## MINUTES OF THE CONFERENCE PROCEEDINGS

The report of the Auditors was given by Mrs. R. D. Christman, which included the report from the Certified Public Accountants, Kimbleton and Rivers. A motion was made to receive the report. Carried.

The District Treasurer's report and the Camp Association Treasurer's report were given by Rev. B. F. Durham, Treasurer.

A motion was made to receive the report. Carried.

The sitting was adjourned with prayer by Rev. J. D. Webb, Sr.



## SECOND SITTING

The Second Sitting of the conference was called to order by the District Superintendent. Rev. A. L. Sypolt led the conference in singing, "What a Friend We Have In Jesus". Prayer was offered by Mrs. P. O. Carpenter.

The minutes of the previous sitting were read and declared approved.

The Reception Committee presented Mrs. Melvin Snyder, wife of our General Superintendent. Her words of greeting and testimony were deeply appreciated. A motion was made to grant her an honorary seat within the conference bar. Carried.

The District Statistician's report was given by Rev. R. V. Gibbs. A motion was made to receive the report. Carried.

The report of the Sunday School Promotional Secretary was given by Rev. H. D. Wright. A motion was made to receive the report. Carried.

The report of the District Missionary President was given by Jenny V. Vincent, President. A motion was made that the report be received. Carried.

The report of the District Missionary Treasurer was given by Mrs. H. H. Bolender. A motion to receive this report carried.

The report of the Ladies' Camp Meeting Auxiliary was read by Lela Newkirk. A motion to receive this report carried.

A motion was made that the election of officers be set as the order of the day for the evening sitting, following the Ordination Service. Carried.

The report of the District Home Missionary Board was read by Rev. Paul Ebright, Chairman. A motion carried to receive this report.

The report of the Memoirs Committee was given by Jenny V. Vincent, Chairman of the committee. In receiving the report, the conference stood in silent tribute, followed by prayer by Dr. Snyder. The group joined in singing the chorus, "There Will Be No Dark Shadows When Jesus Comes".

A recess of five minutes was granted by the Chair.

### THIRD SITTING

The Third Sitting of the Conference opened with the singing of the song, "Jesus, Saviour, Pilot Me", led by Rev. Charles Lewis. Prayer was offered by Rev. H. D. Wright.

A motion was made that we change the order of the day and begin immediately with the election of the officers and during the counting of the ballots, other business shall be interspersed.

Ballots were cast for District Superintendent with Rev. Paul Ebright being re-elected on the first ballot. His words of acceptance were received with warm appreciation.

The minutes of the previous sitting were read and approved.

Ballots were cast for Assistant Superintendent with Rev. H. H. Barber being re-elected.

The following nominations for District Secretary were read: Charles Lewis, J. A. Thomas, and E. R. Mitchell. In the following election, E. R. Mitchell was re-elected.

The following nominations for District Treasurer were read: B. F. Durham, A. L. Sypolt, and F. M. McNurlin. B. F. Durham was re-elected.

A motion was made that the District Board of Administration be made up of nine members. Carried.

A motion was made that the nominations for lay members be made from the floor. Carried. The following were nominated.

The Ordination Service was the order of the day as previously set by the conference. Rev. John Hundley and Rev. E. H. Mattingly were presented for ordination.

The business session resumed and a motion was made that the time be extended until 10:00 p.m. Carried.

The report of the balloting for members of the Board of Administration resulted in the election of J. C. Bone, Coy Miller, and Harry McNurlin.

A motion was made that we vote on the five highest. Carried.

Rev. R. D. Christman and Rev. A. L. Sypolt were elected.

Resolution #8 was returned to the conference for consideration as rewritten. Resolution #8 carried.

Resolution #6 was returned to the conference floor for consideration as rewritten. Resolution #6 carried.

Ballots were cast for District Sunday School Secretary. Rev. Charles Lewis was elected.

Ballots were cast for Christian Youth Crusaders Director. Mrs. R. D. Christman was elected.

Ballots were cast for Secretary of Evangelism and Extension. Rev. J. A. Thomas was elected.

Ballots were cast for lay member of the Board of Ministerial Standing. Coy Miller was elected.

Ballots were cast for District Missionary President. Jenny V. Vincent was re-elected.

A motion was made that there will be a Nominating Committee elected by the conference. Carried.

A motion was made that the committee shall be appointed by the District Board of Administration for this year. Carried.

A motion was made and carried that the following be appointed by the Board of Administration: Board of Missions and Evangelism, Board of Review, Sunday School Committee, and the Secretary of World Missions.

A motion was made that the matter of the United Stewardship Fund be referred to the Board of Administration for adaptation to the district level. Carried.

A motion was made to extend the time fifteen minutes. Carried.



After further consideration a motion was made to rescind the action for extension of time. Carried.

A motion was made to adjourn. Carried.

The benediction was pronounced by Rev. F. M. McNurlin.

#### FOURTH SITTING

The Fourth Sitting of the conference convened at 8:30 a.m. with Rev. Chester Todd leading the conference in singing, "He Lives". Prayer was offered by Rev. M. F. Leadingham. The conference presiding officer called for portions of Scripture from members of the conference that had been especially helpful to them. Several responded with blessing and encouragement to all.

A motion was made to dispense with the roll call.

A motion was made to allow the Board of Administration to approve the minutes of the two final sittings.

A motion was made that the election for two members of the Camp Board shall be a plurality vote with the one receiving the highest number of votes declared elected for two years and the next highest for one year. Carried.

Ballots were cast for Camp Board Members with the following results: W. H. Richardson, 2 years; J. A. Thomas, 1 year.

A motion carried that the Conference Secretary send a letter of appreciation to the District Auditors, Kimbleton and Rivers, for their contribution and for the fine work in auditing the District Treasurer's books.

A motion was made that nominations be made from the floor for vacancy on the Home Missionary Board. The following were nominated: B. J. Watts, George Vance, and Chester Todd.

Ballots were cast with no election. A motion was made that we vote on the two highest. Carried.

Ballots were cast again and Rev. Chester Todd was re-elected.

The report of the Educational and Examining Boards was read by the District Secretary and approved by the conference.

Rev. J. A. Thomas resigned as Director of Evangelism and Extension. His resignation was accepted. Nominations were as follows to fill this vacancy: Chester Todd, C. W. Keyes. Ballots were cast with Chester Todd being elected.

Nominations were read as follows for Representative to the School Board of Southern Wesleyan College: Dan Campbell and Lloyd Brueckner. Dan Campbell was elected.

A motion was made that all unfinished business be delegated to the District Board of Administration. Carried.

The recommendations for General Evangelists were read. A motion was made to

approve them. Carried.

The General Superintendent gave an explanation of the voting rights for the next District Conference in 1969.

The following resolution was presented:

WHEREAS: We appreciate Dr. Melvin Snyder presiding at past conferences, as well as the present one;

AND WHEREAS: His ministry among us has always inspired and challenged us;

AND WHEREAS: His duties will take him elsewhere for the coming years;

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED: That this conference express its heartfelt thanks and appreciation for our beloved General Superintendent by a standing vote;

AND BE IT RESOLVED that we further express our appreciation by presenting him with a love offering;

AND BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED: That he be assured of our prayers as he takes up his duties elsewhere. A motion was made that the resolution be approved. Carried. The conference responded with a standing vote, and a love offering was received. The conference joined in singing, "Blest Be The Tie That Binds".

## DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

General Superintendent Snyder, fellow ministers, delegates to the First Annual Conference of the Kentucky District Wesleyan Church, and friends: Greetings in the Name of Jesus, our blessed Lord and Saviour. In the providence of God, we have been brought again to this hour. My heart overflows with thanks for His wonderful love and mercy.

This has been a historical year! Just a few weeks ago, on June 26th, the Pilgrim Holiness Church and the Wesleyan Methodist Church passed out of existence and a new church was born - The Wesleyan Church! No one, with any degree of spiritual perception, who was present for the merging ceremony and communion service, could doubt the approval of God upon this merger. In the mingling of the delegates, in the acts of union, in the communion service, God's presence was so very real as our hearts were melted and blended together. Even some who had been opposed, freely admitted that God was with us! This sense of divine approval continued throughout the entire conference. Certainly there was debating, but absolutely no division along former church lines. This in itself was remarkable. Certainly we need revival. We needed revival before; and we still need revival in the new Wesleyan Church. God grant that it may be so.

Regarding the Paducah work, we are concluding our second year there. The progress has been slow, but there has been progress. The burden of the District Home Missions Board and the burden of Rev. John Abernathy who has been on the field for two years, is that the work must continue. Within the past months, the prospects have brightened. We must see a good church established in this Western city. We have been praying and looking for a young couple to send to Paducah. We believe that God has providentially supplied the need in the persons of Rev. and Mrs. Don Hilbrecht. Brother Hilbrecht graduated from Kentucky Mountain Bible Institute and Owosso College. This young couple has been appointed and will assume their duties in Paducah around the first of September. Let us back them with our prayers. Let us pray that this year will see advancement made in the Wesleyan Mission in Paducah - Paducah for Christ and the Wesleysans.

