# Standing Rules

#### 1. Visiting Ministers:

All visiting ministers of our denomination and those of other denominations who hold the Bible to be the very Word of God and the final authority in faith and practice are invited to honorary seats in this conference.

#### 2. Date of Conference:

The annual sessions of the conference shall convene on the Chambers Campground at 7:30 p.m., the last Monday of June, except that quadrennially it shall convene the second Monday after the General Conference convenes. The forenoon meetings shall convene at 8:30 and adjourn at 10:45. The afternoon meetings shall convene at 1:30 and adjourn by vote. The seven rows of seats in the front of the tabernacle, and the platform, shall comprise the bar of the conference.

#### 3. Examinations:

Examinations shall be in the hands of the Committee on Itineracy and Orders not later than two weeks before the opening of the conference session.

#### 4. Loans:

Any and all conference loans shall be subject to the approval of the Conference Board of Trustees.

#### 5. Procedure:

The daily order of business shall be: 1. Hymn, 2. Roll Call, 3. Devotions, 4. Reading of Minutes, 5. Appointment of Committees, 6. Report of Committees. 7. Miscellaneous Business, 8. Passage of Characters.

The roll call and the reading of the Minutes shall be heard only at the first session of each day.

### 6. Taking of Pastoral Vote:

- (a) To obtain uniformity, it is recommended that the Pastoral Vote be taken on any day during he third full week in April, or during the following week if Easter falls during the third week. The Pastoral Vote shall be taken on prepared official ballots for this purpose.
- (b) A pastor is eligible for a two year call if he has been a resident pastor continuously since the previous September 1.

#### 7. Pay for Officials:

The Secretary and the Treasurer of the conference shall receive \$75.00 each annually.

#### 8. Statistician:

The conference shall elect a statistician whose term of office shall expire at the close of the next session of the Annual Conference. He shall be the chairman of the Statistical Committee.

### 9. Closing of Records:

The Conference Treasurer shall close her books on June 3 and all receipts thereafter shall be included in the report for the following year. The Treasurer then shall fill in Item IX on the statistical report blanks, affix his signature and return one to the pastor who sent it. The other statistical report shall be forwarded to the Statistician by June 17.

### 10. Reporting of Statistics:

We authorize the use of the abbreviated report blanks.

### 11. Reports:

The report of the Woman's Missionary Society and the report of the Wesleyan Youth shall be printed in the conference minutes.

#### 12 Ex-Officio Members:

- (a) The President of the conference and the President of Wesleyan Youth shall be ex-officio members of the Camp Meeting Committee.
- (b) The President of the conference shall be ex-officio chairman and the President of the Woman's Missionary Society shall be an ex-officio member of the Missionary Board.
- (c) The conference President shall be ex-officio chairman and the Secretary of the conference shall be ex-officio member of the Nominating Committee.
- (d) The conference President shall be ex-officio chairman and the Secretary of Evangelism shall be member ex-officio of the Committee of Evangelism.

# 13. Sale of Properties:

All money coming to the conference from the sale of church and parsonage property shall become a part of the Conference Missions Fund.

# 14. Committee on Location:

The Board of Trustees shall choose three of their own number to constitute a Committee on Building Location. They shall study all proposed building projects and report their findings to the Board of Trustees. The names of the committee shall be printed in the minutes.

### 15. Editing of Minutes:

The Secretary of the conference is authorized to edit the minutes.

### 16. Election of Camp Meeting Chairman:

At the time of the election of conference officers the conference shall elect by ballot from among the elders the chairman of the Camp Meeting Committee.

#### 17. Election of Conference Officers:

All conference officers shall be elected by ballot or after nominations by the Nominating Committee or from the floor. (See list of officers.)

# 18. Conference Policy:

- (a) Each church shall grant its pastor at least two weeks vacation each year, with pay, and the church shall furnish the supply. The pastor's vacation must be taken sometime between the rise of the conference and the convening of the next conference unless a satisfactory arrangement is made otherwise with the church.
- (b) Each church shall grant its pastor the privilege of a two week revival meeting away from his pulpit each year, and the pastor shall pay his supply.
- (c) It is understood that the pastor shall have one day each week for rest and recreation.

  Accumulation of days shall not exceed three days.
- (d) Each church shall furnish an adequate heating system (preferably a central heating system); and a kitchen range for the parsonage as soon as possible.
- (e) Each church shall furnish shades or venetian blinds, draw-drapes, curtain rods and fixtures for the parsonage.
- (f) The church shall release the pastor for attendance at Conference and Camp including both Sundays and shall furnish the supply.
- (g) Each church shall encourage and plan for the pastor to attend all Conference gatherings (Ministerial Fellowships, District meetings, work bees, etc.). This is an important part of the Conference work.
- (h) The church shall encourage the pastor to attend the Annual Ministerial Refresher Course at Houghton each year and shall make this possible by providing for the expense for the same or as much of that expense as possible.
- (i) When a church anticipates changing pastors and invites a minister to candidate it shall provide the expense for such a trip.
- (j) When a church changes pastors it shall pay the moving expense of the incoming pastor.
- (k) A pastor who is leaving a church will continue through conference and camp Sundays from which church or charge he will receive his salary until the end of such time. The above will not pertain to a pastor leaving the conference unless he completes the major part of above mentioned time.

