It was moved and carried that the Conference convene at 8:30 a. m. and 1:30 p. m. and adjourn on motion.

On motion adjourned for committee work. Benediction by Rev. Raymond Young.

#### WEDNESDAY MORNING.

Devotions led by Bro. W. L. Carkuff, who led in prayer and commented upon Heb. 12:5, "Whom the Lord loveth he chasteneth."

Calling of the roll and reading of the minutes.

Committee on Orders of the day make partial report, recommending Thursday at 2 p. m. for the election of permanent officers.

On motion adopted.

On motion the Conference adjourned for a thirty minutes' recess.

Conference again called to order by the President at 10:25 a.m.

Brother P. A. Miller, as chairman of the Committee on State of the Work, reports. Motion made and approvel that report be adopted.

The report was thoroughly discussed by several members of the Conference, especially the recommendation of putting workers in the field under the direction of the Conference.

Report adopted.

On motion the session adjourned. Benediction by Brother Millard.

#### WEDNESDAY AFTERNOON.

Devotions led by Brother C. A. Hill, who led in prayer and commented upon the first verse of the 90th Psalm.

Calling of the roll. Reading of the minutes. Approved after correction.

Committee on Credentials report the name of James Glover of the North Branch charge as delegate. On motion delegate seated.

Discussion regarding the statistical report blanks.

Motion made that a committee be elected to study the statistical blank and report as to the best method of reporting statistics, and that Brother C. H. Dow be chairman. On motion W. H. Carey, S. W. Bond and I. L. DeWitt added.

Committee on Credentials report the name of C. P. Hovey as delegate from the Miltonvale charge. Delegate seated.

Committee on Credentials further report recommending Brother

Oliver Wilson to travel under the directions of the Conference. On motion referred to the Committee on Itineracy and Orders.

Examination of character taken up. Following were called: O. W. Cooper, Porter Willis, E. H. Cook, S. F. Wilson. After being told that their characters were passed, the pastors read their statistical reports and made statement regarding their Christian experience.

Orders of the day called for. Preaching by Sister Elizabeth Feltar. Sister Feltar was followed with an exhortation from Sister Gertie Smith. The Lord graciously poured out his Spirit upon this service.

Examination of character resumed. Brother W. C. Elliott called. Reads his report and makes statement regarding his religious experience.

The committee elected to give some plan regarding the best method to follow in reporting statistics, recommend that unter Item VIII, under "Missions," that we itemize the different fields, Africa and India, and also under "Conference Work" that we state the various items, such as Conference Minutes, Delegate Fund, Kansas City Mission. On motion report adopted.

Motion made and approved that the Apportionment Committee make up a Budget of Conference Benevolences, grouping the several items of the Conferenc Work under one head. Carried.

On motion adjourned. Benediction by Brother Dow.

#### THURSDAY MORNING.

Devotions led by Brother George L. Gurtler, who read 1 Thes. 4, and offered prayer.

Roll call. Reading and approval of minutes.

Committee on Credentials report the name of Frank Carter of the Coffeyville charge as delegate. On motion delegate seated.

Rev. E. Teter introduced to the Conference and he spoke a few words of greeting.

On motion visiting brethren given an honorary seat in the Conference.

Rev. C. P. Carkuff of the Iowa Conference introduced. Brother Carkuff expressed his pleasure to again be with the brethren.

Examination of character resumed. Brother C. H. Dow called. Reads his report and gives his religious experience.

Motion made and approved that we dispense with the reading of the statistical report from the pastors. After discussing the question, the motion was voted upon and lost.

Examination of character resumed. The following Pastors and Evangelists were called: F. E. Shivers, J. A. Stansbury, I. C. Dunbar, L. S. Currie, George L. Gurtler, T. J. Pomeroy, A. B. Hotchkiss, P. A. Miller, W. L. Carkuff, William Millard, Evan W. Howard. Reports were read and statements made regarding the work and their personal experience.

