JOURNAL OF DAILY PROCEEDINGS.

The forty-sixth session of the Kansas Annual Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church assembled in the auditorium at Miltonvale, Kas., August 29th, 1916, at 1:45 P. M., President P. A. Miller presiding. Opening song, "Come and Dine." Prayer by Brother J. E. Dillman. Brother Miller then read and commented at length on a part of Philippians 2 and led in prayer.

Roll Call answered to by 17 Elders and 6 Licentiates.

Roll Call and reading and approval of minutes.

President reads a letter of greeting and thanks from J. M. Beecher, President of the Tri-County Holiness Association; also reads his yearly report. See report.

Motion made to adopt report. Motion amended to refer the financial part of the report to the Committee on Finance. Motion carried as amended.

Motion made and approved that the matter of our Union Camp Meeting and our greetings to the Tri-County Holiness Association

be referred to the Committee on Thanks, and that a copy of the resolution be mailed the Association.

Committee on Credentials report the name of Charles Hovey, of Miltonvale, as a delegate to the Conference. Delegate seated.

On motion adjourned to the call of the chair.

Committee on Finance report recommending that an order be drawn on the Conference Treasurer for \$138.82, balance due the President on his salary. Report adopted.

On motion adjourned to the call of the chair.

Conference called to order by the President at 11:20 A. M. On motion Brother T. J. Pomeroy elected Committee on Courtesy.

Committee on Credentials report the names of James Woodham and Ethel Hibler as delegates from the Chapman Creek charge.

Examination of character taken up. The following pastors were called: E. H. Cook, George Gurtler, F. E. Shivers, Ernest Coates. After being told that their characters were passed, each read their statistical report and gave a statement regarding their Christian experience.

On motion adjourned.

WEDNESDAY AFTERNOON.

Devotions led by Brother Charles Jenson, who led in prayer and read 1 Thes. 5.

Roll call and reading and approval of Minutes.

Committee on Credentials report the name of W. S. Ashcraft, delegate from the Crawford charge, and also read a communication from the Crawford charge recommending Brother William Millard to the Conference to be ordained to Elder's Orders.

On motion delegate seated and the recommendation to Elder's Orders referred to the Committee on Itineracy and Orders.

On motion a rising vote of thanks was given to Sister Imo Jones, Conference Tithing Secretary, for her faithful service and for the attractive chart which she has so kindly prepared.

Examination of character resumed. The following names were called: Rev. S. F. Wilson, Conference Evangelist A. B. Hotchkiss, President P. A. Miller, Rev. T. J. Pomeroy, I. C. and Fannie Dunbar, W. C. Elliott. Their characters having been previously passed upon, reports were read and Christian experiences related.

Committee on Credentials report the name of Sister Alice Lienard as a delegate from the Kansas City charge. Delegate seated.

President H. W. McDowell was introduced to the Conference and made a few appropriate remarks.

On motion the visiting brethren invited to an honorary seat in the Conference.

Orders of the Day called for. Preaching by Rev. W. L. Carkuff.

Conference called to order by the chair at 4:15 P. M.

Resolution read recommending that each charge follow some system in regard to supporting their pastors.

Motion made and approved to adopt the resolution.

After some discussion a motion was made and approved to postpone the resolution until a larger number of the Conference is present. Carried.

Informal discussion with regard to holding our annual Camp Meeting. It was suggested that it might be well to have our Annual Conference precede the Camp Meeting, and if a special evangelist was employed that he be present to preach during the entire Conference and Camp. It was also thought best by some to shorten the time of the Camp Meeting and have the Conference and Camp Meeting occupy only two Sundays instead of three as at present.

Motion made and approved that we have our Annual Conference precede the Camp Meeting.

Motion made that in arranging the time for the next Annual Conference that the same be left with the Conference President, Camp Meeting Board, and the Connectional Officials.

Examination of character resumed. The following names were called: C. H. Dow, F. C. Hill, Porter Willis, H. E. Macy. Their characters were passed, reports of their services were given and their Christian experiences related.

On motion adjourned.

THURSDAY MORNING.

Opened by singing "Revive us again." Devotions were led by Brother Jackson, who led in prayer and commented upon a portion of the 12th of Romans.

Committee on Credentials report the following delegates, which were, on motion, seated:

Committee on Credentials further report the name of Mrs. M. J. Hampton, alternate delegate from the Eskridge charge.