- (I) A pastor failing to make required conference reports shall state his reason to the Pastoral Relations Committee before he is given a conference appointment.
- (m) Each church shall formulate a policy for the remuneration or guest speakers.
- (n) The pastor is an ex officio member of all committees unless it contravenes Discipline, and it is understood that the pastor will extend to the Pulpit Supply Committee, the courtesy of meeting without his being present; furthermore, he will not meet with this committee in the selecting of a pastor unless requested.

### 19. Apportionment of Budget:

- (a) The Budget Apportionment Committee shall apportion budget to all members-in-full, regardless of age.
- (b) The Onondaga Reservation charge shall be assigned only the denominational budget.
- (c) A newly organized church shall be exempt from Conference budget the first year following its organization and only one-half the conference budget assigned the second conference year following its organization, after which it may be assigned all items of budget in full as usual.
- (d) The local church is urged to adopt a policy for paying General and Conference budgets quarterly.

### 20. Course of Study:

Persons recommended to study or to travel under the direction of the conference shall appear personally before the Committee on Itineracy and Orders before they are accepted and annually thereafter or communicate with the committee so long as they are continued. If they fail to do this for two successive years, they shall be returned to their quarterly conference.

### 21. Ministerial Institute:

The President of the conference shall be ex-officio chairman of the committee to plan the Ministerial Institute. The three district chairmen shall complete the committee. This committee shall arrange for the Institute following the next annual session of the conference.

# 22. Delegates' Credentials:

It shall be the duty of the pastor not later than one week before the next annual session of the conference to forward to the Secretary of the conference, who is a Committee on credentials, the credentials of the delegate(s) and the alternate delegate(s) from his charge.

# 23. Audits:

The books of the Treasurer of the conference and of other custodians of conference funds shall be audited by an accountant or recognized bookkeeper approved by the President and his Advisory Board. This shall be done prior to the convening of the annual session of the Conference, and a certified copy shall be furnished the President.

### 24. Conference Missions:

- (a) In the interim between conference sessions the Missionary Board is authorized to interpret what shall be considered conference missions. In the event of the purchase of property, the Missionary Board may make recommendations to the Board of Trustees.
- (b) The third Sunday of the second month of each quarter is recommended as the time for taking the Sunday school offering for conference missions.

# 25. Bible Study Quarter:

Each church is expected to conduct a systematic Bible study for at least one quarter during the conference year. The material to be selected by the pastor and local church from approved material.

# 26. Committee on Orders of the Day:

The President and his Advisory Board shall constitute a committee on Orders of the Day.

They shall plan the daily schedule of the conference and shall prepare a printed agenda. The following shall be the order of the evening services: Tuesday, a Sunday school rally; Wednesday, conference missions; Thursday, a public missionary service; Friday, the ordination service.

### 27. Church Membership Classes:

Each church is requested to present annually a series of studies in church membership to be known as "Preparation for Church Membership." All prospective new members are to be requested to attend these classes. Classes are to be open also to persons interested in learning more concerning membership.

### 28. Financial Appeals:

- (a) The conference shall promote the offering for the Houghton Academy on Academy Sunday which is the second Sunday in September. Twenty-five per cent of this offering is to be designated for scholarships for Wesleyan missionaries' children.
- (b) The Lenten season and Easter offering is hereby established as a time for a special offering for the local church.
- (c) Any financial appeals to be made in the local churches by non-Wesleyan persons or groups shall require the approval of the Conference President and his Advisory Board. This does not apply to representatives of the Gideons and of the American Bible Society.

### 29. Conference Board of Managers:

The Conference Board of Trustees are the Board of Managers of the Conference during the interim of conference. (See <u>Discipline</u> par. 245.)

### 30. Vouchers

The Vouchers of the auxiliary conference treasurers, e.g., Woman's Missionary Society and Wesleyan Youth, are to be sent directly to the Conference Treasurer at least once a quarter and that the second copy be returned to the local treasurer of that organization.

### 31. Ordination Service

Ordination services will be held in a Wesleyan church of the Ordinand's choice. The Conference President and other officials will be in charge. All elders are urged to be present and to participate.

### DAILY PROCEEDINGS

# FIRST DAY - MONDAY EVENING

The Rochester Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America convened at the call of the Conference President, the Rev. David A. Rees, for the 122nd annual session at 7:30 P.M., Monday, June 27, 1966. The roll was not called. The service was opened with the singing of hymns and prayer. The Rev. Dr. Virgil Mitchell, denominational representative, brought the message challenging elders and laymen to consistent witnessing. Members of the conference met around the altar for a closing prayer.

