Daily Proceedings

Tuesday Afternoon Meeting, June 27, 1961

The 119th annual session of the Champlain Conference of The Wesleyan Methodist Church of America convened at the West Chazy Campground, West Chazy, N. Y. on June 27, 1961 at 2:30 p.m. The conference was called to order by the President, Rev. Charles A. Dayton.

Roll Call: The roll was called with thirty-seven ministerial delegates and twenty-nine lay delegates answering the roll.

Bar of Conference: The conference president called our attention to Standing Rule No. 28 pertaining to the bar of conference.

Devotional Period: The Vice President of the Conference, Rev. Edwin Seaman presided during this period, leading us in singing "Faith Of Our Fathers." Rev. Florence Shippee led us in prayer. Dr. C. E. Wirt of Eastern Pilgrim College was introduced to the body and brought us words of greeting. Following this the Eastern Pilgrim College Quartet sang "Amazing Grace."

Conference President's Address: After commenting upon the energetic and numerous activities of our Conference President, Rev. Seaman introduced to us Rev. Charles A. Dayton, asking us to rise in token of respect.

Brother Dayton read to us from St. John 15:1-10 and spoke upon the subject "Fruitbearing Servants of God." He called our attention to: 1. Source, 'The Vine'; 2. The Removal of The Fruitless; 3. Pruning of The Fruitful; 4. Nature of The Fruit; 5. Condition of Fruitfulness; 6. Results of Fruitfulness. Pertinent was the remark, "We must have Jesus Christ to bear fruit. To have Christ, we must have the Spirit of Christ." We were counseled to maintain the Spirit of Christ in our conference sessions. At the close of his message, Rev. Aldis Lamos led us in prayer.

Conference President's Annual Report: The president read his annual report including his appointments and a schedule of the Orders of the Day. This was adopted by a rising vote. (See Report)

The Committee on Courtesy introduced to the Conference Rev. Price P. Stark of Marion, Indiana, who in turn introduced to us Pastor Sedu Mans of Sierra Leone, West Africa. Each brought words of greeting and testimony. All then joined in singing "Blest Be the Tie that Binds."

Conference Committees Elected: The following committees were elected:

Nominating Committee: St. Lawrence District — Elder, Rev. Edwin Seaman; Layman, Malcolm Starks. Northern District — Elder, Rev. Aldis Lamos; Layman, Antoinette Earl. Central District — Rev. C. Lawrence Hill; Layman, Arthur Elliott. Southern District — Elder, Rev. Hervey Taber; Layman, Orlando Clark.

Passage Of Character: Elder, Rev. Bernard Fortune; Layman, Myrtle Larabee.

Pastoral Relations: Elders, Rev. Reginald Hewitt, Rev. Charles McCallum, Rev. O. M. Finch; Laymen, Wenford Hood, Emma Scribner, Lena Mae Lamphere.

Auditing Committee: Elder, Rev. Ralph Seaman; Layman, Ruth Robinson.

Wesleyan Subscription Manager: The president announced the appointment of Rev. Kenneth Ross as subscription manager for the Wesleyan Methodist.

Home for the Aged: Mr. Lester Potter was elected to act with the president as a representative on the committee for the Home for the Aged.

Delegate: On motion Beverly King was seated as a third delegate from the Fort Miller Church.

Recess: We were recessed by vote for committee work.

Wednesday Morning Meeting, June 28, 1961

The Roll was called at 8:45 a.m.

Devotions: The devotional period was led by Rev. Sedu Mans of Sierra Leone, West Africa. Brother Mans read from Acts 4:32 and after presenting a stirring message from this text, closed with prayer.

The Minutes of the Tuesday afternoon session were read and approved.

Order of the Day: The report of the Statistical Committee.

It was voted that the report of the statistical committee be received with the understanding that it be referred to the auditing committee for any corrections before being given to the secretary. The report was adopted. (See report).

It was moved and seconded that the statistical committee submit its report to the Conference President the Saturday before conference convenes, and that no changes be accepted after the Friday before conference convenes.

By vote this motion was laid upon the table until 3 p. m., Wednesday.

Challenger Report: The Editor of the **Challenger**, Rev. Kenneth Ross, gave his report and it was adopted. (See report).

Order of the Day: Sunday School Secretary's Report.

The Conference Sunday School Secretary, Rev. Floyd Tyler submitted his report with recommendations and it was adopted. (See report).

Conference Treasurer's Report: The Conference Treasurer, Rev. O. M. Finch gave his report and it was adopted. (See report).

A financial ways and means committee elected unofficially at Ministerial Institute presented a number of recommendations for consideration and our further study. The conference president explained the purposes of these recommendations. It was voted that the consideration of this special committee's report be held at 2:00 p. m. this afternoon.

Order of the Day: Report of the Woman's Missionary Society President.

The president, Mrs. Josephine Dayton gave her report and it was adopted by vote. (See W. M. S. Minutes).

Order of the Day: Report of the Tithing Secretary.

Rev. Fred Shippee, Tithing Secretary of the Conference, gave his report and it was adopted. (See report.)

Auditing Committee: The motion prevailed that the number of the auditing committee be increased to four, and Rev. Russell Bissell and Rev. Jesse Russell were elected to complete this committee.

Recess: We were recessed by vote for committee work.

Wednesday Afternoon Meeting, June 28, 1961

Roll Call: The roll was called at 1:30 p. m.

Devotions: Rev. Clifton Chapman was the devotional leader. We sang together the song "Praise Him, Praise Him." Sister Eva Ross having gone home to heaven just before dinner today, prayer was offered in behalf of the Ross family. Brother Chapman led in prayer and then read from Psalm 23 and Ephesians 2:19 commenting upon the Building of God and its foundation.

The Minutes of the Wednesday forenoon session were read and approved.

An Offering was received for flowers for the memorial service in memory of our departed loved ones, also for Sister Eva Ross who passed away today.

Orders of the Day: Consideration of the recommendations of the special financial committee.

The recommendations of this committee were as follows:

1. That the annual conference elect a treasurer of church extension funds who shall receive all conference missions money, both budget and non-budget. (Standing rule 21 — sub-paragraph 4, to be amended to conform)

2. That the board on church and parsonage location be authorized to be a ways and means committee to plan for conference missions needs for each year and to report the same early during the conference sessions.

3. That we have a conference work fund and a conference president's salary fund. The Pastoral Relations Committee shall establish the budget apportionment for these and make salary recommendations.

It was voted that recommendation number one be amended by striking out the words 'Treasurer of Church Extension Funds' and inserting the words 'Conference Missions treasurer'.

Recommendation number one with its amendment was then carried by vote.

Recommendation number two was approved by vote.

Recommendation number three was approved by vote.

The Nominating Committee presented a reading of its report for information.

Resignation: Rev. Thomas Boghosian tendered his resignation as a local trustee of Houghton College. By vote his resignation was accepted with regret.

Conference Statistical Report: It was voted that the motion tabled in the forenoon session relating to the Report of the Statistical Committee be removed from the table and considered.

An amendment was offered to the motion changing its latter part to read, 'that no changes be accepted after the Wednesday before conference convenes. The amendment was approved. The motion then prevailed that Standing Rule No. 14 be made to comply with this action. (See Standing Rule Change) The original was then carried.

Characters Passed: During the afternoon session the characters of the following persons were passed: James Keysor.

