliness as never before but still keep love in our hearts. This is a time of jealousy, backbiting and undermining of each other among church members, but let us keep free from it at any cost or we will lose our souls. Be firm as a rock against compromise but keep as sweet as honey. Third, be wise in your support of spiritual missionaries. There are still some left who hold true to the Bible standards of holiness as we endeavor so to do. Don't support any whom you do not know—appearances or no appearance of spirituality. Know where your money goes and what it does. "Not all that glitters is gold." We are responsible to whom we give our money and some who appear to be spiritual are not always so. Pray, try the spirits, as Scripture says, and do not take up with everybody who has a big story to tell.

Above all, let us keep Divine love in our hearts toward everyone for only love will make it through to Heaven. We cannot fellowship nor agree with everyone but we can love their souls and keep bitterness and contention out of our lives. As never before, we need to be banded together with Divine love. "And if a house be divided against itself, that house cannot stand." Mark 3:25

## IV. PROJECTS FOR THE FUTURE

- (1) Our Campground—We can foster Biblical love and unity among us by refusing to scatter our money and interests to outside appeals, and by fortifying and building up our conference work and activities on our campground as well as in our local districts and churches. The State requirements have placed heavy financial loads upon us. This is OUR campground. Let us support and back it for our sake and for our children's sake.
- (2) Besides the needs of our camp, there are two other challenging projects. First, are our two Christian Day Schools—Dixonville and the new one, Stoneboro School, to be erected next to the campgrounds beside this Youth Tabernacle. How very fitting and timely! Do you want your boys and girls to get saved and sanctified, grow up to serve God in true holiness and make it home to Heaven? Then back Christian Day Schools whole-heartedly!
- (3) The other is a new venture made by our beloved Youth President and his wife, Rev. and Mrs. Paul David Stonebraker, who feel led of God to devote full time in Foreign Student Work in Pittsburgh where the nations meet. In this day when foreign fields are closing fast or are being greatly hindered by false isms and atheistic governments, we, the women of Allegheny Conference, have a challenge to Foreign Mission service laid at our very door—near enough that such students can even visit our camp in person and see for themselves the power of the gospel in human lives.

Let us put all three of these projects on our hearts, build up and strengthen our conference by united work and earnest prayers. We hope and pray

that every society will take a pledge now (subject to approval when you reach home) or as early as possible, to support the campground, the school nearest your locality, and the Foreign Student work in Pittsburgh. If you will all pull together, God will answer prayer and make Allegheny Conference a mighty bulwark for Holiness and missions.

### REPORT NO. 3

## COMMITTEE ON PROGRAM AND PLAN OF WORK

We recommend:

1. That the first meeting after conference each local society hold an installation service at which time the duties of each officer are read. (Note: New officers to assume duties first meeting after conference. Refer to Wesleyan Methodist Discipline, Paragraph 540, article 2.)

2. That the Program and Plan of Work, as revised at conference, be read and discussed at an early meeting, and frequently referred to thereafter.

3. a. That each society endeavor to hold a public monthly meeting, praying for those requests found in the WESLEYAN MISSIONARY, especially encourage each member to follow the prayer calendar page, and that stress be placed upon personal evangelism. That each member feel a personal responsibility to bring at least one soul to Christ during the year.

b. That each district during the year observe one missionary service.

4. a. That we urge our societies to promote the Woman's World Fellowship by meeting in two's and three's as convenient each Tuesday morning to pray for women around the world.

b. That the Pastor's wives endeavor to participate in a conference wide prayer vigil at 6:00 a.m. on Tuesdays.

c. That a service early in the conference year be given to the local WWF Secretary for enlisting prayer partners and encouraging prayer. Reports to be sent by May 1 to Conference WWF Secretary, Mrs. Mary Huntsman, 100 McCook Avenue, Carrollton, Ohio, 44615.

d. Since we are requested by the General WWF Secretary to have a minimum of ten prayer and fast services, we urge that all societies refrain from having meals at any missionary service since it does not become the interest of missions to be feasting when we should be praying.

