CHURCH EXTENSION REPORT

Preambles

Whereas; a Conference-wide growing desire for more adequate provision for Church Extension Work exists, and

Whereas; Open doors for such work are challenging our response, and

Whereas; It seems unwise to increase the financial burden of the Conference, and

Whereas; A more wise and effective expenditure of certain monies covering cost of Conference visitation will enable us to accept the "Open Door" challenge of "Pioneer Evangelism" and yet not increase the financial burden of the Conference, and

Whereas; We are practically the only Conference in the Connection employing the services of a Quarterly Conference Evangelist:

Section I

- I. Be it Resolved; That the Conference rescind that part of Resolution No. 15, Page 51, of Conference Minutes, 1936, providing for the office of Conference Evangelist, and, that the Quarterly Meetings involved be cared for according to the Discipline, Section 7, Paragraph 85, Page 53.
- II. Be it Resolved; That the Conference place in the field a Pioneer Evangelist to do Extension Work as follows:
 - A. To open new fields.
 - B. To give special Evangelistic help to newly organized churches, and
- III. Be it further Resolved; That the labors of the Pioneer Evangelist be under the supervision of the Missionary Board, and
- IV. Be it further Resolved; That the Missionary Board be empowered to submit to the Conference Nominations Committee for the filling of this office.

Section II

In order to more effectively and continuously promote District Interests and Aggressive Conference Activities,

Be it Resolved; That one Pastor in each District be elected as General Chairman of the District;

- A. To counsel and advise with Pastors relative to problems and needs concerning their work, when it is not possible for the Conference President to do so.
 - B. To give coödinate leadership to all District activities.

C. To confer with other District Leaders and with the Conference President in the interests of a uniform Conference Program.

D. That the Nominating Committee furnish nominations for the District Chairmen.

Section III

Whereas many of our Churches organized within the last decade, were started by Pastors with a Missionary zeal and vision for fields adjacent to their Parish labors;

Be is Resolved; That, since we recognize this as a means valuable in Conference Extension work, we encourage a continuation of this vision and burden among our pastors, in addition to the labors of the Pioneer Evangelist.

Be it further Resolved; That no extension work be undertaken by a Pastor, General Evangelist, or Pioneer Evangelist without the endorsement of the Missionary Board.

PRAYER LEAGUE

Jesus taught His disciples "That if two of you shall agree on earth as touching anything that they shall ask it shall be done for them of my Father which is in heaven." He also taught them that they should "have faith and doubt not" if they expected to receive those things which they desired. And I am glad that He still hears prayer today when we truly pray.

SUNDAY SCHOOL

The Sunday School is related to the Church as the arm is to our physical body. It is a vital, strong arm upon which the Church leans heavily numerically, spiritually and financially. We recognize the handicap of a body without an arm or a church without a Sunday School; the peculiarity of an arm associated with no body or a Sunday School independent of any church; and the inefficiency of a body with a paralyzed or useless arm or a church with a Sunday School organization which fails to function. Thus we urge upon each church the importance of the work of the Sunday School and plead for a larger, prayerful and financial invest-

ment in this department of the church. It affords opportunity for fruitful service worthy of our best efforts and our spiritually qualified workers.

Education, without the Biblical knowledge and spiritual force supplied by the Sunday School, fails to meet the needs of youth in the development of character that can meet victoriously the temptations of our modern day. Jurists, education and social workers in the testimony that of the large number of youth involved in crime only a very small percentage has ever been under regular or systematic Sunday School instruction.

The work of the year has resulted in increasing the main school enrollment 67 and the average attendance 18. New schools are reported at Hardy, Lawrence and Naponee, while two schools do not report this year. A gain of 33 has been made in Cradle Roll enrollment. More than half the number received into church membership through the year have come through the Sunday School.

A series of One-Day Conventions was held during the year. Sixteen points were visited in which 35 Sunday Schools were represented. The total attendance of 838 included 180 active workers in the local schools.

We notice a substantial increase in the use of our own Sunday School literature and commend it to the use of every Sunday School.