Report of the Campmeeting Treasurer: Mrs. Betty LaPlante, Treasurer of The West Chazy Campmeeting Ass'n gave her report and it was accepted as read. (See report)

Conference Missionary Board: A report of the Missionary Board of the Conference and its expenditure of emergency pioneer funds was given by the Conference President. It was approved by vote. (See report)

Recess: We were recessed by vote for committee work.

Thursday Forenoon Meeting, June 29, 1961

Roll Call: The roll was called at 8:45 a. m.

Devotions: Rev. Edwin Seaman led the devotional period reading from the 91st Psalm. We were led in prayer by Rev. Howard Chapman, and closed the devotional period by singing "Glory To His Name."

Committee Courtesy: The committee on courtesy introduced to us Dr. Roy S. Nicholson, President emeritus of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America, and our evangelist for the camp. He brought us words of greeting and testimony.

Delegate: It was voted that Mrs. Lillian Morehouse be seated as the delegate from Bakers Mills.

The Minutes of the Wednesday Afternoon Session were read and approved with corrections.

Order of the Day: The Superannuated Ministers' Relief Association. (See report)

It was voted that the order of the day, namely, the election of conference officers and committees be postponed until the conclusion of the Superannuated Ministers Relief Association business.

Order of the Day: Election of Conference Officers and committees.

The roll was called once again determining that there were 81 voting delegates present.

The committee on courtesy introduced our Denominational Representative Dr. Rufus Reisdorph to the conference who brought us words of greeting.

The conference president then requested that Dr. Reisdorph preside and conduct the election.

The Nominating Committee read its report and after instruction from the chair, we proceeded to vote. The results of the election will be reported later.

At the conclusion of the balloting the Vice President, Rev. Edwin Seaman assumed the chair. It was voted to have an extension of time until 11:45 a. m.

Recess: We were recessed by limitation of time.

Dismissal by Rev. Everett Elliott.

Thursday Afternoon Meeting, June 29, 1961

The Roll was called at 1:35 p. m.

Devotions: Rev. Maurice Jesmer was the devotional leader. We sang together the first two verses of "I Must Tell Jesus." Rev. C. Lawrence Hill led us in prayer. The Vice President, Rev. Edwin Scaman, assumed the chair.

President's Financial Report: The Conference President, Rev. Charles A. Dayton, gave his financial report and it was accepted.

Conference Minutes: It was voted that the price of the conference minutes for this year be \$1.25 per copy.

Report of the Director of Child Evangelism: The Director of Child Evangelism, Mrs. Pauline Streeter, gave her report. The content and the spirit in which the report was given gripped our hearts. We sang the prayer chorus "Lord, Lay Some Soul Upon My Heart." The report was adopted by vote.

Pastoral Relations Committee: During the passage of characters, the Conference President resumed the chair and the Pastoral Relations Committee gave the 1st reading of its report.

Recess: Having sung together, "Blest Be The Tie," it was voted to recess and we were dismissed with prayer.

Friday Forenoon Meeting, June 30, 1961

The Roll was called at 8:50 a. m.

Devotions: Rev. Thomas Boghosian was the devotional leader. We sang "Blessed Assurance", and then stood and repeated together the first Psalm. Brother Boghosian closed with prayer.

The Minutes of the Thursday afternoon session were read and approved.

Characters Passed: During the forenoon session the characters of the following persons were passed: Edward Mein, Donald Klob, Howard Chapman, Elwyn Putney, Quentin Hayes, Charles McCallum, Florence Shippee, Robert Pepper, Fenton L. Harvey.

The Pastoral Relations Committee gave the second reading of its report.

Expression of Appreciation: In as much as Brother Thomas Boghosian is assuming duties in another conference, the conference body stood in an expression of appreciation for past work and regret for his leaving us.

Transfer of Funds: It was voted that we take \$1,165 from the Emergency

Pioneer Fund and that it be placed in the Conference Treasury to balance the books and provide a working balance.

The Committee on Change in Standing Rules presented its recommendations. They are as follows:

1. That standing rule no. 9 be amended to conform with our previous action so as to read as follows:

"The first Sunday of each month shall be known as missions Sunday; the Sunday School offering to go alternately to Church Extension & Evangelism and Conference Missions in that order, and that the conference missions offering be sent to the conference missions treasurer."

The remainder of the rule is to remain unchanged.

2. That in Standing Rule No. 21, sub-paragraph 2, each phrase 'church extension' be changed to the phrase 'Conference Missions.'

3. That in Standing Rule No. 21, Sub-paragraph 3 be amended to read as follows: "All offerings taken for Conference Missions shall be forwarded to The Conference Missions Treasurer; the Conference Missions Treasurer upon recommendation of the Conference President and the committee on Conference Missions, shall disburse these funds . . ."

The remainder of this sub-paragraph to remain unchanged.

These recommendations were approved by vote.

General Evangelists: It was voted that our General Evangelists submit an annual report and that it be included in the Conference Minutes.

Letters of Greeting: The motion prevailed that a letter of greeting be sent to Chaplain and Mrs. Quentin Hayes.

Wesleyan Youth Business Sessions: Donald Klob, Bernard Fortune, Martin Ayer, John Lamos were nominated by the outgoing Wesleyan Youth President, Rev. Robert Finley as a committee to return to this conference session recommendations toward a solution of the problem of the time of Wesleyan Youth business sessions. Rev. Robert Finley's name was added to the committee. The committee was approved.

Ministerial Institute: The Heuvelton Wesleyan Methodist Church extended an invitation to the conference to hold its Ministerial Institute in their church this year. The invitation was accepted.

The Committee on Courtesy introduced to us Dr. and Mrs. Stephen W. Paine of Houghton College. Words of greeting, exhortation and testimony were given by them.

Order of the Day: Denominational Representative's Address: Dr. Rufus D. Reisdorph:

Rev. Edwin Seaman led us in singing "He Brought Me Out." The Conference President then introduced to us Dr. Reisdorph, a general superintendent of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America.

Dr. Reisdorph first called our attention to our denominational publications and other literature of interest. He commented briefly upon our International Headquarters.

Speaking upon the subject "A Wesleyan Advance" he noted three factors which have contributed to such an advance, namely: 'Operation Outreach', Our New International Headquarters, And the coordination of departmental efforts under the leadership of our three administrative general superintendents.

To further this advance he called our attention to the phrase of scripture "Where there is no vision, the people perish" noting that there was need of 1. a vision of the love of God; 2. a vision of a lost soul; 3. a vision of our responsibility to God and our community. "We must feel a responsibility toward every branch of church work; local, conference and general. To carry out that responsibility we should have a goal, a program, and we must work our program."

At the conclusion of Dr. Reisdorph's address it was voted that we have an extension of time until 11:45 a. m.

New Dining Hall: The motion prevailed that we strongly recommend the camp-meeting committee to seriously consider the construction of a new dining hall and kitchen facilities, and the conversion of the present dining hall for crusader camp.

Wesleyan Youth Officers: The Wesleyan Youth presented the report of their election of officers. The slate of officers was approved. (See W. Y. Minutes)

A Resolution was offered which is as follows:

"Be it resolved that we, The Champlain Conference of The Wesleyan Methodist Church of America assembled this day, June 30, 1961, in its 119th Annual Session go on record as opposing the use of public funds for the parochial schools of any denomination or church, and be it further resolved that we petition President John F. Kennedy and the Congress of the United States of America to continue to observe the long established tradition of separation of State and Church. Done this day, June 30, the year of our Lord, One thousand nine hundred and sixty-one. And signed on its behalf:

The resolution was adopted.

