Resolutions and Laws of the Indiana Conference

I. Houses of Worship.

1. Our houses of worship should not be open to any evangelist or ministers of any other church to hold a series of meetings or to maintain a regular appointment for another congregation; provided, however, that usual denominational courtesies be extended to other ministers in accasional appointments. A waiving of the above by a contract or lease of building must be obtained through the Board of Trustees of the indiana Conference.

tr. Pastoral Duties.

1. It is the outy of the pastors to look after the insurance of our church and parsonage properties. All insurance shall provide for losses caused by fire and lightning, hail, and tornado. A failure on the part of the pastor shall be a censurable offense. If the church fails to insure their property upon reasonable effort of the pastor to secure, the same, then said tailure shall be reported to the President of the Conference who shall then have the property insured. In such cases all insurance monies received from losses by fire, lightning, hail and tornado shall be used in Church Extension work as the Conference Board of Trustees considers best.

z. Each pastor and evangelist shall file a complete statistical report with the statistical committee without fail by July 10th.

A. The paster snall report in open conference the items listed on

special blanks turnished by the Conference.

B. The official character of any pastor or evangelist shall not be passed until ne shall have submitted a satisfactory report including statistics.

U. When a pastor fails to raise, in full, the Superannuated Pension Budget, ne snall report to the character committee a satisfactory reason for not doing so.

D. When a paster rails to raise in full the Conference Expense Budget, he shall report to the Conference body a satisfactory reason

for not doing so.

E. In company statistics report, all figure shall be given in even dollars at the nearest dollar, i.e., \$1.01 to \$1.50 shall be reported as \$1.00 and from \$1.51 to \$1.99 shall be reported as \$2.00. The item number viii on benevolences alone to be excepted and shall be reported exactly as paid.

3. An unaccounted for members appearing in the statistics in the membership list shall be referred to the discontinued list. All members

in excess of the number reported shall be reported received.

4. All quarterly meetings shall be arranged for by the pastor and his advisory poard and shall be held near the close of each fiscal quarter. The pastor shall report quarterly to the President and Vice President on blanks formulated by the President. This report shall be sent in immediately following the quarterly business meetings.

b. Each pastor should prepare a calling list of all the homes connected with the Church and Sunday school; listing the relationship they hold to the church; listing their names and addresses by city, street and number, the same to be kept for his own work while on the pastor-

ate and to be given to his successor on the field.

No pastor whose total receipts are \$2500.00 or more shall hold more than two revivals yearly from his charge, one of which is mentioned in resolution seven under pastoral duties, unless by consent of

the President and his Advisory Board.

7. Each pastor whose total pastor's receipt exceed \$2500.00 a year should seek to organize a new class or give his service in a revival meeting to a new or weaker church, to help establish it. The Church which he pastors should grant him such privilege without censure, with full remuneration of salary while in such a meeting. The Vice President shall serve as Co-ordinator, to recommend and help arrange such meetings.

8. Delegate's Credentials secured from the Secretary shall be mailed to the Assistant Secretary by the pastor, by July the 10th.

III. Churches.

1. All charges should in addition to the regular stipulated salary, assume the responsibility of providing a suitable home in which the pastor may live, a heating plant for that home, and, also, payment of utilities, including fuel, electricity, water, water-conditioning, and sewage, on a basis to be worked out between the pastor and the church. The parsonage telephone, except for personal long-distance calls, shall be considered as church incidental expense and paid for by the church.

2. All charges and stations to which a pastor shall move shall pay the moving and transportation expenses of said pastor, the same to be done in addition to his salary. When the Conference demands the services of any one, it shall bear the moving expenses, if any ex-

pense shall be incurred.

3. No charge shall call any one as pastor, or to supply the work by ministers coming from other denominations as long as there are ministers in our Conference qualified and available to take work. The President after he has exercised his prerogative in the reception of ministers coming from other denominations is to immediately refer them to the Committee on Itineracy and Elders Orders, who shall make a thorough investigation as to the ministry and life of such applicants, who shall report their findings to the President, after which, appointments may be made.

4. Each charge should grant their pastor each year two weeks

vacation with pay.

5. The Sunday School offerings of one Sunday of each month shall be divided equally by the local treasurer between "Home Missions" and "Conference Expense Fund" until these budgets are in full. The same to be forwarded to the Conference Treasurer, quarterly.

6. The Annual business meeting of the local church, which is referred to in Par. 165 (4) of the Discipline, shall be held during the

month of June.