MORAL REFORM

These are days when things political, social, moral, financial, intellectual and religious seem to be breaking from their moorings and drifting rapidly toward the precipice that means destruction. In such days we certainly cannot afford to loosen our grip on things eternal or sever the ties that hold us to the standards that are tried and true, that have held us as a church and people from the current that has led so many down stream.

We reaffirm with emphasis our position against all types of sin and worldliness, some of which are creeping into the Holiness movement of which we are a part. Jude speaks of guarding against those men and influences that have "crept in unawares." That is certainly a needful exhortation of our day. Cards, dancing, tobaccco, habit forming drinks or drugs, bathing beach influences, Sabbath desecration, idle talking and jesting, carelessness in meeting financial obligations and such like are more degrading and damning than ever. Especially would we lift a voice of warning against the so-called "good movie" that is being so subtily used in present day propaganda to solicit the patronage of the church. "Our

people must take an uncompromising stand against these most dangerous influential corporations whose sole end is greed and gain with a total disregard of the moral welfare of cur country. We, as a church, cannot afford to discriminate between good and bad pictures. The source is evil, therefore the fruit is evil."

Semi-nudity, lax principles and divorce are too largely the order of the day and are marks of Atheistic Communism rather than Christian citizenship. Shirtless men and dressless women are a disgusting spectacle on every street and highway. Our people would not go that far but let us not forget that shortening the sleeves, dressing the growing child unbecoming to Holiness and other similar indulgences are but opening wedges that lend strong influences to the wrong side. How beautiful is the grace of modesty. Let us display it generously. When modesty is gone, virtue's guarding angel is off duty.

Exercise of parental authority and obedience on the part of children is getting to be a thing of the past. Let us remember God's covenant to Abraham because He knew he would command his children after him.

We reëmphasize the importance of reverence to God, His day, and His house and would stress anew the wholesome practice of keeping the Lord's day wholly unto Him, entirely free from secular reading, labors, pleasures, and unprofitable visiting.

Inasmuch as the humble practice of kneeling before the Lord in prayer seems in some places to be slipping from us, therefore we feel to reemphasize its importance in this report.

STATE OF WORK

Once again it is becoming to record a survey of the work of the Conference for the year. This has been a year of steady advancement with greatest spiritual strength and power being felt in many of the churches while a goodly number are registering numerical and financial gains. For specific data refer to the Statistical Report.

Almost without exception the newer churches organized within the last decade or so are forging steadily ahead with promise of further increase in all departments of the work. Some of the older classes are catching a new vision, experiencing a spiritual rebirth, and having the joy of an ingathering of souls. May the Conference unitedly share a prayerful concern for those points where the work is moving slowly and where circumstances sometimes beyond human control make it unusually difficult to carry on and go forward.

The loyalty, sacrifice and faithful labors of our pastors have been praiseworthy. We are glad to note and to encourage our brethren in their closer application to the business of adequate preparation and training to meet the needs of the ministry of our day.

We are glad to note throughout the Conference an increasing loyalty to the Discipline not only in matters of moral requirement but in matters of church government and in particular in assuming responsibility and making Disciplinary provision for the care of the pastors of the several churches.

A splendid brick church building is being erected at Gage Park. Lawrence and North Topeka churches have purchased lots in good locations and edifices are under construction. The Lawrence class is worshipping in their new basement temporarily and the North Topeka group expect to have their basement ready for use soon. Major interior remodeling, redecorating, a new roof, and a furnace in the parsonage have added greatly to the church and parsonage at Kansas City, Kansas. Kansas City, Mis-

souri people have painted their church building besides making other improvements. The New Hope people have painted their church and made other general improvements. At Gaylord a vestibule has been added to the church building, the parsonage repaired and both painted. Painting and varnishing have greatly added to the appearance of the church at Union Valley. Clay Center church purchased a new parsonage during the year, while Heber purchased a church.

Wichita church has purchased the building in which they have been worshiping. The Conference has purchased a church property in the Quinton Heights division of South Topeka and steps are under way to repair the church and reopen the field. Both church and parsonage have been moved from Excelsior to accommodate the new Hopewell class ten miles distant. This may be God's plan for forward movement on other fields. Pioneering efforts have been carried on in Leavenworth, Leonardville, Belle Plain, and Manhattan, with other fields in prospect. Classes have been organized at Naponee, Nebraska, and in North Topeka.

