

Record of the Daily Business Proceedings

TUESDAY AFTERNOON

On Tuesday afternoon at 2:20, June 28th, 1949, the Champlain Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America met for its 107th Annual Session. The Camp ground at West Chazy, N. Y. was the place of this gathering as in previous years since 1928.

The first meeting was opened with a trumpet duet by Rev. Aldis Lamos and Mr. Roger Olson. The Rev. Marjean Bennett led in singing "Love Divine". Prayer was offered by Rev. Ralph Seaman.

The Vice-President occupied the Chair, and the roll of Elders, Conference Preachers, and Delegates was called.

Mrs. Helen Tyler sang, "It's Worth All It Costs to Be Holy."

Rev. Charles Dayton, Conference President, brought a message to the Conference, emphasizing the importance of the Holy Spirit's presence and prevailing in the business of the Conference: this is to be desired rather than to insist overmuch *upon* the points of Parliamentary Law, etc.

The President then gave his annual report which was adopted.

See Reports

His Official Acts report was read and adopted.

His Financial reports were read and accepted, and sent to the Auditing Committee.

The Bar of Conference was voted to be the first seven center rows of seats.

The hours of Conference were voted to be:

Forenoon: Open at 8:45 and close at 11:30; Afternoon: Open at 1:30 and close by vote.

The following Committees were elected:

On Passage of Character: Rev. James Keysor and Mr. Roger Olson.

Nominating Committee: Elders— A. Northrup, A. Lamos, H. Miller and G. Jock; Laymen— Roger Olson, Beatrice Lombard, Thelma Thurston and Daisy Phelps.

Later, Mrs. Thurston resigned, and Mrs. Ackerman was elected to take her place.

Auditing Committee: Gerald Matson and Ralph Seaman.

Pastoral Relations Committee: Elders — Reginald Hewitt, Floyd Tyler, Spencer Moon; Laymen— Bertha Jones, Chester Fiet, Eva Allen.

Rev. and Mrs. Albert Warner were introduced to the Conference. It was voted that we elect a FINANCE COMMITTEE, and the following were voted members: Elders— R. Gunsalus, Jas. Keysor, Jesse Russell; Laymen— Mrs. Eva Allen, Mr. Fulton Prest, Mrs. Helen Seaman.

The report on Church Extension was read by Rev. Aldis Lamos. It was adopted by vote.

The Chairman read the proposed Orders of the Day, and it was adopted.

It was voted to adjourn for Committee work.

After announcements, Brother Northrup offered prayer.

WEDNESDAY FORENOON

The new time for roll call was observed—before the devotional period.

The devotional leader, Rev. S. Brainard, read from Hebrews 10:9-25.

Prayer by Rev. F. Tyler.

The minutes of the Tuesday afternoon business were read, and with one addition were accepted as read.

It was voted that the Orders of the Day for Wednesday afternoon be changed to 2:30 and 3:30 p.m.

During the forenoon the following characters were called and passed: Spencer Moon, Ray Morgan, Floyd Tyler, Wilbur Matson, Jas. Keysor, C. L. Hill, Florence Shippee, Fred Shippee, Harris Earl, Edwin Seaman, Harry Johnson, Chas. Dayton.

A motion to adjourn for Committee work was lost.

The Nominating Committee was voted excused for Committee work.

The Committee on Resolutions reported, and the report was adopted. (See Reports.)

A partial report was read by the Committee on Nominations.

It was voted that the Conference reconsider the action taken that we have a Finance Committee.

The motion that we have a Finance Committee was LOST.

It was voted to adjourn. Dismissal by Brother Klob.

WEDNESDAY AFTERNOON

Roll call. Bro. Clifton Chapman read from John 15, and prayer was offered by Rev. Northrup and Rev. Murray.

The minutes of the forenoon business were read and approved as read.

It was voted that we refer the matter of a Conference Directory to a Committee, and the members elected are— Gerald Matsor A. Northrup and C. L. Hill. Characters passed: Price and Helen Stark, O. M. Finch, Gerald Matson, Floyd Phelps, Reginald Hewitt, A. O. Northrup, Frank Wright.