Conference Notifications: It was voted that in the event of the death of a minister or his wife, that all the churches in the conference be notified.

Recess: We were recessed and dismissal was by Rev. Hervey Taber.

Friday Afternoon Meeting, June 30, 1961

The Roll was called at 1:35 p. m.

Devotions: Rev. Stanley Klob was the devotional leader, reading to us from James, chapter four, and urging us to let our faith be proven by our works. We were led in prayer by Rev. Clifton Chapman.

The Minutes of the Friday forenoon session were read and approved.

Characters Passed: During the afternoon the characters of the following persons were passed: Martin Ayer Marjean Chapman, Jesse Russell, A. O. Northrup, Sr., Florence Northrup, Duane Chadwick, Harris Earl. Sister Vina Hewitt spoke in behalf of the work of her husband, Rev. Gerald Hewitt, and the Hague church.

Auditing Committee: A partial report of the auditors was received and a matter on the Statistical Report was referred back for corrections.

Order of the Day: Address of the Educational Representatives of Houghton College and Academy, Dr. Stephen W. Paine and Rev. J. Walden Tysinger.

The conference president introduced to us Rev. J. Walden Tysinger, President of Houghton Academy. He called to our attention a phrase of Scripture, "Nevertheless at thy word, I will —" and referred us to a number of the obedient and trusting men of the Bible. He then presented factual data on the academy and its plans for expansion.

After having sung "What A Friend We Have In Jesus," Rev. Edwin Seaman led in prayer.

Dr. Stephen W. Paine, President of Houghton College, was introduced and reminded us that when faced with problems of expansion and the financial needs relating thereto, God will provide, if we are obedient. "Basically faith is a matter of willingness." He gave us a resume of what has happened this year at the college, commenting upon the following: Increased enrollment, tuition increases, scholarships for Wesleyan students, the new men's dormitory, the proposed new library and the anticipated means of financing, future plans for the college, and spiritual emphasis on the campus. Dr. Paine requested prayer for the college that God would call young people out of Houghton College into His work.

The Pastoral Relations Committee presented the third and final reading of its report.

It was moved and seconded that the report be accepted.

The motion prevailed that the Pastoral Relations Committee Report be amended granting the West Plattsburgh church permission to change their name to Plattsburgh, Turnpike Road. The motion then was passed that the present Plattsburgh church be listed as Plattsburgh, Elizabeth St.

There being an apparent number of changes yet to be made in the Pastoral Relations Report, it was voted that it be referred back to the committee.

Committee on Itineracy & Elders Orders: The report of the Committee on Itineracy & Elders Orders was given. This as adopted, with the exception of the item regarding those to be elected to Elders Orders.

After instruction as to whom were eligible to vote on this separate item, it was moved and seconded that the names submitted for election to Elders Orders be approved. The motion carried.

Apportionment: The Apportionment Committee gave its report and it was adopted. (See Report)

Resolutions: The Committee on Resolutions submitted its report and it was adopted by vote. (See Report)

Date of Ministerial Institute: It was voted that the dates of the Ministerial Institute be October 10, 11 and 12.

Conference Calendar: It was voted that we have a conference calendar this year and that it shall be printed in the **Challenger** and on the back of the Conference Minutes, and that the Calendar Committee be composed of the Conference President and the presidents or departmental leaders of the various conference organizations.

Patriotic Service: It was voted that we have a patriotic service on July 4th and the following were elected as a committee to plan this service: Rev. John Lamos, Rev. Hervey Taber.

It was voted that letters of greeting be sent to: Rev. Elsie Taylor, Rev. L. C. Mattoon, Dr. Frank H. Wright.

'Protector Plan': The Protector Plan Insurance Report was submitted in a written communication by its leader, Rev. Robert Wolcott. The report was adopted. It was voted that a letter of appreciation be sent to Brother Wolcott for his work on this.

District Chairmen: District Chairmen were elected as follows: St. Lawrence, Rev. Charles McCallum; Northern, Rev. Kenneth Ross; Central, Rev. Everett Elliott; Southern, Rev. Donald Klob.

Authorization: It was voted that Rev. Charles A. Dayton, Conference President, and Rev. Aldis Lamos, Conference Missions Treasurer, be authorized to write checks upon the Conference Missions Fund. Done this 30th day of June, 1961.

Recess: We were recessed by vote and dismissal was by Sister Vina Hewitt.

Saturday Morning Meeting, July 1, 1961

Devotions: We were led in singing by Rev. Wilbur Matson. Rev. Edward Mein was the devotional leader. He read to us from the 93rd Psalm calling our attention to the resolutions of the Psalmist and exhorted us to cling to the specific resolution, "My God Will Hear Me." Brother Wilbur Matson offered prayer.

The Roll was called following devotions.

The Minutes of the Friday afternoon session were read and approved.

New Business: A motion to receive new business passed by the necessary two-thirds vote.

This business related to the changing of the hour that conference convenes and the standing rule affected by it. It was voted that this be referred to a committee composed of Rev. Elliott and Rev. Lamos who shall report back.

Usher: Rev. Jesse Russell was appointed as an usher for the Memorial Service.

Chairman: Dr. Rufus D. Reisdorph assumed the chair in the absence of the president.

Characters Passed: The characters of the following persons were passed: Russell Frasc, Pearl Keysor, John Putney, Lorraine Randall, Herbert Seaman, L. C. Mattoon, Kenneth Ross, William Knecht, Ray Morgan, Elsie Taylor, J. Walden Tysinger, Frank H. Wright, Albert Montgomery, Lillian Montgomery, Herman Sebert.

Wesleyan Youth Business Sessions: The committee on Wesleyan Youth business sessions presented the following recommendations:

"We would like to recommend that the Conference make as an Order Of The Day Wesleyan Youth Business, and that such order of the day be on Saturday Morning, if possible, to take care of the important business and annual election of Wesleyan Youth officers."

After discussion it was understood that the Wesleyan Youth would join with conference body on the conference floor for this Order of the Day.

The recommendation was adopted by vote.

Changing the Time of Conference: The committee on change of the time of convening conference presented the following recommendation: "That Standing Rule No. 28 be changed by striking out the phrase 'shall open at 2:30 p. m.', and inserting 'shall open at 7:00 p. m.', also add 'and that the 7:00-8:00 p. m. period shall be an organizational business session led by the president. At 8:00 p. m. the Conference Body shall hear the Conference Sermon.'"

It was voted to amend this recommendation to read "and at 8:00 p. m. the Conference Body shall hear the Conference President's Message.

The original motion with its amendment was carried.

New Business: A motion to hear new business received the necessary two-thirds vote.

Information Booth: It was voted that an information booth be set up on the Campgrounds and a person appointed by the campmeeting committee shall staff it.

Deaconess Report: Deaconess Nellie Carlton of the Corinth church gave a report of her work.

Petition to President of the United States: It was moved and seconded that in order to carry out the special resolution of petitioning President John F. Kennedy with regard to the separation of Church and State, that the secretary shall draw up such a petition and sign in behalf of the Conference.

It was voted that this motion be amended to include the signature of the Conference President.

The original motion with its amendment was carried.

New Business: It was voted to receive an item of new business.

Rev. Bernard Fortune in charge of Post Office Addresses was elected to make necessary corrections in the church location list of the conference.