The chairman of the local Pulpit Supply should have been a delegate in the past three years.

IV. Conference.

1. Each Annual Conference shall be held at Fairmount, Indiana,

beginning on the Tuesday nearest August eighth.

The first Sunday of the Annual Gathering belongs to the old conference year and the second Sunday of the Annual Gathering belongs to the new conference year, this applies to pastoral appointment.

3. The fiscal year begins July 1st and ends June 30.

 The sitting of the Conference for each day is considered as one meeting.

5. In examination of characters the Conference officials shall be

called first.

6. The President and his advisory board shall be consulted before any love offering shall be taken.

7. The Secretary and the Assistant Secretary constitute a commit-

tee on communications.

8. The Assistant Secretary is to act as reporter of the Conference

to the Marion Daily papers.

9. The Treasurers shall submit their reports by July 25th, to the Auditing Committee who shall audit the same and in their report to this body they shall show they have audited the same.

10. The Conference Missionary Board shall be composed of the Conference President, the Conference W.M.S. President, and two elderand two laymen nominated by the Nominating Committee and elected by the Conference. The term of the elected members shall be for one year, and they shall not serve more than four consecutive years. It is recommended that no one, other than the Conference President, be at the same time a member of the Missionary Board and the Conference Board of Trustees. The Conference President shall be President of the Missionary Board by virtue of his office. The Missionary Board shall have complete control of all funds raised for Conference Extension, and shall carry on the work of the Conference Missions between the sessions of the Conference.

11. The Board of Trustees shall authorize all disbursements not

otherwise provided for.

- 12. The President shall receive \$100.00 the Vice President \$50.00 the Secretary \$100.00 the Treasurer \$300.00, the Assistant Secretary \$50.00, each member of the Auditing Committee \$25.00 each member of the Statistical Committee \$40.00 Pension Plan Treasurer \$100.00 and expenses; the expenses of the Committee on Itineracy and Elders Orders: the same to be paid from the Conference Expense Fund. The Conference Sunday School Secretary shall receive \$100.00 and each member of the Conference Sunday School Board \$50,00, the same to be paid out of the Sunday School Treasury.
- 13. The President of the Conference, and Vice President shall be given each year a two weeks vacation with pay, said vacation to be at a time of their own choosing.
- 14. When the churches which have been placed in the hands of the President decide as to who shall be their pastor before the Minutes are sent to press, the same shall be entered in the minutes as if ordered by this Conference.
- 15. The emergency Benefit Fund shall be used for the relief of ministers of the conference or their widows who shall make application to the Conference President for financial assistance in time of sickness or other emergency. This fund to be administered by the Conference Board of Trustees.
- All churches receiving regular financial aid from the Conference Extension Fund shall be under the direction of the Missionary Board.
- 17. A Building Committee composed of two ministers and two laymen shall be nominated by the nominating committee and be elected

y the Conference. The Conference President shall be chairman Ex-

fficio of this committee.

18. The Conference Secretary is authorized to purchase a floral ffering for the family in the event of death of any of our ministers he same to apply to elders or conference preachers in the events of e death of the minister's husband, wife, son or daughter. The father nd mother of the Conference Officials, who are not pastors, shall be cluded. When requested, the price of the flowers shall be given as a issionary memorial. The memorial to be paid from the Conference xpense Fund.

19. In the election of President, Vice President, Secretary and reasurer, the first ballot shall be a nominating ballot. The two names

eceiving the highest number of votes shall be the nominees.

20. The President shall call a meeting of the ministers and their ives in the different parts of the conference during the conference ear. The purpose of this meeting is to promote the work of the conserence. The president shall set forth goals, suggest means of attaining tese goals and in general seek to promote a greater interest in the onference program. All pastors shall be required to attend this meeting except when a legitimate cause may hinder.

21. The President and the Vice President shall constitute the Excutive Committee of the WESLEYAN MESSENGER, and the Vice resident shall serve as Editor. This Executive Committee shall be mpowered to select some person as Business and Circulation Manager. 'he departments which use the columns of the WESLEYAN MESSEN-IER regularly shall make contributions toward the expenses of the

ame.

Committees.

 The Committee on Elders Orders is to transfer all persons to the tudy list who may have been recommended to travel and may not have seen given work, providing they are meeting the disciplinary requirenents in the course of study.

2. When recommendations to travel and to study preparatory to ravel are presented to the Conference in session, they shall be recorded by the Secretary and automatically referred to the Committee on Itinericy and Elders Orders, without having been read to the Conference.