Motion made that in view of the fact that the regular delegate from the Eskridge charge found it necessary to return, that we seat the alternate.

Since some of the Licentiates are interested in again having an Institute, a motion was made and approved that arrangements be made to have an Institute this coming year. The question was discussed by several members of the Conference.

Motion made to refer the matter to the Committee on Itineracy and Orders and that they be instructed to prepare some plan regarding the course of study, also the advisability of holding the Institute.

Motion made and approved that the Conference purchase one set of the new books in the course of study for the benefit of the teachers.

Resolution regarding some system in connection with the pastor's salary was again read and discussed.

Motion made and approved that we refer the above to a committee. The following were elected: Brothers C. H. Dow, A. B. Hotchkiss, and E. H. Cook.

Orders of the Day called for. Hour given to the discussion of Sunday School work. Some excellent talks were given showing the great importance of the Sunday School work.

Conference Sunday School Secretary reads his annual report. On motion report adopted. See report.

President reads the financial report of our Union Camp Meeting. On motion adopted. See report.

On motion adjourned. Benediction by Rev. G. B. Howard.

THURSDAY AFTERNOON.

Devotions were led by Brother Oliver Wilson, who read the 124th and 125th Psalms and led in prayer.

Roll call and reading and approval of the minutes.

Orders of the Day. Election of Permanent Officers.

Ballot for President. Brother P. A. Miller having received a majority of all the votes cast on the first ballot was declared elected President for the ensuing year.

Ballot for Vice-President. Brother F. C. Hill having received a majority of all the votes cast on the first ballot was declared elected.

Ballot for Secretary. E. H. Cook having received a majority of all the votes cast on the first ballot was declared elected.

The Secretary was instructed to cast the vote of the Conference for F. E. Shivers as Assistant Secretary.

The Secretary was instructed to cast the vote of the Conference for Rev. I. L. DeWitt as Conference Treasurer, and for Oliver Wilson as Assistant Treasurer.

Motion made and approved that our President serve as one of the Quarterly Conference Evangelists. Carried.

Ballot for the Second Quarterly Conference Evangelist. Rev. A. B. Hotchkiss having received a majority of all the votes cast on the first ballot was declared elected.

Motion made and approved that in electing the Conference Board of Trustees, we elect the first ministerial member for one year, the second member for two years, the third for three years. The first lay member for one year and the second lay member for two years.

Ballot for the first member of Board of Trustees.

Fred C. Hill having received a majority of all the votes cast was elected as the first member.

Ballot for second member. Charles H. Dow elected on the first ballot as the second member of the Board of Trustees.

Ballot for the third ministerial member.

Silas W. Bond having received a majority of all the votes cast was declared elected as the third member.

Ballot for a lay member. No election on the first ballot. Samuel B. Burgan elected as the first lay member on the second ballot.

Ballot for second lay member. Henry B. Parsons elected on

the second ballot as the second lay member of the Conference Board of Trustees.

On motion Rev. F. C. Hill was re-elected as a member of the Committee on Itineracy and Orders. Term expires in 1920.

Rev. Mr. Tate, of the Presbyterian Church of Miltonvale, was introduced to the Conference.

Motion made and approved that we postpone the election of the Committees of the Conference until tomorrow morning and hear at this time our Connectional Editor.

Rev. F. A. Butterfield, Connectional Editor, addresses the Conference. He emphasized the fact that the Lord would hold us responsible for our faithfulness in carrying forward the Missionary, Educational and Publishing interests of the Connection. He believed that there was at the present time greater spiritual unity of the Church than for years.

On motion adjourned. Benediction by Brother Butterfield.

FRIDAY MORNING.

Devotions led by Rev. Trauger, who read a portion of the 8th of Romans and led in prayer.

Roll call and reading and approval of the Minutes.

Committee on Boundaries report recommending that the name of the Crawford charge be changed to read Langley, and that the Church be known as the "Grace Church." Report adopted.

Committee on Credentials report the name of Dwight Osborn, alternate delegate from the Hall charge. Delegate seated.

Committee on Moral Reform reports. Motion made and approved that the report be adopted and that the same be published in the Wesleyan Methodist, also the local paper.

Motion made and approved that the balance of about \$70.00 pledged toward meeting the expense of insuring the Tabernacle be referred to the Committee on Finance.