The Pastoral Relations Committee presented the final reading of its report and it was adopted by vote.

Building Location Committee: It was voted that the report of the Building and Location Committee be placed in the Conference Minutes without being read upon the Conference floor.

Order of the Day: Memorial Service.

This service was preceded by an organ prelude. Flowers particularly purchased for this time lent beauty and the expression of hope to the service. The service was presided over by the appointed committee on memorials.

Rev. Howard Chapman read from the Word of God, and then expressed the feeling of sorrow and sympathy felt by every member of the conference. He called our attention to the flowers and their particular designation.

Rev. Charles McCallum sang a medley of hymns in keeping with the spirit of the service: "When I Come To The End Of The Road" and "Saved By Grace."

Prayer was offered by Rev. Florence Shippee.

Rev. Aldis Lamos read from I Corinthians 15.

The name of our beloved brother, Rev. Gerald Hewitt, was read by our president. Following the sounding of taps, Rev. Dayton gave a resume of Brother Hewitt's life and service to the conference, closing with a eulogy of the life of this man of God.

REPORT OF THE CONFERENCE PRESIDENT

To the members of the Champlain Conference, Greetings:

As we convene this 119th Annual Session of the Champlain Conference we do so with praise and thankfulness to God. We have seen His mercy and rejoiced in His strength and grace.

Our dear brothers and sisters who have stood with us and have borne the burdens and responsibilities are now enjoying the fruits of righteousness in a brighter and more delectable environment than our mortal eyes have yet beheld. We miss them most acutely and lament their going; however, they have entered the enjoyment of the reward of a life well-lived. Let us "be faithful unto death that we may receive a crown of life." Appropriate memorial services are planned for a later time during Conference — a time when the greatest number of relatives and friends can be present.

We do feel badly that 59 of our members were granted letters within the last year. For various reasons we lost 90 members out of a total membership of 1091. That is a loss of about 8 percent of our membership in one year — or one out of twelve were lost from our rolls.

On the brighter side we have gained enough members during the year to compensate for our losses and to make a net gain of 18 members. Not much of a gain but better than a net loss. We can do better with God's help.

There have been some excellent building programs which have involved considerable expense and effort — in some cases very deep sacrifice and consecration. We rejoice in these victories. Thursday evening we will hear about these ventures for Christ.

Revivals have been attempted in almost every church of the Conference and the salvation of sinners and sanctification of believers have been witnessed again and again. Let us praise God and profit by the past — and press on and up.

REPORT OF THE SUNDAY SCHOOL SECRETARY

Christian Greetings to the Brethren and Sistren of the 119th Champlain Annual Conference assembled in session:

In the good providence of God we have again been permitted to gather complete another year for the Master and to have opportunity together to evaluate the years' activities and efforts and thus be enabled to plan for the coming year, if Jesus tarries.

This past year has been a good year and the blessing and presence of the Holy Spirit has been manifest throughout our Conference. As the reports from the various churches have come to the secretary's desk, some have registered a downward trend while others have shown substantial increases. We have six Sunday Schools with average attendance of over 100 with Corinth heading the list with 199. It is rather interesting to note that one of our newer S. S., Wynantskill, has turned in a tie with Watervliet with 106. Another with marked increase is Schenectady with 103. Our newest, Gouverneur, is showing a good growth with average attendance of 20. We have a net gain in average attendance this year over last of 109 with total average attendance of 2445. Our enrollment also shows an increase with 3181 in Main School as against 3059, a gain of 122.

Through your cooperation we were able also to again meet our obligation to the Denomination. Dr. Kindschi sent word that some of the Conferences were failing to meet budget quotas and therefore his Department was short of funds. A big thanks to you for your help.

Your Secretary was able to represent you at NESSA Convention at Burlington, Vermont last September and also accompanied by Board member Donald Klob and Director of Child Evangelism, Pauline Streeter, and their respective spouses, to be your delegation at the Church wide Convention and also NSSA Convention at St. Louis, Mo. October 12-14. This was a highly profitable trip and much of the material absorbed was passed on to the local churches at Workshop sessions in each of the Conference Districts.

Again this year the Conference S. S. Department is sponsoring a Crusader Camp held concurrently with Annual Conference and Camp. In connection with this program, the Conference Board ran a contest among the boys and girls of the Conference for a Crusader insignia, 1st prize of Free registration and board at Crusader Camp this year went to April Hayes of Hague, N. Y. The second prize, a copy of Children's King James New Testament, to Gordon Chapman of Long Lake. There were about 50 entries in this contest showing the keen interest in our Crusader Program among the boys and girls of the Conference. Truly the Lord is blessing this effort to win these young lives for His Kingdom.

However, in the midst of viewing accomplishments, let us not become complacent

for there is a sobering factor. The churches have reported 191 scholars converted this year but only 97 joining the Church. There is a great challenge here, also in our communities the fields are white unto harvest — one has well said that the most fruitful field in our communities is among the adults. Therefore let us bend our efforts in this direction.

Let us adopt some goals for 1961-62. We would like to suggest to you the following:

1. Have regular, well planned, monthly workers meetings.
2. Institute a plan whereby your staff is availed of the opportunity of completing the WETT Course.
3. Strive for a least a 10% increase in enrollment and average attendance.
4. Put to work a program whereby we may reach and win the adult members of our Communities to Christ and the Church.
5. Determine above all else to keep our S. S. places where men and women, boys and girls, are pointed to Christ who saves from all sin.

Recommendations of the Conference Sunday School Board:

That the Conference Sunday School Budget be 10¢ per member in the main school.

That the Conference Director of the Christian Youth Crusaders be a member of the Conference Sunday School Board.

That the Nominating Committee include in its list of candidates for the Conference offices, the names of candidates for the Sunday School Board and that this become a Standing Rule.

REPORT OF THE BUILDING LOCATION COMMITTEE

The Building and Location Committee met in the Administration Building Tuesday evening, June 28 to consider a proposed remodeling program which Rev. Charles McCallum presented.

The proposal is to extend the present structure 16' toward the sidewalks and

remodel the interior to provide a foyer with access to the present building which would become the Educational unit and also give access to the proposed addition and provide restrooms.

The addition is to be 34' x 60' and placed at right angles to the present building with a full basement with the ground level to include the sanctuary, pastor's study and choir room and to be frame structure with partial stone veneer.

Framing lumber for this building has been provided, also there is \$2000 on hand and the plan is to borrow \$13,000 to finance the balance of this project.

The committee gave unanimous approval to these plans.

Rev. Ray Morgan submitted plans for a proposed addition to the Morley church approximately 38' x 36' two story construction and to be placed at the rear of the church. This addition is to be frame structure and is to include choir loft, Sunday School Secretary's office and three class rooms downstairs. The upstairs will provide four additional class rooms.

The estimated cost of this project is \$11,000, of this sum \$9,000 is on hand and the plan is to raise the balance leaving no indebtedness. Labor is expected to be contributed and the expectation is to not to have to hire help.

The committee gave approval to this project.

On Thursday July 7, 1960, the Building and Location Committee met with Rev. Clifton and Lorraine Randall at the request of the Conference President to consider the matter of obtaining living quarters for the pastor at Gouverneur.

Brother and Sister Randall reported that they had been to Gouverneur and met with Mrs. Lee, one of the ladies of the church, and together with her had visited four different properties, three of them for sale and one an apartment to rent at \$70.00 per month. This apartment was partly up and partly downstairs.

