Resolutions

The following resolutions which pertain to the local churches shall be read by the pastors to their people within six weeks after the receipt of the Conference Minutes and at least four weeks before the Annual Conference.

2. Fiscal Year: Resolved, that the closing date of the fiscal year be June 30 and we request that all statistical reports be in the hands of the Conference Treasurer by July 15. We further request that he forward the blanks to the Statistical Chairman not later than July 25.

2. Conference and Camp Date: Resolved, that the Conference begin annually at 1:30 p.m. on the first Tuesday in August for the organizing of Conference business and committee work, and continue through Saturday night or until completed, and that Camp begin the first Sunday morning following the beginning of Conference and continue through the second Sunday.

3. Order of Business: Inasmuch as it is the desire of the Conference to complete its business as soon as possible it is recommended that the following order of business be followed:

First, the front ten rows of the middle sections and the platform of the tabernacle constitute the Conference bar.

Second, all recommendations to travel or study be turned directly to the assistant secretary, who shall turn them to the Committee on Itineracy and Orders.

Third, minister's reports shall be given immediately after the officer's reports are given and continue whenever other business will permit.

Fourth, business shall continue from 8:30 a.m. to 12:00 noon and from 1:30 p.m. to the hour for the Orders of the Day.

4. Nominating Committee: Resolved, that we elect a committee of five elders, including the president as chairman ex-officio, and five delegates elect from five churches designated by the Conference to:

First, examine the credentials that are in the hands of the committee at the time of its first meeting.

Second, nominate all sessional committees and be prepared to report at the first session of Conference.

Third, examine all delegates' credentials, whether regular or alternate, which are turned in to the committee after the first seating of delegates, and to report such to the Secretary, who shall read the names added to the roll at the next session at which they are automatically seated, if no objections are raised.

Fourth, nominate the personnel of all the Conference Boards and report at an early session of the Conference.

Fifth, nominate the Committee Chairmen for next year, including a full statistical Committee to be elected to serve the next year, and the chairman of the Ministerial Association.

Sixth, nominate the District Chairmen.

5. President to Appoint Tellers: Resolved, that following the convening of Conference and previous to the Orders of the Day for election of Conference Officers, the President shall appoint tellers for the occasion.

6. Election of Conference Officers: Resolved, that the election of Conference officers be held the second day of Conference immediately following the morning devotional period.

7. President's Duties: Resolved, that the Conference President's duties shall be: (a) Travel the Conference, visiting each church at least twice during the year, giving a total of three services to each church. The time of the visits and rotation of field and office work be left to the arrangement of the president; (b) Secure quarterly reports of the pastors, using the findings of the same for the purpose of promoting the spiritual and material welfare of the churches; (c) Urge the proper repair and insurance of church property; (d) The President may upon the request of the Board of Stewards or the pastor of a local church call a meeting to help arrange a workable financial plan for the church; (e) Raise funds for the church extension program.

8. Auditing of Financial Reports: Resolved, that all financial reports together with the books that are to be audited by the Conference Auditing Committee be submitted to said Committee before being read on the Conference floor.

9. Introduction of New Business: Resolved, that all new business of such a nature as to require an election must be presented not later than noon of the third day of Conference.

10. Orders of the Day: Resolved, that (a) the Camp Meeting and Campground Committee be permanently the Committee on Orders of the Day, to prepare ahead of time the Conference Program for publication in the "Wesleyan Visitor;" (b) the following services be fixed as permanent Orders of the Day:

Tuesday evening, Conference Sermon at 7:30 by the Conference President.

Wednesday evening, Education Service at 7:30.

Thursday evening, Public Service of the W.M.S. at 7:30.

Friday evening, Sunday School Service at 7:30.

Saturday evening, Youth Rally at 7:30.

Sunday morning, Ordination Service at 9:30.

11. **Camp Meeting Committee:** Resolved, that the President of the Wesleyan Youth be a member ex-officio of the Camp Meeting Committee.

12. **Evangelistic Help:** Resolved, that the Campground and Camp Meeting Committee be authorized to engage evangelistic help for the Camp Meeting as far in advance as deemed advisable.

