Journal of Daily Proceedings

The forty-seventh session of the Kansas Annual Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church assembled in the Auditorium at Miltonvale, Kansas, at 2 P. M., Tuesday, August 21st, President P. A. Miller presiding. Opened by singing "Love Divine, All Love Excelling." Prayer by Brother C. E. Huscher. Brother Miller read and commented at length upon 1 Thess. 5, especially emphasizing the latter part of the chapter. He then led in earnest prayer.

Roll call answered by 8 Elders and 6 Licentiates.

On Motion Brother Oliver G. Wilson was elected a Committee on Credentials.

Motion made and approved that we adjourn to the call of the Chair for organization of Committees.

Benediction by Rev. F. C. Hill.

Wednesday Morning.

Devotions led by Brother E. H. Cook, who offered prayer and read Psalm 32.

Reading of the Minutes and Roll Call.

Committee on Credentials reported the names of Sister Martha Lowe, alternate delegate from Topeka, and Brother Alex. Ballard, delegate from Miltonvale. On motion delegates seated.

Rev. J. S. Willett, Connectional Agent and Treasurer; Rev. E. S. Davidson, of New York State, who is here in the interest of the Jews; Sister Nancy Barts, returned Missionary from Africa, and Sister Anna Kirk Folger, General Conference Organizer for the W. H. & F. M. Society, were each introduced to the Conference. They all spoke a few appropriate words of greeting.

Motion made and approved that visiting members be granted an honorary seat in the Conference.

Motion made and supported that Rev. A. Trauger, who has been in charge of the work at Eskridge, and Rev. J. M. Davis, from the U. B. Church, be referred to the Committee on Itineracy and Orders for recommendation to the Annual Conference.

On approved motion Brother E. A. Coates was added to the Committee on Credentials.

Since both the delegate and the alternate elected from the Bethel charge were unable to be present, a motion prevailed to seat Brother Elmer Anderson as a delegate to represent the Bethel class.

On motion adjourned to the call of the Chair.

Conference called to order by the President at 11:15 A. M.

Committee on Credentials reported the names of Sister D. D. Smith, delegate from Miltonvale, and William Macy from Chapman Creek. On motion delegates seated.

Committee on Credentials further reported, recommending the following to Elder's Orders: Rev. C. E. Huscher, Walter Eastham, and Wm. A. Smith of Miltonvale, and Rev. Oliver G. Wilson from New Hope and Rev. E. A. Coates from the Ames charge.

The Committee also read credentials recommending Brother Irl C. Petitt of Hollis to travel under the direction of the Annual Conference. On motion report accepted and credentials referred to the Committee on Itineracy and Orders.

The Committee on Itineracy and Orders reported recommending that Rev. A. Trauger and Rev. J. M. Davis be received as ordained ministers to travel under the direction of the Conference. On approved motion report accepted.

President P. A. Miller read his annual report to the Conference.

On motion adopted. See report.

Motion made, approved and carried that an order be drawn by the Secretary on the Conference Treasurer to pay Brother Miller the deficiency of \$158.65 toward his yearly salary as President of the Conference.

On motion adjourned. Benediction by Rev T. J. Pomeroy.

Wednesday Afternoon

Opened by singing "My Burdens Rolled Away." Devotions were led by Rev. T. F. Childs, who read for a Scripture lesson the 99th Psalm and led in prayer.

The Committee on Credentials reported the names of J. W. Martin as delegate from Gaylord and Henry B. Parson from Oakland. On motion the report was adopted and the delegates seated.

Rev. Wade, of the M. E. Church of this city, was introduced to the Conference. He was invited to an honorary seat in the Conference.

Examinations of character was taken up. The following names were called: S. F. Wilson, F. E. Shivers, A. Trauger, T. F. Childs, and Ernest Coates. The pastors read their statistical reports and made statements with regard to their Christian experience.

The Finance Committee reported recommending that Brother E. S. Davidson be granted the privilege of taking an offering in behalf of evangelizing the Jews. The Committee also recommends that an order be drawn on the Conference Treasurer for \$5.00 to cover Brother Miller's expense for postage. On motion the report was adopted.

Order of the Day. Preaching by Rev. A. Trauger. The Lord blessed the message and a good praise service followed.

Examination of character resumed. The following ministers were called: George Gurtler, I. C. Dunbar, J. L. Whitney, W. L. Carkuff, L. S. Curry, S. W. Bond, F. C. Hill, A. B. Hotchkiss and W. H. Burrows. They made statements with regard to their work during the past year and related their Christian experience.