One of the properties for sale was a two-story frame structure with apparently good foundation, ten-room interior, good except for plumbing which was poor. There was also a two-story, two-car garage. This was located on a lot with 70' front and three hundred feet deep and is about two blocks from the church. The price for this property is \$8,600.00.

Another of the properties which was viewed was a three-family house directly across from the church and in need of repair. The price of this was \$5,000.00.

The other property adjoins the church and was reported to be for sale but no details were available.

There was also considerable discussion as to the advisability of buying property or of renting, or of buying a house trailer to be used as a parsonage. In view of our limited knowledge of the local conditions there it was decided that the committee go to Gouverneur on Friday July 8, to investigate the possibilities.

On Friday, July 8, 1960, President Charles Dayton, Committee Members Fred Shippee and Floyd Tyler, accompanied by Clifton Randall embarked on a trip to Gouverneur to look into the purchase of a parsonage.

Enroute we stopped at Malone and viewed the Building Project there. Good progress was being made, basement walls were up, some partitions erected and floor joists and subfloor laid. We then stopped in Norwood and picked up Harry Gibson, another committee member and proceeded to Gouverneur.

Brother Randall took us to the various properties which he knew to be available. Of these, two properties, in the mind of the Committee, were the best suited to our situation, both being adjacent to the church, one on Barnes St. and the other on Rock Island St.

The one on Barnes St. had 7 large rooms, 3 bedrooms upstairs, 2 living rooms, dining room, kitchen and bath downstairs, all with very high ceilings. The downstairs had hardwood floors and there was a large basement with gravity hot-air furnace and a gas water heater. The foundation was basically good but needed pointing up. This house was equipped with aluminum storm windows upstairs and wooden ones downstairs. It also had asbestos siding and a good roof. However, considerable work in

the line of repairs and rejuvenating is needed. It was estimated that these would cost approximately \$1,400.00.

The house on Rock Island St., also under consideration, seemed to be the better suited for our situation. This property has a two car garage and although the house needs renovating, the committee was of the opinion that the lot was more desirable and that this could be had at a figure to allow renovation.

It was voted that we purchase the Rock Island St. property adjacent to the church, to be used as a parsonage, at a cost of \$4,000.00 and that we allocate \$2,500.00 for repairs and remodeling.

It was also voted that Clifton Randall, the pastor, be paid \$1.50 per hour up to \$1500.00 for labor on repairs to said property during this conference year.

It was voted that we immediately put the \$600.00 rent allotment for Gouverneur into the purchase of this property; and that the balance of the \$1200.00, designated by the Conference, above the cost of installing a furnace and building a chimney at the church, be applied on the purchase of the parsonage, this should be approximately \$600.00.

The Committee also voted to approve the signing of a note, by the Conference Trustees with the trustees of the Gouverneur church to the extent of \$5300.00, for the balance of the purchase price; as much as possible of this to be obtained from the SMRS funds.

We then left Brother Gibson at his home in Norwood and proceeded back to the Campmeeting.

Brother Dayton immediately set to work to purchase this property and found that we would have to pay \$4250.00 (\$250.00 more than intended). Approval for this was given by the Committee members.

At two different times Rev. Dayton contacted Committee Secretary, Floyd Tyler for consultation on the Gouverneur project and assistance in the work which was given.

Floyd Tyler requested permission to make repairs and do some remodeling at the Lisbon Parsonage to the extent of \$300.00, which amount is on hand. Brother Dayton granted this request instructing the secretary to record the matter in the Committee records.

The Building and Location Committee met with the Conference President on Wednesday, March 15th, at 1:00 p. m. at the Wynantskill Wesleyan Methodist Church. Rev. Stanley Klob and his son-in-law, Richard Bennett also met with the Committee.

Following an excellent dinner served to the committee by the ladies of the church, the expansion program of the local church was taken under consideration. In connection with this expansion an architect had been consulted and the accompanying artist's conception was presented. The desire of the local church is to rearrange the sanctuary of the church, thereby increasing its seating capacity; and to complete the addition to the rear of the church, the foundation for which had been constructed and capped off for use as a fellowship hall previously. This completed superstructure will provide additional Sunday School facilities. It was also planned to remodel the entrance to the church, making it more attractive and in so doing enclose the steps which presented somewhat of a hazard in winter weather.

To finance this project, Brother Klob proposed the following plan: Make a loan of \$18,000.00, this to be in the nature of a construction loan and to include paying off the present indebtedness of some \$6500.00 in notes and mortgages, and to be repaid on a monthly installment plan.

The motion was made, seconded, and unanimously passed that we approve this plan subject to the following modifications:

1. Brother Klob suggest to the architect that some consideration be given to altering the roofline, the proposed entry, and also the addition of a protective canopy over the door and that the plan be submitted to the committee for approval.

2. That Brother Klob clear with the proper authorities regarding the width of the entrance ramp and the location of doors.

3. That the stairway in the rear addition be indoors.

4. That the person handling these funds be bonded at the expense of the local church.

These minutes were read and approved.

Subsequently each member of the committee received a copy of the architect's proposal for the entry, (one of which accompanies these minutes). Brother Dayton authorized the committee secretary, upon receipt of the other members decision, to notify Brother Klob of said decision. This was done, the consensus of opinion being that the proposed additions would present the appearance of a building which had started small and grown up, but as long as the local church was paying for the project and would be the ones to be satisfied with it that we would go along with them in it matter.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON RESOLUTIONS

The Committee on Resolutions prayerfully presents the following resolutions for the consideration and action of the Champlain Conference in session this 30th day of June, 1961.

We resolve that:

I. Operation Outreach be a total, continuing objective of the Champlain Conference.

A. August and September shall be a time of special prayer for revival and conference missions in our mid-week services.

B. The Conference President shall appoint committees in each district to study the possibilities of new church locations. The Conference President shall chairman each committee.

C. Each church shall emphasize personal evangelism and pray definitely and expect a Holy Ghost revival.

II. We recognize the greatness of the task that faces our ministry and the sacredness of this calling. This is God's day for the redeeming of the time in the saving of souls. In recognition of these facts we challenge our churches to provide full support for their pastors. We also challenge our pastors to fully trust God for their material support.

III. We recognize the problem relating to the legal age for drinking and petition the Governor of New York State and other representatives at Albany to raise the legal age limit to 21 years of age in accordance with the practices of other states. We are still strongly opposed to the sale of all alcoholic beverages.

IV. We recognize that these are days of national and international crises. We also recognize that we are a minority group but God's response is not confined to the multitudes. Our relationship to the crises of our day calls for earnest, daily intercession on the part of all God's people. Our intercession must include: the President of the U.S.; other world leaders; Our Wesleyan Methodist General Superintendents and departmental executive secretaries; the president of our Wesleyan schools; Our World Missions leaders and missionaries; and our Champlain Conference President. Such daily intercession God will honor.

Standing Rules

1. The Resolutions of this Conference shall be printed in the Minutes of the Conference each year.

2. All visiting members of our own, or other Churches in harmony with our principles, shall be invited to honorary seats in the Conference.

3. The Conference Secretary shall receive fifty dollars (\$50) per year for his labor, and any incidental expenses shall be in addition to this amount.

4. The Conference Treasurer shall receive fifty dollars (\$50) per year for his services in caring for the funds.

5. The Treasurer of the Superannuate Ministers' Relief Association also shall close his books one week before the Conference Session.