13. **Additional Delegate:** Resolved, that when more than one delegate from any one church presents credentials to this body, there shall appear in the credentials the name of the elder that entitles the church to the additional delegate.

14. **Superannuate Service:** Resolved, that one public service in each Annual Camp Meeting or Conference period be set aside in honor of the Superannuate Fund and that it be the duty of the Superannuate Board to arrange for such service.

15. **1% Assessment to Be Paid:** Resolved, that effective at the beginning of the Conference year 1955, every active minister of the Kansas Conference receiving an appointment by the Conference shall be required to pay 1% assessment on the total receipts for the current Conference year as determined by the rules and regulations of the Superannuate Pension Plan of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America; membership in the plan being optional, with the minister.

16. **Tenure of Office:** Resolved, that all Conference Officers continue in office until the close of the annual session of Conference.

17. **Pastors Paid Through Conference:** Resolved, that the Church's financial obligation to the pastor, whether he be leaving the field or not, be extended through the Conference and Camp Meeting Period.

18. **Pastor's Moving Expense:** Resolved, that the church hiring a minister shall assume all responsibility of moving expense.

19. **Pastor's Expense at Annual Conference:** Resolved, that inasmuch as the pastor is actually a representative of the local church at the Annual Camp and Conference, that the local churches pay the expense of the Pastor and his wife, including room, board, and transportation, the same to be paid in advance.

20. **Sunday School Averages:** Resolved, that the two Sundays of Conference and Camp not be counted in the Sunday School average attendance reports made to Conference.

21. **Quarterly Meeting Dates:** Resolved, that the first quarterly meeting of the Conference year be held three months from the closing date of the previous conference year and that they continue throughout the year at regular three month intervals. Pastors are urgently re-

quested to make proper provision for the observance of the Lord's Supper at these intervals.

22. Pastors Released for Meeting: Resolved, that at the request of the Missionary Board a church so approached shall release its pastor for one meeting, the same to be held on a new field or one of the weaker charges under the direction of said Board, and that the local church pay its pastor's salary during such engagement. The pastor so engaged shall receive money for the special meeting expenses incurred during such employment, the same to be paid by the church or charge being served, or by the Missionary Board.

23. Pastor Nominates Steward: Resolved, that the pastor be granted the privilege of nominating one member of the Board of Stewards from each church on his charge.

24. Reporting of All Contributions: Resolved, that the Conference President and each pastor urge the people to make all contributions through their local church and society treasuries, in view of more equitable distribution of funds.

25. Vacations: Resolved, that the Conference President be granted a vacation over two Sundays, that the greater part of three weeks might be taken if desired, and that he be given two weeks' pay in addition to his regular salary at the time he chooses for vacation.

Resolved, that each charge grant their pastor a one Sunday leave of absence from his work, that the greater part of two weeks might be spent for vacation and that the church give him one weeks' pay in addition to his regular salary at the time agreed upon by pastor and church for vacation.

26. Money to Treasurer: Resolved, that the treasurers be urged to send all remittances to the Conference Treasurer in whole dollars when possible; and that the local treasurers send budget money each quarter to the Conference Treasurer.

27. Calling List: Whereas, most of the friends and members of our local churches are won through personal contact by the pastors; and, whereas, many of these friends and prospective members are lost in the changing from one pastor to another because the incoming pastor does not know of these people nor their interests in the church;

Be it resolved that the Conference shall ask each pastor to prepare a calling list of all the homes connected with the church and Sunday school, listing the relationship they hold to the church, listing their names and addresses by city, street, and number; the same to be kept for his work while on the pastorate and to be given to his successor on the field.

28. Church Delegate Expense: Resolved, that the local church pay the Annual Conference church Delegate's room, board, and transportation expenses, the same to be paid in advance.

29. **Church Extension:** Resolved, that one Sunday per month be designated by each church for receiving a special Sunday school offering, the same to be given to the Missionary Board for church extension and to help weaker churches not yet self-supporting, and that the pastor and superintendent help stimulate the giving in these offerings. That these monies are to be loaned without interest under the supervision of the Missionary Board.