The following were introduced to the Conference:

Rev. Barse, now a pastor in the Indiana Conference;

Rev. F. R. Eddy, Connectional Publishing Agent;

Prof. and Mrs. Frank Wright, of Houghton, N. Y.

ORDER OF THE DAY: Memorial Service, with Bro. Jock in charge.

The order of service was-

Congregational singing "Abide with Me", led by Sr. Shippee. Prayer by A. O. Northrup.

Bro. Moon, Bro. Hill and Bro. Jock spoke words of appreciation of Bro. J. J. Davison who died very recently.

Sr. Helen Tyler sang the hymn "I Shall See Him Face to Face."

Sr. Marjorie Stevenson and Sr. Florence Shippee spoke in relation to Sr. Gladys Dayton, emphasizing some of the worthy characteristics of her life.

Bro. Jock read a list of the names of members of the various Conference churches who have died during the past year.

Closing hymn "We Shall See the King Some Day."

Dismissal by Rev. Eddy.

After a brief intermission the second ORDER OF THE DAY followed.

It was the hour given to the Sunday School interests, with Rev. A. Lamos, Conf. S. S. Secretary, in charge.

Singing "Bringing in the Sheaves" was led by Sr. Thurston.

A selection of Scripture was read by Bro. Ray Smith, and it was dedicated to Rev. W. F. Lewis who served so many years as Conf. S. S. Secretary. Prayer by Rev. E. Mein.

The S. S. Sec'y gave report.

It was moved to adopt the report. An amendment—that we refer the item of the report relative to the increase in S. S. apportionment to the Pastoral Relations Committee was LOST.

The original motion carried, and the report was adopted.

The financial report of the S. S. Secretary was accepted—by vote.

The motion that the Conf. S. S. Sec'y send a reminder of the S. S. apportionment to each S. S. early in the Conf. year carried.

Prof. Frank Wright then gave an address. He emphasized the Necessity of the Sunday School; he gave suggestions on "Sources of Help in Teaching"; the task of "getting the Lesson in mind" was dealt with by the speaker. The final points were "Helps for the Primary Teacher," and the "Closing of the Sunday School Period."

It was voted to adjourn. Dismissal by Bro. Murray.

THURSDAY FORENOON

Roll call.

Bro. Klob read Romans 8:1-4, and spoke briefly. Prayer by Roger Olson.

The minutes of Wednesday afternoon were read and approved.

It was voted that a Resolution presented by the Southern District ministers be referred to the Pastoral Relations Committee.

The report of the Conference Treasurer was read and accepted.

For information the Apportionment Committee gave a partial report.

It was voted to adjourn for Committee work. Prayer by Bro. Miller.

At 10:30 the ORDER OF THE DAY was observed. After singing and prayer, Rev. F. R. Eddy, the Connectional Representative, brought the Connectional Address. He spoke of phases of early history of our Denomination, pointing out some of the defects, and the growth toward unity and the evangelistic emphasis. He pointed out the greater output of literature from the Publishing House; the enlarging Missionary Enterprise and Educational interests of Wesleyan Methodism; the improvements of the Publishing building, etc. The report was very encouraging.

We were adjourned by limitation of time. Prayer by Rev. Jock.

THURSDAY AFTERNOON

Roll call. Brother W. Matson read selected verses from Gal. 5 and 6.

Rev. S. Moon offered prayer.

The minutes of the forenoon business were read and approved.

Those introduced to the Conference were: Rev. and Mrs. H. C. Burchel, of the Standard Church Mission, of Niagara Falls, N. Y., and Rev. Chas. McCallum.

The Conference Trustees read their financial report, and it was voted to accept the report as read.

It was voted that each Sunday School take an offering this year for the maintenance of the President's home.

It was voted that there be a Committee to provide a calender of special offerings for the year. The elected Committee—Edwin Seaman, R. Gunsalus.

The Committee on Nominations read the report of nominations. Character passed— Robert Gunsalus.

ORDER OF THE DAY: Educational Representative.

This began with song and prayer. Then Bro. Dayton presented Prof. Frank Wright who addressed the Conference on the theme "The Educational Problem of the Church." He presented the Houghton College interests.

