Standing Rules

1. Visiting Ministers:

All visiting ministers of our denomination and those of other denominations who hold the Bible to be the very Word of God and the final authority in faith and practice are invited to honorary seats in this conference.

2. Date of Conference:

The annual sessions of the conference shall convene on the Chambers Campground at 1:30 p.m., the last Tuesday of June, except that quadrennially it shall convene the second Tuesday after the General Conference convenes. The forenoon meetings shall convene at 8:30 and adjourn at 10:45. The afternoon meetings shall convene at 1:30 and adjourn by vote. The seven rows of seats in the front of the tabernacle, and the platform, shall comprise the bar of the conference.

3. Examinations:

Examinations shall be in the hands of the Committee on Itineracy and Orders not later than two weeks before the opening of the conference session.

4. Loans:

Any and all conference loans shall be subject to the approval of the Conference Board of Trustees.

5. Procedure:

The daily order of business shall be: 1. Hymn, 2. Roll Call, 3. Devotions, 4. Reading of Minutes, 5. Appointment of Committees, 6. Report of Committees. 7. Miscellaneous Business, 8. Passage of Characters.

The roll call and the reading of the Minutes shall be heard only at the first session of each day.

6. Taking of Pastoral Vote:

To obtain uniformity, it is recommended that the Pastoral Vote be taken on any day during the third full week in April, or during the following week if Easter falls during the third week. The Pastoral Vote shall be taken on prepared official ballots for this purpose.

7. Pay for Officials:

The Secretary and the Treasurer of the conference shall receive \$75.00 each annually.

8. Statistician:

The conference shall elect a statistician whose term of office shall expire at the close of the next session of the Annual Conference. He shall be the chairman of the Statistical Committee.

9. Closing of Records:

The Conference Treasurer shall close her books on June 3 and all receipts thereafter shall be included in the report for the following year. The Treasurer then shall fill in Item IX on the statistical report blanks, affix his signature and return one to the pastor who sent it. The other statistical report shall be forwarded to the Statistician by June 17.

10. Reporting of Statistics:

We authorize the use of the abbreviated report blanks.

11. Reports:

The report of the Woman's Missionary Society and the report of the Wesleyan Youth shall be printed in the conference minutes.

12. Ex-Officio Members:

(a) The President of the conference and the President of Wesleyan Youth shall be ex-officio members of the Camp Meeting Committee.

(b) The President of the conference shall be ex-officio chairman and the President of the

Woman's Missionary Society shall be an ex-officio member of the Missionary Board.

(c) The conference President shall be ex-officio chairman and the Secretary of the conference shall be ex-officio member of the Nominating Committee.

(d) The conference President shall be ex-officio chairman and the Secretary of Evangelism shall be member ex-officio of the Committee of Evangelism.

13. Sale of Properties:

All money coming to the conference from the sale of church and parsonage property shall become a part of the Conference Missions Fund.

14. Committee on Location:

The Board of Trustees shall choose three of their own number to constitute a Committee on Building Location. They shall study all proposed building projects and report their findings to the Board of Trustees. The names of the committee shall be printed in the minutes.

15. Editing of Minutes:

The Secretary of the conference is authorized to edit the minutes.

16. Election of Camp Meeting Chairman:

At the time of the election of conference officers the conference shall elect by ballot from among the elders the chairman of the Camp Meeting Committee.

17. Election of Conference Officers:

All conference officers shall be elected by ballot or after nominations by the Nominating Committee or from the floor. (See list of officers.)

18. Conference Policy:

(a) Each church shall grant its pastor at least two weeks vacation each year, with pay; and the church shall furnish the supply.

(b) Each church shall grant its pastor the privilege of a two week revival meeting away from his pulpit each year, and the pastor shall pay his supply.

(c) It is understood that the pastor shall have one day each week for rest and recreation. Accumulation of days shall not exceed three days.

(d) Each church shall furnish an adequate heating system (preferably a central heating system); and a kitchen range for the parsonage as soon as possible.

(e) Each church shall furnish shades or venetian blinds, draw-drapes, curtain rods and fixtures for the parsonage.

(f) The church shall release the pastor for attendance at Conference and Camp including both Sundays and shall furnish the supply.

(g) Each church shall encourage and plan for the pastor to attend all Conference gatherings (Ministerial Fellowships, District meetings, work bees, etc.). This is an important part of the Conference work.

(h) The church shall encourage the pastor to attend the Annual Ministerial Refresher Course at Houghton each year and shall make this possible by providing for the expense for the same or as much of that expense as possible.

(i) When a church anticipates changing pastors and invites a minister to candidate it shall provide the expense for such a trip.