6. All monies disbursed by the Conference Treasurer during the interim of Conference shall be upon order of the President, except in case of payment to the President, when such order shall be issued by the Vice President. It is understood that any payment ordered by the Conference direct may be paid by the Treasurer without an order as directed above.

7. No monies shall be loaned by the Conference Treasurer except by order of the Conference, or by the consent of the President and his Advisory Board.

8. Each Elder shall make his engagements as Pastor with the understanding that if he be elected Conference President he shall be released from his engagement as Pastor within the period of three months following his election.

9. The first Sunday of each month shall be known as missions Sunday; the Sunday School offering to go alternately to (new) Church Extension & Evangelism and Conference Missions in that order, and that the conference missions offering be sent to the Conference Missions Treasurer. The Committee on Finance defines "Conference Missions" as the establishing new (or) subsidizing of the needy fields of the Conference.

10. In securing Evangelists for the Camp Meeting the Camp Meeting Committee is privileged to secure not more than one worker outside the Denomination.

11. The Camp Meeting Committee shall be composed of the Conference President, as Chairman, and three ministers and three laymen, all to be elected by ballot, the term of each office to be three years, the time of one minister and one layman expiring each year; also, the Conference Vice President, the President of the Missionary Society and the President of the W.Y. shall be members of this Committee.

12. Pastors shall state financial items in their statistical reports in even dollars, except in items affecting the Budget, and as far as possible are requested to report all Budget items in even dollars. When such rule is not followed, the statistical secretaries are authorized to drop decimals, except as provided above.

13. The Committee on Credentials shall secure from each delegate the necessary credentials as provided by our Discipline, with Post Office address of the same.

14. May 26th to the following May 25th shall be the term of all local Church officers, except the Committee on Pulpit Supply. May 25th shall be the close of the Conference year for Statistics. By June 2nd the pastor shall send to the Conference Treasurer all monies and receipts, with both copies of his statistical report made out, except budget items raised. These items the Conference Treasurer shall fill in and sign. In the event that the Conference Treasurer discovers a deficit in any of the Budget items, he shall notify the Pastor. By June 9th the Conference Treasurer shall in turn pass the reports to the Auditor of Statistical Reports. The Auditor shall correct the reports (if mistakes are found), and by June 16th shall pass one copy to the Statistician, and one back to the Pastor. He shall also send to the Apportionment Committee the membership of the churches, Sunday Schools, and W.Y. The Statistician and Auditor shall give Pastors opportunity to explain apparent errors but (new) no changes shall be accepted after the Wednesday before Conference convenes. Otherwise, the closing Sunday of the Conference year shall be the Sunday following the beginning of the Annual Conference. The Pastor's salary for this closing Sunday shall be paid by the church of which he is pastor; and for the Sunday of the new Conference year by the charge to which he is going.

15. Newly elected Conference Officers take office after the close of Conference Sunday.

16. The Conference shall include in the Orders of The Day a special period to consider Camp Meeting business.

17. A Nominating Committee shall be elected to consider and nominate all elective Officers of the Conference. The Committee shall consist of four Elders and four laymen. No one shall repeat service on this Committee until an interim of one (1) year has elapsed. The report of the Nominating Committee shall be read to the Conference the day preceding the election.

18. The delegates' credentials shall be sent to the Committee on Credentials BEFORE THE OPENING DAY OF CONFERENCE, and the Conference Secretary shall send printed blanks with the Statistical, Character, etc.

19. The Conference recommends that each Charge grant its Pastor two weeks vacation, and also grant him permission to hold a two weeks meeting (over two Sundays) away from his local Charge — both vacation and meeting to be without loss of pay; and exclusive of Annual Conference and Camp meeting.

20. The first Sunday in May shall be PASTORAL VOTE SUNDAY.

21. CONFERENCE MISSIONS: (1) Conference President shall act as Pioneer Secretary. (This does not create the office of Pioneer Secretary.) The Conference Board on Church and Parsonage Building and Location shall be the Conference Missions Committee.

(2) There shall be at least one Conference Missions service on each Charge in the Conference this year, at which time all of the Conference Mission activities within the Conference shall be presented. This service shall be under the supervision of the Conference President, or one whom he may appoint.

Any person traveling the Conference in the interest of Conference Missions must be appointed and under the direction of the Conference President. Those thus appointed to travel the Conference in the interest of Conference Missions shall receive not to exceed five cents per mile.

(3) All offerings taken for Conference Missions shall be forwarded to the Conference Missions Treasurer, and credited to Conference Missions. The Conference Missions Treasurer, upon the recommendation of the Conference President and the Committee on Conference Missions, shall disburse these funds. Any designated funds can be disbursed by notice received in writing from the Conference President, and that all monies raised to subsidize, build or repair new or old churches and parsonages be listed under Conference Missions by all treasurers and societies of the Conference.

(4) Whereas the W.Y. is an organization that is aggressively supporting the Conference Pioneer projects, we recommend that as far as possible all monies for pioneer work be passed through the Local Wesleyan Youth Treasurer, to the Conference Missions Treasurer of the Champlain Conference. We further recommend that the local Conference Missions program be sponsored by the W.Y. as far as possible.

22. During the year each Sunday School shall take an offering for the maintenance of the Conference President's home.

23. The Conference President shall be ex-officio member of the Board on Church and Parsonage Building and Location; the term of the other members shall be two years each, the term of two members expiring each year.

24. No new business shall be introduced to the Conference Body after Friday noon, without a two-thirds vote of the Body.

25. Our Conference shall meet for its Annual Session the first Tuesday after the last Monday in June, except the years of the General Conference. On such years our Conference shall begin the second Tuesday following the General Conference.

26. Each Church member over 14 years of age shall be apportioned \$2.50 per year for CONFERENCE MISSIONS.

27. The Pastors shall not be required to read their statistical reports (before the Conference Body).

28. The Bar of Conference shall be the first seven center rows of seats; Conference shall open at 7:00 p. m., the first day (Tuesday); The 7:00 - 8:00 p. m. period

shall be an organizational business session led by the President. At 8:00 the Conference Body shall hear the Conference President's Message; the hours of Conference following the first day shall be 8:45 to 11:30 a.m. and 1:30 p.m. to closing by vote; the roll call shall be before the devotional service; and Work Week shall be the first full week in June.

29. The Superannuated Ministers' Relief Association shall supplement payment of Insurance Plan assessments to the extent of \$400. (four hundred dollars) annually.

30. In the event of the death of a minister or his wife, churches desiring to send flowers, shall send money instead.

31. The Missionary Board of the Conference shall be composed of the Conference President, W.M.S. President, Wesleyan Youth President, and Y.M.W.B. Superintendent.

32. Each church shall take an offering to help defray expenses of the Ministerial Institute and send it to the proper person.

Camp Ground Rules

General Rules

Ever bear in mind that these grounds and buildings are church property, and respect them as such.

The religious services are for your benefit — take advantage of them.

Only young people who come at the recommendation of their pastor will be permitted the benefits of the Young People's Financial Plan.

Each young person is required to attend the regular Young People's Meeting; also — the evening service, and one other service during the day.