# SECOND DAY - TUESDAY MORNING

The Conference was called to order by the President, the Rev. David A. Rees. The Rev. Bradley Wood led the conference in singing "A Wonderful Saviour." The Rev. Thomas Boghosian led the devotions using Proverbs 14:7.

The roll was called with  $3^{l_1}$  elders and conference preachers and  $3^{l_1}$  lay delegates responding. The Chair declared the delegates seated. Mrs. Fred Crawford was seated as delegate in place of Mrs. Marion McCarty of the Elkland Charge.

The agenda of the Annual session was read and adopted subject to necessary changes. (See Report No. 1). The motion was amended to allow for a fifteen minute address from T. E. Koshy, who works with International Students at Syracuse University.

A motion prevailed that we adopt the report of the Nominating Committee (See Report No. 2).

Orders of the Day - The Rev. William Woughter, Sunday School Secretary, gave his report. The financial report was referred to the Auditing Committee. (See Report No. 3). It was moved that the Award Standard of 1965 be adopted. An amendment was made to change Item 4 by striking out "any four Sundays of the year" to read "any two Sundays of the year." The amendment carried.

The main motion concerning the Award Standard was referred to the Sunday School Secretary and Board.

The Financial Report of the Camp Treasurer, The Rev. Gerald Wright, Sr., was read and referred to the Auditing Committee. (See Report No. 4).

The Financial Report of the Treasurer of Children's Camp was given and then referred to the Auditing Committee. (See Report No.

The Courtesy Committee reported. Dr. Virgil Mitchell, our General Superintendent; Dr. Robert Luckey, Houghton College Representative; and The Rev. Roy Straub, the Avon pastor were introduced and brought words of greeting.

Mr. T. E. Koshy, an international student in journalism at Syracuse University, was introduced. He addressed the conference concerning the work of International Students in world evangelism using as his text Isaiah 43:14.

Mrs. Marjorie Hawks, conference representative on "Truth For Youth," reported on the work of that organization as it works with the public schools. It was moved that this report be accepted.

We adjourned by motion.

# SECOND DAY - TUESDAY AFTERNOON

The Rev. Roger C. Rounds conducted the devotions using as his text "Bless the Lord, O my soul."

Dr. Virgil Mitchell, General Superintendent, called the conference to order. The Courtesy Committee reported. The Rev. & Mrs. Elwyn Patrick were introduced.

The Rev. Roger Bohall, representing "Truth For Youth" was introduced. He in turn introduced Mr. Carl Moore who spoke concerning alcoholism among the public school youth and what "Truth For Youth" is doing to educate youth against the use of alcohol.

# Orders of the Day - Educational Hour

The Rev. Wesley B. Nussey introduced Dr. Robert Luckey, Vice-President in Development, Houghton College. He first brought a greeting from The Rev. Philip Birchall, Principal of Houghton Academy, who could not be present. The Academy graduated thirty students this year. Planned Academy expansions were also reported.

Dr. Luckey shared some statistics with us that related to the forty students from the Rochester Conference who attended Houghton this last school year. His report was followed by a question and answer period. He concluded the hour with slides on "delayed giving" or giving through including the college in one's will.

We recessed for fifteen minutes by common consent.

The Conference reconvened to hear the reports of delegates to the recent General Conference. The following reported: Rev. Gerald Wright, Sr., who gave some general impressions; The Rev. James E. Bence who reported on the vote to merge with the Reformed Baptist Alliance of Maine and the Canadian Maritime Provinces; Mr. Richard Beach who reported on the vote to merge with the Pilgrim Holiness Church; and Mr. Harold Woodard, on the new Pension Plan.

The Rev. Gerald Jack, Houghton Area Wesleyan Youth President, reported on the General Conference Wesleyan Youth actions.

General Superintendent Mitchell gave the conference a careful explanation of the disciplinary action of the General Church taken against the Alleghany Conference and the Tennessee Conference.

A partial report by the Committee on Religious Services was read and adopted. (See Report No. 6).

# THIRD DAY - WEDNESDAY MORNING

The Conference President called the conference session to order. Bradley Wood led in singing "Praise Him."

The roll was called. Captain Richard Sprowl spoke concerning his work as a chaplain in the United States Air Force. He then read a scripture lesson from Luke 16:8 from which he raised questions suggesting some answers and asking us to supply further answers.

Orders of the Day - The Vice-President, The Rev. James E. Bence took the chair. President David A. Rees read his annual report and Official Acts which were adopted by two separate motions. His financial report was read and referred to the Auditing Committee. (See Report No. 7).

The Rev. James E. Bence, trustee secretary, gave the report of the Board of Trustees. The report was adopted by vote after corrections were made.

The Committee on Examination of character gave a partial report. Crook, Roy R. Straub, I. Leslie Conley, Wesley B. Nussey, Wayne Wager, James Bence, Edward Mein, Thomas Boghosian, Paul Larson, Harold Little, Charles Wheeler, Jack Lints, Edward Crandall, Adelbert Edwards, Gerald Jack.