5. a. That each society have an aggressive solicitor for the WESLEYAN MISSIONARY, whose duty it shall be to report all subscriptions to the district solicitor, send a quarterly report to the Conference Solicitor, Mrs. Erla Hoobler, R. D. 1, Hadley, Pa., 16130, strive to place the magazine in each home of the church and Sunday School, and achieve a net gain of at least two subscriptions. If possible, each society send at least one gift subscription to some interested family, library, hospital, etc.

b. When sending in subscriptions always be sure to identify your church by its number, and conference letter, AL, as published in the Conference Minutes. (Include Zip Code of subscribers.)

6. a. That all society officers and delegates to Annual Conference be members of the Wesleyan Methodist Church. We also recommend that Conference Society Members be members of the Wesleyan Methodist Church and their local Wesleyan Missionary Society.

b. That each local society have a nominating committee if possible.

c. That each society send the retiring president to conference and elect the incoming president or an officer as delegate, also make provision for the YMWB Superintendent or other proper representative to attend the public YMWB Rally, assuming their expenses if possible.

d. That each society instruct the delegate the amount to pledge at the public missionary service.

7. a. That each society use the WMS Handbook and other suitable helps, also encourage members to read the Reading Course Books as recommended by Gen-

eral Conference or the substituted Reading Course books as recommended by the Reading Course Secretary. All literature to be obtained from the Wesley Press, Box 2000, Marion, Indiana.

b. That each society have a program committee of which the president is chairman.

8. That each society be urged to respond to the Card Call Plan thus assisting in the Extension Program of the Church. NOTE: All money for Card Call, send to Church Extension and Evangelism Department, Rev. C. Wesley Lovin, Box 2000, Marion, Indiana. NOTE: Send all stubs with statistical report to Mrs. Elma Patterson, 17 6th Avenue, Greenville, Pa. 16125.

9. That inasmuch as the American Bible Society prints our Bible Transcripts without charge, we support it with prayer and finance. Send money direct to American Bible Society mentioning name of our denomination. This can be sent through regular treasurers.

10. a. That, where possible, each society have a Mercy and Help Committee, whose duty it shall be to visit the sick and needy and give aid where necessary, and send flowers or greeting cards to shut-ins.

b. That we encourage the giving of special memorial gifts as recommended by General Conference for the promotion of definite missionary work as living tribute to the memory of deceased loved ones, instead of the usual extravagant floral tribute.

11. That we put forth a special effort to secure every woman in the church as a member of the society and show a gain in membership.

12. That we follow the Denomination Monthly Emphasis: June—Installation of officers; September—Membership; October—Education; November—American Bible Society; December—White Christmas; January—Subscription; February—Woman's World Fellowship; March—Personal Evangelism; April—Self Denial.

13. That the delegate's credentials be sent two weeks before conference to the Conference WMS Secretary, Mrs. Eunice Comadoll, 20 South 13th Street, Indiana, Pa. 15701.

14. That statistical blanks be sent to Mrs. Elma Patterson, 17 6th Avenue, Greenville, Pa. 16125, at least by May 15. Send an itemized list with vouchers for "Other Objects".

15. a. That the Local Missionary Treasurer send money for both individual and society pledges made at conference and camp through the church treasurer and sub-treasurer. Designate on pink report blank who paid and for what project.

b. That local missionary treasurers keep a record of all money paid in pledges and report the amount on each pledge, at least two weeks before conference to the Conference WMS Treasurer, Mrs. Dolores Boughner, R. D. 1, New Wilmington, Pa. 16142.

16. That the report of the Reading Course Secretary be sent by January 15 to Mrs. Ellen Benninger, R. D. 1, Utica, Pa. 163621

### Financial

17. That \$1.00 dues be paid by all members, active and honorary. That said dues be sent undivided through the local church treasurer to the sub-treasurer. All monies to be sent in at least quarterly.