In regard to the future activities of Rev. John Abernathy, we have asked him to remain near the field for counsel and assistance. He will be open for several revivals. In addition, we are tentatively planning a tour of the District, so that Brother Abernathy may visit each of our local churches in the interest of District Home Missions in general. We feel that this will be of tremendous value in helping to extend our outreach within our district. This must be done if we are saved from stalemate. This is vital.

This past April 23rd, tragedy struck in Falmouth, Kentucky. A tornado swept through this city, leaving behind in its wake, destruction, death and despair. There was some injury among our people there, but we are so thankful that God saw fit to spare their lives. Our church and parsonage were extensively damaged. There have been some repairs already made on these buildings, but the major repairs are yet to be made. The pastor is now in the process of obtaining contracts and we trust that the work can be brought to a satisfactory conclusion and the buildings restored to even better condition than formerly. In this same tornado, the mobile home of Rev. and Mrs. Orlow Webb, who were there in a revival, was damaged beyond repair, but God mercifully spared them.

There has been much material progress this year among our churches. A detailed report of this will be given in the minutes. However, I feel there are three that

deserve special attention.

Most of you will recall when the Hitchins Church and parsonage were destroyed by fire several years ago. They had no insurance on the buildings. Since that time, they have been worshipping in the Presbyterian Church and we do appreciate this courtesy. Eventually a Sunday School unit was constructed that has been serving as the parsonage. Finally after much prayer and consideration and in the face of many obstacles, a church building was begun and this year has seen its completion. The dedication was held June 9th. This new church building is a credit to our district and entire denomination, and was made possible only through the faith and determination of the people as they were inspired by a courageous pastor and wife - Rev. and Mrs. F.M. McNurlin.

Under the leadership of Rev. and Mrs. Charles Lewis, the Elizabethtown Church constructed a fine new parsonage. The space and facilities of this new building shows careful planning and makes it what the ideal parsonage should be. This parsonage would be classed among the very best in our entire denomination.

The Covington Church under the leadership of Rev. and Mrs. E. R. Mitchell, completed a major redecorating of the church from the basement floor to the ceiling, including new drapes on the rear wall of the platform, carpeting, and floral arrangements. In addition, two new studio pianos were purchased. On the outside, a new steeple was added, with flood lights. The value of all of this was six thousand dollars. The thing that makes this redecorating and improvement project so unique, is that the various items and projects were all gifts by individuals or families.

A new venture was made this year in the form of Zone Ministers Retreats. Wife and I met with the preachers and wives of all the zones except one. These meetings were centered around an evening meal together, and were for the purpose of informal discussion of zone activities, inspiration and fellowship. It was felt and expressed by most of those who attended that our time spent together was indeed interesting and profitable. I feel these were the beginning of something that should be continued and broadened. A close relationship between our district preachers is very vital if we would maintain that family spirit that is so necessary and helpful to all.

Now a word about the future of our district. This is our first District Conference as the Kentucky District Wesleyan Church. These are days of transition. There will be changes in organization, financial plans and so forth. All of these changes will require patience and determination to succeed. I am asked many questions -- "When are we going to merge districts?" "What will be the boundary?" "What about the future of the camp ground?" In every instance, about the only answer that can be given right now, is that at this point - "We do not know." There are a lot of things I do not know. I am perplexed about many things. But there is one thing I do know - I am determined to plow through the confusing, baffling network of problems and do my best to perfect this merger. I would hope we will all do the same. Selfishness, being bound by traditional patterns, lack of vision, all of these things will hinder; whereas unselfishness, vision, and a desire for God's best, will promote. The Wesleyan Church can be a great church. The Wesleyan Church can be a spiritual church. It is up to us. Our attitudes will hinder or help.

Due to the pressures of the last few weeks - the General Conference, preparation for this District Conference, the uncertainty in many areas, and the various boards and committees that may be elected, I have not been able to come before you with a definite suggested plan of action for the coming months. I would hope that following this conference, the various departments will chart courses that will enable us to forge ahead. The Merging General Conference has adopted as a theme for this quad-



rennium: "EVANGELISM IS THE ANSWER." In connection with this theme, some recommendations were presented and adopted. It is to be hoped that this emphasis on evangelism will be augmented by suggestions and guidelines by the general church. Evangelism is the answer for this materialistic concept of our age. Evangelism is the answer for real unity. Evangelism is the answer for soul winning. Evangelism is the answer for stalemate. EVANGELISM IS THE ANSWER! Let this be stressed in all our churches across the district. Let this be stressed in all departments of our churches. The future is as bright as the promises of God.

I would like to extend my heartfelt thanks to the various boards, committees, and departments who have labored for the welfare of our district. I appreciate my District Council for their burden, concern, and fellowship. I appreciate my Assistant, Rev. H. H. Barber, for his faithfulness in standing by me with advice and active assistance. My wife and I appreciate those of you who have extended hospitality to us this year. We love and appreciate all of you.

## REPORT OF SUNDAY SCHOOL PROMOTIONAL SECRETARY

Greetings to you in behalf of Kentucky Wesleyan Sunday Schools.

The average attendance for this year is 2436. The attendance for last year was 2911.

Allow me to thank you for your cooperation in making this report possible. My sincere thanks and compliments to the twenty churches that reported each month. Ten churches reported eleven times and six reported ten times.

The Lexington Church is honored with the highest net gain of 220 which gives them an average monthly gain of 18. McAndrews follows a close second with a net gain of 213 or a monthly average of 17.9. Also, McAndrews is the only Sunday School that showed no losses for any month during the entire year. Based on the ten reports received, Garvin Ridge shows a net gain of 183 or a monthly average of 18. Lewisport has an average gain of 12, while Covington had an average of nine. Glen Dean Mission, being a new work, showed an average attendance of 41 for the year. Thirteen other churches also showed a substantial gain. Out of 49 churches there were only 19 that showed a gain.

As a result of the merger, the Decade of Progress contest is terminated as of this conference year. Past reports show that it has been awarded seven times. Three years in succession, 1960-1963, Covington was the winner, E. R. Mitchell, pastor. Maysville, with Lon Helms at the helm, won for the year 1963-1964. Covington won again in 1964-1965. The Ashland Fairview Church, Lon Helms, pastor, won the following two years, 1965-1967. Therefore, Covington having received the award four times out of seven is declared the winner, and is awarded the ship on a permanent basis.

The Sunday School of the month plaque has been awarded eight times. Garvin Ridge and Olive Hill have both won twice. McAndrews, Lewisport, Clay, Covington and Soldier were also winners.

On August 3, 1967, during the last year's camp, the Board met to plan for the continuation of the work at Paducah. Rev. John Abernathy was reappointed as pastor of the work there. Also plans were made for the Camp Home Missions Service.

On November 17, 1967, the members of the Board met on the field at Paducah to conduct a week-end meeting. While there, a business meeting was held, at which time plans were made for a spring revival. A district tour in the interest of District Home Missions was tentatively planned; but this has not materialized.

The spring revival was conducted May 30 - June 9, 1968, with a fine evangelistic party - Rev. and Mrs. W. H. Richardson and J. O. Kelly. Jenny V. Vincent and Laura Fleming came for the last week-end of the revival and conducted a Vacation Bible School the following week, June 10-14. We appreciate the efforts put forth by these



willing workers. They went without financial remuneration, except for their expenses.

Personally, I have made three trips to Paducah this year - October 8, preaching once; November 17-19 to assist the Board in the week-end meeting; and June 1 and 2, during the spring revival. While there in June, I paid off the mortgage on the property, leaving it clear of debt.

In the further interest of District Home Missions, this past February, I made a trip to Columbia, Kentucky, to contact a former Pilgrim Family, thinking there might be an opportunity there. As yet, nothing has materialized.

Kentucky is a great state - but it could be greater by establishing more Wesleyan churches. This must be done if we are to go forward for God and our church!

## REPORT OF THE RESOLUTIONS COMMITTEE

1. Whereas: The Wesleyan Methodist Church and the Pilgrim Holiness Church have merged at the general level:

Be it resolved that the Kentucky District, Pilgrim Holiness Church, and the Kentucky District, Wesleyan Methodist Church, be merged into one district of The Wesleyan Church.

2. Be it resolved that the date and place of the Merging Conference shall be set by the Executive Officers of both conferences following the conference of 1968.

3. Be it resolved that the present Comity Committee be continued for the coming year.

Be it further resolved that the District Board of Administration fill any vacancies so that each district may have equal representation.

4. Whereas: The new Wesleyan Discipline provides that the District Conference may delegate to the District Board of Administration authority to appoint certain committees:

Be it resolved that the District Board of Administration be authorized to appoint the following committees:

The District Conference Action Committee  
The District Building Committee  
The District Statistical Committee

5. Be it resolved that the District Board of Administration be authorized to hire an auditor to give an annual audit of the records for all departments of the district.

6. (As referred back to Conference)

Be it resolved that the District Board of Ministerial Standing (formerly the Examining and Educational Boards) shall consist of five members elected by the Conference, one of which shall be a layman. The vacancy to be filled this year by expiration of term shall be filled by a layman.

7. Whereas: There are now two camps in Kentucky under the Wesleyan Church and one of them is already known as the Kentucky Wesleyan Camp:

Be it resolved that the camp here at Maysville be officially called the Maysville Wesleyan Camp.