(j) When a church changes pastors it shall pay the moving expense of the incoming pastor.

19. Apportionment of Budget:

(a) The Budget Apportionment Committee shall apportion budget to all members-in-full, regardless of age.

(b) The Onondaga Reservation charge shall be assigned only the denominational budget.

(c) A newly organized church shall be exempt from Conference budget the first year following its organization and only one-half the conference budget assigned the second conference year following its organization, after which it may be assigned all items of budget in full as usual.

20. **Course of Study:**
Persons recommended to study or to travel under the direction of the conference shall appear personally before the Committee on Itineracy and Orders before they are accepted and annually thereafter or communicate with the committee so long as they are continued. If they fail to do this for two successive years, they shall be returned to their quarterly conference.
21. **Ministerial Institute:**
The President of the conference shall be ex-officio chairman of the committee to plan the Ministerial Institute. The three district chairmen shall complete the committee. This committee shall arrange for the Institute following the next annual session of the conference.
22. **Delegates' Credentials:**
It shall be the duty of the pastor not later than one week before the next annual session of the conference to forward to the Secretary of the conference, who is a Committee on credentials, the credentials of the delegate(s) and the alternate delegate(s) from his charge.
23. **Audits:**
The books of the Treasurer of the conference and of other custodians of conference funds shall be audited by an accountant or recognized bookkeeper approved by the President and his Advisory Board. This shall be done prior to the convening of the annual session of the Conference, and a certified copy shall be furnished the President.
24. **Conference Missions:**
(a) In the interim between conference sessions the Missionary Board is authorized to interpret what shall be considered conference missions. In the event of the purchase of property, the Missionary Board may make recommendations to the Board of Trustees.
(b) The third Sunday of the second month of each quarter is recommended as the time for taking the Sunday school offering for conference missions.
25. **Bible Study Quarter:**
Each church is expected to conduct a systematic Bible study for at least one quarter during the conference year. The material to be selected by the pastor and local church from approved material.
26. **Committee on Orders of the Day:**
The President and his Advisory Board shall constitute a committee on Orders of the Day. They shall plan the daily schedule of the conference and shall prepare a printed agenda. The following shall be the order of the evening services: Tuesday, a Sunday school rally; Wednesday, conference missions; Thursday, a public missionary service; Friday, the ordination service.
27. **Church Membership Classes:**
Each church is requested to present annually a series of studies in church membership to be known as "Preparation for Church Membership." All prospective new members are to be requested to attend these classes. Classes are to be open also to persons interested in learning more concerning membership.
28. **Financial Appeals:**
(a) The Conference shall promote the offering for Houghton Academy on Academy Sunday which is the second Sunday in September. This shall be in addition to raising the educational budget in full. (Note: Houghton Academy receives 20 per cent of the total educational budget.)
(b) The Lenten season and Easter offering is hereby established as a time for a special offering for the local church.
(c) Any financial appeals to be made in the local churches by non-Wesleyan persons or groups shall require the approval of the Conference President and his Advisory Board. This does not apply to representatives of the Gideons and of the American Bible Society.

Daily Proceedings

FIRST DAY - TUESDAY AFTERNOON:

The Rochester Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America convened at the call of the President for its 20th annual session at 2:00 p.m. on Tuesday, June 30th, 1964. Rev. I. Leslie Conley led the congregation in singing "All Hail The Power of Jesus Name." Rev. Stanley W. Wright offered prayer.

The roll was called showing 31 Elders and Conference Preachers, and 33 lay delegates present. The report of the Committee on Credentials was adopted and amended to seat alternates. (See Lay delegates on page 14)

The Rev. Wesley B. Nussey, Conference Secretary, brought a devotional message from Matthew 28:16-20. He emphasized three points: (1) a truthful claim, (2) the Great Commission, and (3) an enduring promise.

The Agenda on Orders of the Day was adopted. (See Report No. 1)

A motion was made and carried that the report of the Nominating Committee be accepted which carried with it the election of the members to the committees. (See Report No. 2)

The Conference President asked that the report of Committees on Bible Study be made at a later time.

A verbal report was made by the Tithing Secretary, Rev. I Leslie Conley. This report was adopted.

The report of Conference Pension Plan Treasurer was postponed to a later time.

Rev. Roger Bohall, Director of Truth For Youth, was introduced and brought a few brief, but pertinent, comments concerning the work of this organization.

We adjourned by vote. Rev. George Pattington dismissed us with a word of prayer.

SECOND DAY - WEDNESDAY MORNING

The Conference President called the conference session to order. Harold DuFour led in singing and Rev. James Bence offered the opening prayer. The roll was called. Dr. Ries conducted devotions, pointing out the scriptural way to poise, calm, equanimity, and rest.