18. That we endeavor to raise one-quarter of the church education budget. This is to include the L.S.U. Pledges.

19. That each society contributes \$5.00 or more annually for the support of Hephzibah Home. This is not to apply on budget.

20. That each society contribute \$3.00 or more annually to the Medical Fund. This is not to apply on budget.

21. That each society contribute at least \$5.00 for General Church Extension and Evangelism. This is a budget item.

22. That \$.40 for each active member for conference entertainment be sent to the sub-treasurers before the books close, April 30. An extra donation of canned fruits and vegetables or cash will be much appreciated and needed.

23. That each society send \$.50 per active member for conference WMS working fund, which includes \$.10 per active member for the conference missionary cottage upkeep. This is not a budget item. (Southern W. Va. district exempted from the missionary cottage upkeep.)

24. That each society give the delegate an appropriate amount of money for the purchasing of literature for the society and for small offerings taken during conference.

### REPORT NO. 4 COMMITTEE ON RESOLUTIONS

Be it resolved:

1. That, since the theme of our Annual Conference is "The Christian—Facing a Growing Pagan World and Facing It Triumphantlly", our Woman's Missionary Society adopt this theme for the coming year.

2. a. That we give ourselves to intercessory prayer and fasting.

b. That we be faithful witnesses to those whom we contact, and when possible go out two by two in home visitation. "All things are possible to him that believeth." Mark 9:23

3. a. That we be faithful in attending our missionary services, and not hinder missionary work at home and abroad by being indifferent.

b. That we strive to obtain all of our men as honorary members.

4. That we give ourselves to prayerful study of the Word of God, the Wesleyan Missionary, and other helpful missionary materials.

5. That we adhere strictly to Scriptural methods:

a. In raising funds for missions, by sacrificial giving. "Freely ye have received, freely give." Matthew 10:8b.

b. In our programs by abstaining from the use of movies, slides, skits and plays.

6. a. That we diligently strive to maintain firm, loving discipline in our homes because we believe what Catherine Booth said, "The secret of lawlessness both toward God and man is that children were never taught to submit to the authority of their parents." Proverbs 22:6; Ephesians 6:4.

b. That we faithfully hold to the Biblical standards of our Discipline in creating a wholesome atmosphere in our homes.

c. That we stress the maintenance of a family altar in every home, with the children having a part. That we, as parents, faithfully instruct our children concerning the plan of salvation, urging them to obtain a definite personal experience, knowing that this will create in them the desire to follow Bible standards. Deuteronomy 6:5-9.

d. That we encourage our children to use their own Bible and have a regular system of reading and of memorizing Scripture in the home. Psalm 119:11.

e. That we as parents encourage our children to seek God's will in their life's vocation, rather than being influenced by the materialistic trends of our age. Proverbs 3:6.

f. That we pray faithfully for our children in school, that they may reject all erroneous teaching presented, and be careful in choosing their friends and associates. That we urge parents to take a firm stand against the immodest dress and other evil practices of the modern athletic and music program.

7. a. That we abstain from all worldly amusements, including the theater, the dance, cards, unwholesome radio programs, etc. That we abstain from reading or

allowing our children to read comic books and other undesirable magazines and books, and that we provide wholesome literature for our children.

b. That since modern mixed bathing is conducive to loose morals, we urge parents not to permit their children to visit such places of sinful amusement.

c. That we abstain from all Sabbath desecration such as buying Sunday newspaper, pleasure riding, social visiting, reunions, buying, etc. Isaiah 58:13, 14. Also that we refrain from patronizing establishments open on the Sabbath Day.

d. That we urge our people to refrain from having television sets in their home where it is in their power. That we refrain from viewing it in the home and elsewhere, realizing that television has a degrading influence, a tendency to make the soul lean, and the potential danger of sending souls, both young and old, to hell. Psalms 101:3.