8. Be it resolved that resolution number 41, page 35, be revised to read:

Resolved: That there be a Camp Meeting Board that shall have supervision of the maintenance of the camp grounds and buildings and the physical operations of the Camp Meeting, excluding the calling of the workers and the spiritual supervision of the Camp.

Be it further resolved that this board consist of five members, one of which shall be the District Treasurer, by virtue of his office. The other four members, who shall not be members of the Board of Administration, shall be elected by the conference on the revolving plan. The persons elected to this board in 1968 shall serve as follows: The first elected shall serve until 1970, the second elected shall serve until 1969. Term expiring after this initial election shall be replaced on a two year term.

Furthermore this board shall meet immediately after conference and elect its officers. The Chairman of the board shall be the Business Manager of the Camp, and shall assign and supervise work week activities and work assignments during Camp. This committee shall also appoint a tool room manager for supplies and tool dispersements.

9. Whereas there are numerous items in our district minutes that relate to the former Pilgrim Holiness Church Manual:

Be it resolved that the District Board of Administration be authorized to edit and delete all items which are obsolete or superseded by the new Wesleyan Church Discipline.

## RESOLUTIONS

### District Superintendent

1. Resolved: That the District Superintendent make two trips over the District during the year, and to give more time to the smaller churches as needed.

### Board of Administration

2. Resolved: That the Conference delegate authority to the Board of Administration to construct buildings for the District, appointing and directing a committee to carry out its plan, to make rules and by-laws regulating the sale of lots, the building of cottages, and to govern the Camp grounds; the same to be printed in the Minutes.

3. Whereas: Eventually the two Districts will be merged, and

Whereas a United Ministerial Institute will be practical and profitable as we approach the time of final union.

Therefore, be it resolved: That we continue to have United Ministerial Institutes, and that the District Board of Administration negotiate the date, place and program for each institute.

4. Resolved: That the District Board of Administration be given power to rezone the churches of the District when necessary.

### Churches

5. Resolved: That each church close their books on the last day of each month, and the monthly budgets be sent to the District Treasurer immediately. Be it also resolved: That the District Treasurer's books be closed for the year, at noon, on the 10th day of July.

6. Resolved: That each church, minister, and deaconess mail a copy of its annual report to the District Statistician by the 15th of July each year, and

Be it further resolved: That persons failing to comply with this ruling be reported to the District Board of Administration and Board of Ministerial Standing.

7. Resolved: That whereas many of our pastors do not receive sufficient financial support, Be it resolved: That each local church appoint one night each month as "donation night" at which time food and provisions shall be brought together for the pastor.

Be it also resolved: That the District Superintendent shall appoint "an agitator" at the annual business meeting, whose duty it is to announce donation night in advance.



8. Resolved: That since it is a matter of great importance for the pastors of the District to attend the Camp and Conference, Be it resolved: That the pastor's support at the church where he is assigned as pastor shall continue over the two Sundays he attends Camp and Conference and the first Sunday following.

9. Resolved: That pastors and church boards urge the calling of evangelists for our revivals from among our own Wesleyan ministers, and that the District Superintendent be consulted before we call other ministers.

10. Resolved: That churches do not slate revivals during the Ministerial Institute or Camp and Conference.

11. Resolved: That the pastors of churches paying full support be asked to hold a revival of at least a week in length for smaller churches of the District, if requested to do so. The church benefiting by said revival is to do its best financially for the pastor holding the revival. The church sending its pastor shall assume financial responsibility of its pulpit during the absent Sunday or Sundays. The District Superintendent shall serve as clearing agent for such revival.

12. In as much as objectives, plans, and goals are necessary in order to carry out the program of the District, and these must be in the hands of the pastors early in the year in order for the program to be effective, therefore: Be it resolved that objectives, plans, and goals of all district departments (Sunday School, Youth, District Home Missions, and the District Missionary Society), be in the hands of all ministers by September 30.

#### Sunday School

13. In as much that there is no uniform time to stop counting Sunday School attendance, Be it resolved: That the half way point in the Sunday School session be the deadline for counting attendance.

14. Resolved: That each Sunday School be given credit for the number of scholars from their church attending Sunday School at our Camp.

15. Resolved: That the annual report of the Sunday School average attendance be figured on the basis of the 50 highest Sundays as set in the Sunday School Standard of Excellence, #4D.

16. Resolved: That the Sunday School Secretary shall make a tour of the District in the fall months, presenting the plans and program of the District Sunday School Board and those of the General Sunday School Department. Be it further resolved: That a time shall be given during Camp Meeting, when detailed study can be given for teachers and workers for the betterment of our local Sunday Schools. This is not to be at the time of any of the main services.

#### District Home Missions

17. Resolved: That a District Home Missions Board be formed, consisting of the District Superintendent as chairman, and one member appointed from the Board of Administration, plus two additional members elected by the Conference as follows: The first one elected shall serve for two years, the second one elected shall serve one year. Thereafter, each one elected shall be for a term of two years. The two members elected by the Conference shall be other than those on the District Board of Administration.

Their duties shall be as follows:

- a. To keep a constant lookout for new areas in which to locate new Wesleyan Churches.
- b. To have supervision of District Home Missions Projects including location, financing, and placing of pastors for a minimum of the first five years and said details to be subject to approval by the District Board of Administration.
- c. To sponsor and promote an annual District Home Missions service in the Camp Meeting.
- d. To report annually to the District Conference.

Be it further resolved: That district ministers be urged to give a week or two of revival, or other effort, on a District Home Missions Project, if called upon by the District Superintendent or District Home Missions Board.

#### Credentials

18. Resolved: That all persons applying for license appear in person before the Board of Ministerial Standing, unless the applicant is sick or otherwise unable to appear; in which case some member of the Conference is to certify as to his or her character and location.

#### Pastor

19. Resolved: That each pastor read all resolutions of this Conference to his congregation at the earliest possible date.

20. Resolved: That each pastor make a special effort to place a current Discipline in the home of each member of the church.

21. Resolved: That each pastor list in a book the name and address of each Advocate Subscriber, with the expiration date; said book is to be transferred to his successor, and that each pastor endeavor to keep a subscription list equal to his membership.

22. Resolved: That no pastor hold revivals off his charge without making satisfactory arrangements with his church. Be it further resolved: That no pastor hold a revival away from his church within 30 days after a revival in his own church, nor more than two revivals during the Conference year, providing said church is supporting him.

23. Resolved: That each pastor send the obituary of deceased members of his church to the Chairman of the Memoirs Committee immediately following the funeral.

24. Resolved: That each active pastor be given two weeks vacation with pay.

Be it further resolved, if the pastor does not take a vacation, he be paid one or two weeks extra salary, as the case may be.

25. Resolved: That each minister submit his name, address, and telephone number to the District Secretary immediately upon arrival at his new address; the same to be included in the Ministerial Directory. Each minister shall notify the District Secretary of any changes occurring thereafter.

26. Resolved: That any pastor failing to get a call or recall on the first ballot, shall not be considered for that church in that specific conference year, without consent of the District Board of Administration.



## Ministers

27. Resolved: That each minister support financially the church of which he is a member.

28. Resolved: That each minister attend the Camp and Conference in full or present a written explanation of non-attendance to the District Board of Administration.

29. Resolved: That whereas ministers are interested in the welfare of other ministers and their families, and whereas, there is a Ministerial Benefit Association established for the purpose of protecting the family of the deceased minister, we therefore recommend: That the local church assume payment of the assessment for pastor and wife when called for by the Association. Be it also resolved: That the District pay the assessment of the District Superintendent and all those under the jurisdiction of the District Home Missionary Committee.

30. Resolved: That no minister or church shall conduct a radio broadcast without permission of the District Board of Administration.

31. Resolved: That upon the death of a minister or his wife the Superintendent be notified, and that he notify the District Secretary, who in turn will notify the Zone Chairmen, and they are to notify the pastors in their zone by phone or card.

## Conference

32. Resolved: That no one leave the Conference without permission.

33. Resolved: That no church send a delegate to Conference who will not agree to stay throughout the entire Conference.

34. Resolved: That our churches send qualified delegates, who know the problems of the church and District.

35. Resolved: Whereas much valuable time is sometimes taken by resolutions which may not deserve much time, and whereas, the Conference Action Committee often feels reluctant to ignore any resolution even if it seems of small importance: Be it therefore resolved: That this Conference invest the Conference Action Committee with the power to reject any resolution that is not written out and signed by the person who offers it for consideration to the committee and, or, Conference.

36. Be it resolved: That all resolutions must be in the hands of the Conference Action Committee at least three days before the District Conference.

## Camp

37. Resolved: That our Camp shall begin on the last Friday before the last Sunday in July.

38. Resolved: That there be a Camp Meeting Board that shall have supervision of the maintenance of the Camp grounds and buildings and the physical operations of the Camp Meeting excluding the calling of the workers and the spiritual supervision of the Camp. Be it further resolved that this board consist of five members, one of which shall be the District Treasurer by virtue of his office. The other four members, who shall not be members of the Board of Administration, shall be elected by the Conference on the revolving plan. The persons elected to this board in 1968 shall serve as

follows: The first elected shall serve until 1970, the second elected shall serve until 1969. Term expiring after this initial election shall be replaced on a two year term.