The Sunday School Secretary, Rev. William Woughter, read his report, which was adopted by vote. The financial report was referred to the Auditing Committee. (See Report No. 3)

The Committee on Courtesy presented Dr. and Mrs. Paine who testified to God's faithfulness and brought greetings from Houghton College. Mr. and Mrs. Tarbell Lamos were introduced and brought greetings. Mrs. Lamos is the Conference Treasurer. Rev. Lloyd Mack, who became pastor at Willett Memorial Church this year, was introduced and brought greetings.

The Pension Plan Treasurer, Rev. Leon Jelliff, gave his report. (See Report No. 4)

The Committee on Religious Services made a partial report which was adopted by vote. (See Report No. 5)

ORDER OF THE DAY - CONFERENCE PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Rev. James E. Bence, the Vice-President, took the chair. The Annual Report and Official Acts of the Conference President, Dr. David A. Rees, were read and adopted by motion. The Conference President's Recommendations were read. Recommendation No. 1 was read and adopted. Recommendation No. 2 was read but not acted upon at the request of the Conference President. The Financial Report was referred to the Auditing Committee. (See Report No. 6)

It was voted that the Orders of the Day be changed to permit the Conference Treasurer to make her report at this time. Mrs. Charlotte Lamos, Conference Treasurer, read her report which was referred to the Auditing Committee. (See Report No. 7)

The Committee on Examination of Character reported. The following characters have been examined and were passed by vote:

SECOND DAY - WEDNESDAY AFTERNOON

Conference was called to order by the Conference President. Brother DuFour led in singing "Leaning on the Everlasting Arms". Rev. David Konz read Joshua 9:3-16, 22 and brought devotional thoughts from the verses read, emphasizing "the listening side of prayer."

The Courtesy Committee reported. Rev. Enox Cann of the Reformed Baptist Church was introduced and gave his testimony.

The Committee on Itinerary and Orders made a partial report. With the adoption of the report, the name of Rev. Harry Barrigar was placed on the Roll of Elders. (See Report No. 8)

The Committee on Examination of Character reported. The following characters have been examined and were passed by vote of the conference: Bond Harlan, Mary Crandall, Leon Jelliff, William Turverey, Harley Hill, David Konz, Robert Wilhelm, Wallace Taylor, Grace Russell, Merlin Loomis, William Woughter, Lloyd Mack, Bernard Newberry, David Rees, Richard Sprowl.

Brother DuFour led in a hymn, awaiting the Orders of the Day.

ORDER OF THE DAY - EDUCATIONAL HOUR

Rev. Edwin Macumber, Educational Secretary, introduced Dr. Paine. In his opening remarks, he announced the death of Miss Mildred Gillette, who had served Houghton College for 35 years. Dr. Paine read

I Cor. 1:18-25. In his message he contrasted the wisdom of the world to the wisdom of God. He reported that Houghton College has reached the enrollment of 1000. Although we do not have a general recruitment program, we are seeking to recruit more Wesleyan Methodist youth. Rev. Robert Crosby has accepted the position of visiting Wesleyan Methodist Churches of our area. Dr. Paine noted that the final wing of East Hall has been completed. The library has been completed, but not furnished for occupancy. Presser Hall, a small auditorium in the basement of Wesley Chapel, was completed this spring. He reported on new and returning faculty coming to Houghton College.

Rev. Philip Birchall, President of Houghton Academy, was introduced. He reported a registration of 88 students and indebtedness of \$47,000. The Academy has operated in the black this year, and it has been a good year spiritually. Academic courses have been added. Mr. Birchall emphasized the need of Christian education on the secondary level.

Mrs. Charlotte Lamos, the Conference Treasurer, was voted an honorary seat within the bar of the conference.

Conference recessed for 15 minutes. Richard Doan was seated as the delegate from the Lyncourt Church representing Wesley Nussey, an elder who holds his membership at Lyncourt.

ORDER OF THE DAY - REPORT OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

The official acts of the Board of Trustees were read by the Secretary of the Board of Trustees, Rev. James E. Bence. Rev. Stanley Wright asked for the amount of financial authorization during the year -- this amounted to \$140,000 to \$150,000, but the full amount was not needed.

Rev. James Bence was asked to explain why the Penfield Church was being built within three miles of a Free Methodist Church. The explanation is:

- (1) to care for seven Wesleyan Methodist families in this area, and future incoming Wesleyan families,
- (2) to present a Wesleyan witness in this area,
- (3) it is the center of an eight mile radius on the east side of Rochester.

The Board of Trustees' Report was adopted by vote.