The enlarged tabernacle and dining hall not only help in providing more adequately for the increasing crowds at the Annual Conference and Camp but bear testimony to the faith of the brethren in the future of the Kansas Conference.

While we stand ready to conserve God's work wisely, prudently and scripturally, we are glad to encourage our people in avoiding strained relations with sister churches, in all of our aggressive undertakings, and recognize the need for spiritual unity among all of God's people. "If the Lord delight in us, then he will bring us into this land and give it us; a land which floweth with milk and honey."

A growth is evident in practically all lines of church activity. The average contribution per member was \$40.60 as compared with \$34.85 last year. Sixty-one per cent of the churches increased in total receipts and 68 per cent of the pastors reported increase in total receipts for pastor.

Eight new church or parsonage buildings are reported this year, increasing the property valuation \$7,957.84, while the amount of indebtedness increased but \$1,701.90.

The following charges raised every item of the budget: Abilene, Ames, Antioch, Belleville, Chapman Creek, Concordia, Hall, Heber, Hopewell, Kansas City, Kansas; Lawrence, Miltonvale, Ottawa, Topeka, 1st, Gage Park, Wesley Center, Willis. Wichita Church raised more than the assigned budget but did not fill each item of the budget. Naponee, Union Valley and Wichita Mission, without budget assignment, reported substantial payments.

The total raised by the Conference for the budget shows an increase of \$1501.11, each item showing an advance over last year. The budget for Hephzibah Orphanage is 5.78 over the amount assigned the Conference.

Subscriptions to the church periodicals has increased. Seventy-seven new subscribers to The Wesleyan Methodist are reported, bringing the total to a little better than one-fourth of the membership. Fifteen new subscriptions to The Wesleyan Missionary are shown.

RESOLUTIONS

- 1. Evangelistic Help. Resolved, That the Camp Ground and Camp Meeting Committee be authorized, if they see fit to do so, to engage Evangelistic help for Camp Meeting two years in advance.
- 2. Election of Conference Officers. Resolved, That the election of Conference Officers be held on the second day of Conference at 9:00 a. m.
- 3. Subscription Lists. Resolved, That all subscription lists and money raised at Conference for all purposes be put through the hands of the Conference Treasurer or the Treasurer of the W. H. & F. M. Society, and that all subscription lists be kept by these Treasurers, and that notice of indebtedness be given all subscribers by means of a list sent to their pastors early in the year.

- 4. Sanctity of God's House. Resolved, That such work as making quilts and disposing of the same be performed in the homes of the people and not in the houses erected for public worship.
- 5. Pastor's Moving Expenses. Resolved, That the class hiring a minister shall within ten days after his arrival pay to him his moving expenses, this not to be applied on his salary.
- 6. Reporting All Offerings to Pastors. Resolved, That all monies be reported to the Pastors for entry on their Statistical Report in order to give due credit both to the Charge and to the Conference.
- 7. Subscription Lists Record. Resolved, That the Secretary supply the Conference President with a list of all supscriptions taken at Conference. That he also provide each pastor with a list of those from his charge.
- 8. Unleavened Bread. Resolved, That it be the sense of this Conference that all our churches use unleavened bread in the administration of the Lord's Supper. We suggest the following recipe: ½ cup flour, 1 teaspoon butter (heaping), moisten with milk enough to roll. Mark in ½ inch squares and make as pie dough. The above will serve 50 pesons.
- 9. Pastor Nominates Steward. Resolved, That it be the sense of this Conference that the pastor be granted the privilege of nominating one member to the Board of Stewards from each church on his charge.
- 10. To Hold Quarterly Meetings. Resolved, That the Conference President shall travel the Conference and care for one-half of the Quarterly Meetings.
- 11. Inspection of Church Property. Resolved, That it is the sense of the Annual Conference that the Conference President should inquire at each Quarterly Conference whether the local church property is properly repaired and insured.
- 12. Nominating Committee. Resolved, That all Conference Sessional Committees be filled through a Nominating Committee, and that the Conference President be Chairman ex-officio.
- 13. Night Services Evangelistic. Resolved, That it is the sense of this body that all its night services be conducted along strictly evangelistic lines.
- 14. Theological Institute. Resolved, 1st, That the Theological Institute begin on Monday of the last full week of April and continue until noon Thursday.