The Wesleyan Youth President gave his report which was approved. A rising vote of thanks was given to Rev. Gerald Wright, Jr., retiring W. Y. President.

The Rev. Thomas Boghosian gave a report of his work as chaplain at Syracuse University. His financial report was read and referred to the Auditing Committee. (See Report No. 19).

We adjourned by limitation of time.

# THIRD DAY - WEDNESDAY AFTERNOON

General Superintendent, Virgil Mitchell, called the conference session to order. Devotions included the singing of a hymn, the reading of scripture and a prayer concluding with a meditation. The Rev. Leon Jelliff was in charge.

Orders of the Day - Report of the Director of Child Evangelism was made. The Rev. Edward Crandall spoke on the work of Children's Camp

at Chambers. He reported that last summer 85 workers assisted in the program; 236 children registered of whom 150 made a spiritual decision. He spoke also concerning the work of C.Y.C. The report was adopted by vote.

The Rev. Carroll Brentlinger, Secretary of the Policy Committee read the report of the Committee. (See Report No. 8). The report was acted on item by item. Item No. 1 was adopted. Item No. 2 was adopted. Item No. 3 was adopted. Item No. 4 was adopted. Item No. 5 was adopted. Item No. 6 was adopted. Item No. 7 was adopted. Item No. 8 was adopted. Item No. 9 was adopted. Item No. 10, 11, 12 were adopted with the following insertion: "A promise was read from the Rev. A. E. Liddick and the Commission on Missions that the amount of \$75.00 per month will be sent towards support of Onondaga Indian Reservation workers." Item No. 13 was adopted.

We recessed for ten minutes by common consent.

Suggestions for implementing the Ministers' Retirement Program, as prepared by The Rev. Orval Butcher at the 1966 General Conference, was read for conference information.

Item No. 14 was referred to the Finance Committee and the Ministers' Retirement Program was referred to the Finance Committee.

Item No. 15 was adopted. It was voted that No.'s 4, 5, 9, and 13 be entered as Standing Rules and the Secretary be permitted to enter them in appropriate places.

The Seminary Scholarship Committee report was read and adopted. (See Report No. 9).

The Rev. Norman Handy read the Financial Report for the Mutual Aid Plan which was referred to the Auditing Committee. (See Report No. 10).

The Sunday School Board reported recommending a change in the Award Standard, item No. 4 to read, "average attendance shall be an average of the Sunday School attendance divided by the number of actual sessions held." This was to take the place of the first sentence of Item No. 4.

It was moved and seconded that a fifth item be added to the Award Standard which would read, "that the average attendance reported for Silver Cup Standard included only the regular Sunday School session."

The conference body was also urged to encourage Extension Sunday School work and recommended that the average attendance in extension works other than organized sessions be added to the number in Home Department.

This was discussed and referred to the Sunday School Board. We adjourned by vote.

# FOURTH DAY - THURSDAY MORNING

Conference session was called to order by the Conference President. The roll was called. The Rev. Elwyn Patrick conducted

devotions.

The Committee on Courtesy reported. They introduced The Rev. and Mrs. Paul Dekker, missionaries to Sierra Leone, West Africa. They gave their testimonies.

The time for Orders of the Day was changed by vote to permit the reading of the Treasurer's Report. Mrs. Charlotte Lamos, conference treasurer, read her report which was received and referred to the Auditing Committee by vote. (See Report No. 11).

Mrs. Lamos reported on the Conference Missions Fund. This was adopted and referred to the Auditing Committee. (See Report No. 12).

General Superintendent Mitchell was invited to preside during election of Conference President and Vice-President.

The Committee on Character made a partial report. The following characters were approved: Wallace Taylor, Lowell Watkins, Dale Cowan, David A. Rees, Bond Harlan, Roger C. Rounds, Grace Russell, William Woughter, George Merz, Leon Jelliff, C. B. Newbury, Enos H. Cann.

The following officers were elected:

A motion was made to receive the report made by the Conference Board of Trustees. (See Report No. 15).

Brother Ward Hall, pastor elect of the Buena Vista Church, was introduced to the Conference President who in turn presented him to the Conference.

Brother Hall was voted an honorary position within the bar of the conference.

The Courtesy committee reported. Captain and Mrs. Richard Sprowl were introduced to the conference and gave their testimonies.

Elwyn Patrick was voted an honorary seat within the bar of the conference.

It was moved and seconded that the Secretary be instructed to cast a ballot for all nominations except Sunday School Board, Promotional Secretary of Wesleyan Men and Missionary Promotional Secretary. The Chair ruled the motion out of order.

We adjourned by limitation of time. Prayer was made by The Rev. George Kilpatrick.

# FOURTH DAY - THURSDAY AFTERNOON

Bradley Wood led in the singing of "He Brought Me Out," after which General Superintendent Virgil Mitchell called the conference to order. The Rev. Roy Straub led in devotions.