The following pastors gave their statistical reports: Gerald F. MacKinnon, Tarbell Lamos (lay delegate reported for Lyncourt), Edward Mein, Harry E. Barrigar, Carroll Brentlinger, Edwin Macumber, Edward VanWicklin.

THIRD DAY - THURSDAY MORNING

The Chair called the conference to order. Brother DuFour led in an opening hymn. The roll was called. Claude Davenport was seated as a delegate from Odessa in the place of Mrs. Marlie Bowen.

Those reporting during the morning session: Richard Sprowl, Harley S. Hill, Gerald Wright, Jr., Bond Harlan, Robert Wilhalm, David Konz, Gerald Wright, Sr., Wallace Taylor, Thomas Boghosian, Merlin Loomis.

ORDERS OF THE DAY - ELECTION OF OFFICERS

Dr. George E. Failing, Denominational Representative, was invited to preside during the election of Conference President and Vice-President.

The Committee on Examination of Characters made a further report. The report was accepted passing on the characters of the following: William Woughter Sr., Lloyd Mack, Bernard Newberry, David A. Rees, Richard Sprowl.

Chaplain Richard Sprowl reported on his activities in the U.S. Air Force.

The following officers were elected:

Election of the 2nd Lay Trustee was reported - Fay Stewart-Term to 1967

Camp Meeting Chairman was elected - I Leslie Conley

It was voted that the Secretary be instructed to cast an electing ballot for the nominating slate excepting for Tithing Secretary, Member of the Local Board of Trustees of Houghton College, the Alternate Delegate to the local Board of Trustees, and the laymen on the Committee on Vacancies.

The Courtest Committee reported. Rev. Robert Stone, pastor of the Taylor Church, and the Rev. Edward Bead were introduced to the Conference. Both gave testimonies.

We adjourned by limitation of time with prayer by Rev. H.S. Hill.

THIRD DAY - THURSDAY AFTERNOON

Brother DuFour led in an opening hymn after which the Vice-President called the Conference to order. Rev. Edward Crandall conducted devotions. The Chairman announced that Rev. Reginald Hewitt was involved in a serious accident this week on his way to the Champlain Conference. The Conference united in prayer for Rev. Hewitt with Rev. Edward Mein leading.

Rev. Eugene Cockrell spoke to the Conference concerning the Wesleyan Investment Foundation.

The Chairman of the Conference Missions Fund reported. This report was adopted. The financial report of Conference Missions Fund was referred to the Auditing Committee. (See Report No. 9)

The Campmeeting Treasurer read his report. This report was referred to the Auditing Committee. (See Report No. 10)

ORDER OF THE DAY - DENOMINATIONAL REPRESENTATIVE

The Conference President introduced Dr. George E. Failing, who is the official church representative. Dr. Failing read Psalm 44:1-8. He

reviewed Rochester Conference statistics from the years 1948-63. He spoke to us about Wesleyan Methodism past, present, and future. He stated that we are Methodists, and then defined the doctrinal position of Methodism. He explained that the founders of Wesleyan Methodism broke with the Methodist church over slavery and the episcopacy. We came into being as a protest movement, and we remain reformers, which puts a burden upon the work of evangelism. He challenged us to be unafraid, and concluded by saying that the Holy Spirit is still at work in Wesleyan Methodism.

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Three constitutional changes in the Discipline were presented. Proposal A was approved with a standing vote of 74 to 0. Proposal B was approved with a standing vote of 73 to 0. Proposal C was approved with a standing vote of 75 to 0. (See Conference File, Display No. 1, 1964)

C.C. Watson, lay delegate, reported on the work at Taylor. Harold Little and Richard Brown reported.

Rev. Richard Brown, Treasurer of Ministerial Mutual Aid Plan, gave the financial report of the Mutual Aid Plan, which was referred to the Auditing Committee (See Report No. 11).

We adjourned by vote and with prayer by Rev. Harold Little.

FOURTH DAY - FRIDAY MORNING

The Chairman called the Conference to order. The song leader led in the singing of "Called Unto Holiness". Rev. Lloyd Mack conducted devotions from Ephesians 4:1-15. The roll was called. The minutes were read and approved.

The Committee on Courtesy presented Rev. Norman Hardy, who has been pastoring in Jersey City, N.Y. Brother Hardy has accepted the pastorate on the Elkland Charge. He gave his testimony.

ORDERS OF THE DAY

The W.M.S. President, Mrs. Gladys Newbury, gave her report. A rising vote of thanks was extended to Mrs. Newbury for her work. The Conference Youth President, Rev. Gerald Wright Jr., reported. A rising vote of thanks was given to him.