Furthermore this board shall meet immediately after Conference and elect it's officers. The Chairman of the board shall be the Business Manager of the Camp and shall assign and supervise work week activities and work assignments during Camp. This committee shall also appoint a tool room manager for supplies and tool dispersements.

39. Resolved: That all who attend Camp Meeting must register. Work will be assigned as nearly equally as possible to all those working during the Camp.

40. Resolved: That the District Superintendent, his wife, and the Camp nurse, be registered free for the Camp and Conference. Be it further resolved, that the District Superintendent, his wife, the nurse, and the called workers for the Camp and Conference be entertained free at the lunch stand.

41. Resolved: That each church in the Conference of less than 20 members give 2 days labor or \$10.00; 20 to 50 members, 4 days labor or \$20.00; above 50 members, 6 days labor or \$30.00, for help in Camp ground maintenance or Camp preparation. This call for help shall be issued by the District Board of Administration or Camp Board.

42. Be it resolved: That permission to locate a trailer on the Camp ground during Camp Meeting shall be obtained from the Camp Meeting Board, and steps be taken immediately to provide a trailer park.

43. Resolved: That all cabin owners furnish their own cabins.

44. Resolved: That whereas we have a large number of children on our Camp ground during Camp. Be it therefore resolved: That a fund be established to provide the necessary equipment for a supervised playground, using the offerings from the Children's services to apply on the equipment. Be it further resolved: That the District Board of Administration appoint a committee to take the necessary steps to provide said playground.

45. Resolved: That since it is so important that the Camp set the proper example and standards for others to follow, therefore, be it resolved: That the District Board of Administration see that all workers, such as speakers, singers, pianists, and musicians used in any service on the Camp Meeting platform, be required to dress as "becometh holiness," including the wearing of hose and sleeves of below elbow length, and that the Secretary inform all workers when calling them of the standards that the Conference requires.

46. Resolved: That the District Board of Administration appoint someone each year to be in charge of each of the prayer rooms and to arrange for prayer groups and other special prayer effort all through the Camp.

47. Whereas: There is a pressing need for many items for the continuing operation of the Camp: Be it resolved: That we ask the District Board of Administration to appoint a Chairman and a three member committee to organize, list, and assign the needed items to the various churches. This is to be known as the Ladies Camp Meeting Auxilliary.



Miscellaneous

48. Resolved: That the following District Officers shall serve as Trustees of the Kentucky District, Viz. - The District Superintendent, District Secretary, and District Treasurer.

49. Resolved: That no one person serve on more than one committee where competent persons are available.

50. Resolved: That each church plan for a Daily Vacation Bible School.

51. Resolved: That resolutions which are of a temporary nature shall become void upon their completion and shall automatically be deleted from our Minutes.

52. Resolved: That a Conference paper be published monthly, the same to be edited by one appointed by the District Board of Administration. The various departments of our District program shall consider this as our official organ. The heads of these departments shall be considered as contributing editors. It is further recommended that this paper be devoted to information and promotion rather than a compilation of sermons.

53. Resolved: That the host church, with the District Superintendent, decide as to the mode of entertaining the Ministerial Institute.

54. Be it resolved: That a District Comity Committee of five be established to meet with a like committee from the Kentucky Conference of the former Wesleyan Methodist Church, for the purpose of discussion and exchange of ideas relative to the merger. Be it further resolved: That said committee be chosen by the following method: Two members appointed from the Board of Administration by the Board of Administration, and three additional members elected by the Conference.

55. Resolved: That the Comity Committee and the District Board of Administration serve as a Polity Committee for the merger of the Districts and the designating of the name for the Camp Meeting be referred to them.

56. Resolved: That the Kentucky District, Pilgrim Holiness Church, and the Kentucky Conference, Wesleyan Methodist Church, be merged into one District of the Wesleyan Church.

57. Resolved: That the date and place of the Merging District Conference shall be set by the Executive Officers of both Conferences following the Conference of 1968.

58. Resolved: That the present Comity Committee be continued for the coming year.

59. Whereas: The new Wesleyan Discipline provides that the District Conference may delegate to the District Board of Administration authority to appoint certain committees:

Be it resolved that the District Board of Administration be authorized to appoint the following committees:

The District Conference Action Committee  
The District Building Committee  
The District Statistical Committee

60. Resolved: That the District Board of Administration be authorized to hire an

auditor to give an annual audit of the records for all departments of the District.

61. Resolved: That the District Board of Ministerial Standing (formerly the Examining and Educational Boards) shall consist of five members elected by the Conference, one of which shall be a layman. The vacancy to be filled this year by expiration of term shall be filled by a layman.

62. Whereas: There are numerous items in our District Minutes that relate to the former Pilgrim Holiness Church Manual: Be it resolved: That the District Board of Administration be authorized to edit and delete all items which are obsolete or superseded by the new Wesleyan Church Discipline.

63. Resolved: That the following point system be adopted as a standard for the judging of missionary displays from year to year:

- a. Clarity of theme - 10 points.
- b. Illustration of theme - 25 points.
- c. Quality - 25 points.
- d. Originality - 25 points.
- e. Neatness - 15 points.

Be it further resolved that no display be considered in judging if it has been previously displayed.

64. Resolved: Whereas, we feel that television is detrimental to deep spirituality and the teaching of the Wesleyan Church: Be it resolved that the Kentucky Conference go on record as opposed to members and ministers having television sets.

#### RECOMMENDATIONS OF THE WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE

1. We recommend: That each Sunday School pay two dollars (\$2.00) per month into a Building Fund, for the purpose of construction or maintenance of buildings on the Camp Ground.

2. We recommend: That each church take a free will offering for the District Superintendent on all the visits, the same to be sent in by the local treasurer and applied on the Superintendent's traveling expense.

3. We recommend: That whereas, there is a pressing need for buildings to house our people, that each church or individual buying a lot be asked to build a cabin on said lot within three years, and if they fail to do so, to put the lot up for resale. Furthermore, we recommend: That those who purchased lots prior to this date be contacted by the District Superintendent urging them to build a cabin within two years or give the District the privilege of reselling their lot.

4. We recommend: That whereas our District Home Missions and Church Extension Loan Fund is being supervised by the District Board of Administration and they are placing all designated funds in this department, that the rate of interest be four per cent (4%) on all loans.



5. We recommend: That each church pay the registration fee of their pastor and wife and church delegate to the District Conference; this amount to be raised by the District Superintendent at the annual meeting; and also an offering for their traveling expense.

6. We recommend: That the District Treasurer be paid two hundred fifty dollars (\$250.00) per year, and the District Secretary one hundred eighty dollars (\$180.00) per year; the same to be paid in equal monthly payments; and that the District Statistician be paid sixty dollars (\$60.00) per year.

7. We recommend: That each church have a monthly missionary service, at which time an offering shall be taken for World Missions.

8. We recommend: That each church send ten percent (10%) of their regular offerings to the District Treasurer, designated as District Budget. This does not include special offerings, such as building fund, evangelists, General Church obligations.

9. We recommend: That the District Superintendent's salary shall be set by the District Board of Administration.

10. We recommend: That any minister traveling under the direction of the District Superintendent, the Board or Committee of which he is a part, be paid seven cents (7¢) per mile traveling expense plus one dollar (\$1.00) per meal bought while in District work.

11. We recommend: That all those who come in to work on the called work week be paid at the rate of seven cents (7¢) per mile. Where possible those coming from one area shall group together. They shall stay the minimum of days as required by the Minutes.

12. We recommend: That the churches pay their pastor a salary at least equal to the average wages of the working people of the church, and that the matter of the pastor's salary be taken care of by the District Superintendent or his assistant at the time of the annual meeting.

13. We recommend: That the local church pay 50% of the Social Security payment on his salary from the church. We further recommend that the District pay 50% of the District Superintendent's Social Security.

14. Whereas: the pastor's attendance at the Ministerial Institute benefits the church as much as the pastor:

We recommend: That each church pay its pastor's travel expense to the Institute at the rate of 7 cents per mile, and \$1.00 per meal.

15. We recommend: That the District Budget shall be divided as follows: Zone Bible School 4%, General Conference Expense 3%, Sunday School Promotion 2%, and the balance placed in the Sinking Fund.

16. We recommend: That the District raise one thousand dollars (\$1,000.00) per year to assist on the Camp Meeting; the same to be raised by each local church giving the sum equivalent to one dollar (\$1.00) per member, the sum to be sent to the District Treasurer.

17. We recommend: That each church take steps to raise their revival offering at least thirty days before the revival starts.

18. We recommend: That when a mission is organized into a church it shall not be asked to pay District Budget for one year from the following Conference; and that the church shall pay fifty percent for the two following years.

19. We recommend: That each church send \$2.00 per month for our district youth work, same to be sent to the District Treasurer and forwarded to the District Youth Treasurer.

20. We recommend: That each Sunday School set aside one Sunday each month and 50% of said Sunday's offering be given for District Home Missions.

21. We recommend: That each Sunday School adopt the birthday offering plan, said offerings to go for District Home Missions.