8. a. That we as parents tell our children the true story of life as soon as they begin to ask questions. Also that they be instructed as to the sacredness of their bodies before they start to school in order that they may be prepared to withstand the low moral standards of this day. I Corinthians 6:19,20.

b. That we parents be companions to our children, and provide for them wholesome recreation frequently. That mothers carefully select their "baby-sitters" since there is so much immorality prevalent today.

c. That as far as possible we know where our children are and what they are doing at all times. That we restrain our children from attending slumber parties and be very cautious in allowing them to spend the night with friends.

9. a. That we uphold by precept and example modesty of dress, as becometh holiness, by which we mean wearing clothing at a modest length between the knee and ankle, both standing and sitting, with long sleeves and modest neckline, which things accompany purity and deep spirituality. I Timothy 2:9, 10. That we adhere to Deut. 22:5, "The woman shall not wear that which pertaineth unto a man—for all that do so are an abomination unto the Lord thy God!"

b. That we refrain from wearing all jewelry, which includes, brooches, showy watch bands, and all other ornaments such as sparkling buttons and sequins. Isa. 3:16-24; I Peter 3:3, 4. Also, that we do not wear very sheer, seamless, or nude shades of hose, shoes with open toes and heels, or spike heels (including all heights of pencil heels), or hats which display flowers, veiling and other superfluous adornments. Furthermore, we urge our women to wear hose and dress modestly that we may be examples of modesty at all times, both in public and in the home.

c. That we also refrain from the worldly style of the "Long bob", and cutting, trimming and curling the hair. I Corinthians 11:15. We believe with John Wesley on the Scripture, I Timothy 2:9, that "brodered hair" means curled hair.

d. That we also dress our boys and girls modestly, thus teaching them early the necessity of modesty in dress. Not permitting our boys to go without shirts, to wear shorts or sheer shirts, and that our girls wear long hose and not be allowed to wear sheer clothing or shorts, slacks, or pedal pushers.

e. That we strive to be neat in appearance.

10. That we urge avoidance of unnecessary debts, and the neglecting of long standing bills. "Owe no man anything." Romans 13:8.

11. a. That as far as possible, we refrain from patronizing establishments selling intoxicating beverages, and also that we oppose the use of tobacco in all its forms since we greatly detest the use and effect of both. II Corinthians 7:1.

b. We urge that our children be given scientific instruction on the evils of tobacco, alcohol, and all narcotic drugs.

c. That we be patriotic by displaying the American Flag in observing national holidays, thereby honoring God Who gives us freedom and liberty.

12. That resolutions be read in each society semi-annually.

### CONVENTION MINUTES

#### First Day July 16, 1965

The 34th annual Youth Convention of the Allegheny Conference convened on Stoneboro Camp Ground with the first service on July 15, 1965. At this service the appointments for temporary organization were read. The first business meeting was held on July 16, 1965 and was called to order by Rev. P. D. Stonebraker. Rev. David Price led in singing "It Cleanseth Me." Rev. H. E. Robertson and Rev. James Hogg led in prayer. Rev. Robert Boughner and David Cherry were appointed to fill the credential committee. Roll was called with 66 delegates, 28 pastors and 24 youth presidents present. The bar of conference was set as the first 12 rows of the center and right hand tier of seats and the platform. The president's report was read and adopted. The treasurer's report was read and referred to the Auditing Committee. Reports were given by these zone chairmen: Templeton, Charles Martin; Akron, Allen Messner; Titusville, Richard Price; Newcastle, Roy Wade. Revision of the temporary organization was read. Adjourned by vote.