Special number by a mixed quartet.

It was voted that we adjourn for Committee work.

FRIDAY FORENOON

Roll call. The devotional Scripture lesson was read from I Peter 2:1-10—Bro. Gerald Matson, the leader. Prayer by Bro. Murray. The minutes of Thursday afternoon business were read and

adopted.

ORDER OF THE DAY-ELECTION OF CONFERENCE OFFI-CERS.

Bro. F. R. Eddy occupied the Chair. The tellers appointed were: Clifton Chapman, Russell Frase, Edwin Seaman and Kenneth Ross.

The Pastoral Relations Committee gave the first reading (partial) of its report.

It was voted that Inasmuch as the labors of Rev. J. J. Davison are greatly appreciated by this Conference, the Minutes of this 1949 Annual Session be dedicated to his memory; and that C. L. Hill prepare a memorial with his picture to be placed in the front of the Minutes.

Characters passed: Clarence Murray, Elton Seaman.

A letter from the family of Rev. J. J. Davison was read. It expressed thanks to the Champlain Conference for its expression of sympathy, and for its contribution to Bro. Davison through the years of his decline.

It was voted that the Ministerial Institute be held at Lisbon, if there be an Institute.

It was moved that the 108th Annual Session of the Champlain Conference convene for its opening service on the first Tuesday of July, the 4th, 1950, at 2:30 p.m.; that the roll of Elders and Conference Preachers be called at this time; that immediately following this roll call, the President address the Conference assembly; that the Conference sermon be preached Tuesday evening, at 7:30; and that there be no preaching services during the day sessions of Conference week, unless an urgent need requires otherwise.

An ORDER OF THE DAY took precedence over the regular business. This was a meeting of the Superannuate Ministers' Relief Association. (See Reports)

Following the M.R.A. Order of the Day, Rev. Arthur Gould was introduced. The Conference adjourned by limitation of time. Prayer by Bro. Gould.

FRIDAY AFTERNOON

Roll call. Bro. E. Mein read from John 17. Prayer by Bro. Olson. The minutes of the forenoon business were read and approved with one addition.

Unfinished business: The motion relative to the date for beginning the 1950 Conference was LOST.

Standing Rules

1. The Resolution of this Conference shall be printed in the Minutes of this Conference each year.

2. All visiting members of our own, or other Churches in harmony with our principles, shall be invited to honorary seats in the Conference.

3. The Conference President shall receive twenty dollars per year for postage and stationery; also any needed traveling expense. At any time the President be required to travel the Conference, his duties and pay shall be defined by the Conference.

4. The Conference Secretary shall receive twenty-five dollars (\$25) per year for his labor and incidental expenses.

5. The Conference Treasurer shall receive twenty-five dollars (\$25) per year for his services in caring for the funds.

6. In making his report, the Conference Treasurer is authorized to close his books one week before Conference session. The Treasurer of the Superannuate Ministers' Relief Association also shall close his books one week before the Conference session.

7. All monies disbursed by the Conference Treasurer during the interim of Conference shall be upon order of the President, except in case of payment to the President, when such order shall be issued by the Vice President. It is understood that any payment ordered by the Conference direct may be paid by the Treasurer without an order as directed above.

8. No monies shall be loaned by the Conference Treasurer except by order of Conference, or by the consent of the President and his Advisory Board.

9. Each Elder shall make his engagement as Pastor with the understanding that if he be elected Conference President he shall be released in his pastoral engagement.

10. (New) The first Sunday of each month shall be known as Missions Sunday, the Sunday School offerings to go alternately to Home Missions and Conference Missions, in that order, and be sent to the Conference Treasurer. (The Committee on Finance defines "Conference Missions" as the establishing of new and (or) subsidizing of the needy fields of the Conference.)

11. In securing Evangelists for the Camp Meeting, the Camp Meeting Committee is privileged to secure not more than one worker outside the Denomination.

12. The Camp Meeting Committee shall be composed of the Conference President, as Chairman, and three ministers and three

laymen, all to be elected by ballot (after the Conference of 1923), the term of office to be three years, the time of one minister and one layman expiring each year.

