MINUTES

FIRST DAY.

MORNING SESSION.

Pursuant to appointment, the Forty-fourth Annual Session of the Iowa Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church, convened in the Wesleyan Methodist church (called Immanuel Chapel) seven miles east of La Porte City, in Blackhawk county, Iowa, commencing September 29, 1897, at 10 A. M.

The President, Rev. J. H. Meek, being absent the conference was called to order by the Secretary, and Rev. J. A. Preston was

elected President pro tem.

Rev. H. J. Richardson conducted the devotional exercises.

He read the 37th Psalm and offered a very earnest prayer.

Revs. R. W. Mack and H. J. Richardson were elected committee on credentials.

On motion of Rev. S. A. Gilley the conference bar was fixed to include the four front seats and the side seats.

The Pastor of the church, Rev. E. R. Dodd, was made committee

on religious services.

The committee on credentials reported, George Logsdon, delegate from Bethel, R. W. Wilson, delegate from Marengo, C. H. Babcock and J. E. Grinnell, delegates from College Springs. The report was adopted.

On motion of Rev. S. A. Gilley, the Chair was ordered to appoint

two lay delegates to the Committee on Itinerancy and Orders.

The committee on Credentials reported Asenath Skidmore delegate from Manona The report was adopted.

The Chair appointed R. W. Wilson and C. H. Babcock to the committee on Itinerancy and Orders. R. W. Wilson resigned.

The following committees were appointed

Resolutions: -Rev. J. A. Preston, Rev. Thos. Hartley, and J. E. Grinnell. Sunday Schools:-Rev. H. W. Rose and R. W. Mack.

Missions:—Rev. O. L. Snow, Rev. J. C. McGovern and R. W. Wilson.

Statistics:- Rev. R. W. Mack and J. E. Grinnell.

Books and Periodicals:—Rev. S. A. Gilley, Rev. O. L. Snow and George Logsdon.

It was ordered to proceed to the election of the ministerial members of the committee on Pastoral Relations. Revs. S. A. Gilley, H. J. Richardson and J. T. Platt were elected.

The time of the conference sessions was fixed as follows; morning session from 8:30 to 11:30, afternoon session from 1:30 to close at the discretion of the conference.

A letter from Rev. F. E. Calhoon, Missionary to Eastern Montana was read and referred to the committee on Pastoral Relations and Statistics.

Rev. J. A. Preston, F. J. Wilson and A. W. Hall were appointed committee on memorials.

The Roll was called and corrected.

It was ordered, on motion of Rev. S. A. Gilley, to reaffirm our action of last year relating to licentiates acting as delegates to the conference.

Conference adjourned by limitation.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

An excellent sermon was preached by Rev. H W. Rose from Matt. 5: 13, "Ye are the salt of the earth"

The Roll was called.

The committee on credentials reported J. R. Little from Pilot Rock and John McLeod from Dayton. The report was a dopted.

The Chair appointed John McLeod to the committee of Itinerancy and Orders to take the place of R. W. Wilson who resigned.

Letters from Rev J. H. Meek were read.

The official report of the President, Rev. I. H. Meek, was read and adopted except that part of the report relating to the appointment of Mina Johnson assistant pastor at Manona. The appointment of Rev. R. W. Mack to Howardville and St. Charles circuit was concidered a part of the report. (See Presidents report.)

It was ordered that all papers to come before the conference be referred to the proper committees, after being read, without farther action.

A letter from Rev. W. J. Davis was read, which contained a report of his work and a recommendation to the conference to travel under its direction.

The committee on camp meeting reported and the report was

adopted. See report No. I.

The committee on credentials reported E. E. Jones, from Butler, and Samuel Hoover, from Hoover and Walker circuits. Report adopted.

Letters were read from C. P. Sage, M. E. Grinnell, W. H. Stanley,

and R. E. Rose.

The examination of character was taken up and the name of C. P. Sage was called. A communication from him had been read and his character was passed.

Rev. J. H. Meek was called and his case was laid over until his

delegate should arrive and offer his report.

The names of Revs S A. Gilley and J. T. Platt were called. They reported and their characters was passed.

The committee on credentials reported W. M. Gippe from La

Porte circuit. The report was adopted.