The Report of tellers for committee elections was read by the secretary. (See Conference Boards).

The Promotional Secretary of Wesleyan Men nominations were lost in the first ballotting. Charles Kaine was elected from the floor.

The Conference Book Store report was given by Mrs. Charlotte Lamos. It was referred to the Auditing Committee. (See Report No. 14).

The Report of the Conference Promotional Secretary was made by the Rev. Carroll Brentlinger. It was adopted by vote. He then gave the Conference Promotional Treasurer's Report. It was referred to the Auditing Committee. (See Report No. 13).

The final Report on Religious Services was given and adopted. (See Report No. 6).

The Sunday School Board reported item 5-B which was adopted by motion. (See Report No. 3).

Orders of the Day - Dr. Virgil Mitchell, General Superintendent, spoke during the afternoon session. Brother Mitchell reported on what had been taking place and also future visions in outreach of the church. A comparison was made between the Jerusalem Council, as recorded in Acts 15, with the recent 1966 General Conference.

We recessed for ten minutes by common consent.

We reconvened to hear the reading of the Preamble to the Document on Merger and the Legal Resolution.

The Rev. I. Leslie Conley made a motion that the Legal Resolution be adopted. It was seconded by The Rev. William Woughter. The motion prevailed.

The alternate delegate of the Taylor church, Lloyd May, was seated in the place of the delegate, C. C. Watson, who could not be present.

It was moved and seconded that the Secretary write to the Alleghany Conference stating that the Rochester Conference hopes and prays that all things can be righted and that we might further serve God in continued unity of purpose and love. The motion was unanimously carried.

It was voted that every church in the conference complete the vote on merger by October 15, 1966.

The vote on merger of The Wesleyan Methodist Church and The Pilgrim Holiness Church was as follows:

81 votes cast

77 voted "YES" (in favor of merger)

4 voted "NO" (against merger)

The motion prevailed that the motion relating to our communication with the Alleghany Conference be referred to a committee

for the purpose of writing the letter and that the letter be brought back for conference approval. Elected to the committee were: David A. Rees, George Kilpatrick, Wesley B. Nussey.

The letter to the Alleghany Conference was submitted and approved as follows: "We, the members of the 122nd annual session of the Rochester Conference meeting at Chambers, New York, wish to convey to our brethren of the Alleghany Conference that it is our sincere prayer that the difficulties which perplex us at this time may be resolved in such a manner that our organic unity may be preserved and that we may continue to serve Christ and His church in unity of purpose and love."

We adjourned with prayer.

# FIFTH DAY - FRIDAY MORNING

The Vice-President, James E. Bence, called the conference to order. The Rev. Bernard Roof led in the singing of "Blessed Assurance." The roll was called. Devotions were conducted by The Rev. Stanley Lawrence. The minutes were read, corrected, and approved.

Orders of the Day - Mrs. Gladys Newbury gave the Woman's Missionary Society President's report. A rising vote of thanks was given Mrs. Newbury.

The Report of the Financial Committee was made and adopted. (See Report No. 16).

The Report of the Committee on Itineracy and Orders was given and adopted. (See Report No. 17).

The Statistical Report was given and adopted with appreciation. (See Report No. 18).

The Sunday School Board nominated The Rev. Edward Crandall as Director of Child Evangelism. It was approved.

The Conference Secretary nominated The Rev. Wesley B. Nussey as Assistant Secretary. The nomination was adopted by vote.

The Conference President nominated The Rev. James E. Bence and Mr. Tarbell Lamos as members of the President's Advisory Board. The nomination was confirmed.

It was viewed that "each local Church in the Rochester Conference take a vote by October 15, 1966, as to whether or not they favor the study of relocation for camp to lakeside and that the actual vote be forwarded to the Conference Secretary.

We adjourned by limitation of time.

# FIFTH DAY - FRIDAY AFTERNOON

The afternoon session was called to order by General Superintendent, Virgil Mitchell. Bradley Wood led in singing "Love Divine."

The Rev. Jack Lints led in devotions.

The motion brought before the conference in the morning session stating that "each local church in the Rochester Conference take a vote by October 15th as to whether or not they favor the study of the relocation for camp to a lakeside and that the actual vote be forwarded to the Conference Secretary" was reopened.

An amendment was moved that the camp meeting committee prepare a questionnaire to be sent to the churches this summer concerning camp relocation.

The amendment was lost by vote. The main motion was then voted upon and lost.

The following was moved: That Standing Rule No. 2 "Date of Conference," be changed to read: "The annual sessions of the conference shall convene on the Chambers Camp Grounds at 2:00 P.M. the last Tuesday of June, except that quadrennially it shall convene the second Tuesday after General Conference convenes. The fornoon meetings shall convene at 8:30 A.M. and adjourn at 10:45 A. M. The afternoon meetings shall convene at 1:30 P.M. and adjourn by vote. Rees, Ronald Madden, Lloyd Mack, Russell Bremer, James Frase, Richard Brown, Stanley Wright, David Konz. No communication was received from Harold Chapman, Claude Reis, Bertrand Rudd, Carrie Warburton.