13. Pastors shall state financial items in their statistical reports in even dollars except in items affecting the Budget; and as far as possible are requested to report all Budget items in even dollars. When such rule is not followed, the Statistical Secretaries are authorized to drop decimals, except as provided above.

14. The Committee on Credentials shall secure from each delegate the necessary credentials as provided by our Discipline, with Post Office address of the same.

15. The closing Sunday of the Conference year shall be the Sunday following the beginning of the Annual Conference. The Pastor's salary of this closing Sunday shall be paid by the Church of which he is Pastor; and for the first Sunday of the new Conference year it shall be paid by the charge to which he is going.

16. Newly elected Conference Officers shall take office after the close of Conference Sunday.

17. The Conference President shall include in the Orders of the Day a special period to consider Camp Meeting business.

18. A Nominating Committee shall be elected to consider and nominate all elective Officers of the Conference. The Committee shall consist of four Elders and four laymen. The report of the Nominating Committee shall be read to the Conference the day preceding the election.

19. Each Church member over fourteen years of age shall be apportioned fifty-two cents per year for Church Extension.

20. The Delegate's credentials shall be sent to the Committee on Credentials BEFORE THE OPENING DAY OF CONFERENCE, and the Conference Secretary shall send printed blanks with the statistical, character, etc.

21. The Conference recommends that each Charge grants its Pastor two weeks vacation, and also grant him permission to hold a two weeks meeting (over two Sundays) away from his local charge both vacation and meeting to be without loss of pay, and exclusive of attending the Annual Conference and Camp Meeting.

22. The first Sunday in May shall be PASTORAL VOTE SUNDAY.

1) The Conference President shall act as Pioneer Secretary. (This does not create the office of Pioneer Secretary.) The Conference Board on Church and Parsonage Building and Location shall be the Church Extension Committee.

2) There shall be at least one Church Extension service on each Charge in the Conference this year, at which time all of the Church Extension activities within the Conference shall be presented.

This service shall be under the supervision of the Conference President, or one whom he may appoint. Any person traveling the Conference in the interests of Church Extension must be appointed and under the direction of the Conference President. Those thus appointed to travel the Conference in the interests of Church Extension shall receive not to exceed five cents per mile.

3) All offerings taken for Church Extension shall be forwarded to the Conference Treasurer, and credited to Church Extension. The Conference Treasurer, upon the recommendation of the Conference President and the Church Extension Committee, shall disburse these funds. Any designated funds can be disbursed by notice received in writing from the Conference President.

4) Whereas the W.Y.P.S. is an organization that is aggressively supporting the Conference Pioneer projects, we recommend that as far as possible all monies for Pioneer work be passed through the local W.Y.P.S. treasurer to the treasurer of the Champlain Conference.

We further recommend that the local Church Extension program be sponsored by the local W.Y.P.S. as far as possible.

Ruth Gibson, R.N., brought a missionary message as well as showing us views of our work in South America. This was enjoyed by a large congregation. The offering amounted to \$2,988.50.

Dr. Eddy dismissed us with prayer.

SATURDAY MORNING

After a season of song, including our theme song, "Work for the Night Is Corning", Professor F. H. Wright had the devotional period, reading Ephesians 3:19, "Filled with all the fulness of God."

Voted to pay Miss Gibson her expenses coming.

Mrs. Aileen Shea was introduced, showing us some literature that she used for Band work. \$600.00 was raised the first year as to \$65000.00 the largest year:

The report of the committee on Statistics was read and approved. See report number 8. A rising vote of thanks was given the committee composed of Sister Matson and Sister Alice Seaman.

Miss Florence Carey brought greetings from the Indian work on Cornwall Island.

Mrs. Murray, the subscription committee, brought in fifteen subscriptions to the "Wesleyan Missionary".

It was voted to send Rev. F. R. Birch \$100.00 from the treasury without being ear marked.

Voted to adjourn.

Standing Rules

1. The standing rules of the Conference Missionary Society shall be printed in the Conference minutes each year.

2. The Conference Treasurer is authorized to close her books one week before the Conference session begins.

3. One of the two statistical blanks sent to each society, after being carefully filled in, is to be given to the statistical committee at the beginning of Conference, the other is to be retained by the delegate and read to the local society at the first meeting of the new year. Receipts and disbursements must be made to balance before being placed in the hands of the statistical committee, also giving rating according to efficiency standard.