22. We recommend: That each church give the minimum of five dollars (\$5.00) to support the District Ministerial Institute each year.

23. We recommend: That each church subscribe for the number of Kentucky Pilgrims they desire per month and that they pay 7¢ per copy for the same.

24. We recommend: That due to the heavy financial burden at Camp time, an organization shall be formed called the Kentucky Pilgrim Camp Association. The purpose of the association shall be to relieve that financial burden. Each member of said organization would contribute the sum of 50 cents per month for 10 months, with the total amount to be sent to the District Treasurer on or before June 30.

25. We recommend: That each local Missionary Society pay the sum of fifty cents (50¢) per month, to be used for miscellaneous expenses of the District Missionary Society. It shall be known as the Missionary Society Expense Fund. Said money is to be sent directly to the District Missionary Treasurer.

#### RULES GOVERNING SALE OF LOTS AND BUILDING COTTAGES

Price of lots, \$20.00 each. Terms: \$5.00 down payment when purchased, balance to be paid in monthly payments of \$3.00 each. Six percent on unpaid balance at maturity. All lots are to be paid for in six months or contract is void.

All outside lots in the old plot shall be of this dimension, 20 feet in width and 30 feet in length. Inside lots shall be 20 x 20. All lots in the new plot shall be 20 x 30 feet. All cottages are to be uniform in size and placements on lots in accordance with the row or street on which they may be placed. The dimensions of the cottages are to be 10 x 12 feet, with an eight foot eave, six concrete piers, one door and two windows, a screen door, and either a metal or asphalt roof. The building is to be made of dressed lumber, either boxed or framed, and to have two coats of white paint. An extension of nine feet may be built on any of the cabins on an outside lot of the old plot, such additions, to be of the same dimensions as that of the cabin with a window on each side. A porch may be built on the front of any and all cottages. Cabins on the new plot may be either single or double.

The District Council holds the right to paint or repair in any way necessary, unless the owner does the work himself, and the owner is to pay the expense of same. Aluminum paint only is to be used on the metal roof.



## RATES FOR THE CAMP

### Camp Rates:

1. Season meal ticket for Camp and Conference: \$7.50 and work assigned; or \$15.00.
2. Children from six through twelve shall be charged at the rate of \$3.00.
3. Children under six years of age, shall be entertained without charge.
4. Individual meals shall be 75 cents per meal.
5. Delegates and all others who attend Conference, and who have not paid the season ticket rate, shall be charged the rates for individual meals.
6. The children of actively engaged district pastors, aged 16 and under, shall be entertained without charge, but shall be subject to assigned work.
7. Cabin owners shall pay a \$2.00 registration fee, this to include electricity.
8. Rent for rooms shall be charged as follows:  
    \_\_\_ Old dorm. for camp season \$10.00      \_\_\_ New Dorm. for camp season \$12.00  
    \_\_\_ Nightly rates in Old Dorm.    1.00      \_\_\_ Nightly rates in New Dorm.    1.50
9. Meals and bed shall be gratis to visiting ministers of other districts and denominations for a period of not exceeding 3 days. Any exception to this rule shall be left to the discretion of the Camp Meeting Board.

### Other:

1. The "Reserved Table" in the Dining Room shall be limited to the seating of the District Superintendent, Assistant District Superintendent, and wives called workers, and special guests.
2. All youth who register for the Camp Meeting, must participate in the Youth Program.
3. All single youth shall be housed in barracks type rooms, place to be designated by Camp Meeting Board.

## **REPORT OF RESOLUTIONS AND WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEES**

1. We recommend: That Resolution Number 16 be deleted.

2. We recommend: That Resolution Number 18 be changed to read as follows:

We recommend: That a copy of all resolutions be placed in the hands of the zone chairmen and pastors within thirty days after Youth Conference, to be read at the first zone meeting and to all local congregations.

3. We recommend: That Recommendations Number 2 and Number 5 be combined to read:

We recommend: That each church send three dollars per month for our District Youth Work, same to be sent to the District Treasurer and forwarded to the Youth Treasurer.

4. We recommend: That Recommendation Number 6 be changed to read:

We recommend: That any District Youth Official, and others traveling on official youth business be paid the sum per mile and meals equal to the District Superintendent and other District Officials while traveling.

5. We recommend: That the Youth President be paid seventy-five dollars per year for services rendered to the Youth Department.

6. We recommend: That the District Youth Treasurer receive and disburse all funds of the Kentucky District Youth.

### **YOUTH CONFERENCE STANDING RESOLUTIONS**

1. Resolved: That the District Youth Conference shall be held during our District Camp. The time to be set by the executive officers of the Youth Council.

2. Resolved: The first ten rows of the tabernacle and the platform area shall constitute the conference bar. The hours for conference sittings shall be from 9 a.m. to 11:45 a.m. and 1:15 p.m. until finished.

3. Whereas the District Board of Administration presents three or more names per zone for the election of Zone Chairman at the Youth Conference, and whereas the District Youth President is in close touch with the zones; therefore, be it resolved that we request the District Youth President be allowed to meet with the District Board of Administration when making these nominations.

4. Resolved: That space be given in the Conference Minutes for a Youth Section, consisting of directory of officers, committees, resolutions, ways and means recommendations and minutes of Youth Conference.

5. Resolved: That our Youth Department shall honor the High School and College Seniors of the District with a banquet or banquets. The times and places to be set by the Youth Society Officers.

6. Resolved: That the District Youth Council have authority to set the time and arrange other details of the Youth Camp.

7. Resolved: That the District Youth Council appoint a Youth Camp Committee of three, who with the Youth President shall have authority to arrange the details of the Youth Camp.

8. Resolved: That the District Youth President be authorized to meet with the District Board of Administration to confer on any construction on the Camp ground relating to youth activities.

9. Be It Resolved: That all Youth Conference Committees for the new year shall be appointed by the Youth Executive Council and published in the Minutes.

10. Inasmuch as there is a need of uniformity as to the number of zone rallies held each year, therefore, be it resolved that the minimum number of rallies per zone be set at four per year.

11. Inasmuch as there has been a lack of uniformity in the composition of the zone rallies; therefore, be it resolved that all of the eight zones have the same point system in awarding the zone banner. The following points will determine the winner of a zone banner:

1. One zone attendance banner in each zone.
2. One point per church per mile to rally (mileage as set by AAA)
3. Three points per person attending the zone rally.
4. Host church entitled the liberty of winning the banner if they have 51% of the attendance.

## 12. DUTIES OF ZONE OFFICERS

The duties of the zone officers shall be as listed below:

### CHAIRMAN

1. Meet with zone committee and plan dates in advance for zone rallies.
2. Send dates of zone rallies to the District Youth President and to all pastors in the zone.
3. Plan and promote all zone rallies.
4. Preside at all zone rallies.
5. Give attention to financial matters of the zone.
6. Serve on the District Youth Council.
7. Co-operate in promoting the district and national youth program.
8. Keep an up-to-date mailing list of all local officers in the zone.
9. Give a report to the Annual District Youth Conference.

### VICE CHAIRMAN

1. Shall co-operate with and assist, the chairman as requested by the chairman.
2. Serve on the zone committee.

### SECRETARY

1. Keep minutes of all zone committee meetings.
2. Help the zone chairman with zone correspondence.
3. Keep an up-to-date mailing list of all local officers in the zone.
4. Report each zone rally to the District Youth President as soon as possible after each rally.

### TREASURER

1. Receive and disburse funds as directed by the zone committee.
2. Keep accurate records of receipts and disbursements and bank all



monies immediately upon receiving.

3. Serve on zone committee.

13. The officers of the zone shall be Chairman, Vice Chairman, Secretary, and Treasurer. Each one must be a member of the Wesleyan Church.

14. Be It Resolved: That the Zone Chairman, Vice Chairman, Secretary, and Treasurer and the Zone Pastors constitute a zone planning committee. They shall plan the programs, set the dates, and choose the places of the zone meetings. They shall raise funds in the zone meetings and disburse the same.

15. Resolved: That all zone chairmen prepare a report of the activities and finances of the zone to be read at the Youth Conference by the Zone Chairman, or Vice Chairman, or by another, if these cannot be present. The same report shall be inserted into the District Youth Minutes.

16. Resolved: That each church send a delegation of at least one or more young people to represent said church to each zone rally, regardless of Revival or other special meeting going on in their church at the time of rally.

17. Resolved: That a copy of all resolutions be placed in the hands of Zone Chairmen and pastors within thirty days after Youth Conference, to be read at the first zone meeting and to all local congregations.

#### RECOMMENDATIONS

1. We Recommend: That when the District Youth President conducts a Rally in the zone meetings, that an offering be taken in the service for his traveling expenses.

2. We Recommend: That each church send \$2.00 per month for our district youth work, same to be sent to the District Treasurer and forwarded to the District Youth Treasurer.

3. We Recommend: That Zone Rally offerings be divided as follows: 25% for Youth Camp to be sent to the District Youth Treasurer; 25% for Sunday School Promotion to be sent to the District Treasurer; 50% to be used at the discretion of the Zone.

4. We Recommend: That any district youth officer traveling on official business, be paid the sum of 5¢ per mile and meals while traveling.