3. The Camp Meeting Committee shall nominate and the Conference elect the one to preach the opening sermon of the next Conference

Year with his alternate.

4. The Conference shall elect five members of the Camp Meeting Committee. Three of which are to be ministerial members, one to be elected each year for a term of three years; two to be lay members, one to be elected each year for a term of two years.

No building or major repair involving structural changes on thurch property shall be undertaken without the approval of the Con-

ference Building Committee.

6. A nominating committee shall be elected during the session of conference, consisting of two ministers and two laymen, the President as chairman. This committee shall meet prior to the next Annual Conference and fill committees with nominees to be approved or disapproved by the conference. This committee shall be nominated and elected from the open floor of conference and shall serve for one year only, except, the chairmen who retains this position by virtue of his office.

We earnestly request that the pastor present, or have presented, the work of the Burial Association at least once during the conference

year, and seek to obtain new members for the same.

VIII. Pension Plan.

1. Let it be clearly understood by every member of the Conference that aside from the provisions of the Pension Plan the Conference has no fund upon which to draw to meet the financial needs of the superannuated or permanently incapacitated ministers or their dependents.

2. Let it further be understood by the membership of the Conference that following the rise of the 1952 Indiana Annual Conference any eligible minister who has failed to join the plan will have voluntarily waived his right, and that of his dependents, to any financial aid from the Conference in the case of his superannuation, or physical disability, which forced him to retire from active service within the Conference before or after the age of retirement.

3. Any person receiving a pastoral or general evangelist appointment, excepting those who were serving at the time of the 1954 annual conference or those appointed to such work at that conference, shall be required to become a member of the Superannuated Pension Plan.

June 1 the church voted unanimously for R. R. Prickett to serve at pastor for the remainder of the year and for the coming year. On this date Brother Prickett accepted the call and I appointed him pastor o the Noblesville church with his duties to begin July 1.

- 19. June 24—The New Castle Church Division. Late in May the New Castle Church voted on the return of the pastor, C. A. Kerschner wno had served them since last August. The vote resulted in 27 voting for change and 19 voting for no change. Within a very short time Don Phillips catted several of the minority group together and they voted to withdraw from the church and start another church. At the same meeting tney voted to invite Brother Kerschner to become pastor of the new group. On May 26 elected representatives of the minority group, namely, Don Phillips, Marion Futrell, and Orville E. Rhoade: came to Marion and talked about starting another churca. On June I took the Advisory Board to New Castle and met the church in a closed business meeting and we made a sincere effort to get the old senters to wait another year and then start another Wesleyan Church in a peaceful way. Our efforts were not successful. We were handed a petition signed by 23 members and several others asking for "recogni tion as a duty organized Wesleyan Methodist Church." We took the matter under advisement and left without reaching any agreement One week later on June 11 the representatives of the minority group met with me and the Advisory Board in Marion. At that time they demanded our decision. Inasmuch as the entire proposal was to be of their terms with an unwillingness to be reconciled, there appeared to be no alternative but to deny the petition. Among the reasons given for our decision were the following:
- The meetings which resulted in the request for another church were held very soon after the vote on the pastor and the action taker so nastily is considered as a protest to the desires of a majority of the church.
- The method proposed to start a new church, by withdrawal ir disagreement, is against the established policy of the conference,
- 3. This type of withdrawal will not give a proper witness to our cardinal doctrine of holiness. It announces to one and all that holiness goes not work out in practice,

On Thursday night, June 13, the New Castle church voted to waive its right to call a pastor and leave the matter in the hands of the con ference in accordance with paragraph 87 of the Discipline. On June 24 I received and accepted the resignation of C. A. Kerschner from the

Report No. 7 REPORT OF SPECIAL COMMITTEE

At the 1957 session of the Indiana Conference, we were elected as a special committee to study the provisions for the Conference Board of Trustees and The Missionary Board in the Discipline, paragraphs 120, 121, 277, and 278, especially the differences between them in the light of our Conference having only board, and the relationship of this matter to the work of Conference Extension.

Upon careful examination of the Discipline, we have discovered that there are differences in the provisions for these two boards in four areas: personnel, mode of election and term of service, duties,

and the manner of filling vacancies.

1. As to personnel, the Board of Trustees is to be made up of not less than five members, two of whom shall be laymen; and the Missionary Board is to be made up of not less than three members, of whom the Conference President shall be one, and he shall serve as President of the Missionary Board, and the President of the Conference W. M. S. shall also be a member by virtue of her office.