30. **Wesleyan Visitor:** Resolved, (a) that the Conference shall publish the periodical known as the **Wesleyan Visitor**, the subscription price to be .75c; (b) that each Sunday school of the Conference pay a minimum of \$2.00 to supplement the subscription income of the **Visitor**, the same to be sent to the editor; (c) that each church so responding shall receive one subscription per .50c sent in; (d) that each church elect a subscription solicitor to the **Wesleyan Visitor**.

31. **Conveying Property:** Resolved, that all instruments conveying property for church or parsonage use, carry the official name of the church, viz., "The Kansas Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America, Inc."

32. **Trustees Authorized:** Resolved, that all action taken heretofore by the Trustees of the Annual Conference in the interim between the meeting of such Annual Conferences concerning the purchase or conveyance of real estate are hereby approved and confirmed and held to be as binding upon the Annual Conference as they would have been if such action had been specifically authorized by the Annual Conference.

Resolved, that the duly elected and qualified Trustees of the Annual Conference are hereby authorized and directed to take such necessary action as to them seems proper and expedient and to the interest of the Annual Conference and the local churches concerning the purchase, sale, mortgaging, and conveying of real estate during the interim between the meeting of the Annual Conference and all such actions so taken by the Trustees shall be deemed to be legal and binding upon the Annual Conference and as full force as they would have been if such actions on the part of the Trustees had been specifically authorized by the Annual Conference.

33. **Board of Building and Location:** Resolved, that: A. the Board on Church and Parsonage Building and Location consist of the Missionary Board and the Conference Trustees; B. The Missionary Board shall be composed of five elders, including the president as chairman ex-officio, and four laymen, with not more than three of the members being changed in a given year; C. The travel expense of the Board of Building and Location be allowed at the rate of .03c per mile in excess of 100 miles round-trip, the same to be taken from the Missionary Board Treasury.

34. Conference Loans: Resolved, that the Conference Treasurer shall issue no loans from any Conference monies except by sanction of the Conference Trustees.

35. Subscription Lists: Resolved, that all subscription lists and monies raised at Conference for all purposes be put through the hands of the Treasurers of the Conference, the W.M.S., or the Camp Meeting Committee and that said Treasurers furnish the Conference President with a copy of the subscription lists which they hold that he may furnish each pastor with a list of subscriptions from his charge.

36. Unleavened Bread: Resolved, that all our churches use unleavened bread in the administration of the Lord's Supper. We suggest the following recipe: One-half cup of flour, one rounded tablespoon of butter, moisten with water enough to roll. Mark in $\frac{1}{2}$ inch squares and bake as pie dough. This recipe will serve 65-70 people.

37. New Resolutions: Resolved, that all proposed resolutions and changes in existing resolutions, to be considered at the next Conference, be printed in the *Wesleyan Visitor* at least sixty days before the next session of Conference.

All proposed resolutions and changes in existing resolutions not so printed shall require a two-thirds vote to pass.

38. Ministerial Association: Resolved, that (a) the Annual Convention of the Ministerial Association be held on Tuesday, Wednesday, and Thursday of the second week in March of each Conference year; (b) an offering equivalent to .25c per member be taken in each local church, to be sent to the chairman of the Ministerial Association. Such monies shall be used to defray the traveling expense of the pastors whose salary is \$1,850 or less, at the rate of .02c per mile, round trip; also that the pastor and his wife from said churches be given \$1.00 each per day for meals; (c) pastors from the more distant churches that are over 200 miles from the Convention be paid .02c per mile in excess of 400 miles round trip, irrespective of salary; (d) the Ministerial Association Committee with the President of the Conference be authorized to engage Convention speakers as far in advance as it may seem advisable.

39. Prayer Convention: Resolved, that each district hold a District Prayer Convention, and that District Chairmen shall be responsible for planning such Conventions, the time and place to be announced in an issue of the *Wesleyan Visitor*.