5. We Recommend: That any district youth official, and others, traveling on official youth business be paid the sum per mile and meals equal to other district officials while traveling.

6. We Recommend: That the Youth President be paid seventy-five dollars per year for services rendered to the youth department.

7. We Recommend: That the District Youth Treasurer receive and disburse all funds of the Kentucky District Youth.

8. We Recommend: That each local youth group send \$1.00 per month to the District Youth Treasurer for the Youth work.

## STANDING RESOLUTIONS

### I. The Annual Conference (Officials and Boards)

1. The annual district-conference shall convene on Wednesday following the first Monday of August.

2. The book of Discipline of the Wesleyan Church shall constitute the polity under which the Kentucky District of the Wesleyan Church shall operate as a corporation.

3. The District and Church fiscal year shall close June 30, and the District Treasurer shall close his books July 15.

4. Ministers and delegates attending Annual Conference shall have priority on dormitory rooms on the campground during the session.

5. The District Superintendent shall be custodian of deeds and legal documents.

7. The District Treasurer and the Statistical Committee shall check each pastor's report.

8. The District Treasurers of the Missionary Society, of the Wesleyan Youth, and the Y. M. W. B. shall send a report of itemized receipts from each church to the District Treasurer immediately after their books close.

9. There shall be a Publications Committee of three of which the District Superintendent and the District Secretary shall be members ex-officio.

10. There shall be a committee of seven Wesleyans to operate the camp meeting, three of which the District shall elect for staggered terms of three years each, two of which shall be elders and one a layman; and two of which the Board of Directors of the Camp Meeting Association shall elect for three years each, one of which shall be an elder and the other a layman. The District Superintendent and the President of the Camp Meeting Association shall be ex-officio members, the District Superintendent being the chairman.

11. No divorced person who has remarried shall be ordained.

### II. The Church and Sunday School

12. No charge shall call a pastor or supply from other districts or denominations as long as there are available ministers in the district qualified for the work.

13. The vote on the pastor should be taken the first week in June unless special permission is granted for another date by the Board of Administration. The clerk should prepare the ballot for this vote. The results shall be reported at once to the District Superintendent.

14. Each church shall provide their pastor suitable living quarters, insofar as possible, all his utilities, monthly donations, two weeks vacation with pay exclusive of conference and camp Sundays, and shall definitely arrange with the pastor the number of revivals he is allowed to hold off his charge; and the contracting church shall pay the pastor's moving expense.

15. Church elections shall be held so that elected officials fill their offices on July 1, provided that the treasurer shall fill his office July 15.

16. Each church shall observe a Sunday prior to Annual Conference as Camp Meeting Sunday by informing the pastor or delegate the amount of Church pledge for campground improvement and operation.

17. Sunday School attendance should be determined before the last ten minutes of the class period; an average annual attendance may be obtained by counting the fifty highest Sundays.

### III. Ministry

18. The pastoral year shall end with the last Sunday of Camp Meeting and the church shall pay the pastor's salary through this time.

19. Each pastor shall have his membership transferred to the church of which he is pastor.

20. A minister may borrow a book from the District Library for one month only (unless there is no call for it) at 25 cents per month, but he shall pay 5 cents per day for failure to return it on time.

21. Pastors shall read annually to their congregations the General Rules and Special Directions in the Discipline; the Standing Resolutions; the Moral Reform Report; and shall encourage them to familiarize themselves with the Discipline.

22. Each minister shall attend both conference and camp; or, if unable to do so, he shall give valid reasons on a form prepared by the Board of Administration which shall evaluate the report.

23. No pastor shall accept revival meetings or camp meeting which conflict with the Annual Conference or Camp Meeting, without the approval of the Board.

24. Our own evangelists shall not conduct revivals or camp meetings in our Wesleyan churches within the conference bounds at the time of our Youth Camp, Annual Conference, Camp Meeting, or Ministerial Institute.

25. Each pastor shall get his statistical report to the District Treasurer by, or before, July 15. The Treasurer shall notify the District Superintendent of delinquent reports not received by July 20. The Statistical Committee shall designate the omission of such reports in the minutes by an asterisk.

### IV. Morals, Spiritual Life, and Standards of Practice

26. We reaffirm our historic Wesleyan standards of doctrine, of a life of piety and deep spirituality, and of separation from worldly practices. We strongly urge our people to dress modestly, to shun nudity, to desist from wearing apparel pertaining to the opposite sex, and to put off the wearing of gold, jewelry, rings, and exorbitantly costly apparel. We expect our ministers to support this resolution.

27. Knowing that the enemy of all righteousness is engaged in degrading man more deeply by pornographic literature, evil radio programs, sexy and lustful television programs, the advertising of beer, and tobacco by various media, and by false teachers and preachers in classroom and pulpit, Kentucky District registers its disapproval of all this. We strongly admonish our members to control radio, to screen literature read by children, and to shun the appearance of evil in every detail.

28. Realizing that the common use of television is a very serious detriment to the building of holy character by breaking down standards of modesty, purity, and morals through the showing of many obscene, nude, and lustful scenes, the advertisement of beer and tobacco, and often by making crime seem heroic to youth, Kentucky District will not license preachers or workers, ordain elders, or station ministers who own or have a television set in their possession.

### Report No. 1

#### PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Members of the 46th Session of the Kentucky Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church, now The Wesleyan Church, cordial Christian consolation:

Divine providence permits us to meet again in the interests of Christ's eternal kingdom. We live in the sunset hours of the day of grace. The evening shadows are upon us. The rapture now awaits the saints. The night of tribulation will speedily engulf the earth. The Anti-christ, the Beast, and the False Prophet will then reign. What terrors await men's souls and bodies. Following the bride's wedding week of seven years, the bridegroom and the bride will return to earth for a thousand years' reign to correct earth's dilemmas—social, moral spiritual, economic, racial political, ecclesiastical — and to lock up the Anti-christ for a thousand years. Spiritual and eternal values count. Time fast runs out. What we do for Christ under the Spirit's anointing and leadership lasts. We must be diligent about our Master's interests. Scripture points to unjust stewards, foolish virgins, seed falling on unproductive soil, unwise builders, and those with earthly interests paramount. What indifference and lethargy now characterizes the church general and even the holiness church. Under such conditions it seems easy to blame one another, to allow division to sever our militant ranks, and to rest on a few laurels.

But this is a day of urgency. Diligence demands depth of consecration, prevailing intercession, fearless proclamation of the Savior's claims by His death, His resurrection, and His return, and our seeking out the lost. We must not be divided, but united under one banner for a great spiritual conquest. The merger of the Pilgrim Holiness and the Wesleyan Methodist Churches into The Wesleyan Church must provide aggressive evangelism, promote revival, unite our forces for a forward thrust, conserve some funds to educate more youth for Christian service, and to girdle the globe with fiery zealots of the Christ of redemption. Sacrifice must bridle luxury so that we love not our lives unto death. Love always finds a way: in marriage, in community of living a common purse, common interests, and common aims. Perfect love shed abroad in our hearts will cause the new church to operate without friction. Glory will settle down. We shall run like Samson's foxes setting fire to the enemy's cornfields. Fear will fall on the lost. The devil will flee. Plans born of the Holy Ghost will promote growth and spiritual life. Christ will be honored. Man will fit into his niche without grumbling. Conniving and politicking will be set aside. Selfishness will be banished. Souls will be saved. Believers will yearn for holiness and be filled with the Spirit. This will come when we turn from our ways, and seek the Savior first, and pray and fast until He sends the Holy Ghost. Powerful revivals and aggressive evangelism would then produce the pastors so sorely needed.

This year there has been much material and spiritual progress in various churches and some losses in others. Atwood church has laid a new carpet installed new pews, and given the old ones to the campground. Bloomfield has admirably remodeled the parsonage quarters without indebtedness. Calvary at Owensboro has made church and parsonage improvements with their own funds. Camp Taylor has paid off the debt on improvements. Clear Fork has made several improvements. Sale Avenue has purchased property behind the church for parking. Sylvania has liquidated the parsonage debt. Watterson Trail has built a needed Sunday School annex at a very reasonable price. West Frankfort has installed

a new furnace with air conditioning and made a parking lot. Calvary, Clear Fork, Holton, Hope, Roselawn, Sale Avenue, Stonewall and Watter-son Trail are consistently reducing building indebtedness. New Albany has just paid off their building indebtedness.

The beautiful Lebanon pioneer church has been constructed this year at a saving of \$10,000 or more. A parsonage was also purchased into which our pioneer family, the Tilley's, moved last October. The first services in the new church were in June of this year with good results. Urgent prayer is requested and sacrificial giving is solicited for this project.

Four new pastors have been engaged for churches in the conference besides three supplies. Rev. Amos Glendenning began his service at the Clear Fork Church on December 31, 1967. The Glasgow church has called Rev. John Hundley for the new year; the Highland Park Church, the Rev. Frank Webb; and Owensboro First, the Rev. Everett Wilson. Sylvania secured a splendid Nazarene pastor, the Rev. Fred Parsons, as supply, May 5. Rev. Clyde Sciscoe, a Nazarene Christian gentleman, continues to supply Whitehall. And Rev. Clinton Peek, a former Free Methodist, supplies West Frankfort Church.