The Director of Wesleyan Men, Mr. Richard Doan, reported on the progress of this organization. Wesleyan Men has been divided into four Districts with a promotional program in three of these Districts during this past conference year. This report was adopted by vote.

The financial report of the Christian Life Book Shop was read by the Conference President, Dr. David A. Rees. A motion was made to adopt the verbal report, and refer the financial report to the Auditing Committee (See Report No. 12). A period of discussion followed.

A motion was made and carried that we extend the time for discussion pertaining to the matter of the Christian Life Book Shop.

It was moved that the Trustees be empowered to act concerning the Christian Life Book Shop as the Board sees best. The previous question was moved and carried. The main motion was adopted.

We adjourned by limitation of time. Brother Hardy offered the closing prayer.

FOURTH DAY - FRIDAY AFTERNOON

The session was called to order by the Assistant Secretary, Rev. William Turverey. The Conference was led in the singing of "There is Sunshine in My Soul". Devotions were conducted by Rev. Paul Lawrence who read from Psalm 26. The Houghton College Trumpet Trio rendered a special number.

The Committee on Itinerary and Orders reported. The report was adopted by vote. (See Report No. 8) The Auditing Committee reported. This report was adopted by vote. (See Report No. 12)

The Finance Committee submitted its report. It was moved that this report be accepted. The motion was made to include an itemized statement of how the \$8.00 per member for the Rochester Conference budget was spent. The amendment was lost. The main motion prevailed. (See Report No. 14)

The Director of Child Evangelism gave a verbal report which was accepted by vote. The Sunday School Board nominated Rev. Edward Crandall as the director of the Christian Youth Crusade. The nomination was confirmed by vote. (The Director of Christian Youth Crusade was formerly called the Director of Child Evangelism.)

The Statistical Committee read its report which was adopted by vote. (See Report No. 18) A discussion followed concerning the deficit in the Educational budget and the Pension fund. It was voted that the Conference President meet with the churches which have not paid their budgets in full to determine with them how much of the unpaid balance each church can meet. This information is to be given to the Advisory Board who with the President will determine a method for paying the Educational and Pension budget in full. These deficits are to be paid by November 1, 1964.

The Committee on Examination of Characters reported and the following pastors' characters were passed: George Pattington, James Bence, Bernard Draper, Richard Brown, Orville Lawrence.

The Committee on Religious Services reported. (See Report No. 5) The report of the Treasurer of Child Evangelism was given by Rev. James Bence. (See Report No. 15) This report had been adopted with that of the report of the Auditing Committee.

FOURTH DAY - FRIDAY AFTERNOON

Mrs. Mildred Snedeker, the lay delegate from Boylston Charge, introduced a letter which stated that "There should be some consideration given to those who are members and yet are in their teens or are in college, also elderly members whose income is fixed and very limited." There was no action on the part of the Conference.

The Editor of the Conference News reported concerning the editorial policy of reporting news. Rev. William Turverey gave his pastoral report.

The report of the Policy Committee was read. The recommendations were adopted item by item with the exception of recommendation No. 3 which was amended to read "and Conference Reports at June 3" instead of "and Conference Reports at June 10." The recommendation was approved as amended. (See Report No. 16)

The Conference President passed out blanks for the following reports to be used in the local churches: Sunday School Treasurer, Church Treasurer, Woman's Missionary Society, Wesleyan Youth Treasurer, and

Y.M.W.B. (See Display No. 2, 1964) It was moved to adopt these blanks as a method for reporting in our local churches. The motion was amended to state that the Conference supply these blanks to churches on demand. The amendment carried. The motion as amended prevailed. The card for the Pastor's Quarterly Report was adopted by vote. (See Display No. 3, 1964)

The following pastors and retired elders reported: Lloyd Mack, Adelbert Edwards, William Woughter, George Pattington, James Frase, James Bence, Grace Russell, Leon Jelliff. We adjourned to meet at 6:30 p.m.

FOURTH DAY - FRIDAY EVENING

The Conference was called to order by the Secretary. Mrs. Gladys Newbury was nominated to fill the office of Conference World Missions Secretary. This nomination was confirmed by a motion which carried.

The Pastoral Relations Committee reported. The report was adopted as read. (See Report No. 16)

The Secretary nominated Rev. Wm. Turverey as Assistant Secretary. This was adopted by vote. The President nominated Rev. J.E. Bence and Howard L. Dietrich to the Advisory Board. This nomination was confirmed by vote.

The Courtesy Committee introduced Rev. and Mrs. Charles Wheeler who will pastor the Wallace church after campmeeting.