The names of Revs. H. W. Rose and Albert Johnson were called. They reported and their characters were passed.

Ordered on record the following official ruling, "That the church

and not the pastor, shall correct the church roll."

On motion of Rev. S. A. Gilley the following telegram of sympathy was ordered sent to the President of the conference, Rev. J. H. Meek; —"2 Thess. 2: 16, 17. With deepest sympathy; our greetings."

The names of Revs. R. W. Mack, O. L. Snow, H. J. Richardson, and Thomas Hartley, were called. They reported and their characters were passed.

The committee on credentials reported Lizzie Thompson and

Orpha J. Clark, fr m West Union. The report was adopted.

Ordered that the auditing committee be continued, and that they be required to bring in a report before the Treasurer's report.

It was ordered that the chair appoint a committee of two on the roll of Honored Dead. Revs. S. A. Gilley and Thos. Hartley were appointed

The character of Rev. B. F. Logsdon was passed.

Ordered that the chair appoint a committee of one in P. O. addresses. Rev. H. J. Richardson was appointed.

A motion that the collection to be taken up the coming Sunday

be for incidentals. Motion lost.

Ordered that a collection be now taken for incidentals. Amount raised was, cash \$8.47 and \$1.00 promised.

The following characters were passed: Revs. John Balcir, J. A.

Preston and T. C. Breeding.

Committee on religeous services reported that Rev. O. L. Snow would preach the opening sermon to-night.

Conference adjourned by motion. Doxology was sung. The benediction by Rev. I. T. Platt.

SECOND DAY.

MORNING SESSION.

The devotional exercises were conducted by Rev. John Balch,

The committee on credentials reported J. A. Laird, delegate from Wayne, and Truman Smith, from Masonville and Dundee. Adopted

J. A. Laird, W. M. Gippe, and R. W. Wilson were appointed lay members of the committee on Pastoral Relations.

The time for the election of the conference officers was set for 2 11. M., to-day.

Worster Kingsbury's certificate of Elders Orders was read and referred to the committee on Itinerancy and Orders.

A paper relating to the Manona work was read and ordered laid on the table.

Letters recommending R. E. Willis of Marengo, D. M. Wright, C. B. Frost, and Leonard DeVore of Manona, to travel under direction of the conference, were read.

A petition looking to the formation of a new conference, was presented to the conference and referred to the following committee. Rev. J. T. Platt, Rev. Geo. S. Fry, and C. H. Babcock.

Letters recommending A. G. Gage of Manona, and Mina Johnson

of Guthrie, to travel, were read.

The following characters were passed; Revs. J.J. Fell, Geo. S. Fry G. C. Houck, J. C. McGovern, F. A. Calhoon, W. H. Riley, M. K. Gifford, D. Stanford, James Lytle and A. Tuffin.

The Sec. was instructed to write M. K. Gifford as he made no re-

Rev. M. R. Baldridge was called. His character was not passed at the last conference. The action of the last conference in his case was questioned and the matter was referred to the following committee for investigation: Rev. S A. Gilley, John McLeod and Rev. Geo. S. Frv.

The characters of Rev. A. B. Wilkinson and Rev. D. F. Sheperd-

son was called and passed.

Conference adjourned for committee work. Doxology. Benediction by Rev. H. J. Richardson.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

Sermon by Rev. Thos. Hartley.

Minutes read and corrected.

The committee on credentials reported E. A. Heisler from Vinton and Geo. Bennett from Howardville and St. Charles. The report was referred back to the committee for correction. The committee then reported E. A. Heisler from Vinton and the report was adopted

A telegram of greeting from the State W. C. T. U., in convention

at Creston, was read.

The order of the day was called for, and the conference proceeded

to the election of officers.

The first ballot for President was an informal one. Rev. J. A. Preston received a majority of all the votes cast. The vote was made formal and he was declared President of the conference for the ensuing year.

Upon first ballot Rev. F. J. Wilson was re-elected Secretary for

the ensueing year.

Upon first ballot Rev. J. C. McGovern was duly elected Conference Treasurer.

By the renewal of the articles of incorporation it became necessary to elect five Trustees.

It was ordered to elect one first for one year, then one for two vears etc.

Upon first ballot John McLeod was elected trustee for one year.