On motion adjourned. Benediction by Brother Porter Willis.

#### THURSDAY AFTERNOON.

Opened by singing "Revive Us Again." Devotions led by Rev. C. P. Carkuff of the Iowa Conference, who read the 17th, 18th and 19th verses of the 119th Psalm and commented upon the same, and offered prayer.

Roll call. Reading and approval of the minutes.

Committee on Itineracy and Orders render partial report. On motion report adopted. See report.

Orders of the Day called for. Election of permanent officers.

#### President.

Ballot for President. Brother P. A. Miller having received a majority of all the votes cast on the first ballot was declared elected.

#### Vice-President.

Rev. F. C. Hill elected on the first ballot.

#### Secretary.

Motion made and approved that Assistant Secretary cast the ballot of the Conference for E. H. Cook as Secretary. This having been done he was declared elected.

#### Assistant Secretary.

On motion the secretary was instructed to cast the vote of the Conference for F. E. Shivers as Assistant Secretary.

#### Treasurer.

On approved motion the Secretary cast the vote of the Conference for I. L. DeWitt as Conference Treasurer.

# Assistant Treasurer.

On motion the Secretary was instructed to cast the vote of the Conference for W. H. Carey as Assistant Treasurer.

# Quarterly Conference Evangelists.

Motion made and approved that the President be one of the quarterly Conference Evangelists.

Brother A. B. Hotchkiss having received a majority of all the votes cast on the first ballot was declared elected as the second quarterly Conference Evangelists.

#### Board of Trustees.

Ballot for Board of Trustees. Fred C. Hill elected on first ballot. Charles H. Dow elected on first ballot as second member. Silas W. Bond elected on first ballot as the third member. William H. Smith elected on first ballot as fourth member and Samuel B. Burgan elected on the third ballot as the fifth and last member.

# COMMITTEES.

#### Itineracy and Orders.

On motion Rev. F. E. Shivers re-elected to succeed himself as a member of the Committee on Itineracy and Orders.

Motion made and approved that Brother Alfred Drake be the next member of this committee.

#### Judicial.

Cn motion Brother C. H. Dow elected as chairman of the Judicial committee. Rev. P. A. Miller, F. C. Hill and T. J. Pomeroy added.

#### Vacancy of President.

On motion Brother A. B. Hotchkiss made chairman. S. W. Bond, C. W. Cooper, Alex. Ballard and E. E. Palmer added.

#### Camp Ground

On motion, the President and his Advisory Board were elected as the Camp Ground committee. S. W. Bond and A. B. Hotchkiss added.

#### Advisory Board.

The President nominates as his Advisory Board, Rev. C. H. Dow and Alex. Ballard. On motion they were elected.

#### Institute.

Motion made and approved that instead of having as heretofore the ten days' institute, that any licentiate wishing to prepare upon any subject or take an examination may appear before any member of the Committee on Itineracy and Orders for the same, thus providing in a measure for the work done by the Institute. After discussing the question the motion carried.

#### Superannuate Board.

Rev. P. A. Miller, Chairman ex-officio. On motion the following were added: F. C. Hill, J. A. Stansbury, I. H. Crouch, Alex. Ballard.

#### Missionary Board.

P. A. Miller, Chairman ex-officio. On motion the following were added: A. B. Hotchkiss, James Stansbury, E. E. Jones, Kinsley Morgan. Motion made and approved that the Missionary Board be free to employ for Missionary work such Evangelists as may be available.

On motion the Conference instructed the Board of Trustees to only loan money on gilt edge real estate security.

Motion made that the Conference consider and vote upon the resolution passed by the last General Conference with regard to making the use of tobacco a test of membership and that the time that the vote shall be taken be referred to the committee on Orders of the Day.

Committee on Credentials make partial report, recommending that Eura D. Howard be appointed Matron of the Kansas City Mission. On motion request granted.