#### Second Day July 17, 1965

The second business meeting was called to order by President Stonebraker. Rev. Johannes Maas led in singing "Glory To His Name." Rev. T. A. Robertson led in prayer. Roll was called with 78 delegates present, 34 pastors and 26 youth presidents. Tellers were appointed: First Team: Wayne Carpenter, Jerry Diffenderfer, Rodger Whippo. Second Team: Charles Stearns, John Durfee, Randy West. P. D. Stonebraker and Sheridan Rainey were nominated for president. Balloting for president ensued. Report of the committee on Goals and Methods was read and adopted. Efficiency Standard report was read and accepted as read. The ballot for president resulted in the election of P. D. Stonebraker with 115 ballots out of 136. Prewitt Duncan and Charles Martin were nominated for vice president. Balloting for vice president ensued. The Resolutions committee report was read and adopted. The ballot for vice president resulted in the election of Prewitt Duncan with 114 ballots out of 135. David Phelps and John Dye were nominated for secretary. Balloting for secretary ensued. Rev. F. E. Mansell reported on the International Student Evangelism work. The ballot for secretary resulted in the election of David Phelps with 102 ballots out of 129. William Rosengreen and William Cornell were nominated for treasurer. Balloting for treasurer ensued. The report of the efficiency standard revision was read and adopted. The Finance committee reported audit of the Treasurer's Books, finding them to be correct and in order. The report was adopted. John Dye was elected for Prayer League Secretary. William Cornell was elected for Efficiency Standard Chairman. The Statistical report was read and adopted. The ballot for treasurer resulted in the election of William Rosengreen with 120 ballots out of 133. David Phelps and Prewitt Duncan were nominated for delegates to General Conference. Voting ensued. The report of nominations for Zone chairmen was read and adopted. A motion was made and passed that our new project be the supporting of the International Student Evangelism

work. Prewitt Duncan received 107 ballots and David Phelps received 99 ballots and were elected as delegates to General Conference. William Rosngreen with 99 ballots and William Cornell with 90 ballots were elected as alternate delegates to General Conference. Northern West Va. Zone report was given. A motion that all unfinished business be left in the hands of the Executive Committee. The minutes of both days were read and approved. We adjourned by motion.

Young people, never before have you needed the guarding and guiding council of the Holy Spirit as you do today! A multitude of enticing voices are endeavoring to ensnare you. Grave dangers, severe testings and unusual temptations are sure to assail you. Your safety, in God's grace, is assured only as you walk in daily light and keep stride with the personal directives of the Holy Spirit.

First, I would express my hearty thanks and sincere appreciation to each of you and your respective societies for your prayers, patience and cooperation this past year—especially during my illness. I can not repay nor speak words which convey my feelings of gratitude, but I do pray "the God of all grace" to abundantly repay you for every way your help was extended to me.

During the past year, it has been a joy to work with the other members of your Executive Council and cooperatively seek God's will for the Conference youth work. In all matters of importance, we have sought and appreciated the council of our Conference leaders. Rev. H. C. VanWormer, Rev. T. A. Robertson and Rev. F. E. Mansell. These men have a sincere interest in you young people and want God's best for you.

We also appreciate the service and work of your respective zone chairmen this year. Though my health did not permit a very extensive coverage of the Conference in rallies, yet the monthly reports I received indicated God's manifest help in the various zone services.

The new "Allegheny Conference Youth Reporter" was a partial success. The subscription list exceeded 400. Several difficulties which arose however, prohibited the "Reporter" from being used to its best advantage. First, the dormitory fire at the Salem Bible College where Rev. Paul Treese was housed, evidently destroyed a few of our addresses. Secondly, when complaints came in, we discovered that the postal services were neglectfully failing to send many copies. Third, my illness prohibited the regular preparation of this paper in the more recent months. —We do however, deeply appreciate the service of the several talented persons who wrote regularly for the "Reporter."

As best I could, I endeavored to be faithful in the youth work you committed to me. The following therefore, is an itemized summary of my limited labors with some recommendations:

- III. Executive Council Meetings
  1. Nov. 21, 1964—At the Pittsburgh parsonage to arrange plans for this convention.
  2. April 7, 1965—At the Ministerial Institute, Massillon, Ohio, to complete and verify final preparations for this Convention.
- IV. Personal Labors
  1. Mailed 158 pieces of mail. In addition, Miss Helen Smolenak made mailings for me.
  2. Traveled 1,423 miles in the interests of the youth work.
  3. Wrote two "Youth Columns" for the Conference Messenger.