40. Candidates to Elders' Orders: Resolved, that all candidates to Elders' Orders present the Committee on Itineracy and Orders a transcript of credits which may be accepted in lieu of the Conference course and a list of books and reading other than textbooks.

41. **Pastors Vacating Parsonage:** Resolved, that each pastor when moving from his charge, shall vacate the parsonage during the first week following the close of Camp week or at such other time as designated by the Annual Conference or the President and his Advisory Board.

42. **Room Reservations:** Resolved, that any persons reserving rooms in Conference or School dormitories pay room rents one year in advance. In the event the room is not to be used at Conference the party shall inform the one in charge by the opening day of Conference, in which case monies received shall be refunded provided the one in charge is notified on or before the first day of Conference.

43. **Solicitation of Funds:** Resolved, that (a) requests by, and plans of all organizations and individuals desiring to visit the churches of the Conference for the purpose of soliciting funds, shall be referred to and cleared by a committee composed of the President of the Conference, the President of the W.M.S., and the Treasurer of the Missionary Board, before the completion of such plans with the local churches; (b) We urgently recommend that 50% of all monies solicited from the churches of the Conference for projects not sponsored by the Conference or the Wesleyan Methodist Denomination shall be retained by the local church involved and contributed to Denominational Missions or to Conference Church Extension.

44. **Pastor's Reporting of Contributions:** Resolved, that amounts paid by the church for pastor's official expense be included on the Statistical Report in "Pastor's Salary," and that amounts paid by the church for parsonage utilities be included in "Pastor's Gifts." These amounts are not to be included in church incidental expense. Contributions for Benevolences that do not fall under any of the printed headings in Item IX are to be grouped under "Other Objects."

No new societies have been reported this year but some gains have been noted in establishing and maintaining between Sunday activities, in organized societies.

RESOLUTIONS FOR THE WESLEYAN YOUTH

The local president shall read these suggestions to the society within 30 days after conference and 30 days before conference.

1. That each society sponsor a Youth Revival, the Executive Council being responsible for securing the evangelist, advertising and financing the meetings.

2. That the leaders for Wesleyan Youth services be carefully chosen and the leader's names with lesson topics posted quarterly. It is recommended that the President lead at least once a quarter.

3. That emphasis be given to the Missionary Meeting of the Wesleyan Youth noting that the offering received applies on Church Budget and is divided 50% to Foreign Missions, 25% to Home Missions, and 25% to Education.

4. That emphasis be placed on the offering of Wesleyan Youth Educational Sunday, which is the third Sunday in July. All educational budget money received during the summer quarter may be credited to the Wesleyan Youth.

5. That all societies sending money to the Conference Treasurer:

A. Remit the same quarterly by check or money order rather than small change, and that remittance slips be used and filled out properly.

B. That all societies remit Youth Camp Apportionment, in full, to the Conference Treasurer no later than January 15.

6. That attention be given to local representation at the Annual Wesleyan Youth Conference:

A. The newly elected President and Vice-President.

B. Two delegates. (One additional delegate for societies whose membership exceeds 25).

C. The pastor.

D. In case there is no local Wesleyan Youth organization the pastor may appoint a representative (age 13-40).

7. That the fiscal year close the thirtieth of June and that all monies sent to the Conference Youth Treasurer be postmarked by the third of July and all reports be sent to the Conference Youth Secretary by the tenth of July. These include:

A. Annual Report.

B. Delegate Credentials.

C. Efficiency Standard Report.

8. That the local president and adult counselor receive the Conference Visitor, the subscription to be paid from the society treasury.

9. That the Moral Reform report of the Annual Conference be read within 30 days after receiving the Minutes.

10. That one service be designated for the promotion of Confer-

ence Church Extension Revolving Fund and the raising of the Church Extension apportionment. (See Finance Report).

11. That each district plan at least three Conventions a year, one of which shall be under the direction of the Conference President, and that the District Chairmen be responsible for making a report of these conventions to the Conference Visitor.

12. That the Conference Wesleyan Youth President work out the district visitation itineracy with a District Chairman to the end that mileage expenses may be reduced.. Conference:

13. That a Youth Rally be held on Saturday of the first week of conference, such meeting to be planned by the Executive Council.