Committee on Orders of the Day report recommending that we give Friday morning from 10 to 11 to the Sunday School Work, Friday atternoon from 3 to 4 to Rev. E. Teter, and Friday evening at 8 to the Woman's Home and Foreign Missionary Society, and Saturday at 3 p. m. to Educational Interests. On motion adopted.

On motion adjourned. Benediction by Rev. E. Teter.

#### FRIDAY MORNING.

Devotional services were led by Rev. Rich Hiner, who read a portion of Scripture and led in prayer.

Roll call. Reading and approval of the minutes.

Committee on Orders of the Day recommend that we give the hour of 4 p. m. Friday to vote on the Tobacco amendment. On motion adopted.

Committee on Credentials report the name of Frank Duncan of the LeRoy charge as a delegate. On motion delegate seated.

Committee on Sabbath Schools render their report. On motion adopted. See report.

Examination of character taken up. The following were called: I. L. DeWitt, C. A. Hill, Elizabeth Feltar, F. C. Hill.

Statistical reports were read and some account of their work and Christian experience was given.

Assistant Secretary reads letters of Greeting to the Annual Conference from Brother L. Wing and B. F. Hester, a letter from Brother G. B. Howard was also read by the President.

Motion made and approved that the Secretary be requested to write a letter of greeting from the Conference to Brothers Howard and Wing, and that Brother Howard's letter be referred to the Superannuate Board.

On approved motion Sister Ruth Macy was added to the Committee on Moral Reform.

Orders of the Day called for. The discussion of Sunday School work in its various phases. Many helpful and inspiring messages were delivered that we trust will produce a greater love and zeal for the Sunday School work.

On motion adjourned. Benediction by Rev. I. C. Dunbar.

#### FRIDAY AFTERNOON.

Devotions led by Brother E. Clymer. Following prayer, a portion of the 34th Psalm was read as a Scriptural lesson.

On motion Rev. P. A. Miller made Chairman of Sunday School Board. E. H. Cook and T. J. Pomeroy added.

President recommends that the Oak Dale class recently organized by Brother Whitney be received into the Kansas Conference, also states that they wish to be united with the Coffeyville charge.

Motion made and approved that the class be received into the Conference, and that the matter of uniting them to the Coffeyville charge be left with the Committee on Boundaries.

Conference Tithing Secretary reports 251 members in the Conference as tithing. He also read a few accounts from certain ones who were blessed in following this Scriptural method of giving. On motion the report was adopted.

Motion made that the Tithing Secretary print the names of those tithing and hang the same in the auditorium.

Committee on Pastoral Relations gave the first reading of their report.

The matter of Holiness conventions was taken up and discussed. The matter of continuing these conventions and urging a better attendance was agreed upon by all.

On motion Brother I. L. DeWitt elected as Chairman of the first district. Brother W. L. Carkuff of the second district, L. S. Currie of the third district and Brother S. F. Wilson of the fourth district.

Motion made and approved that the matter of redistricting the Conference for Holiness Conventions be referred to the Committee on Boundaries.

Motion prevailed that at each Holiness Convention held, that one service be devoted to the interests of Sunday School Work.

Resolution read by Brother F. C. Hill recommends that Pastors shall not drop any preaching appointment upon their work without the written consent of the President and his Advisory Board. On motion adopted.

Committee on Thanks renders their report. Motion made that the same be adopted and published in the Local Paper. See report.

Orders of the Day called for. The hour was given to our Missionary Secretary, Rev. E. Teter. Brother Teter urged that we support our own Publishing and Educational Interests and especially urged that all should take the "Wesleyan Methodist."

In visiting the different fields we find encouraging as well as discouraging features.

We are thankful for the omens of good and seek to find the cause of unsatisfactory conditions. As to the encouraging features, we have organized several new classes and added members to others. Have had some good revivals, for which we are thankful to our God. On the other hand, some of our churches are depleted, some doors closed, some parsonages empty. Some pastors wondering what to do and some churches in doubt as to calling a pastor. This condition is deplorable and calls for more earnest prayer and consecration, that these causes may be removed.