4. All money raised by the society shall be used for missionary work, and no money paid out without a vote of the society.

5. The Conference President shall receive annually five dollars, the treasurer ten dollars and the secretary three dollars, to defray expense of postage and writing material.

6. The voting body shall be composed of Conference Officers, Y. M. W. B. Superintendent, Presidents of local societies, and one delegate from each local society, lady pastors and pastor's wives.

7. Each local society shall continue sending six dollars to Southern Mountain Work, and five dollars or more to Hepzibah. This must be sent through the Conference Treasurer and to apply on budget.

8. It is required that twenty-five cents per member of the local society dues be forwarded through the Conference Society Treasurer to the General Conference Treasurer for the general fund. Also that twenty-five cents be retained in the Conference treasury and the remaining fifty cents be used directly for missionary work and be applied on the budget.

The local societies shall disburse all Conference and General Conference funds through the Conference Treasurer, who shall in turn remit all General funds to the General Conference Treasurer.

9. Each society is to make provisions for a missionary to travel the conference as early in the year as possible, allowing ample time for each charge.

10. The Plan of Work should be read quarterly to our local societies to keep us enthused in our work.

11. We recommend that the Treasurer of the Conference Society be elected as a Committee of Remembrance with authority to send flowers or other suitable tribute, to those of our number who shall be called to their eternal reward. We further recommend that this shall include all pastor's wives and officers of our Conference Missionary Society.

PLAN OF WORK

We recommend that each local W.M.S.:

1. Have regular monthly meetings, at which we urge the use of missionary programs, (study books and missionary papers are good sources of material for this) along with prayer and business.

2. Observe special days with appropriate program.

3. Endeavor to secure every woman of the congregation and any other interested person as a member, and to enlist the men as honorary members and co-workers.

4. Form an active prayer partner group with a prayer partner secretary to keep records of same and report to conference corresponding Secretary by November 1st.

5. Elect officers who are subscribers to and readers of the "Wesleyan Missionary" and the "Wesleyan Methodist". Endeavor to have the "Wesleyan Missionary" in every home.

6. Continue sending good usable clothing, notions, pictures and medical supplies to our Home Missionaries, requesting no valuation, by vote of the Conference Women's Missionary Society.

7. Send to Conference, articles prepared for our Home and Foreign Mission stations to be displayed for our mutual interest and inspiration. These things to be received, arranged for exhibit, and packed for mailing at close of Conference by a committee which shall be appointed at first session. The postage being paid from the treasury.

8. Continue contributions of canned goods and other supplies for the camp. Each society is requested to furnish an assigned room in a dormitory with the following suggested articles: towel-racks, soap dish, dresser scarf, oil cloth for wash stand, curtains (plastic if possible), curtain rods, rugs, lamp, coat hangers, stand, double screw in plug, drinking glass, pitcher, mirror, chair, calendar, pillows, quilt and 36 inch green shade.

9. Send a correctly balanced, complete statistical blank with delegate, to be presented to the statistical committee at the first session,

10. Send delegate's credentials to the Conference Missionary Secretary at least one week before the conference convenes. (See form No. 438 of Discipline).

11. Send at least ten cents per member to the Conference Treasurer not later than May 1st., for the fund for cleaning dormitories and Association cottages, which work shall be under supervision of our committee named for that purpose.

12. At a meeting before conference, elect officers for the coming year, including a magazine solicitor and a delegate (other than church delegate if possible), whose room and board shall be provided for Conference week. Instruct their delegates how much to pledge for Missions. (Each Band also should be prepared to make a pledge).

13. Receive from their delegate a clear and comprehensive report at the first meeting after conference.

14. Send the equivalent of ten cents per member, per month to the Conference Treasurer quarterly towards liquidating the mortgage on the Cobleskill church.

15. Elect a Mission study secretary who will form a "Mission Study Class", keeping a record of all reading and study work done, and reporting statistics to the Conference Mission Study Secretary each quarter.