A motion stating that the Conference should convene on Monday, 2:30 p.m., instead of Tuesday, 2:00 p.m., was lost. A motion was passed that all other unfinished business be left in the hands of the Conference President and his Advisory Board. We adjourned at 7:30 p.m. to meet at the call of the Chair.

7:30 P.M., FRIDAY EVENING

Harry E. Barrigar was ordained an elder of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America. The Conference President, Rev. Dr. David A. Rees, presided and the denomination representative, Rev. Dr. George E. Failing Editor of The Wesleyan Methodist, delivered the ordination sermon. Rev. Stanley W. Wright gave the charge to the ordinand's wife, Mrs. Bessie Lamos Barrigar.

REPORT NO. 3

REPORT OF THE SUNDAY SCHOOL SECRETARY

Your Sunday school secretary, plus delegates from all three cup winning Sunday schools, attended the National S.S. Convention at Buffalo, N.Y. last October. Our conference was well represented with upwards to 50 in attendance.

I spoke at three S.S. rallies: Canandaigua-Waterloo, Elmira, and Canisteo. Two special meetings of the Sunday school board were held during the year; one at the Houghton Ministerial, and one at Bently Creek.

We arranged for special speaker and music for this year's conference Sunday school night rally and the date and place of the great SHARE CONVENTION to be put on for us by the National office. The Share convention will be held September 26th in the Elmira Wesleyan Church.

Nearly \$400 worth of film strips have been purchased and are now available, free of charge, to all our Sunday schools.

AWARDS

The three conference trophies are awarded as follows: CANANDAIGUA with an increase of 13%, BENTLY CREEK with an increase of 37%, and KIRKEVILLE with an increase of 79%.

The pastor, or other delegate, of these three schools will each receive transportation in one car to the Philadelphia Area convention this fall. In addition each will receive \$10.00 from the S.S. fund toward convention expenses.

The 10% ribbons of Merit are awarded to: Boylston 14%, Odessa 31%, Shady Grove 10%, Taylor 23%, Wallace 26%, W. Jasper 27%.

THE AWARD STANDARD

The Sunday school board recommends the following awards and standard for the coming year:

1. Each school in the conference achieving a 10% gain in average attendance for the year will receive a Ribbon of Merit.

2. Schools competing for the trophies shall be divided into three groups: up through 59, 60 through 99, 100 and up. The grouping of schools will be established according to the average attendance for the last conference year. A trophy will be awarded to the one in each group achieving the greatest percentage gain.
3. The pastor, or a key layman, of each trophy winning school may travel without charge in one car at the expense of the conference Sunday school convention or a comparable one selected by the Sunday school board. In addition, each winner who takes advantage of this will be given \$10.00 from the same fund for other convention expenses.
4. Each school shall have the privilege of omitting from its record of average attendance any four Sundays of the year. To be counted present, scholars must be in attendance at least half of the Sunday school session. Persons known to be in attendance at any Sunday service of our annual camp meeting may be considered present at their local Sunday school for that Sunday or Sundays.

To the members of the Rochester Annual Conference assembled on the Chambers Campground for its 120th Annual Session:

Cordial greetings in the Master's name. We are privileged to gather again for the annual session of the Rochester Conference. We wish to express sincere thanks to God for His blessing throughout the year. During the session we will be giving an account of our labors for the past year and we believe that God has helped us in all areas and the reports will reflect a good year. We rejoice with you again in the fact that our Conference is continually moving forward. It was a time of inspiration and rejoicing when we organized the new Penfield Wesleyan Methodist church with 21 members -- this new church will launch out under the aggressive leadership of Brother Bence and with the prayers

and backing of the Conference. It was a time of challenge and anticipation to officiate at two ground breaking services this year; one at Kirkville last fall for their new church, the first unit of which is already completed and being used, which meets a real need for their growing Sunday School and increased attendance, the other service was at Penfield for their new church which is already under construction and we trust will be ready for use this fall. It was also a time of great satisfaction and inspiration to participate in three dedication services during the year, one at Redfield last fall when their new addition to the church was completed. First, the financial report given by the Director is not the total giving of our churches for Conference Missions. This report only reflects the actual money that passed through his books. Some money was sent directly to the Conference Treasurer due to oversight or misunderstanding of the local treasurers involved. Some givings went directly from the church making the gift to the church or organization designated. If a complete report of the money given by our conference for our extension work is desired, spade work through all treasurers reports must be made.

Secondly, it is evident that many are individually interested in our conference multiplying churches and endeavoring to keep somewhat in pace with our population, but not all of our congregations are so motivated. Many local churches have NO pladges to RCMF, some of the Sunday School offerings indicate little interest, as also do the annual church offerings. This suggests, no doubt, that our people need a clearer understanding of the urgency of growth and development conference wise.