I. Care of Grounds

1. Place waste paper and garbage only in containers provided. Do not throw it on the grounds.

2. Waste paper and other refuse may be burned only in drums provided for this purpose.

3. Empty waste water in appointed place — at back of the grounds. Do not throw it out the window or on the ground.

4. Do your part toward keeping the grounds around your cottage or dormitory neat and looking clean.

5. No dogs or cats are allowed.

II. Personal Conduct

1. The use of tobacco, profanity, obscene literature, card playing and gambling are prohibited on the Campgrounds.

2. Wearing apparel must be modest at all times. The wearing of slacks, shorts, gym clothes or bathing suits is prohibited on the grounds. Men are requested to wear shirts, and ladies to wear hose.

III. Dormitory and Cottage Rules

1. Campers are requested to be in their rooms for the night at 10:30 unless engaged in the tabernacle.

2. The rights of your neighbors must be respected: therefore, quiet must prevail in all rooms and dormitories.

3. Remember that there are others who will occupy these rooms after you, therefore, keep them clean, and leave them in good condition.

4. Because of fire hazard, there must be no cooking of food in the dormitories.

Report No. 2

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

To the Members and Friends in attendance at this 56th annual session of the Champlain Conference Woman's Missionary Society.

"... behold, I am with thee, and will keep thee in all places whither thou goest" (Genesis 28:15).

This year has brought radical changes into the life of your president — when she with her husband and family left the responsibility of an individual church to take residence in the president's home on the edge of the camp grounds. It was not so much a lessening of the burden for the one church and W.M.S. as an increase in the interest and concern for all the Conference churches and societies. The Lord, in His great providence prepared us in a measure for this revolution in our lives by giving to us the above verse a couple months earlier when it appeared that the change would be in a different direction. God has made good His promise throughout the year, and we would ascribe glory to His name at this time.

As a Conference Society there are both achievements and set-backs to report. We regret the necessity of admitting the set-backs; namely — that we came below last year in the total amount of money received and in the number of magazine subscriptions. If only each individual and each local society could be brought to realize that the Conference society advances or retreats only as the local societies progress or retrogress; and a failure along any line by any society effects the total picture of the Conference as a whole!

We also regret that the society at Cooks Corners was unable to function this year due to the lack of leadership, as the pastor and family resided at a distance and commuted on Sunday. We were pleased with the fact that this faithful little group had responsibility and initiative enough to send in a report of "No report" for the information of the Conference officers in computing their annual reports.

Money, members, etc. can be made up by means of prayer, determination and hard work. However, our Conference has sustained another loss which we will feel for years to come in the homegoing of Sister Ruth Hill. Mrs. Hill served faithfully as Conference Vice President for a number of years, as well as on numerous important

committees. Her services and counsel were valued and respected; but it was the spiritual uplift of her gracious personality in our Conference sessions which will be especially missed by the regular attenders at Annual Conference. We are praying that the mantle of her unusual gifts, graces and concern for the advancement of Conference Society interests may fall on some of our younger women, who can carry on the torch she had to lay down.

Although as a Conference Society there have been set-backs we are happy to report there have been achievements too. We made advances over last year in readers of the missionary books, and community mission work. We held our own in Women's World Fellowship work and membership was about the same. All four districts had Workshops with three of the districts being very well represented. All four districts also held District Missionary Rallies with excellent reports from each.

We were able to have Miss Eloise Wood, missionary to Honduras, tour our Conference last fall. All who attended those services will agree that Miss Wood's presence and message were both a blessing and a challenge. It is of interest to note that she credits our Champlain Conference with the largest contribution toward a new dispensary in Honduras.

A fact that has been most interesting to note is that there have been definite signs of growth and spiritual life and progress in the churches where the missionary societies pushed the Community Mission program. God rewards organized efforts if other conditions are met.

Perhaps our outstanding achievement this year as a Conference Society is the fact that for the first time in a number of years we have completely met our obligation for Mrs. Witthunn's support, missionary to Haiti. This was accomplished in spite of higher costs for missionary support, and also the fact that at the time of the Workshops in April the treasurer reported that less than half of the required amount had come in. (interjection — a point in favor of Workshops — when our people KNOW, they respond)

The president's official acts beside the promotion of the various phases of the work in general and the necessary correspondence and routine have consisted of the following: presiding over all four workshops, serving as the featured speaker in the southern district missionary convention; negotiating for the tour of the missionary through the Conference last fall, and for the speakers of our public service during Conference week; Arranging for the presence of our Area chairman, Mrs. Ella Bradley of Collingswood, New Jersey in our annual conference. We have visited and spoken to eleven local societies at their invitation, some of those near-by two or three times. We sat on two camp meeting board meetings and three interim executive Board meetings and contacted all the local societies monthly through the medium of letters in our official Conference organ, *The Challenger*. Also, it was our solemn privilege to represent our Conference W.M.S. by a few words of appreciation at the funeral of Sister Hill, pastor's wife and former vice president of the Conference W.M.S. An unexpected opportunity to represent our Champlain Conference W.M.S. this year presented itself in the form of a request to address the Oak Park W.M.S. in Chicago in April while we were in that city attending the N.H.A. Convention.

This, dear sisters, is the account of our victories and (let us face up to them) our defeats for the year 1960-61. Let us thank God for the victories and humbly confess to Him our defeats. They were due to OUR negligence, not His. For "God is able to make all grace abound toward you; that ye always having all sufficiency in all things, may ABOUND to every good work." That is our purpose as we face the second half of this current Quadrennium, Dear Sisters, let us go forward confidently like Abraham, who "staggered not — being fully persuaded that what He (God) had promised He was also able to perform."

Wednesday evening, June 28, 7:30 p.m.

Rev. John Lamos led the congregation in singing "Send the Light."

Rev. Price Stark led in prayer.

A candle lighting installation service was carried out for the installation of the new officers.

Mrs. Zelda Russell sang "Let Me Burn Out For Thee."

Mrs. Josephine Dayton, Conference Missionary president brought words of greeting.

PLAN OF WORK

I. General

We recommend:

1. The election in each local society of consecrated officers of vision to carry on a work which is ever new and challenging.
2. That the men be encouraged to join the local societies as honorary members, particularly emphasizing March and September as membership months. Also, that all efforts be made to foster public missionary meetings.
3. That at a meeting before conference when officers for the coming year are elected, a delegate (other than the church delegate, if possible) be elected, whose room and board for the conference shall be provided by the local society. She shall be instructed as to the amount of the pledge for missions and her report be given at the first meeting after conference.
4. That the financial obligations of the Society, per member be as follows:
 - (a) \$1.00 membership dues to be sent to the conference treasurer and forwarded to the General Wesleyan Missionary Society treasurer for the General Fund.
 - (b) That each local society pay annually into the Conference Working Fund, the amount assessed by the Conference Executive Board which was 50 ¢ per member.
5. That money dispersed receiving no budget credit be listed as follows:
 - (a) Card Call
 - (b) Conference Missions Fund (10 ¢ per member per month)
 - (c) Honorary College Enrollment
 - (d) Houghton Academy
 - (e) Mile of Dimes
 - (f) Medical Missions Fund
 - (g) Self-Denial Offering
 - (h) White Christmas Offering
 - (i) Membership Dues
 - (j) Offering for American Bible Society
6. That in societies where it is deemed more expedient, one large offering be taken to defray the obligation for special projects, rather than taking a number of separate offerings. This large offering to be divided by vote of the society or the Executive Committee of the local society.
7. That since our witness for Christ is to begin in Jerusalem, let us seek to win souls in our home communities by personal work calling on new families, inviting others to our meetings, and in thoughtful service to all.
8. Methods of Operation:

(a) **Visitation** — A systematic campaign of visitation by a volunteer staff. Each may choose the type of calls she will make.