Committee on Finance report recommending that an order be drawn on the Conference Treasurer for \$2.00 in favor of the Secretary and 50 cents in favor of the Treasurer for their expenses. The committee further recommends that we pay to P. M. Martin \$10.00, balance due him for his expenses to the General Conference last year. The committee also requests that the names of those who have subscribed to the Tabernacle fund be given to Rev. S. F. Wilson for collection, and that the balance of indebtedness, including insurance that is unpaid at the end of thirty days be

paid from the Conference Fund, a balance being reserved for that purpose. Report adopted.

First reading of the report on Pastoral Relations given. Reading of the Conference Evangelists' dates for the first quarter.

Committee elected to act upon the resolution with regard to the pastor's salary report. Motion made and approved to adopt the resolution. See resolution.

Motion made and approved that the pastors of the various charges recommend the Budget System as set forth in the Discipline.

Committee on Itineracy and Orders report with regard to a Theological Institute, also requirements of licentiates regarding the course of study. They recommend that the licentiates read each book twice before taking an examination upon the same. Motion made to amend the report by requiring only one careful reading of the books, with notes, before examination. A second amendment was made that notes be required on each chapter of the books read. Motion carried as amended. See report.

Committee on Sunday School report. On motion adopted. See report.

Examination of character taken up. Rev. W. L. Carkuff called. His character having been previously passed, he read his statistical report and related his Christian experience.

On motion adjourned. Benediction by Rev. H. H. Williams.

FRIDAY AFTERNOON.

Singing "This world is not my home." Devotions led by Brother Abe Wilson, who read Hebrews 2 and led in prayer.

Brother Alex. Ballard wishes to resign as a member of the Missionary Board.

Motion made to accept the resignation of Brother Ballard and that Brother Kinsley Morgan be elected in his stead.

Committee on Credentials report the name of J. A. Reimer as a delegate from the Raymond charge. Delegate seated.

Committee on Finance report recommending that we allow an offering by subscription to be taken by the W. H. & F. M. Society in their evening service tonight for the debt on the Dormitory.

Committee on Apportionment report. On motion adopted. See report.

Committee on Pastoral Relations gave the second reading of their report.

Motion made and approved that we continue to hold Holiness Conventions and that they be divided as shown in last year's Minutes, and that the Chairman of the various districts be the same as last year, except that Rev. J. L. Whitney be Chairman of the First District and Rev. I. L. DeWitt Chairman of the Second District.

Motion made and approved that the Committee on Itineracy and Orders be the Committee of the Theological Institute.

Motion made that we set aside \$20.00 from the Conference Fund to meet the expenses of the Teachers to the Institute.

Motion made that Rev. T. J. Pomeroy be the Conference Sunday School Secretary for the ensuing year.

On approved motion Sister Imo Jones was elected Conference Tithing Secretary.

Sunday School Board.—Rev. P. A. Miller was elected as Chairman of the Sunday School Board. E. H. Cook was added as the third member

On approved motion the President's salary for the ensuing year was fixed at \$700.00.

On motion adjourned for committee work.

Motion made that the Conference, through its Board of Trustees, rent the Dining Hall, not including furniture or dishes, to two young married families who expect to attend the College.

Motion made and approved that we charge \$6.00 per month for the rent of the Dining Hall.

Orders of the Day. Hour given to Educational work in charge of President H. W. McDowell. After singing, prayer was offered by Rev. F. C. Hill. Brother McDowell gave a profitable and interesting address in regard to our Educational work. Short talks were also given by Brothers Millard, Coates and Wilson. The Educa-

tional service closed with a vocal solo by Prof. Kittering.

Committee on Books and Periodicals report. Motion made and approved that the report be adopted and same be published in the Wesleyan Methodist. See report.

Committee on Thanks render their report. On motion report adopted. See report.

Committee on the State of the Work render a verbal report. They state that they find some very encouraging features in connection with the work of the Conference. Some of the charges have increased much in spirituality and membership. The work on some of the charges, however, is not so encouraging. Certain conditions are existing that seem to hinder the best results. On motion report adopted.

On motion adjourned. Benediction by Brother C. H. Dow.

SATURDAY AFTERNOON.

Opened by singing "Shall we gather at the rvier." Prayer by Brother Cook.

Roll call. Reading and approval of the Minutes.

Committee on Pastoral Relations give the third reading of their report. On motion report adopted. See report.

Examination of character resumed. The following pastors were called: Oliver Wilson, William Millard, Alfred Drake. Their characters having been passed, reports were given and experiences related.

Committee on Statistics report. On motion report adopted. See report.