A. That a portion of the program be given for a conference wide Bible contest.

B. That District Contestants who are not official representatives be paid board and room while on the grounds, from the Conference Promotional Fund.

C. That an award be given to the "A" society with the highest points. This award will be presented at the Saturday Night rally. If societies be tied in points the winner will be determined by per cent of gain.

14. That there be a Nominating Committee composed of the Wesleyan Youth Conference Executive Council and the first delegates elect from Gas City and Hall Societies and Pastors from St. Louis Overland and Topeka First (Societies rotating alphabetically). The duties of the committee shall be:

A. To examine all credentials and certificates.

B. To nominate all sessional committees and committee chairmen for the ensuing year.

C. To nominate all District Chairmen.

D. To nominate members of the standing committees.

E. To select tellers to serve in the election of officers.

15. That the Annual Wesleyan Youth Conference convene on Monday morning of the Annual Camp Meeting and that sessions be held from 8:30 a.m. to 10:00 a.m. and 1:00 p.m. to 2:30 p.m. each day until business is completed.

16. That the Orders of the Day for the Annual Conference be:
Monday 8:30 a.m.

A. Report of the Nominating Committee.

B. Report of the President.

C. Report of the District Chairmen.

Tuesday 8:30 a.m. Election of officers and reports.

Thursday Morning. Youth Hike.

17. That the Wesleyan Youth President's traveling expense be paid while traveling in the interests of the Conference Wesleyan Youth; when traveling by car, he be allowed 6c per mile.

18. That officers expenses which are not otherwise cared for be paid from the Conference Promotional Fund.

19. That there be a sixth member of the Executive Council whose duty shall be to act as Wesleyan Youth Conference Devotional Chairman, and to serve as Public Relations Director.

20. Youth Camps:

A. That all Youth Camp committees, programs, officers, and workers be approved by the Conference Executive Council.

B. That all Youth Camp treasurers submit a complete financial report to the Conference Treasurer upon the closing of Youth Camp books.

C. That Youth Camp committees be composed of not less than five members.

D. That Pastors and District Chairman, serve on the Youth Camp Committee for District Camps, the District Youth Camp Director be elected by the District Youth Camp committee.

Y.M.W.B. PLAN OF WORK

We the Y.M.W.B. Executive Committee, submit the following Plan of work:

We recommend:

1. That by careful study of the Plan of Work and Efficiency Standard, each Superintendent strive to make a goal of 100%.
2. For memory work, the names and stations of our Missionaries; the songs and Scriptures listed in the July issue of the Young Missionary.
3. The solicitation of the entire Sunday School as members of the Y.M.W.B. Those 1-13 as active members, and all over 13 as Honorary members.
4. That the bands have at least one meeting each month, and a public meeting once every three months.
5. That the money be sent quarterly to the Superintendent, Mrs. Oletha Hoerner, Route 5, Clay Center, Kansas. Quarters ending, September 30, December 30, March 30, and June 30, and remittances post marked not later than the third of the following month.
6. Our Membership goal to be 2,400 and our goal for dues and offerings be \$4,000.

7. That at Conference an award be given to the Band that has met the largest number of the following items:

- (1) For having reached a goal of 100% on the Efficiency Standard.
- (2) For having the greatest percent increase in membership.
- (3) For raising the largest amount of money per member.
- (4) For bringing a poster to Conference.
- (5) For at least 50% of the active members, memorizing the assigned scripture.

8. The new Superintendent elected at the annual election of the W.M.S. take office at the beginning of the New Conference year, and the same to be treasurer of the band. We request each Superintendent to attend Conference, if possible.

The incoming Secretary, Lorene Hotchkiss, was introduced. A duet, "Love Divine," by mother and daughter, Ruth Hotchkiss and Velma Brannon, followed. The Rev. George Huff was introduced as the evening speaker. In graphic language he described heathenism and the need for Redemption's Story. Jesus becomes victor over the paralyzing effect of sin. Motion that a copy of the magazine demonstration be sent to Alice Boyd, Literature Secretary, was adopted.