(1) Supervision: to be directed by the local vice-president and committee of two others.

(2) Areas of visitation: The ill, aged, unchurched, Sunday School absentees, new comers to the community, delinquent families, bereaved homes, friendless ones, needy people (spiritually or financially), or any others who might benefit by a call made in the spirit of Jesus. Institutional visitation — if and when — permitted: hospitals, nursing homes, sanatoriums, rescue homes, jails and other places of detention.

(b) **Nature of Reports:**

(1) Number of contacts made for Christ by letter, phone or visit.

(2) Number of hours so employed.

(3) Total amount of cash and supplies disbursed for Community Missions.

(4) Report of work sent to Conference vice president at close of church year.

(c) **Evangelism** — A campaign of individual witnessing and personal soul-winning.

(1) Supervision: To be directed by the local Executive Board.

(2) General Aims:

(1) To stress the importance of the Christian's testimony whenever opportunity presents itself.

(2) To encourage an organized effort of personal evangelism by sponsoring some means of instruction for these interested in personal soul-winning.

(3) To designate the month of March as "Focus Month" for conducting an aggressive soul-winning crusade by means of personal contacts, cottage prayer meetings, tract distribution, etc.

9. That a Women's World Fellowship Secretary be appointed who shall promote this program and that a Prayer Partner circle be formed under her direction and a report be sent to the conference W.W.F. Secretary within 60 days after conference who in turn will send her report to the General W.W.F. Secretary 90 days after conference. Then a second report be sent to the Conference W.W.F. Secretary by June 1st.

(a) That each local society send two reports, one for the regular Prayer Partners and one to Women's World Fellowship. This should be done twice a year. (see above)

(b) Reports to include: Number of Missionaries prayed for, number of people participating.

(c) That the following used postage stamps be salvaged:

All commemorative stamps including air mails. (commemorative stamps are issued for some special person or subject such as the recent boy scouts, water conservation, etc.)

All stamps above 5 cents value;

All stamps that have ½ cent on them;

All postage due and special delivery stamps;

All stamps that have the name of a town printed on them;

All foreign stamps, and send to General W.W.F. Secretary to help build an operation fund. Cut around the stamp leaving a good margin (½ inch) of paper.

10. That local churches hold missionary rallies as can be arranged with the pastor, to stimulate missionary interest, utilizing the facilities of Wesley Film Service when advisable.

II. Home Work

We recommend:

1. That each local society send in a minimum of five dollars for the Dept. of Church Extension and Evangelism, the same to be given budget credit.

2. Since our conference has no Home Missions project for which we are responsible, we will aid Home Missions in other conferences by supporting their projects with gifts and offerings.

3. That each local society contribute five dollars or more annually for the support of Hephzibah Orphanage, the same to be applied on budget.

4. That local societies inquire into the needs of the Home Mission Stations and Orphanage before sending used clothing, and that no monetary value be placed on same; That boxes of new merchandise be reported as to monetary value and that the sending society evaluate the same. The voucher evaluation, signed by the missionary, be forwarded to Conference Woman's Society Treasurer for proper receipting.

5. That each local society support the work of the American Bible Society, by an annual offering, preferably taken during Universal Bible Reading Period. Channel Funds through Conference W.M.S. treasurer.

III Foreign Work

We recommend:

1. That our local societies make bandages when called for by our missionaries, these to be forwarded to the Missionary Headquarters. (see current Efficiency Standard under Medical Missions for specific directions for making bandages.)

2. That the local society contribute \$3.00 or more annually to the Medical Mission Fund.

IV Education

We recommend:

1. That the combination treasurer's blanks be used for the remitting of money by the Local Conference, and General Conference Treasurers.

2. That a concerted effort be made to increase the subscription list of the Wesleyan Missionary by faithfully securing renewals and new subscriptions to include every home in the church and Sunday School with January being observed as campaign month. That all societies faithfully use the Conference Church Key combination which may be obtained from Conference Solicitor (see conference minutes). Local Solicitor should keep up to date records of correct addresses and expiration date of each Wesleyan Missionary subscriber.

3. Subscriptions be encouraged as gifts for weddings, anniversaries, new converts and new families contacted by the church, and that the magazine be placed in libraries, offices, hospitals, home for the aged and such other public places deemed advisable.

4. The use of "The Guide" and other prepared helps.

5. That the Reading Course be promoted, wherein the Mission Study Secretary will keep a record of all reading done in the prescribed reading course reporting statistics to the Conference Mission Study Secretary by the 15th of January.

6. That the 1959-1963 new Efficiency Standard for the local society, the Plan of Work and the Standing Rules be read as soon as available after Conference and that this be a guide for the Local President for her check-up at the end of the year.

Standing Rules

1. The Standing Rules of the Conference Missionary Society shall be printed in the Conference Minutes each year.

2. That all remittances should be in the hands of the Conference Treasurer by May 25th.

3. That the Local Treasurer send a statistical blank to the statistician on or before June 1st. All blanks arriving after the deadline will not be included in the statistical report. Send the delegates credentials to the Conference Missionary Secretary two weeks before Conference. Receipts and disbursements must be made to balance before being sent, also rating according to efficiency standard. Take one home after conference to read to the local society.

4. We recommend that the treasurer of the Conference Society be elected as a Committee of Remembrance with the authority to send flowers or some suitable tribute to those of our number who shall be called to their eternal reward. We further

recommend that this shall include pastor's wives and officers of our Conference Missionary Society.

5. That each society respond to the Card Call plan by subscribing as a group in addition to those already receiving the Card Call, and send the money to the Conference Missionary Treasurer.

6. The continuation of supporting worthwhile projects, such as sending good usable clothing, notions, pictures and medical supplies to our Home Missionaries, forwarding Sunday School charts, flannelgraph material and Sunday School quarterlies to fields where there are English Speaking Schools, and the preparation of exhibits to be displayed at conference. Societies displaying exhibits for World Missions send sufficient funds to cover postage to Marion, Indiana. (It is considerate to contact the missionaries as to urgent needs.)

7. That we send the necessary supplies to the camp ground, and the needs to be itemized in the **Challenger**.

8. That since there is an urgent need for refurnishing dormitory rooms, those societies interested in cooperation may contact the matron in charge, whose name will be published in the **Challenger**.

9. Along with the delegates credentials send into the conference secretary a list of the deceased within the year, and a brief statement of their activities within the society.

10. Special Projects:

a. Conference Mission Project money amounting to the equivalent of 10 cents per active member per month or \$1.20 annually to be sent to the conference W.M.S. Treasurer.

b. May we encourage emphasis on the penny-a-meal fund which provides for the support of our missionary, Mrs. Witthunn. Due to the fact that missionary support has been substantially increased, this phase of our work should be brought to the attention of our ladies from time to time.

c. That we discontinue the reading of statistical reports during conference, and the president appoint a committee to compile, bring a report, and display the data in a chart to be posted during conference.

d. That each local president include the name of their delegate on the Conference President's Fourth Quarterly Report; and the Local Vice President include the name and address of the new Vice President on her last community Missions Report to the Conference Vice President.

e. That we assume a responsibility for emphasizing special prayer in our societies for young men and women to answer the call of God to go as teachers in the Government schools in Sierra Leone.

f. That a Hill-Seaman Memorial Fund be established by each society taking an offering for the aid of Foreign Students in Houghton Academy.