4. Editorially prepared 8 issues of the "Allegheny Conference Youth Reporter." (Vice President, Prewitt Duncan, prepared a ninth issue.)
5. Editorially prepared the program booklets for this Convention.

1. Two new Wesleyan Youth societies were organized this year.  
Aug. 16, 1964—The Apollo youth group was duly organized as a Wesleyan Youth Society.  
March 19, 1965—The Blairsville youth group was duly organized as a Wesleyan Youth Society. (V. Pres., Prewitt Duncan presided.)

VI. Recommendations

May I recommend the following:

1. That much emphasis be given to prayer, both in our local and zone services and that each local group be an active, organized Prayer League Society.  
I further urge each praying young person to participate in the prayer program of the Conference.
2. That each local society either cooperate with a Zone Youth Week Revival or prayerfully strive for a Spirit-directed revival in their own church.
3. That you read the selected books of the denominational "Wesleyan Youth Reading Course" which will be commended to you by your Executive Council.
4. That in addition to the afore-mentioned books, which will be commended, additional books be selected which will provide you with choice reading for a year. "A Book A Month," or a total of 12 books.
5. That a new, probably less detailed "Efficiency Standard" be adopted by this assembly.
6. That the "Allegheny Conference Youth Reporter" be continued for another year, and that an editorial staff be appointed to aid in a more regular preparation of this little monthly.
7. That a local-to-zone, zone-to-Conference wide quiz again be conducted this year on a New Testament book—possibly the book of Romans.
8. That we strive for a gain in youth membership this year and a goal of at least two newly organized locals.

I sincerely thank you for your prayers, patience and cooperation, both this year as well as the past five years.

**REPORT OF THE COMMITTEES ON GOALS AND METHODS**

The Committee on Goals and Methods submits the following report:

1. That every church organize a Wesleyan Youth Society.
2. That each society send the name and address of the local W.Y. President and Secretary to the Conference W.Y. President not later than one week after election.
3. a. That each society pay annually:
  - (1) \$2.00 per full member for General Conference Dues
  - (2) .50 per full member for Conference Dues
  - (3) .50 per full member Annual Convention Entertainment
 b. That each unorganized society pay:
  - (1) \$ .50 per each attendee for Conference Dues
  - (Local W.Y. treasurer's books close April 30)
4. a. That our pastors and local W. Y. Presidents carefully read and do their best to carry out the program of our Efficiency Standard.
  - b. That a committee composed of the Pastor, W. Y. President, and Secretary or the Efficiency Standard Chairman, shall grade the local society quarterly, according to the Efficiency Standard. This rating shall be submitted to the Conference Efficiency Standard Chairman quarterly and the annual report two weeks before the Annual Young People's Conference.
  - c. That the secretary keep such records as are necessary for this committee to make this rating.
5. That we heartily support the Conference W. Y. Program and projects, inclusive of Pioneer.
6. That each W. Y. heartily support our missionary endeavor according to the requirements of the Discipline with one service a month for missions and we suggest that the offering of said meeting be given for missions.

7. That each local society strive to engage in as many of the following as possible:

- a. Street and institutional meetings
- b. Cottage prayer meetings
- c. Tract distribution
- d. Door-knob evangelism
- e. Visitation of sick and shut-ins
- f. Cooperation with child evangelism, Daily Vacation Bible School and Religious Education in public schools.
- g. Become a member of Conference Brigade of Intercessory Commandos.

8. That each local W. Y. cooperate 100 percent to make Wesleyan Youth Week all God wants it to be, and strive to interest other young people outside the church in these services.

9. a. That a Local Prayer League Secretary, to cooperate with the Conference Prayer League Secretary, be elected to recruit volunteers for the W. Y. League and administer other duties of the Prayer League within the local society.

b. That the name and address of this Secretary be sent at once to the Conference Prayer League Secretary.