On first ballot C. N. Fox was elected trustee for two years.

Upon first ballot Revs. J. T. Platt, Geo. S. Fry, and H. J. Richardson, were respectively elected for three, four and five years.

The committee on credentials reported Richard Wing, delegate from Maquoketa. Report adopted.

Revs. S. A. Gilley and H. J. Richardson were re-elected to committee on Itinerancy and Orders

Revs. R. W. Mack, H. J. Richardson and D. E. Knapp were elected committee on Presidency.

Revs. H. W. Rose, Geo. S. Fry, J. C. McGovern and J. A. Preston were elected the conference Judicial Committee.

It was ordered that the committee on Itinerancy and Orders be the Camp Meeting Committee.

It was ordered to proceed to fix the time and place of the next camp meeting.

Ordered to fix the place by call of the roll. Upon first call, no place was fixed. It was then ordered to confine the voting to Guthrie, Marengo, and Immanuel, and Guthrie was the place chosen for the next camp meeting.

A motion was made and seconded that the time should be the last Saturday in May. A substitute was offered to fix the time to the third Tuesday in Aug. The whole matter as to time of camp meeting was then by vote laid on the table. It was moved to hold the camp meeting at the time of the next Annual conference, but the motion was tabled.

It was then ordered to re-consider the fixing the time of the next camp meeting. It was moved and carried to fix the time of next camp meeting some time during this session of the conference.

It was ordered to seat George Bennett delegate from Howardville and St. Charles in place of Garrett Winterink who desired to go home, both being elected in good faith.

Conference adjourned for committee work.

THIRD DAY.

MORNING SESSION.

Devotional exercises were conducted by Rev. J. T. Platt.

The roll was called and the minutes read.

Rev. J. A. Preston on account of the pressure of work, resigned his place as chairman of the committee on Resolutions. It was accepted and Rev. H. W. Rose was elected in his place.

A letter from Rev. J. H. Meek was read in which there was a

request that the conference join him in prayer from 9 to 9:20 o'clock, on Saturday morning, for the healing of sister Meek's body. The time specified was made the order of the day.

Rev. H. W. Rose offered the following resolution which was

adopted

Resolution. Whereas, Our beloved sister, M. C. Grinnell, has been lately bereft of her husband, therefore, -B? It Resolved, that the Secretary of the conference be instructed to write a let er of sympathy from the conference to her.

The committee on the action of the conference in the case of Rev M. R. Baldridge reported. Report was adopted. See report No. 2. The committee on Sunday Schools reported, and their report was

adopted. See report No. 3.

A letter from Rev. J. H. Meek was read.

Rev. T. F. Blair, Rev. J. T. Platt and J. A. Laird were appointed a committee to investigate as to the needs of Rev. J. H. Meek and wife, in their affliction.

Two letters from C. N. Fox, Beaconsfield, were read. His name was ordered to be placed on the roll as delegate from Beaconsfield. The name of W. H. Stanley was also ordered placed on the roll as

delegate from Manona.

It was ordered to send the following telegram to the W. C. T. U. Conventio at Creston, Iowa:—"We the members of the Iowa Wesleyan Conference to the Iowa W. C. T. U. 'Christian greeting; let us unite on the platform outlined in Nehemiah 4: 14,'"

A letter from I. Colyer was read and his name was ordered plac-

ed on the roll of delegates, as delegate from Des Moines.

On motion of Rev. S. A. Gilley, it was ordered that it is the sense of this conference that whenever there are available funds at hand the trustees should secure the purchase of the undivided half of the Beaconsfield church, now owned by the M. E. society, to be deeded to the conference

It was ordered to send Rev. J. H Meek \$3:08 due him for confer-

ence postage, by Rev T. F Blair

Rev. J H. Meek's name was called again, his statistical report was

read and his character passed

The name of D F. Sheperdson was taken up and he was reported by Rev. J T. Platt. His character passed. The characters of Revs. M. R. Baldridge and T. F Blarr also passed.

The committee on books and periodicals reported and the re-

port was adopted. See report No. 18.

The character of Revs. D. E. Knapp and F. J. Wilson were passed. The name of Rev. L. True was called. The question as to from whom he should receive his license, was raised, and the chair ruled that if the character of a licentiate in the pastorate, is not impugned by the local church of which he is a member, his ministerial relation is with the conference. Rev L True reported and his character was passed by vote of the conference

The committee on Resolutions made a partial report through Rev Thos Hartley The report was adopted. See report No. 4

Rev. W. H. Kennedy, the Connectional Missionary Secretary was introduced.

The committee on the case of Rev. J. H. Meek reported, the report was adopted See report No. 5.

The following characters were passed, Revs. (). M. True, E. R. Dodd, A. W. Hall, Mary Sheperdson, and James Means Rev. C. M. Bamford's license was not renewed, and his name was dropped.

Rev. W. F. DeHarppart having taken work in another denomination, was considered withdrawn.

It was the order of the day to hold a Missionary meeting first thing to-morrow afternoon. Conference adjourned by limitation. Prayer by Rev. E R Dodd Announcements Benediction by A. W. Hall.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

Rev R. W. Mack conducted the devotional exercises. The minutes were read

Rev Walton, of the Evangelical church of La Port city, and Rev J W. Shawffle, Sunday School Missionary, were introduced to the conference

The name of Rev. C. M. Howe was called, his case was referred to a committee of three, to be appointed by the chair

The conference adjourned for a half hour for committee work, and was called again at 3:45.

The chair appointed Rev Geo. S Fry, Rev. Thos. Hartley and Samuel Hoover, committee on case of Rev. C. M Howe.

Papers recommending Chas. Skidmore of Monona, and Lizzie w of Tracy, to travel under the direction of the conference, were

The committee on Memorials reported through Rev. F. J. Wilson; the report was adopted. See report No. 6.

The committee on Missions reported, through their chairman Rev.

O. L. Snow, the report was adopted. See report No. 7.

Rev O. L. Snow offered the following resolution of sympathy which was adopted:—Whereas in the providence of God our Heavenly Father, it has seemed good to remove from our midst, and from the hearth-stone, our beloved B.o. Rev. Geo. Allen, Therefore

Be It Resolved:—That we recognize in this the loving hand of God and would extend to our sister in her bereavement our heart-felt sympathy, and by these presents assure her that she is not forgotten by us. It was made the order of the day to hear the General Agt. report immediately after the Missionary session.

It was moved and carried that we invite the General Missionary Sec. to make his address during the missionary session of the con-

ference

The committee on the case of Rev. C. Howe made their report through their chairman Rev Geo. S. Fry. The report was adopted.

See report No. 8.

It was ordered to take from the table the piper relating to Manona circuit. It was re-read. It was moved and seconded to adopt the paper. It was moved and seconded to amend, by striking out the words relating to appointing power. A general substitute for the whole, to refer the paper to the committee on Pastoral Relations, prevailed. It was ordered that the committee on Pastoral Relations be instructed to include in their report the points contiguous to Manona Mission as possible mission points, provided they appoint Rev. Albert Johnson to that field.

The committee on the petition to form the Missouri River Conference reported, and the report was a lopte 1. See report No. 9.

Conference adjourned by motion. After the announcements the benediction was pronounced by Rev. J. C. McGovern.

FOURTH DAY.

MORNING SESSION.

The devotional exercises were conducted by Rev. J. A. Preston. The roll was called and the minutes read.

It was ordered that the chair appoint a committee of three on disbursements of Superannuated Ministers Fund, and the chair

appointed Rev. Geo. S. Fry, Rev. Thos. Hartley and J. A Laird. Order of the day called for and prayer was had for the healing of sister Meek.

Rev. Thos. Hartley of committee on resolutions made a final report, which was adopted. See report No. 10.

The money received for sale of song books bought in connection with camp meeting was presented and referred to the committee on camp meetings.

Ordered that the time of the conference camp meeting be now fixed. It was moved and carried that the conference camp meeting com-

Ordered that a committee be raised to draft rules governing the Ministerial Institute. Revs. A. W. Hall, S. A. Gilley and O. L. Snow were elected.

A postal card from Rev. J. H. Meek was read.

The order of the day was called for, and approperate services were held in memory of Revs. Joel Grinnell Sr. and George Allen, conducted by Rev. J. A. Preston.

It was oredred that Rev. F. J. Wilson, Sec. of conference, Rev. O. L. Snow and John McLeod be committee on conference paper.

The publishing of the conference minutes was referred to committee on conference paper,

It was ordered that the chair appoint a committee to secure funds to publish the conference minutes in pamphlet form.

It was ordered that the time of the next conference be left to the

suggestion of the connectional book committee,

Bids for the next conference were received, West Union, Butler, Marengo and Hoover were received. The roll was called and Marengo received the higest number of votes and was declared to be the place to hold the next conference.

The order of the day was taken up which was the missionary session of the conference. After the meeting was opened Rev. W. H. Kennedy made his address as General Missionary Secretary.

Rev. A. W. Hall, the General Agent, made his report.

The committee on disbursement of the Superannuated Fund made final report which was adopted. See report No 12.

John McLeod, Rev. J. A. Preston and J. A. Laird were appointed to look into the needs of sister Johnson, widow of the late Rev. H. W. Johnson.

The committee on conference paper reported, the report was a-

dopted. See report No. 15.

Ordered that as far as the funds will go the Treasurer pay the

appropriations of last year, each to receive his proportion.

The committee on Itinerancy and Orders, through their chairman, Rev. S. A. Gilley, made their report, which was adopted. See report No. 16.

Rev S. A. Gilley, chairman of committee on Pastoral Relations,

made his report, which was adopted. See report No. 17.

A hearty vote of thanks was tendered the people of Immanuel chapel for the royal entertainment the conference had received.

The following Missionary appropriations were made, Maquoketa \$25:00. Beaconsfield \$25:00.

Rev. Geo. S. Fry protested against the Missionary appropriations and the whole missionary proceedings as illegal.

An appropriation of \$50:00 from the missionary fund was made to Rev. O. L. Snow as Conference Evangelist.

The conference adjourned by motion. Prayer by Rev. J. T. Platt. F. J. Wilson, Conference Secretary.

CAMP MEETING.

We recognize the importance of mission work, both at home and abroad, and while we are greatly pleased on the one hand with the general advance steps on this line, on the other hand we deplore the condition, especially of the foreign field,

When we remember that the money spent by professed Christians on "needless adornments," or the money spent for the baneful to-bocco habit, exceeds the amount spent on foreign missionary work so far that the missionary offering would not equal a lawful interest on either the item spent for "needles adornment, or tobacco," we feel like hanging our heads in shame.

Brethren; are we as Wesleyan Methodist wholly clear on these lines? and have we done our duty, or has worldliness crept in and marred our purity and spotted our character as a reform church?

We hereby enter our earnest protest against this needless waste of money, and suggest that this money be put to a better use, that of carrying the gospel to the heathen.

We also would call the attention of all of our members to the fact that we are a *reform* church, and earnestly exhort them both pastor and laity; preacher and people, not to be led, but to *lead* in this line of reform.

We understand that at this present moment there lies in confusion and on the site for building, all the material with which to put up a much needed building on our work in Rokinso, Timne Land, Africa which is hindered, and the material, in a sense, wasting, simply for the lack of means with which to build, and for the lack of the building, our work is hampered, our cause hindered, our hearts saddened and our Gospel put to shame in the eyes of the heathen.

We pray God that if ever a Wesleyan Methodist brother spends a nickle for tobacco for the purpose of gratifying a morbid and perverted apetite, that his sleep may be disturbed by the clanking chains of superstition and slavery, and the iron heel of despotism and oppression of heathendom may be felt and seen in his dreams until he sees the deplorable condition of his less fortunate brother across the sea so vividly that he will lose his taste for the weed, or else forgo this habit and use the price of his tobacco for the foreign missionary field.

We farther pray that when the sister spends the quarter for the needless adornment, that the shriek of the husband-whipped-child-wife, and the heart rending cry of the drowning girl babe, as it vainly extends its hands towards us for help, or clutches in its tiny dark skinned fingues the foam of the wave, as it sinks to rise no more, until it stands before Him to say "they never told my mother any better," be heard, until the heart will be wrung with grief so deep that no longer our missions will be hampered for the lack of means.

In a word the Wesleyan Methodist church stands committed to approve and indorse everything right and good, and oppose everything evil, whether apparently expedient or otherwise, we are founded, not on expediency but on righteousness and truth.