Finally, those who have given faithfully and sent their prayers with their gifts are to be commended. It is a joy to work with God's concerned saints. Let us press on in the work, trusting in our Lord to guide and assist us.

REPORT OF THE FINANCE COMMITTEE

We recommend that the Woman's Missionary Society and the Wesleyan Youth be asked to pay for the printing of the number of pages in their portion of the Conference Minutes.

We recommend that where the pastor is a member of the Social Security Plan that the church give the pastor a bonus sufficient to cover his social security payment.

We recommend that for the conference year 1964-65 the expenditures for Conference Administrative work be approximately \$5700 as follows:

- A. The salary of the President shall be at the rate of \$85 per week
- B. The Conference President shall be allowed Expense at the rate of seven cents per mile and miscellaneous expenses.
- C. The Conference is to assume the expenses of the parsonage utilities of the President.
- D. We recommend the Conference Treasurer to be authorized to give the Conference President a bonus sufficient to cover his social security assessment plus the \$20 minimum for Mutual Aid.
- E. That the Conference President receive \$300.00 for secretarial work.
- F. We recommend appropriations of:
 - (1) \$100.00 to Mrs. A.J. Shea
 - (2) \$50.00 to Mrs. Exa Rathbun
 - (3) \$600.00 to Onondaga Reservation

In order to finance the above program we recommend that the following be adopted:

1. The Conference Budget shall be \$8.00 per member of which 25¢ will go for the Chambers Camp expenses.
2. The Mutual Aid Budget shall be 60¢ per member.
3. When the Conference President shall hold revival meetings within the bounds of the Conference, \$50.00 per week shall apply on budget. Any balance above this amount shall be a love offering to the President.

The Budget Apportionment is assigned on a per capita basis and is divided at the rate of \$23.10 per full member of the church, and is divided as follows:

The Conference Policy Committee offers the following recommendations:

1. That from the Conference Policy Committee Report of 1963,
 - a. Number 1 become (k) of Standing Rule #18,
 - b. " 4 " (l) " " " " ,
 - c. " 6 " (m) " " " " ,
 - d. " 7 be combined with (a) of Standing Rule #18.
2. That mimeographed report forms be made available for the local treasurers of our churches and presented at Conference.
3. That it be recommended that the deadline for local church reports be set at June 3rd, and Conference Reports at June 10th, and this incorporated in Standing Rule #9.
4. That the local churches be urged to adopt a plan whereby each would pay its budget on a quarterly basis.

Whereas the present provisions for our Conference Missions Fund income, namely, by quarterly Sunday School offerings, an annual church offering and individual card pledges, totals to less than \$5,000 per year,

Therefore Be It Resolved that each church in our conference will conscientiously strive to contribute 2% of its total income for the last year to the Conference Missions Fund annually.

Be It Resolved further that each church endeavor to make quarterly payments on its total contribution, thereby enabling he treasurer to meet the interest payments on loans secured for conference projects.

8. That when the church discusses the matter of the pastor's salary, the pastor use his own discretion as to whether he remains or absents himself during this discussion.

We recommend that a full-time president be employed by the Conference, whose duties shall be in accordance with those set forth in the Discipline, paragraphs 147-150.

1. We recommend that the conference missionary church shall be under the special care of the Conference President and his Advisory Board, until such time as they shall have assumed the entire responsibility for their indebtedness, and that other missionary churches be under this care by mutual agreement of Church and Conference President. The Conference President shall be a member ex-officio of the boards of these churches and shall be informed of the meetings of these boards with the agenda for the same. He shall be sent a copy of the minutes of these churches as often as necessary to counsel and encourage the pastor and people.

2. He shall be required to study and survey possible fields for new work and report annually to the Board of Church Extension and Evangelism. This board shall have the power to authorize further investigation and institute a definite plan of action.

3. The Conference President shall superintend the more-established churches and shall endeavor to visit them once a year. He shall preach at the morning service and visit another church in the evening at his own discretion, presenting the needs of the conference and church missionary work. Each pastor shall adjust to the convenience of the President of the Conference so that his visit may be made with the minimum of time and travel.

4. He shall enforce the provisions of the Discipline, and uphold the standards of the church.

5. He shall seek to co-ordinate the evangelizing efforts of the various churches of the conference by suggesting to pastors a suited arrangement of meetings, and by counseling with reference to evangelists.

6. His conference evangelistic dates shall be established by the President and his Advisory Board.

7. The Conference President is to be permitted to take two evangelistic meetings per year outside the bounds of the conference.

8. He shall be a member ex-officio of the Finance Committee.

We further recommend that all appropriations cleared by the Pastoral Relation Committee be referred to the Finance Committee.