10. That each society send the President, two delegates, chaperon, and pastor, with expenses paid, to the Annual W. Y. Convention.

11. a. That the Conference W. Y. President arrange to hold at least one service in each zone of each district during the year.

b. That his traveling expenses be paid by each zone visited.

12. That these goals and methods be read in each local society within the first month after receiving the conference minutes.

13. That each W. Y. send by mail all statistical reports to the Conference Youth Secretary, not later than July 1.

14. That the District and Zones evaluate their activities according to the following point system and an appropriate award be given to one achieving the highest percentage.

15 points for having at least 8 Rallies per year (West Virginia excepted)

10 points for the organization of each new society.

10 points for a Paid Conference Budget for every organized society. (50 cents per member)

10 points for District or Zone Youth revival

15 points for meeting Zone pledge.

5 extra points for over-subscribing the Zone pledge 10%.

5 points for Conference dues for every unorganized society.

10 points for Chairman attending Annual Conference Convention.

5 points for Chairman reporting the year's activities to the Annual Conference Convention.

10 points for report of Zone Rallies sent to the Conference Messenger

5 points for report of one Zone Rally sent to the Wesleyan Youth magazine.

15. That each local W. Y. Treasurer submit, to their District or Zone Chairman, a report of the total members of their local society and the amount of dues paid. (Due two weeks prior to Youth Convention)

## REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON RESOLUTIONS

We, the Committee on Resolutions of the Wesleyan Youth of the Allegheny Conference submit the following:

1. That we seek to have a spiritual program which is God-honoring, Christ-centered, Spirit-directed, and where personal convictions are stressed, rather than a social program.

a. That each society have two adult counselors, one of which shall be the pastor.

b. That there be a period of time for instruction on the articles of our doctrinal truth, emphasizing the Work of Creation and Redemption.

c. That we instruct our young people on their behavior toward those of the opposite sex, and marrying in the Will of God, as stated in II Cor. 6:14-18.

2. That each society shall appoint a proper chaperon for its group attending the annual Convention.

b. Each individual shall be responsible for his conduct and attendance at all services.



- c. The presence of all pastors is requested.
- d. Only those who conform to these resolutions be elected to the Convention as delegate.
- 3. That we prayerfully strive for a Youth Week Revival.
- 4. That we, as Wesleyan Youth, govern our lives by adhering to the Standards of the Bible and the principles set forth in the Discipline, as interpreted by the Allegheny Conference.
- 5. That we, as Christian youth, have a definite plan of Bible reading, Bible memorization, and prayer, and accept the privileges of carrying a soul burden.
- 6. a. That we refrain from reading unwholesome literature such as comics, Detective and True Story or other literature detrimental to our spiritual life.
- b. That we strongly urge our youth to develop Christian character through careful and extensive reading of edifying literature.
- c. That we read the books of the "Wesleyan Youth Reading Course" which will be selected and commended by our Allegheny Conference Youth Executive Council.
- d. That the W. Y. augment the church and Sunday School library, or where there is none, sponsor one with good church literature which is approved by the pastor and adult counselor.
- 7. That because of the physical, moral, and spiritual degeneration resulting from the use of tobacco, narcotics, and alcoholic beverages, especially among our youth, we take a vigorous stand against these evils.
- 8. That in view of the fact that he who is a friend of the world is an enemy of God, we urge all our youth to take a positive stand against worldliness, in that we refrain from the following:
  - a. Card playing, games of chance, theater attendance, public and mixed bathing, dance halls (including participation in Senior Proms) skating rinks, bowling, circuses, carnivals, fairs, and viewing television.
  - b. Wearing of jewelry.
  - c. Wearing of immodest and worldly style of dress, both boys and girls.
  - d. Sabbath desecration, such as buying and selling, pleasure riding, etc.
- 9. That due to the problems of modern education, we will support our own Christian day schools with our prayers and finances.
- 10. That these resolutions be read in each society semi-annually.