2nd, That the Ministerial Association begin Thursday at 2 p. m. of that week and continue over Friday.

15. Vote on Pastor. Resolved, That we as a Conference set the first week in June as the time when the churches shall take the vote on retaining their pastor, providing he has not expressed his purpose to change.

MORAL REFORM

We see in the present low ebb of public moral standards evidence of the spirit of compromise characteristic of the "great falling away" of the "last days." We urge our members, by consistent Christian living and activity, to support spiritual reform in those realms which are peculiarly the sphere of woman. We deplore the encroachments being made, particularly upon the young womanhood of our land, by the tobacco evil and exhort our people to use every influence, example and teaching to check this menace so injurious to health and morals. We urge our women to be "in behavior as becometh holiness," and in apparel as models of "the holy women of old." We urge them to use the same care and principles in selecting clothing for their children, refraining particularly from the use of anklets and sun-suits. Children are "an heritage of the Lord" and we are exhorted to rear them "in the nurture and admonition of the Lord." Thus they are entitled not only to godly parental example but to godly precept and guidance in making the choices of style and habit in the formative days of life. We recommend that each pastor preach upon the subject of dress at least once a year. We denounce the patronage of public bathing pools, the movies, card parties and nudist fashions and the use of popular music or fiction and habit-forming or intoxicating beverages. We recommend Sabbath observance and the public and private means of grace as mighty bulwarks of Christian faith and liberty.

PLAN OF WORK

We, the Committee on Plan of Work, hereby recommend the following:

Division I. Local Work

- 1. That this Plan of Work be read quarterly in each Local Society.
- 2. That we observe the "Red Letter Days":
 - A. Harvest Home Day for Educational Work.
- B. Easter—Programs and offering for Home Missions Connectionally supported.
- C. The World Day of Prayer—we recommend that the District Organizers make definite plans for the observance either by districts or local societies.
- D. May Day—to be known as gift day, bandages and such gifts as can be sent out with outgoing missionaries or used in our home fields.
- E. Wesleyan Missionary Day—public presentation of Missionary Magazine in effort to secure subscriptions.
- 3. That October 22 be observed as Harvest Home Day. We urge each society to send cash or make donations to the Dormitory and report same to Harvest Home Committee to receive credit on the Educational Budget.
- 4. That all local dues be sent to our Conference Treasurer. One half of the same to be used for missionary work and be applied on church Budget. Please designate specifically where this credit is desired.
- 5. That each Local Society elect a Solicitor for the Wesleyan Missionary, the same to be a permanent officer. Her duties shall be to secure renewals and fill up the quota for her society.
- 6. We recommend the use of a monthly envelope system for the col-Jection of dues, the Treasurer to keep record of the amounts paid in.
- 7. That each Society contribute 10 cents per member to pay General Conference Delegates' expenses.
- 8. That each Society contribute at least \$6.00 for Home Missions Connectionally supported.