We recommend more pastoral visiting, and in order to do this there will need to be more of an effort on the part of our churches to support the pastor that he may give his entire time to the work of the ministry. We also recommend more aggressive evangelism in opening new fields and the building up of those that have gone down or are tending that way. In order to do this, we recommend workers being put in the field under the direction of the conference.

In general, we find a spirit of love and unity prevailing over the conference. This coupled with a living faith, prevailing prayer and works that really mean sacrifice will bring victory. This is within our reach and God will not accept anything short of our best efforts.

Much of the Sabbath School literature and reading for the young is in the mild form of the novel. It is no small part of the work of the church to furnish a type of literature which shall in some measure at least tend to counteract the influence of that class of reading. As a church we have a golden opportunity and a great mission to perform in this field of religious work. The Wesleyan Methodist is among the best if not the best Holiness paper in the realm of religious literature. It is ably edited, clean, radical and filled with information and solid religious truth each week. No loyal Wesleyan Methodist family will be without it.

The Holy Bible is the book of books—indespensible in Church and Sabbath School work. We note the general excellence of our Sabbath School literature, and highly appreciate the weekly Banner. The enormous supply of wholesome books from our Publishing House is as a reservoir of soul food and cannot fail to promote vital piety and should be widely circulated.

#### MORAL REFORM.

Since secular corporations are so strongly opposing these evils, we, as a reform Church, ought to be more encouraged to act against these evils by our prayers, our voice and vote.

The lodge being a menace to the Church, let us renew our stand against it.

False religions and doctrines have educated men to promulgate and teach them, and in order to meet them on a fair basis, we who stand for Bible salvation and orthodox truth must have trained men and women. And since the moral tone of the average secular school is below par, and higher criticism and skepticism has crept into so many of the so-called religious schools, we therefore, recommend that our young people be educated in our own schools.

The need of today is Spirit-filled men and women who can pray and fight for God against the many evils of our land which have so worked havoc in our churches, thereby causing the drop of the spiritual tide to the extent that some of our Churches are vacant and closed, and classes once strong are almost gone. Let us hereby resolve in our hearts before God that we shall wait before Him until we shall know His voice more perfectly and be led by Him in tearing down the strongholds of Satan and sowing the seed of reverence to God and his cause in the hearts of the young and rising generation. For how shall we keep up the growth of our Churches and expect to see our young people sayed unless we teach them the way from their youth?

Since the sin of Sabbath desecration has become so prevalent and we as a church have allowed ourselves to become careless and lower the standard set by God and our Church forefathers, to the extent that in too many cases Sabbath services are forgotten and pleasure seeking and visiting takes its place, therefore, we recommend that as a God fearing and Holiness people, we heed the command of God, "Remember

# SABBATH SCHOOLS.

The importance of the Sabbath School work needs to be emphasized. It has been stated that 90% of the membership of the church is gathered through the Sabbath School.

George Muller states that "The vigor of spiritual life will be in exact proportion to the time devoted to the study of God's word (The Bible). Since the teen age is the period when scholars are apt to drop out of the Sabbath School, special attention should be given to keep up the interest during this period. This can be done by appointing teachers to these classes who will show an interest in their pupils, visiting them in their homes, and showing an interest in their school work, books they read, duties employed at, etc.

A visiting committee also might be provided to visit absentees, the sick, and to solicit new members.

The Superintendent and officers ought to be spiritual men and women who have an interest in the work, and by their own unbounded enthusiasm and zeal arouse the interest of others.

The Teachers should be trained as far as possible and they should be punctual at their post of duty and urge the same upon their scholars. We also deem a brief, pointed, spiritual review of the lesson to be instructive and beneficial.

We appreciate the introduction of the Sunday School into our annual gatherings and suggest that these be continued under the direction of the Conference Sunday School Board. T. J. POMEROY,