A motion was carried that any unfinished business be placed in the hands of the Conference President and his Advisory Board.

The Auditing Committee Report was read and adopted with all the financial reports which were included in the report. (See Report No. 20).

A rising vote of thanks was extended to The Rev. Wallace Taylor, The Rev. James Frase and others who worked so diligently in the kitchen preparing the meals.

A motion was made and seconded that our conference appoint The Rev. Lloyd Mack as representative to foreign students with the privilege to present this work as the churches would ask. The motion was lost by vote.

A motion was made and seconded that the matter of International Students Relations be referred to the Pastoral Relations Committee and be brought back to this conference. It was lost by vote.

A motion was made and carried to adjourn sine die.

### REPORT NO. 3

# REPORT OF THE SUNDAY SCHOOL SECRETARY

During the past year your Sunday School secretary mailed out approximately 300 cards and letters, spoke at two Sunday School worker's banquets, kept accurate records and reported all Sunday School figures, represented you at all conference related committee

meetings and attended the Philadelphia Area Sunday School convention with the Cup-winning delegates.

I was thrilled and surprised by the frequent use of the filmstrip library by the Sunday schools. These filmstrips have been a very active part of our department's work this year.

Eighteen schools made gains of 1% or more this year. Camden, though not having had a complete year to base reports on, has had a very good growth and has added to the total picture of gain.

10% Ribbons of merit are awarded to the following schools; Haskinsville 11%, Grace Lee (Chambers) 17%, Waterloo 12%; Millview almost made it with 9% gain.

The conference trophies are awarded as follows; Larger schools Spencerport with 12% gain, 59-99 class - Riverside with 24%, and in the smaller schools, Penfield with a whopping 58% gain.

It is a real thrill to see Chambers with a 17% growth and Waterloo with 12% and to realize that Canandaigua has had a good solid growth for the second year in a row. If I were a prophet, I would prophesy that Sandy Creek will be coming on strong this next year.

Total gain for the conference is 11, but this is in spite of a loss of 77 during the bad third-quarter winter.

### THE AWARD STANDARD

The Sunday School Board recommends the following awards and standard for the coming year:

- 1. Each school in the conference achieving a 10% gain in average attendance for the year will receive a Ribbon Of Merit.
- 2. Schools competing for the trophies shall be divided into three groups: up through 59, 60 through 99, 100 and up. The grouping of schools will be established according to the average attendance for the last conference year. A trophy will be awarded to the one in each group achieving the greatest percentage gain.
- 3. The pastor, or key layman, of each trophy-winning school may travel without charge in one car at the expense of the conference Sunday School fund to the National Sunday School convention or a comparable one selected by the Sunday School Board. In addition, each winner who takes advantage of this will be given \$10.00 from the same fund for other convention expenses.
- 4. The average attendance shall be an average of total Sunday School attendance divided by the number of actual sessions held. To be counted present, scholars must be in attendance at least half of the Sunday School session. Persons known to be in attendance at any Sunday service of any conference connected services such as Chambers camp, youth retreat, or Houghton Youth rally, may be considered present at their local Sunday School for that Sunday or Sundays.
- 5. \*Extension Sunday School defined:
  "That the average attendance reported for Silver Cup Standard

include only the regular Sunday School sessions."

\* An Extension Sunday School should be a school which is set up for regular weekly classes for all ages and open to the public.

The staff should be elected by the church and the curriculum used should be that which is taught in the main school.

Teaching done to specialized groups such as: nursing homes, prisons, and all people under confinement, should be considered as a department (logically, the Home Department) not as a school.

In order to avoid confusion and repeated waste of conference time, we recommend that attendance figures of extension schools be reported separately, and that the extension school be considered a school in its own right and able to compete in its own category after its first full year.

# REPORT NO. 7

### REPORT OF THE CONFERENCE PRESIDENT

To the members of the Rochester Conference assembled on Chambers Campground for its one hundred and twenty-second Annual Session:

Cordial Christian greetings. Again, in the providence of God, we are permitted to meet for this Annual Session of the Rochester Conference. In the midst of a world torn by strife, frustration, wickedness, and uncertainty, how wonderful to know the peace of God and how great to be associated with His cause and program of promoting the Gospel of peace.

The thirty-second General Conference, which was a specially called session, (at close of three years instead of four) is now

history, and in reality, this General Conference made history especially in the unanimous vote favoring merger with the Alliance Reformed Baptist Church and an excellent vote - almost 80% - favoring merger with the Pilgrim Holiness Church. We will be voting during this conference session on merger with the Pilgrim Holiness Church following which the matter will be handed to the local churches for their consideration. Also, this General Conference approved an all-inclusive Pension Plan associated with the Equitable Life Assurance Society of the United States. In addition, several important changes were made in the <u>Discipline</u> which will strengthen our government structure and make for greater progress in the Lord's work. We were impressed with the consciousness of the presence of the Lord throughout and believe that real strides forward were made.