- 9. We urge each Society to contribute at Ieast \$5.00 to the Hephzibah Orphanage. Such contribution to be applied on Budget.
- 10. That each Local President appoint a committee quarterly, whose duty shall be to visit the sick and to work in harmony with the pastor in rendering assistance that will help in reaching souls and building up the kingdom of God.
- 11. That the President of each Local Society be made responsible to arrange with the pastor for one evening of the third week of each month to pray especially for the Mission work, the same to be preceded by a day of fasting. We also recommend that an offering be taken at each of these services as follows:
 - A. September, December, March and June, Grace Davis' salary.
 - B. October and November for Education.
 - C. January-Hephzibah Orphanage.
 - D. February-Kansas Conference Missions.
 - E. April-Home Missions.
 - F. May-Bethshan Home.
 - G. July-Medical Missions.
- 12. In harmony with the recommendation of the General Society we urge that our ladies observe Friday of each week as a day of fasting and prayer for a Connection-wide revival, until it comes.
- 13. We recommend the use of the Programs printed in the Wesleyan Missionary.
- 14. That all bandages be sent to Rev. E. F. McCarty, 222 S. Clemens Ave., Lansing, Mich., receiving credit of 50 cents per pound but does not apply on Local Church Budget. Before sending donations of clothing for use in Home Mission work secure information from the workers concerning proper addresses for mailing packages. See Magazine Directory for addresses.
- 15. That all money be disbursed through our Local and Conference Treasurers. That all money or receipts applying on Budget be sent from the Local W. H. & F. M. S. Treasurer to the Conference Treasurer quarterly. This money should all be in the hands of the Conference Treasurer by August 1. That each Local Society use the Treasurer's Book prepared by the General Conference Society, this to be audited by a committee of two before the report is adopted.

- 16. That the annual report be prepared by the President, Secretary and Treasurer of the Local Society, one copy to be sent to Committee on Statistics, Mrs. N. Mae Clark, Perry, Kansas, two weeks before Conference, the duplicate copy to be brought to Conference by the Delegate. The names of the out-going President and Secretary should appear on the back of the Report Blank.
- 17. That each Society grade themselves by the Efficiency Standard, which is to be read at the last business meeting. A grade of 10 per cent will be given on each of any ten points chosen. Societies making a grade of 90 per cent will receive honorable mention and those making a grade of 100 per cent will be placed on the Honor Roll.
- 18. We urge the reading of the Report on Moral Reform at four public meetings during the year.
- 19. That each Society have a Committee of two to see to the gathering in of food stuffs for the Conference dining hall. The minimum for each Society shall be: 10 quarts of fruit spread, 10 quarts of pickles, relish or catsup, 10 pounds of noodles, and one-half dozen tea towels. Fruit, vegetables, rice, beans or macaroni may be substituted. This does not apply on Budget or Society apportionment. We recommend that churches sending larger delegations increase their proportion according to their delegation.
- 20. That the Local Society cooperate with the Temperance Superintendent of the Sunday School in observance of Temperance Sunday.
- 21. That our Conference goal for the coming year be 650 members, 375 magazines and \$5,500 Budget.
- 22. That honorary membership be undivided and applied on Missionary Budget.

Division II. Conference Work

- 23. That the W. H. & F. M. S. Conference open Wednesday at 8 a. m. of Camp Meeting week.
- 24. That the President and District Organizers arrange the time and recommend the worker for the Convention also that they prepare the schedule for the visitation of our worker.
- 25. That each District be supervised by the District Organizer under the direction of the Conference President. The Organizer shall be Prayer Secretary and Magazine Committee of her District and shall report the conditions of her District to the President quarterly. We suggest that each Organizer meet with each Local Society once during the year.

26. The Districts are as follows:

District No. 1—Topeka 1st, Gage Park, Ottawa, Fairview, Eskridge, Williams Chapel, Kansas City, Kansas City, Mo.; Willis, Easton, Brotherly Love Mission, Lawrence.

District No. 2—Clay Center, Antioch, Bethany Chapel, Wesley Chapel, Abilene, Trudell, Miltonvale, Salina.

District No. 3—Concordia, Hall, Belleville, New Hope, Morgan Chapel, Heber, Hollis, Union Valley.

District No. 4-Wichita Church, Wichita Mission, Excelsior, Grace Chapel.

District No. 5-Mankato, Wesley Center, Formoso, Victor, Hardy.

District No. 6—Cedar, Phillipsburg, Iowa Union, Inglewood, Gaylord, Naponee.

27. That the Gleaners each:

- A. Observe the monthly Prayer Hour.
- B. Be a subscriber to the Wesleyan Missionary.
- C. Furnish five pounds of bandages.
- D. Write at least once to each of the Mission Fields.
- E. Write to some other member of the Gleaners once quarterly.