Two separations took place this year. The former pastor of the White hall church and more than half the members withdrew immediately following conference last year and started an independent work. However, the Whitehall Wesleyan Church is making progress and adding new members and the indebtedness on the basement has been paid off. The group that formerly withdrew from the New Shiloh church informed me of their withdrawal from the Kentucky Conference on October 11, 1967.

Revivals have come to some churches, new members have been taken in, and the spiritual tide is rising. For this we long in every church. Fasting, tears, prevailing prayer, witnessing to the needy, Bible preaching, and holy urgency will bring results, as a few lead the way.

### President's Activities

This year the Conference President has been in most of the churches twice or more for business meetings and preaching services. He has preached 129 times; conducted 43 church business meetings; taught Sunday School 14 times; had 19 conference board meetings; attended four Marion College Board Meetings, and an area ministerial committee meeting, the united ministerial institute, the General Conference, and several revival services; edited the Messenger and cared for the secretarial work of the office.

September 8, appointed Clyde Sciscoe supply pastor at Whitehall.

September 12, appointed F. C. Collings supply pastor at Sylvania.

**REPORT OF CHURCH EXTENSION BOARD**

**August 14, 1967**

The Church Extension Board met and organized. H. Blaine West was elected secretary for the conference year 1967-68.

Motion carried to authorize Conference President and Conference Treasurer to pay all bills as they come due.

**August 19, 1967**

Motion carried to ask Gordon Tilley to go to Lebanon to organize and pastor the new Pioneer work.

Motion carried that the expenses of the board meetings be paid out of the Sunday School Pioneer Fund, including 7c per mile for travel.

**August 22, 1967**

Motion carried to approve Gordon Tilley's going to Lebanon to pastor pioneer work.

**September 16, 1967**

Motion carried permitting the Bicknel Church to rent the parsonage at 302 Liberty Street, Bicknel, Indiana and for the funds from the rent to be used by the pastor, provided great caution be used in renting to responsible parties.

Motion carried authorizing the Bloomington, Indiana Church to tear out the wood floor in the basement of the church, and to divide the space into Sunday School rooms, with a center hall, at a cost of approximately \$900.00, provided the rooms shall be arranged suitable for living quarters as may be needed later.

Motion carried with resolution to be signed, authorizing the purchase of a parsonage at 529 Spalding Avenue, Lebanon, Kentucky, as agreed on August 30, 1967 for the sum of \$14,000.00 with a down payment of \$3000.00 from the Pioneer Calendar Fund, and the balance of \$11,000.00 to be financed at the Marion County Building and Loan Association of Lebanon, Kentucky on their 15 year plan at \$99.00 per month.

Motion carried to pay Morrison Gilmore \$20.00 per week from Sunday School Pioneer Funds for room and board for Rev. Gordon Tilley for four weeks in September.

Motion carried to pay Gordon Tilley \$50.00 per week for the month of September from the Pioneer Calendar Funds, with provision for \$100.00 of this amount to be sent to Fay Gilmore as local treasurer, who shall pay Rev. Tilley \$50.00 per week from the funds, with provisions further that beyond September adjustment of funds shall be made as need requires.

Motion carried to make the monthly payments of \$99.00 for church parsonage to the Marion County Building and Loan Association of Lebanon, Kentucky from the Sunday School Pioneer Funds.

Motion carried to consolidate loan of Sales Avenue Wesleyan Methodist Church, amounting to approximately \$32,000.00 with Wesleyan Investment Foundation.

### October 30, 1967

Motion carried to authorize Loretto Lumber Company, by Leroy Thompson, assistant manager, to proceed with church building at Lebanon, according to details of signed contract and agreement.

Motion carried that a contract be signed jointly with Board of Education of Marion County, Kentucky and trustees of the Kentucky Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church for the use of the Lebanon Elementary Grade School Auditorium for one year plus two weeks use this fall for revival services.

Motion carried to sell lot on Main Street, joining Elementary School property for the sum of \$17,000.00 and hereby authorize Conference Trustees to sign deed for same, confirming note taken by mail.

### March 2, 1968

Motion carried to install two furnaces in the Lebanon Church instead of one. The one being for the upstairs and the other for the basement, thus enabling only one floor to be heated if so desired, and necessitating the use of smaller furnaces.

### March 9, 1968

Motion carried that we order pews from Rugel Manufacturing Company, Morristown, Tennessee for the sum of \$2435.49 to be used in the new church at Lebanon.

### Resolutions

Approved by resolution April 30, 1968 the Sale Avenue Church in Louisville purchasing three lots behind the church for parking at a cost of \$27,000, monthly payments of \$171.60 at 5% interest, note to be signed by the Sale Avenue Church without mortgage. (Renting of two houses on the lots brings in \$175 monthly).

May 1, 1968, approved by resolution the Watterson Trail Church borrowing of \$8000.00 for the same at 5 1/2% interest, a note for said amount building a Sunday School annex at an approximate cost of \$10,000.00 and the to be secured by the joint signature of the Watterson Trail Trustees and the Conference Trustees.

### Recommendations

#### I. Calendar System

1. A Pioneer Calendar shall be provided by the District Board of Administration for a Sunday in September, chosen as Pioneer Sunday, at which time pledges shall be taken in each church to be paid in 10 monthly payments.

2. A Pioneer secretary shall be appointed by each church, who in turn shall announce or have announced on the second Sunday of each month the pledge collection on the third Sunday, and shall collect and tabulate

opposite each pledge the monthly contributions, then having the church treasurer remit total collected each month to the District Treasurer.

3. Pioneer works, and/or new works, may be granted permission by the District Board of Administration to use their money locally as may be needed.

4. Previous to Pioneer Sunday there shall be a rally of the pastors in each zone presided over by the District Superintendent or another designated by the District Board of Administration, when goals for each church may be suggested.

5. Fields and Goals: (1) Money shall be saved for centers of population to be invested in property or to employ men of pioneer ability. (2) We urge a goal of \$10,000.00 this year toward reducing indebtedness.

### II. Revolving Fund

This fund shall be increased by gifts, and at the discretion of the District Board of Administration from regular pioneer funds not to exceed \$500.00 per year.

### III. United Effort

We suggest and urge co-operation of the District W.M.S. and the Youth Executive Committee with the District Board of Administration to help our pioneer works as may be needed.

### IV. Deeds and Legal Documents

1. The District Superintendent be custodian of deeds and district records to be kept in a safe.

2. The District Superintendent shall collect all deeds and records for filing, at the time of his visitation in Quarterly Conference.

3. The Board of Administration will recommend no authorization or the signatures on notes or mortgages for churches until there is a joint deed made to local and district trustees.

4. All Pioneer churches involved in indebtedness shall secure approval of the District Board of Administration

## COMMITTEE ON WAYS AND MEANS

### Item I. Budget

1. We recommend that the District pay General Budget assessments as follows. 6.7 percent of the total church income, less building fund, into the United Stewardship Fund, plus world missions on voluntary basis; and that the local church pay 12 per cent of the pastor's cash salary to the pension fund, and 12 per cent of an engaged Wesleyan evangelist's offering to the pension fund.

2. We recommend that each church pay District Budget as follows: 7 percent of the total church income, less building fund; and Pioneer Calendar pledges on voluntary basis; and that a Sunday be designated by the Board of Administration as Campground Sunday and that either the Pastor or District Superintendent shall take pledges for reduction of indebtedness on the sanitation system striving for a goal of \$5.00 per member.

### Item II. Pastor

1. Each pastor shall encourage the storehouse plan of tithing.
2. All pastors shall encourage membership in the Card Call Plan.
3. The Pastoral year shall end with the last Sunday of Camp and the church he is serving shall pay his salary until that time.
4. Each church shall provide their pastor suitable living quarters, all his utilities, fill their obligations by monthly donations and definitely arrange with the pastor the number of revivals he is allowed to conduct. The pastor shall receive two weeks vacation with pay exclusive of Conference and Camp Sunday.
5. Each pastor's moving bill shall be paid by the contracting church.

### Item III. District Superintendent

1. The District Superintendent shall be paid \$100.00 per week, one-

half of his Social Security, also Hospitalization Insurance, House rent, utilities, desk expense, secretarial help, and traveling expense at 8¢ per mile in connection with the District work, also two weeks vacation with pay, and the amount equal to 12 percent of his cash salary be paid to pension fund.

2. The District Superintendent shall meet with the Board of Stewards and encourage the church to provide adequate support for their pastors.

3. Each church shall hold monthly business meetings; one to be held by the District Superintendent, the others arranged by the pastor.

4. The District superintendent shall give as much time as possible to supervising the pioneer work and the smaller churches.

5. Upon incapacity of the Superintendent, he and his Advisory Board may authorize the Assistant Superintendent to assume certain duties, who, when so authorized, shall be recognized and received by the churches and ministry of the District in the same capacity as the Superintendent of the Conference. Any legitimate expense thus incurred by the Assistant Superintendent shall be cared for out of the Superintendent Fund.