2. As to election and term of service, members of the Board of Trustees are elected by ballot for three years, but members of the Missionary Board are elected for one year, the means not designated.

3. As to duties, the Board of Trustees is. "to receive, and hold, and dispose of all property within the bounds of the conference, according to the provisions of the Discipline and the directions of the conference." On the other hand, the Missionary Board is to carry on the work of missions between the sessions of the Conference, as the Conference may instruct, or direct. It shall elect a treasurer unless the Conference does so. It may serve as the Board of Managers for the Conference. It may employ missionary evangelists between sessions of the Conference, and they shall report to the Conference as if appointed by it.

4. As to filling of vacancies, in the Board of Trustees this shall be done by the Committee of Vacancies, but in the Missionary Board

it shall be done by the board itself.

In the light of these differences, your Committee feels that while some of the provisions are not mutually exclusive, it would be impossible for one board to operate according to all of the rules for both boards. It is our judgment that while the Discipline is a bit ambiguous at this point, we are not abiding by the provisions of the Discipline

with only one Board.

Furthermore, we have inquired as to the procedure in most of the other conferences in the United States, choosing the ones most com-parable to our own and one or two of the Mission Conferences, and have discovered that we are not in accord with the general practice. Of the twenty conferences that responded to our questionnaire, 16 have separate boards, while 4 have the same board; though in only one of these is the procedure quite like that of our own conference. Not one of the ones with separate boards was dissatisfied, most were enthusiastic about the system, many ascribed their gains, at least partially, to this type of organization. It is noteworthy that these include the fastest growing conferences in the denomination.

Therefore, your committee recommends that under "Resolutions and Laws of the Indiana Conference," Article IV, paragraph 10, be changed to read as follows:

The Conference Missionary Board shall be composed of the Conference President, the Conference W. M. S. President, and two elders and two laymen nominated by the Nominating Committee and elected by the Conference. The term of the elected members shall be for one year, and they shall not serve more than four consecutive years. It is recommended that no one, other than the Conference President, be at the same time a member of the Missionary Board and the Conference soard of Trustees. The Conference President shall be President of the Missionary Board by virtue of his office. The Missionary Board shall have complete control of all funds raised for Conference Extension, and shall carry on the work of the Conference Missions between the sessions of the Conference.

- All church budget excepting that raised by the W.M.S., the Y.M.W.B., and the Wesleyan Youth shall be sent to the Conference Treasurer.
- When a pastor fails to raise in full the Conference Expense Budget, he shall report to the Conference Body a satisfactory reason for not doing so.
- ITEM II. The President shall have general supervision of the work of the Conference.

The visitation schedule shall be so arranged that each church in the Conference shall be visited once during the year by either

the President or the Vice-President.

The Vice-President shall be responsible for the supervision and promotion of the Extension Work of the Conference subject to the approval of the Missionary Board. Each quarter he shall visit each church or pastor that is regularly receiving conference support and/or under the direction of the Missionary Board to counsel, advise, and help those pioneer pastors and churches with their problems, except when excused by the Missionary Board. Ine pastors of those churches are asked to make monthly reports to the Vice-President. He shall forward those reports to the Missionary Board, at least quarterly. He and the district superintendents shall be responsible to seek for openings throughout the Conterence and report the same to the Missionary Board. It shall be his duty to see that funds are raised for Extension Work.

A minimum goal of \$4.00 per full member shall be raised for

Conference Extension.

There shall be hominated by the Pastoral Relations Committee and elected by the Conference, a District Superintendent for each of the Conference Districts, who will assist the Vice-President in carrying out the Conference Extension work. It shall be their duty to inform the Vice-President of any possible openings for the extension of the work of the church in their respective districts. They shall assist in the raising of Conference Extension Funds. The pastors in each district are urged to co-operate and expected to do so.

ITEM III. The salary of the President shall be \$375.00 per month plus utilities (including fuel, electricity, water, water-conditioning and sewage), and that of the Vice-President \$300.00 plus utilities the same to be paid by the Conference Treasurer monthly, with expenses incidental to their work. The Vice-President shall receive \$40.00 per month parsonage rent. The President and Vice-President shall employ secretarial help as needed, to be paid for from Conference Expense.

Report No. 14 REPORT OF THE RESOLUTIONS COMMITTEE

We. your committee on Resolutions, submit the following report:

1. In view of the trend today toward shallow decisions for Christ: be it resolved that our church place a strong emphasis on the necessity of our people living a consistent saved and sanctified life in Christ.

2. Inasmuch as we are living in an age of laxity; let us stress the importance of regular attendance to the means of grace, expecially to the mid-week prayer meeting, and realize our obligation of using the

store house plan of tithing.

3. In observance of the fourth commandment. "Remember the Sabbath day to keep it holy." Exodus 20:8: we insist that our people abstain from buving and selling, and participating in worldly pleasures

on the Lord's day.

4. Realizing sin and immorality are running rampant in the world today, we wish to voice our protest against immodest dress, public bathing, the use of tobacco, intoxicating beverages, and narcotics; furthermore, we ask that our children be instructed against the evil of being associated with these and other forms of worldliness. We urge our neonle to read and heed the general and special rules of the Wesleyan Methodist Discipline.

5. Recognizing the great evil of divorce, we admonish our ministers to preach against it and to instruct our youth in the sanctity of

the home.

6. Since we are grieved over the invasion of the television into the American home, we urge our people to take their stand against this channel of evil as well as that of the degrading literature found on the news stands of today. We further denounce the Satanic influence of the "Bock'n Roll" music that is undermining the morals of our teenagers. Therefore, be it resolved that in our homes there be established family altars which would create a godly atmosphere and influence our children toward Holy living.

7. We believe our ministers should continue to sound a warning against false cults especially that of the Roman Catholic Church in its hid for world power. We caution our people against voting for any Catholic for public office and warn our young people against familiar

associations with Catholic young people.

8. Due to the integration issue in our nation, we earnestly ask our people to manifest a Christ-like spirit regarding racial discrimination.

9. Due to the fact that we are ever on the brink of war. and young men of our churches are continually being called into the armed forces; we recommend that the Wesleyan Service Men's Commission have our wholehearted cooperation.

10. Let us determine to continue to seek a revival and keep the

anointing of the Holy Spirit upon us.

Standing Rules

- 1. The first session of the Wesleyan Youth Conference shall convene Tuesday afternoon of conference week at one o'clock, and sessions shall continue daily until all business is transacted.
- 2. The president shall appoint the chairman of each committee and the Executive Council shall nominate the rest of the members of the committee; their report to be read and voted upon in the first session of annual conference.
- 3. All organized locals keep permanent records of membership and finances. The list of members shall be revised at the close of each conference year.
- 4. The Finance and Appropriations Committee shall be composed of five members elected by the Wesleyan Youth Conference and a sixth member chosen from and by the Committee on Finance and Appropriations of the main conference body.
- 5. There shall be a Wesleyan Youth Camp Committee of five members. The president of the Wesleyan Youth shall be chairman exofficio; the other four members to be elected for a term of four years. One shall be elected annually or until his successor is elected so that the term of all will not expire at the same time. The Wesleyan Youth Camp Committee shall elect one of its members as treasurer of the Youth Camp.
- There shall be a Youth Camp of one week duration and the date of the camp shall be set by the Wesleyan Youth Camp Committee.
- Members of the Executive Council shall not hold the office of District Chairman, but shall work in co-operation with and under the direction of the president.
- 8. There shall be elected an assistant secretary whose duty shall be to assist the secretary and to compile the statistics. The secretary shall be given the privilege of making the nomination.
- 9. All churches shall send their delegates credentials and statistical reports to the secretary by July 5.
- 10. The Executive Council of the Wesleyan Youth shall have complete charge of helping new works.
- 11. The local president shall consult with the pastor when making out their annual Wesleyan Youth report, to avoid inconsistencies in the same.
- 12. Copies of the report of the Finance and Appropriations Committee shall be mailed within three weeks after the close of conference, one copy to each district chairman, pastor, and local president. These reports shall be carefully presented to each local by its president as soon after conference as possible.
- The treasurer shall report at the annual conference the locals that have raised the budget in full.
- 14. The executive council of each local Wesleyan Youth should consult with the pastor and his board of stewards before planning its financial program for the year.
- 15. There shall be a missionary committee elected by each local, who shall be responsible for one missionary service each month.

Report No. 8

REPORT OF THE FINANCE AND APPROPRIATIONS COMMITTEE

I. Rallies

We recommend that each district co-operate with the following conference program as to rallies:

- A. That the district chairman be responsible for the rallies and that notices of said ratties be sent to the courches and the Conference Youth President at least two Sundays in advance in order to promote closer co-operation between the district chairman and the president kalties should be held quarterly and, if possible, monthly. It no other system is being provided by the district, railies should be held on the fifth Sunday when it occurs.
- B. As the Scripture recognizes that Christ grew in wisdom (education), stature (physical), and in favor with God (spiritual), and man (social), we too suggest that the rallies be as equally balanced in their interests.
- C. As soon as possible after conference a rally be held in each district under the direction of the district chairman. This snall be a banner count rally. One of the purposes of this rally shall be to organize for the new year and prepare for the conference promotional rally.
- D. The president or vice president shall participate in a rally in each district during the months of April or May for the purpose of promoting the May 30th rally and Youth Camp, with a special evangelistic emphasis.
- E. That the district chairmen call a meeting of the local presidents, district officers, and district adult counselor within a month after the rise of this conference for the purpose of planning district

rallies for the year. A notice of this should be sent to the Youth Conference President.

The local president shall be responsible to see that each active and associate member signs a membership card annually.

shall be reported as a member until the pledge card is signed.

G. That the following point system for district banner be adopted: local president or vice president at rally. 5 points; master present. 5 points: for each 1% of active members present (to be based on the current number of members except for those in college), 1 points: for each active WV member present 1 point; for each non-member present, 1 point: for each mile traveled to the rally site. 1 point.

H. That a loving cup be passed to the society, and the award he based on the percentage of subscribers to THE WESLEYAN YOUTH as to the number of church members plus the number of subscriptions to THE WESLEYAN YOUTH. The loving cups are to be secured from

the Executive Council by the district chairmen.

That the conference print and distribute to the locals suitable

blanks to implement the point system.

J. That there be a conference rally held on the Campground on Memorial Day, and that the conference banner be awarded on the same basis as that of district rallies.

That the conference loving cup be awarded on the same basis

as that of district rallies during the annual conference.

L. That the local president, adult youth counselor, and youth solicitor shall be responsible for promotions to subscriptions to THE WESLEYAN YOUTH and shall see that members subscribe.

II. Projects

A. For conference project we recommend the following:

That there be a leaders' conference in the fall at Marion Collage for local presidents or a representative, district chairmen, and the Executive Council, and that the program be planned by the Executive Council.

That the Executive Council take up the advisement of having

a caravan, council going to Marion in the spring.

3. In keeping with the emphasis of the church extension program that assistance be rendered in such area as deemed advisable by the Conference Board of Trustees, and to such extent as deemed advisable by the Missionary Board.

4. The Executive Council be responsible to promote the Bible quiz program and provide the information to the local presidents of

such.

B. For locals we recommend the following: That the locals plan and promote the interests of the Bible quiz in organizing and preparina team. plan visitation programs and special meetings with members of the local such as jail services, hospital and shut-in visitations, distributing tracts, and radio programs.

III. Finance

For finance we recommend the following:

That the salary of the conference officers be as follows:

1. President—\$120.00.

Vice President-\$50.00.

Secretary—\$75.00

4. TreasurerJ\$75.00

5. Assistant Secretary-\$10.00

Said salary to be paid in equal payments, on December 5, and the other June 1.

- B. That the desk and traveling expenses of the president, vice president, secretary, and treasurer, be paid from the Youth Conference Budget; and the desk and traveling expenses of the Youth Camp Committee be paid from the Youth Camp Treasury and the said expenses be paid at least quarterly. That traveling expense be figured on the basis of 6 cents per mile.
 - C. That the budget for the following year be as follows:
 - 1. General Dues, \$1.50 per active member of the local.
 - 2. Conference Budget (based on church membership) 60c.
- 3. One-third of the Conference Budget to be designated for the Youth Camp and the rest used at the decretion of the Executive Council.
- 4. On the basis of the above apportionment exact assessments for each item shall be made for each local and mailed to the pastors and local presidents by the conference secretary within two weeks of the rise of this conference session.
- 5. That above funds be sent in quarterly on remittance blanks furnished by the conference. Inasmuch as this is based on church membership, the church should feel its responsibility to aid the local when necessary.
- D. That the Executive Council shall have power to appropriate money from the Conference Budget for the general promotion of the Youth work.
- E. That all monies raised within the local for missions be forwarded to the Wesleyan Youth Treasurer for departmental credit and that said money be raised by monthly missionary offerings and be sent in quarterly with the Wesleyan Youth Budget.

IV. Standing Rules

A. That the Executive Council call a meeting of all district chairmen semi-annually.

B. That standing rule 15 be omitted.