We further recommend, concerning the relationship of Willett Memorial Church and Lyncourt church, that a liaison committee, composed of three members from the conference and three from each of the churches be formed, with the Conference President chairman of this committee. Members from the conference being James E. Bence, Bernard A. Draper, and David A. Rees, with the Pastors and two elected members from each church.

2. The first five seats shall comprise the bar of the Conference.
3. The Conference officials shall receive the following salaries:
President - \$20.00
Vice-president - \$10.00
Secretary - \$15.00
Treasurer - \$40.00
Y.M.W.B. Superintendent - \$20.00
They shall receive their board and room during Conference.
4. Members of the Executive Committee shall receive traveling expenses equal to that voted by the Conference for Conference Officials.
5. There shall be elected a Conference Statistician whose term of office shall not expire until the close of the Conference session following her election. She shall be the Chairman of the Statistical Committee and shall be authorized to choose the members of said committee. She shall be seated within the bar of the Conference and shall be given board and room during Conference. The local treasurers shall send both of their statistical reports to the Conference Treasurer by June 3rd. The local Y.M.W.B. Superintendents shall send their reports to the Conference Y.M.W.B. Superintendent by June 3rd.
6. Each local society of the Conference shall close its financial and records for the year, May 31st.
7. To receive credit all cash and vouchers must be sent to the Conference Treasurer and Y.M.W.B. Superintendent by June 3rd. Any money sent after that date shall be applied on the next year.

REPORT OF WMS CONFERENCE PRESIDENT

To the members of the Rochester Conference WMS, gathered for their 59th annual session, greetings!

I count it indeed an honor and a privilege to have served the Lord again this year as your Conference Missionary President. For anything that has been accomplished, we praise God, and express our sincere thanks to each of you. It is only as we work together and with Him, can we see anything done that will last.

It has been most gratifying to see the excellent response to the making of the flags and dolls to represent the various countries that were assigned. What a nice lot of color it brings to our conference.

Because you cared and labored . . . over \$1500 was given for the disaster in Haiti; a large number of sheets and pillowcases were sent to Africa; \$77⁴ was given to the work on the Onondaga Reservation; \$1881 was raised for Conference Missions; the field support for Robert and Norva Crosby was raised in full . . . along with the completion of

numerous other projects, making our total giving for this year to be \$23,572.97. Of this, \$18,145.75 was sent to the treasurer in cash.

Last fall I arranged for the itinerary of Rev. Glen Barnett, Haiti, to tell the needs and victories throughout our conference. I have prepared and mailed five form letters to all WMS presidents and pastors. I have met with the WMS Executive, Conference Policy Committee, and a Special Committee for the planning of the work. Mrs. Turverey and I attended the five conventions with our missionary, Rev. Robert Crosby. These were held April 28 through May 2 at Willett Memorial, Sandy Creek, Waterloo, West Jasper, and Millview. The offering for these conventions totaled \$330.48. We trust that much more money will be channeled into the work of Columbia and the Carribean area because of these conventions being held. We wish to again thank the entertaining churches and the chairmen for their help in making these a success.

We are happy that Mrs. Helen Stark, President of the General WMS is with us for a part of this conference session. Rev. Harold Johnson, missionary to Japan, will be our speaker for Thursday evening. We anticipate the presence of Miss Jeannie LaBarre, the Crosbys, the Sprowls, and perhaps others before the close of Conference.

After consultation with the WMS Executive, Camp Meeting Board, Dr. Rees and you who attended Spring Conventions, we have invited the Houghton Area Missionary Convention to Chambers Campground for August 31 through September 2, 1965. This will indeed be a privilege for us as a conference and also a big responsibility. It will necessitate the wholehearted cooperation of all to plan and care for its entertainment. We earnestly solicit your prayer and support.

Since the Crosby family will not be returning to the field of Columbia this fall, we have chosen Rev. & Mrs. Harold Johnson of Japan, Rev. and Mrs. Paul Dekker of Africa, and Rev. and Mrs. Paul Swauger of Columbia for our conference missionaries. All money you send in for General World Missions goes toward this.

We are instructed to "lift up our eyes to the whitened harvest fields." I trust that as we do this, we will not only see the needs across the seas, but also the tremendous needs in our own community, our conference, and our homeland. We did well in our giving for Conference Missions this year. Let us really get behind the building of new churches, with a real united effort, this year. Because of the excellent preparatory work of Rev. and Mrs. Bernard Draper, we organized with eleven paying their dues, three of them men, on that evening. We expect that Penfield will have an organized society before conference in 1965. Do you see how Conference Missions pays?