### Item IV. Miscellaneous

1. The District Treasurer and District Secretary shall each receive an honorarium of \$100.00 annually.

2. All superannuated ministers and their wives of our District shall be entertained free during camp meeting.

3. We recommend that the board of Administration be empowered between sessions of the conference to make available for present use any surplus in any funds.

4. We recommend that the Kentucky District Ministerial Student Aid Fund at Marion College be placed under the District Board of Administration with recommendations from the donors.

5. We recommend that the minutes be sold for \$1.00 per copy.

6. We recommend for use by treasurers in the local church, mimeographed envelopes for reporting funds sent to the District Treasurer prepared by the District Treasurer at Work Fund Expense.

7. The assistant secretary shall work with the secretary during the session of the District Conference and receive an honorarium of \$10.00.

WESLEYAN YOUTH PRESIDENT'S REPORT

To the 46th Annual Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church and the 1st Kentucky District of the Wesleyan Church, greetings:

Working with Wesleyan Youth the past 21 years has been the highlight of my ministry. It has been a rewarding experience to see young people of the conference grow up in the youth work and now leaders in our denomination, district and churches, serving the Lord in His vineyard. We could give some disappointing experiences of young people who had the same opportunities and made their choice to choose the way of the world but the rewarding experiences outweigh the disappointments.

Wesleyan Youth has played a vital part in the work of the conference. A real investment has been made to the camp over the last 20 years with four new buildings; mainly the boys dormitory, the YM Building (a joint project with the WMS), the lunch stand and book store, and the class-room dormitory building. These buildings are debt free with a new project now in the planning stage.

The youth camp has been one of the main events over the years. We started with a week end convention 20 years ago and now we have a well balanced program for a full week with the purpose of a teaching ministry and evangelism. Many young people have found Christ for the first time during the youth camp and some have been called to full time Christian service. This has been the prime purpose of the youth camp and it has paid off well.

Our vision has been beyond our borders. We not only have contributed to our pioneer churches, but we have supported a missionary child for a number of years. This has caused us to have a greater interest in the work of the Lord in the region beyond.

### MORAL REFORM REPORT

1. Since our homes are the tributaries which feed the stream of our national and religious life, we call upon our ministers to challenge our entire church congregations to make our homes Christian.

2. Inasmuch as we are living in a world of unrest, of contention, and of strife, which is the result of the spirit of the anti-Christ, we ask our people to seek the peace of unity of the faith once delivered to the saints, to seek understanding in the midst of misunderstanding, to cover our brothers faults with the grace of charity and by fellowship with those who may be weaker in the faith.

3. We call our people to return to a reverence for the Lord's Day and stress the necessity of a faithfulness to all services conducted on that day. We urge our families to worship as a family unit and adopt the family pew and sit together. We intreat our people to abstain from social and secular interest and indulgences that take away the sacredness of the Lord's Day.

4. Believing in the integrity and devotion of our God appointed church leaders in all levels of administration, we urge our people to support them by their prayers and cooperation in furthering the work of the Lord through the channels of the Wesleyan Church. We feel that the Leaders should, in return, be sympathetic and have a common understanding toward the district's beliefs and standards — Hebrews 13:17.

5. That the pastor exhort his people to fulfill their responsibility as citizens in registering their vote in all areas including local, state, and national levels, and also encourage praying for our public official's. I Tim. 2:1-3.

6. In the midst of the racial tension we discourage our people from participating in or encouraging any pressure groups that produce un-Christian attitudes. We exhort our people to treat all races (Negro-Indian-Asiatic) with respect and dignity since God has made of one blood all people. Acts 17:26

7. We strongly oppose any fad which leads to effeminate behavior, which obliterates the line between the sexes, and which stimulates a tendency toward homosexuality in either sex.

**PRESIDENT'S REPORT**

To the members of the forty-sixth annual session of the W.M.S. of the Kentucky Conference, greetings in the Name of Jesus.

This session is unique in that it is our last one as the W.M.S. of the Wesleyan Methodist Church after serving the denomination sixty-five years and the Kentucky Conference forty-six years. But what vistas open before us as we enter the enlarged field of the W.M.S. of the Wesleyan Church, as of the merged conference June 25th thru July 1st, 1968. Instead of 16 mission fields around the world we now have 30 with approximately 200 missionaries instead of 100 for which to pray and give.

In the Wesleyan Church the W.M.S. is an auxiliary of it, as the W.Y. has been and is, instead of a separate organization but continuing supporting missions as formerly. Our Director of Wesleyan W.M.S., formerly General President of the W.M.S., shall be a member of the Council of Auxiliaries which in turn serves under the General Board.

The general officers of the Wesleyan Women's Missionary Society shall include the General Director of W.M.S., the area W.M.S. chairmen and the General Director of the Young Missionary Workers Band, who together shall constitute the general W.M.S. Executive Committee.

The local W.M.S. will function as formerly except for the election of officers. The local church board shall present two or more nominations for the local W.M.S. president, one of which will be elected by the local W.M.S. A Nominating Committee of three to five members elected by the local W.M.S. at one of its monthly meetings, presided over by the pastor shall nominate all other officers, committee members and delegates. Executive officers shall be elected by ballot, the other officers and committee members may be elected in any manner desired. Election shall be by majority vote of the active members of the W.M.S. present and voting. The election of all other than the local W.M.S. president must be ratified by the local church board before coming final.

The local W.M.S. Treasurer shall remit all dues and funds to the conference or district W.M.S. Treasurer who in turn remits to the conference or district treasurer. This year the local Y.M.W.B. Superintendent will remit all monies to the conference or district Y.M.W.B. Superintendent as formerly.

We feel you each join with us in thanking the Lord for the privilege of working with our sisters of the Wesleyan Church for the advancement of His Kingdom sharing the responsibilities and obligations of the merged W.M.S.

The payment of your Faith Pledges this current year enabled the Conference W.M.S. Treasurer to remit the extra \$1,540.00 to cover the recommended increase in the salaries of the missionaries we help sup-

port making total of \$8,740.00. Included is \$300.00 for Rev. Wayne Edwards.

Miss Florence Glass, missionary to Haiti, endeared herself to us as she toured the conference. The Ortlips will return to Haiti when Sister Ortlip has had time to recuperate from a second major operation since coming home on furlough. Margaret Wright will soon return to Nepal. They all appreciated our Christian sincerity and are depending upon our prayer support.

Miss Marie Evatt returned missionary to Sierra Leone will tour the conference from October 16th to November 17th. Rev. Franklin Heer returned missionary to Colombia, South America, will tour October 21st, to 27th.

This conference we will have the opportunity of hearing about a mission field new to us when Rev. and Mrs. Wm. Morgan tell us of their work in South Africa.

The time and place of the Wesleyan W.M.S. General Conference is not yet determined. Those delegates elected last year will serve when it does convene.

#### WESLEYAN YOUTH PRESIDENT'S REPORT

To the 36th annual Conference of the Wesleyan Youth of the Kentucky Conference and the 1st Kentucky District Wesleyan Youth, greetings:

Working with Wesleyan Youth the past 21 years has been the highlight of my ministry. It has been a rewarding experience to see young people of the conference grow up in the youth work and now leaders in our denomination, district and churches, serving the Lord in His vineyard. We started with a week end convention 20 years ago and now we have a well balanced program for a full week with the purpose of a teaching ministry and evangelism. Many young people have found Christ for the first time during the youth camp and some of them have been called to full time Christian service. This has been the prime purpose of the youth camp and it has paid off well.

Our vision has been beyond our borders. We not only have contributed to our pioneer churches but we have supported a missionary child for a number of years. This has caused us to have a greater interest in the work of the Lord in the region beyond.

You have noticed a youth column in the conference paper since its beginning. Some articles have been news items and others have been promotional but it has been one way for us to communicate with the conference each month. Many pieces of mail have gone from the youth office and we trust it has been helpful.

Statistical reports have been very discouraging at times. There is always a great turnover in youth leaders and membership. Some of our large churches do not have an organized Wesleyan Youth. This has caused a weak link in our conference organization. We hope to see a greater united effort in this area.

Now, with this report, I close my tenure as President of Wesleyan Youth in the Kentucky Conference. I wish to express thanks to you for your support and cooperation. You have been patient with me these 21 years.

As we face the future, may we do it with courage and faith. Let us

#### WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE

This committee shall nominate the chairman and members as standing committees of the (1) Ways and Means, (2) Resolutions, (3) Statistical, (4) Auditing.

f. A District-wide "Youth Leader's Retreat" shall be held as called by the W. Y. President for the purpose of promoting the District youth work. We urge the Pastors, Zone Chairmen, and all local youth officers to attend.

### II. Zone

a. The Zones shall be set up the same as the District Board of Administration specifies for the churches.

b. The Zone shall have at least four rallies during the year, and endeavor to use the young people in a variety of programs rather than always securing an outsider speaker.

### III. Local

a. The local treasurer's books shall close June 30.

### IV. Finances

a. Each local raise the amount of one dollar (\$1.00) per active member for the District Expense Fund and one dollar (\$1.00) per active member for the Youth Camp Fund.

b. The Executive Committee shall have the power to appropriate the youth money for the promotion of the General and District work.

c. Each Zone in their rallies shall raise the following amount for our missionary project:
