A new Wesleyan Methodist Church was organized at Waseca, Minn. on Nov. 5 by the pastor, Rev. H. F. Clark. Twenty one people formed the charter membership group with others expecting to unite with the church in the near future.

The Sunday School has been organized with three classes and plans are being made to reach out into the community.

The auditorium was cleaned and prepared for worship by the young people of the Albaton Wesleyan Methodist Church of Sloan. Sixty new bronze Samsonite chairs have been placed in the auditorium for seating. A piano has been given to the group by Florence Fair of