Greetings from Alice Boyd were conveyed by Sally Heer.

Kansas City District Chairman, Vera Stephens, reported. Report was adopted and expense account referred to the Finance Committee.

Literature table was advertised.

Post Office Report—Faye Oglevie reported. The report was read, corrected, and adopted.

The question of stainless steel knives, forks, and spoons for the

dining hall was discussed. A motion followed to place this matter in the hands of the Executive Committee to be reported in the afternoon session.

Area Convention Delegate—Irene Powell was elected first delegate. Adjourned. Benediction by Marjorie Fredrickson.

Friday, 1:15 p.m.

Irene Millard had charge of the opening song service. Velma Dunbar, devotional chairman, called upon Edith Mehl to lead in prayer.

Courtesy—Mr. Fennell, Temperance speaker from Winona Lake, Indiana, brought greetings to the body.

A special song, "He Giveth More Grace," was sung by Esther Turnbough.

Roll was called. Minutes were read.

La Gonave Hospital—At the moving of the Spirit, pledges were taken to add to the evening offering for the new hospital. Sister Lola Smith was asked by the chair to come forward and list the pledges. A total amount of pledges was raised amounting to \$1,405.00.

Election of Area Convention Delegates—By ballot Leona Cunningham and Irene Millard were elected delegates.

Motion that we come at 6:15 to complete the business session was passed.

Friday, 6:15 p.m.

Study Book Review—"Christ At The Bamboo Curtain," was reviewed by Doris Ferguson in a very interesting manner.

Literature was distributed.

EFFICIENCY STANDARD

1. That the Efficiency Standard be read to the society the first monthly meeting following conference, (5% credit) and that arrangements be made with the Pastor for one missionary prayer meeting each month. (5% credit).

2. That a minimum of ten meetings be held during the year at which time prayer requests are presented and remembered and business transacted. (5% credit). At least one public meeting (5% credit).

3. We recommend the formation of one or more Prayer Partner Circles in each society with a Prayer Partner Secretary within sixty days after the sitting of the annual conference.

4. That the President, Secretary, Treasurer, and the equivalent of 75% of active membership be subscribers to the WESLEYAN MISSIONARY.

5. That a Solicitor be elected for the WESLEYAN MISSIONARY gaining not less than two subscriptions a year

6. That a delegate be elected to the Annual Conference Woman's

Missionary Society and that she be instructed by the local society regarding the amount to be pledged by that society at the Annual Conference session (5% credit). That the President attend the Annual Conference session. (5% credit).

7. That the dues \$1.00 per member be sent directly to the Conference treasurer, 50c of which shall be divided by her as specified and applied on Budget. (5% credit). That all monies and vouchers be sent to the Conference treasurer at least quarterly. (5% credit).

8. That we secure every woman in the church as a member of the society, or achieve a 10% gain in total membership.

9. That each local society pay annually an amount equal to 25c per active member to be used as a General Administrative Fund, not to apply on budget.

10. That the local Y.M.W.B. Superintendent be seated in the Annual session and be granted the privilege of speaking, and provisions be made by her society for such representation. (Ten per cent credit shall be given for each of the above items and all societies making a grade of 80% shall be placed on the honor roll).

Conference Work

11. Conference goal for coming year: 850 active members; 325 honorary members; 1000 magazines.

12. The President and District Chairman arrange the time and recommend the worker for Conference and Convention Visitation.

13. Each district supervised by the District Chairman under the direction of the Conference President.

14. We recommend that at least one workshop for the Y.M.W.B. and Children's worker be held annually.

15. The districts are divided as follows:

Wichita District—Arkansas City, Augusta, Hutchinson, Wichita First, Wichita Mission, Wichita West Side.

Abilene—Abilene, Junction City, Manhattan, Salina.

Concordia—Belleville, Concordia, Hollis, Mankato, Morgan Chapel, New Hope, Wesley Center.

Denver District—Colorado Springs, Denver, Englewood, Greeley.