Motion made and approved that a mail box be placed on the Conference Camp Ground for the use of all who attend the Conference.

Motion made and approved that the Secretary be authorized to embody in the Minutes of the Conference a resolution with reference to raising funds for the Superannuated Ministers' Fund.

BOOKS AND PERIODICALS.

That champion of pure literature and giant reformer, Wilbur F. Craft, in the last issue of the Wesleyan Methodist says: "The amusement craze, with its strong 'yellow streak,' has invaded even our publishing houses, libraries and reading rooms. Magazines have crowded out about all reading save daily papers. Where they were once mighty howitzers of civic reform, they have now yielded to the public tendency to give all of life outside of business hours to amusement and have become—most of them—mere squirts of sex stories with which the land is being flooded to the serious injury of mind and body. The injury comes not only from the carrion with which their readers are being fed, but also from the displacement of great books which are 'necessities of life' to the soul of man and the spirit of the nation."

We are convinced that the widespread prostitution of the American press to the wholesale publication and nation-wide propagation of impure literature in the form of "yellow journalism," books, magazines and suggestive cartoons have reached such vast proportions as to become a nation-wide peril and fearful source of corrupting our young people and the reading public.

In the department of religious literature there is an increase of unorthodox publications. Not only are the deceptive writings of C. T. Russell on the increase, but in so-called orthodox circles there is an alarming and ever increasing movement to supplant the Bible doctrine of the one and only atonement based on the divinity of Christ and his meritorious sacrifice for sin-cursed humanity, with false logic and destructive criticism that utterly divests Christ of His divinity, robs His atonement of all merit, banishes hell and all future punishment on the theory of that double (but false) logic that "man is too good to be damned and God is too good to damn man."

Our only means of counteracting this great peril is by the united effort of God's saved and sanctified people in increasing the publication and wider diffusion of God's Word and all Holiness literature and pure, wholesome secular literature.

To this end we would respectfully call the attention of the people called Wesleyan Methodists to Wesleyan Methodist publications. We believe our church paper, the Wesleyan Methodist, stands equal, if not in the lead, of any church paper in the land, and should be in the home and hands of every Wesleyan Methodist. Our Sunday School literature ably meets the demand of that department of church work and no church can be termed a loyal church that bears the name "Wesleyan Methodist" and substitutes other publications.

Our Publishing House can furnish Bibles and all the religious books at prices as low and sometimes lower than any publishing house in the country. Let us pledge ourselves to loyally patronize our own publications and the interest of our own house in preference to all others.

MORAL REFORM.

The mother of Wesleyan Methodism is Reform.

When J. Horton, L. Lee, O. Scott, and L. R. Sunderland issued the call through the columns of the True Wesleyan for the Andover Convention, Wesleyan Methodism was born—born to stand boldly for reform principles. Only as we stand out against the evils of the present day are we worthy to be called the sons of those mighty men of God.

Therefore we renewedly pledge ourselves to stand fearlessly against worldliness that would entangle our feet and hinder us in the race for eternal life.

We reaffirm the position taken in our Discipline that "Jesus was the only begotten Son of God, born of the Virgin Mary, suffered under Pontius Pilot, was crucified, dead and buried to be a sacrifice, not only for original sin, but also for the actual transgressions of men, and to reconcile us to God." Many are claiming environment and good breeding sufficient, but Christ said, "Ye must be born again." Let us hold tenaciously to this fundamental truth.

We believe the "entertainment craze" so prevalent in our midst

today, to be one of Satan's strongholds to draw our young people away from God, and is sapping the spiritual life of many churches.

Therefore we take a firm stand against it, and pray for so much of the Spirit and power of God that the world will hunger for the true pleasure in Christ.

In view of the fact that public sentiment is rising against the liquor traffic, and because it is a menace to the home and self-government, we stand unequivocally: 1st, By speaking against it from our pulpits, in our Sunday Schools and our daily conversation. 2nd, By our votes in the support of the present Prohibition Presidential candidate, J. Frank Hanly.

Jesus said, "In secret have I said nothing." We believe His voice is still silent in the secrecies of our land, therefore we stand boldly against secret and oath-bound orders.

Since the sin of Sabbath desecration has become so prevalent, and we as a Church are drifting from the standard of the Bible and our book of Discipline, to the extent that visiting and pleasure riding are taking the place of divine worship, we recommend that as a Church we observe and use our influence against all forms of Sabbath desecration.

SABBATH SCHOOLS.