We believe this has been a good year of progress in all phases of the work in the Conference. The fine progress being made in our new churches is indeed encouraging. Plans have been approved for the superstructure of the church at Kirkville and for the first educational unit at Penfield; these plans evidence real growth and progress in both places. Pulaski has completed their fine new parsonage, and much progress has been made at our newest work, Camden, by way of plant improvement, numerical, financial and spiritual growth. The new parsonage at Haskinsville has been completed; Avon, having sold their old property on 70 West Main Street, is in the process of purchasing a new parsonage; the Corning church remodelled their auditorium including a new ceiling and now have a beautiful sanctuary. Several other churches in the Conference have made noticable stride forward with much accomplished.

Following the rise of Conference last year, we worked with both the Avon and Buena Vista churches in an effort to secure a pastor. Finally, in early fall, Rev. and Mrs. Wendell Shephard from the Reformed Baptist were secured for the Buena Vista church; and Rev. and Mrs. Roy R. Straub were secured for the Avon church. However, Brother Shephard is leaving the pastorate at Buena Vista after only one year or even less because of the illness of Mrs. Shephard. Brother and Sister Ronald Madden, also from the Reformed Baptist, accepted the pastorate at Endicott, as reported last year, and are leaving after serving only one year. Brother Madden feels keenly the call to the Mission field and will be leaving soon for Africa with his family.

We have been very gratified with the fine response of three churches in the repayment of loans to the Conference: Baldwinsville, (with the much larger amount) which paid more than half and the remainder will be amortized over the next two years; Waterloo, and Horseheads. These churches and their pastors are to be commended, and this brings some real financial relief to the Conference. This will be reflected in the report of the Conference Treasurer, Mrs. Charlotte Lamos.

It has been a pleasure to participate in anniversary services, dedication and memorial services as well as some long week-end services. We have visited every church, with one exception and this due to unavoidable circumstances, and some more than once in the interest of promoting the work of both on a Conference and local level. Have spoken over sixty times, attended and participated in nearly twenty business meetings, met several times with the Conference Board of Trustees, the Book Shop Committee, Conference Advisory Board and other committees in the interest of the Conference work. We have mailed out several circular letters in addition to our regular correspondence; had more than thirty personal and business conferences; and have worked closely with Pulpit Supply Committees where changes were anticipated.

Throughout the year we have endeavored to keep in close touch with the pastors and churches through personal contacts and correspondence.

Once again we would like to express our thanks and appreciation to our Vice-President, Rev. James E. Bence, and to the Advisory Board for their cooperation and counsel - especially to Brother Bence who has aided in several business meetings and Committee work where there were conflicts or other unavoidable circumstances; to our Conference Treasurer, Mrs. Charlotte Lamos, for her very untiring and efficient work; to our Conference Board of Trustees, Conference Policy Committee and all Conference committees for their help and fine cooperation in planning and implementing these plans in the interest of the Conference work. We are again so grateful for the fine spirit of teamwork in our midst and it is this working together of committee, pastors, and laymen that makes real progress possible. Again we express thanks to our neighbors, the Larsons, for their cooperation in taking telephone calls and getting our mail while we were out of the city. To Mrs. Rees we are indebted for her help in the office in sharing responsibilities by way of work and through understanding and prayer. Above all, we are deeply thankful to God for His help especially in recent days - and for His guidance and blessings throughout the year.

That the pastor be ex-officio member of all committees (unless it contravenes <u>Discipline</u>) and it is understood that the pastor will extend to the Pulpit Supply Committee the courtesy of meeting without his being present; furthermore, he will not meet with this committee in the selecting of a pastor unless requested.
- 5. That a pastor may be eligible for a two year call if he has been a resident pastor continuously since the previous September 1st.

- 6. That the Sunday School Superintendent, Woman's Missionary Society President, and Wesleyan Youth President, be included as members of the local Policy Committee and other leaders as the local church may deem advisable.
- 7. That it should be emphasized that a member, ex-officio, is not an honorary member, but a full member by virtue of his office with all rights, privileges and responsibilities of the elected member (unless it contravenes the Discipline).
- 8. That all funds designated for the Indian Reservation (other than gifts) be channeled ultimately through the Conference Treasurer.
- 9. That the vouchers of the auxiliary conference treasurers, e.g., Woman's Missionary Society and Wesleyan Youth, be sent directly to the Conference Treasurer at least once a quarter and that the second copy be returned to the local treasurer of that organization.
- That we recommend the Memorial Committee send a strongly worded memorial to General Conference reminding them that the Onondaga Indian Reservation was started as a denomination project and that we want to know what support the denomination will give toward this.
- 11. That Dr. A. Liddick, Rev. R. Lytle, Dr. D. Rees, Mrs. B. Newbury, Rev. N. Phipps, Rev. G. Merz, Rev. G. Wright, Sr., and Rev. J. Bence meet at Chambers during the missionary convention in August to discuss the Onondaga Indian Reservation Support.
- 12. That we favor continuing with the denomination regarding the Onondaga Indian Reservation program providing the denomination continue its financial responsibility of approximately 50% or if this assistance is impossible we be given permission to set up a Houghton Area Indian Mission to work with the Onondaga Reservation