Committee on Orders of the Day reported recommending that Wednesday evening be given to Brother Davidson; Thursday, 2:00 P. M. for the election of permanent officers; Thursday 3:00 P. M., Educational interests; Friday 10:00 A. M., Sunday School work; Friday 3:00 P. M., given to Brother J. S. Willett to present the Connectional interests; Friday evening given to the W. H. & F. M. Society; Saturday 3:00 P. M., Memorial services.

President McDowell was introduced to the Conference. He spoke briefly of the Educational work.

On motion Conference adjourned. Benediction by Brother J. S. Willett.

Thursday Morning.

The morning session was opened by devotions led by Rev. A. B. Hotchkiss, who read and commented upon the 141st Psalm and led in prayer. While singing "He is Coming Back Again," the Lord wonderfully manifested Himself by pouring His Holy Spirit upon the audience. Shouts of victory and triumph went up and during an old-time hand-shaking that followed an unusual melting spirit was upon us. Praise God!

Reading and approval of the Minutes. Roll Call.

Brother Wigfield, of the Nazarene Church, was introduced to the Conference. He spoke a few appropriate words of greeting.

Committee on Credentials reported the name of Barbara Fringer

as a delegate from the Keene charge, and also read a recommendation from the Excelsior charge for Leona Dunbar to travel under the direction of the Conference. Motion made to seat the delegate and refer the other recommendation to the Committee on Itineracy and Orders.

A statement was made that Brother Woodham, who was present, had been duly elected as a delegate, but had left home and forgot his credentials. On approved motion Brother Woodham was seated

as a delegate from the Chapman Creek charge.

Examination of character was resumed. The following ministers of the Conference were called: T. J. Pomeroy, E. H. Cook, Walter E. Carrington, W. C. Elliott, B. F. Hester. Each made statements with regard to their Christian character and their work during the past year.

The Secretary read a financial report from Evangelist H. H. Williams regarding his work for the past year. Held seven meetings.

Reecived \$573.77. Expenses \$87.77.

The name of Rev. O. W. Cooper was called for examination. The President stated that he had received a personal letter from Brother Cooper requesting that his name be dropped. Motion made

and supported that the request be granted. Carried.

The Secretary called the names of V. C. and H. Jennie Taliaferro for examination. Inasmuch as Brother and Sister Taliaferro are at present not members of any Wesleyan Methodist Class a motion was made and approved that their names be dropped from the Conference roll.

The Secretary was requested to write each of them a letter and kindly state the cause of the action taken.

The Committee on Books and Periodicals reported. A motion

made and approved that the report be adopted.

The motion was amended that the statement in the report regarding the unqualified wrong of Chautauqua bills be made to read that we condemn as wrong "all the objectionable features of the Chautauqua." After much discussion by the various members of the Conference, a motion was made and supported to amend the amendment and drop the word "Chautauqua" entirely from the report. A standing vote was taken and the motion was adopted as last amended. See report.

Committee on Credentials read a transfer of the membership of Rev. Walter Eastham, of the Iowa Conference, to the Kansas Conference; also a recommendation to Elder's Orders of Rev. Wil-

liam Millard from the Elm Row class. On approved motion both of the above recommendations were referred to the Committee on Itineracy and Orders.

On motion adjourned. Benediction by Rev. McDowell.

Thursday Afternoon.

Devotions were led by Rev. Wigfield, who read the latter part of the 8th chapter of Romans and led in prayer.

Committee on Credentials reported the name of J. A. Reimer, of the Raymond charge, as a delegate to the Conference. On motion the delegate was seated.

The pastor of the LeRoy charge having failed to provide their delegate with proper credentials, a motion prevailed to give Sister Murray a seat in the Conference.

Committee on Itineracy and Orders rendered a partial report. On motion the report was adopted. See report.

Committee on Credentials reported the name of Dwight Osborn as a delegate from the Hall charge. On motion the delegate was seated.

Orders of the Day. Election of permanent officers.

Ballot for President. Brother P. A. Miller having received a majority of all the votes cast on the first ballot was declared elected.

Ballot for Vice-President. Brother F. C. Hill having received a majority of all the votes cast in the first ballot was declared elected.

Ballot for Secretary. Brother E. H. Cook having received a majority of all the votes cast in the first ballot was declared elected.

Motion made and approved that the Secretary cast the ballot of the Conference for F. E. Shivers as Assistant Secretary.

Motion made and supported that the Secretary cast the ballot of the Conference for Oliver G. Wilson as Treasurer.

Motion made and approved that the Secretary cast the ballot of the Conference for Brother W. A. Smith as Assistant Treasurer.

On approved motion Brother P. A. Miller was made one of the Quarterly Conference Evangelists.

Ballot for second Quarterly Conference Evangelist. Brother A. B. Hotchkiss having received a majority of all the votes cast in the first ballot was declared elected.

Ballot for one ministerial member on the Conference Board of Trustees to be elected for the term of three years. Brother Fred C. Hill was elected on the first ballot.

Brother C. H. Dow stated that he expects to leave the Con-

ference and therefore tendered his resignation as a member of the Conference Board of Trustees. On motion his resignation was accepted.

Ballot for a ministerial member of the Board of Trustees to fill the vacancy made by Brother Dow's resignation. No election on the first, second or third ballot. On the fourth ballot Brother C. Edward Huscher having received 28 out of the 52 votes cast was declared elected.

Ballot for one lay member on the Conference Board of Trustees to be elected for a period of two years. Samuel B. Burgan was elected on the first ballot.

Orders of the Day. Educational services in charge of President McDowell. Brother McDowell spoke of the need of good religious schools for the training of our young men and women, and urged the support of the same by the entire Connection. Brother F. C. Hill and Brother J. S. Willett were also called upon to speak, and at the close of these very earnest appeals, pledges were taken for the Life Support Union amounting to \$207.00. Benediction by Brother F. E. Shivers.

Friday Morning.

Devotions were led by Rev. Ernest A. Coates, who read and commented upon the 46th Psalm and led in prayer.

Reading and approval of the Minutes. Roll Call.

On approved motion the following committees were elected:

Judicial—S. F. Wilson, S. W. Bond, A. B. Hotchkiss, and I. C. Dunbar.

Vacancy of President—A. B. Hotchkiss, F. E. Shivers, J. A. Stansbury, Alex. Ballard and J. W. Martin.

Camp Ground and Camp Meeting—The President and his Advisory Board, Rev. C. E. Huscher, Frank Dietrich and E. E. Jones.

The President nominated Brother A. B. Hotchkiss and Brother Alex. Ballard as members of the Advisory Board.

Motion made and approved that we elected the Advisory Board nominated by the President. Carried.

On approved motion Rev. Ernest A. Coates was elected for a term of four years on the Committee of Itineracy and Orders to fill the expired term of Brother T. J. Pomeroy.

On approved motion the following Boards were elected:

Superannuate Board—The President, Chairman ex-officio; F. C. Hill, T. J. Pomeroy, E. E. Jones and L. P. Rawlins added.

Missionary—The President, Chairman ex-officio; A. B. Hotchkiss, Will A. Smith, W. F. Whitney, Philip Beals, and Alex. Ballard added.

Sunday School-P. A. Miller elected Chairman. T. J. Pomeroy and L. S. Curry added.

On motion Brother T. J. Pomeroy was elected Conference Sunday School Secretary.

Motion made and approved that the Annual Conference next year precede the Annual Conference Camp Meeting.

Motion made and supported that in arranging the time for the next Annual Conference the same be left with the Conference President, Camp Meeting Board and the Connectional Officials.

First reading of the report on Pastoral Relations.

The Committee on Credentials reported, reading the transfer of membership of Rev. H. W. McDowell from the Lockport Conference to the Kansas Conference.

On motion the same was referred to the Committee on Itineracy and Orders.

The Finance Committee reported, recommending that the W. H. & F. M. Society be given the privilege of taking an offering in behalf of their work. On motion the report was adopted.

On motion Conference adjourned for committee work until the Orders of the Day are called for.

Conference called to order at 10:30 A. M.

Orders of the Day. Hour given to Sunday School work. Singing, "The Old Rugged Cross." Brother Miller introduced the subject, showing the great value of Sunday School work. Brother J. S. Willett spoke of what constitutes a "Loyal" and also a "Front Line" Sunday School. His talk was interesting, suggestive and helpful. Brother Pomeroy, the Conference Sunday School Secretary, spoke of the importance of the Sunday School and of the need of Sunday School Conventions. In connection with his adddress he read his annual report. On motion the report was adopted. See report. Brother L. S. Curry, editor of the "Standard," spoke of the paper he is publishing, and desired the co-operation of the entire Conference in making the paper a success. A number subscribed for the paper at the close of his remarks.

Examination of character resumed. Rev. C. H. Dow called. He read his report for the past year and stated that he still enjoys God's grace and favor upon his soul.

The Committee on Itineracy and Orders reported, recommending that Rev. H. W. McDowell's transfer of membership be accepted and that he be received as an Elder of the Conference. On motion the report was adopted.

Examination of character was resumed. The following ministers were called: Rev. I. L. DeWitt, V. C. Bowman, William Millard, E. H. Dunbar, and J. A. Stansbury. Each of the pastors read their statistical report and made statements with regard to their Christian experience.

Committee on Sabbath Schools reported. On motion report was adopted. See report.

Reports from the Chairmen of Districts One and Two regarding holiness conventions. They stated that no holiness conventions were held on their districts.

Orders of the Day called for. Rev. J. S. Willett spoke especially of the Publishing and Missionary interests. The Publishing, Educational and Missionary interests are all in a prosperous condition. Brother Willett stated that at the time he took charge of the Publishing interests the total liabilities were about \$28,000.00, and that they have been reduced to a little over \$15,000.00 at the present time—a reduction of about \$13,000.00.

On approved motion a rising vote of thanks was given to Brother I. L. DeWitt for his years of faithful service as Conference Treasurer. Brother DeWitt expressed his appreciation for the fellowship of the Conference and desired our prayers.

A motion was made that we instruct the Secretary to write Father G. B. Howard a letter of sympathy and Christian greeting and include our greetings also to Sister Alice Lienard and Sister Howard for their faithful attention in caring for Brother Howard.

A motion was made and supported that we also write Brother E. H. Sewart a letter of greeting from the Conference.

On motion Conference adjourned.

Saturday Morning.

Devotions were led by Rev. T. J. Pomeroy, who read and commented upon Isaiah 41 and offered prayer.

Reading of the Minutes and Roll Call.

Second reading of the report of the Pastoral Relations Committee.

Report of Holiness Conventions. Rev. Curry reported for District No. 3.

Motion made and approved that we have District Holiness Conventions for the coming year.

On motion Rev. T. J. Pomeroy was elected Chairman of the First District.

On approved motion Brother W. H. Burroughs was elected Chairman of the Second District.

On approved motions, Brother L. S. Curry was elected Chairman of District No. 3, and Brother Shivers Chairman of District No. 4.

Motion made and carried that the matter of districting the Holiness Conventions be referred to the Committee on Boundaries.

Motion made and carried that at least one service of each Holiness Convention be devoted to the interests of Sunday School work.

Motion made and approved that our Holiness Conventions be held for a period of three days and that the same precede the Quarterly Meeting.

Motion made and approved that each of the various Chairmen of the Holiness Conventions be instructed to have written programs for their Conventions.

A motion prevailed to have a Ministerial Institute for the coming year.

On approved motion the Committee on Itineracy and Orders together with the Conference President was made to constitute the Committee on Ministerial Institute.

Motion made and approved that \$25.00 be set aside from the Conference Fund to pay the car fare of the instructors to and from the Institute.

The Committee on the State of the Work rendered their report.

On motion the report was adopted. See report.

Motion made and approved that a salary of \$700.00 a year be given the President of the Conference.

The motion was amended to raise the salary to \$800.00 a year instead of \$700.00. Motion carried as amended,

Conference Tithing Secretary reported only five charges in the Conference as reporting to her the members tithing on their works.

Several members of the Conference discussed the subject of

tithing, as to the proper manner of tithing and of the importance and blessing that follow tithing.

Motion made and supported that Sister Imo Jones act as Conference Tithing Secretary for the coming year, and that the local Tithing Secretaries be instructed to forward their reports to Sister Jones not later than July 1st.

Motion made and carried that the matter of taking an offering for the support of a Conference Missionary Evangelist be left with the Committee on Finance.

Motion was made and seconded that the matter of sending out one or more Missionary Evangelists be left with the Conference Missionary Board.

Motion amended that the Conference elect a Conference Missionary Evangelist and Organizer, who shall be under the direction of the Missionary Board. After considerable discussion a vote was taken on the amendment. Amendment lost. Vote on the original motion. Carried.

The President read a telegram received from Brother Sage of Oregon, a former member of the Conference. Brother Sage stated that he expects to be in Kansas in September and would be prepared to take work. No particular work was assigned him by the Conference.

Motion made and approved that the matter of renting the dining hall for the coming year be left with the Camp Ground and Camp Meeting Committee.

Motion amended that we leave the renting of the dining hall with the Conference Board of Trustees. Motion carried as amended.

Motion made and approved that we secure from the Publishing Association a receipt book similar to that used by the Connectional Agent and Treasurer, furnishing two extra duplicate copies, and that we recommend that all parties handling Conference money use only these receipt books.

Motion made and approved that the Kansas Conference send a written invitation to the General Conference Board, to hold the next General Conference at Miltonvale, Kansas. A rising unanimous vote was given in favor of this motion.

Brother Hotchkiss read a schedule for the first Quarterly Meetings for the East and West Districts.

The Committee on Statistics rendered a partial report.

On motion Conference adjourned. Benediction by Brother J. S. Willett.

Saturday Afternoon

Conference opened by singing "Deeper Yet." Prayer by Rev. L. S. Curry.

Reading of the Minutes and Roll Call.

The Committee on Boundaries reported. On motion the report was adopted. See report.

The Committee on Itineracy and Orders rendered a partial report. On motion the report was adopted. See report.

The Committee on Moral Reform reported. On motion the report was adopted. See report.

A statement was made by the President that Rev. Wigfield, who is known by the members of the Conference, expects to join the Conference and take work, but is not at the present time a member of any Wesleyan Methodist class. A motion was made and approved that we refer Brother Wigfield's credentials to the Committee on Itineracy and Orders

The Committee on Charity reported. On motion the report was adopted. See report.

It was suggested that some of the bretheen visit and pray with Brother Fitch instead of writing him a letter. On motion the president appointed Brothers Carkuff, Carrington, Elliott and Hester to visit and pray with him.

The Committee on Credentials rendered a partial report. Sister Vera Macy, of the Chapman Creek charge, and Sister Leona Hotle, of Miltonvale, were recommended as eminently suitable to serve as missionaries in our mission field in Africa. On motion the report was adopted and the credentials were referred to the Committee on Itineracy and Orders.

The Committee on Finance reported, recommending that a freewill offering be taken in behalf of our Conference mission work. On motion the report was adopted.

Motion made and approved that the above offering be taken on Sunday morning.

A recess of twenty minutes was taken

We deplore the fact that millions of vile, immoral, deceitful and soul-blighting books and periodicals have been allowed to sweep over our land like a flood until but few homes, if any, have escaped the influence of ungodly circus bills, picture show bills, Sunday newspapers, and literature put out by so-called Christian Scientists, Spiritualists, Mormons, Russellites, and lodges. We furthermore urge that our people be careful and watchful regarding the literature that comes into their homes.

SABBATH SCHOOLS.

It is believed that for the best interest of the true Church of God, which is made up of true believers, that the Sunday School has been and is one of the greatest means of gathering the youth into the Church. It has been proven that in the Word of God there are found all principles that should govern life, for the best interest and welfare and edification of all whom it shall influence.

One of the saddest failures in Sunday School work is that which comes from teaching without the power of the Holy Spirit. No person is capable of teaching the Scriptures who has not first tasted the good Word of God, for no one can give that which he has not, or impart knowledge which he has not received.

First. We believe that the Bible should be the text book. Be it resolved, That no one is prepared to teach a lesson without so thorough a study that the lesson becomes a part of themselves. A lesson taught by the help of the Holy Ghost always brings results, for God is faithful and will carry the Word home to the heart of the child as well as the older ones. The Spirit seeks to arrest the attention of every one and cause them to think. It is a very important matter after the mind has been aroused to direct one's thought in the right line. One of the greatest principles of teaching is to hold one's attention upon right lines of thought by diverting their mind from all that is unlike the one that the teacher desires to convey to their scholars. If this principle be carried out successively in the Sunday School classes it will edify both old:

and young. As a person is more easily influenced and their life in a large degree moulded in their youth, it is very desirable that the Word of God should find a lodgment in the heart at this time.

First, there is that in the Bible which will appeal to the interest of every one, if the Word is taught in such a way as to arrest the mind of the individual.

Second, it is very essential that the child become interested and that interest be constantly increasing. It is believed that this may be done by the teacher being interested in their class individually and collectively. It is very desirable that every member of the church be a member of the Sunday School, and highly recommended that the pastor be present and contribute his influence for the encouragement of all. It is also recommended that each Sunday School teacher be punctual and thus lend their influence for a faithful observance of the Sabbath, and a regular attendance of the preaching service, and a study of God's Word.

Great good has resulted from the Home Department and this arm of the work should not be underestimated.

The world today is calling for trained men in all departments, yet this is no more essential than trained teachers for our Sunday Schools. Each Sunday School should see that its members be provided with good reading, that the mind of the youth be cultured and a taste created for such books as will help them both intellectually and morally; that in the selection of these preference be given to publications carried by our own House.