It is estimated that 90 per cent. of the membership of the Church is gathered through the Sabbath School. The failure of much teaching and much Sunday School effort is due to the fact that the Sunday School lesson is taught without the power of the Divine Spirit back of the Word. That which makes the lesson convincing and awakening in its influence upon the unsaved, and nourishing to the child of God is the power of the Holy Spirit that accompanies it. Therefore we see the need of Spirit-filled teachers. As childhood is the time when the heart is tender and most impressive and when the mind easily retains what is brought to its attention, we ought to give special attention to the children, and get as many of them into the Sunday School as possible. The Cradle Roll Department permits us to begin with them, and through them to the hearts of the parents, very early in life. This department should not be neglected.

At a proper age they should be promoted from the Cradle Roll

to the Sabbath School proper. It may be encouraging to arrange a programme to be rendered on this occasion. We believe that it would add to the interest and arouse enthusiasm if the classes in the Sunday School be arranged on a graded basis, thus giving a regulated system of advancement from one class to another.

Not only are we able to reach those who are able to leave their homes and go to the place where the Sunday School may be in session, but those who are not able to do this can be reached through the Home Department, and we urge that this department be not neglected.

We call attention to the need of having trained teachers to instruct the different classes.

Our Connection has already arranged for a Teacher's Training Class and provided a course of study for the same. We recommend that each circuit endeavor to arrange a class, and follow the studies as prescribed. We also recommend that a more hearty co-operation be given between the local Sunday School workers and the Conference and Connectional Sunday School Secretaries, and that each pastor and Sunday School Superintendent put forth an effort to arrange for and attend Sunday School Rallies and Conventions.

RESOLUTION.

Resolved, That as a Conference we admit that we have not done our full duty in raising funds for our Superannuated Ministers. Those sacrificing soldiers of the Cross who have spent their best years and strength in faithful service in the Church, and now through the infirmities of old age are unable to continue in regular work, should by no means be neglected.

Resolved, therefore, That we give all due attention to this matter and ask that each charge in the Conference raise at least 50 cents per member toward this fund. It should be understood by the various charges that all of the money paid into the Superannuated Fund is applied to the principal and the money loaned out on gilt-edge security, and only the interest on the principal is paid out to the superannuated ministers.

RESOLUTION.

While fully persuaded that God will and does provide for those who labor in the interest of His kingdom, yet we do not believe that this truth justifies carelessness or neglect upon the part of the Lord's people. It is with a view to correcting certain conditions that exist and permanently improving the work of the various charges of the Conference that we offer the following.

Many of the pastors of the Conference do not feel like asking any stated salary for their services, but accept the work and leave it with the charge calling them to attend to this matter. This would be well and good if the church would fully feel its obligation and follow some plan and system toward recompensing the one called to labor over them in the Lord. But in many cases the stewards are inexperienced and the church follows no system of giving and lacks in interest and spirituality, and the willingness of the pastor to serve without any stated salary is, in some cases, taken advantage of and he goes poorly paid for his services, even though in many cases the charge was abundantly able to pay a good liberal salary. We believe it would please God and be for the betterment of the work, if the Conference would seek to correct this fault by establishing a scriptural and uniform method of giving on each charge and thus provide for the proper support of her

ministers. In order to secure this we believe it will be necessary for the Conference to authorize the Conference President and Conference Evangelist at the first quarterly meeting to assist each charge and the stewards of the same in carrying out and complying with a financial system as set forth in our book of Discipline.

Resolved, therefore, That we recommend that each charge of the Conference employing a pastor, will, at their first business meeting, agree if possible, on some certain amount that they will raise toward the pastor's support.

Resolved, further, That we recommend that the stewards of the charge ask each member of the class at least to subscribe something toward this amount. As to the best methods of paying this amount we earnestly recommend that we follow the Scriptural command to "lay by on the first day of the week as the Lord has prospered us." We believe it will be well to let the morning offering, after counted and credited by the stewards, or the evening offering where there are two or more appointments and only one offering is taken, be given to the pastor toward his support. We believe this rule of giving should be insisted upon for the good of the work. The envelope system will greatly aid, no doubt, in establishing this rule of giving. We would also recommend that it be understood as the wish of the Conference that this resolution be read and acted upon by the various charges of the Conference at their first business meeting.

In case the pastor prefers that no stated salary be agreed upon, the charge may follow the above, except in the matter of agreeing upon a stated amount.