  (A promise from The Rev. A.E. Liddick and the Commission on Missions that the amount of \$75.00 per month will be sent towards support of Onondaga Indian Reservation workers.)
- 13. That the ordination service be moved to the local church or district with the conference officials involved and all the elders of the conference urged to participate.
- 14. That the conference budget be set at \$12.00 to meet the demands of conference growth.
- 15. That the Promotional Secretary of Conference Missions be a member of the Conference Policy Committee.

It should be noted that it was not ascertained as to whether or not the last four were lay or ministerial members.

#### REPORT OF THE FINANCE COMMITTEE

We refer the Conference Pastor's Financial report relative to Mutual Aid Assessments to the Policy Committee with the following suggested changes recommended:

- 1. The word "fees" in item 3 be changed to read "honorariums" with a footnote explaining what this includes.
  - 2. A footnote for item 4 stating what this includes.
- 3. The "Total Pastor's Receipts" be eliminated and one "Total Income" be recognized.

We recommend that the Woman's Missionary Society and the Wesleyan Youth be asked to pay for the printing of the number of pages in their portion of the Conference Minutes.

We recommend that where the pastor is a member of the Social Security Plan that the church give the pastor a bonus sufficient to cover his social security payment.

We recommend that for the conference year 1966-67 the expenditures for Conference Administrative work be as follows:

- A. The salary of the President shall be at the rate of \$90.00 per week.
- B. The Conference President shall be allowed Expense at the rate of seven cents per mile and miscellaneous expenses.
- C. The conference is to assume the expenses of the parsonage utilities of the President.
- D. We recommend the Conference Treasurer to be authorized to give the Conference President a bonus sufficient to cover his social security assessment plus the \$20 minimum for Mutual Aid.
- E. That the Conference President receive \$300 for secretarial work.
- F. We recommend appropriations of:
  - (1) \$100 to Mrs. A. J. Shea
  - (2) \$50 to Mrs. Exa Rathbun
  - (3) \$600 to Onondaga Reservation
  - (4) \$100 to Chaplain expenses at Syracuse University

In order to finance the above program we recommend that the following be adopted:

- 1. The Conference Budget shall be \$12 per member of which  $75\phi$  will go for the Chambers Camp expenses.
- 2. The Mutual Aid Budget shall be 60¢ per member.
- 3. When the Conference President shall hold revival meetings within the bounds of the Conference, \$50 per week shall apply on budget. Any balance above this amount shall be a love offering to the President.

The Budget Apportionment is assigned on a per capita basis and is divided at the rate of \$31.25 per full member of the church, and is divided as follows:

- 2. He shall be required to study and survey possible fields for new work and report annually to the Board of Church Extension and Evangelism. This board shall have the power to authorize further investigation and institute a definite plan of action.
- 3. The Conference President shall superintend the moreestablished churches and shall endeavor to visit them once a year, presenting the needs of the conference and church missionary work.
- 4. He shall enforce the provisions of the Discipline, and uphold the standards of the church.
- 5. He shall seek to coordinate the evangelizing efforts of the various churches of the conference by suggesting to pastors a suited arrangement of meetings, and by counseling with reference to evangelists.
- 6. His conference evangelistic dates shall be established by The President and his Advisory Board.
- 7. The Conference President is to be permitted to take two evangelistic meetings per year outside the bounds of the conference.
- $\delta$ . He shall be a member ex-officio of the Finance Committee.

We further recommend that all appropriations cleared by the Pastoral Relations committee be referred to the Finance Committee.

The president and secretary of Board of Trustees be authorized to send out pertinent information to pastors and that board minutes be read as has been the policy at annual conference.

We also recommend the following:

- 1. That the Conference President and Advisory Board along with Conference Trustees be authorized to dispose of the property at Groton, if this seems advisable.
- 2. That the Conference President, Advisory Board and Conference Trustees study the situation at Armenia Mountain concerning what is to be done with the property.
- 3. That the matter of working with Inter-National Students in Syracuse University be referred to the Annual Conference Board of Managers and the three Local Syracuse Pastors and the Willett Memorial Church.

They shall receive their board and room during Conference.

- 4. Members of the Executive Committee shall receive traveling expenses equal to that voted by the Conference for Conference Officials.
- 5. There shall be elected a Conference Statistician whose term of office shall not expire until the close of the Conference session following her election. She shall be the Chairman of the Statistical Committee and shall be authorized to choose members of the said committee.
